County Cancer Society Commended At Meeting

The American Cancer Society's annual district meeting was held at convention center of the Red Raider Inn in Lubbock. Delegates to the meeting elected three district directors to represent them on the State Board of the Society. Those elected were Carl Page M. D. of Lubbock, Earl Jones of Brownfield and Mrs. L. C. McLain.

Delegates attending from Castro County were Mrs. W. A. Epperson of the Easter Community, treasurer; Mrs. Claude Forson of Dimmitt, public education chairman; Mrs. James Kennedy, service chairman; Mrs. H. M. Morrison of Dimmitt and Mrs. McLain.

Mrs. Curt Reimann, executive vice-president of Texas division in Austin and Mrs. Gordon Hallon, Division committee member, spoke during the plans and evaluations session citing the need for more active local volunteer leadership to keep expenses down, and the value of district leaders in aiding the counties in the battle against cancer.

Dr. Carl Page highly commended the Castro County unit and the citizens of the county on the work and support of the cancer control program this year. Local delegates accepted two awards for Castro County.

The Golden Achievement Award read thus, "To Castro County Unit for reaching an all time high in Crusade income and for

exceeding the per capita goal of the Texas Division for 1971 in the Crusade to Conquer Cancer." The second award was made to the unit for "leading District Three South in presenting life-saving information toward greater public education and awareness for clubs and organization audiences."

Only five of the twenty counties in the district received the Golden Achievement Award. Only two of the twenty received an award in public education.

Also presented at the district meeting was a scrapbook for the local unit which was compiled and prepared by publication chairman, Mrs. Trent Downing of the Easter community and Mrs. W. A. Epperson.

Mrs. McLain conducted a district workshop in public education at the meeting.

The program was concluded with a very informative speech given by Harry Milt, a representative from National A.C.S. headquarters in New York. He discussed the advances in cancer research touching on viruses as a cause of cancer, breast cancer and leukemia. He has also written research booklets in these fields.

Milt urged those attending not to let up on this relentless battle against our common dreaded disease. Although the government is supplementing the research program, we must view it as just that, because if we are to find a cure for cancer, it will be through the combined concentrated efforts of the American people.

Other investors can do well in securities which are basically commodity plays. This is a very high risk type of investment.

The Game is played by the investors trying to determine, let us say, that the demand for copper is going to exceed the supply for several years, that copper production will not increase proportionately, and that the therefore inevitable rise in the price of copper will flow through as profits to certain copper companies, and that this future increase has not yet been discounted.

If the investor is successful at his determination of the commodity market, he will find his returns very substantial. It has been said, however, that the

odds are safer at a race track than trying to play the commodity market.

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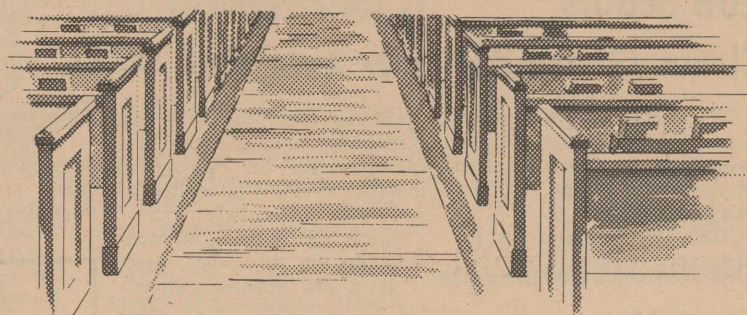
