## City Audit Reveals \$523,000 Operation

An audit which reflects the assets of the City of Wellington at near the \$2 million mark was accepted by the City Council in its Monday night meeting. The exact figure is \$1,916,181.

This audit, presented by Gordon D. Maddox, C.P.A. of Memphis, also reflected total operating expenditures of \$412,238. for the fiscal year July 1, 1977 to June 30, 1978 and total revenue of \$523,039, an excess of revenues over expenditures of \$110,810.

This excess, or profit, has gone into capital expenditures for the city in the amount of \$109,797.36, including the new Fire Department truck, garbage disposal system, and a new scraper.

In other business City Manager Glen Taylor told the council that an employee retirement program in now mandatory. It has been optional in the past. Of several recommended by the Texas Municipal League, city employees favor one in which they will pay into the retirement fund 7½ percent of their full salaries, with the City to pay a matching 7½ percent, Taylor said.

This was adopted, along with an additional provision

that present retired employees will have retirement pay increased by 50 percent.

The city has three retired employees presently drawing retirement pay, Mrs. Jennie Holcomb, Russell Yates and Jake Leach.

Taylor told the council that the City has built up a surplus to its credit in the Texas Municipal Retirement Fund, and that the three retired employees helped to build that surplus.

This carried on a motion by Tom Wilkins and second by Willie Gragson.

Of the three retired employees, Councilman Wayne Cudd pointed out that Yates went to work for the city when he was 16 years old and never worked for anyone else until his retirement a few years ago.

Bob Watson, Ambulance service president, told the council that the grant for certain new equipment required a sponsor's matching funds of \$1,886. This ordinarily would be shared four ways by the city, county, hospital and ambulance service.

Because of the hospital's financial difficulties, Watson requested the city to assume

one third of the hospital's part, jointly with the ambulance service and county. This passed on a motion by Cudd and second by Gragson. Each of the three agencies will pay \$626 on the matching funds.

The council voted to offer for rent a concrete block building at the old Green Acres Golf Course for \$50 per month. This was approved on a motion by Wilkins and second by Cudd.

Cudd asked when the city was going to do something about the "art work" on the water tower.

These obscenities and similar writing at Pioneer Park are part of the vandalism that has seen an upsurge in recent weeks.

Taylor said he would not ask one of the city's employees to climb the water tower and repaint the exterior, but if one volunteered to do the work, he would let him.

It was brought out that every few years high school students climb the tower and paint their class year. Never before has there been obscene writing.

Lyndon Crelia and Ralph

Owens, the city's representatives on the Law Enforcement Advisory Board, have asked for a meeting with the representatives from the commissioners court and Sheriff John Riney to consider the increase in vandalism.

Present for the council meeting were Mayor Hatch, Taylor and Councilmen Cudd, Crelia, Wilkins and Gragson.

## John Rogers New Trainee With SCS

John Rogers of St. Bernard, La., has joined the staff of Soil Conservation Service as a soil conservationist trainee.

His work here will be primarily orientation and training, and learning the work and organization of SCS, said Tommy Powell SCS conservationist.

Rogers graduated from St. Bernard High School, 15 miles southeast of New Orleans, then received a B.A. degree from the University of New Orleans. He has a M.S. degree from the University of Southern Mississippi, where his major field was in geology with a specialty in resource management and where he had a teaching fellowship.

The trio includes Jimmy Morgan, Robert Burba and Catrina Atkinson, but only Morgan will be able to attend, according to Jamie Larson,

band directors.

Approximately 200 tuba players from over the state are expected to perform with the UT band. They will be guests of the band during their stay in Austin and will attend a barbecue held in their honor.

"The invitation came due to our participation in the state solo and ensemble contest," Larson said.

It will be held in Bura Handley Community Center at 7:00 p.m.

This Oktoberfest is a fund-raising event, with all proceeds to help reduce the debt on the new sanctuary, according to the Rev. Tom Thomson, pastor.

Tickets are \$25 each and will be available until the time of the banquet and may be bought from the pastor or any member of the church finance committee, said Mrs. Richard Nall, chairman of the steering committee.

## Undefeated Electra to Meet Rockets Here Fri.

Electra Tigers will come to Wellington undefeated Friday, Oct. 6, to meet a Skyrocket team that is trying to get its spirits up from a loss to Childress. Game time is 8:00 p.m.

But the character of the Rockets are showing, and this week the "Fighting Rockets" are living up to their name, as their schedule gets tougher.

This will be the Wellington High School Homecoming game.

"The score in the Childress game didn't indicate what we have," Coach James Williams said. "I feel if we had kept them from the first score, the game would have been a lot closer. This is not taking anything from Childress. They are one of the best teams we have played. They are tremendously strong on de-

fense."

Electra, with good size, has not been scored on and threatened only once. The Tigers opened the season with a 25-6 win over Archer City, but they eased by Holiday by only one Point, 7-6. The next week they rolled over Crowell 43-0, and Friday night upset undefeated Bowie 13-10.

Electra, in the same district with Childress, scouted the Rocket-Bobcat game.

"They feel if they can beat us, they can beat Childress," said Williams.

He called this "another real tough game against another AA team."

"When we get to district, we should know what it's all about," he said.

The Tigers have good size in their line, averaging around 190 pounds.

There are two fast backs who can run 100 yards in 10 seconds flat, plus a quarter back with a good throwing arm.

Nine Tigers play defense only, giving Electra something of a two-platoon system, while Wellington is using most of its boys for both offense and defense. The Rockets picked up some bruises in the Childress game that may slow them this week, Coach Williams revealed.

Charles McIntosh has a hyper-extension of an elbow, making him doubtful for this week, and Joe Thomas received a knee injury, and it is still doubtful if he will be at full strength. Richard Garcia has a pinched nerve in the upper shoulder.

"We're trying to get them well," Williams said.

## Absentee Vote Mounts in Hospital Bond Election

Thirteen absentee ballots had been cast in the \$150,000 proposed hospital bond election by Tuesday evening, October 3.

This is an unusually heavy vote as only 5 days of absentee voting had passed and the deadline is 10 days away.

Anne Langford, acting administrator, emphasized that a person must be a qualified voter, that is a registered voter, in order to cast a ballot in this special election.

Any voter who believes he may be out of town on the October 17 election day is urged to come by the hospital during voting hours, 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday, and cast an absentee ballot.

Dr. Carter Holcomb told the hospital board in a meeting Tuesday, October 3, that the hospital must come under a new Medicare-mandated quality control program in its laboratory not later than November. This will mean that

for every laboratory test on a patient, three control tests must be run, for which the hospital will receive no pay, and which will cause increased paper work.

It must be done if the hospital is to continue its medicare approved status, he emphasized.

Dr. Joe Esquibel Diaz, the hospital's consulting pathologist, has said he believes the hospital can successfully meet the requirements, Dr. Holcomb said.

Tanya Coker, laboratory technician, worked with Dr. Diaz in his laboratory to update herself on the new requirements.

Mrs. Langford, said that Don Lauderdale, a Medicare representative, visited the hospital last week and was pleased with what is being done to bring the hospital building up to Medicare standards. The latest work has included installation of fire-proof tile in the office. Lauderdale will return later in the year.

It is urgent that Medicare requirements be met, board members agreed as the reviewed plans for the upcoming bond election.

It would provide that \$105,000 of the proposed \$150,000 bond issue be available for repairs and improvements of the hospital and equipment repairs and purchases.

# Rockets Lose 43-12 to Tough Childress Bobcats

Well, it was a bad week end for Wellington football fans. The Dallas Cowboys, the West Texas Buffs, the Texas Tech's Red Raiders joined Wellington's Skyrockets in the losing column, as the Rockets went down 43-12 to the undefeated Childress Bobcats Friday, Sept. 29.

It was the Rockets' first loss of the season.

The crowd of 4,000 in Childress Greenbelt Bowl had expected a close contest, but Skyrocket penalties and turnovers repeatedly gave Childress good field position and the Bobcats zapped the Rockets 29-0 by halftime.

Childress' junior quarterback Perry Morren lived up to his reputation with on-target passes and extra-point kicks and execution of a bootleg option that left the previously unscored-on Rocket defense wondering where and why.

Childress' David West put the Bobcats on the scoreboard with a 2-yard run that capped a 68 yard scoring drive, and Morren kicked the extra point. On that drive the Rockets donated 20 yards in penalties.

Childress moved from their own 36 on their second possession to score again when Morren carried from the 1. A fake kick play was good for two points with Ralph Sims as ballcarrier, putting the score at 15-0. Penalties cost the Rocket defense 30 yards on this Childress drive.

Bobcat Larry Johnson intercepted a Skyrocket pass to kill the Rockets next drive. And it took Childress 7 plays to score again, this time in the form of Quentin Klepper from the 4 yard line. Morren kicked the extra point.

Childress Ricky Sims picked off another Skyrocket pass to set up the Bobcat's next score. That came on a Morren pass to David West from the 8 yard line. The completion left Morren with a 5 for 5 passing record for the first half.

Morren kicked the extra point and the Bobcats lead a stunned Wellington team 29-0 at halftime.

The second half turned out to be a different story, but it was a little too late to change the outcome.

Childress recovered a Wellington fumble on the Rocket's first possession after halftime,

and Morren hit Marty Morey from the 11 yard line to make the score 35-0. Morren kicked the extra point.

It wasn't until the fourth quarter that the Rocket offense got hooked up. The Rockets took possession on their own 25 yard line and marched to the 6 yard line where Tim Anderson scampered into the end zone untouched by the Childress defense. Carl Taylor's extra-point pass was incomplete.

Rocket Kevin Hall went up with a Childress pass receiver on Childress next pass play, and when the dust cleared Hall had the Ball. The interception and an offsides penalty put the Rockets on Childress 46.

On first down Carl Taylor lofted a pass, Hall leaped, turned around, grabbed the ball and kept his footing to score the Rockets second touchdown.

The Rockets extra-point pass attempt again fell

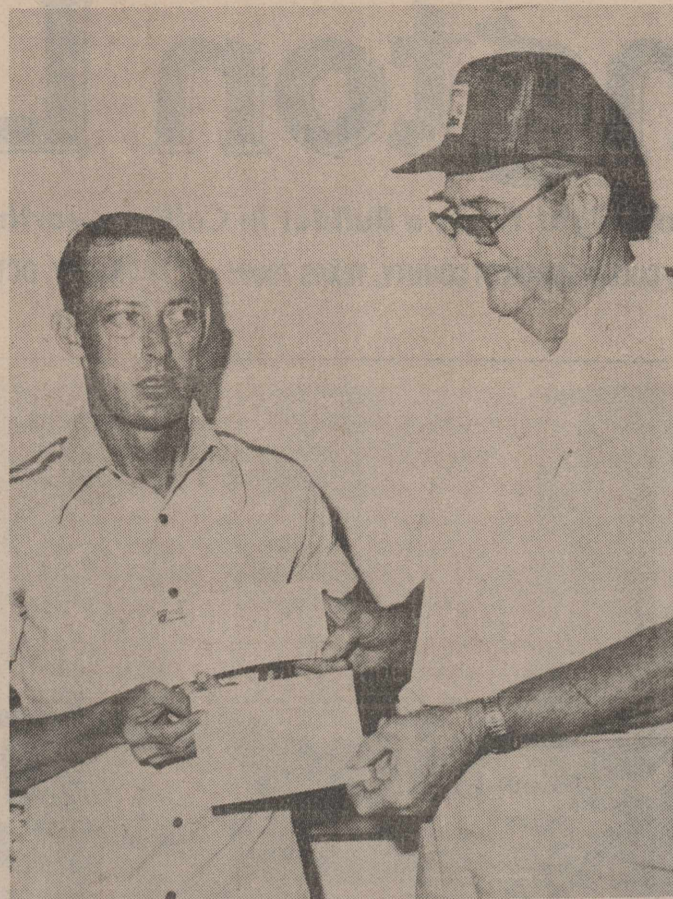
incomplete.

Almost all of this is to meet Medicare requirements. Right now, the hospital has facing it \$40,758, almost \$50,000 in improvements, all of them Medicare mandated.

The major items is a sprinkler system costing an estimated \$25,450 and other improvements include a fire door costing \$5,000, a fire-alarm and smoke detector unit costing \$6,264, and a number of other less expensive items.

It is the hospital's progress in getting these things under way that Lauderdale was checking in his visit last week. "For the sake of the people we serve, the hospital simply cannot let its medicare certification be jeopardized," one board member said.

From 85 to 90 percent of all hospital patients in this area, including those in Collingsworth General, are Medicare patients, it was pointed out.

If for any reason a hospital is closed, however briefly, by Medicare, it is extremely difficult for it to open again,

## Other Editors Say ...

### They Didn't Cry 'Wolf'

Maybe you were one of those skeptics who laughed when farmers warned last year that as government kills the family farm big business in America will continue to provide food.

"What would big businesses want with farming?" some scoffed.

Scoff no more. What big business wants with American farmland is what big business wants with anything else — to make money.

The Wall Street Journal reported last week that several big business enterprises, GE and General Mills, for example, are rapidly moving into farming, applying some mass production techniques and making money.

Those firms are now concentrating on production of things like tomatoes, lettuce, spinach and other salad-type goodies which can be grown year-round inside large buildings using a controlled environment.

This relatively new trend has some favorable aspects, some not so favorable.

Perfection of indoor, technology-intensive farming of produce-type items will lead to more abundant supplies of those foods. The efficiency of American industry, when making use of technology, is astounding, and one can anticipate more and more food.

Perfection of those technological efficiencies will be evident in the long run if man is to live with any semblance of comfort in the environments of the future, including the earth environment. Space colonization, not really a science-fiction long-shot, will depend on perfecting indoor farming.

More abundant supplies of foodstuffs could well lead to lower prices in the long run.

On the other hand, the interest among giants like GE and General Mills in actual food production illustrates that where money can be made, there, too, will be industrial interest.

Farmers who warn that the demise of the family farm will lead to corporate ownership, then, aren't crying "wolf".

### Tunnel Vision

There is little doubt but that we in America are becoming highly specialized in almost every field of human endeavor. It is one of our strengths. It is also one of our weaknesses.

People who devote their entire time and effort to one particular kind of problem develop special skills and knowledge which make them experts in that particular area.

Without exposure to other concerns, however, they may also develop "tunnel vision."

Tunnel vision prevents people from seeing beyond the special problems of their own line of work or their own circle of friends.

It's a common ailment, even among competent leaders. Most managers or supervisors get their start in one speciality or another. The tendency at the bottom of the ladder is for people to know more and more about less and less.

It becomes quite important for people, as they move up the ladder, to know more and more outside their own sphere of expertise.

One of the hardest things for elected public officials to do is to take a broad view of the problems that come up and try to arrive at a solution that is acceptable to all areas, not just their own.

A farmer on the school board, for example, has to learn to look at problems with a broad outlook instead of applying the problem to his own particular situation.

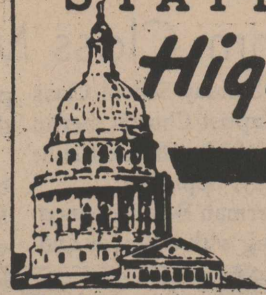
A Chamber of Commerce director has to learn to deal with problems as they affect all business and professional and agriculture and oil industries, not just the one in which he happens to make his living.

Doctors are sometimes accused of having tunnel vision because they spend so many long and hard hours attending to the sick until they can easily lose sight of other areas of life other than medical.

## STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN—A bitter legislative battle is shaping up over whether Texans should have a direct vote in 1980 on selection of presidential candidates.

The House Elections Committee recommended revival of a Texas presidential preference primary law, which expired by its own terms after single use in 1976.

However, the committee sought to fix the date on which the voting should be held as that of the June runoff primary rather than the May general primary.

That irked Republicans who voted in state convention to hold a presidential primary in May under their own rules.

Democrats are divided on the issue. Many conservatives in the legislature fear the primary would draw conservative voters into the Republican voting boxes to aid presidential candidates like Ronald Reagan, John Connally or George Bush. Cross-overs, they reason, would increase the strength of liberals.

But many liberals have turned against the idea of a presidential primary, preferring the old convention system of naming delegates to national party conventions. Some liberals argue national party rules allow primary states to avoid major proportional representation requirements.

Democratic gubernatorial nominee John Hill has come out firmly for a primary, however, and said he expects the legislature to approve one of some type. The Democratic convention barely mentioned the issue, and tossed it to the state party's executive committee for a study and recommendations.

GOP State Chairman Ray Barnhart called the House committee recommendation "hypocrisy" aimed at misleading the people.

### Stamps Changed

Welfare recipients won't have to spend their own money for food stamp program coupons in the future.

The Texas Board of Human Resources meeting in Amarillo voted to end the cash outlay requirement for participation.

If federal guidelines are received on schedule, the cash outlay provision will end December 1.

Recipients will receive fewer stamps than they now receive. They get an allotment of food for a greater value (determined on basis of household size) than they pay for stamps (based on net income). A household of four gets about \$182 a month in food stamps. For this amount, the family pays \$58 of its own money, making bonus value of the coupons \$124. When the purchase requirement is eliminated, the household will receive the \$124 in food stamps as bonus coupons, but will not have to pay out the \$58.

Human Resources Commissioner Jerome Chapman said the change will provide needy Texans the same amount of food subsidy, while permitting them to retain more of their cash resources for other necessities.

### Court Change Urged

A legislative committee has recommended major changes in the city and county court system.

The House Committee on Judicial Affairs recommended a requirement that all municipal court judges

be attorneys and that all be elected rather than appointed.

Most municipal court judges are appointed by city councils and commissions.

The committee's interim report also recommended creation of county courts of appeal to help relieve crowded dockets due to appeals from justice of the peace and municipal courts.

### Courts Speak

The Court of Criminal Appeals reversed a Dallas heroin conviction and life sentence on grounds the search for evidence was illegal. The court said a passenger in a car cannot be searched on mere suspicion he is drunk and armed.

The same court reversed a 16-year prison sentence for aggravated assault against an Austin man, holding the punishment excessive, and ordering it reduced to the range prescribed by law.

# No Funds Available for Panfork Encampment Road

The State Highways and Public Transportation Commission has rejected, for the current fiscal year at least, the request for funding the Panfork Encampment road project.

Notice of this action was received by County Judge Zook Thomas Friday, Sept. 29, from B.L. DeBerry, engineer-director of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

He told Judge Thomas that all funds authorized for Farm to Market Road construction are already designated for specific projects.

"We are disappointed that it didn't go through," said the Rev. S.L. Yielding, Panfork Camp director. "We will make whatever application we need in order to get it in the future."

The 24-member delegation, headed by Judge Thomas and the Commissioners Court, and including Baptist pastors and laymen from over the eastern half of the Panhandle, appeared before the commission Thursday, Sept. 21, to request the road.

"The Commission met in a later session and discussed your presentation in detail," DeBerry wrote. He encouraged the Panfork group to present their project again.

"If the State Legislature continues the F.M. Road Program at their next legislative session, this project can be considered for inclusion in a future program," DeBerry continued. "In the past these funds have been very limited, and if continued in the same amount, several years would be required to fund a project of the magnitude included in your request. If the County feels this project is a high priority, it should be recommended to the District Engineer at the next meeting regarding F.M. Road considerations."

"I'm sure it will hold up a little on our construction, but I feel that we will go ahead with it as we are financially able in our long range plans for building and remodeling," Rev. Yielding said.

Before the group went to Austin, he had outlined the extensive enlargement plans

which would add new buildings, remodel a number of the present structures, and make of Panfork Baptist Encampment a year-round facility.

"We are hoping, of course, that the road will be paved in the near future," Yielding added.

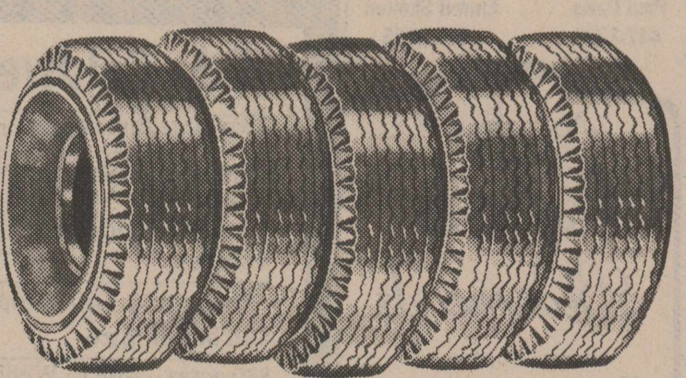
