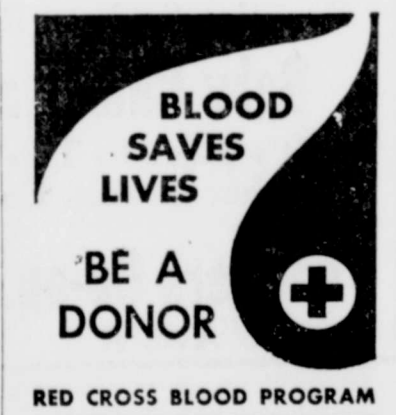

### Col. Hendricks Showed Film at C-C Luncheon

Col. W. M. Hendricks of Sheppard Air Force Base, presented a colored film titled "Survey of Astronautics" to the members of the Chamber of Commerce at the monthly meeting in Town Hall on Monday.

All about man's attempts to learn, at close range, the wonders of space, it explained the purpose of satellites sent into orbit, the problems yet to be solved before sending men to build, and man a space station in the universe, and just what type craft they may use to get materials and themselves there. The very interesting motion picture described proposed trips to the Moon, Mars and Venus, showing the methods and machines which will probably be used to learn more about the planets once the men are there.

A Space Unit is stationed at Sheppard Air Force Base and is now participating in this study of outer space.

It is fantastic how far man has penetrated space and a feeling of "Buck Rogers' fantasy," as one watched the "Survey of Astronautics" film, prevailed.

AUSTIN — Ten Texas investor-owned electric utility companies, including Texas Electric Service Company, announced in Austin February 26th sponsorship of a major research program in atomic energy to be conducted initially at the University of Texas and Texas A&M University.

The ten utility companies comprise the membership of the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation. The initial phase of the research program will carry a commitment of \$325,000. Ultimately the Foundation may support a total of \$540,000 in nuclear research in Texas.

Beeman Fisher, president of Texas Electric and a director of the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation, was present at a luncheon at the Driskill Hotel when the announcement of the research program was made.

The research projects at the University of Texas and Texas A&M will complement a program of nuclear fusion research which has been under way since 1957 under the joint sponsorship of the Foundation and the General Atomic Division of General Dynamics Corporation in San Diego, California.

The research program seeks to harness the thermonuclear (fusion) reaction — the source of power of the hydrogen bomb — for the eventual economical generation of electricity. The project is the world's first and largest program in controlled nuclear fusion research financed entirely by private industry.

C. A. Tatum, Jr., of Dallas, president of the Foundation, announced that the initial stages of the research programs at the two institutions would be supported up to a total of \$325,000, to be disbursed during 1964, 1965, and 1966. Of this amount, \$245,000 will go to the University of Texas for two projects and \$80,000 to Texas A&M for one project.

"The Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation and its member investor-owned electric utility companies of the state are extremely happy that our joint research program with General Dynamics in controlling the fusion reaction will now also be carried out in Texas," Tatum said.

"In addition to the contributions it may make to the fusion research program, we are hopeful that this support will substantially aid the universities in their drive for excellence in science education in Texas," Tatum declared.

Scientists have not yet succeeded in controlling the nuclear fusion reaction, Tatum pointed out, although the nuclear fission reaction — the splitting of the atom — has been controlled and a number of atomic fission power plants have been built. However, the cost of generating electricity from atomic fission is not competitive in this area with such conventional fuels as natural gas, the principal fuel for electric power generation in Texas, Tatum stated.

"The electric utility companies of Texas plan to be ready for the use of atomic energy whenever that becomes a better and less expensive way to serve our customers," he declared.

At General Atomic, some of the nation's leading scientists are attempting to reproduce on earth the process responsible for the energy generation of the H-bomb, the sun and the stars. The Texas program will complement this effort.

The research is centered on finding a way to hold ultra-hot ionized deuterium gas (plasma) in stable confinement long enough for it to be brought to in stable confinement long about 400 million degrees centigrade in order for a self-sustaining nuclear fusion chain reaction to be achieved.

At General Atomic, scientists have been experimenting with "magnetic bottles," containers whose walls are formed by magnetic lines of force, since any container made of a solid material would melt.

that. For some length of time there has been pressure on  
Congress to pass a "truth in labeling" bill that would  
place a heavy and needless burden on both producers and  
retailers. The opponents of legislation of this sort are not  
going on record in favor of misrepresentations and distor-  
tions of fact. But the proposed bills involved complexities  
that could, and no doubt would, place the most honest of  
producers and sellers in possible violation of the law.  
They would add, additionally, to the problem of framing  
attractive and informative advertising for a multitude of  
products. Most important, perhaps, they would give a  
bureaucratic agency a power which is without precedent,  
and for which there is no genuine need.The American consumer is not an idiot—but these  
"truth in labeling" proposals seem to assume that he is.  
We live, happily, in an intensely competitive economy. A

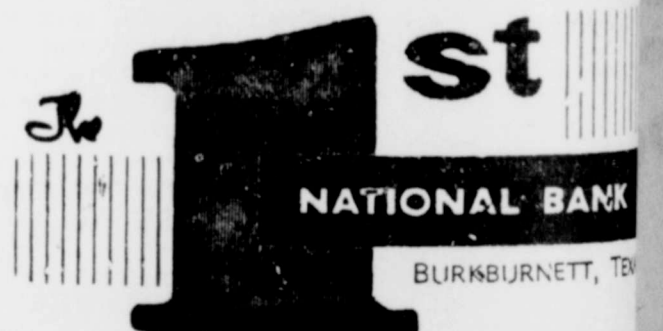

rocks always have received extra  
radiation many times greater  
than is contained in radioactive  
fall-out from the testing of  
nuclear weapons and... even  
those living on certain sediment-  
ary rocks at sea level always  
have received ten to twenty times  
the present fall-out dose."A special scientific committee  
of U.N. found that 100 years of  
continued atmospheric testing  
would yield only 4 percent of the  
radiation mankind receives from  
natural sources. The Swiss  
Academy of Medical Science has  
said, "The present increase in  
atmospheric radiation precipita-  
tion plays no essential part and  
has no practical importance com-  
pared with natural radiation.  
The values which have been  
recorded do not in any case con-  
stitute a danger to the health of

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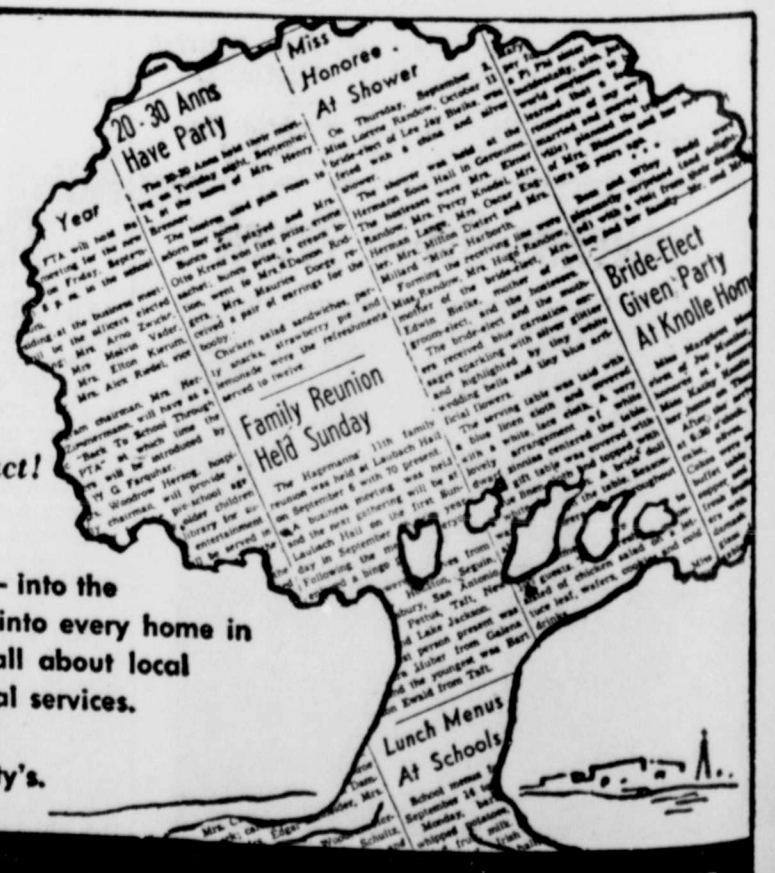

## Recipe of the Month



Just watch the pieces disappear when this Refrigerated Cherry Torte is served! It's a treat that boasts double enjoyment, with two layers of dark, rich fudge nut cookies and two layers of tart-sweet cherry pie filling. A combination of flavors meant for pleasing the man of your life, this torte is easy enough for the newest cook to attempt, tasty enough for the most experienced home-maker to serve.

The torte base is made with a roll of refrigerated fudge nut cookies, sliced and arranged side-by-side in two cake pans. When baked, these fudge layers are much like crisp brownies, good eating to the end! The cherries are in a can—a can of fruit pie filling that is ready for use, wealthy with plump, red cherries. Garnished with an edging of whipped cream, the torte is certain to brighten every party it's invited to.

## REFRIGERATED CHERRY TORTE

1 roll refrigerated fudge nut cookies  
1 can (2½ cups) cherry pie filling

Roll cookie roll into slices ¼-inch thick. Place cookie slices in the bottom of two 9 or 9-inch square or round cake pans that have been greased. Line with wax paper, greased and floured. Bake at 350° for 15 to 20 minutes. Cool until light golden brown. Cool 10 minutes; remove from pan. Cool.

Spread ½ can cherry filling over bottom layer. Top with cookie layer and remainder of filling. Chill overnight. Just before serving, spoon Pecan Whipped Cream around outer edge of cherry filling. Serves 6 to 8.

## PECAN WHIPPED CREAM

Whip ¼ cup heavy cream to form soft peaks; gradually add 2 tablespoons sugar. Fold in ¼ cup chopped pecans.

News From The  
County Agent

The official entry list for the 1963-64 Texas Community Improvement Program carries the names of 251 communities. These communities have been working hard to live up to the program slogan, "Working to Make Texas Even Better."

All county tours, community record book scoring and other local judging must be completed by March 31. Record books are due in the District Extension offices by April 6 and all district judging is to be completed.

Shade trees and summer-flowering ornamental shrubs should be pruned during the winter months when the temperatures are above freezing. Pruning should follow careful thought and include repair of injuries, dead wood removal, and controlling the size and shape of the plant.

A ton of manure is worth about \$5.00 in its ability to produce crops. The average nutrient content of manure is 10 pounds of nitrogen, 5 pounds of phosphate, and 10 pounds of potash per ton. Manure is usually worth more when it is spread at a light rate of about 5 tons per acre.

The success of any cattle feeding operation depends largely on the feed-lot facilities used. Though feedlots need not be fancy they should be suited to the particular climate and soil characteristics where they are constructed.

The initial cost of lots may range from \$15 to \$50 or more

per head depending on these natural conditions, according to a new publication of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. MP-680 says that a higher initial investment in some items may be more economical in the long run.

If any screwworms have survived the winter in Texas, they should be appearing soon. But it appears that if any did overwinter in the state they are few in number.

The weekly report on the eradication programs shows that no cases have been reported in the state during the last two weeks of January, and during the entire month only one case was identified. This compares with 157 confirmed screwworm cases in January, 1963. There

were over 62 million sterile flies released in Texas during the last week of January.

## Questions &amp; Answers

Q—As an amputee, I have been receiving a pension for nonservice-connected disabilities. During my present hospitalization, it was necessary to amputate my other leg. Can I receive a greater pension now?

A—You may now be eligible for an additional allowance for aid and attendance after discharge from the hospital. This is not a general benefit but one made based on individual circumstances. You will have to apply to the VA for it.

Q—As a non-veteran, may I buy a GI home when it has been repossessed and again offered for sale?

A—The Veterans Administration has for sale to anyone who can qualify as to credit standing a large number of homes which have been foreclosed following non-payment by the GI purchaser. See your real estate broker, since most brokers are co-operating with the VA, to find out if any of these foreclosed homes are in your area.

Q—Can I make a personal loan from the VA to meet a financial emergency?

A—No. The benefits granted to veterans by Congress do not include provision for personal loans.

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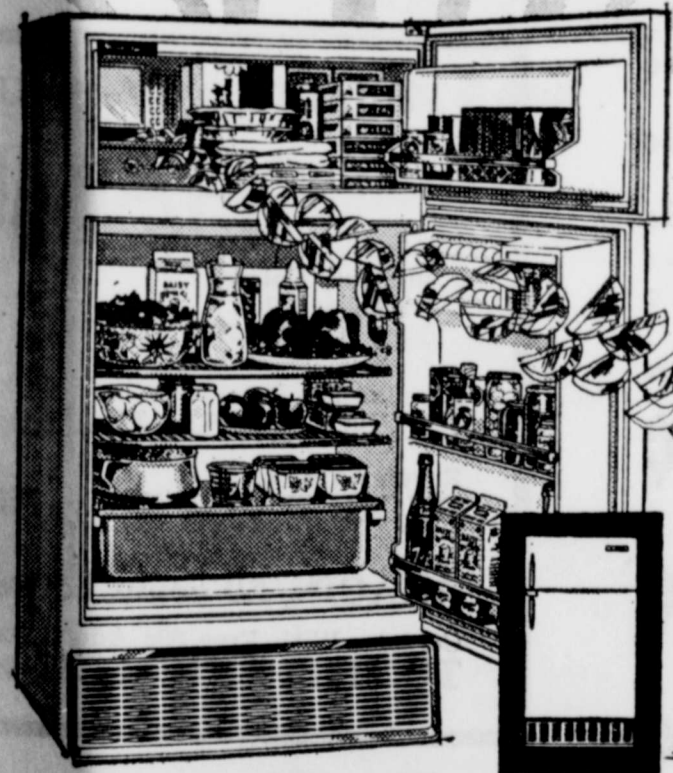

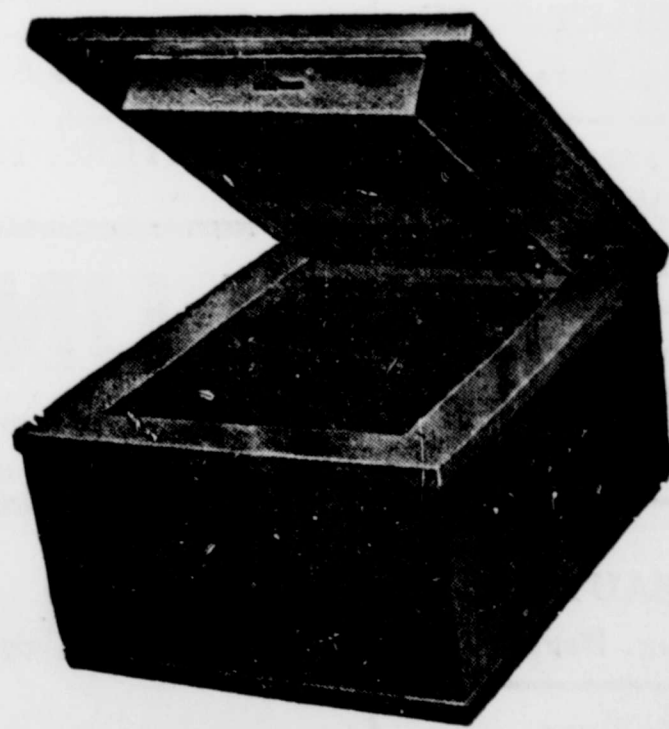

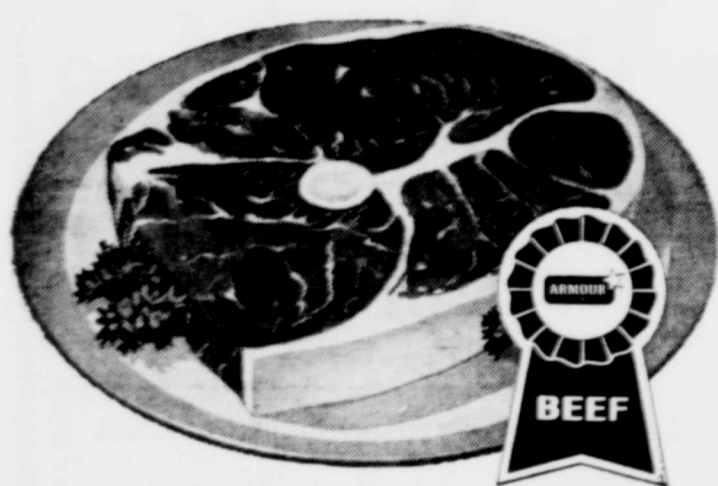

## Open Plan, Built-in Appliances Favored by Today's Homemaker

Kitchens are getting bigger and better. What's more, open planning is being used to make them appear even larger than they actually are.

Architect Herman H. York, winner of 32 major awards for excellence in residential design, points out that today's families are demanding more spacious kitchens. This is true in spite of the fact that modern appliances such as the automatic electric range reduce kitchen drudgery and cut down on kitchen time, he said.

### Open Plan Popular

A good example of an attractive kitchen with a feeling of space is found in a house designed by York for Point of Woods in Huntington, N. Y.

In this home, which costs around \$25,000, York establishes a continuous sweep from the kitchen, through the dinette and into a Colonial-style family room. This type of open plan is particularly popular with homemakers because it permits them to be part of family activity even while they are busy in the kitchen.

The all-electric kitchen itself is an efficient work center generously supplied with wood cabinets and counter space. It features a built-in electric wall-oven and separate electric surface cooking units.

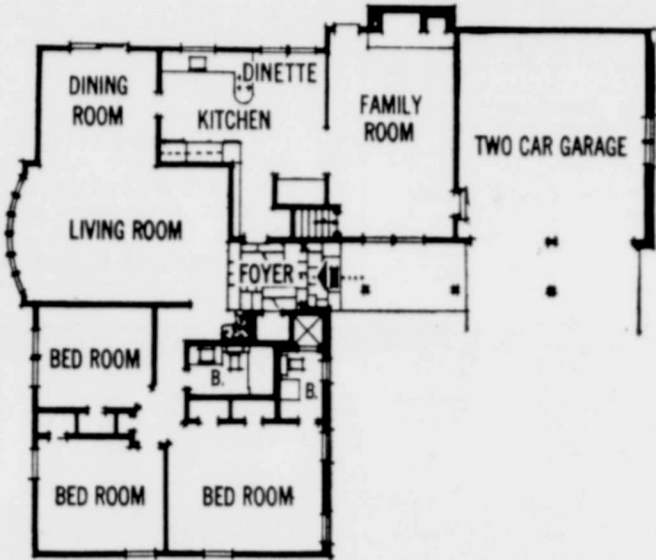
### Many Range Styles

This type of range fits in well with this particular kitchen, York said, but he added that one of the many other electric range styles might be appropriate in another kitchen. He urges families "not to follow a fad blindly but to choose the range style that is best suited to the individual kitchen."

Other types of electric ranges available include the new high-oven model, the one-piece built-in, and the traditional free-standing unit. All of these feature square corners and a built-in look, and all are available with

## 22 Accidents In Wichita County During January

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated twenty-two accidents on rural highways in Wichita County during the month of January, according to Sergeant W. L. Stroud, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for two deaths, seventeen injured persons, and an estimated property damage of \$27,050.00.

The Sergeant reminded motorists that Texas along with every other state in the nation many years ago enacted a safety responsibility law to meet the problems created by irresponsible operators of vehicles on our streets and highways. This law is intended to encourage all motorists to become financially responsible and to promote highway safety by identifying those drivers and owners of motor vehicles who will not assume their moral and legal obligations to society and therefore should be removed from the highways.

"More stringent provisions of this law — requiring drivers and owners to be able to pay for damage to others in traffic accidents — became effective January 1, 1964," the Sergeant said. "In any accident in which damage amounts to at least \$25.00 or more, the operator of every motor vehicle is required to report the accident in writing to the Texas Department of Public Safety. If the accident involved death, injury or damage to one person's property of at least \$100.00, the accident then comes under the Safety Responsibility Act and its requirements must be met," he explained.

"The Department of Public Safety is required by the new law to suspend the driver licenses and all motor vehicles registration plates of both the operator and owner of vehicles involved in accidents coming under the Safety Responsibility Law unless the owner and operator meet one or more of the following requirements."

1. Liability insurance coverage in minimum amounts of \$10,000 for one injury or death, \$20,000.00 total injury and death and \$5,000.00 property damage.

2. A release signed by the damaged parties.

3. Signed installment agreement for damages.

4. Operator and owner found not to be liable in a court of jurisdiction.

5. Operator and owner posting cash or bond security in amounts sufficient to cover liability incurred.

"If in doubt as to the amount of damage send in a report and be on the safe side, or if additional information is needed contact any member of the DPS," the Patrol Supervisor concluded.

ly defective vision and not know it. This can wreak havoc with his schooling, in that he may not be able to read his textbooks, or to see the blackboard. Many a child labeled stupid by teachers and parents was later found to be nearsighted.

What can you do to protect your vision?

The most important thing is to have regular eye examinations, preferably once a year. And make certain that everyone in your family gets a regular checkup, particularly the children. Any noticeable change in vision also is a clear tip-off that something is happening to your sight and that an examination is needed.

### Save Your Vision

How good are your eyes?

If you're a gambler, you would win money betting that the other guy has defective vision. On the basis of statistics, the chances are slightly more than one in two that something is wrong with your eyes.

Close to 80 million Americans wear glasses. There are at least two million who have inadequate vision even with glasses, and about one million are blind. Every year another 30,000 Americans become blind.

To point up the problem of protecting the nation's vision, Congress has proclaimed the first week of March, 1964, "Save Your Vision Week."

There are many popular misconceptions and myths about vision. Some of them are discussed in Today's Health, the magazine of the American Medical Association.

Ophthalmologists (physicians who specialize in eye care) usually agree that there is no such thing as eye STRAIN. Those pains and discomforts that sometimes follow long hours of watching a jumpy television screen actually are due to eye FATIGUE. Your eyes need to rest, too.

Children do not outgrow crossed eyes, and this condition should be treated as early as possible. Otherwise some loss of sight could result.

Good vision is important to safe driving of an auto, but perfect vision is by no means required. The driver who has a few drinks under his belt is much more dangerous than the nearsighted driver whose defect is reasonably well corrected with glasses.

Carrots do not improve the vision. Carrots contain vitamin A, but only a very small amount of it is needed and it is found in many of the foods we eat, as well as carrots.

The most common of the serious eye diseases, glaucoma, cannot be cured, but it usually can be arrested by treatment, and further loss of vision can be prevented. Regular checks up for glaucoma are most important, particularly to those past 40.

Cataracts, a lens disorder occurring most often in older people, can usually be corrected by surgical treatment. Loss of vision from a forming cataract can be slow and sometimes isn't noticed by the patient at first.

Children should have their first medical eye examination at the age of three or four, and should be reexamined each year. The small child may have gross-

Health authorities agree that a lot of progress has been made toward venereal disease control, but a growing number of cases is causing grave concern.

After the war, an aggressive venereal disease program spectacularly cut skyrocketing VD statistics. The VD rate (figured in cases per 100,000) reached a very low level by about 1954 and remained there until about 1958. In 1958 the syphilis rate began a stealth climb.

Today, the trend is still up. A corkscrew-shaped microorganism — Treponema pallidum — causes syphilis, the most dangerous of the venereal infections. The germ dies quickly outside the human body. Sunlight, soap, milk, heat or drying out quickly kills it. Therefore, syphilis is not spread by water, food or air. And it is not caught from toilet seats, door handles, drinking fountains, eating utensils or other such objects.

It is possible, but rare, for syphilis to be spread by kissing. Ordinarily, it begins with a small sore — called a chancre — and if untreated subtly progresses and may cause blindness, mental illness or death.

Simple laboratory tests will reveal the presence of syphilis almost any time during the disease.

Public health personnel are combating VD with a two-point campaign — interviews with people who may have been exposed and public education.

A nationwide telephone network can quickly alert VD investigators anywhere in the country as to the whereabouts of a possible VD contact. The contact is encouraged to seek medical examination.

Education, in the main, is carried out by lectures, leaflets, films and other media.

Knowing the truth about venereal disease may set some — otherwise destined to misery — free to live.

Few, if any, sports are so completely organized as shooting. The National Rifle Association, a non-profit membership organization recognized as the governing body for shooting in the U. S., conducts contests for the youngster with a BB gun, for example, and it selects and sponsors the marksmen who carry the U. S. emblem at the Olympics. Hundreds of thousands of rifle and pistol shooters test their skill each year at events ranging between these two extremes. Each year, the NRA issues some 400,000 qualification awards, a majority of them to young shooters.

**WINTER IS ROOT VEGETABLE TIME** — Add color and variety to your wintertime meals with vegetables from the earth — beets, carrots, turnips, rutabagas, mature onions, green onions, radishes, parsnips. All are flavorful and nutritious carrots are especial-

ly high in vitamin A, and raw turnips are a good source of vitamin C, says Thelma Wirges, county home demonstration agent.

Eat some raw, some cooked. Leave the skins on, or pare only skin deep. Cook them only to the crisp-tender stage. Use the cooking liquid in soups, gravies, or vegetable cocktails.

A white sauce goes well with many of these root vegetables and you can pep up the sauce with left-over bits of meat and fish, hard-cooked eggs, or sliced and mixed with nuts or raisins and salad dressing. Or combine several root vegetables in this delicious soup:

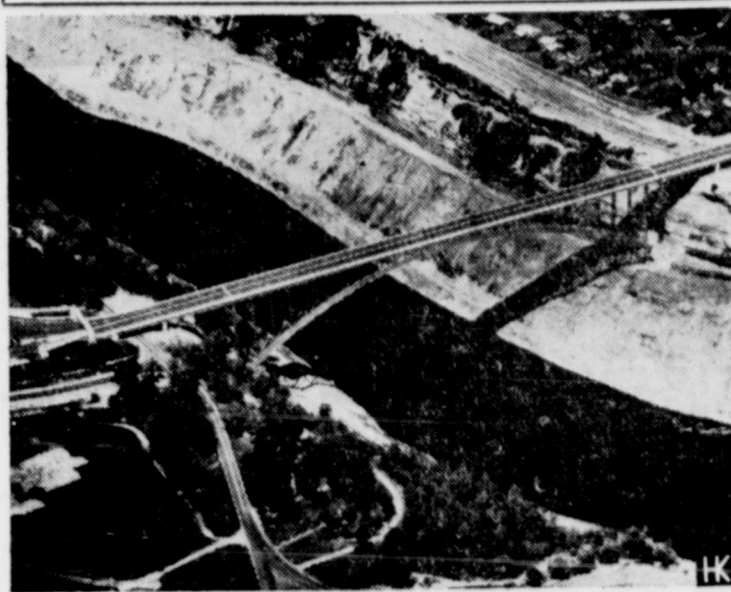
Simmer a soup bone in water. To each three cups of this meat broth add:

- 1 small carrot
- 1 small potato
- 2 small carrots
- 1 small green pepper
- 1 stalk green celery and leaves
- 1 cup tomato juice and pulp
- 1 small turnip

Cut all the vegetables about the same size. Cook until tender in the salted meat broth. Season well and serve hot. This will make four servings, 1 cup each.

People who will be applying for social security benefits in the near future should remember to bring certain documents with them which may very likely speed up the processing of their claims, said Erton F. Tate, district manager for social security in Wichita Falls, Texas.

Tate said you can reduce the processing time on your claim by bringing the following things with you when you come to file your claim: (1) Proof of age, such as your birth certificate, baptismal certificate or old life insurance policy; (2) A copy of your 1963 tax return if you are self-employed; (3) 1963 W-2 form (the statement of your wages from your employer); (4) A list of your employers during the year, amounts each paid you and their addresses, if you had several employers during the year.

It will also help if you have

the following dates in mind or written down: your date of birth, wife or husband's date of birth, date of marriage, and dates of prior marriages, and terminations (death or divorce) of each.

Tate explained that the person who brings these items on the first visit enables the social security office to start his claim without undue loss of time and gets his checks coming sooner.

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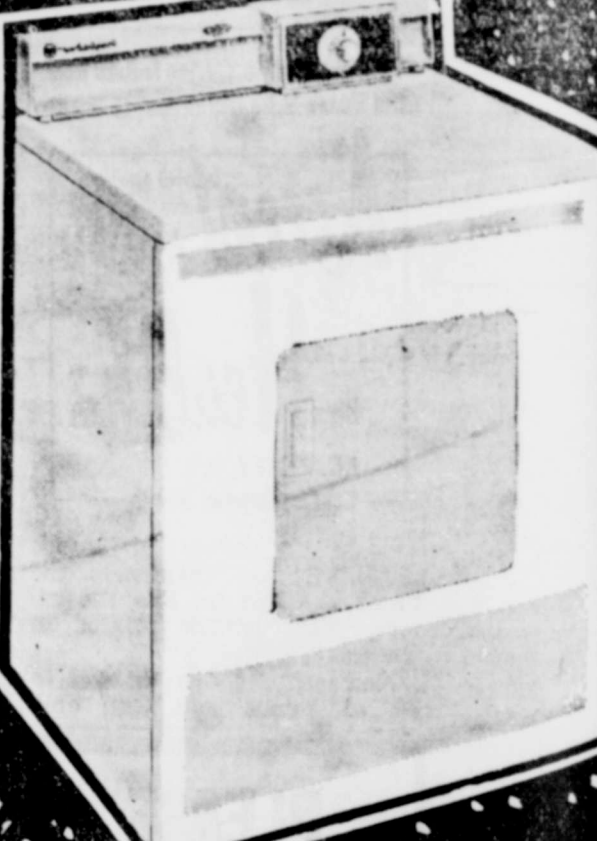

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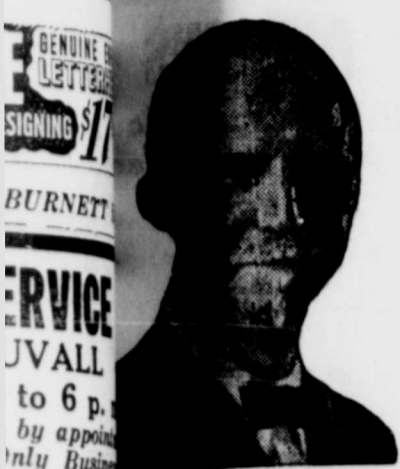

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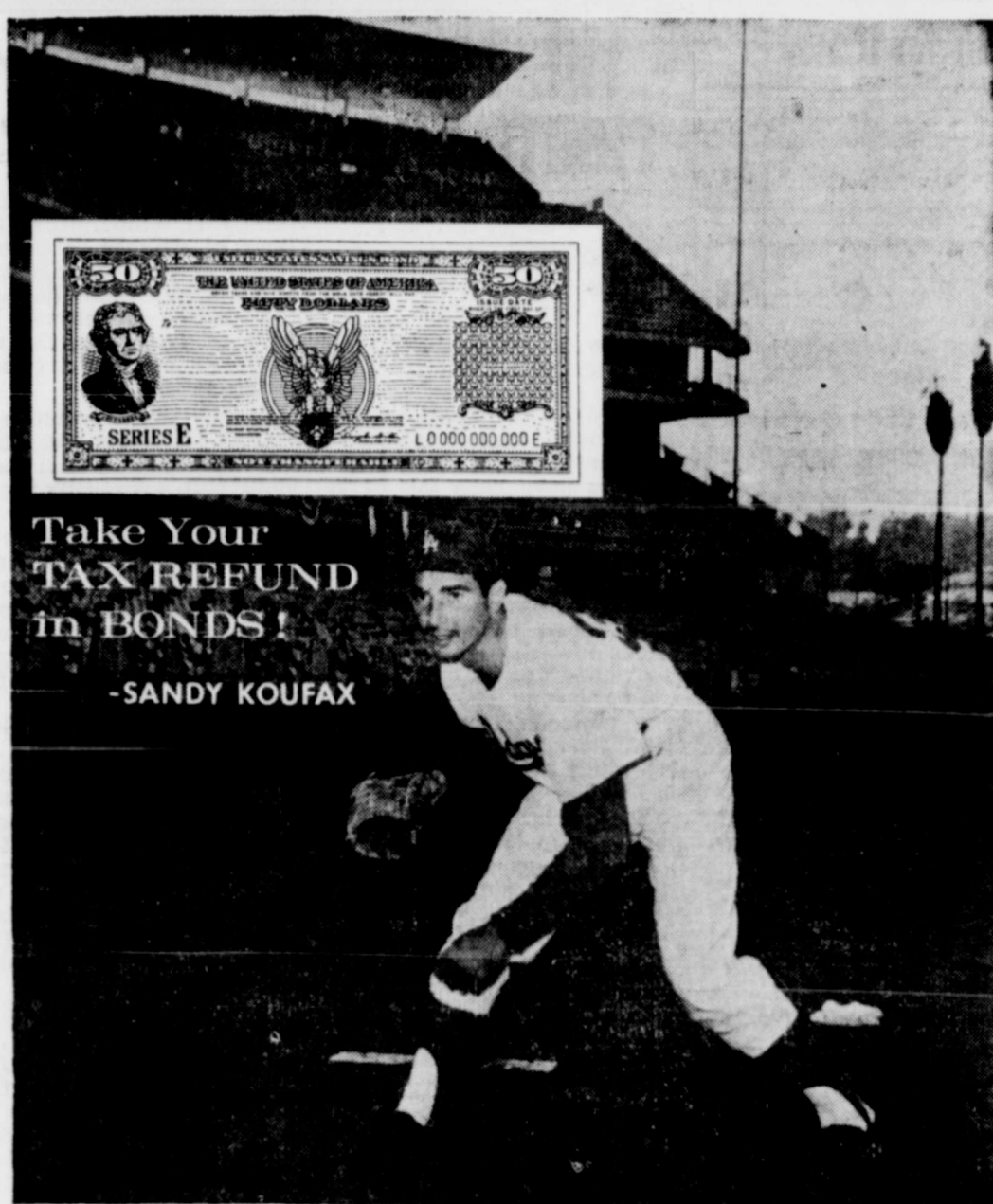
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because of age or because they have accumulated enough funds to ensure a living income. This always brings up anew the questions of where to go, what to do with spare time, whether

to buy or rent, etc.

Climate Should Be Considered

Certainly, climate is one of the main considerations in choosing a place to retire to. First thought is usually that the warm states like Florida, California, and Arizona offer the best opportunities. For older couples this may well be true. Of course, no state, county, or community offers all the advantages. Places that may have attractive and lively business in the summer may be quite the opposite in winter — and vice versa. So, time and care must be taken if you are to make a move for which you will not be sorry.

While I know that an even, warm climate is often fine for those who are no longer young or for those with respiratory troubles, there is something wearing about weather that is hot for too long a time. Studies

have indicated that the most dynamic and intelligent people are likely to develop in climates with marked contrasts. Younger couples — especially those who still have their children with them — should consider either a section of the country with a wide temperature range or else two homes in areas with entirely different weather.

Income Is A "Must"

Rapid population growth in states with the most inviting weather has not come as a result of new babies or thriving agriculture and industry so much as from newcomers moving in to retire and bask in the sun. Such people must, of course, be able to depend upon regular checks, such as those coming from pensions, insurance, rents or properties in other localities, and dividends on stocks, interest on bonds or mortgages. Social security pay-

ments are a great help, but they will not pay all the bills in the states on which people are now converging.

Some seem to think that places with delightful winter climates offer very cheap living conditions. This is frequently an illusion, often caused by publicity agencies. You may not spend so much for fuel, electricity, and clothing in sunny areas, but food and rents usually cost just about as much, for comparable accommodation. So do medical and dental services, entertainment, and transportation. Also, states and cities throughout the country have varying ways of collecting taxes; but even if some of these look more inviting, they turn out about the same.

Some Want To Work

Most men and even many women get restless after they loll around for a while. If you want a job, be sure to go into something for which you are trained. If you want a business of your own, work in that field first before you buy an establishment. Some interesting potential fields for "retired" workers are real estate, shopping services, typing, dressmaking, debt collecting, plant and tree nurseries, frozen-food programs, manufacturers' representatives, caretaking services, landscaping, and interior decorating.

Some people want to buy homes rather than rent, and this is often a good idea if you are careful in your selection. Be sure that a house you are considering is in an area that is improving, not deteriorating. Be sure it is near churches and stores. It is wise to include enough land for a vegetable and flower garden, and this in a pinch might be sold as a house lot or two if you ever need to retrench a bit. Never buy unless you have lived in a community — preferably for at least a year — and have got

the feeling of the place. Real estate values are influenced more by the trend of feeling than by any business statistics.

First Steps In Choosing

Pick out a state by studying real estate booklets, maps, and information available at most libraries. Next, write the Chamber of Commerce at the capital of the state being considered. Ask for data on different parts of the state, including climate

## THE CIVIL FIGHTS BILL

The most insidious piece of legislation in the history of our country is now being railroaded through Congress. Its passage would destroy our rights to govern our own lives.

If you have been led to believe the Civil Rights bill was designed to give "justice" to minority groups, you have been sold a bill of goods.

Few Americans, especially businessmen, realize that this vicious measure would convert this nation into a police state under the direction and control of a powerful central government. Its effects would adversely affect everyone, black and white alike.

The bill has been hailed in glowing terms by the President and has been passed in the House. It is now before the Senate. By its action on this bill the Senate will determine the fate of the Constitution and the freedom it guarantees.

Its evils are not concentrated in, nor are they confined to, the much discussed and highly publicized "public accommodations" section, vicious though that section is. It becomes more and more evident that "Public Accommodations" is a red herring that has been used to divert public attention from the basic evil that runs through all of it like a fine electrical control wire, ready to be charged whenever the Attorney General chooses to throw the switch.

Like all such schemes, this Socialist Omnibus Bill — misnamed the Civil Rights Bill — is sponsored and pushed under the guise of do-goodism. The phrases, "guaranteeing rights for minorities" and "ending discrimination" cover its real aim, the subjugation of 185 million Americans to an all-powerful centralized Washington bureaucracy.

If Congress passes the Civil Rights Bill, the United States Attorney General will thereby be made a dictator with practically unlimited powers. His "inspectors" will swarm, snoop and pry, over the countryside — as if Judicator Warren and his presumptuous usurpations were not enough.

This proposed legislation goes far beyond the wildest hopes of the Socialist-Liberals. It impairs the right of homeowners to be the sole judges as to whom they will rent, lease or sell their homes; it impairs the right of employers to hire or discharge as they see fit; it impairs the seniority rights of employees, union and nonunion, alike; and it impairs the rights of banks and other institutions to make loans and extend credit in accordance with their best judgment.

The bill can affect nearly every individual in the United States; insurance agents, realtors, editors, broadcasters, merchants, manufacturers, bankers, farmers, homeowners, teachers, recipients of veterans pensions, civil service workers, receivers of social security, and parents of children attending school, even school boards, themselves. It would outlaw "discrimination," yet, it doesn't even define the word.

If you find this difficult to believe, your doubts are understandable. It seems impossible that the far-reaching effect of this legislation could have been successfully kept from the public but it has, and time is short.

This evil plot must be defeated. Once control of all American life is centered in Washington, the autonomy and sovereignty of our 50 United States will be swept away.

The President, as the House of Representatives, has deserted.

The Senate, therefore, is our last hope. If its members cower before the winds of hysteria, we will have had it. For the President impatiently awaits the opportunity to put his signature to the warrant that will consign us, our children and our grandchildren to generations-long political, social and economic bondage.

If you want to continue governing your own life, write your Senators, both of them, and tell them so. Tell them you oppose this bill, tell them why. Do it NOW.

## Atomic Research

material would be vaporized instantly at temperatures of millions of degrees. The problem is not only to produce temperatures many times hotter than the surface of the sun but to be able to contain the plasma long enough for a fusion reaction set in.

If the energy-producing process of the H-bomb can be controlled, mankind will be provided with a virtually inexhaustible supply of power for thousands of years. This is because deuterium (heavy hydrogen), which is found in almost unlimited quantities in oceans, rivers and lakes, can be used as a fuel for generating electricity through nuclear fusion. The deuterium in one gallon of seawater from the Gulf of Mexico, for example, contains the equivalent energy of 350 gallons of high-octane gasoline. In the fusion reaction, energy is produced by bringing together the atoms of light elements at tremendous collision velocities and fusing (or locking together) their nuclei. This is in contrast to nuclear fission, in which the nuclei of heavy atoms such as uranium are split and energy is released.

The research projects at the University of Texas will be under the direction of Dr. W. C. Dueterhoeft, Jr., professor of electrical engineering and Dr. Hans Schluter, associate professor of physics.

Dr. Dueterhoeft's research will center around an investigation of injection of plasma into or across magnetic fields. An objective of the investigation will be detailed study of plasma impacted against a perpendicular magnetic field. Plasma "guns" will be utilized to fire super-hot gases into a "magnetic bottle."

The research under Dr. Schluter will concentrate on the heating of plasma by means of electromagnetic fields and how to prevent plasma leakage from "magnetic bottles." The research at Texas A&M will be under the direction of Dr. Melvin Eisner, professor of physics. The project will concentrate on the investigation of means of analyzing plasma using a giant laser — a very intense and coherent beam of light. A plasma facility will be constructed for this program at Texas A&M.

An initial expenditure of \$85,000 — \$65,000 to the University of Texas and \$20,000 to Texas A&M — has already been made by the Foundation for starting up the program and purchasing equipment. Tatum announced. An additional \$80,000 — \$60,000 to the University of Texas and \$20,000 to Texas A&M — will be expended this year. Another \$80,000 will be expended during 1965 and 1966.

Attending the luncheon at which the research programs were announced were the chief executives of a number of Texas electric utility companies who serve as directors of the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation; Dr. Frederic de Hoffman, president of the General Atomic Division of General Dynamics Corporation; Dr. E. C. Creutz, vice president—research and development at General Atomic; and representatives of the University of Texas and Texas A&M, including Dr. H. H. Ransom, chancellor of the University of Texas and Dr. M. T. Harrington, chancellor of Texas A&M.
