Barrow Strikes Again; One Dead, One Missing

SCHOOL TRUSTEE ELECTION WILL BE HELD ON SATURDAY; ONLY THREE NAMES ARE FILED

With the time for filing on the school board election, which is to be held Saturday, April 7, has passed and ballots are being printed. The election will be held at the city hall only and no box will be open at Young school.

Only three names have been filed with E. A. Ringold, secretary of the board. A. N. Larson, who has been a member of the board for some time, is running for reelection, and R. S. Balch, who has been a member of the board, again a candidate. The only new name on the ticket is that of G. (Lum) Love, who is making his first race for a political position.

The members chosen in the election Saturday will take office at the first regular meeting of the school board, which will be on Tuesday, April 10, it was stated today by Mr. Ringold.

The board has not, as yet, selected a coach, superintendent, principals of the various ward schools or high schools, or any of the teachers for the coming school year, it was stated today, and it is expected that this will be one of the first duties of the school board after the members elected Saturday have taken office.

It is customary for the board to select a coach early in the year, usually in January or February, and the superintendent and principals in March, with the other members selected later in the year, usually by this time of the year, to date no action has been taken along this line.

It was indicated by several today that the vote may be light in election Saturday, but all the voters were being urged to cast their ballots.

Highway Employee Killed; One Injured By Trio In Auto

AUSTIN, April 6.—Occupants of a black, Chevrolet coupe proceeded toward San Angelo after fatally shooting Bill Johns, highway maintenance employee and occupying another unconscious, L. Phares, chief of the highway patrol, was informed here this afternoon.

Two men and a boy occupied the car, it was said. The shooting started about two and a half miles west of Melvin, in Concho county. Cause of the attack was immediately known. It was reported the two employees had approached the car to assist passage of a flooded stream.

Final Decision In Insult Case Is Expected April 7

STANBUL, Turkey, April 6.—Legal authorities were expected to give final decision tomorrow on appeal of Samuel Insull against a government order for surrender to the United States government.

Insull, held in the Istanbul detention house, depended on Turkish and British lawyers to free him on the plea that he was arrested illegally while seeking passage through the Bosphorus to Black Sea in search of refuge from American extradition charges.

Cabinet Closeups GEORGE H. DERN Secretary of War



GEORGE H. DERN

NEA Service Staff Correspondent WASHINGTON.—This smiling two-term governor of Utah has a great deal to do besides direct the army and plan against future wars, though his first job beyond the actual cabinet post is that of chairman of the Council of National Defense.

Secretary Dern rose through the mining and smelting business to the U. S. Senate and the governorship of his state. He is co-inventor of an ore-smelting device, and prepped unconsciously for his present job by membership in his state's council of defense during the World War.

But Dern's job involves a great deal of "big business" administration as well as tending a war machine. He supervises the Inland Waterways Corporation, which coordinates and operates or leases 30,000 miles of inland water transport.

Dern is president of the National Forest Reservation Commission, which buys and manages cut-over or denuded lands, to regulate stream flow or promote timber growth. He is responsible not only for the defense, but for the operation of the Panama canal.

He directs the corps of engineers in the improvement of waterways and making of power and construction surveys in the United States, Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico, and also has certain power over the civil affairs of the Philippines and Porto Rico.

Much of the job of reorganizing the air mail recently fell to him as responsible head of the army air corps.

When the enormous relief works, organization of the Civilian Conservation Corps and the Civil Works administration came along, all details of recruiting, feeding, housing and organizing these millions of men fell on Dern's department.

Between these essentially civilian activities and the actual army, Dern has supervision over the buying of a vast bulk of supplies for all these agencies, and the surveying and organization of industry for possible war.

The conduct of West Point and the Army War College are his responsibility, as well as that of the new Army Industrial College.

Dern, who is 61, has five children, including a charming daughter who just has made her debut.

Cattle Rustling Is Revived In Texas

BEAUMONT.—Cattle rustling days of the old West have taken their sequel in this motored age. Jefferson county's new grand jury was charged by Judge R. L. Murray to be on the alert for cattle rustling—an old western custom of stealing stock.

Dairy owners and stockmen have lost cattle to the thieves who travel in trucks instead of riding horseback as their early brothers, Judge Murray said. The animals are picked up and moved bodily after being shot with a silencer-equipped gun. Then they are butchered and sold miles away from the pasture where they were stolen, the owners told the judge.

Against these new enemies of the livestock owners Judge Murray has directed the attention of the grand jury.

HOUSEWIVES BUYING MORE SURVEY SHOWS

(Copyright 1934 by United Press) NEW YORK, April 6.—The American housewife who spent sparingly during the depression, apparently is loosening her purse-strings more than at any time since the depression set in.

A survey in a number of the nation's largest cities revealed not only a pronounced jump in sales in recent months, but a spirit of optimism among business men, generally.

The increase in retail sales, which began to be noticeable around the Christmas holidays, became more marked coincident with the recent general increases in manufacturing payrolls and factory employment, as revealed by the department of commerce.

"Housewives are not only spending more from the husband's weekly earnings, but are dipping into the savings they put aside to weather the depression, one department store executive said.

New York department store business increased 25 per cent in March, 1934, over the same month last year. Chicago and Detroit stores reported about 8 per cent increase in sales, while those in Cleveland were 40 per cent higher than in March, 1933.

Fort Worth department stores reported a 20 per cent increase over last year, while Dallas sales ranged from 25 to 93 per cent higher and Houston from 50 to 100 per cent higher.

New Accounting System to Handle Future CWA Work

The complete termination of CWA activities on April 1st, will place the burden of supplying relief to indigent families of Texas on the shoulders of the following programs to be conducted by the Texas Relief, the Subsistence Homesteads and the Rural Rehabilitation Projects.

The successful carrying out of these programs in Eastland county has entailed the creation and installation, by the auditing department of the Texas Relief Commission, of a materially changed accounting system. The new system, known as the "Donnell" system, was made under the supervision of George R. Donnell, Auditor of the Commission.

Of particular interest in the new set-up is the new "Work Relief" card which will enable the Administration to properly supervise the "Work Division" activities. Those unemployed, who (Continued on page 8)

COUNTY SANITARY SUPERVISOR MAKES DETAILED REPORT ON SANITARY WORK IN THE COUNTY

The following is a survey of the sanitary work carried on in Eastland county under the CWA program, which came to an end on the night of March 29, as reported to the state health department by Fleming Waters, county sanitary supervisor.

Mr. Vic Ehlers, State Health Department, Austin, Texas.

Dear Sir: I hand you herewith an abstract, complete to date, of all sanitary work in this county under the recent CWA program which terminated the night of March 29, 1934, as follows:

1. Administrative—\$767.10.
 2. Engineering—\$2,640.70.
- This work consisted of the accurate surveying, and mapping of the drainage areas of the water sheds; planning and designing sanitary corrections; planning and designing and supervision of the water system of Desdemona, Texas; surveying, planning and designing the correction of other defects in water supplies, county wide. Engineers were paid skilled wages of \$1 per hour.

POSSE SEEKS BANK BANDITS IN SAND DUNES

CORPUS CHRISTI, April 6.—Sheriff Paul Cox of Nueces county led a posse of 100 heavily armed deputies and citizens into the desolate sand dune country south of here in search of three bandits who were routed yesterday at the First State bank of Bishop.

The bandit car was traced into the area yesterday, and armed guards patrolled all roads during the night, Cox said.

"We know they are in there and we are going to get them," he said. One of the two men who entered the bank undoubtedly was wounded, Cox said, by the surprise fusillade laid down by the cashier and his assistant.

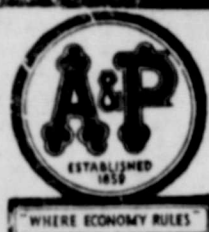

Rapid Expansion Of Oil Markets Traced In Survey

AUSTIN.—It is in the perspective of the major trends and movements in the oil industry as a whole that certain recent developments in the oil industry of the United States, which are of major interest and concern to Texas, can best be understood, according to Elmer H. Johnson, regional economist in the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research. With this premise in mind, Mr. Johnson has in his monthly analysis of the petroleum industry for the Texas Business Review, traced the rapid market expansion, the rapid growth of supply, the beginnings of restriction of output, and other principal trends.

monopolized by the various major problems that came to the oil industry with East Texas. World-wide readjustments in the oil industry are the scramble for oil properties.

"Many months ago the area limits of the great East Texas field were fairly definitely marked out, and that section ceased to be a great hunting ground. Oil exploration did not cease elsewhere, however, even in spite of the depression. For more than a year a rather intensive exploration program has been carried out—and, due to the great reserves concerned, a large share of these operations have been made in the various Texas regions. It may also be noted that oil exploration has been proceeding rather intensively in other parts of the world, and particularly in Russia. It may be said that the search for crude oil supplies has been going on almost as intensively as has been the search for markets for its products. In addition, as a part of the world-wide movement making for greater decentralization of industry, refining centers are being built to serve markets in various parts of the world outside the United States. This latter development has not only tended to decrease exports of oil products from the United States; it has also been a factor in accentuating various competitive forces in the oil industry.

RECIPROCAL TARIFF PLAN ON THE WAY

House democrats deserted the President when it came to standing up and taking the count on the veto message which added almost a third of a billion dollars to the taxes of the people. Then they rallied to the presidential standard and pushed the administration tariff bill over stubborn as well as the very aggressive opposition of the minority—meaning the republican members. A roll call vote on passage was demanded by the republicans and granted—resulting in approval by 273 to 111. It was strictly along party lines. Three farm-labor members from the Northwest voted with the democrats. Only two republicans broke away from the wigwag of the elephant and voted for the F. D. tariff plan. Now quick action in the senate by both democratic and republican leaders is predicted.

Sen. Charles McNary of Oregon, minority leader, frankly conceded the measure would pass the senate virtually as approved by the house. As drafted and enacted by the house it is one of the important legislative acts of the New Deal administration. It would empower the President to negotiate without congressional approval trade agreements with foreign nations for the export of American surpluses. It carries authority for the executive to lower or raise existing tariff rates 50 per cent in making the pacts. It limits to three years the authority for negotiating trade agreements. Another important provision is that "nothing in this act shall be construed to give any authority to cancel or reduce, in any manner, any of the indebtedness of any foreign country to the United States."

Government crop control of American staples must come about or else foreign markets must be found for the surpluses. "An America Self-Contained" would result in crop control some day with tariff walls as high as the sky, for the protection of the farmers of America and its manufacturers and wage workers.

There are prosperity signs in the heavens. There is an adjustment period on. This is a history-making age and all Americans should face the future gladly and resolutely for sane programs of leadership and legislation that will restore peace and happiness and a fair share of prosperity to all concerned.

drinking water at all times, but increased their fire protection and decreased their insurance rate.

6. Water System, Rising Star—\$397.60.

This work consisted of cleaning and painting the water tower in Rising Star, together with other minor corrections in their general water system. The city furnished the necessary materials.

7. Water Connections, County-Wide—\$510.00.

This work consisted of connecting homes and public buildings with water lines and curing other minor defects.

8. Drainage, County-Wide—\$580.00.

This work consisted of draining low places which constituted dangers to the communities as mosquito breeding points, and in and around dairies, to eliminate pollution. It was county-wide.

9. Sewer Connections, County-Wide—\$1,130.60.

This work consisted in connecting homes to sewer lines where practicable, and resulted in the expenditure of from private sources, \$3 spent for materials by the individuals where the government

spent \$1 for labor.

10. Pit Privies, County-Wide—\$11,811.25.

This work consisted of the building of sanitary standard pit type privies, county-wide, where sewer connections were not available and where individuals were unable to purchase the materials necessary for the construction of septic tanks.

Five hundred fifty-one pit privies were constructed in the county, and at this time, approximately 20 are left in the process of construction. At this time, this office has on hand a record of some 631 additional individuals who have a desire to have these buildings constructed on their premises.

11. Septic Tanks, County-Wide—\$2,342.60.

Where the individuals were in a position to purchase plumbing fixtures and other materials necessary to operate a septic tank, installation was made. Twenty-four of these were completed and five were left in the process of construction. The relative high cost of labor for these installations resulted from encountering a great deal of solid rock.

12. General Clean-Up—\$2,496.10.

This work consisted of cleaning

dump grounds, removing miscellaneous health hazards, etc. It was county-wide.

13. Miscellaneous Plant and Office Repairs—\$546.90.

Sum Total—\$30,927.25.

Skilled labor was employed where available, and others were paid in pursuance to the wage scale for the southern zone as set forth by the administrator as a result of an agreement with the trades unions of the United States. Every effort was made to expedite the work without sacrificing economy or sound business methods.

While the above report sets forth the accumulation of a great deal of work, we have, figuratively speaking, merely scratched the surface.

There is now being prepared in this office a proposal for the continuation of this work in the county, and it is anticipated that we will be able to carry on with the inauguration of the new work relief program.

Hoping that this report meets with your approval, and trusting that it is the harbinger of many others, I am,

Rapid Expansion Of Oil Markets Traced In Survey

AUSTIN.—It is in the perspective of the major trends and movements in the oil industry as a whole that certain recent developments in the oil industry of the United States, which are of major interest and concern to Texas, can best be understood, according to Elmer H. Johnson, regional economist in the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research. With this premise in mind, Mr. Johnson has in his monthly analysis of the petroleum industry for the Texas Business Review, traced the rapid market expansion, the rapid growth of supply, the beginnings of restriction of output, and other principal trends.

"Prior to 1900 the petroleum industry was dominantly a kerosene industry with lubricants as important associated products," he explained. "At the close of the World war the petroleum industry had become a gasoline industry, but with kerosene and lubricants as very important associated products. Since 1920 the gasoline industry has grown greatly and the fuel oil market has developed to one of importance. The advances made by oil products and natural gas are reflected, of course, in the reactions of the coal industry to these newcomers in the power and fuel industry.

"While these developments have been occurring, rather sharp shifts have been taking place in the larger outlines of the production of crude oil. Up until around 1925 production of crude oil, in the main, was only keeping up with the rapidly increasing markets for oil derivatives. In the meantime, however, wider geographical exploration was being carried on, and particularly there came to the forefront in oil exploration the successful use of refined technical and scientific applications. In conjunction with these movements there came in rather quick succession the discovery of a number of major oil fields. And in regard to the share contributed by major fields, it is worthwhile to emphasize that in 1933 15 major fields produced at least 54 per cent of the total oil for the United States. At the same time, epoch-making improvements were being made in refining technique whereby a barrel of crude was made to yield a larger quantity of gasoline. "Thus were dispelled the fears of rapid exhaustion of the oil resources of the United States. At the same time there began to arise the actualities of large production from the new countries, and of a return to large production in Russia.

"Almost overnight the oil industry was changed from one of scarcity of crude oil to one of abundance—and then came a whole series of attempts to limit and to restrict production. Since the war oil has become a commodity of vital economic and political importance. World conferences have attempted to deal particularly with the problem of its over-production. Conservation policies at last began to get a hearing. Then more recently the possibilities of synthetic products—by hydrogenation, low-temperature carbonization, etc.—have appeared on the scene. Coal, with the aid of these new processes, can be used as a raw material for the manufacture of petroleum products, and thus our supply of these essential commodities is extended far into the future.

"Since the discovery of the gigantic East Texas fields in 1930 attention very generally has been

monopolized by the various major problems that come to the oil industry with East Texas. World-wide readjustments in the oil industry are the scramble for oil properties. "Many months ago the area limits of the great East Texas field were fairly definitely marked out, and that section ceased to be a great hunting ground. Oil exploration did not cease elsewhere, however, even in spite of the depression. For more than a year a rather intensive exploratory program has been carried out—and, due to the great reserves concerned, a large share of these operations have been made in the various Texas regions. It may also be noted that oil exploration has been proceeding rather intensively in other parts of the world, and particularly in Russia. It may be said that the search for crude oil supplies has been going on almost as intensively as has been the search for markets for its products. In addition, as a part of the world-wide movement making for greater decentralization of industry, refining centers are being built to serve markets in various parts of the world outside the United States. This latter develop-

ment has not only tended to decrease exports of oil products from the United States; it has also been a factor in accentuating various competitive forces in the oil products from the United States; it has also been a factor in accentuating various competitive forces in the oil industry. "More recently still, there has been a veritable scramble for the major integrated companies for oil producing lands. Within the past few weeks the Pew estate has bought the Cranfill-Reynolds holdings; more recently the Carter Oil company, a standard subsidiary, has bought the Slick-Urschel properties. It is reported that other negotiations are in the air. "Some of the reasons advanced for this scramble for oil properties include: The fact that no major field, except Conroe, has been found in the United States since East Texas was discovered during 1930; the efforts that are being made to stabilize the industry, and thus to reduce waste, and to control overproduction; and, the potential market factor. As industrial demand for petroleum products is to be hoped for."

'Wild Horses' Cause Deaths In Texas Health Officer Says

AUSTIN.—A herd of wild horses was responsible for approximately 1,000 deaths in Texas last year, according to Dr. John W. Brown, state health officer. Under the hood of the automobile are from 40 to 100 horses. Whether these are tame or wild and dangerous to human life depends to a large extent upon the drivers. Pedestrians, also, must be "safety minded," if the number of lives lost in fatal automobile accidents is reduced.

In cities, hundreds of thousands of people in the aggregate deliberately and habitually throw caution to the winds by jay walking, by crossing streets at all points but at intersections, by dodging around street cars and even by deliberately disregarding traffic signals. And highway walkers also are more likely to move with, rather than against traffic, which of course results in greater risk, especially at night.

The automobile driver himself, intoxicated by the joy of effortlessly stepping up his machine to an excessive speed, and in hundreds of other ways violating the rules and the ethics of the road, makes of this magnificent invention the Frankenstein it has so sadly turned out to be.

It needs to be more emphasized upon the average brain than it is today, that all the healthful living in the world is of no avail when one either as a driver or as a pedestrian takes chances with the automobile and loses. Moreover, prager water and milk control, as well as the many other safeguards to health and life, mean absolutely nothing to a dead man killed by his or another's automobile.

Lodge Plans Test Message from Dead

LONDON.—One day—not so very long now—the world may have definite proof that the dead can communicate with the living.

Sir Oliver Lodge, Britain's foremost spiritualist and scientist, has deposited a sealed "test message" with the Society of Physical Research. When he dies, and he is 83, he will attempt to communicate that message from the hereafter.

The content of the message is known only to Sir Oliver, and its nature is such that it will definitely establish its authenticity if received by mediums.

Some hint of the form of the message is contained in his book, "My Philosophy." In it he takes an imaginary case suggesting that a verse of even frivolous description, which, unknown to anybody else, has been constantly in the mind of a person, may be remembered after death.

Sir Oliver has been an almost life-long believer in communication with the dead. As long ago as 1908 he started the world with an announcement to that effect. Recently he reaffirmed "his absolute belief in life after death," in a countryside radio broadcast.

He is spending his remaining days in an old stone-walled house on the lonely Salisbury Plains. The gray mists that continually swirl about it seem to hold the spirits with which he claims to converse.

To use his own words, he is engaged in "the enjoyment of tranquility," a tranquility that is undoubtedly enhanced by his belief that he will meet "on the other side" his wife, whom he so greatly loved; Raymond, his son who was killed in the war; his daughter, Violet, and others who shared his affections on earth.

Some months ago Sir Oliver underwent a serious operation, and he still is convalescing. He has a favorite walk. Nowadays he can only complete half the walk.

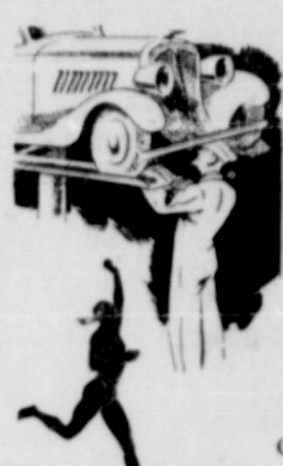

Wood Scraps Used To Make a Violin

HOUSTON—Scraps of wood in the hands of W. J. Parker, 54, cabinet maker, turned almost magically into a violin with a tone that brought praise of musicians. Parker insists the instrument is a fiddle.

are actually destitute and are physically able to work, after a thorough investigation has been made definitely establishing their need, will be given the opportunity to work and earn to their estimated relief need requirements. This work card is so designed as to limit the payroll to the actual relief requirements for each particular individual employed. Pay to persons not eligible for relief, or to relief clients in excess of the requirements of the individual family will not be approved in Austin. The new work card, though simple in form, will permit the definite placing of responsibility and indicate who is at fault if a client is allowed to earn from relief funds more than his relief budget requirements.

Staff Auditor H. W. Haney of the Texas Relief Commission announced today, after a conference with County Relief Chairman Earl Conner of the Eastland County Relief Board, that a thorough study had been made of Eastland County Relief Problems and the new system installed. Elsworth Mayer will take charge of the new set-up here effective April 1st, as Certifying Officers under H. E. Driscoll, Administrator.

The new Relief Set-up to be used in this County has the specific approval of Washington officials, and it is believed that Kansas and Oklahoma, who recently sent officials to Austin to confer with State Relief Officers and to study the Texas Relief Accounting Set-up, may install this system in the Relief Work in their own respective states.

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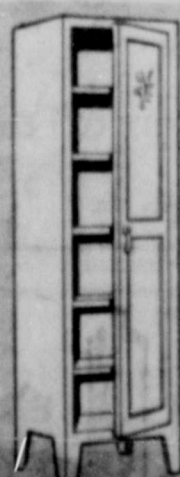
