WAR FLASHES!!!

(By The Associated Press)

Gen. Douglas MacArthur, dramatically underlining his pledge of an allied counter-offensive against Japan, told leaders of Australia today that "there can be no compromise... We shall win or we shall die" in the fight to drive Emperor Hirohito's invasion armies back out of the Southwest Pacific.

"And to this end, I pledge you the full resources of all the mighty power of my country, and all the blood of my countrymen," Gen. MacArthur said, speaking at a dinner in Parliament House, in Canberra.

"I have come as a soldier in a great crusade of personal liberty as opposed to perpetual slavery. My faith in our ultimate victory is invincible."

LONDON — Tempestuous aerial blows ranging from cold Murmansk to German's industrial Ruhr valley and the white cliffs of Dover were reported today as Prime Minister Winston Churchill sounded a rare note of optimism with the declaration that the Allies "cannot lose this war except through our own fault."

Churchill acknowledged, however, that the grim battle of the Atlantic "upon which at all times our power to live and carry on the war effort depends" had again taken a turn for the worse after a marked brightening in the last five or six months.

EASTON, Pa. March 26 (AP) — Hundreds of pounds of dynamite exploded prematurely at a limestone quarry of the Lehigh Portland Cement company four miles north of Easton today, killing at least 30 men and shaking the countryside for miles around. Investigators said the death toll may reach 32.

MOSCOW, March 26 (AP) — The German air force has struck with 66 planes at Murmansk, Arctic Russian base, and lost 11 of them while causing no damage, a dispatch from the Arctic front said today.

Schools Warned Against Lowering Teacher Standard

L. A. Woods, State Superintendent of Schools, notified local school officials this week that our first aim is to win the war, but that letting down standards for teachers will not help but will affect the training of our children. Therefore, the requirements for well trained teachers in the accredited schools will not be lowered.

He states that there is a definite shortage of teachers for some fields of teaching. However, there are many teachers with degrees in the state who are unemployed. A number of these are married ladies who have been out of the classroom for a number of years but who are graduates and who are well equipped to hold responsible places. He recommends that these ladies come back into service but they should be urged to attend summer school and to take a refresher course in the field in which they expect to teach.

No county or independent school superintendent is allowed to approve a contract which is below the standard required by law.

Dr. Woods states that these retired ladies together with the college graduates of 1942 should meet the immediate needs of the profession.

Dawson Ranks Fifth In Cotton In Entire State

Turning out a total of 85,104 bales, Lubbock County paced the state for the 1941 cotton growing season by a substantial margin.

The final figures were 12,233 bales above those for the nearest county, Lynn, according to the Bureau of Census report, covering cotton up to early March.

Total for the South Plains is 574,267 bales, compared with 449,486 bales a year ago. The increase, 124,781, bales represented a 27.7 per gain.

Dawson county ranked third in the area, and fifth in Texas; Crosby, ranking fourth is 7th, and Lamb ranking fifth, is 8th in the state.

Other high ranking counties are Hockley, Scurry, Dickens and Terry.

State total was 2,555,611 bales, compared with 3,111,051 bales for the 1940 crop.

Farmers Urged To Plant Full Cotton Quota

Farmers of Dawson County should plant their full cotton acreage allotments if they are equipped to do it and if such plantings will not interfere with the production of food for home use or other war crops.

In urging farmers to plant their cotton allotments, Joe M. Peterson, chairman of the county USDA War Board, pointed out that the Nation needs more longer staple cotton and that the Commodity Credit Corporation this year is offering greater premiums on longer staple lengths.

Shifting part or all the acreage from short to long staple cotton in areas where soils are suited to long staple production is not only good business but a patriotic contribution to total war, the chairman declared.

"We need medium and long staple cotton for use in manufacture of balloon and parachute cloth, Pontoon for sea planes, and other military needs. We need more fats and oils and it's up to us to produce them," the chairman added.

The percentage of cotton planted in Dawson County has declined, during the last four years. The supplementary cotton program and abandonment of acres unfit for harvest, were reasons cited for the decline last year.

Dawson County should not exceed 1942 allotments and allotments will not be increased, the chairman said.

"The AAA regulations on cotton are the same. Allotments still stand. Marketing quotas also still stand," he said.

Premiums will be increased on cotton 1-8 inches and longer in order to encourage producers to plant longer staple cotton instead of the shorter staple varieties usually planted in most of the cotton producing areas of the state.

Can Terrace Farms For Price Of 75c Per 100 Ft.

Basic fair price for terracing easier farms in Dawson County has been set at 75c per 100 feet, according to Joe M. Peterson, chairman, county AAA committee.

Under the terracing plan, with construction costs varying by individual farms, no cash outlay is needed since the cost of construction of terraces is deducted from future AAA payments, the chairman said.

After terraces are completed they are reported to the county office and checked in the field to assure compliance with specifications established by the county committee after which they are reported to the state office for audit. Certification of payments are made to the Regional Distributing office, in Dallas, on the same day they are received in the state AAA office. Coordination between the local and state AAA offices make it possible for contractors to be paid promptly for their work, Peterson said.

"If you are going to terrace your farm under this plan, let us know so your name can be added to the list if it's not already there," the chairman said in pointing out that contractors already are working in the various communities.

"Some farmers are terracing just enough to earn soil building payments, while others are using as much as 70 per cent of their 1942 AAA payments for the practice," he said.

Peanut Acreage Increased In Dawson County

Peanuts went to war right after Pearl Harbor, according to Joe M. Peterson, chairman of the Dawson County USDA War Board.

The new goal for Dawson County in the Food For Freedom program this year is 500 acres (this is the minimum amount that the county committee has accepted) while Texas goal is 1,056,000 acres or approximately 300 per cent increase over the 1941 crop.

"Peanuts are in the war for the duration because we need fats and oils we formerly imported from the Far East where the Japs are now," Peterson said.

At the same time farmers are being asked to increase peanuts, they are not being asked to produce them at a financial loss, the War Board chairman said in explaining that farmers would receive a fair price for the peanuts produced.

Secretary of Agriculture Claude R. Wickard has announced that the price of U. S. No. 1 White Spanish type peanuts will be supported at not less than \$62 per ton with differentials for grades and locations.

"This does not mean all peanut farmers will receive \$62 per ton, but it does mean they'll receive a fair price for what they raise," he said.

Peanut seed are available to the county farmers on a cash basis or loan basis and may be obtained from Southwestern Peanut Growers Association.

"If a farmer wants credit in buying peanut seed to produce peanuts for oil, he'll sign a promissory note which is due November 1. The note can be satisfied with cash or peanuts from his 1942 production," the chairman said.

Good Ration For Pigs Given By County Agent

"I have a nice litter of pigs on the ground now. They are about as good pigs as I have ever raised. I do not want to lose one day's time in getting these pigs topped out this year. Usually it seems as if I always lose some time in getting my hogs topped out. What can I do to help myself this year, because I wish to do my part in the Food for Victory Program?" This is an almost every day inquiry received by B. J. Baskin, county agent.

Keep these pigs coming all the time is the answer to this program time is the answer to this production problem. But how is he to do it? First keep these pigs free from intestinal parasites. Keep them free of external parasites. Feed them a growing feed up to the time they weigh about 100 pounds, and then put them on a finishing ration. A good pig feed is:

Ground threshed maize	55 lbs.
Wheat gray shorts	10 lbs.
Ground oats	20 lbs.
Cottonseed meal	9 lbs.
Tankage	6 lbs.
Limestone flour	1 1/2 lbs.
Salt	1-2 lb.

This ration can be placed in a self feeder where the pigs can get to it at all times. It should be so that the sow cannot get to it. These pigs will get off to a good start, and keep right on growing and doing good after weaning.

Self feeders are recommended because (1) a pig will do a better job of feeding itself than a man will do, (2) the pigs will come along faster, (3) they will grow out at a lower cost per pound, and (4) they will not have any set back at the weaning time.

MRS. STUART THOMAS, KEY HAS PLENTY TOMATOES

Mrs. Stuart Thomas, who lives in the Key community, having moved there from Howard County, told the members of the Key home demonstration club, that she produced enough tomatoes for her family and neighbors and then sold \$86 worth last year.

"I used the Marglobe variety and grew my own plants. And every time it rained, I would go and set out a few more plants." The acreage which she planted to tomatoes was one tenth of an acre.

Farmers Urged To Feed Good Laying Mash

Many farmers are giving their best thoughts and efforts to the best method of growing out their 1942 baby chicks. For poultry to be at its best it should receive every opportunity to reach its maximum growth and development. The only way to do this is to feed a good growing mash. Cost of such mashes is rising gradually, and many re-ways to do this is to feed a good formula that the farmer can mix at home.

Any formula for a growing mash must provide for minerals and vitamins as well as for proteins and carbohydrates. Below is a good formula:

Ground threshed grain	50 lbs.
Wheat gray shorts	15 lbs.
Fine ground oats	12 1/2 lbs.
Alfalfa leaf meal	5 lbs.
Meat scraps (or fish meal)	5 lbs.
Cottonseed meal	8 lbs.
Dried milk (skim or buttermilk)	3 lbs.
Ground limestone flour	1 lb.
Salt	1/2 lb.

TOMATOES ARE VALUABLE FOOD

In view of the Lend-Lease Program, whereby America has agreed to furnish food to Great Britain, it is more necessary this year more than ever, that people who have the soil and tools, produce enough tomatoes for home consumption.

The tomato is a valuable source of Vitamin C, which affects the tissues of the body, helps to prevent rheumatic conditions, and helps to prevent disease of the gums. While the tomato it not the only source of this vitamin, in view of the difficulties of transportation, it is the best source for the British.

Tomatoes may be grown in abundance in West Texas - in Dawson County. The time to start is now. One may take an old tub or box and fill it with half and half soil and manure, plant the seeds about 2 inches apart, keep it moist, and in 6 to 8 weeks time have tomato plants to set out in the fenced garden or field.

The varieties of tomatoes recommended by people who have been successful in producing them, are the Porter, the Marglobe, the Earliana and the June Pink. One fourth ounce of seed will furnish enough plants and tomatoes for two persons.

Need Scrap Iron In Fight Against U. S. Enemies

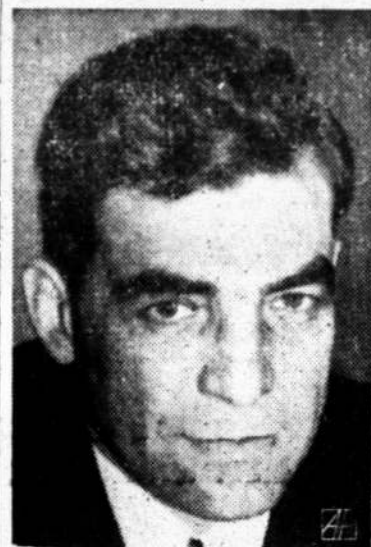
City Alligators Out Of Winter's Hibernation

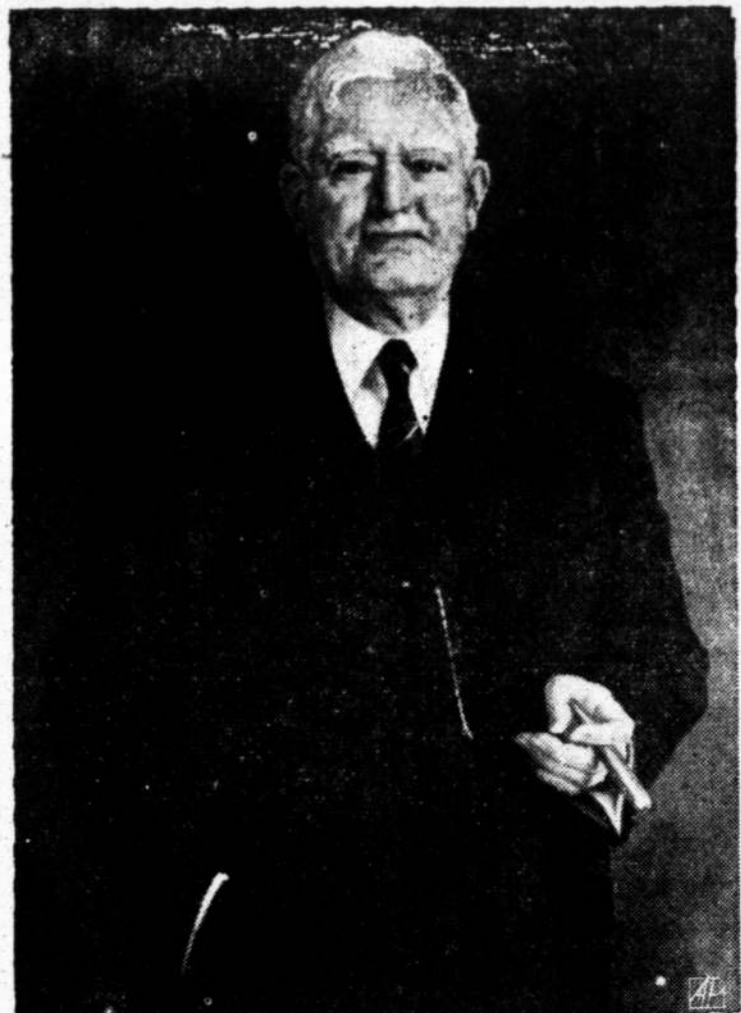

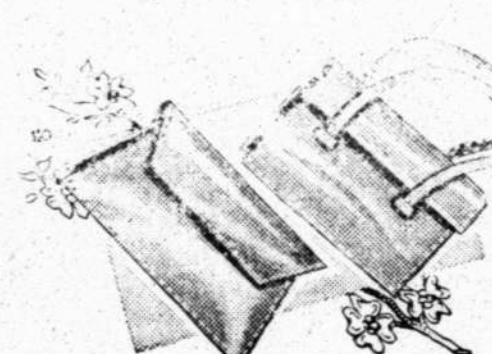
