



Janell Jones Attends Youth Range Workshop

Janell Jones, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Darrell Jones, was among the 36 Texas high school students chosen to attend the Youth Range Workshop at the Texas Tech University Center, Junction, Texas, June 19-24.

Selection was based on outstanding projects and interest in range management. The weeklong workshop was sponsored by the Texas

Section of the Society for Range Management (SRM). This was the 34th consecutive year for the education youth activity. More than 9,000 young people have benefited since the first workshop in 1955.

The workshop is designed to recognize outstanding range and ranch youth and to provide them with an opportunity for complimentary training in range management and leadership skills. During the workshops, participants learned to identify plants by collecting and mak-

ing a plant press, evaluate rangeland potential and current condition, manage rangeland for livestock production and wildlife habitat, and practice ranch planning.

Field trips to the Joe B. Norris Ranch in Kimble County, and to the Kerr Wildlife Management Area in Kerr County allowed the participants to get hands on experiences to use the knowledge that they had gained in the classroom.

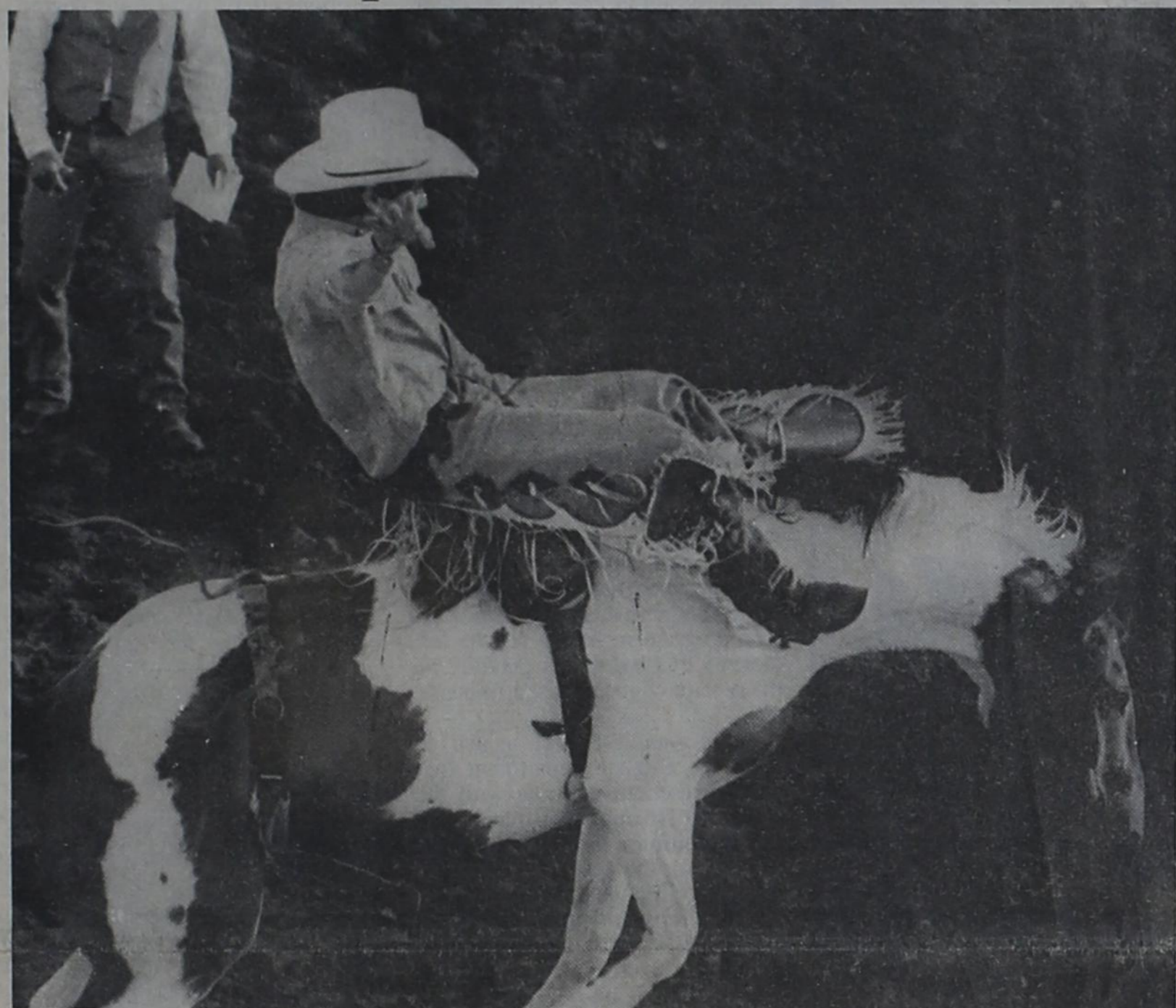

1988 Stampede Rodeo Kicks Off With Downtown Parade



RIDE'EM COWBOY will be the yell as the bronc riders come out of the chute in the 48th Annual Post Stampede Rodeo that will begin Thursday, August 11. Many plans are being made to make this a festive and fun occasion.

Post Stampede Rodeo activities get underway on Thursday, August 11 at 5:30 p.m. in downtown Post when the traditional rodeo parade kicks off the 48th annual August event.

Post Chamber of Commerce Manager Kathryn Floyd has announced that the chamber will award \$500 in cash prizes to the winning float entries in this year's parade - \$225 for first place, \$175 for second place and \$100 for third place.

Heading up the parade as Marshall will be Homer McCrary who will be leading the floats and the area riding groups that are always a part of the yearly parade.

Following the parade on Thursday, and on Friday and Saturday evenings, there will be lots of action at the Post Stampede Arena beginning at 7:45 each night with the Grand Entry.

The evening's show starts promptly at 8 p.m. Thursday, Friday and Saturday with all your favorite rodeo events - bareback bronc riding, calf roping, saddle

bronc riding, barrel races, team roping, bull riding, steer wrestling and junior flag races for riders 12 and under.

Sure to be a favorite event with the crowds this year is the junior barrel race for riders 14 and under.

The 14 and under barrel races will be a nightly event and a jackpot will be awarded each night.

Another popular event is back this year - the wild cow milking contest - and should prove to be as much fun to the audience and the participants as it has in the past.

Books on all rodeo events open Monday, August 8 at 8 a.m. and close Wednesday, August 10 at 12 noon.

Three familiar faces will be back for this year's show - producer Terry Walls of Stephenville, announcer Marv Pierce of Clovis, New Mexico and rodeo clown Hoss Fly Atchinson of Midland.

Tickets for the 48th Annual Post Stampede Rodeo are \$4 for adults and \$1 for children 12 and under.

GESC Funds Available for Major Home Repairs

Guadalupe Economic Services Corporation (GESC) of Lubbock announces the availability of funds to make major home repairs for low-income, elderly or handicapped homeowners in Garza County through a grant from Farmer's Home Administration making these funds available to rural areas.

Margy McMennamy, GESC Housing Director, states that this money can be used for such repairs as roofing, plumbing, electrical rewiring and handicap accessibility.

A total of \$10,000 per home is available depending on the value and condition of the home before repairs are begun.

Only 55 percent of the value can be spent for repairs and the house must be brought up to standards with the money invested or the house will not be considered for the program.

The first \$5000 is repayable in the form of a five percent loan; the remaining amount used for thermal improvements will be a grant to the homeowner.

This rehab program has been in existence for two years and is coming to a close at the end of September, 1988. Anyone wishing to apply should do so immediately.

Applicants must have an appointment and applications will not be taken unless the homeowner brings with him the following: 1) Proof of ownership - must be living in the home one year prior to application. 2) 1987 income tax returns and, 3) Copies of property tax receipts - property taxes must NOT be delinquent.

Ranches to Meet in Annual Showdown

Twelve of Texas' best-known ranches will meet in Wichita Falls August 19-20 to put their skills to the test in a real cowboy showdown - the annual Texas Ranch Roundup.

Now in its eighth year, the Texas Ranch Roundup showcases the time-honored skills and talents of the state's working cowboys. On the line for participating ranches are bragging rights as the best ranch in Texas.

Patterned closely after daily ranch chores, Texas Ranch Roundup competition includes team roping, team branding, penning, horse breaking (better known as bronc riding) and wild cow milking.

These and other events highlight the rugged, romantic lifestyle that Texas ranchers have maintained since the birth of the cattle industry.

In addition to area competition, roundup participants challenge each other in a chuckwagon

cookoff; a first lady contest honoring ranch women for contributions and knowledge of the industry; and a talent competition featuring painting and photography, as well as favorite campfire songs and skits.

The Texas Ranch Roundup illustrates just what its like to be a Texas cowboy -- the kind who still works cattle every day for a living," says event coordinator Ruth Ann Allred of Falls Distributing Co.

"Ranch life has withstood the test of time, changing very little since the cattle industry's inception on the Texas frontier."

This two-day event, adds Allred, also revives the traditional concept of the "rodeo," which began as both reunion and friendly competition.

"Like their forefathers did for the early rodeos in the late 1800's, entire ranch families and crews

come from throughout the state to visit, swap tales and watch as their outfits compete at working cattle."

Returning to defend its 1987 Texas Ranch Roundup win is the Randerbrook-Spade Ranch in Colorado City.

Also competing this year are Cowan & Son Circle Bar Ranch (Seymour), Double U Hereford Ranch (Levelland), JA Cattle Co. (Palo Duro), King Ranch, Inc. (Kingsville), Lewis Ranches (Clarendon), Moorhouse Ranch Co. (Benjamin), Pitchfork Land & Cattle Co. (Guthrie), R.A. Brown Ranch (Throckmorton), Tongue River Ranch and Spur Headquarters Ranches (Dumont); and W.T. Waggoner Estate (Vernon).

The 1988 Texas Ranch Roundup, held at the Wichita County Mounted Patrol Arena, benefits the North Texas Rehabilitation Center (Wichita Falls), the West Texas Rehabilitation Center (Arlington) and the West Texas Boys Ranch (San Angelo).

Kirkpatrick Named Defensive Most Valuable Player at Game

Ben Kirkpatrick, former All-State football player from Post, was named "Defensive Most Valuable Player" of the North-South All-Star

Game played at the Astrodome in Houston Tuesday, July 26.

Kirkpatrick recovered a fumble in the end zone for the winning touchdown as the North defeated the South, 13-7.

With 7:17 remaining in the game South running back Wayne Williams (who rushed 16 times for 173 yards, an all-star record, earning him the offensive most valuable player honors) fumbled the ball.

The ball rolled back into the end zone where Kirkpatrick recovered it for the touchdown.

Kirkpatrick was really surprised when he found out about his honor.

"I was on the field visiting with some players and reporters when one of the (Odessa) Permian coaches came up and congratulated me.

When I asked him what for he directed my attention to the scoreboard where my name was in lights about the defensive MVP.

I nearly fell over from the shock."

Kirkpatrick went to the game just happy to play one more high school game before he started work for the Texas Tech Red Raiders.

"I was happy to play one more

game before the year was over."

"The coaches were real good and the players were of course good and big."

"I was intimidated at the first practice but after I saw I could play with them I felt pretty confident."

Kirkpatrick started the whole game at the weak side linebacker position. He played the whole game at that position with no substitutions.

After his graduation in May from Post High School Kirkpatrick moved to Lubbock to work and prepare for the football season at Tech.

He signed a letter of intent to play for the Red Raiders this fall. Kirkpatrick stopped working to go to the All-Star game. Now he is just working out getting ready to report to Tech on August 8.

"I hope I put Post on the map" proclaimed Kirkpatrick as we ended the telephone interview. Not only did he put Post on the map but he showed a lot of people across the state what we have seen in the last four years as a Post Antelope, a love for the game of football and the skill to be the best in the state at it

Roxanne Power to Study At Cornell University

Roxanne Power is a very busy person - always moving on to new things and places; new learning experiences.

A native of Post and the daughter of Tom Power of Post and Iris Parker Hamilton of Lubbock, Roxanne will soon be leaving Colorado to make her home in Ithaca, New York, where she has been accepted into Cornell University's Master of Fine Arts program.

Roxanne finished high school, with honors, at Fountain Valley Private High School in Colorado Springs, Colorado, and spent her freshman and sophomore college years at Colorado State University at Fort Collins.

She graduated from the University of Colorado in Boulder in May of 1987 with a B.A. degree in Creative Writing-Poetry.

After graduation, she remained out of school for one year to begin her own business "Sparklettes Housecleaning," with a friend and fellow writer.

Together they expanded the business successfully for several months and Roxanne began to make applications to several graduate schools.

Cornell University was the first with the good news. They had accepted her into their Master of Fine Arts program in poetry for the fall of 1988 and word was pending on the receipt of merit-based financial aid.

This was in March - and in April the English department faculty representative wrote with the news that Roxanne had received a full tuition scholarship-over \$12,000-for the year, plus a \$3,000 stipend for living expenses.

The representative was also working toward an increase in the stipend, in exchange for work for the department on the staff of the literary magazine "Epoch," and within program-coordinating committees for the graduate English department.

Roxanne soon received more good news - she was the recipient of a full fellowship, plus a job on the editorial staff with \$6,000 for the school year.

This was easily her best offer, so she wrote immediately to accept, and began arranging her af-

fairs for the upcoming summer move to Ithaca.

Commenting on her future plans, Roxanne said, "Cornell is a fortunate roost for my graduate writing years, as it is one of the few programs with an MFA/PhD degree option in my field - perhaps one of two or three in the country."

"That will help immensely when I begin to apply for teaching positions after I receive my degree. My current plans are to complete the MFA degree within two years and a large collection of related poetry for my thesis and possibly a larger fictional work."

"Following the conclusion of my degree requirements, I hope to travel throughout Europe for two years, possibly teaching English to French-speaking students and then returning to Cornell or another university to initiate my doctorate work in English; either drama or literary criticism."

Roxanne is not setting limitations on herself, but she is concerned now with making "one manageable movement at a time."

Although she is looking ahead to Cornell, Ithaca and her writing, her thoughts are also on her family. "My immediate desires will focus on the frequent visits of my family to the upstate New York countryside in the fall, where unimaginable bursts of orange, red and yellow foliage light fields of gentle, swelling hills on fire in the autumn changing."

Use Pesticides Safely...

For most of us, pesticides are commonplace in the home or apartment. At the first sign of insects or other types of critters, we reach for whatever is handy to get rid of the pests.

"This kind of familiarity with pesticides can lead to carelessness and potential problems," said Dr Phil Hamman, entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"There are so many different products on the market today, all aimed at taking care of specific problems, such as home pests, lawn and garden pests, and plant diseases. Use of pesticides has become quite complicated over the years, and that's where the danger lies," Hamman said.

"With specific products for specific pest problems, safety with pesticides is all the more important today," said the entomologist. "There are hosts of potential risks associated with the use of all of these products as well as specific risks with certain ones."

"That's why it's so important to read the label of a particular product before buying it to make sure it's what you need to handle your specific situation. Then, before using that product, read the label again to make sure you are applying the pesticide properly and using the necessary precautions."

A label on a pesticide container is a legal document, so make sure it's

in place at all times, Hamman said. That means storing the pesticide in an area protected from the weather so that neither the product nor the label will deteriorate. Never store leftover pesticides in an unmarked container. Of course, always store such products out of the reach of children; it's best to keep pesticides in a locked area.

Two major problems in using pesticides are breathing fumes and absorption through unprotected skin, said Hamman. Exposure to pesticides in these two ways can cause definite problems.

Always mix pesticides in an open area where there is plenty of fresh air. Wear gloves and other protective clothing. If you accidentally spell pesticides on your skin, wash immediately. If chemicals get into your eyes, flush them with water for 15 minutes and get medical attention immediately. If clothes get contaminated, take them off as soon as possible and wash your skin with soap and water. Wash contaminated clothing twice, separately, in a strong detergent.

When spraying or dusting large areas, wear safety glasses and a face mask, or wear sunglasses and cover your nose and mouth with a handkerchief. If you can smell a pesticide, it's entering your lungs, Hamman said.

If you suspect pesticide poisoning or contamination, immediately call your doctor or the nearest Poison Control Center.

North Central: 1934, 1951 through 1957, 1963, 1967, 1971, 1978 and 1984.

East Texas: 1951, 1952, 1954, 1956, 1964 and 1981.

Trans-Pecos: 1934, 1935, 1949 and 1951 through 1957.

Edwards Plateau: 1934, 1935, 1951, 1952, 1954, 1955, 1956, 1962, 1963, 1967, 1971 and 1984.

South Central Texas: 1951, 1952, 1954, 1955, 1956, 1963, 1964, 1967, 1971 and 1984.

USDA to Buy Beef to Ease Drought Impact

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has earmarked an extra \$50 million to buy bulk ground beef in a bid to ease the impact of the drought on cattlemen, U.S. Senator Phil Gramm said.

"This short-term plan will allow USDA to buy about 45 million pounds of beef in addition to its regular purchases," the senator said.

"The effect of the purchase will be to provide badly needed market assistance to cattle raisers."

The drought has forced many ranchers and farmers to thin their herds, prompting depressed cattle prices nationwide.

"The beef purchase is the latest

in a series of steps that the government is taking to deal with the drought," Gramm noted.

Already in Texas, 110 counties have been approved for emergency haying and grazing on set-aside land and the USDA has finally agreed to drop its so-called "drought severity formula" and open Conservation Reserve Program land for haying.

Earlier, the department decided to open its emergency feed program in 40 counties.

"These new steps by USDA are helpful, particularly after the department was initially slow in responding to the drought," Gramm said.
