Search For Pow-Wow Murderer

WITCHCRAFT PROBE TO RESULT FROM MURDER

(By Associated Press)
ALLENTON, Pa., Mar. 19.—A second alleged pow-wow doctor was sought by investigators today in connection with the death by poison of Miss Verna Octavia Delp. It was intimated an investigation would be made of the whole practice of powwowism in the country.

Deciphering of one of the mysterious missives found tied over the dead girl's breast when her body was found Saturday in a field near the Catasauqua Gun club range, indicated to investigators she had feared death or violence. Recording of the symbol was contained in a letter received by Chief of Police Bernard from an unnamed person in Philadelphia.

The letters "N I R" which appeared on one of the missives, and which were repeated and set down in the form of a cross, are said to constitute a charm against robbers and murderers in the "Hex Ritual." None but those versed in powwow practice would have been able to give it to her, it was said.

Coroner Bausch and District Attorney Gerhart still hold to the theory that Miss Delp was murdered, and that the practice of "Hex" was a factor in her death.

"WITCH DOCTOR" BECAME LEGEND

ROME, Ga., Mar. 19 (P).—Death of an 80 year old "witch doctor" who had become a legend among superstitious negroes in this vicinity where she had plied her trade many years was as much a mystery today as ever. A coroner's jury had failed to cast light on how or why Miss Martha Russell was cut and beaten to death.

J. A. Humphrey, a mechanic, who discovered the woman's body when he called upon her for treatment for "poison" in his system failed to tell the jury anything other than that she was giving him medicine made from roots and peach buds, and that dead spiders, was medals, knives and many trinkets played a part in her treatment.

OPEN BIDS ON LAND LEASING

QUICK RESPONSE FOR SALE IS HAD AT CAPITOL TODAY

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, March 19.—Bids on university oil and gas properties, opened today by Land Commissioner J. T. Robinson through an agreement with the attorney general's department, ran well past the \$1,000,000 mark within less than an hour after a check of the offers was started.

The leases were advertised for sale January 2, but stopped through an injunction suit against the land commissioner. The state's action was taken so payments of bidders might be returned.

The largest check received by the commissioner represented an offer of \$711,168 by Leland Fikes of Fort Worth for block 30, section 32, in Crane county.

Bids of the Humble Oil and Refining company totaled almost this figure.

MARRS SPEAKS AT TECH; ENROLLMENT 2061

COLLEGE HAS CONVOCATION THIS MORNING

STATE SCHOOL HEAD, IN TALK, STRESSES EDUCATION

"The principal purpose of education is to produce first class American citizens; all other results are incidental," S. M. N. Marrs, state school superintendent of Austin, said this morning in addressing the first convocation of the spring term of Tech College, held in the gymnasium.

Preceding the principal address, Dr. Paul W. Horn, president of the college here, announced that the year's enrollment was now 2061, slightly less than double the enrollment of Tech's first year. He predicted that the first year's enrollment would be doubled by the end of this week. Other than Mr. Marrs, Dr. Horn introduced M. J. Duncan, superintendent of the city schools and Miss Mae Murfee, county school superintendent.

Mr. Marrs, who was a member of the committee that located Texas Technological college here, pointed out the value of education. "Our system of public school education," he said, "is the most important institution supporting democracy."

FORT WORTH, March 19 (P).—Decapitated, apparently in an explosion, the body of John Kay, 59, was found here yesterday. A note said he feared he was going crazy. Kay, a stone quarryman, had not been seen since he left home Friday.

Police believe death was caused by a dynamite explosion. A fuse was found near the body, and the clothing was burned from the shoulders.

Constance Bennett Divorced, Report

PARIS, Mar. 19 (P).—Illness of Constance Bennett, American actress and daughter of Richard Bennett, has revealed her divorce from her husband, Richard M. Plant, in a French court recently.

Plant, who inherited approximately \$15,000,000 from his stepfather, Commodore Morton F. Plant, remained in close attendance at his former wife's bedside during a severe attack of appendicitis. Now, however, that her condition is much better he has made arrangements to sail on the Ile de France for America.

ROAD SESSION IS CONTINUED

MILLION AND HALF IN ADDITIONAL WORK WILL BE LET

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Mar. 19.—Having awarded contracts for new construction and maintenance, including surfacing for nearly 200 miles of roads aggregating \$1,295,961, yesterday, the state highway commission today will let contracts for about \$1,500,000 worth of additional work.

Contracts totalling \$627,421 were awarded for new construction as follows: Kerr county, highway 41; Brazos and Grimes counties, highway 6; Karnes county, highway 72; Starr county, highway 12-B; Eastland county, highway 23.

Maintenance awards, mostly for surfacing, were let as follows: Bowie county, highway 5; Marion county, highway 40; Potter county, highway 13; Reeves county, highways 3 and 27; Ward county, highway 82; Kimble county, highway 27; Mason and McCulloch counties, highway 9; Coleman county, highway 107; Colorado county, highway 3; Fayette county, highway 72; Gonzales county, highway 3.

County allotments included Archer county, \$277,834.69 for 16 miles concrete pavement; Scurry county, \$27,804.56; Matagorda county, \$38,016; Wichita county, \$13,651; Childress county, \$51,189; Freestone county, \$167,144; Ward county, \$62,254; Washington and Waller counties, \$16,536; Dimmitt county, \$28,672.

Oklahoma Man Is Wounded In Hold-Up

NEWKIRK, Okla., March 19 (P).—Apparently the victim of a robber whom he resisted, George Sanford, about 60 years old, was shot and killed here early today. His body, a bullet wound in the chest, was found in the front yard of his home, where he lived alone.

In one hand Sanford gripped a pistol. It had not been fired. In his clothing was found \$300.

REBELS STOP TRAIN AT SIDING NEAR ESCALON

(By Associated Press)
 Having captured the rebel stronghold of Torreon without a battle, federal armies today were pressing pursuit of the insurgents to the north.

General Calles, commander-in-chief of the government forces, promised a campaign of "extermination" against the rebels and was organizing a strong column to advance on Chihuahua, now important rebel base.

General Escobar, insurgent chief, who evacuated Torreon yesterday, consolidated his position at Escalon, 100 miles to the north and said he expected to engage the federals in a major battle within 24 hours. He asserted he evacuated Torreon to spare the inhabitants the horror of air raids, several of which over the week-end took four lives.

A request for peace terms was reported to have been received by President Portes Gil who declared he would not treat with the insurgents. The rebel general, however, denied suing for peace.

Escalon, the new insurgent headquarters, is a virtual oasis in an arid desert region. The insurgents believe it strategically stronger than Torreon.

The situation along the border was unchanged. Federal forces at Naco were still entrenched, while both sides awaited developments in Chihuahua.

'EXTERMINATION' DRIVE PLEDGED

MEXICO CITY, March 19 (P).—General Plutarco Elias Calles promised today to continue the "extermination" drive against the rebels.

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Mabel Normand Is Reported Very Ill

LOS ANGELES, March 19 (P).—Mabel Normand, former star of motion pictures, is suffering from "advanced tuberculosis in both lungs," Dr. E. C. Fishbaugh said today.

"Miss Normand is very sick," Dr. Fishbaugh said, "and her condition is unchanged."

The physician explained that while death was not imminent unless hemorrhages occurred, the actress had very little chance of recovering.

CATTLE ASSN. HAS BIG YEAR

MEMBERSHIP REACHES NEW PEAK; THEFTS SHOW INCREASE

(By Associated Press)
HOUSTON, March 19.—More new members were received by the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers' Association last year than in any other year since the war, the report of the executive committee today disclosed.

Seven hundred and twenty-five persons enlisted in the organization in 1928 and the net gain that year was 478 persons and 97,704 cattle. The present membership is 3,115, rendering 1,253,257 cattle.

Giving figures to show that 75 per cent of the association expense was for inspection work, the executive committee recommended that the association's territory be divided into districts to obtain more funds for that purpose.

MURDER SEEN AFTER BURNED TORSO FOUND

NEW ORLEANS MATRON MEETS DEATH IN BLAZING AUTO

(By Associated Press)
NEW ORLEANS, Mar. 19.—Discovery of a burned human torso in the charred wreckage of a sedan in Audubon park has presented a baffling mystery to the police.

The body was identified as that of Mrs. Janet Baker, widow of Colin M. Baker, prominent New Orleans man. Additional facts have turned the police to the theory of murder.

Early today a blazing automobile in front of her house aroused the attention of Mrs. E. M. Gilmer, known to newspaper readers as Dorothy Dix and she called the fire department. After the fire had been extinguished, the body was found on the remains of the front seat under the steering wheel. The car was traced to the Bakers and the police learned that Mrs. Baker had been missing during the night. Members of the family later identified the body.

Movements Were Mysterious
 Mrs. Baker, who ran a fashionable boarding house at her residence, was reported to have gone driving alone Monday night. She was also reported by one boarder, F. J. Scott, to have left the house about 5:30 o'clock this morning in company with an unidentified man and woman. Her movements during the night were a mystery as she said her bed had not been slept in or disturbed.

Mrs. Baker, who was in the habit of attending church early each day, wore practically no jewelry and carried only small sums of money. A theory of accidental fire and death was weakened, police said, by the fact that the car was standing in the roadway and was burned only in the center. The emergency brake

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Hoover Has No Plan For Drastic Change

WASHINGTON, March 19 (P).—President Hoover has no idea of any drastic dramatic prohibition drives as a means of bringing about the general law enforcement for which he declared in his inaugural address. The purpose of the chief executive is to build up the enforcement of laws generally, by tightening up the federal organization, and the reorganization of the federal judicial system.

Mr. Hoover is undertaking to reduce crime in the United States and in doing so he expects the support of the press and every good citizen of the country.

Policeman Killed, Result Gang Feud

NEW YORK, March 19 (P).—In a gang feud over control of liquor supply business a policeman riding in the car of a Brooklyn gang leader was killed today. The leader engaged in a gun fight with members of a rival gang.

Petrolman Daniel Maloney, 28, died with a bullet near his heart. Thomas Connell, 33, who police said was a friend of Maloney's was shot in the leg. Harold Richard, 41, was shot in the shoulder.

Connell, Richard and Charles Higgins, 28, said by police to be the leader of the other gang, who was captured near the scene of the shooting, were held for questioning.

AIRPORT ELECTION DATE IS APRIL 23

Meeting in a called session at the city hall yesterday afternoon, the Lubbock city commission set the date for the \$75,000 bond issue election for a municipal airport for Tuesday, April 23.

With the passage of the issue, the city will purchase 640 acres of land on the Plainview highway, north of the city, as a site for the airport. The port will be adequately equipped with hangars and other necessary equipment, if the election passes.

MORE RIVERS THREATENING TO OVERFLOW

POSSIBLE EPIDEMICS LOOM AS THREAT FROM FLOODS

ATLANTA, March 19.—Warnings of coming peril were sounded along the lower reaches of the Flint river today as that stream and the Chattahoochee poured swollen waters into the Apalachicola basin in Florida.

The Flint was still rising at Albany and West Bainbridge, Ga., but falling elsewhere. River Junction, Fla., where the two Georgia streams merge into the Apalachicola, was partially inundated. Its inhabitants in the exposed places had taken refuge with friends on safe ground before the flood arrived.

The Chattahoochee was more than three miles wide this morning about Fort Gaines. Boats were used to get children to and from schools and mail and passengers were brought by boat from Killen, two miles away.

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MODELS ARRIVING FOR CAR DISPLAY

New automobile designs are arriving in Lubbock daily for the Lubbock Automobile Show which will open on the afternoon of March 28, according to G. P. Kuykendall, president of the local Automobile Dealers' Association.

Latest models which have graced the magnificent show rooms of the New York, Chicago and St. Louis metropolitan centers will be on display here, Mr. Kuykendall said. Auto dealers are highly pleased with the co-operation being furnished them by manufacturers.

Present indications point to an automobile demonstration such as the motorcade of this section have never before witnessed. The variety of designs which will be on the floor at the Uptown Dallas Palace is expected to draw visitors here from the furthest points of the Lubbock trade territory.

PERMIT FOR BIG PRODUCE PLANT GIVEN

\$125,000 PROJECT IS STARTED TUESDAY; RECORDS FALL

Lubbock building permits today soared above the million dollar mark as a permit for the construction of a \$125,000 plant for the Lubbock Poultry and Egg Company was issued from the city hall.

The plant's total of \$1,075,503 breaks all records for building activity in the city and places this year about six weeks ahead of last. Permits reached the million mark in May last year.

With W. G. McMillan as the general contractor, construction began today on the mammoth poultry and egg plant, which is to be located at the corner of Fourth street and Avenue K. Construction will require about four months.

The plant will have an annual capacity of fifty cars of turkeys, 300 cars of chickens, 150 cars of eggs with 12,000 dozen eggs to the car and twenty cars of hides. The creamery will contain a capacity of butter and will produce 1800 gallons of butter daily.

Mr. McMillan announced that the two-story building will be of brick and reinforced concrete with a corrugated asbestos roof. It will contain 32,500 feet of floor space, including the following departments: Creamery, poultry dressing room, cold storage vaults, feeding room, warehouse, and boiler room.

Mrs. building total now stands at \$295,113 for 42 permits, showing a substantial gain over March, 1928, which had a total of \$233,533.

Lubbock was fourth in the entire state last month in building totals, being surpassed only by Houston, San Antonio and Fort Worth. This city out-totaled Dallas, Fort Arthur

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WORLD COURT ACCORD NEAR

UNITED STATES IS BUT
TWO STEPS AWAY
FROM PACT

(By Associated Press.)
GENEVA, March 19.—The United States is but two steps away from adhering to the World Court today, but League of Nations observers saw a distinct possibility that at least one of those steps might never be taken.

The two steps involve ratification of the protocol agreed upon yesterday by the Commission of International Jurists, ratification by the American Senate and by the forty nations which comprise the League of Nations, on the other.

Little opposition to the protocol is expected in the American Senate

since it is believed that Elihu Root, its author, conferred with the urbane here with the sanction of President Hoover and Republican leaders.

Approval by member nations of the League, however, presents quite a different matter. A single nation's disagreement with the terms of the protocol will be sufficient to prevent American adherence to the court under its terms. It is believed easily possible that some one state, or even more, may rebel against the conditions of the convention.

Such disagreement, which is feared particularly from Latin American League members, probably would have the effect of forcing an international conference at which a further thrashing out of the matter would be in order.

The protocol as finally adopted by the jurist commission grants the United States an opportunity to discuss any American objections to a proposed advisory opinion with the League council before the council votes this provision, in a measure insuring the semblance of American participation in League council discussions affecting the United

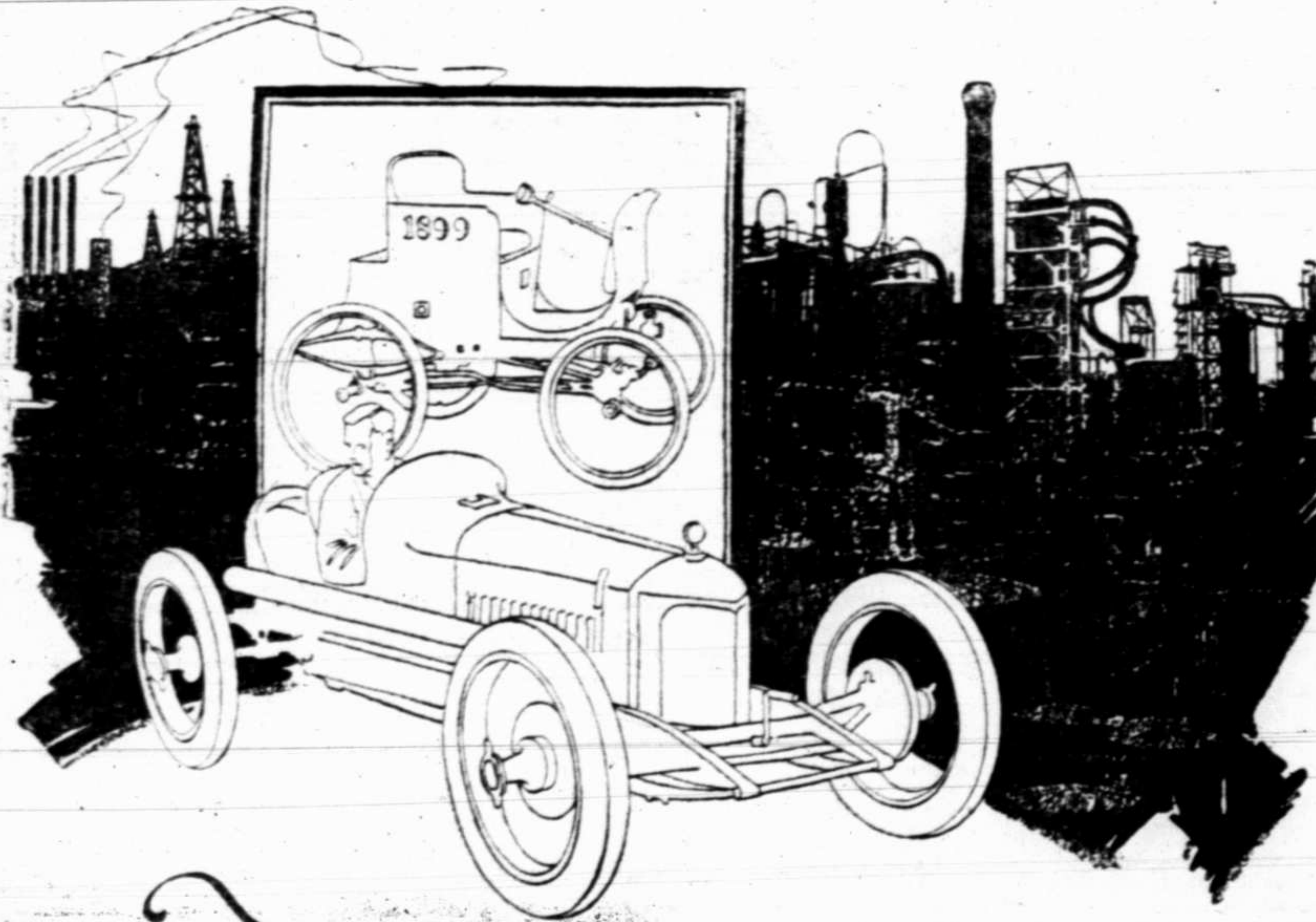

work. The territory would be divided into 24 districts, each district to have its share of the association obligations and in addition to meet all inspection costs.

The report emphasized the activities of the association in freight rate matters. "The service which was rendered in connection with transportation during the past year has probably meant more actual dollars paid for the cattle shippers than any activity which has been carried on," the report recited.

More Cattle Theft

More thefts were reported last year than for many years, it was said. Attorneys for the association took part in 27 trials, resulting in 19 convictions, seven acquittals and one hung jury. The 35 cattle inspectors have spent most of their time investigating cattle thefts. Thirteen of the inspectors are located in the territory.

used President Porfirio Gil today a campaign of "extermination" against the retreating army of the Rebel General Jose Gonzalo Escobar.

The former Mexican president said he "commenced immediately organization of the column which will march on Chihuahua to fight and exterminate the traitors." The promise was contained in a message from Guadalupe Victoria, Durango. It said temporary headquarters had been established there but the federal generalissimo was leaving shortly for Torreon.

The message stated occupation of Torreon was complete and that aviators had told him the rebel army had stopped its retreat at Escalon, in the southeastern corner of Chihuahua. Five troop trains were on sidings there.

The message of General Calles, following as it did reports of another bloodless victory yesterday, aroused what was almost jubilation in Mexico City and at Chapultepec Castle, presidential headquarters.

Little Opposition Expected

No considerable opposition to the advance of General Calles into Chihuahua is expected, Escobar is not regarded here as being particularly suited to defense. Retreat from Torreon, which a greatly inferior army might have held indefinitely, was taken as an implying complete rout.

SMART CLOTHES FOR STORMY DAYS

PARIS. While I believe that a woman should be smart and appealing every moment of the day, and every day of the year, I think she should have a very special chic for dreary and stormy weather. Clothes that are as smart as a material matter. They are as any even casual observer knows, a tremendous spiritual and emotional force. Therefore the depression inevitable to dark days cries out for clothes which are a contrasting stimulant.

Smart clothes for stormy days are a difficult problem. They must be sturdy and protective, and at the same time dainty. Clothes that you wear in sunny weather simply will not do for the rain. I think every woman who ventures out in a storm, even though it be from her door to her limousine, should be costumed specially for the occasion. Too many ladies use wet weather as an excuse for putting on their old clothes. Women who ordinarily exercise the greatest care in their toilettes, will go out wearing a motley assortment of garments that must be as depressing to themselves as they are to others. Thus, she who does equip herself with a chic rainy day outfit becomes doubly appealing by contrast.

The fabric makers have, of late, given us much smart and beautiful rainy-weather materials, that the creation of storm costumes has become perfected to a fine art. A so-called raincoat, today, is a trim, smartly simple wrap which gives exactly the same air of style that the most perishable of fair weather wraps does.

Rather tailored lines are best for storm styles, with no exaggerated flares and no pleats to wrinkle and become messy. Now that fine woollens come in impervious weaves as well as do silks, the raincoat made of such materials retains its shape and charm in severest weather. However, such a coat should not be made less effective and useful by the addition of fur, which loses its chic appearance immediately when wet.

The hat for the rainy day should be a simple felt, supremely smart in line, and without any trimming which will become spoiled. A bright scarf is like a ray of sunlight when it is added to the rainy day costume and many of the smart impervious fabrics come in bright weaves.

The chic umbrella is an absolute essential, and it should be selected to harmonize in color and detail with your rainy day coat. I have created a small folding umbrella which fits into a rainy day bag, and this combination is designed to make less cumbersome the necessary equipment for the smart wayfarer in a storm. If you carry a separate bag it should be made of calfskin, or some other leather that does not get ruined by moisture, and if your shoes match your bag you will add to your charm of appearance.

**SILT REVEALS

CHICAGO, March 19.—Discovery of evidence of two great floods, one of them told of in the Bible in Genesis, was announced today by the Field Museum which is sponsoring an expedition working on the site of the ancient Sumerian city of Kish.

The Babylonian and Hebrew accounts of the deluge are confirmed by the expedition's findings. Professor Stephen Langdon asserted in a cable to the Museum.

Archaeologists of the expedition estimate from the depth of the layer of silt in the excavated site at which the evidence was found from the traces of the damage done by water, and from inscribed tablets found there, that the Bible flood occurred about 2400 B. C.

The earlier flood of which the expedition has found traces is estimated to have occurred about 4,000 B. C.

EAKER AGAIN THWARTED

FLIER ONCE MORE IS FORCED DOWN SHORT OF HIS GOAL

BROWNSVILLE, Texas, March 19.—Beaten and punished in the air in his second attempt to fly from one country to another between dawn and dusk, Captain Ira Eaker today chafed at Tampico, Mexico, against a fate which may prevent his reaching his father's side before a crisis in his illness is reached.

Personal grief has come to the captain just after two of his great contests. His mother died while he first was acclaimed for piloting the Question Mark to its refueling record. Yesterday's announcement that his father will submit to a major operation today struck him immediately after he had abandoned at Tampico his effort to reach Brownsville by dusk. He took off from Brownsville at 4 a. m., yesterday but the old enemy, bad weather, defeated his effort just as a few days before, it had ended in failure his attempt to fly his ship, the Pan American, from Brownsville to Panama.

But for a major field at Tampico the captain could have taken off last night or early today immediately after learning of his father's condition. This however, compelled him to plan his departure for Kell Field, San Antonio, via Brownsville, for this afternoon with the prospect of reaching San Angelo Wednesday.

\$15,000 Damage As Gary Bomb Explodes

GARY, Ind., March 19 (AP)—A gun cotton bomb exploded here today, wrecking the fronts of two stores and blowing glass from several large buildings. Estimated damage was \$15,000.

The bomb was placed in the doorway of a drygoods store owned by William Herman. The front of that building and of the adjoining structure, occupied by Stinson Brothers, was wrecked. Herman's wife and six children, living above the store, were severely shaken, but not otherwise injured.

BOOZE SHIPMENT DIPLOMATIC FUSS

POLICE SEIZED SIXTY CASES DESIGNATED FOR SIAMESE LEGATION AT WASHINGTON

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, March 18.—Three government departments took steps yesterday to deal with technicalities arising since Washington police Friday seized sixty cases of diplomatic liquor consigned to the Siamese legation.

Immediately after the seizure and the delivery of the consignment to the legation by the police, the situation was one of discussion only among the members of the diplomatic corps.

With announcement yesterday however, that Secretary Kellogg had decided to investigate the case, possible ramifications of the question filtered into the treasury department and the department of justice and resulted elsewhere in several unofficial opinions.

The state department declined to

comment on the matter. Some officials believed that the department regarded the situation as one of the most embarrassing it has been called on to face in a long time.

At the treasury, Secretary Mellon said the transportation of liquor for the embassy did not come within the scope of the law because it was an act within the rights of the embassy and not illegal in any way.

A search of decisions of attorney generals disclosed an opinion by former Attorney General A. Mitchell Palmer, to the then secretary of state, Robert Lansing, in which he said:

"It is unlawful to cause intoxicating liquors to be transported from Baltimore, for instance, to Washington. I apprehend that one could not successfully defend against an indictment for such transportation

Fort Worth Man Has Disappeared

KANSAS CITY, March 19 (AP)—Fear was expressed last night for Joe Brooks, about 24, of Fort Worth, Texas, who disappeared mysteriously Friday from the Cidercort Dairy, near Independence, Mo., where he was employed.

Proprietors of the dairy on that day received a telephone call from a man who said Brooks had been injured in a motor car accident. A check of hospitals was fruitless.

Brooks had worked at the dairy for ten days.

CATTLE RAISER DIES

CINCINNATI, O., Mar. 19 (AP)—Clarence E. Holden 47, widely known breeder of prize cattle and owner of Woodhold farm, near Higginson, died suddenly today at a Cincinnati hospital, where he was taken after a brief illness.

PARRISH, BACK HOME FROM AUSTIN, TELLS OF ACTION TAKEN BY SOLONS

Upon his return from Austin yesterday, Senator Pink L. Parrish of this city, told of activity during the past legislative session.

He said that it was on his suggestion that the Texas legislative committee decided to inspect Tech college and other state institutions in this section of the state on April 8, and then to investigate the strip of land on the Texas-Oklahoma border that has been in dispute for number of years. He explained that this land lying north of Chilress, recently had been given to Texas by a decision of the supreme court and that Oklahoma wanted to purchase it. "Personally I am in awe of keeping it," he said.

In speaking of the Small bill Senator Parrish said that Governor Moody vetoed it upon Attorney General Claude Pollard's opinion that it was unconstitutional. The bill was one of the merit in the world and the principle involved means as much to this part of the state as to any other," he stated.

Opposed Vritz bill
Parrish voted against the Vritz

bill, which gave authority to the state executive committee of political parties to keep "bolters out of the party, because, he explains, "to rule everyone out who voted for Butte, Petty, or Hoover would not leave a corporal's guard in the democratic party."

Senator Parrish introduced bills raising the salaries of Texas judges and creating a new district court in Floyd, Briscoe, Motley and Dickens counties. He plans to present a bill in the next session to cut down the earnings of county officials in the thickly settled counties some of whom he says makes hundreds of thousands of dollars in a year.

In the past session Parrish voted for the bill reducing the automobile registration fee. This bill will come up again at the special session in April.

STOCKS SHOW IRREGULARITY

SELLING PRESSURE IN RADIO, OIL, COPPER IS VERY MARKED

NEW YORK, March 19.—Price movements lacked uniformity at the opening of today's stock market. Which was featured by a renewal of selling pressure against Radio and further accumulation of the oil and copper shares. Radio (new) opened with a block of 5000 shares at 11-1/2, off 1-1/2, and then eased to 11-1/4. General Electric, Montgomery Ward and International Nickel held fractionally. American Smelting, Andes Copper and Polymet advanced a point or more. Superior Oil opened with a block of 10,000 shares at 10-7/8, up 1-8. Despite the weakness of Radio and a few other popular industrials, such as U. S. Steel, common, Goodrich Rubber and Allied Chemical, which sold down 1 to 3 points, the general market continued to forge ahead under the leadership of the oil, oil motor and railroad equipment shares.

Buying of the railroad equipments was stimulated by reports of large new business and talk of further railroad electrification projects. Baldwin locomotive advanced 2 points to a new high at 25 1/4. Lima Locomotive, Westinghouse Air Brake and New York Air Brake all recorded early gains of a point or more.

PRODUCTION TAKES TOLL

SUBSTANTIAL DROP IN SHOWN IN CRUDE PRODUCTION

TULSA, Okla., March 19.—Production again took its toll in the Greater Seminole area in Oklahoma and the California Santa Fe Springs and other fields continued to drop in production resulting in a decrease of 32,943 barrels in the estimated daily average production. In light and heavy gravity oils in the United States during the week ending March 16 over the week ending March 9, according to the current report of the Oil and Gas Journal.

The total decrease in light oils alone was estimated at 36,017 barrels. A nominal increase in heavy oils lowered the total decrease on all oils.

The grand total production of all oils in all fields during the week ending March 16 was 2,631,519 barrels as compared to 2,663,562 for the week ending March 9.

Oklahoma's fields alone reported a decrease of 29,770 barrels in light oils. Of this 23,450 barrels was in the Seminole Area exclusive of the St. Louis-Pearson pool. West Texas areas had an approximate decrease of 1,238 barrels in light oils. The total Mid-Continent are showed a decrease of approximately 27,475 barrels.

California's decrease was approximately 4,250 barrels. Gulf Coast heavy oil production was a leader in the increase in this class with approximately 4,544 barrels gain reported.

Towards the end of the first hour, however, the market was steadied and rallied to within one point of the top.

The market gradually improved during the morning largely due to the firmer technical position and the well liquidated condition. Shorts developed nervousness and found contracts somewhat scarce when they sought to cover. At noon May traded at 20 1/2, July 20 3/4 and October 20 1/4, or 14 to 15 points above yesterday's close.

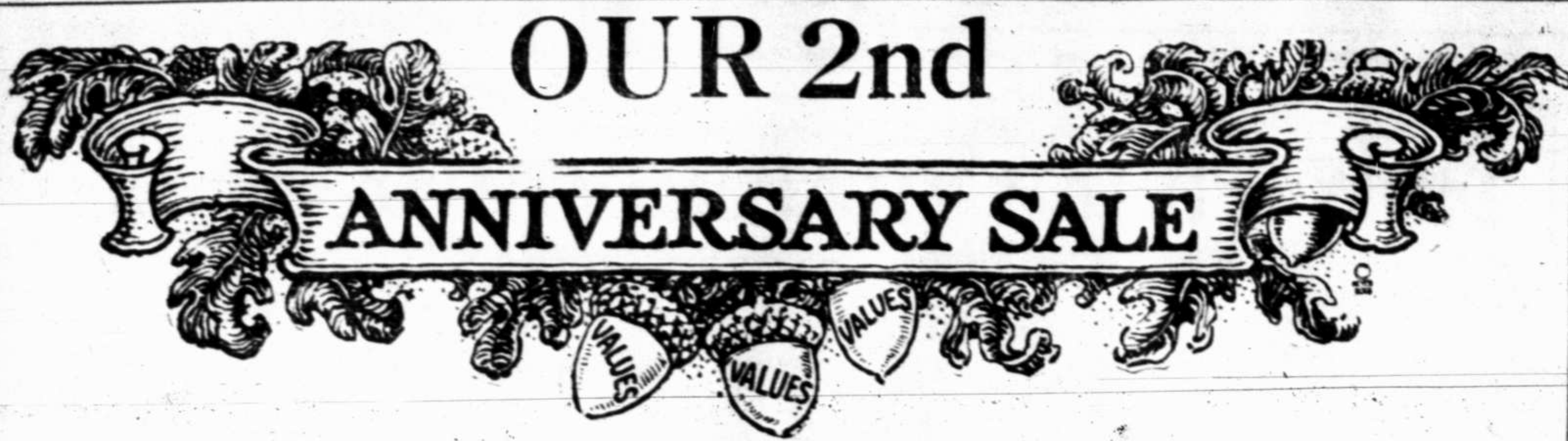

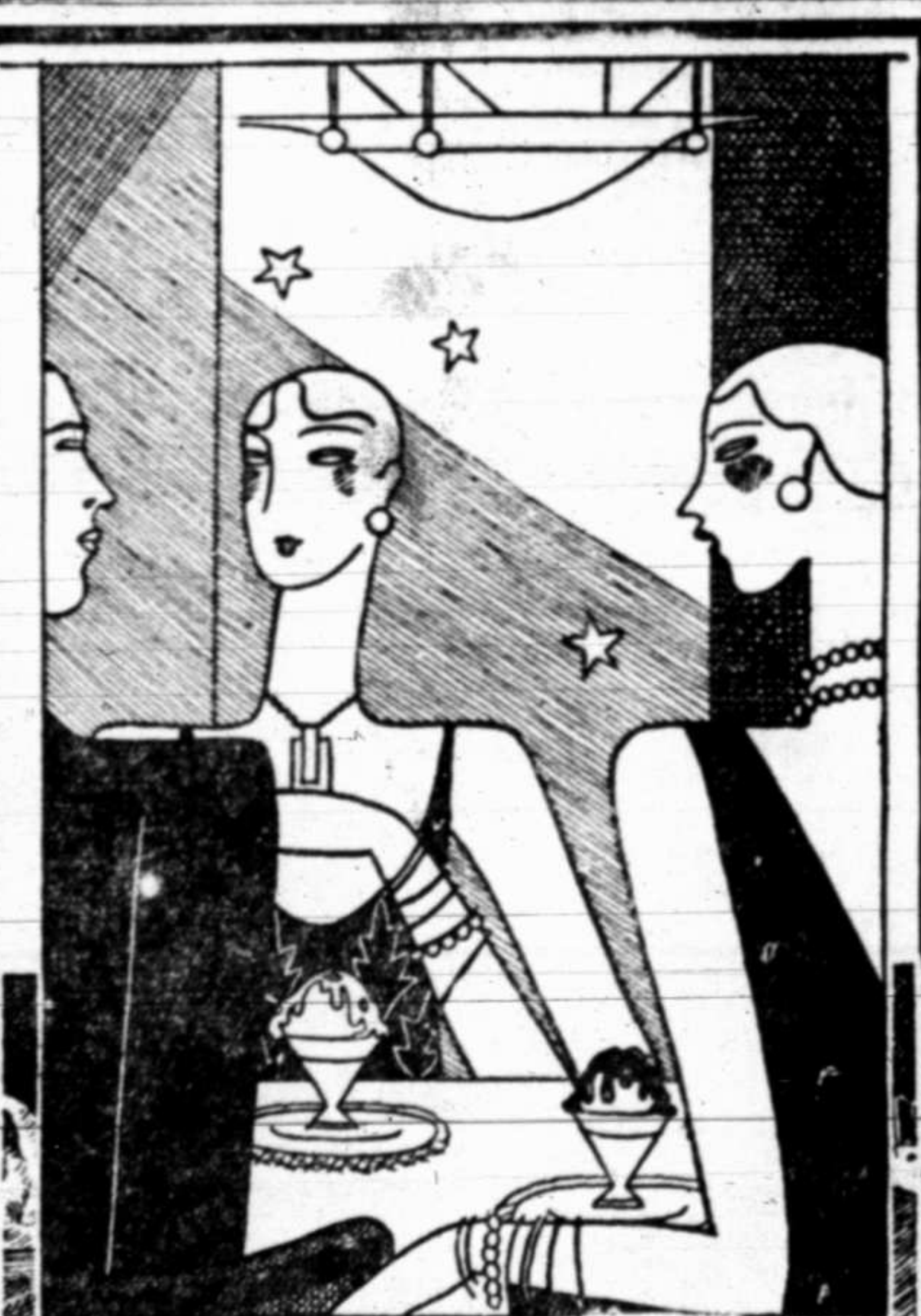

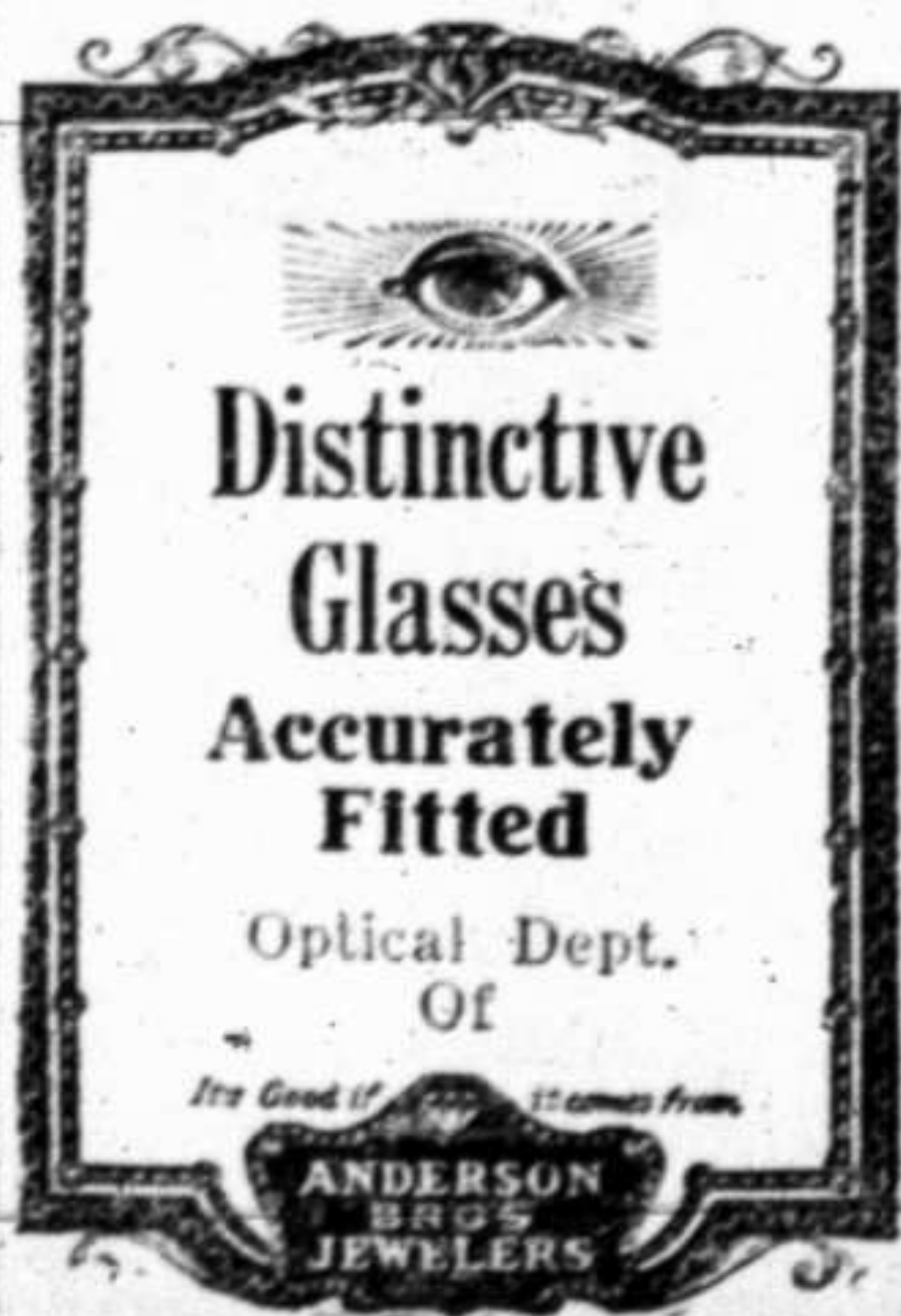
Scoutmasters To Session Tonight
