Activity In Oil Leases Increases

Interest in the oil industry in Eastland County seem to be picking up. There is a lot of old leases being renewed and new leases being bought. Evidently from the activity in this area there is something about to develop.

The Pan American Petroleum Corporation reportedly now has 55,000 acres under lease in Eastland County and they are still looking for more leases. A spokesman for the company said they were planning on developing these leases in the near future. What this will amount to nobody seems to know.

Wheat Control Referendum Is Being Held Today

Eastland County farmers are voting today on 1960 wheat marketing quotas. Voting places in the county for the referendum are at the ASC office in the courthouse in Eastland and at the Cisco Chamber of Commerce office. Polls will remain open until 6 p.m.

Farmers who will harvest more than 15 acres of wheat in 1960 are eligible to vote.

If quotas are approved support prices will be 75 percent of parity. If they are not approved the support price will be 50 percent of parity.

Sheriff J. P. Williams said his department has been swamped with calls from "all over Texas" concerning cattle, goat and hog thefts.

Bighorn Sheep Restored in Texas

The desert bighorn population on the Black Gap Wildlife Management area in West Texas now has reached 11, according to the director of Wildlife Restoration of the Game and Fish Commission in Austin.

At the present time there are five rams and six ewes behind the lion proof fence in the middle of the 100,000 acre wildlife refuge.

Biologists have been back in Arizona on the Kofa wildlife refuge with their summer trapping. Because of more favorable trapping sites, they have done better this year than previously. They are working with the U. S. Fish & Wildlife Service and the Arizona Commission in the trapping program.

Two ewes and two rams were added to the compound last week. It is possible some others may reach the area before the summer is over.

The animals are being planted there in an effort to restore the Desert Bighorns to the mountainous country along the Rio Grande, where they once roamed in great numbers.

Because of mountain lions it was necessary to erect a high wire fence around a section of pasture land, so that the sheep would have a chance to survive.

Clyde McCoy's Famous Band to Play Lone Cedar

Clyde McCoy, famous for his rendition of "The Sugar Blues," will appear at Lone Cedar Country Club tonight at 8:30 p.m.

McCoy originated on his trumpet the "wa-wa" sound which gave his orchestra a unique style and made his arrangement of "The Sugar Blues" a classic among jazz music.

Forming his first dance band in 1918, McCoy began by playing college and dance dates, later played the Orpheum circuit from 1924 through 1928. His entire orchestra joined the Navy as a unit in 1942 and were released as a unit in 1945.

The six-county 4-H Club Boys Camp has been set for July 29 and 30. The Camp will be held at the Cisco Lake Park.

Counties planning to participate in the camp are Eastland, Calahan, Shackelford, Jones and Palo Pinto. Stephens County will not participate this year as normally.

Starting time for the camping activities will be at 10 a.m. July 29 and break up at 2:30 p.m. July 30.

Some of the activities for the camp will be swimming, track, softball, horseshoes and washers. Curly Hays, representative of West Texas Utilities Company, has been asked to have a night program on July 29 for the 4-H boys.

Meals will be served in the camping area with Mr. and Mrs. Floyd McFee doing most of the cooking with some of the Extension Service Agents helping. Four meals will be served during the camping period — the meals being lunch and supper on the 29th and breakfast and lunch on the 30th.

Judge Hart Is Voted \$1200 Expense Account

Eastland County Commissioners have voted to allow County Judge John Hart \$1000 per month for "traveling expenses and depreciation on his car while on official business within the county."

The action was taken at the Court's regular semi-monthly meeting July 12, and the order set the date payment was to begin at June 1, 1959.

The \$1200 a year expense account is the maximum which could be set under state law. Commissioner B. M. Bennett made the motion and it was seconded by Commissioner Carl Lamb. All members of the Court were present and all voted for the order.

The order pointed out "County Judge has been furnishing his own car and automobile expenses during the past eight years, and that the cost of automobiles, transportation and upkeep of automobile has materially increased from year to year."

All four commissioners use county-owned pick-up trucks.

The office of county judge in Eastland County pays \$5,017 yearly.

The 56th Legislature passed a bill authorizing such payments of expenses, setting the maximum payment at \$1000 per month.

The Court also authorized the lease-purchase of a \$20,544 Caterpillar No. 12 motor grader from Treanor Equipment Co. of Abilene.

The cost was less \$750 trade-in allowed for a six yard Garwood scraper and an \$11 auto patrol.

Commissioners also recently completed a bond selling-buying deal with C. N. Burt and Co. of Dallas. The County sold Burt and Co. \$8000 worth of City of Eastland Waterworks and Sewer Revenue refunding 3 percent bonds (maturity dates, Oct. 15, 1964) for \$975 per \$1000, or a total of \$7,800.

Then the county in turn purchased \$5000 worth of Eastland School District refunding bonds at \$935 per \$1000, or \$4,675, and \$5000 worth of 2 1/2 percent City of Fort Worth general obligation bonds at \$900 per \$1000, or \$4,500. All money used was out of the permanent school fund. The county invests the money in order to keep it from being dormant.

Peanut Meeting

A program planned to interest and inform the State's peanut producers will be held in Stephenville Friday. It is the annual membership meeting of the Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association and will be held in the Agricultural Auditorium at Tarleton State College.

According to Ben Spears, extension agronomist, the members will meet at 10 a.m. and the general session, open to every person interested in the Texas peanut industry, at 11 a.m. Featured speaker for this session will be Delph Brice, Jr., well known Uvalde rancher - farmer - businessman and one of the State's best known conservationists.

Dr. Sydney Reagan, chairman of the Peanut Improvement Work Group, will report on items of interest to peanut growers including the latest developments in research work dealing with peanuts.

Following lunch which will be served in Stephenville City Park, courtesy of the SWPGA, a demonstration program will be given. James Dickens, agricultural engineer from North Carolina State College, will demonstrate newly developed automatic peanut sampling and grading equipment.

Spears says the program has been planned so growers can fully utilize the day. Association business will be handled during the first hour of the meeting while the remainder of the day will give those attending a chance to visit and at the same time pick up information which should be valuable in their operations.

Slick Pavement Cause Of Traffic Accidents

Houston Street and Highway 80 was the scene of three traffic accidents this week. Wet, slick pavement and excessive speed combined to cause three automobile mishaps.

Saturday at 2:20 p.m. a 1957 Ford truck owned by W. R. Keithley and driven by Pistubee Lester, jackknifed on the wet pavement causing the truck to smash into a sign. The truck was considered a total loss.

Monday at 11:53 a.m. an International truck, driven by William Carl Cope, jackknifed, colliding with a '58 model Oldsmobile driven by Charles May of Eastland. Peanut Price Support Levels Announced

Interim price support levels by types and areas for 1959 crop peanuts have been announced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

These levels are based on the minimum national average support of \$193.50 per ton announced in advance of planting time.

USDA officials explained that the announcement today will permit price support operations to be placed in effect promptly for the 1959 crop, pending determination of the final support rates on the basis of the August parity price (to be released July 31) and the supply situation as affected by the 1959 estimated production shown by the August crop production report (to be released Aug. 11).

If the final support rates are higher than those announced today, any farmers who may have placed peanuts under loans at the announced interim levels will receive additional advances to reflect the higher levels.

The average support prices by type per ton of 1959 crop peanuts related to the \$193.50 per ton announcement are: Virginia type, \$205.30; Runner type, \$180.64; Southeastern Spanish type, \$197.90 and Southwestern Spanish type, \$189.83. (Interim loan advance for Southwest Spanish will be \$180.88). If a change is made in the national average level of support, upward adjustments will be made in approximately equal amounts for all types.

Loans and purchase agreements on 1959-crop peanuts will be available to individual producers and grower associations from the first of harvest through January 31, 1960. Loans will mature May 31, 1960, or earlier on demand by the Commodity Credit Corporation.

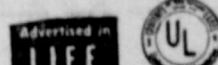

I GIVE YOU TEXAS

By BOYCE HOUSE

Just rambling:
Los Angeles has an Italian cafe called "The Tower of Piza."
On the highway a good many miles east of L. A., a motel was under construction, with a sign reading, "Another Blank Comp. any motel -- here we grow again."
From the train window, one can see the Salton Sea; it parallels the Southern Pacific's line for miles, and there are speedboats skimming along and the shore is bright with tents and awnings of family outings -- but what makes the sea so amazing is that it is 244 feet below sea-level.
The train glides through a scenic contrast; on the left are mountains of jagged stone and on the right are mounds of white sand as smooth as just-fallen snow. Yes, California is a land of wonders.

In Lordsburg, N. M., a movie house had this sign:
"Long Hot Summer;
Selected Shorts"
And as you enter Wilcox, Ariz., a sign announces the population as 1,803 and further proclaims, "Cattle Capital of the Nation."
When I was a "cub reporter" at The police station in Memphis, there was a "rescue home" in that city. One night, the desk sergeant not disclosing his identity, however -- telephoned the superintendent of the institution and said, "I understand you save women." "That's right," "Then," said the caller, "save me two -- a blonde and a brunette."
Did you ever know an Irishman who said, "Beggara"? (Except on the stage and in Pat -- and Mike jokes.)
A Kentucky orator, A. O. Stanley, debating with a rival, declared, "Ed Morrow's pronouns wander through a wilderness of words searching vainly for their antecedents."
And whatever became of Kilroy?

What was Austin and its life like when O. Henry, the future master of the short story, lived there?
In the issues of the Austin Statesman during January 1887 (O. Henry was then working in the Land Office), there were such news items as an account of four runaway teams on East Pecan street in one day with no injury; a fire in the room of a man who after, "a night around", had gone to bed at 6 a.m., cause of the fire, which caused \$450 damage, being furnished as an overturned lamp or a lighted cigar; and the acquittal of a man for killing a dog.
In one issue, the reader was told of the escape of a prisoner from the chain-gang, the breaking out of the "cabinhouse" by another and announcement of a meeting of the Austin Grays -- (a drill unit of which O. Henry was a mem-

ber).
Another item was, "The weekly dance at the insane asylum last night was attended by a number of legislators."
Also the public was advised that Fritz Hartkopf of the Opera House Club will serve his customers with "bear meat at lunch today."

The editor indignantly commented, "So far as the Statesman is aware, the Austin postoffice is the only one which keeps the doors of its main entrance locked more than two-thirds of the time. It is an inconvenience to the people which should be remedied."
Incidentally, the business enterprise of the daily is indicated by the fact that the issue of January 2 carried an advertisement of Christmas presents! And the ad was on the front page.

O. Henry himself gives us a glimpse of Austin's appearance in his magazine, "Rolling Stone," August 25, 1894 -- (the governor at that time being James Stephen Hogg). The capital grounds, O. Henry wrote, "are scarcely more than Hogg yellow prairie, and a wilderness of weeds, rubbish, holes and sunflower forests."
He refers also to a "wild waste of ugly, ponderous, dangerous, top-sided, creaking and groaning signs that hang over the sidewalks of Austin . . . Oh, wicked and perverse generation, ye seek a sign and it shall be given you -- on your own heads be the consequences."

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AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

WASHINGTON, D. C. - "THERE OUGHT TO BE A LAW!" How often we have heard this. In some instances it would be entirely appropriate to say there should not be a law.

That is about the situation connected with efforts to produce some sort of a labor reform bill in the Congress. The so-called Kennedy-Edwards Bill recently passed by the United States Senate by a vote of 90 to 1 seemingly pleases no one. On the other hand, at the

time of passage the only real opposition was to the so-called McClellan "Bill of Rights."

Since the Bill is now in the House of Representatives, it is opposed by the U. S. Chamber of Commerce, the National Association of Manufacturers and the large labor unions. This all makes for very strange bedfellows. Of course, they oppose it for different reasons. The National Association of Manufacturers and the U. S. Chamber of Commerce say the Bill is too weak. Many labor union leaders say it is too strong. All of them say they are opposed to corruption, but supposedly everyone is also against crime and sin, unless it is Jimmy Hoffa. Just being against corruption does not require much courage, nor does it

say in specifics what is being opposed or advocated.

Comparatively few people have had occasion to read the Kennedy-Edwards Bill or the several bills proposed as substitutes for the measure.

Sweeping generalities made for the purpose of arousing the emotions among various segments of the population is not something on which legislation can be based. Legislation must deal with the exact and technical language which is to become law. Platitudes are not that kind of language.

Unless one looks at the situation realistically and from the law, he will reach conclusions only on what he hears and what he reads. If what one hears and what he reads is from only one source and based only on the proposition "there ought to be a

law," the opinion may be based on emotion.

For practical reasons legislation is usually a matter of compromise to attain the possible.

The need for labor reform legislation is clear and indisputable. On this point must agree, but exactly what is needed and the method of attaining it as a matter of law is something else. To burn down the barn to get rid of the rats has proved not to be the best method of rodent control.

Any Labor Bill should allow the rank and file union member to

vote secretly by ballot for his officers. The member of the union should know for what his union funds are being spent and some control over them. He should be afforded his individual freedom from within his organization and protected against racketeering and unscrupulous leaders.

It should not be to break and destroy honest unions. Both management and labor should have protection under the law from hoodlums and their criminal actions. It follows, of course, that the general public would be protected.

"There ought to be a law" -- legislation is of vital necessity.

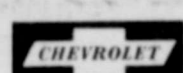

State Department Of Health

"School days, school days. Good ol' golden rule days!" Here they come again, and if you're a wise parent you'll get ready ahead of time.

There is lots to do - buy clothes, fit shoes - and if your child is entering the first grade, chances are you need a birth certificate copy.

School districts in Texas require that entering students be six years old before September 1. Otherwise they must wait until the following year.

The best means of proving your child's age and birth date is to have a certified copy of his birth certificate.

In many areas of Texas, copies are available from local registrars of vital statistics in health departments or county court houses.

You may also obtain a birth certificate copy from the Division of Vital Statistics of the Texas State Department of Health in Austin.

To do so, you must send one dollar requesting a copy. Be sure to include the child's name, date and place of birth and the parent's name.

It is important that parents take care of this chore as early as possible.

During August and September the Division of Vital Statistics is swamped with literally thousands of requests each week for birth certificate copies.

If you want to be sure your child has his birth certificate when school starts, request it now. Rough estimates place the number of upcoming first graders at about 250,000. That makes for a lot of birth certificate copies.

In addition to birth certificates, it would be wise to check with your school district regarding any vaccinations that may be required. It would be a good idea - if you have not already done so - to get your child started on his series of three Salk polio shots before school starts.

Also, a fourth shot or "booster" is generally recommended for added protection a minimum of one year after the initial series.

Another smart idea that will pay off, is adjusting your child's schedule to approximate that of school time including bedtime, meals and especially waking time. (This is a weekly feature of the Division of Public Health Education, Texas State Department of Health.)

Safeway Stores In Nation Show Six Percent Business Increase

Reporting the highest mid-year sales and net profit in its 33-year history, Safeway Stores today confirmed that for the first 24 weeks of 1959 its profit after taxes was more than two percent ahead of last year and sales were up nearly six percent.

For the first time, Safeway's sales exceeded One Billion Dollars during the first half-year reaching \$1,047,943,389, President Robert A. Magowan reported today. Net profit for the same 24-week period, ended June 13, established a new high of \$15,304,138. These results compared with consolidated sales of \$989,331,976 and net profit of \$14,966,433 for the first

24 weeks of 1958 when the Food Company established its previous mid-year records.

Safeway's 1959 net profit at mid-year, after provisions for payment of preferred dividends and taxes on income, amounted to \$1.20 per share of common stock, based on the average number of shares outstanding during the period. Even though this average number of shares continued to increase from 12,183,482 during the first half of 1958 to 12,313,022 this year, Safeway's net earnings per share nevertheless exceeded 1958 when they amounted to \$1.18 at mid-year.

"Such results, of course, are good news for our stockholders," President Magowan said, "but we are particularly pleased that we have been able to parallel this financial growth with similar development of our facilities and employment opportunities. Thus far, in 1959, we have opened 69 modern retail stores and two large warehouse distribution centers. Four more distribution centers will be completed or in the midst of construction by year-end by which time the number of new retail stores opened this year will have reached about 200. These new warehouse centers and retail facilities represent replacements or additions to those which we have outgrown. At mid-year, our report is a constructive one of growth for Safeway."

There were 2,125 Safeway Stores in operation at the close of the Company's first 24 weeks of 1959 as compared to 2,050 at the same time a year ago.
