Building bridges

Aging structures being replaced

Work is underway on replacing three county bridges which wouldn't be possible if Mitchell County had not been able to pay 20 percent of the cost.

The three bridges, two in precinct two and one separating precincts one and two, will cost \$834,400 when completed. The county's 20 percent share of the cost will be \$166,880 with the state picking up the rest of the tab.

The county money is coming the road and bridge fund which is funded by the \$5 additional charge on license plate renewals.

The two bridges in precinct two span Morgan Creek and are located on county roads 290 and 280 three miles north of Iatan off Interstate 20. The third bridge, the old Cedar Bend bridge spanning the Colorado River, is located

about two miles west of Farm to Market Road 1229 north of the Travel King Truck Stop (the old Cattleman's) on Interstate 20.

The Cedar Bend bridge has been determined an historical landmark and will not be torn down. Instead, a new 28-foot wide bridge, some 310 feet long and with a load capacity of 80,000 pounds, will be built nearby.

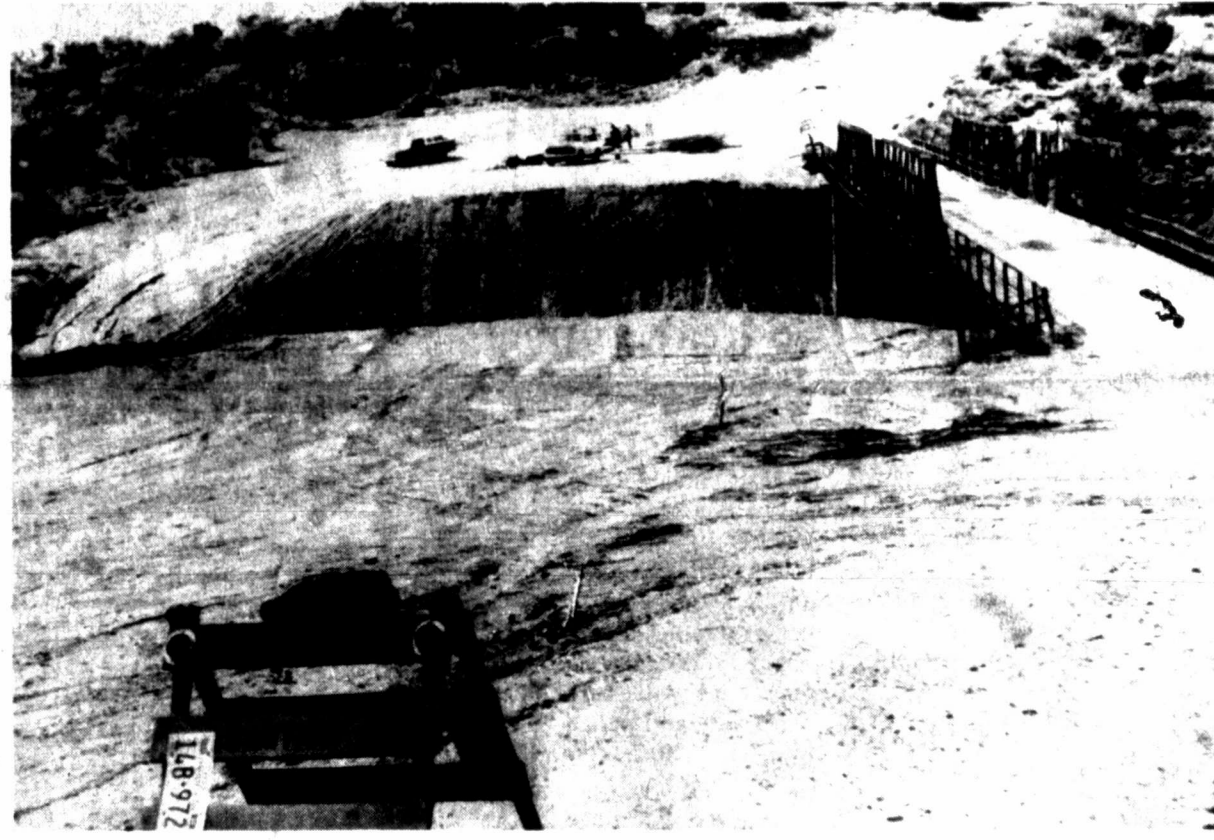
The other two bridges have already been demolished and construction is underway on the new ones. The new bridges will be 100 feet long with 28 feet wide and will have the same load capacity as the Cedar Bend bridge, said Pct. 2 Commissioner Johnny Shackelford.

The old iron bridges, one-lane

Commodity distribution is scheduled

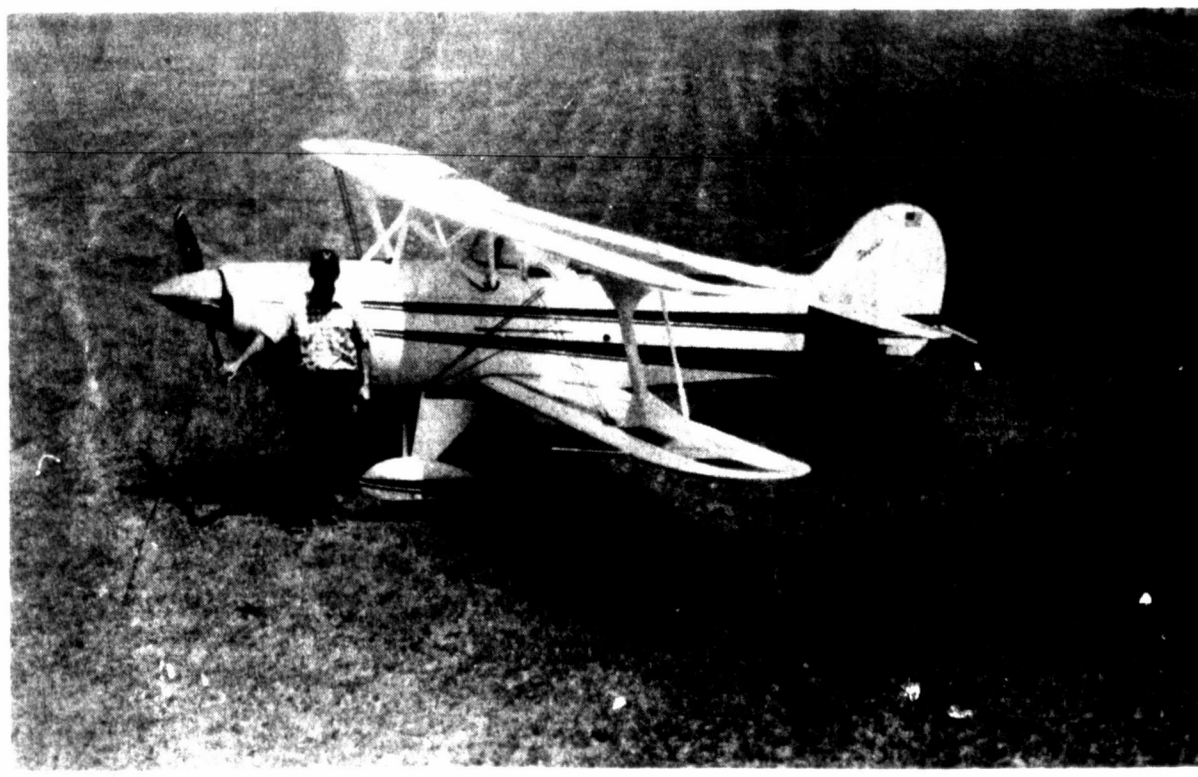
Commodities of pork, butter, honey and flour will be distributed Wednesday and Thursday here, according to Bertie Kidd, coordinator.

Fly-in to feature aerobatics

One of the highlights of this year's July 4th Fly-in will be aerobatic demonstration by Scotty Jergenson of Cheney, Kan.

Jergenson, son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Dave Hutchins of Colorado City, will be performing stunts in a 260 horsepower Skybolt and he built himself. The plane has been flight tested for aerobatics and utilizes fully inverted fuel and oil systems.

"My primary goal is not monetary, but to inspire folks, especially young people, about the world of aerobatics and aviation," said Jergenson. "The local airshow played a big part in my

Former resident becomes internationally acclaimed artist

Bill Worrell's latest exhibit, "The Lower Pecos River Revisited" at the Blue Moon Gallery in Houston, has opened to rave reviews.

The former Colorado City resident is the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Worrell.

The exhibit consists of bronze wall hangings and free standing sculptures, clay pots, paintings and his sterling silver jewelry. The opening of his exhibit benefited the Houston Symphony and was inspired by

his recent trip down the lower Pecos River.

He journeyed from Western Texas to Mexico and discovered art forms that would redirect his life's work.

"In the caves and along the 600-foot-high cliffs, I found splendid human and animal images, feathered shamans and shapes that today's contemporaries would label abstract," said Worrell. "I did not want to document the expressions of these ancient people; my intent is to represent

them." In paintings, bronzes and clay and sterling silver, Worrell, a professor of art at Houston Baptist University, expresses what he describes as a "lifelong love affair with the land."

Worrell describes himself as "an inventor, a writer, a photographer, a lyricist and a person who paints and sculpts."

Worrell is excited about his new relationship with Zapotec Art in Houston,

and his on-going relationship with Frank Howell Galleries and Contemporary Southwest Gallery in Santa Fe and in La Jolla, and in the J.B. Tollett Gallery in Austin. He also is represented in galleries across the nation and can be found in the private collections of Johnny Carson, Georgia O'Keefe and former Gov. Dolph Briscoe.

own motivation for a career in aviation."

Jergenson is currently a production test pilot for Learjet Corp. in Wichita, Kan., a position he has held for the past two years. Prior to that he worked for Cessna Aircraft Co. as an air safety investigator/analyst, an engineering test pilot and flight test engineer.

He holds a bachelor of science degree in aerospace engineering from the University of Texas at Austin.

He has a total flight time of over 4,000 hours.

He built the Skybolt from scratch over a 14-year period. A successful first flight was conducted on June 27, 1987.

The fly-in will be held at the municipal airport, an ex-military jet landing strip four miles northwest of Colorado City. During the morning, trophy presentations, aerobatics, parachute jumps and airplane rides are scheduled.

The traditional trophies will be awarded at 10 a.m. for the oldest pilot, youngest pilot, oldest airplane, most unusual airplane, and the pilot coming the longest distance.

Airplane rides will be offered again this year. The rides go over Lake Colorado City and come back over town, a flight of 15-20 minutes. They have \$5 for the last two years and will probably be the same this year. The rides are sponsored by Crime Stoppers of Mitchell County.

wide, were probably built in the 1930s, said Shackelford, adding that there are other county bridges that need replacing and hopefully the county will be able to participate in a similar program in the future.

"Actually, Mitchell County was about fifth on a priority list, but the other counties ahead of us didn't have the money to participate in the program," said Shackelford.

"Luckily, we had the money for our 20 percent share of the cost," he said.

Shackelford noted that the state is currently evaluating all county bridges over 20 feet in length and is requiring counties to post the weight limits for each bridge.

Last week's stormy weather reminds me of the time when I was either in junior high or high school and the tornado warning sounded one night while I was taking a bath.

My mother pounded on the bathroom door, yelling at me to get out the tub.

"A tornado is coming - we're going to the cellar!", she hollered as I quickly put on some clothes, which wasn't easy to do since I was dripping wet.

We didn't have a cellar, but our neighbors, Sybil and Buster Stevens did, and off we went. By the time we got to the cellar, most of the neighborhood was already there.

I didn't, and still don't, like the idea of going to a cellar to wait for a tornado that probably won't materialize anyway. My opinion of cellars is that they are dark and stuffy and only good for growing mushrooms and to breed spiders.

True, these days a trip to the storm cellar provides a rare chance to visit neighbors, but I would just as soon do that someplace more comfortable.

Until last week, I hadn't been in a storm cellar since school days. "I hear a roaring noise, let's go to the cellar," my wife exclaimed as an angry black cloud engulfed the town.

We had been listening to reports on the police scanner of wind damage and possible tornadoes, so I decided not to argue the point.

Off we went to a storm cellar a few blocks away. Our next-door neighbors were already there along with other people from the block where the cellar is located.

There were places to sit, but I chose to stand near the steps where some fresh air was filtering in from the door which was propped open a few inches by an old lawn sprinkler.

Those sitting in the dark, dungeon-like space were trying to keep cool by fanning with whatever they could find. A flashlight gave off an eerie glow in a corner.

I suppose there's something to the old adage that there's comfort in numbers, because my wife seemed to forget all the storm as she chatted away with those in the storm cellar.

Finally, the worst of the storm passed and apparently everyone had gotten their visiting done. It was time to go home.

My 12-year-old stepson had not been home when the storm struck. He was at his grandparents and they had not gone to a storm cellar. He was crushed at the thought of having missed out on such an adventure.

"But, it was hot and dark and uncomfortable in that cellar," I told him. "Why would you want to go to a storm cellar?"

"I just do. My friends were there," he said. Jeffrey is at the age, and for that matter has been since I've known him, that friends seem to be more important than breathing.

That storm cloud finally passed over and the next afternoon, the scanner was full of reports again about possible tornadoes.

Jeffrey pleaded to go to the cellar. The next-door neighbors had already left.

We gave in and went to the cellar which was still hot and dark. I opted to go back to the car and listen to the radio for storm warnings. Janet and Jeffrey stayed in the cellar. Before long, Jeffrey was out of the cellar and standing in the carport where a some of us had gathered. "It's hot down there," he says. I rest my case.

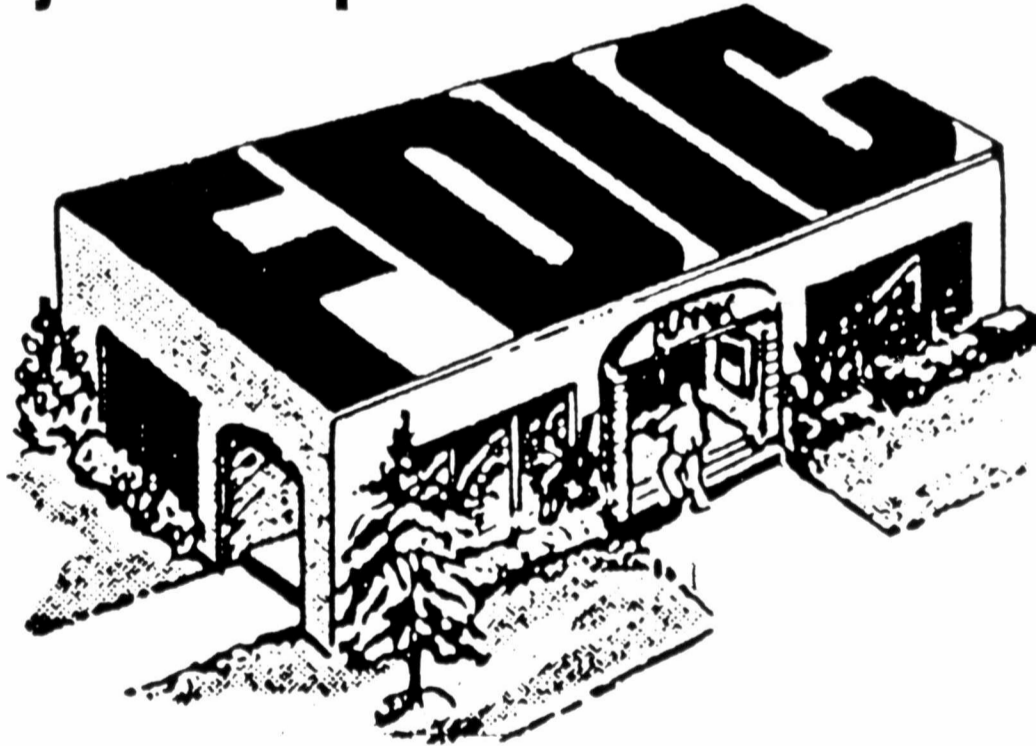

County Oil and Gas Report

Taking over from Hexagon Oil and Gas as operator, Ernest Closuit Jr. of Fort Worth is preparing to conduct a re-entry operation at a dry hole location in Mitchell County, about eight miles west of Westbrook.

The well in question is known as the No. 2 Halbert. It was drilled to total depth of 3,100 feet in the autumn of 1988 with no commercial shows indicated. The new operator intends to seek production in the Clear Fork Formation at a depth of about 2,900 feet.

Kohler Energy Inc. of Wichita Falls has given up on its efforts to make a producer out of a Mitchell County wildcat located about 10 miles northwest of Westbrook. Designated as the No. 2 Wheeler-Kohler, the well was spudded on April 29 of this year and probed to a dry bottom at 8,300 feet. It

will be plugged and abandoned.

Chevron U.S.A. has called in a completion rig at the No. 5006 North Westbrook Unit in the Westbrook Field, Mitchell County, five miles north of the Westbrook townsite. The well was spudded on March 30 and was taken to total depth of 3,205 feet. No details have been made available regarding production prospects.

Chevron U.S.A. is testing for potential at the No. 5210 North Westbrook Unit in the Westbrook Field. Spudded on March 11, the well has been drilled to total depth of 3,231 feet, with plug-back to 3,188. It has been perforated for possible production at a depth of about 3,050 feet. Drillsite is about miles north of Westbrook.
