NEW SCHOOL TO BE READY SOON

WORKERS OF NEW SCHOOL AHEAD OF SCHEDULE; WILL COMPLETE FOR OPENING OF SCHOOL

Carpenters, plasterers and painters are now busy putting the finishing touches to Perryton's new school building so that it will be ready for occupancy in September. Contractor Moss is ahead of schedule and says that it is as though nothing can now stop the building from being all

ready. The plastering has been completed. Carpenters are now doing the finishing work with painters following them. It is seen that the building cannot be finished, then it will be made to get sufficient rooms completed so that no inconvenience will result.

The new building, which is being erected at a cost of \$65,000, will be the Perryton community's first and best school plant on the plains. Not only have the best buildings, but the Perryton ranks as one of the best in point of affiliated credits of work of all schools in Texas, being ahead of towns much larger than Perryton.

MAN SEES BETTER TIMES

CHICAGO GRAIN OPERATOR PREDICTS BETTER TIMES AHEAD FOR WHEAT FARMER

Following by Fred Uhlmann, Uhlmann Grain Co., of Chicago, of the shrewdest men in business, who has been in the wheat business for the past two years, Uhlmann says that the wheat advance wheat prices 2 1/2 cents and created a better feeling among wheat farmers.

Uhlmann, manager of Goffe Bros., Inc., through whose agency the Uhlmann statement is being made, says:

"It is a long time ahead we are looking to get off the wheat at these levels. We do not mean wheat will today or tomorrow, or perhaps next week or next month. No, we mean the immediate future. It was the long view which taken when we assumed a large acreage in the market. The increased acreages would be a bull side uncomfortable. We think adjustment will be made. This year's winter wheat crop is 42 million acres. We think it is likely a reduction due to low prices might be 10 to 15 million acres, leaving 27 million acres. The average winter wheat crop of 1930 was 33 million acres and reduced the standard to about 34 million acres. The average yield is about 18 bushels per acre or 510 million bushels. 744 million this year. There are any such prospects in February or March that we get much excited at prices. We expect a decrease of 15 per cent in the price of wheat. There, no doubt, would be an amount to a uniform decrease of 350 million bushels compared with the average acreages were highest. We are aware that probably this year's poor crop but it will be smaller and will probably have larger reduced acreage.

year and the foreign situation ought to be pretty well cleared up by that time."

SOME INFLATED REPORTS COST OF HIGHWAY BONDS

During the past few days some wild reports have been going around as to the actual cost of the road bonds, even if the state gasoline tax did not take care of same. The plan proposed is to sell sufficient bonds to build the highways. This figure is set at \$400,000 to play safe, although engineers state that the cost for the county's share will probably not exceed \$350,000. If these bonds, say \$400,000, are issued to run for thirty years, interest only payable for the first five years, then the cost to the taxpayers for interest alone will be \$20,000 per year at five per cent. The assessed valuation of the county is almost \$7,000,000 and at this valuation a levy of 28¢ on the \$100.00 valuation will pay the interest of \$20,000.

Now land for county and state taxes in Ochiltree county is assessed at from \$2.00 to \$10.00 an acre. This means that a section of land will pay from less than \$4.00 to a maximum of a little over \$18.00 to carry the interest alone. Then at the end of five years, if the state has not taken over the bonds, what will the cost be? One-twenty-fifth or \$16,000 in principal, will be payable each year, making a total due of \$36,000 on the sixth year. To pay this, based on present valuations, it would take a fifty cent levy, making the cost run from \$6.40 to \$32.00 per section. This would get less each year as the amount of principal was reduced.

We are not asking you to accept these figures as correct. Go to the records of the county and figure it out for yourself. The above calculations are all based on the assumption that the state would never take over the highway situation and relieve the counties of all payments on bonds used on state highways, and retiring same with the gasoline tax, as is now being done in nearly every state in the United States. The Texas legislature would have provided for this at the last session if it had not been for the efforts of several disgruntled and defeated candidates who had fought the highway program of Governor Sterling.

Take Larger Packages

Increase in Size and Weight of Parcel Post Packages Announced By Local Office

Increase of size and weight of parcel post packages accepted for delivery throughout the U. S. and its possessions has been announced from the Perryton post office.

Formerly, a package that measured not to exceed 84 inches in length and girth combined and weighed not more than 49 pounds could be accepted for delivery in the eighth zone. Now the weight has been moved up to 70 pounds with a length plus girth dimension of 100 inches for parcels. Packages weighing up to fifty pounds and with a total dimension of 85 inches will be accepted to any zone.

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GIVE WHEAT TO WELFARE BOARD

LIONS CLUB PROVIDES FUNDS FOR CIRCULARIZING ENTIRE COMMUNITY IN CHARITY APPEAL

Letters have been mailed this week to every citizen of the Perryton community asking for donations of wheat to the central charity fund. This movement has the endorsement of every civic organization in the city and a committee consisting of W. B. LaMaster, B. B. Kent and A. J. Kelly has been appointed to receive the wheat, also to investigate the actual needs of all charity cases.

Arrangements have been made so that wheat for charity purposes can be left with any elevator in the county. Take a receipt for same and send or bring the receipt to any member of the above committee, so that a record can be made of same.

The wheat for charity movement was first started by the Veterans of Foreign Wars, then taken up by the Perryton Lions Club. This latter organization provided the funds for the printing and mailing of the letters, outlining the plan and asking for donations.

Farmers who have wheat are being solicited and those who do not have wheat of their own are asked to purchase the same and deliver to the committee. H. W. Ragan, living one mile south of Perryton was the first donor. Mr. Ragan hauled in a load of over eighty bushels, several days ago. The Ochiltree County Herald is giving all wheat received on their "Trade Wheat at a Dollar a Bushel for Subscription" campaign. At the present time, over 400 bushels is available from this source with the certainty that over 500 bushels will come in before the offer closes Saturday, August 15, at 6.00 p. m.

Plane Burns Sunday

Spartan Biplane Ground Loops While Taking Off and Burns; None Injured

A new Spartan biplane, the property of the Spartan Aircraft Corporation of Tulsa, Okla., ground looped while taking off from this city for Amarillo early Sunday morning, causing a short in the wiring which later ignited the plane. It was a three passenger open job.

H. E. Abbott, the pilot, with Jay Thomas of this city as a passenger, were uninjured. While attempting to take off, the plane nosed up in the bar pit on the highway just south of town. While Mr. Abbott and Thomas were gone to a nearby house to get a rope with which to tow the plane back to its anchoring place, it caught fire, presumably from a short circuit and was soon a mass of flames, totally destroying the ship. It was covered by insurance.

HOOKE FIGHTS FOR LOWER GAS

NEIGHBORING TOWN IS NOT SATISFIED WITH VOLUNTARY REDUCTION BY UTILITIES CO.

At the meeting of the city dads Monday evening, action was taken to file a petition before the State Corporation Commission of Oklahoma, regarding the gas rates.

The voluntary reduction which the Cimarron Utilities recently put into effect only affect about 10 per cent of the gas users, and the board holds that practically no reduction was made as far as the domestic consumer is concerned.

While on the face of the rates, it shows a reduction from 100,000 cubic feet to 25,000 cubic feet, for a minimum charge of 60¢ per, and the city contends this will benefit no one except the public schools, a few of the business houses and possibly the restaurants.

For this reason the board instructed the city attorney, Orlando F. Sweet, to prepare petitions to be presented to the State Corporation commission, in the hopes that a readjustment in rates may be granted.—Hooker Advance.

FREE TERRACING DEMONSTRATION

EXTENSION SERVICE SPONSORING THREE DAY DEMONSTRATION ON AUGUST 26TH-27TH-28TH

County Agent Guy R. Sheets announces that arrangements have been completed with the extension department of the state agricultural college for a three day terracing demonstration and school in this county on August 26-27-28. Three different locations have been chosen, including rolling land, level plains land, and a lake, thus giving all conditions of farming to be found in this area.

On the first day a demonstration of rolling land terracing will be held on the A. E. Devers farm located nine miles east of Perryton, three miles south of Huntoon and three and one-half miles west and three miles south of Booker. On the second day, August 27, the demonstration will be on level land on the farm of L. R. Conner, located just north of the railroad at Farnsworth. Lake terracing will be on the last day program at the farms of Ed Grever and W. A. Fuller, three miles south and one and one-half miles west of Waka.

These demonstrations will be under the direction of M. R. Bentley, extension agricultural engineer from A. & M. College, and A. K. Short, of the soil conservation and terracing department of the Federal Land Bank. These gentlemen will lecture on soil and moisture conservation at the courthouse in Perryton on Thursday, August 27, at 8:00 p. m. Everybody is welcome and urged to attend the demonstrations and the lecture.

Presiding Elder Here

Rev. Ed R. Wallace, Presiding Elder of Perryton Methodist District Moves

Rev. Ed R. Wallace, presiding elder for the Methodist church of the Northwest Texas Conference, and wife, left Friday for their new home which is now located at Perryton, Texas.

According to Rev. Wallace, the Panhandle of Oklahoma and Texas being such a vast territory with a wide scattering of churches over this section of the conference, it was voted in and became a part of the Northwest Texas Conference at their last meeting, and the presiding elder's parsonage was erected at Perryton, Texas, which will become headquarters for the presiding elder of this district.

For years Hooker has been the central point of Methodist activities in the Panhandle section of the country. They leave a nice parsonage in this city which we understand will be sold in the near future.

In the meantime, Rev. N. A. Phillips, former pastor, will occupy these quarters until other arrangements have been made by the Northwest Conference, which will probably take place this fall.—Hooker Advance.

MANY FROM SOUTH HALF COUNTY PROTEST BONDS

A well organized effort brought out a large crowd of citizens, practically all of whom were from the south half of the county, on last Monday to a protest meeting against the sale of the highway bonds, which were voted almost two years ago by an overwhelming two-thirds majority for the construction of pavement of Highways 4 and 117. Meetings were held, both morning and afternoon at the courthouse, J. L. Redus presiding as chairman. One of the points stressed very much at these meetings was that in the election many people were influenced to cast their vote for the bonds by misrepresentation of the issue. For the benefit of the citizens and taxpayers of the entire county we are publishing the actual vote in this election.

Since spokesmen for the protest from the south half of the county have been so insistent in their talk of the people being influenced by misrepresentation, we wish to offer the following analysis of the vote to show just how few votes from the south side of the county were possibly influenced. The total vote of the seven precincts on the south side, including Alfalfa, Halfway, Taz, Crowe, Mears, Cedar Bluff and Black, was 5 for the bonds and 127 against the bonds, and of the five that voted for the bonds, we have been informed that one of these five was voted by mistake by a voter who was a bitter opponent of the bond issue. That brings the total in the entire south half of the county down to four who could possibly have been influenced in any way in voting for the bond issue. There are two sides to every question but it appears to us that opponents of the bonds from the south half of the county certainly do not have any misrepresentation argument to present.

HIGHWAY QUESTION UNDECIDED

COMMISSIONERS COURT WILL PROBABLY MEET LATTER PART OF WEEK TO MAKE DECISION

The Commissioners Court of this county recessed late Monday evening after an all day session given over almost entirely to discussion of the matter of issuing sufficient bonds of the \$700,000 issue for the purpose of proceeding with the paving of Highways No. 117 and No. 4 through the county.

Much of the time was taken up with hearing protests from delegations composed principally of citizens from the south half of the county, some of whom were opposed to the issue from the start, others used as their argument for protest against the sale of bonds, the matter of location.

As to the location, practically the entire citizenship of Perryton and county favors a routing of No. 4 just as far south as possible before turning southeast toward Canadian. This is a matter that has been in dispute with the state and federal authorities for many months and local road enthusiasts still have hopes of getting the south route even though state officials have made what is supposed to be a final decision.

It is thought that the Commissioners will meet the latter part of the week to make a final decision in regard to the sale of the bonds.

POTTORFF GETS JAIL BREAKERS

BERT MERIDITH SAWED OUT OF STINETT JAIL IS CAPTURED AT OMAHA

Bill Colson alias Bert Meridith will be back in jail in Stinnett this week end after a two weeks vacation, because of the activities of W. J. Pottorff, chief of the Ochiltree county bureau criminal identification, and this time he will have his wife for company.

Meridith with Lloyd Williams, sawed their way to freedom on the night of July 30. Mrs. Meridith is thought to have aided in the jail break by taking saws to the jail. Sheriff Jim Crane, Hutchinson county, called Officer Pottorff who had taken their fingerprints to put out circulars for them offering a reward of \$25.00 each. Officer Pottorff fingerprints all prisoners in the Stinnett jail as well as at Borger and it was through his office and his ability as a criminal investigator that they were apprehended.

Mr. and Mrs. Meridith were picked up at Omaha, Neb., on Monday of this week and Pottorff was immediately notified. Sheriff Crane passed through Perryton on Tuesday on his way to Omaha to return with the two prisoners. Williams is still at large.

Meridith is indicted by the grand jury of Hutchinson county for forgery, while Williams was charged with hi-jacking.

Here is Meridith's record obtained from Washington, D. C.:

As Bert Meridith, No. 5243, arrested in Oklahoma City, Okla., sheriff's office February 21, 1929, charge investigation.

As Bert Meridith, No. 6184, arrested Oklahoma City, Okla., police department, December 3, 1929, charge obtaining money under false pretenses, turned to Cleveland county.

As Bert Meridith arrested Stinnett, sheriff office, charge forgery, waiting trial, escaped jail by sawing out.

As Bert Meridith, arrested police department, Omaha, Neb., held for W. J. Pottorff, Perryton. Pottorff turned him over to Sheriff Jim Crane, Stinnett.

It is wondered by a large majority of the people of Perryton and vicinity just why the City Council and Commissioners Court cannot see the necessity of this bureau of criminal identification established by Officer Pottorff and give it the necessary support. It is a certainty that this department will be badly needed here in the near future.

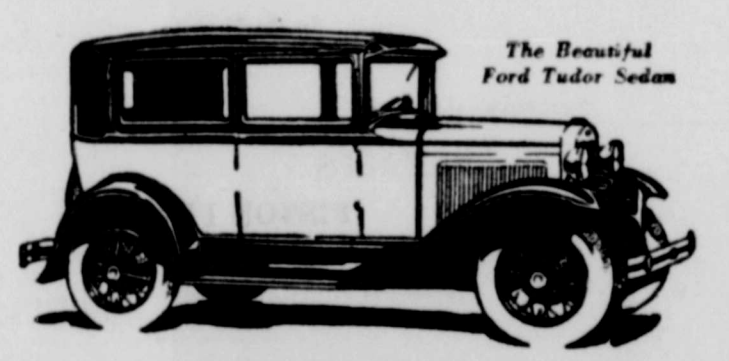

A TEST FOR CLEAN SAND

You can't make good-quality concrete with sand that is not clean. This is an important item often overlooked, particularly on the farm where the sand is used as it comes from a shallow local pit in which there may be roots and some top soil. Sand containing much dirt, shale, or other foreign matter is undesirable for concrete. Vegetable or animal material that may be present in sand which looks clean prevents proper setting of the concrete, and the surface may scale and wear away if used as a floor or walk. The U. S. Department of Agriculture suggests a simple test for organic impurities in sand. It is reliable enough for practical purposes on the farm. Stir one heaping teaspoon of lye (labeled at least 94 per cent sodium hydroxide) into a

half pint of water in a pint mason jar of clear glass. Pour in a half pint of sand, cover, shake vigorously, and let settle. Twenty-four hours later examine the color of the water. Water that is clear or no darker than apple-cider vinegar shows that the sand is free of organic impurities; if the water is as dark as ordinary coffee, the sand is unsuitable for concrete unless washed. Remember that a liquid such as vinegar or coffee, viewed in a fruit jar, may appear several shades lighter than as ordinarily seen in a cup. It is well therefore to fill one jar with vinegar and one with coffee for making the color comparison.

My Experiences in the World War

By General John J. Pershing

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CHAPTER XXXVIII—Continued.
Lord Milner arose, much incensed at M. Clemenceau's statement, which he considered quite unjust.

"M. Clemenceau has intimated," he asserted, "that there was something mysterious about the London agreement. I believe that an explanation is necessary. He appears to believe that the agreement was signed in a reversal of the supreme war council's decision. I know only of a joint note embodying the recommendations of the military representatives, but it is of no value without the approval of the governments."

"Besides, M. Clemenceau seems to be under the impression that half of the American troops were to go to France and the other half

fighting and has suffered heavy losses. All available drafts have been sent to France and we shall send all who are available in May and June. This would be the case even if all the Americans who arrive in Europe during these months should be assigned to the British army."

"At present certain British divisions have been so severely handicapped that they cannot be reconstituted. General Foch will remember the number."

"Yes, ten," Foch answered.

"As we cannot again put them in line," Mr. Lloyd George continued, "they must be replaced by new units. The Germans are now fighting with the object of using up our effective. If they can do this without exhausting their own re-

sources of July or the middle of August. So we have the whole month of May ahead before deciding whether an emergency is likely to arise in June. I have explained to Lord Milner and General Foch why I do not wish to commit the American army so long in advance. If need be, I shall recommend the extension in June. I can see no reason for it now."

CHAPTER XXXIX

"I am commander in chief of the allied armies in France," said General Foch, "and my appointment has been sanctioned by the signature not only of the British and French governments but also by the President of the United States. Hence, I believe myself in a position to insist."

"There is a program signed by Lord Milner and General Pershing at London. I asked to be made a party of this arrangement, since America has given me the strategic direction of the war, or else I have no reason for holding the position."

"So I asked that an agreement be made this evening among Lord Milner, General Pershing and myself, extending to June what has been decided on for May."

"I cannot forget the responsibilities weighing on me, because of the fact that the allied governments have entrusted to me the direction of operations in France."

no authority to dictate regarding such matters had been conferred upon him and his remarks only showed that the allies were ready to go to almost any length to carry their point."

Clemenceau Makes Plea

Premier Clemenceau then said he agreed with General Foch and favored an American army, but that the Germans were at Villers-Bretonneux, and if the lines were broken there the enemy might quickly arrive under the walls of Paris, and liaison between the allied armies might have to be established on the Loire, or if the lines were pierced at Hazebrouck the enemy could reach the sea.

"What is important for the morale of our soldiers," he said, "is not to tell them that American soldiers are arriving but to show them that they have arrived."

In my opinion the plan proposed was entirely unsound, and I thought that the best and quickest way to help the allies would be to build up an American army. Moreover, the implied presumption that the council might dictate to us either as a council or through the allied commander in chief in the arbitrary manner indicated set me more firmly than ever against American units serving in allied armies. The day's discussion made it quite clear that both allies intended to get commitment to the proposed schedule as far into the future as possible.

Saw Pershing Opposing Wilson
A telegram sent by the British secretary of state for foreign affairs April 8, 1918, to Lord Reading, British ambassador at Washington, said:

"It is evident from the brief account of the conversation that General Pershing's views are absolutely inconsistent with the broad policy which we believe the President has accepted. The main difference, of course, is that we interpret it as meaning that 480,000 infantry and machine guns are to be brigaded with French and British troops in the course of four months. General Pershing admits no such obligation and does not conceal the fact that he disapproves of the policy."

"A second and minor difference in that, while the British government quite agrees as to the propriety of ultimately withdrawing American troops brigaded with the French and British so as to form an American army, they do not think this process could or ought to be attempted until the end of the season for active operations this year draws to its close, say, in October or November."

"I am unwilling to embarrass the President, who has shown such a firm grasp of the situation, with criticisms of his officers. But the difference of opinion is so funda-

mental and touches so nearly the issues of the whole war that we are bound to have the matter cleared up."

At M. Clemenceau's suggestion the meeting of the council was adjourned at this point that Foch, Lord Milner and I might meet and examine the question and see if some agreement could not be reached. Whereupon we repaired to an adjoining room and went over the whole subject again.

In the next installment General Pershing tells of final agreement on shipping and allotment of American troops.

to England. I do not recollect any such decision. All that General Pershing and I have urged is that infantry and machine gunners should be sent to France. We had no intention of depriving France of any American troops. I do not know that anything has been said regarding their allotment on arrival in France. We simply wanted to hasten their coming."

Pershing Upholds Independence

"In making the agreement with Lord Milner," I interposed, "I had in mind bringing troops as rapidly as possible to meet the existing situation. Lord Milner is quite correct in stating that there was no agreement as to the allocation of American troops either to the British or French armies. There is no agreement between my government and anybody else that a single American soldier shall be sent to either the British or French."

"There is in existence an agreement between Mr. Lloyd George and myself that six divisions should be brought to France. M. Clemenceau will remember that I spoke to him about going to London to arrange for the shipment of American troops to France and that he approved because it would expedite their arrival. I also spoke to General Petain about it."

Clemenceau is Insistent
M. Clemenceau remembered my speaking of it, but disregarding his previous approval continued his objections, saying:

"We have been informed that nothing had been decided on at Versailles, but something has been decided on at London, and France was closely connected in this. It was decided that six divisions should go to the British. Well, I will not argue about that. You announce to us artillery for the month of June."

"Where four are in alliance, two of them cannot act independently. Nothing has been provided for France in June."

"The appointment of General Foch as commander in chief is not a mere decoration. This post involves grave responsibilities; he must meet the present situation; he must provide for the future."

"I accept what has been done for May, but I want to know what is intended for June."

M. Clemenceau said the French had not received certain specialists they had asked for, and also quoted from the conversation I had held with General Foch with reference to sending over troops in May and June."

Mr. Lloyd George then said:

"I am of M. Clemenceau's opinion. The interests of the allies are identical; we must not lose sight of that, otherwise the unity of command has no meaning. We must consider what is best for the common cause."

"What is the situation today? The British army has had heavy

losses. They will some time deal us a blow which we shall not be able to parry."

"In the meantime, I suggest that the decision for the allotment of the American troops for June be taken up when that month arrives. In May, in fact, either of our two armies may be hard pressed. That is the one which should be reinforced. It is not desirable now to decide how troops arriving in June should be allotted."

Foch Also Cites France's Need

To this, Foch replied: "It is undeniable that the British army is now exhausted; so let it receive immediate re-enforcement in May. But lately the French have had grave losses, notably at Montdidier, and both during the last few days have been fighting shoulder to shoulder. So American aid is now needed almost as much for France as for Great Britain. Above this question of aid to the French or to the British is aid to the allies."

"We are agreed that the American army is to re-enforce the British army at once, in June we, too, shall need infantry and machine gun units. So let us make the agreement for June at once by saying: the same shipment of infantry and machine guns as for May. If there is tonnage available we shall devote it, after that, to the elements necessary for filling up the American divisions. I am sure that General Pershing, with his generosity and his breadth of view, will grant the fairness of this view and will extend for June the agreement decided upon for May."

Whereupon Mr. Lloyd George gave support to the principle, saying that British recruits would not be available until August and he understood it was the same for France, when both would be able to furnish their own recruits. He then asked that the May program be extended over June, in which M. Clemenceau agreed.

Pershing Acts on Own Army

In reply, I said:

"I don't suppose that we are to understand that the American army is to be entirely at the disposal of the French and British commands."

M. Clemenceau said that of course this was not the intention.

Continuing, I said:

"Speaking for my government and myself, I must insist upon our intention to have our army. The principle of unity of command must prevail in our army. It must be complete under its own command. I should like to have a date fixed when this will be realized. I should like to make it clear that all American troops are not to be with the British, as there are five divisions with the French now and there will be two more in a short time."

"As to the extension of the May agreement to June I am not prepared to accept it. The troops arriving in June will not be available for the front before the end

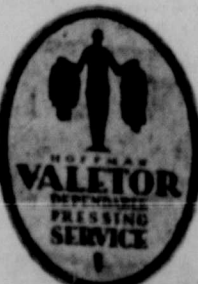
