Injury in 3-Story Fall Is Fatal to Sgt. Bill Eberhart

The adventurous and colorful army career of M. Sgt. Bill Eberhart, 38, ended Tuesday in an accident in Hawaii.

Mr. and Mrs. Ed Eberhart received word Wednesday afternoon of the accidental death of their son. The telegram from Army Headquarters in Hawaii informed them that he had died as the result of a fall from a three-story building. Further details were not included in the message.

No funeral arrangements have been made.

Bill Eberhart, a native of Muenster and a paratrooper in the army, was a career soldier. He volunteered for service in September 1940 and participated in world war II. He was with the paratroops in the Africa, Sicily and Italy campaigns and with them in Belgium and France. He was wounded five times and was decorated. He held the rank of lieutenant.

After the war he was out of the service for about two years, managing a cafe here, then returned to the army. He was with the Army of Occupation in Japan and was later on the front lines in the Korean Campaign.

He went to Hawaii in September this year after being stationed at Fort Bragg, N.C.

During his training days he married a Macon, Ga., girl and she survives with their seven children, six sons and a daughter. She has been with her family in Macon since Sgt. Eberhart left for Hawaii.

Other survivors include two brothers, Herman of Muenster and Walter of Gainesville and four sisters, Mrs. William Flusche of Lindsay, Mrs. Ray Sickling and Mrs. Eddie Krah of Muenster and Mrs. Julius Stelzer of Post.

He sustained nine broken ribs on the left side and this is causing a great deal of pain and will keep him in the hospital at least a week. His general condition is reported as good otherwise.

The accident occurred at the intersection of Farm Road 1199 and U. S. 82 at Lindsay.

Cubs Close Season With 28-0 Decision Over Cowtown Kids

The Cubs of Sacred Heart Elementary School ended their football season in a big way Sunday afternoon by playing their best game of the year and swamping Father Patrick's kids of St. Mary's, Fort Worth, by a count of 28-0.

Four of Muenster's Hornets were named on the 10-B all-district team for 1957 and two received honorable mention in the annual selection made by district coaches in their post season meeting last Saturday in the Community Room of the First State Bank in Gainesville.

The coaches also officially named Muenster as the district representative in the bi-district playoff with Lockett. Sharing the champ title with Saint Jo, with identical loop records of 5-1, the Hornets were favored because of their win over Saint Jo.

Final standings of other teams in the district were Valley View 4-2, Alvord 3-3, Era 4-2, Sanger 1-5 and Callisburg 1-5.

Hornets selected for the mythical team were Butch Fisher, the only unanimous selection of the district, Butch Hudspeth, C. J. Hellman and Dan Hamric. Honorable mentions were James Wolf and David Klement.

Because of the method of voting the mythical team has a membership of 16 players. The votes account for an extra member in five of the team's positions. Hornets Win 10-B Co-Champ Title; Will Meet Lockett in Bi-District Play-off Saturday

An ambition of the Muenster Hornets ever since 1950, when they were admitted to District 10-B of the Interscholastic League, will be realized Saturday night when they meet the Lockett Panthers of District 9-B in a bi-district play-off.

The game will be played in Leeper Stadium of Gainesville and kickoff time will be 7:30.

Lockett, like Muenster, is the co-champ of its district and becomes the bi-district standard bearer by virtue of its win over Woodson, the other co-champ of the loop.

According to the scant information available to Coach Boze Ansley, there are several factors and records to indicate that the teams will be evenly matched in this tussle. Lockett has a season record of 7-2-1 as compared with Muenster's 8-2 and it also has decisions over two teams which lost to the Hornets. Lockett beat the Valley View Warriors 33-13 and Newcastle 26-6. Muenster won over those teams 13-7 and 31-12 respectively.

As regards size, Muenster will be at a disadvantage, as it has been for every game during the season. Ansley's information is that Lockett will have a heavier

Hornets Edge Era 20-19; Claim 10-B Co-Champ Honors

History almost repeated itself Friday night as Era's Hornets' traditionally at their season's best against Muenster, failed by a single point to stage an upset and deprive Muenster of co-champ honors in district 10-B.

Coach Ansley's charges nosed out 20-19 to share with Saint Jo the season's top district honors. While Muenster was struggling with Era the Panthers were mangling Valley View 40-14.

The game was the last of their regular season, however, developments as a result of the Muenster and Saint Jo wins allow them to play a bi-district game also.

That Muenster had a big job ahead became apparent in the opening minutes as the hosts started marching immediately after receiving the kickoff. Hard driving Patterson and Muller led the assault in a 55 yard drive that was finally halted on the 13. However it was resumed just two plays later when Muenster lost a fumble on the 20. Three attempts from three gained 5 and Neal Wilson passed to David Wilson over the line for the first TD.

Muenster's comeback was rapid and decisive. In 8 plays it moved 60 yards to tie the score, Harris making the last 17. Hamric followed over for an extra point but an offside penalty nullified his effort. The next attempt, a pass from Hamric to C. J. Hellman, was good and Muenster led 7-6.

The honoree had attended ten o'clock mass with her son Joe Horn and family and found all the rest of the group waiting to greet her when she returned.

As a joint birthday gift the Horn children gave their mother a trip to the Rio Grande Valley to visit her sister, Mrs. John Wilde, at Harlingen. She hasn't decided just when she will go but plans that as an event in the not too distant future ... perhaps around Christmas.

Mrs. Horn has lived in Muenster 67 years and spent more than a quarter of a century managing

Muenster Telephone Company. She was this community's first operator.

The former Miss Mary Voth, Mrs. Horn was born in Borken, Germany, on Nov. 21, 1875, a daughter of Henry and Christina Voth, and came to the United States with them in 1883. They settled in Albion, Neb., and stayed there seven years, then moved to Muenster in 1890, a year after the colony was established. Mrs. Horn has lived here continuously since.

In May 1903 she married J. S. Horn and in 1909 she took over as telephone operator when the company installed its first switchboard. She held the job for five years then resigned to devote her time to her growing family. She went back to work for the telephone company in January 1927 and was in charge until 1943. From then until May 1950 she served as relief operator. At that time a fall caused a broken hip and it was two years before she walked again.

The broken hip necessitated two operations. The first failed to join the bones sufficiently and in February 1951 she underwent surgery again and spent ten weeks in a full length cast. Sheer determination and practice ... and she learned to walk again in March 1952. She advanced from wheelchair to walker to crutches and then to a cane which she still uses. She learned to do all her housework from the wheelchair.

Her husband died June 21, 1949, and with the exception of the time she was helpless with the broken hip she lived alone until about two years ago. Her daughter, Mrs. Christine Schad lives with her since Mr. Schad died.

Always interested and active in parish and civic events, Mrs. Horn is a charter member of the local court Catholic Daughters of America, and belongs to the parish St. Anne's Society and the Third Order of St. Francis.

Her five children attended the birthday party. She has 11 grandchildren and four great-grandchildren. She has one sister Mrs. Wilde of Harlingen and one brother Joe Voth of Justin.

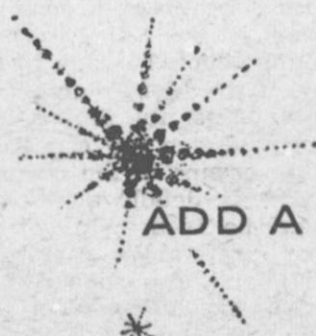

After that there was a weiner roast and other eats with drinks and a birthday cake, then games. Guests presented the honoree with a shower of gifts.

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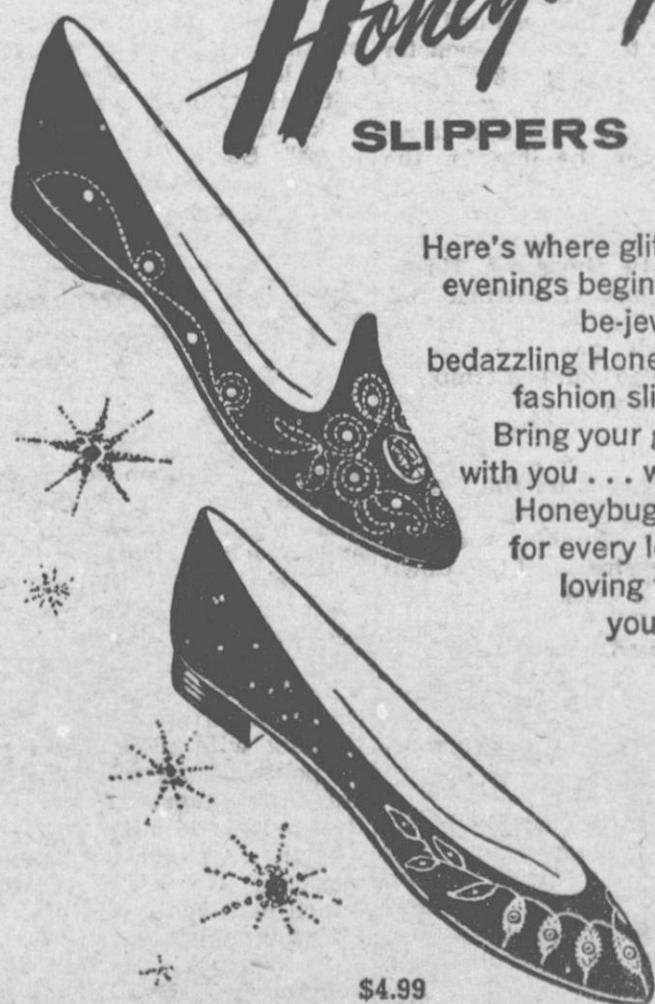
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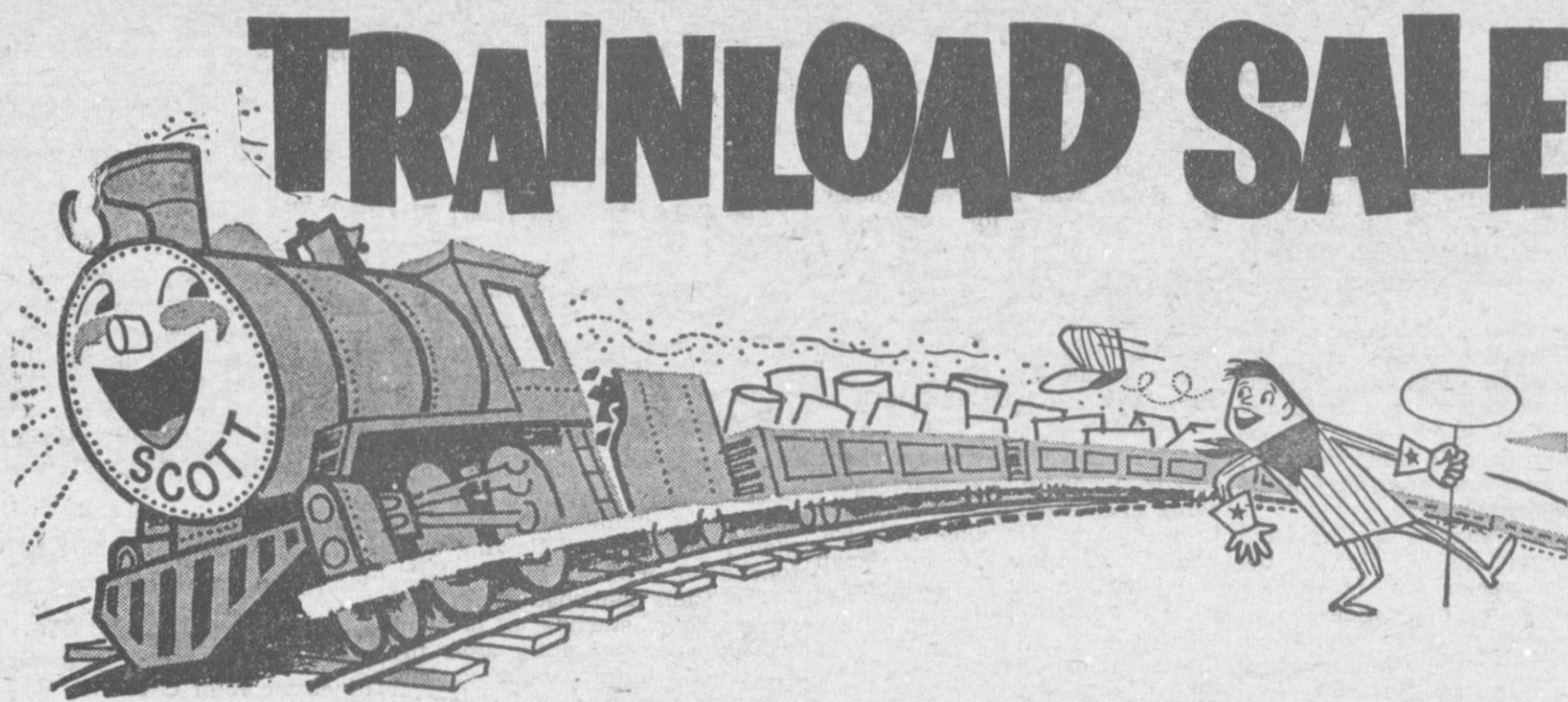

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



Did recent rains catch you with bare soil showing? That's a timely question asked by the local Soil Conservation Service personnel.

The beating downpours recently caused heavy soil losses on fields that were left without the protective cover of crop residues. Crop remains left on or near the soil surface act as a protective mulch to break the force of falling raindrops and allow more water to soak into the soil.

Fields left clean-plowed are exposed to the impact of falling rain. The soil surface quickly becomes sealed over so that water soak-in is slowed. Soil particles are jarred loose and carried down hill by run-off waters that rush from the field over the bare ground.

Each inch of rain that strikes the land weighs 114 tons per acre. Drop this much weight on the bare soil, then move it rapid-

ly down the slope and severe damage to the soil will occur. Crop remains or growing plants provide a cushion to lessen the damage of falling or moving water, terraces slow the water so that its carrying power is reduced, grassed waterways carry the rainfall safely down slopes.

Walk over your fields. Can you see where top soil has been washed away? If you are losing soil, then your production is going down. A complete soil, water and plant conservation plan applied to the land will prevent soil and water losses and will increase production.

The Upper Elm-Red Soil Conservation District will assist you in planning and applying conservation practices to your land. Apply all conservation practices while there is still soil to work.

Reservoirs

The Upper Elm-Red Soil Conservation District's system of upstream flood retarding dams on Elm Creek proved its worth again during the first week of this month when over eight inches of rain fell in the watershed over a three-day period.

The seventeen reservoirs that have been completed in the watershed rose some ten feet above normal when the floodwaters were impounded. There was no flooding along the Elm Creek bottoms until a point below Gainesville. There the creek left its banks and spread over the Leo Hoedebeck farm causing considerable damage.

Rainfall records are being set this year and the floodwaters retarding system is getting a good workout. Last spring the system prevented damaging overflows along the fertile bottomlands of Elm Creek by holding back water and releasing it slowly over a long period of time. Now there has been a repeat performance as unusually heavy fall rains have hit the area.

There are 17 completed reservoirs in the watershed. The 18th one is under construction on Dry Elm Creek north of Muenster. Four more structures are planned for construction soon on the upper reaches of the watershed and others will be built as the flood control plan on the watershed progresses.

Local Herds Rate Among Top Herds In DHIA for Oct.

Eight local dairy herds were among high herds in the DHIA for the month of October and George Bayer's cows were in third place, being topped only by the herds of Peter Prescher and H. H. Moody. Paul Fisher's cows were in fourth spot, according to the association's report for the month.

Prescher's herd, first in both milk and butterfat production, averaged 1240 pounds of milk and 48 of butterfat. Moody's cows produced 1190 pound of milk and 44 pounds of butterfat. Bayer's herd ran up totals of 1125 pounds and 38 pounds.

Of the 804 cows owned by association members, 113 produced 50 pounds of butterfat or more during the month.

Average milk production for the association was 755 pounds per cow, and average butterfat production was 30 pounds.

In a state DHIA report just released for September, the Cooke County association topped the state in the production of

milk with an average of 700 pounds per cow. The Dallas County association was in second place with 680 pounds, and the Wichita Valley association placed third with 670 pounds.

In butterfat production, Cooke County was in a tie for third with Hopkins County. Both reported 26-pound averages. Wise County placed first with an average of 28 pounds, and Dallas County was second with a 27-pound average.

The state association averaged 600 pounds of milk per cow, and 24 pounds of butterfat.

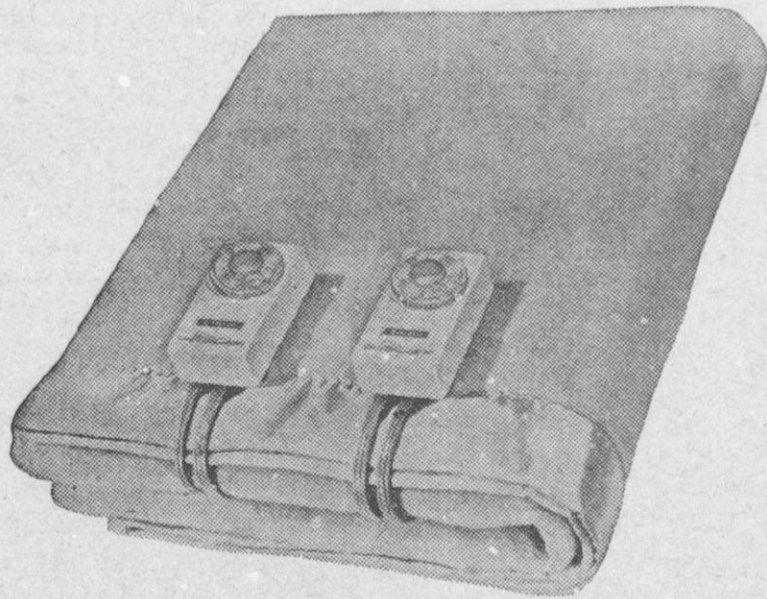

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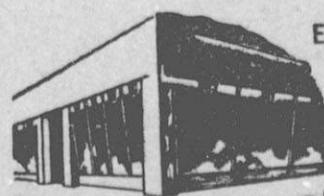
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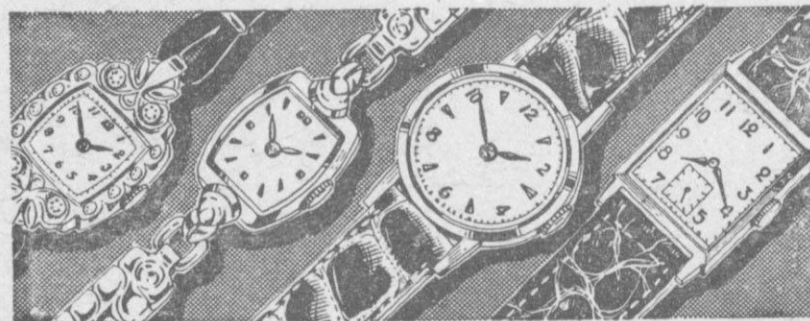

Still scrapping hard the Jesuit rookies put up their best game in the second period, limiting the Tigers to two first downs while they marked up three of their own.

On the first play of the period Hartman intercepted a pass, the first of seven stolen from the visitors during the game, and the Tigers followed with a prompt first down to Jesuit's 41. Then Mollenkopf got loose on a touchdown sprint but officials called it back and penalized the team for backfield in motion. Next a fumble ended the Tiger threat suddenly. Jesuit snapped back with two pretty plays, a pass for 17 and a run for 19 reaching to the Tiger 28, but that was all. The Tiger defense refused to budge an inch on the next four downs. For the rest of the quarter the teams were deadlocked in mid field, each making only one first down.

The second half opened with a bang as Mollenkopf took the opening kickoff on the 18, picked up nice blocking and scooted the full 82 yards for a touchdown. His kick for extra point was true and the score was 13-0.

TD member 3 came almost as fast. On the first play after kickoff Mollenkopf intercepted a Jesuit pass and broke into the open for 35 yards and a TD.

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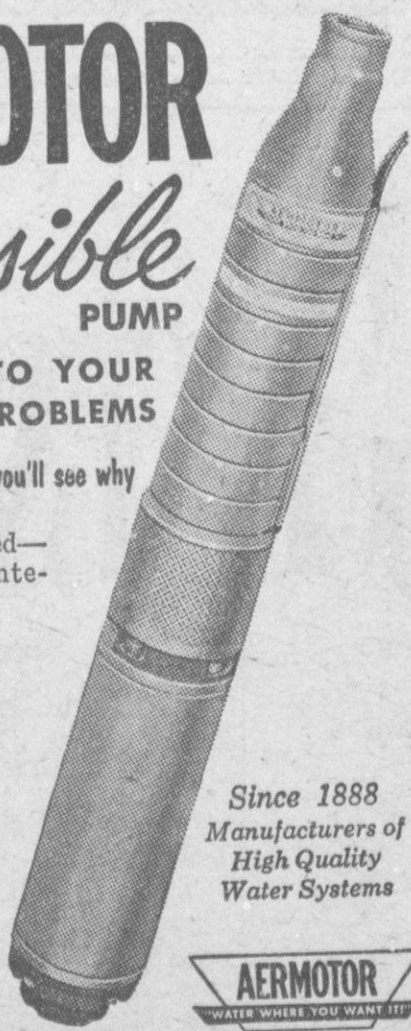

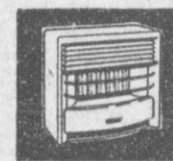

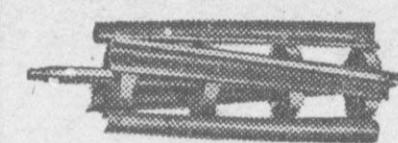
