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Executive Put and Take

The further we look, the more dragons' teeth we find in the surprise package that is labelled "The Civil Rights Act of 1963" and tabbed with the numbers S. 1731 and H. R. 7152.

Peering beyond its widely publicized Title II—the explosive "Public Accommodations" section which confuses property rights and human rights and withdraws the Constitutional right of trial by jury those charged by Federal gun-shoers with violation of this chapter—there are some further shockers:

Title VII, for instance, is a blueprint for the destruction of the union seniority system—if not of the whole temple of organized labor. Stanza Seven authorizes a "Commission on Equal Employment Opportunity" with the unlimited powers "as may be conferred upon it by the President." It would prevent racial or religious discrimination in hiring by all employers "participating in programs or activities in which direct or indirect financial assistance by the United States Government is provided by way of grant, contract, loan, insurance, guaranty or otherwise." (Which means practically every business and professional institution.)

Where the Commission's inspectors found racial or religious "imbalance", an employer could be required to fire sufficient workers of the predominant race or religion and hire enough Negroes or white or Indians or Chinese or Eskimos, or Protestants or Catholics or Jews to achieve whatever the inspector considered "balance". Obviously, the employer needing such replacements could no longer hire out-of-hand the workers sent him by the unions with which he had contracts.

And since the Commission could require removal of imbalance at all levels from the laborers through the supervisors, executives, officers and directors—it seems obvious that its army of Federal busybodies would swiftly become the real masters of labor and management both—throughout the whole economy.

Their power becomes apparent when we realize that offenders might well have Federal loans called, contracts, guarantees or insurance cancelled, FDIC protection withdrawn, participation in any program denied—and after that, blacklisting for one, two or three years and revocation of Federally granted licenses all by Executive Order.

The Executive Department is telling our Senators and our Congressmen that this is the kind of America you want. If you don't write these men today and tell them to kill The Civil Rights Act of 1963.

She was a mother. Her son was in Viet Nam. Military Advisor. And she felt we had no business being there. When I pointed out that — not to be there was to abandon the country, and eventually the world, to the Communists — she replied, "Yet, we always tie ourselves up with the wrong kind of people."

There is the observation of a well-meaning do-gooder. Perhaps liberal and do-gooder are synonymous. There are circumstances when we have as much to fear from the actions of the liberal do-gooders as from the dedicated Communists.

When I made the observation that even Batista was less of an evil than Castro, the answer was — "Yes, but must we always be on the side of dictators?"

A l w a y s is a long time. And, idealistically, of course, we wish that dictators were elected to office by democratic processes. But, don't you remember when Cheddi Jagan was considered a do-gooder, with the interest, at heart, for the people of British Guiana? . . . and do you remember when Herbert L. Matthews, then writing for the New York Times, "convinced" us that the revolution in Cuba was not Communist, but simply the dictates of the agrarian people for self-government?

All of which adds up to — there are many plans and processes by which the Communists are knocking off one country after another. We have to defend ourselves, not only against the avowed Communist, but also against the naive do-gooder, who unknowingly aids the Communist goals.

It is a little thing. Yet, it was broadcast to the nations of Europe and most of the countries in this hemisphere. While relatively unimportant, it shows the nature and character of the Russians. It occurred on the televised track meet of the Russian versus the American athletes. It had been agreed by both parties that the points scored by the males and females would be calculated separately. The American males beat the Russian, but the Soviet girls

trounced our gals. Both countries had affirmed the agreement . . . yet, to show themselves as the winner, the Soviets violated this agreement. For all the viewers to see, were the point standings — lumped together — which, in total, placed Russia first.

As we see it, the Russians will violate an agreement in sporting events, in international diplomacy or in military matters, whenever they see any advantage in breaking it. How long will they honor the Test Ban Agreement?



Taking Mr. Khrushchev at his own words when he replied to Peking — they believe they can bury the Capitalistic West without overt war. Overt — meaning outright, declared war. There was no mention made about brush-fire wars, nor about the subversion and conversion of discontents into training and scrub wars, in places like Latin America, Asia and Indonesia.

All of which means that the present Washington atmosphere of rosy co-existence — and agreements to ban nuclear testing — appear to me to be anything but a new era in Soviet comradeship.

Despite rumors to the contrary, the Negro's campaign for civil equality was not originated by the Communists, nor is it as yet dominated by the Communists. But it would be strange indeed if the Communists did not try to move in and make the best of a great opportunity for mass violence and racial warfare. And that's just what they are doing.

Growing behind-the-scenes Communist influence, backed by Party Funds, would like to divert

the movement towards armed revolt and other bloody tactics. The moderates and other passive-resistance advocates are being pressured to step aside.

Furthermore, the Party seeks in the campaign a rewarding hunting ground for new members, especially among the Black Muslims (who now demand one-fifth of the United States for their own personal use.)

They've done it to us again! We've never lost a war, and we've never won a peace. In my judgment, we've been had a g a i n. While the Test Ban Treaty may have beneficial aspects, there are many points which are contrary to our best interests and, certainly, to our intentions.

Russian policy-makers play with us like a cat plays with a mouse. Consider this — the agreement says that any nation can become a party to the treaty automatically by notifying the three signers that it agrees with the treaty. This means that East Germany and Cuba, with whom we have no relations and with whom we do no business, merely by signing the treaty, recognize us and we, perforce, recognize them regardless of the fact that we disclaim it.

It goes further. The agreement says that while no nation will test in the atmosphere, under water, or in outer space, a nation may test in caves or underground. Therefore, Cuba, with lots of caves, can become the developing ground for Communistic experiments.

When you take into consideration that the Bar Association has plainly stated that Russia has broken fifty out of fifty-three agreements into which she has entered . . . when you retain in your full reasoning that the Communists mean to annihilate us . . . that every interval in the Cold War is intended to consolidate their advances, you begin to question whether wily Khrushchev's intention was not only a Test Ban Treaty, and a means of consolidating but also gaining recognition for East Germany and Cuba.

FISHING LINES

If the biting rate of fish could be plotted on a chart, the curve would go up sharply after Labor Day. At least, that's the direct city kids back from camp, and the waters starting to cool, fish be moving to the surface for more active feeding. They seem sense the long, lean winter months ahead.

Cooler autumn air means that bass, pickerel and trout start biting better, particularly brown trout — sluggish in weather, but rough and ready for those late Fall fly-hatches. So of the best brown- and bro trout fishing is coming up. Western Montana and Wyoming and other trout-fishing areas where the Fall fly-fishers move into the smaller streams.

You'll find these beauties a rare treat on one of Garcia's 8-ft. or 8½-ft. fly rods in the Gold Line, strung with Intallite. Balance them with either a light weight 3½" Priddy fly-caster reel or the medium-weight Baiter in the same family.

Travel up to the Great Lakes or near the Canadian border, and you'll find pike, walleye and muskie rising more quickly to the bait. These varieties feed till it's too cold to fish — especially small- and large-mouth bass which have sense enough to want to put on some extra weight before winter sets in.

They're looking for frogs along the weeds and water pads, waiting for them. If you use this wily lure, keep it at shallow depths by setting the lip control at almost a vertical position. When you working awkward spots, you might prefer an Abu-Relex spinner designed to snake through weeds and other submerged snags.

As cooler weather moves in, habits also change in saltwater angling. Salt fish, such as mullet, start moving southward, hugging the shore as they go. Their natural enemies — albacore, wahoo, marlin, and bonito — come inshore to follow them — and then when you want to be ready with some long rods.

For surf-fishing at this time, you'll find the 11' 4" Garcia 11 rod comfortable, especially when using it with a Mitchell 302 or 3 spinning reel and a 1-oz. Luster-Lure.

If it's salmon you're after, the 10' Garcia 2554 rod will give good performance, especially when worked with 15- to 20-lb. test line.

The later it gets the more fight in the great striped bass and bluefish. Seems like nature, shaking loose from the bonds of summer heat, is making one last huge lunge of energy before the mercury dips below freezing. Better eat a hearty breakfast before shoving off!

VETERANS

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Are veterans of World War I entitled to a pension? If so, is there a requirement as to age and do they have to be disabled?

A pension may be payable to a wartime veteran, regardless of age, if he is totally and permanently disabled not as a result of his military service. The veteran must be unable to pursue a gainful occupation by reason of such disability and his income from all sources must be under the statutory limits. Details in an individual case are available at any VA office.

I have been told that any veteran is entitled to use the word "G.I." Is this right and what does it mean?

The term "G.I." might be considered as "government issue" and is referred to various supplies, equipment, clothing, etc., issued to individuals or units in service. In time it became a term referring to the men themselves. It has standing as an entitlement to certain benefits.

Why are widows of World War I or of Korean Conflict unable to get pensions from the Government on the grounds that World War veterans can?

That is no longer true. As of July 1, 1960, widows of World War I or of Korean Conflict veterans have been able to receive pensions on the same basis as World War veterans. In brief, the deceased had to have at least 90 days of service of which at least 30 days were during wartime, he had to be discharged under conditions other than dishonor, and the widow's annual income must be within statutory limits. Individual details may be obtained at any VA office.

COMMENTS FROM THE CAPITOL

Suppose the Prime Minister of Great Britain had invited Jimmy Hoffa to visit him... or Walter Reuther... or both. It would be damned unusual, to put it mildly — yet, that's what the Whiz Kids did in Washington. Mr. Kennedy's kindergarten klotch influenced whoever it was necessary to influence to get the Labor Party's Harold Wilson invited to the White House. Imagine how embarrassed Prime Minister MacMillan must have been...

Not being content with unusual procedures, inner circles report that Presidential Advisor MacGeorge Bundy, Ted Sorenson, Pierre Salinger and other bright boys, who are sometimes long in wit and short in wisdom, are telling our Western allies in NATO how to run their affairs and their countries. Who is to say them nay?

It seems so simple that I wonder how liberals can get themselves confused. We need bases in Spain for NATO, and our own defenses. Even the liberals agree to this. Their hue-and-cry is that, unfortunately, Spain is ruled by Dictator Franco and — horrors! — we should not do business with "dictators" and especially him, they say — but we need the bases in S...

For the sake of example, let's consider the imaginary case of a modern automobile manufacturer, who got his start by making horse-drawn buggies. He switched over to cars generations ago, but suppose the union still requires him to maintain a fully-staffed horse-

collar - and - related - accessories division. Preposterous? Certainly. But that's exactly what's happening to our railroads. They're required by the union to keep thousands of firemen on the payroll, even though modern diesel locomotives have no coal to shovel and no fires to tend.

Two different presidential boards have recommended squeezing the manpower waste out of railroad work rules. What's more, the United States Supreme Court has upheld the right of management to do so. But all the unions can say, in reply, is a stubborn "no" and "strike"! They choose to ignore the fact that feather-bedding is pushing the railroads a half-billion dollars closer to bankruptcy every year. Crippled railroads mean a crippled nation, but they couldn't care less about that, either. The only thing that really seems to matter to the unions is an irresponsible "what's in it for me?"



"Management of the news", whether it emanates from Washington or the UN, unfortunately, is still very much with us. Typical of these truth-twisting tactics is what the American public is being

told about Portugal's colonial possessions in Africa.

Like most Americans, I had been led to believe that the Portuguese colonies were horrible examples of imperialistic exploitation at its worst, with the oppressed natives rising in righteous revolt. But, then, just a few days ago, I suddenly discovered how wrong I was.

I talked with some newspapermen who had just returned from there. What they found was progress, prosperity, and complete harmony. The only trouble-makers were the professional agitators sent by neighboring African states — the very same states that pushed through the UN arms embargo on Portugal. In view of what's really going on, it would seem much more sensible to block off the arms supply of the trouble-making countries, instead.

Speaking for the Communists in America, Gus Hall, the U. S. Commie boss, says, "peaceful co-existence has enriched Marxism" — "the test ban agreement is the result of peace and ban-the-bomb forces in all lands." Strange, there has been no word of ban-the-bomb movements in Russia. There, people are simply told what to believe — and they believe it.

In his testimony before the Senate, the Secretary of State is quoted as saying — "The signing of the Test Ban Agreement does not mean that we trust the Reds." Naively, I then ask, why sign it? At best, it can only be a one-way observance.

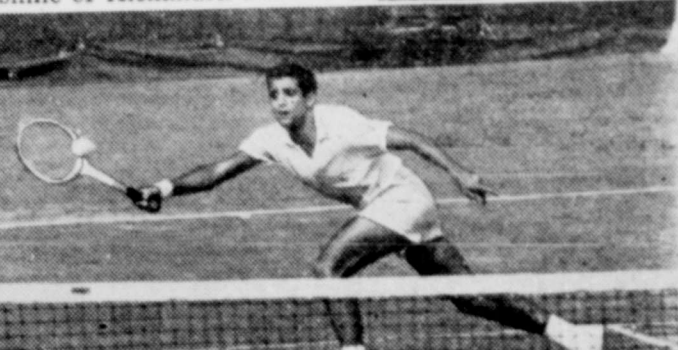

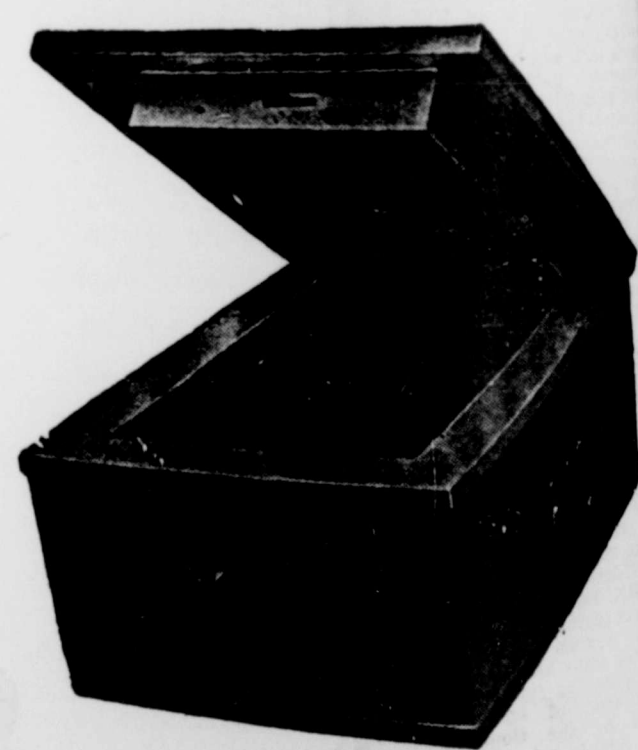

4-H Marks 35th Anniversary of Canning Awards Program

Thirty-five years is a long time for a private business concern to sponsor a specific youth program. But that is the record attained this year by the Kerr Glass Manufacturing Corporation of Sand Springs, Okla. for its support of the national 4-H canning program.

The company's president, Mrs. Ruth Kerr, herself a homemaker and pioneer in the home canning field, personally has congratulated thousands of 4-H members who won trips to the National 4-H Club Congress for their canning ability.

Give Canning Awards

Soon another championship group will arrive in Chicago as guests of Mrs. Kerr. From about four dozen girls, six of the best will be selected for a \$500 national canning scholarship. Over the years the firm has helped 174 high school graduates with their college education by way of scholarships.

Home canning was the first 4-H project for girls and the product to be canned was tomatoes, which the girls were supposed to grow. That was around 1910.

Today, according to a recent survey, tomatoes still head the list of home canned foods. Pickles, beans, peaches, jellies and preserves are next in the order named.

Methods Improved

A half century ago club members were taught to can in tin rather than in glass because they were encouraged to sell the surplus for cash. Housewives of that era were accustomed to buying tinned foods.

Probably the main difference between the early canning project and the 1963 version is that greater varieties of plain and fancy foods—including meat, fish and poultry—are preserved by easier and safer methods.

Today's 4-H pantries are stocked with goodies such as chicken a la king, meatballs in tomato sauce, apricot-raspberry jam, soups, pie fillings and just about every kind of vegetable. In fact, an entire meal can be

made from canned foods.

Because of Mrs. Kerr's continuing support and the expanded information supplied by the Extension Service, the 1964 canning program includes up-to-date guides on good nutrition, safe and sanitary practices in food handling and processing, and of course, news on tested methods for canning different food combinations.

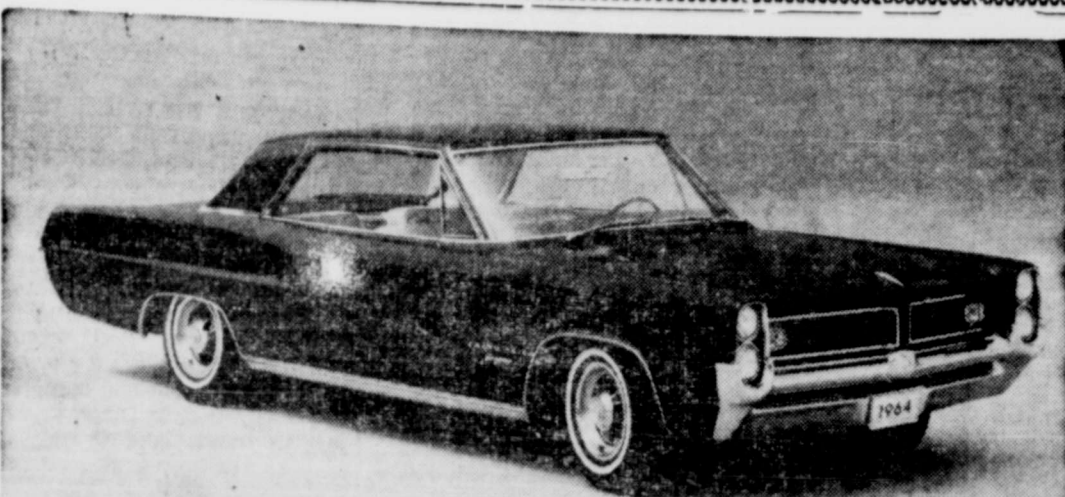
Babson Discusses Consumer
Buying Intentions

There are many methods used to determine what business in general is going to do next, but none of them are surefire—as those of us in the forecasting business know so well. However, one barometer of business weather that I always watch with interest is consumer buying intentions. This is published each quarter by the Census Bureau.

When you come right down to it, public sentiment is very quick to reflect economic tendencies — even sometimes to direct them. If, for instance, people simply do not feel like buying, it is pretty difficult to make them buy. And if they do not buy, stores are caught with top-heavy inventories, orders die down, production has to be cut back, and unemployment begins to rise. Thus the scene is set for a possible recession—or perhaps even for a depression.

Fortunately, however, the opposite is true if the nation's shoppers really want (and are able) to buy. When the future looks comfortably secure, this desire to buy can carry consumer resistance almost to the disappearing point. The more buying increases, the more inventories are used up. Then come new orders for salesmen, for wholesalers, for manufacturers. Production starts to climb, employment expands, and chances of an early recession—or depression—practically vanish for the time being.

How Do Shoppers Feel Now?
This seems like a good time to take a look at the latest estimates of consumer buying intentions, just recently released. Over the next twelve months, more people intend

to buy new automobiles than planned to in the previous year. In fact, the Census Department says that 8.4 per cent of households reporting to it plan to purchase a new car. That is the highest level for this time of the year in the history of this statistical series.

I find this situation optimistic because a great many people are more inclined to pick up a second-hand auto than a new car unless the future looks relatively serene and prosperous. But, right now intentions to purchase used cars show practically no change from a year ago. The emphasis is on new cars—a good sign for business generally in the months ahead.

Buying Intentions For
Household Goods

The picture in household goods may not be quite so rosy as that in automobiles, but it reflects a trend in the same optimistic direction. Consumers intend to buy somewhat more household equipment over the next six months than was the case for the same period a year ago. Many families also expect their incomes will be higher. This is comforting inasmuch as figures show that people have stepped up their buying during the past year faster than they have been increasing their disposable income.

Of course, I realize that a sudden international or financial debacle could make the public pull in its horns very quickly. However, even such an occurrence could not for very long prevent a fundamentally secure-feeling populace from extending its buying again. As an example: Even the threat of war with Russia over her Cuba-planted missiles did not keep people's purse strings closed for any great length of

time.
Employment Will
Remain High

Even though unemployment is giving the Administration a headache, employment totals are climbing steadily, carrying incomes up with them. Except in the relatively few centers of work scarcity, people expect to hold their jobs indefinitely to add to their family incomes from time to time, and to be able to afford more luxuries.

Better homes, second (and even third) cars per household, brand-new labor-saving devices, are all popular expectations for many households today. Fundamentally, business is good; money and credit are plentiful; Russia does not want war; 1964 is an election year, which is always favorable for business. Given co-operation by the weather, it all adds up to good production and trade in the months to come.

Wind-Resistant Roof
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It's time to batten down houses in high-wind areas for the storm season. The first spot to check is the roof, because once it's damaged the rest of the house and its furnishings are wide open to the driving rains that sweep along with most storms.

Roofers, home owners and housing officials in hurricane and other high-wind areas of the country have found that self-sealing asphalt shingles with the Underwriters' Laboratories wind-resistant label have successfully withstood 100-mph hurricanes. They are also fire-resistant and durable.

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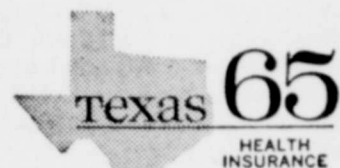
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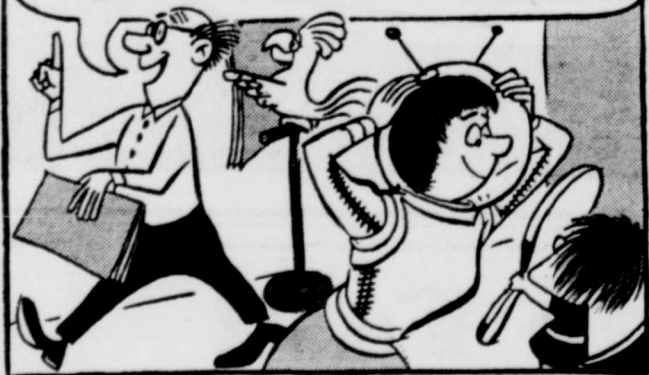
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
