MORE ANNOUNCEMENTS FOR CITY OFFICES

Interest in city election is picking up and the candidates are getting busy. This week we are authorized to announce the names of B. B. Kent for Mayor, Frank Caradine for City Marshal and G. C. Castleman for City Clerk. There are two aldermen to elect at this election, the terms of M. R. Coffee and J. L. Dodson expiring. Then the school election will be held next month. The terms of Mrs. H. C. Coffee, Miss Nellie Perry G. O. Brillhart and B. L. Barnes expire and successors to fill their places on the board must be selected.

In authorizing us to announce his name for City Clerk, G. C. Castleman asks us to tell the voters that he has had about seven years of clerical experience and feels that he is well qualified to capably and efficiently fill this office. The interesting feature of this death in the death house is the violent effort to resuscitate the man after he had strangled himself. The law said he must die, why not let him die?

What do the higher powers above think of the corpses that we send up from our gallows, electric chairs and lethal chambers? How much better does our civilization seem up there than that of the ancient Mexicans that ripped out the heart of a living human sacrifice, offering that as a welcome gift to their gods?

How do our gifts to the goddess of justice impress real justice? The French army has tested and approved a new stabilizing device for airplanes, without the use of a gyroscope. That means one step nearer to absolutely safe flying, safer than any mode of travel on land.

Ten to twenty years should see the end of long distance rail travel and of ocean surface travel. Wise real estate investors will make their plans with the flying machine in mind.

The British worry because the national eyesight grows weaker. One hundred and fifty in every 1,000 lack good sight at the age of twenty and ten at the age of four. The human eye, like the teeth, that nature gave us, is defective,

a poorly made instrument. Our teeth, cause suffering and death. Teeth better planned would not do that. Even our five-fingered hands, would have been much improved by adding one finger. With that extra finger we should use in arithmetic the superior duodecimal system, instead of the inferior decimal system, and we could play stringed instruments of a higher, more complicated kind.

Floyd Collin's suffering is over. This man's death illustrates the power and the weakness of human imagination. A hundred men risked their lives to save his. Doctors went to his rescue by flying machine, but could do nothing. The entire nation followed closely the tragic story.

Imagination showed the man lying in the low cave, his leg crushed by the 14,000-pound rock, existing day after day for nearly two weeks in horrible agony and discomfort.

It was possible to imagine clearly that dreadful situation. And the nation sympathized. Any legislature would gladly have voted \$100,000 to save Collins.

The same nation, through its legislatures, refuses to pass the Child Labor amendment that would free tens of thousands of children from years of slow torment.

The feeble public imagination cannot see clearly those children in the mills.

The Prince of Wales, whom Americans recently made very welcome, is interested in a plan to send British students to this country. That is common sense, as well as a pleasant compliment.

The Rhodes scholarship system, that now sends American boys to British universities, will be reversed in the new plan. The way to establish peace is to increase intelligence. When nations know each other, they will compete instead of fighting.

There is disappointment because the British Church can't find a way to make a saint of Florence Nightingale, and supply her with a halo. The answer to that is that Florence Nightingale is a saint already, and needs no halo.

When she went to Scutari, with her group of devoted nurses, to save from needless death the wounded men in the Crimea, sticking at her work, although prostrated with fever, she made herself a saint. Nothing that the Archbishop of Canterbury might do would make her saintliness more genuine than it is.

"Conditions have changed so radically during the last few decades that increasing outside interests, the lure of pleasure, the 'greed for gold' and the restless spirit of the age threaten to destroy the sanctity of home, that blessed institution, upon which depends the destiny of our Nation, and the future of our Civilization.

The life of many a man and woman, harassed with business anxieties and burdened with ceaseless cares, has been made steady and serene because of noble principles instilled in the atmosphere of a Christian home. If we fail to leave our children this heritage of faith, this stabilizing influence and moral impress, how can we expect them to stand when the storms of life beat hard upon them?

Since there is no time for deep and indelible impressions like the plastic years of childhood, the home presents a golden opportunity for molding life and shaping character. It is at Mother's knee that child forms its first conception of right and wrong, respect for the rights and property of others, reverence for authority and the inherent honesty and regard for truth that mean so much in later years.

Here, as the child grows older, should be taught the dignity of labor, the value of responsibility, the utility of obedience, the sublimity of service, and the necessity of industry and thrift.

In this period of unrest, the throbbing of life is so intense that we need, as never before, the poise and calm that only a well ordered home can give. Too many mothers, in an effort to attain social prestige and worldly honors, are forfeiting the sacred privilege of "home-making", than which there is no task more richly worth the while.

Far more numerous are the patient home-loving mothers who, burdened with many cares and "cumbered

with much serving," find little time for a quiet hour with the children. 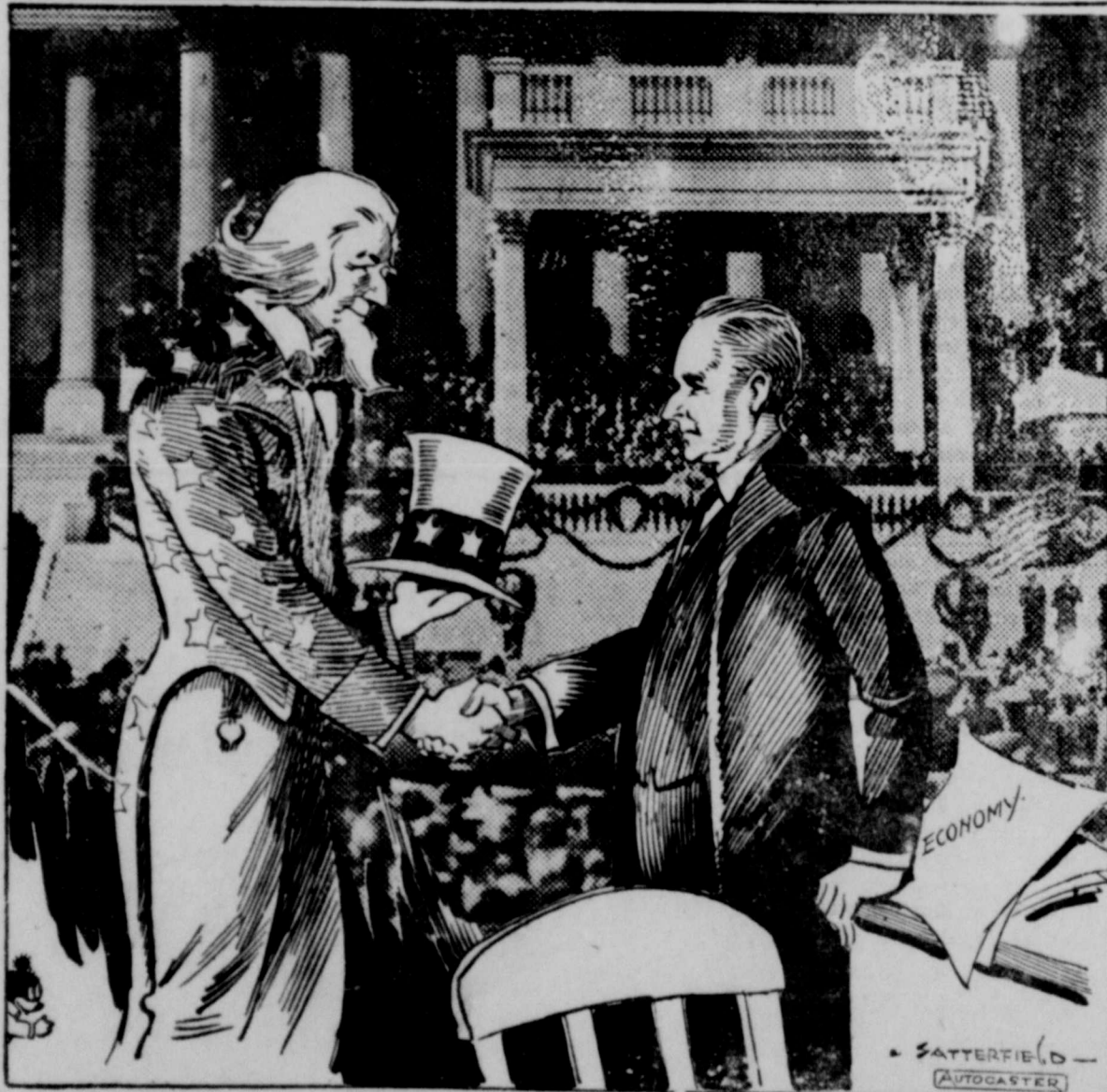

OUTLOOK FOR HOGS AND CATTLE

The market supply of hogs for 1925 will be relatively small compared with the past several years. The fellow that gets in the hog business now is the one that is going to make money. As a special inducement the Texas Swine-Breeders' Association is making preparations to award again this year gold, silver and bronze medals in the ten litter contest. In addition arrangements are being made to offer \$1000.00 cash to the winner who produces the heaviest litter in 150 days. Indexes point to a gain of 10 to 15 hog market by September. Ten litter men have made money the last two years on high feed and low market. Ten litter projects pay the farmer and advertise the value of his hogs on the farm.

The winning Litter of pigs last year was produced in the Panhandle of Texas not many miles from here. It is just as possible to produce the same results here, because many of the hogs in this section are as good as will be found in any other locality, so let's have a number of entries in this contest and show what we can do.

Litters farrowed between February 15th and May 15th are eligible if ear marked by the county agent with in ten days after farrowing.

There will be no nomination fee, so it will cost nothing but what you actually put into the pigs themselves, and if they are fed a balanced ration you will make a good profit at the same time have a chance at one of the various medals and also the grand prize of \$1000.00.

Full details and definite premiums will be announced later, but in the mean time if you have a good litter farrowed see the county agent with in the prescribed time and sign an enrollment application blank, and he will help you work out the proper rations to get the pigs started off right.

Hens, like other animals, require a certain amount of salt. In more than very limited amounts, however, salt is poisonous to poultry. A safe rule is to use one-half pound of salt to each hundred.

A pan full of dry warm oats poured into a boy's wet boots dries them out the best of any known method.

A pan of water on the radiator or register will give needed moisture in the air of the room during the winter.

The soil for most potted plants should be a good garden loam containing a little sand, a little well-rotted stable manure, a very little bone meal, and a little leaf mold.

In preparing macaroni, a hearty cold weather dish, all stickiness should be washed away by rinsing after cooking. Plenty of cheese, tomato, or meat sauce adds flavor to this dish.

Agricultural chemists throughout the country are finding that pure sunlight, without the interference of window glass, is an essential in making strong-bodied animals.

For best hatching results, a proper ratio between males and females should be maintained in the poultry flock. For Leghorns, the proper ratio is one male to 20 females. In the case of American or dual purpose breeds, one male to 12 or 15 females is about the right ratio.

A reduction of about 10 per cent over last year in the number of brood sows bred for farrowing this spring is reported by the United States Department of Agriculture. Last fall's pig crop is reported as about 24 per cent of last year.

Did you ever try feeding alfalfa to your brood sows? Experiments show that it is a great form of insurance for strong, healthy, spring litters.

Prolonged storage of potatoes at low temperature or repeated removal of sprouts reduces the vitality of the "spuds" for seed stock. Guard against these conditions if you want a good stand next summer.

Canned fruits—pineapple, pears, or peaches—are excellent in salads. Disappointing cracks in the tops of cakes may be caused by too hot an oven. The crust sets rapidly and must break when the cake rises.

Chicken need sunlight to prevent rickets.

Probably roup is the worst trouble maker in the poultry business. It is particularly prevalent when sudden changes in the weather begin. Remember that a bird must catch cold before she can take the roup. Her inherent vitality and the feeding and care which she received is going to prepare her to resist taking cold. Continued exercise in a deep dry litter will also help to keep up her circulation at night. A full crop of grain when she goes to roost is a further help.

Many colds are started by drafts or dampness. Houses should be wide so that it will be possible to keep some of the front open for ventilation without the birds feeling the wind on roost or floor. Inspect the rear and end walls closely for cracks every fall. It will pay as an insurance against trouble. Put in dropping boards below the roosts to cut off bottom drafts. Allow one square foot of light muslin on the front of the house to fifteen square feet of floor space. Do not crowd the birds. Allow three to four square feet of floor for each bird, depending upon the breed.

Mix up a barrel of water forty gallons) to a pound and a half of blue copperas and an ounce and a half of sulphuric acid. Do not put the sulphuric on the dry copperas, it will explode. Use this mixture for a head dip and dilute equal parts with water for a drink.—O. C. Krum.

CLEAN THE HEN HOUSE

A filthy hen house is not conducive to a healthy flock and a good winter egg production. Clean the house monthly putting in new straw eight or ten inches deep. Spray the house thoroughly each time with a sheep dip, with compound cresol or a mixture of kerosene and crank case drainings. This will keep mites and disease germs under control. Install a platform under the roosts to check bottom draughts and keep the droppings out of the litter in which the hens must feed. Keep the drinking vessel clean. Remove lice from the hens with an application of sodium fluoride obtainable at any drug store. Do not crowd the birds; allow four square feet of floor space for each bird.

Cow testing associations determine the production of every cow belonging to members of the association. They locate the good, the medium, and the poor cows which cannot be found in any other way. After the capacity of the cows is known, there is opportunity of increasing the production of the herd. The constant breeding of the best producing cows to a well selected bull should establish a herd of high producing dairy cows.

Cows under test receive better care and more concern is given to the subject of feeding. When there is nothing to prompt the dairy farmer to study the individuality of the cow, her needs are not watched as closely as when there is some object in giving her attention. The owner learns to know his cows as individuals, each one becomes a personality of interest.

Weighing the milk brings the attention of the milker to any abnormal decrease in milk flow. It is not uncommon for cows to shrink in the flow of milk unnoticed unless the attention of the farmer is called to the production of each animal. The scale does this.

Some cows are capable of giving large flows of milk at the beginning of their lactation periods and then fall off rapidly in their milk flow and produce rather low records. They loaf most of the year. On the other hand, there are the persistent milkers which never seem to give a very large flow of milk, but persist from nine to ten months a year and make very creditable records. They work most of the year.

Knowing what cows to select makes it possible to keep fewer cows and yet produce the same amount of milk and fat. The profit from such a herd is larger and the work less.

Keeping of records sets the farmer to thinking and leads him to consider his cows in a different light; it leads him to be a better dairyman. Everybody that comes in contact with cows under test is influenced, and all work to the advantage of the cows.

Then there is the personal satisfaction of knowing. It is more interesting to know what profit a herd of cows is giving than not to know, that is, if the dairy farmer is interested in dairy advancement.

By its actual demonstration of the money value of co-operation it puts down the dollar and builds around it a better community spirit. It brings neighbors closer together, and we need good neighbors in the country.

It opens the way for the co-operative buying of feeds, and the business is large enough so the officers study the feed market and discover the cheapest kind of grain and where to buy it.

It provides a check on the tests of the man to whom the milk is sold, and also discovers whether the separator is working properly.

It interests the young people on the farm. As one young man whose father was a breeder and owner of race horses said: "The interest in breeding and racing horses is mild compared with the interest in putting a record on a cow and seeing what I can make her do."

It aids in the selling of cows because it supplies a public record in place of a private record.

It not only discovers the poor cows, but it discovers the poor dairyman. It tests the cow, the man, and the methods, and the man by knowing these things can improve all three.

It sets up a community interest whereby members are induced to grow the proper feeds for their cows to work as a unit for the eradication of such diseases as the tuberculosis to make improvements in their barns.

SHANKS & KLAPP

A durable grinder on the stock farm effects economy. The extent of value depends on the price of grain. Farther worth of the process is in combining two or more kinds of food stuff including the various provenders—giving a tempting mixed ration known as "chopped feed." Corn, oats, barley, rye, kaffir, milo, maize and other grain go farther by a third or more when ground into the right proportion of the various kinds of hay, fodder, etc. The farmer saves the miller's charge by grinding at home and the time of hauling to and fro. The quality of all the "make-up" is better and understood, also. Springtime calls for the grinder as well as the autumn season. The brood sows and pigs require it. Dairy cows and the fattening cattle, as well as the work teams all need the prepared rations. The work may be done in odd spells of rainy weather. One should get a good grinder at once in the interest of better food conditions on the farm if not well supplied in this respect.

and in their cropping methods, and to do many other things that would not be done if there was not an association and a tester visiting this group of farmers one day a month.—Hoar's Dairyman.

Nineteen twenty-three saw big pig crops. Result, lower prices in relation to corn. Nineteen twenty-four saw a smaller crop, and an unusually poor corn year. Results, high prices for corn, lessened feeding and fewer pigs for market in 1925. Higher prices are certain to follow. The market supply of hogs for the fall of 1925 will therefore, be relatively small, smaller since 1920.

Industrial prosperity is likely to continue for 1925 with a brisk demand for meat products and good prices for pork. Higher prices for pork will affect the beef market favorably, but not to such an extent as to warrant any great advances.

Apparently beef was over-produced, and even yet, after four years of liquidation from the ranges there is nothing to warrant any rapid advances in cattle prices. Fewer cattle are being fed this winter, and this will stimulate prices. But the cattleman has something to encourage him after passing through a trying fall and winter.

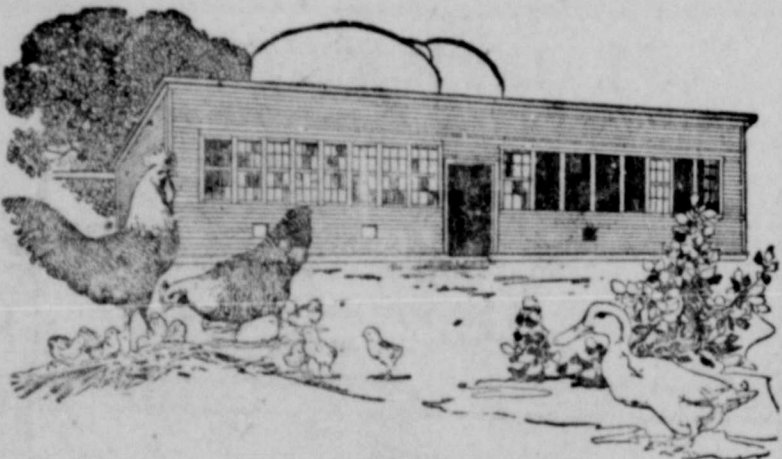

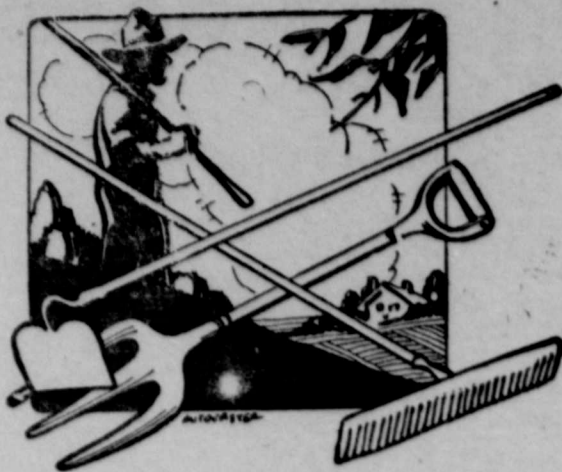
