Rural Schools To Get Federal Relief Aid

Miss Pauline Bulsterbaum, county superintendent has received the following letter from Mr. Pat Bullock, Director Division Rural Aid. The letter is self explanatory:

"A representative of the Federal Government was here Tuesday. He stated very definitely that Federal aid will be granted schools having to close early on the basis of not to exceed \$15 per teacher per week. Janitors and bus drivers may be included in the Federal Relief program. He stated that the program will be handled entirely through the state and county relief office and that the state relief office would send applications and instructions to each county relief office the latter part of the week. The length of term will be based on the longest term the school applying has maintained since 1929."

Pat Bullock, Director Division of Rural Aid.
Miss Bulsterbaum states that the schools having to close early due to the lack of funds and eligible for emergency aid should apply at county superintendent's office at the earliest possible date.

Surfacing Contract To Be Let On No. 9

According to information received in Lamesa today, the contract for a triple asphalt surface on Highway No. 9 from Lamesa to the Lynn county line will be let April 30th.

This is the first contract for paving of Dawson county highways, and we are hoping that before the work is stopped that all highways in the county will be paved. This will be approximately 17 miles of highway.

April 15th Last Day For Cotton Sign-Up

Cotton Contracts

Producers who intend to sign cotton reduction contracts should do so not later than Monday, April 15, as that is the last date that contracts will be made out in his office.

There still seems to be some confusion in regard to the land owner tenant question as to division of the rental and parity benefits that are to go to each party. There has been no change from the regulations of last year, in that Managing Share Tenants are to receive one half of the rentals and land owners are to receive one half, while the parity payments are to be three-fourths to the tenant and one fourth to the land owner. That is according to regulations. Any other division will be contrary to the regulations.

Harvesting Wheat

There is a rumor that the producers who have wheat planted will get to harvest and sell the wheat grown this year. We have no official information as to that effect as yet.

The county committee is at present working on the cotton contracts and will continue to work on them until they are completed and ready to send to the state board for review.

Corn-Hog Program

In a meeting Saturday practically all the old corn-hog committeemen were re-elected to serve this coming year. Mr. Hill of the State Corn-Hog Review Board stated that this county's contracts last year were in as good condition as any in the State and much better than average. This of course is due to the fine work of the Corn-Hog committee and to the secretary-treasurer of the county.

Home Economics Style Show To Be Staged April 19th

The annual style revue of the Home Economics department of the local high school is to be April 19 in Baldwin's window, as last year. The high school orchestra under the direction of Conway King will furnish the music.

There will be ninety-five girls modeling dresses and approximately 22 children. The first year class girls are making appropriate school costumes; second year, tailored street dresses of silk, linen, and woolen materials. Each girl is to select the proper accessories to go with her dress. The Home Economics 3B girls are constructing special occasion costumes, including afternoon, dinner, and evening gowns, suitable for the high school girl.

On April 18 the local contest for selecting three students to represent Lamesa in the Home-Making Educational Rally which is in Corpus Christi on April 25-27, will be held.

Monday, April 15, Is Deadline on Dog Tags

Beginning next Monday, April 15, the City Commission will order all dogs killed that are not tagged.

Notice was given by the City Commission last week that dogs must not run loose without tags. Still complaints are coming to the City officials that dogs are loose over town.

For all dogs without tags delivered to the City Pound at the City Hall beginning Monday the 15th, the City will pay 10 cents per head.

A wholesale dog slaughtering will start Monday the 15th, so it behooves all dog owners if they desire them not to be killed to get the official City Tag by this date.

LAMESA WINS SIXTH STRAIGHT DISTRICT TITLE

A creditable record was made last week end by local high school contestants in the 1935 Interscholastic League meet at Lubbock.

Over forty contestants represented the local schools in literary and athletic events. Around 1200 students from 16 counties participated in the meet. Out of this great number Lamesa was fortunate in placing about twenty pupils. That is about one out of every two that qualified in the County Meet placed in competition. The following pupils placed in events listed:

One-act play contest won by Lamesa team composed of Elizabeth Arnett, Vanabel Clark, Bettye Burgess, Richard Collins, Dwight Morris. Miss Arnett won the individual score as best actress with Miss Burgess a close second. This team won second place in the district last year and is to be congratulated upon its second year of first class performance. The team was coached by Mrs. Stephens and Miss Merrick.

Tennis doubles team composed of Braswell Gilbert and Cecil Roberts won second in the tournament. These boys have another year to go and should be strong contestants next year.

The typing team composed of Delmar Sears, Betty Bratcher and Harold Williams won second in the meet. This team was coached by Miss Barnes.

The track and field team coached by A. G. Bearden carried off the track meet for the second consecutive year, giving Lamesa its second successive grand slam in major sports in the district, an outstanding record in Texas. This was the sixth consecutive district championship for Lamesa. Jack Hughes was high point man of the team and of the meet. Jack won the discus throw, the javelin throw and second in the shot. Other members of the team that won points were Kirk McKinnon, Eugene Boswell, Clovis Nolen, Buck Hilburn, Willie Huddleston. Hughes set a new district record in the discus.

The girls debate team coached by Dan Ogletree and composed of Elaine Hightower and Laurie Dell Davis won their first two matches to reach the semi-finals of the tournament and tying for third place.

Several of the events are not finished yet and final results will not be known until next week. However, Lamesa is proud of the wonderful spirit shown by her boys and girls and hope they will always profit by the lesson of experience gained in good, clean competition.

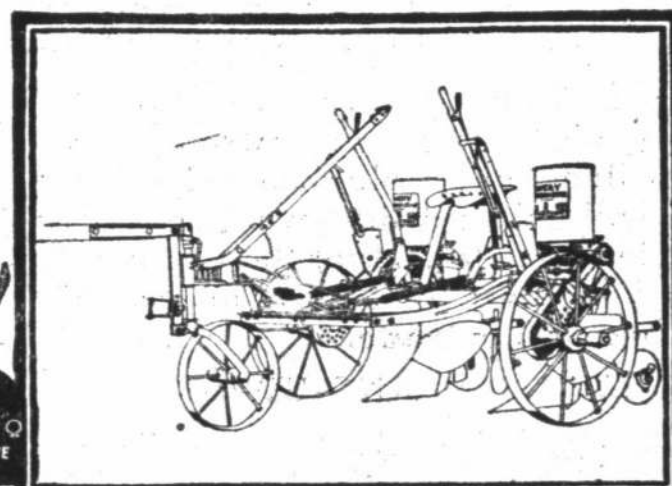

Drilling Resumed On T-Bar Test

Tahoka, April 6. —Drilling in the Wanette-Hart Oil company test on the T-Bar ranch, ten miles southwest of Tahoka, was resumed at 7 p. m. Friday. Depth was 4,313 feet.

Shutdown had been ordered so the bit could be changed following drilling through the anhydrite formation. The test known as the Cass O. Edwards No. 1 is in the big lime, and the porous lime is believed likely to be encountered at about 4,500 feet. The tests log shows that the formation is running from 230 to 250 feet higher than an old wildcat test on the T-Bar ranch about five miles to the east and also a test to the west in Terry county.

The test is being drilled by E. B. Germany, Dallas driller. A large block of acreage estimated at 50,000 acres was formed.

Money for Wells May Be Borrowed From F. H. A.

Congressman George Mahon was advised today that it would be possible for farmers to secure loans under Title 1 of the Federal Housing Act for the purpose of putting down irrigation wells on their farms. This interpretation was made by the Legal department of the Federal Housing Administration after Mr. Mahon had called on them in regard to the irrigation problem.

The Act provides that the Federal Housing Administration may insure loans made by local bankers to home owners for the purpose of making improvements up to \$2,000. A farmer may apply to his local banker for funds to put down a well and provide the equipment. If this loan is made in accordance with the regulations of the Act, it will be insured by the Federal Housing Administration, according to the information received.

Of course, the local banks would be the judges of the soundness and desirability of this type loan. The future policy of the Federal Housing Administration can not be predicted with certainty.

from 5 to 7 inches off the ground, and when grown in mass the plants will form a mat that in full bloom will give the soil the appearance of having a carpet of flowers. Because of the ability of the plant to form a compact growth and produce a wealth of flowers over a long period the verberna is frequently used as a bedding plant where carpet bedding effects are desired. The length of stem and the texture of the flower are such that the verberna is of value for bouquets and table decorations. It can be used with good effect for beds borders, mounds and window boxes.

While the verberna grows readily from cuttings and from layers of seedling plants are more vigorous and as a rule produce better flowers. For the earliest bloom sow the seeds now, soaking them a few hours in tepid water and sow in seed boxes filled with light rich soil; cover one-fourth of an inch deep, press down firmly, and water sparingly. When weather permits choose a bright sunny situation in which to place them. Make the soil rich and compact rather than light, but in all cases provide good drainage. Set the young plants 10 to 15 inches apart each way and give good cultivation until they cover the ground. With such treatment the verberna should give continuous bloom from early summer until killed by the frost.

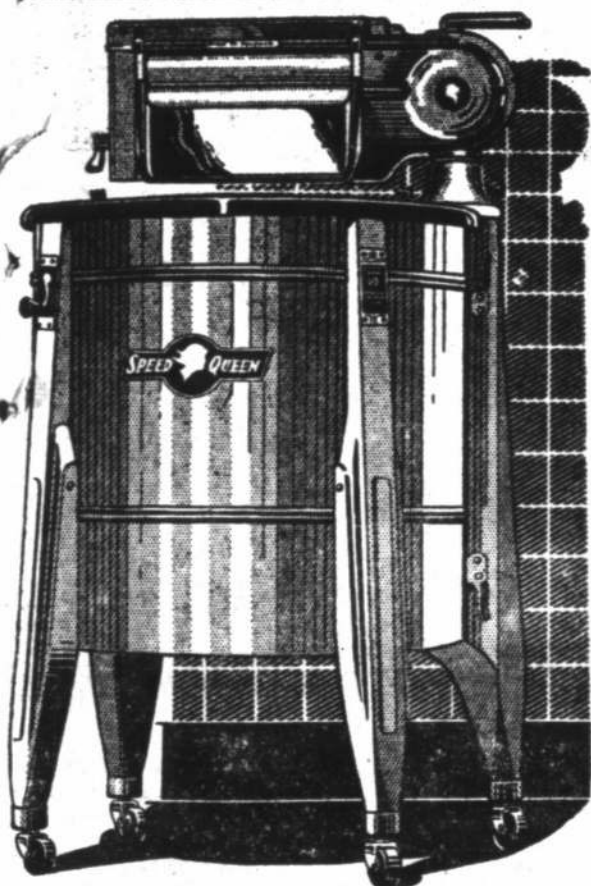

SHUMAKE H. D. CLUB MET MARCH 13TH

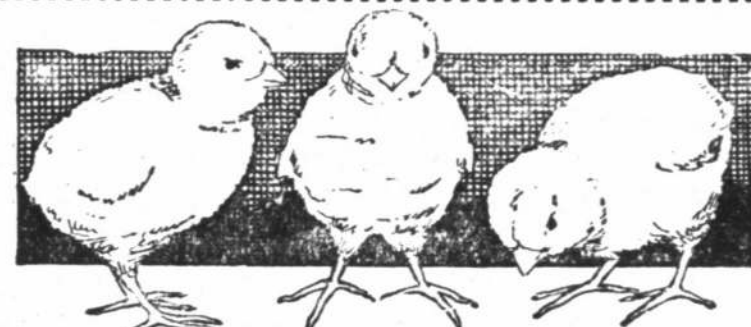

Washington Digest

National Topics Interpreted
by William Bruckart
National Press Building
Washington, D. C.

Washington. — President Roosevelt has submitted to congress a list of the legislation he deems necessary to have passed before the present session adjourns. He has divided it into two categories—"must" and desirable. If congress enacts only the list of "must" legislation and passes over the other group of bills which the President considers desirable, it is made to appear that the membership of the house and senate is due to suffer some of the torrid temperature and the uncomfortable humidity of a Washington summer. The President said he must have legislation extending the National Recovery administration, providing social security, eliminating public utility holding companies, increasing the loaning power of the Home Owners Loan corporation, extension of the so-called nuisance taxes which expire by limitation of law on June 30, and revision of the banking laws.

In addition, the President made known that he would like to have enacted legislation to take the profits out of war, whatever that may mean. He previously had sent a message asking enactment of a law providing for expansion of the American merchant marine through the use of ship subsidies, and he also desires to have enacted legislation setting up machinery for the settlement of labor disputes. This legislation is in the congressional hopper in the form of a bill by Senator Wagner, of New York.

The President would like to have amendments to the agricultural adjustment act in order to eliminate some of the weaknesses which the AAA people admit exist. The airmail contract situation is another matter with which Mr. Roosevelt has been concerned.

Seasoned observers recognize that this list of "must" legislation, not to mention the desired legislation, is sufficient to keep congress grinding away far into the summer. They recognize likewise that if the desired legislation later becomes of such concern that the President wants to place it on the preferred list as well, the membership of congress must be prepared to forego summer trips of any kind.

Since a good many members of congress have grown tired of being called rubber stamps for the administration, they naturally have turned attention to legislation which they think will be helpful to their own bailiwicks, to themselves personally or from a

party standpoint. Thus there have been promoted numerous pieces of legislation for which some individuals, at least, entertain greater fervor than they do for measures that were drafted by President Roosevelt's official family and transmitted to congress as administration legislation. It is the general observation that an individual, representative, or senator frequently will go much further in fighting for legislation that is his own brain child than for legislation placed before him on a silver platter such as administration proposals have been. Consequently, individual or group measures are constantly cluttering up house and senate legislative calendars. This is a factor meaning delay for administration bills.

It is to be remembered, as has been reported in these columns, that Mr. Roosevelt is unable to ward off criticism of some of his proposals. Indeed, there have been Democratic criticisms and Democratic opposition to a greater or lesser degree to all of the legislation he has proposed since congress convened last January. All of which is by way of saying that congress faces weeks of committee work and floor debate despite the fact that the house Democratic leaders still retain rather solid control of a sufficient majority in the lower house of congress to drive through any pet measures for the administration. In the senate the situation is decidedly different.

Included in the legislation being fostered by individual members is the bill that would permit cabinet officers to appear on the floors of congress for questioning and explanation, such as occurs under the British and French parliamentary systems. The administration does not want this bill. It will have to exert some pressure to avoid passage. The reason is that the Roosevelt administration is no longer one in which the cabinet is dominant. Cabinet officers are only part of the scheme, and if congress wanted to inquire about the handling of relief money, which it probably will desire, it must talk with Administrator Hopkins. Mr. Hopkins is not in the cabinet. The same is true of NRA and to some extent to the AAA, although Secretary Wallace of the Department of Agriculture theoretically is a superior officer to Administrator Davis. The administrator is definitely opposed to the passage of bonus legislation for the former soldiers, sailors and marines and it looks like a Presidential veto will be necessary there. The same is true of inflationary proposals of which there are many. The situation is one,

therefore, in which Mr. Roosevelt must be constantly on his guard to prevent action which he does not want as well as being fortified at all times with pressure to put through the legislation he has described as necessary. Thus it is seen he is confronted with many complications which did not disturb him in the first two sessions of New Deal congresses and these complications mean a longer life for the current session.

Let us examine the status of the legislation which the President said must be passed. The outlook is something like this:

Some "Must" Legislation
The extension of the National Recovery administration is still far off. Senate hearings are just ended and the house is still further behind. No action can be expected in either body for several weeks. The present law expires June 16.

Recently Mr. Roosevelt sent to congress a very bitter message denouncing public utility holding companies and demanding legislation eliminating them from our economic structure. The house committee considering this legislation is just winding up its hearings and the senate committee which will have jurisdiction has taken no action at all. It must be said that a hard fight is in prospect if and when this legislation reaches the stage of debate because investors in these companies are not going to have their equities destroyed while they sit idly by. These investors are doing more now than just making faces at congress and the volume of letters which members are receiving in opposition to the holding companies legislation transcends anything that ever has happened in the memory of this correspondent.

The banking legislation which Mr. Roosevelt has proposed, or which was proposed for him by Governor Eccles, the New Deal and radical governor of the federal reserve board is faced with opposition equally as bitter and as well organized as that confronting the holding companies bill. Perhaps it can be said that opposition to the banking legislation is even stronger because in that fight the President will be opposed by Senator Carter Glass of Virginia, who must be regarded as the most virulent of all the Democrats in the senate. The house banking committee has about done its job with hearings on this bill but the senate committee where the full force of the Glass opposition will be felt has not even set a date for committee consideration.

The social security bill about which Mr. Roosevelt has done much talking, because it is distinctly a reform measure, has finally been redrafted in the house while senate leadership is unable to get together on any policy respecting it. Some senators want to split up this bill and pass the section providing for old age pensions, allowing the other parts of the bill to die a slow death.

The legislation to increase by \$1,750,000,000 the loaning power of the Home Owners Loan corporation probably will get through the senate without much more ado. The house passed the bill because it could not do otherwise with individual members realizing that there was a chance that some of this money would go into their particular districts. Included in this bill is a line that promises a good many hundred jobs for politicians and it is natural that the party in power is not going to overlook this possibility.

There remains on the "must" list, then, only the proposal to extend the nuisance taxes which expire at the end of June. It is probable that the bulk of these levies will be accepted by congress as necessary.

One cannot fail, in tramping around Washington these days, to note the frequent expressions concerning the outlook for the New Deal and for President Roosevelt's personal political future. In fact, some hardboiled servers lately have been heard to say that Mr. Roosevelt is suffering from too much ballyhoo. He was put up on a pedestal that made of him in the eyes of many persons something of a superman. He himself is regarded as having contributed to this condition by his many campaign promises, some of which he has found absolutely impractical as remedies in leading the country out of the morasses and on to a more satisfactory economic plain. In truth, the President's own political colleagues have continued to depict him as an individual capable of things which no human can accomplish and this combination of circumstances is declared by many keen minded persons as likely to bring, if indeed it has not already brought, a definitely bad political reaction from the President's standpoint.

It is still fresh in the minds of men and women throughout the country, how President Hoover was over-advised as a superior person in an administrative way. Mr. Hoover suffered from too much ballyhoo to an extent

greater than any other man who has served as President with the possible exception of Woodrow Wilson. When the depression came and the current turned against Mr. Hoover he was utterly powerless. With a recalcitrant congress on his hands and a dissatisfied people, Mr. Hoover met the fate that must have been expected.

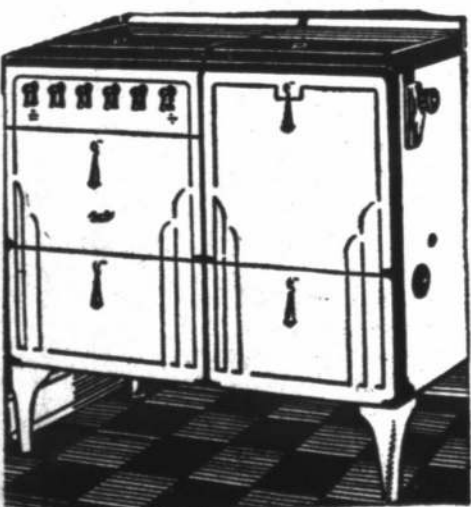

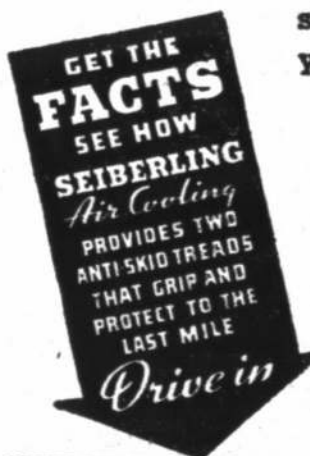
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THE MAN FROM YONDER

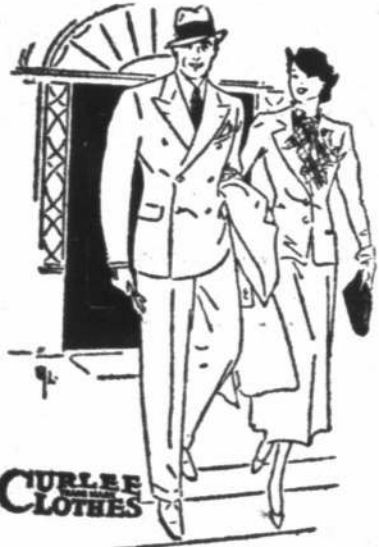

Order for the abandonment of the Ray Albaugh et al No. 1 John Robinson, Dawson county wildcat oil test in section 46, Block M, E. L. and R. R. Ry. survey, was issued Friday, and the hole is to be abandoned at 4,860 feet.

After drilling was resumed at 4,515 feet when further drilling was ordered after the first contract depth of 4,500 feet was reached, considerable trouble was reported. It was said that a string of tools was lost in the hole and that in searching for them a huge cave-in was found. As a result of this, drilling was stopped and the plugging ordered.

The test was running high in the Yates sand, it was reported. A considerable flurry of leasing was occasioned when Harper and Adams, Midland drillers, took over the operations at the insistence of some of the major companies. Ray Albaugh had drilled the test down to below 3,300 feet, on his own resources.
