B. C. D. Directors Consider Details Of Permanent Site

Temporary Landing Place Is Already Being Arranged; Benson Leaves for Dallas to Meet U. S. Man.

COMMITTEE APPOINTED ON BOND ISSUE WORK

Highway Work Leading In to City Holds Attention Of Board Also; Committee Appointed In Work.

A municipal airport for the city of Lubbock assumed definite proportions last night in a meeting of the Board of City Development in the city hall during which time the members, bled themselves mostly with the disposition of travel facilities by land and air into the city. Benson leaves for Dallas to meet U. S. Man.

George E. Benson, chairman of the aviation committee of the board, before leaving for Dallas where he will confer with the inspector of the Department of Commerce, the department of the federal government governing aviation, regarding the establishment of the field here, made a report on the work done. It was found that a temporary landing field had already been secured north of the city and that arrangements were under way for putting it in condition for a field.

Reach Settlement In Wage Squabble

Differences Between Western Railroads and Workmen Smoothed Out; Terms Not Announced.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—Differences between Western railroads and employees organized in the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen and the Order of Railroad Conductors are expected to be reconciled by an agreement announced here today by the United States Board of Mediation, discussing questions of issue with representatives of both groups since July 22.

The proposed settlement, details of which cannot yet be made public under the law, must be ratified by the general committee on behalf of the Railway employees before it goes into effect. A. P. Whitney, president of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, will present it to the association at a meeting in the midwest in the near future. He signed it for his organization, and E. P. Corbin, signed as president of the conductors.

70,000 Men Affected. Wages and working rules were major questions involved in the dispute, which affected 70,000 employees of 50 railroads covering 50 per cent of the mileage west of Chicago. Proposals of the employees for pay increases ranging from 10 to 18 per cent brought an offer by the railroads for increases averaging 7-1-2 per cent, providing certain working rules be abandoned. While accepting the wage compromise, employees had declined to drop the working rules.

JOIN IN SEARCH Greater Rockford Fliers Are Still Missing

COPENHAGEN, Denmark, Aug. 28.—(AP)—Reindeer hunters have joined parties searching the interior of Greenland for Bert Russell and Parker Crumer, Rockford-to-Sioux fliers, it was learned today. The hunters will search in the remote mountain regions and explore the shore cliffs for traces of the airmen.

SUITS SETTLED

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 28.—(AP)—A cash settlement out of court of three suits demanding \$1,467,500 damages from Charles H. Christie, film producer, by Alice Murrell, screen actress, was announced today by attorneys for both sides. Miss Murrell had charged Christie with breach of promise to marry, seduction and breach of contract to employ.

It was a gentleman's agreement, and the amount of details Murrell and will not be revealed, declared Miss Murrell's attorney.

Smith Waiting To Begin Active Work On Campaign Talks

Three Itineraries Being Planned for Demo Leader; Governor Is Anxious To Start Work.

(By Associated Press) NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—As he shapes his plans for his Presidential campaign, Gov. Smith is keeping in mind a big lesson—that it is better to be prepared than to be surprised.

It is this conviction, coupled with desire to cover as much ground as possible without dissipating his strength and voice, makes it difficult for the Democratic nominee to determine just where he should go and how many speeches he should deliver.

Raskob, chairman of the National Committee, said here today. Raskob and others were here for conference with state leaders from eight midwestern states.

The budget of the National Democratic Committee, Raskob said, calls for \$4,000,000 to be raised and spent during the Presidential campaign. This is an increase of \$1,500,000 over the budget announced in New York July 28.

LAKE CLAIMS BOY

Wealthy Chicago Couples
Afloat 11 Hours in Water

CHICAGO, Aug. 28. (AP)—Two couples, children of wealthy parents, were rescued today from a capsized boat in Lake Michigan after being afloat for 11 hours last night. Then one of them, a sophomore of Cornell University, slipped to death in an effort to save the others.

Later one of the girls started to swim for shore, three miles away. She swam for an hour, in circles, and coast guards rescued her, blue with cold, blind from the sun, and delirious. In turn they rescued the remaining couple.

The boy who drowned was Fred Rummel, 21, son of Eugene A. Rummel, patent attorney. His companions, said he died to save them. The girl who tried to swim ashore is Marjorie Prince Olson, 17, daughter of John P. Olson, vice-president of the First National Bank of Chicago.

The other couple was Shirley Conlee, 18, daughter of George P. Conlee, a broker, and Harold Tarrant, 20, son of J. H. Tarrant, meat dealer.

Reginald Baker, Republican National Committeewoman from New Jersey, declared the women of that state would vote for Hoover because of their confidence that the Republican party would continue a protective tariff which provides a higher standard of living for their families.

Rep. Louis T. McFadden, Pennsylvania, said that state would be organized more thoroughly than ever before and that it would cast the heaviest Republican vote in its history.

Curtis Promises Farm Problem Solution

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Aug. 28. (AP)—Promising early solution of the agricultural problem, Senator Curtis today called for election of Herbert Hoover, and of a Republican congress "to assure adequate tariff revision."

He spoke at the New York State Fair. It was Home and Farm Bureau day and farmers and their families seemed to predominate the crowd.

Robinson Prepares Campaign Tour Talks

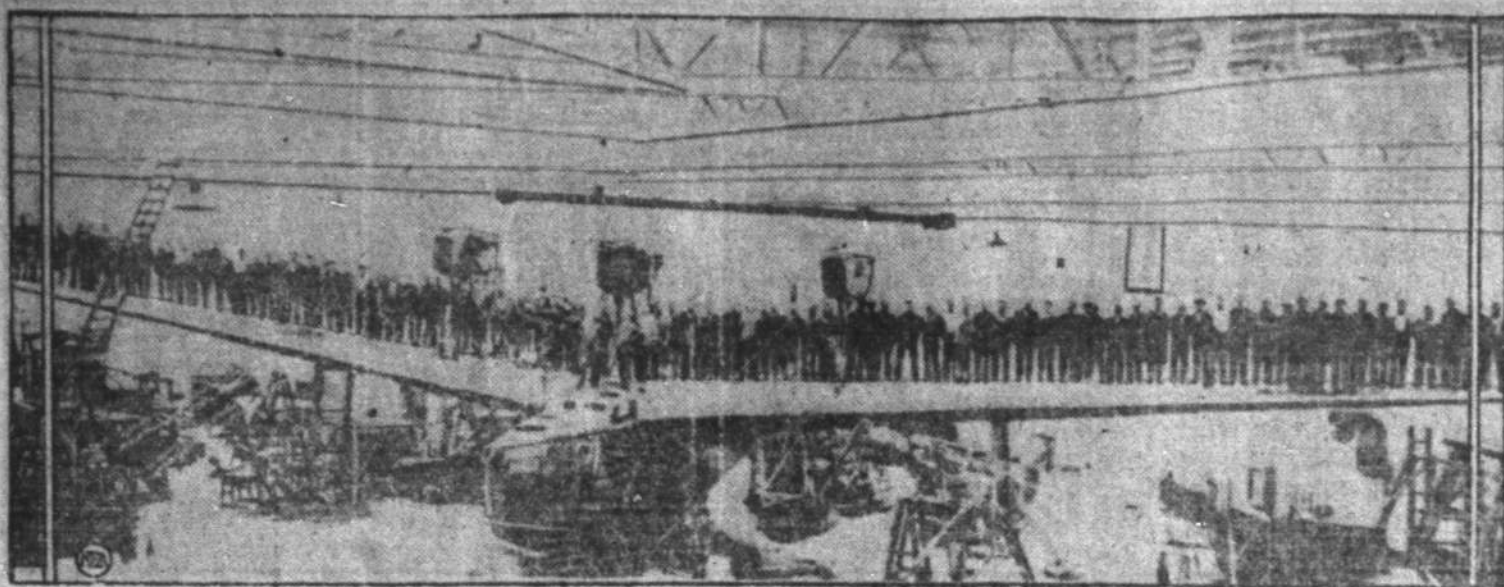

TO BE INSTRUCTED

Texas Democrats To Receive Anti-Smith Dope

DALLAS, Aug. 28. (AP)—Anti-Smith democrats in Texas will vote for the full republican ticket of presidential electors, an announcement from republican headquarters here today said. The statement quoted Alvin Moody, Houston, leader of the anti-Smith movement in the democratic party, as saying no attempt would be made to divide the anti-Smith democratic vote so as to intersperse democratic electors among those supported by the anti-Smith wing of the party.

One million sample ballots will be printed by the anti-Smith organization showing voters how to cast their ballot for Hoover and Curtis, and at the same time vote for the remainder of the democratic ticket. These ballots, and schools of instruction which will be held for voters, are designed to prevent disqualification of anti-Smith democratic ballots because of improper marking.

"Then he told me he'd heard it from Palmer himself. Well, after that it was easy to get the rest. And I don't see where you get off to talk to other people about despoiling them."

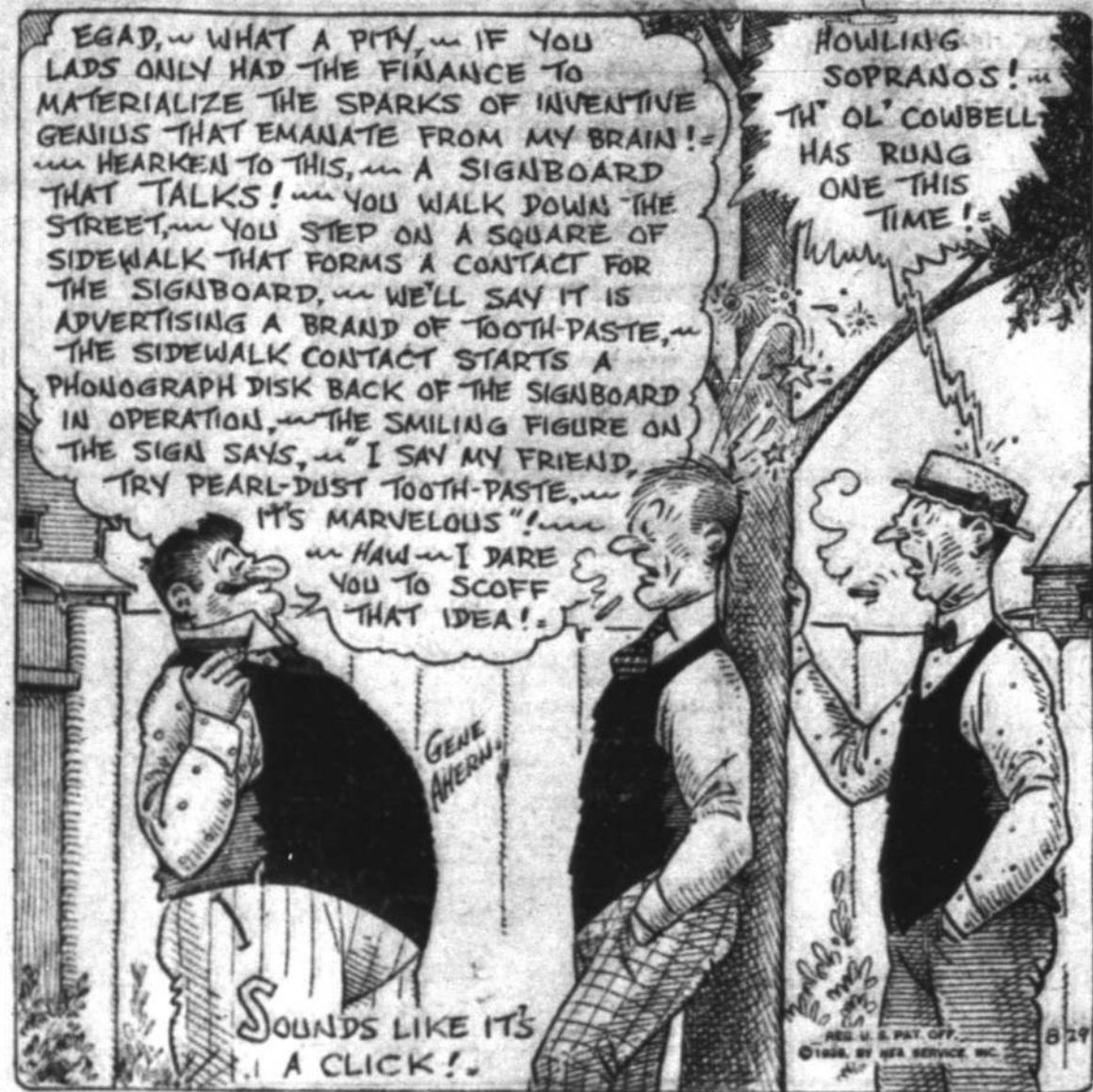

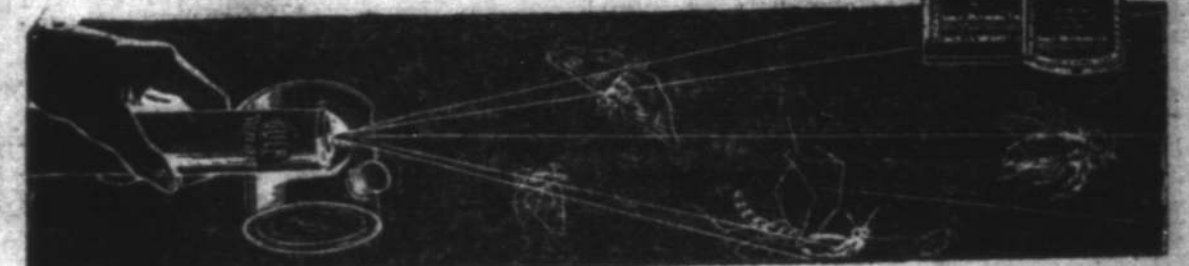

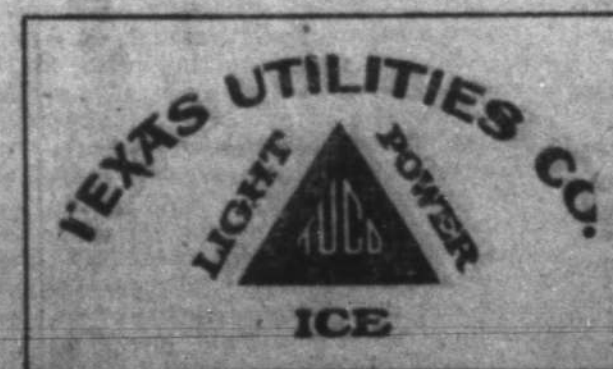
