Construction On Highway 82

Texas Highway Department has announced a new highway construction project in Red River County. The project on U. S. Highway No. 82, will begin at the Bowie County line and extends west 4.5 miles, including the City of Avery. The Texas Highway Department and the contractor, McKnight Construction Co. of Commerce, stated that the construction will begin on or about June 3, 1963 and will be completed by Sept. 14, 1963.

L. D. Cabaniss, District Engineer of the Texas Highway Department in the Clarksville area, stated that traffic will be routed through the construction on this project, but pointed out that adequate barricades and warning signals will be prominently displayed, and flagmen will direct traffic where necessary, but motorists should be extremely cautious in passing through the project, as it will be heavily traveled by large highway construction equipment. The entire length of the construction areas will be patrolled to minimize the inconvenience to motorists. Cooperation of the public is requested in obeying all traffic signals, warning signs and flagmen.

Austin.—Rumors concerning a special session continue to bounce around the Capitol.

Most persistent rumor is that Gov. John B. Connally will "line-item" veto the appropriations bill, which he contends "short-changes" higher education. Then call a special session in the fall.

In a "line-item" veto he would strike out items he considers unnecessary. Then try to convince Legislators that the money should go to higher education instead.

Some lawmakers think they will be called back in September. Others pick October. Those who predict a fall session believe they again will have to tackle the subject of congressional redistricting. They didn't agree to a solution in the regular session.

SPEAKER SATISFIED—House Speaker Byron Tunnell of Tyler thinks a summer session is possible.

Tunnell said he is making no vacation plans until he is certain he won't be called on to preside over the House in late June or July.

But the Speaker stated he was well satisfied with the budget passed by the Legislature. He said, "They apparently did what they thought was right, and I for one will stand behind them."

"The 58th Legislature met its challenge and did its work," Tunnell said proudly.

There were many times during the 58th session when the Speaker and the House seemed at odds. But when the session ended most House members agreed that Tunnell had been a good referee.

INSTANT RAILROAD COMMISSIONER—Many nice things have been said about Jim C. Langdon since Governor Connally appointed him to the Railroad Commission to replace Bill Murray. One thing for sure, he adapts to changes easily.

In two short hours, Langdon resigned as chief justice of the El Paso Court of Civil Appeals; withdrew from the race for the State Supreme Court place which Judge Frank Culver of Fort Worth is expected to leave; was sworn in as Railroad Commissioner; announced as a candidate

for re-election in 1964; and went right to work.

Then he and Commissioner Ben Ramsey made the announcement the oil and gas industry was waiting for—a 28 per cent allowable for June.

GOVERNORS' CHOICE—Langdon's appointment was the third he has received during three administrations.

Gov. Allan Shivers appointed him 112th District Judge in 1954. He was elected to that bench twice. Then Gov. Price Daniel appointed him Chief Justice of the El Paso Court in 1959. This post he resigned to accept Governor Connally's appointment.

BILLS VERSUS LAWS—A quick tabulation of the results of five months of labor by the 181 members of the 58th Legislature reveals that only about 31 per cent of the bills passed both House and Senate, to become law.

A total of 1,723 bills were introduced. Of these, 543 were passed to law. Most of the weeding-out was done by committees. They reported as favorable only 786 bills as compared with 906 in 1961.

SUPREME COURT BACKS COMMISSION—State Supreme Court upheld the Railroad Commission's right to authorize an operator in a particular oil field to conduct a survey of another operator's well to determine if it were illegally slanted.

Case at bar was L&G Oil Company (headed by H. G. Lewis Jr. of Kilgore) versus the Railroad Commission et al.

L&G charged that a Railroad Commission order permitting Tidewater Oil Company to authorize Sperry-Sun Surveying Company to run a slant-hole survey on an L&G well in the East Texas field was illegal.

The 12th District Court in Austin had supported the Railroad Commission's order.

But while the Supreme Court affirmed the right to give the order, it said it was improperly worded and sent the case back to the trial court.

Two members of the high court—Associate Justices Meade F. Griffin and Joe Greenhill—dis-

"To allow a citizen or corporation—a potential foe in litigation—to go upon and take notice of another's property without even so much as an opportunity to be heard, is a clear violation of the due process clause of the Texas and Federal constitutions," they stated.

DATE MIX-UP—On or about August 1, Secretary of State Crawford Martin has to start publishing amendments to the constitution that will be up for a vote in a special election on Saturday, November 9.

Martin checked out the first three amendments scheduled for the ballot: One to decide whether to abolish the poll tax; one asking whether to extend the Veterans' Land Program and increase bonds; and one asking voters whether the state should increase from \$54,000,000 to \$60,000,000 state funds that can be spent each year on federal-state assistance for old folks, children, the blind and disabled.

Then he came to a fourth—a proposed amendment to authorize a retirement and benefit program for Jefferson County drainage district employees. One clause referred to a November 9, 1963, election. Another set the election for November, 1964.

Martin couldn't decide which date was right, so he referred the matter to Attorney General Waggoner Carr.

HIGHWAY CONTRACTS RECORD SET—A \$5,200,000 contract for construction of a 12-mile stretch of Interstate Highway 20 in Kaufman County broke all records for the State Highway Department.

Contract was one of 64, representing \$33,000,000 worth of road improvements, let by the State Highway Commission on May 27.

UNEMPLOYMENT DOWN—Economic pictures drawn by state agencies this week began to look like "Texas Brags."

Texas Employment Commission also had a glowing report. It announced that the number of job-seekers dropped from 191,000 in March to 171,000 in April. Number of employed was 3,543,100—56,100 more than the March figure.

Telephone Toll Rate Changes

Reduced long distance telephone rates for most station-to-station calls between 9 p. m. and 4:30 a. m. within Texas will be introduced by Southwestern States Telephone June 15, D. T. Strickland, vice president and general manager of the Company announced.

The new rates for a three-minute call will be scaled on a mileage basis beginning with station calls to points of a distance of 83 miles or greater. Reductions of up to 50 cents on the longest calls within Texas will result from the new schedule, Strickland pointed out.

Along with this reduction there will be a slight increase in most person-to-person calls within the state. This will amount to five cents on the basic person-to-person rates on most day and evening calls, the telephone official added.

Most other telephone companies in Texas will introduce similar rate changes the same date Strickland said.

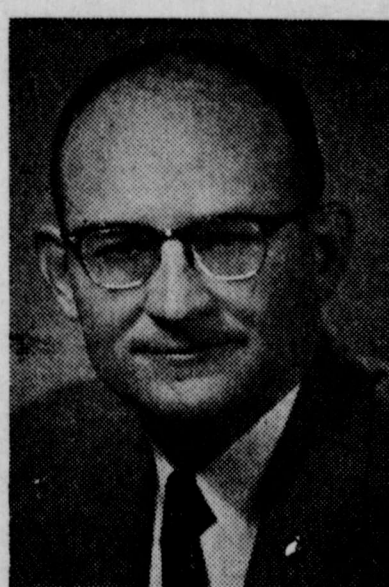
