13 INDICTED IN BALL SCANDAL

CHICAGO, Oct. 29.—Indictments against thirteen persons in connection with throwing the games of the 1919 world series between the Chicago White Sox and the Cincinnati Reds, will be returned this afternoon to Judge Charles MacDonald by a special Cook county grand jury, it was announced by the State's attorney's office today. The grand jury which last Tuesday completed taking testimony in a five week's investigation of the baseball scandal will hold its final session this afternoon.

ALABAMA UNION VOTE ON STRIKE

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Oct. 29.—Resolutions calling for a general strike in Alabama was introduced in the convention of the state federation of labor here today.

Other resolutions were introduced, including the one calling for the impeachment of Gov. Kilby for sending troops into the

mining fields. All of the resolutions were referred to the committee on resolutions.

The locals are strengthening themselves to defeat the visitors and seek revenge for the drubbing the locals received at the hands of the Coleman team two or three weeks ago. Following the football game the visitors will be the guests of the local players at a party to be given at the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Penn.

WILSON FORECASTS VICTORY

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29.—President Wilson today addressed a letter to Gov. Cox expressing confidence in the Democratic presidential nominee. Mr. Wilson expressed the hope that under the leadership of Gov. Cox, "we may carry the policy of the national government forward along the path of liberal legislation and humane reform until the whole world again sees the illustration of wholesome strength of democracy, and the happy fruit of what the founders of this republic purposed when they set this great government up."

President Wilson stated in the letter that he had followed Gov. Cox's course throughout the campaign and with the administration expressed the belief that Gov. Cox would receive the emphatic endorsement of the voters of the country.

"You have spoken the truth fearlessly about the great issues at stake," said the president, "and the American people will stand behind the principles for which this nation has been fighting."

NEW YORK, Oct. 29.—George White, chairman of the Democratic National Committee, today made a forecast of the election results. "The general political situation at the close of the last week of the campaign full signs point unmistakably to Democratic success," declared Mr. White. "The Republicans are demoralized from the Canadian border to the gulf, and from the Atlantic to the Pacific," added the Democratic chairman, "and their forces are in full retreat everywhere."

NEW YORK, Oct. 29.—Will H. Hays, chairman of the Republican National Committee, today issued a statement in which he said, "an official Republican survey of the country indicates that Harding and Coolidge will receive the largest popular majority ever cast in a presidential election. I have complete faith in a complete Republican victory this fall, because we have one hundred per cent confidence in American common sense and one hundred per cent evidence of the dependable American intelligence and the faith that it will express itself at the polls next Tuesday."

NEW YORK, Oct. 29.—The total of 335 electoral votes, which Will H. Hays, chairman of the Republican National Committee, predicts will be cast for Senator Harding is just ten votes less than the 405 which Republican managers claimed two weeks before the 1916 election, for their candidate, Chas. E. Hughes. When the returns were counted Hughes actually received 254 electoral votes, and Woodrow Wilson was elected. Just before the 1916 election, William R. Wilcox, chairman of the Republican National Committee, predicted a Republican landslide.

"The people," he said, "have made up their minds in favor of Hughes, and that is all there is to it."

Among the states which he claimed with the utmost assurance, would give large Republican majorities were California (went Democratic by 3,800); Kansas, (went Democratic by 36,000); and Ohio, (went Democratic by 89,500). California, Mr. Wilcox asserted, would go Republican by 250,000, citing the fact as evidence, that 307,793 Republicans had voted in the State primary and only 77,830 Democrats.

PASTORS ENDORSE
LIBRARY MOVE

"We note with heartiest pleasure the effort which is now being made to keep our public library open regularly, and we hope the movement will meet with warm sympathy and full success. There are some urgent reasons why this should be done:

"1. Our civic honor: Mr. Wilmett gave the lot and Mr. Carnegie gave the building. We as citizens accepted the gift. That was our agreement to keep the library in use. We should keep our agreement as faithfully as we would with a bank.

"2. Our civic pride: Under the conditions of the gift the property could be taken away from us by the donors if they should choose to do so, in view of the fact that we have not kept it open. If this should happen it would be a civic disgrace. We would hate to live in a town where that had happened.

"3. Our loyalty to the pupils of our schools: One thing that makes a strong school is the constant access to a library. Our boys and girls should have the benefit of the library every day, in addition to their own school library.

"4. A literary center: Ballinger is the county capital—the center of the county school system. Why not encourage the schools of the county to consult the periodicals, the reference books, as well as the popular books of our library?

"5. A civic center: If our library were kept open regularly many of our people, both young and old, as well as transient people, would be encouraged to spend many profitable hours there which have heretofore been spent in worthless surroundings.

"6. The strengthening of the library itself: If we get the habit of using the library we need not worry about not having many books or periodicals. This in itself will keep alive a public sentiment which will make it comparatively easy to make the book collection grow, if properly managed, and to maintain a magazine fund.

"Let all the organizations of the city, which have as their purpose the moral, educational and civic uplift of the community show their co-operation that we are a people able to appreciate a noble gift, which was made years ago. It is time when we have money and in many cases we are spending it for things which have less value. A good working library is one of the most elevating and useful things a community can have.

"CAPTAIN SWIFT" AT
MAEROY TONIGHT

Earle Williams' Vitaphone feature, "Captain Swift," which is to be shown at the Maeroy Theatre today and tonight, is a splendid example of how a picture version of a famous play may be even superior to the original stage production. The screen has the advantage over the stage in that much of the action, vital to the story, which can only be referred to in the spoken play, owing to the natural limitations of the stage, actually is visualized when the camera is used.

EXPLAINS "BETTER
SCHOOL" MEASURE

S. M. N. Marrs, chief supervisor for high schools in Texas, was here Thursday and Friday in the interest of the "Better Schools" Amendment. Mr. Marrs spoke to a small crowd at the Methodist church Thursday evening and explained the benefits to be derived by the adoption of the better school amendment.

Mr. Marrs stated that the amendment would remove a great handicap under which the rural schools are now laboring, and which can not be remedied any other way. The amendment will be far more beneficial to rural, or common school districts, than to independent districts.

Under the present law independent districts can increase their revenue for school purposes by increasing the property values, while common school districts are

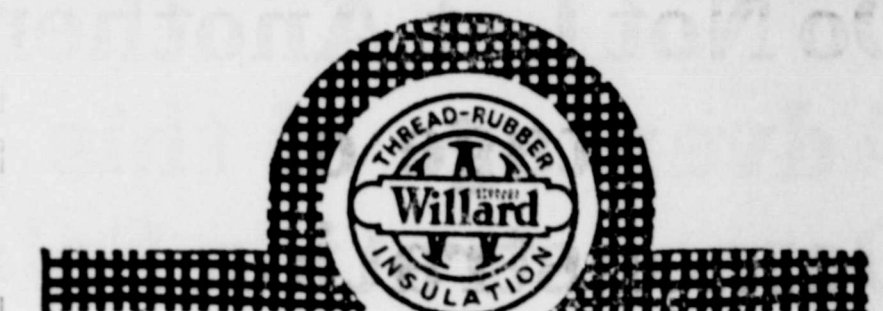
forced to accept the county conditions and cannot increase property values, and have no authority to vote a tax rate higher than fifty cents. If the "Better Schools" Amendment is adopted, common school districts can vote any tax they see fit for the maintenance of their schools. "The law is designed to help rural schools especially," said Mr. Marrs, "and it does not place any tax on anybody until the people themselves vote by a majority to fix a tax rate."

Mr. Marrs went to Winters in company with Superintendent Bugg Friday morning, where he was billed to address the people in the interest of the amendment.

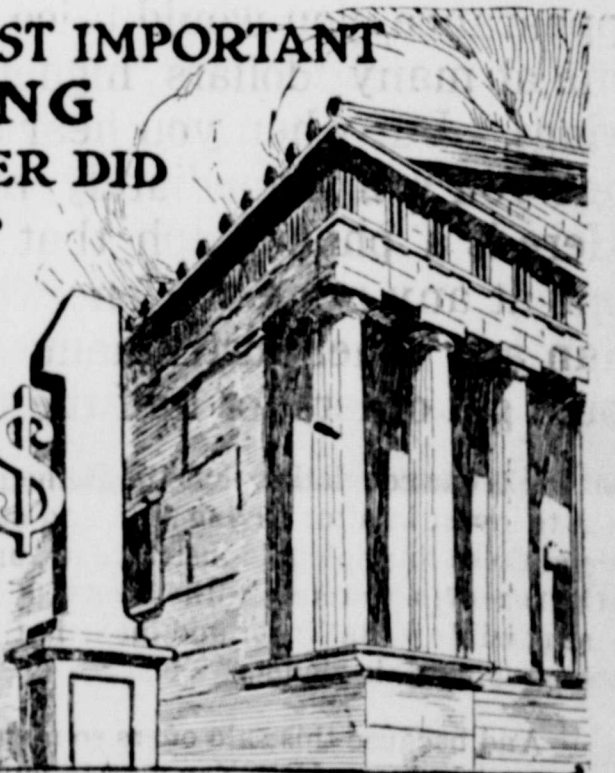

14 PRISONERS IN
THE LOCAL JAIL

Sheriff Perkins is again under responsibility of caring for fourteen prisoners, most of whom are under felony charges, and are being held in the local jail where escapes have been common in the past. Two of the prisoners are visitors, and are being cared for at the expense of Concho county, as that county is without a jail.

Of the fourteen prisoners, eleven are white men, two negroes, and one Mexican. Two white men are under murder charge, two under charges of arson and attempt to murder, two have been sentenced for horse theft.

This criminal record has been made here within the last two or three weeks, the county jail being practically vacant most all the time, and the court docket clean. The prisoners are either transients, or in most cases people who have been in this county but a short time.

RIOTING OVER BODY
TERENCE MACSWINEY

QUEENSTOWN, Ireland, Oct. 29.—The body of Terence MacSwiney, late Lord Mayor of Cork, was landed here today from the steamer Rathmore. The body was received by the Urban Council and thousands of the city's inhabitants. A draft of armed troops was present.

DUBLIN, Ireland, Oct. 29.—Over a hier catafalque in Pro cathedra here this morning venerable Archbishop Walsh celebrated low requiem mass for the repose of the soul of the late Lord Mayor MacSwiney of Cork, whose body unescorted, except by a guard of English police, was at the same time proceeding across St. Georges Channel on the packet Rathmore towards Cork. The whole of Southern Ireland is in mourning today and most all business is suspended.

HOLYHEAD, Wales, Oct. 29.—When day broke this morning over the Irish sea, the steamer Rathmore bearing the body of late Lord Mayor MacSwiney, who died Monday in Brixton prison, London, was steaming Southward off Welsh headlands on the way to Cork.

At the same hour, relatives of MacSwiney, who refused to board the special steamer provided to take them and the mayor's body to Cork, were on their way to Dublin. The shipment of the body direct to Cork was preceded by a violent scene in which blows were struck and members of the MacSwiney family were dragged from a railway coach at the Holyhead station.

The relatives of MacSwiney refused to consent to the government's plan to take the body to Cork instead of Dublin, and it was only after they had been placed under virtual temporary arrest that the body was taken from the train and hauled to the dock where the Rathmore was waiting to take the body direct to Cork.

GRAND JURY IN
SPECIAL SESSION

Judge Woodward reconvened the grand jury at one o'clock Friday afternoon and the body was immediately put to work investigating the killing of Charley Allen. The grand jury had been summoned for ten o'clock Friday morning, but for some reason one member was unable to get here at that hour and the session did not open until one o'clock.

It is not expected that the grand jury will be in session but a short time, and will return an indictment against J. H. Boland, charging him with murdering Allen. The State's attorneys had taken the testimony of a number of witnesses, and this evidence will be presented to the grand jury and considerable time saved.

If Boland is indicted the court will probably fix bond at once by agreement between counsel for State and defense and the case will come up for trial at the next term of court, six months hence.

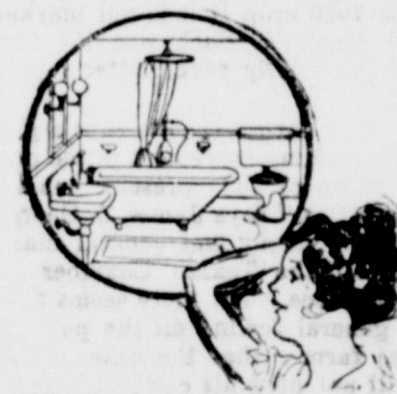

\$10,000 BOND FOR CONCHO MAN

W. H. Martin, charged with killing his son, will be released from jail pending trial of the case at Paint Rock next spring, provided he can find friends who will sign his bond for \$10,000.

District Attorney Early and Judges Doss & Baugh went to Paint Rock Thursday, where the man was given a preliminary hearing, before the justice of the peace who fixed the bond at the above amount.

The prisoner was remanded to jail as no one appeared to help him arrange the bond, and as Paint Rock is without a jail, the prisoner is being held in the Ballinger jail, where he was confined following the killing about two weeks ago.

Martin and his grown son quarreled over a crop which they had made together, and the father shot the young man several times, killing him almost instantly. The evidence in the case tends to show that the crime was one of the most deplorable homicides ever committed in Concho county, the father shooting his son in the presence of the mother and five other children. The father's plea will be self defence, claiming that his son was trying to shoot him. Doss & Baugh have been employed to defend the man.

COTTON MARKET LOW EARLY IN THE SEASON

DALLAS, Oct. 29.—A ten year average shows that cotton has sold at higher figures during November and December than in October.

A cotton holding movement is taking hold throughout the state, and though the present depression in cotton prices has been reached, according to several hundred letters which have been received by the Texas Chamber of Commerce from bankers, cotton men, cotton farmers, merchants, and commercial organizations of Texas. "I believe that the extreme low price has been reached," writes a prominent banker of Houston, "farmers did not heed the appeal to hold cotton during the first part of the picking season because most of them followed the usual policy of selling a few bales to meet their more urgent obligations; however, I believe that a hard and fast holding movement has now set in."

"The present low price of cotton is due to an unprecedented scare; the world needs and will pay a fair price for every bale of the 1920 crop if it is not marketed wisely." Such was the tone of practically every letter received.

"The farmer knows that a general holding movement is the only solution of the present market problems," says James Z. George, vice-president and general manager of the Texas Chamber of Commerce, "but there seems to be a general feeling on the part of the farmer that the other fellow will not hold his cotton." Farmers, bankers, merchants, of each community should get behind the cotton holding movement; they should see that every farmer is given assistance in holding his cotton and they should let the other communities of the state and the South know that they are holding their cotton.
