Services for Scout Troop Held Tonight

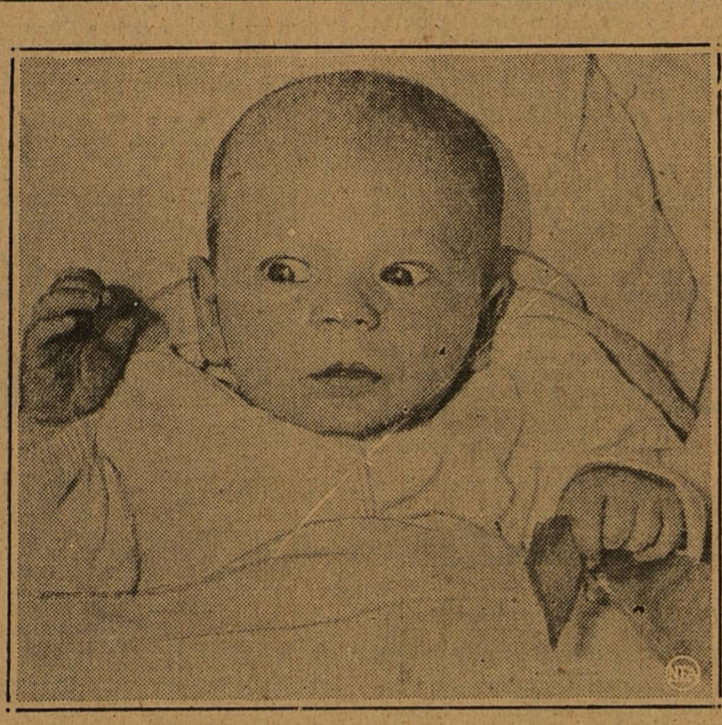

Exposition at San Diego Given Exploitation Here

Delegates from San Diego, who stopped here overnight with the Broadway of America motorcade, advertised extensively the California Pacific International Exposition which opens at Balboa park, San Diego, May 29, and is expected to attract more than 5,000,000 visitors.

Jack Adams, of the publicity department of the exposition, expressed the hope that many residents of Midland and West Texas would make San Diego the center of their vacation trips, witnessing the exposition.

Art and science, commerce and industry will be welded into one great pageant that will climax four centuries of advancement in the West—from the day Juan Rodriguez Cabrillo sailed into San Diego Bay to the present—and beyond, for it is the aim of America's Exposition to presage the years that are to come and to herald the new developments and progress that will mark the next score of years on the Pacific Coast.

With the assured representation of more than thirty foreign powers, the Exposition becomes at once an international project. Plans have been made for buildings and villages incorporating the architectural features that are unique with Old World countries and the lands of Latin America. It is natural that Mexico, fifteen miles from San Diego, will have an outstanding exhibit that will display all the industries, arts and communal life of the southern republic.

At the present time the Exposition is expected to be one of the most extensive features of the Exposition. Canada and the British Empire will also enter largely into the international scheme since 1935 will mark the twenty-fifth anniversary of King George's reign.

Throughout the duration of the California Pacific International Exposition special celebrations and events have been planned to commemorate the British monarch's anniversary.

With its rich heritage from Spain and the Spanish speaking countries has been planned, France and Italy will also have representation in Japan and other Asiatic states have signified their intention of joining the world-wide congress at the Exposition.

Each of the forty-eight states will have representation on the Exposition grounds in San Diego. At the present time plans are being prepared for state days and Governor Merriam of California is making arrangements for the actual details of each state in the United States.

Marine, Land Planes Spend Night Here

OKLAHOMAN DIES OF INJURY AFTER HOPPING FREIGHT

Was Warned Against Attempt to Board Moving Train

Alex Holt, 29, of Oklahoma City, died at 4:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon at a Midland hospital as result of an accident at 7:10 Sunday morning when he attempted to board a moving freight train and had both legs cut off.

The eastbound train, No. 54, had stopped at the station here and was moving up at the rate of about 25 miles per hour, scheduled to stop at the stock pens to unload the John M. Gist show cattle which were being returned from the El Paso stock show.

Holt, according to Eugene Franklin, negro proprietor of a barbecue stand near Alamo Courts, had stopped for something to eat and Franklin gave him a sack of food. Holt, referring to the freight train, asked if it were a local.

"No, it's a hot shot," said Franklin. When the train moved eastward, Holt ran toward the tracks and Franklin said he shouted to the man that he couldn't "make it," seeing that the train was gaining speed rapidly.

Franklin said he could see the brakeman waving to Holt, apparently signaling that he should not attempt to board the train.

Holt, however, stepped to the south side of the track just opposite the Humble station and pumps, ran eastward along the track and cut in to the train about four cars behind the locomotive. The impact and suction threw him under the wheels, cutting the left leg off at the hip and the right leg just below the knee. He was badly mangled but was conscious when the train stopped and aid was given, remaining so for several hours.

The train was "cut" to allow aid to be brought from the north side of the track. A "hobo" riding the freight ran to the Humble station and asked F. F. Lord to call an ambulance. Members of the train crew, assisted by Franklin and others who gathered as quickly as possible, picked up the injured man and placed him in the Ellis ambulance, rushing him to a hospital.

Suffering intensely from shock and loss of blood, complete amputation of the injured members could not be made for several hours. Holt remained conscious, however, almost until the time of his death.

He gave the name of his mother, Mrs. Minnie Herring, 500 S. E. 18th street, Oklahoma City. Holt was unmarried, was red headed and young in appearance.

The accident was almost identical with one sustained about ten days ago here by Oscar Brown, also of Oklahoma, who had his leg run over below the knee. He still is in a hospital here, surgeons saying he will remain a cripple for life.

The accident victim was buried at Fairview cemetery here today, following receipt of advices from relatives.

Seek News of Kin In Storm Area

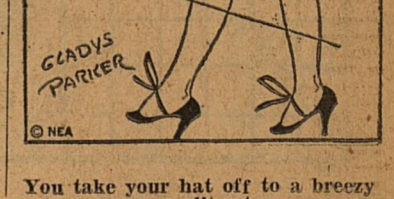
Storms which Saturday afternoon and night brought death and terror to Glover and Woodville, Miss., as well as areas in other Southern states, carried suspense for Midland people as well.

EASING THE WAY TO DEATH

As long as capital punishment lasts—which probably will be a long, long time—the authorities will have trouble trying to decide what is the most humane way of treating a condemned criminal during his final days on earth.

Gov. Bibb Graves of Alabama has adopted the policy of not letting condemned prisoners know until the last moment that their final appeals for clemency have failed. His idea is that such a man might just as well have the benefit of hope, up to the last possible minute. The shock of learning that the last hope is gone will be painful whenever it is received, and Governor Graves thinks it kinder to postpone it.

Many people will disagree with this theory, emphatically. But the point is that capital punishment is a cruel process, at best. You can't be so very humane with it, no matter what you do. Governor Graves at least deserves for good intentions in the matter.
