Yanks Stage Smashing Raid On Germany

Back From War



S-Sgt. Lee Roy Jacoby, pictured above, recently spent a three day pass in Ranger visiting with his wife the former, Miss Sue Gordon, his son, Ronald LeRoy, and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Jacoby.

S-Sgt. Jacoby arrived in the States, October 5th, from Italy, where he was a member of the 36th division, Company I, 142nd Infantry. He went overseas from New York in April, of 1943, landed in Oran receiving Amphibious and mountain training in Africa until the time of the Italian invasion at Salerno.

S-Sgt. Jacoby stated that, he believed, the fighting around Cassino and the monastery there was the hardest fighting his division had seen. He participated in the fall of Rome prior to his hospitalization in Italy several months before his return to the States. He was wounded in the leg by German shrapnel and is a holder of the Purple Heart. He was awarded the infantryman badge. S-Sgt. Jacoby is now at the Harnes General Hospital at Longview, Texas, but expects a 30 day furlough soon.

Soldier's Eyes Do All Right In Nicaragua

HILLSDALE, Mich. (UP)—When in Nicaragua do as the Nicaraguans do and it is the custom there to speak expressively with the eyes says Mrs. James O. Lindwedel of Hillsdale, whose husband wooed and won her despite the fact that he speaks no Spanish and she no English.

The 25-year-old soldier, a peace-time resident of St. Louis, met his 19-year-old bride in Managua, where her father is an attorney. After the initial party, he took her to movies, dances and dinners, being at all times expressive with the eyes. He brought along an English-Spanish dictionary for use in small talk, and occasionally an interpreter was present.

Mrs. Lindwedel—Clara Luz in Nicaragua—sadly admits that the interpreter was necessary at the climax of the courtship—to read the proposal Lindwedel had written on a slip of paper. After that, the dictionary was just in the way. Lindwedel, an orphan, anticipated his transfer back to the U. S., and sent his bride to Hillsdale upon recommendation of a buddy who has relatives here. She has become fast friends with the professor of languages at Hillsdale College and holds a war job in a factory.

SIXTH BOND DRIVE TO OPEN NOVEMBER 20

In preparation for the opening of the Sixth War Loan Drive on November 20, Cyrus B. Frost, Eastland county chairman for the drive, has issued the following statement:

The Sixth War Loan Drive starts on November 20 and closes on December 16, but credit will be given for all Series E, F, and G bonds that are purchased during the full months of November and December.

The national quota is fourteen billion, which is two billion less than the Fifth War Loan. The overall quota for the State of Texas is \$414,000,000. The overall quota for Eastland county is 645,000 and of this our Series E quota is \$255,000. Our overall quota for the Fifth War Loan was \$725,000, and our Series E quota was \$300,000 of the overall amount. During the Fifth War Loan we sold on the overall quota over one million, and on the Series E quota over \$400,000. So it will be seen that we have a smaller job to do for the Sixth War Loan than we did for the Fifth War Loan, and when we take into consideration the large peanut crop that is being raised and now harvested, and high prices that the farmers are going to get for the same, we should move into the matter of getting the Sixth War Loan over at an early date, and with the determination to make it an outstanding success, as we have done in all former drives.

At an early date the chairman of all the community committees, and representatives from all the banks will meet to break down and assess the individual quotas for all towns and communities in Eastland County.

We again solicit the interest and labors of all patriotic citizens to move forward to this task as has been so valiantly done in the past. The Germans are rapidly being driven from every conquered country; MacArthur is back in the Philippines; and our Navy is now clearing the Pacific Ocean of the last vestige of the Imperial Japanese Navy; additional great military results can be hoped for between now and Christmas and the fighting fronts, and let us here at home give all the boys and girls everywhere in the armed services a Christmas present en masse by putting over at an early date the Sixth War Loan.

H. L. Gipson, Jr., 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Gipson of Eastland, arrived at home in Eastland last Friday from overseas service. He is a corporal in the United States Marines and came home directly from Los Angeles, at which point he recently landed from Guam. He is on a 30 day furlough.

Gipson enlisted in the Marines on December 8, 1941, the next day after Pearl Harbor.

While in action on Guam Gipson was wounded twice and another time he narrowly escaped injury when a Japanese sniper fired at him from a concealed position on a hill overlooking the fox hole from which Gipson and his buddies were firing upon the enemy below. A bullet from the sniper's rifle struck Gipson's helmet but glanced off without penetrating far enough to seriously injure him, and struck his buddy just below him, passing through the flesh of one leg and drilling a hole in the bone of the other.

L. E. DAVENPORT LONG TIME RESIDENT DIES

Ranger, Texas Nov. 3 — Funeral services were conducted Tuesday afternoon at 4:00 o'clock at the First Methodist church in Ranger for Leonard E. Davenport, a resident of Eastland county for more than a half century. Rev. H. P. Johnson, assisted by Rev. A. B. English, was in charge of the services and arrangements were by Killingsworth's Funeral Home. Interment was in the Pioneer Cemetery.

Death came to Mr. Davenport Monday about noon and followed a long illness through which he suffered. Born in Coryell county, October 15, 1868, he had just recently passed his 76th birthday. He came to Eastland county in 1890 and for many years served as a peace officer in Ranger. He was a member of the police force during the days of Ranger's oil boom and in more recent years had been a special officer for the Lone Star Gas and Lone Star Producing companies. Through his services as an officer he acquired the name of "Sheriff" and it was by this name that he was affectionately called by all his friends.

Through his life of service to his community he was known for his steadfast adherence to what he believed right and his service as an officer was marked by this characteristic.

Shortly after coming to Eastland county he was married to Miss Florence Stephens and they recently observed their 47th wedding anniversary. To Mr. and Mrs. Davenport were born seven children all of whom survive him except one son, Robert, who died several years ago.

Besides his wife survivors are: three daughters, Mrs. H. O. Wood, of Ranger, Mrs. John Hamilton of Midland, Mrs. Ira Wolford, Ranger; three sons, John Davenport of Jacksonville, Fla., Mike Davenport of Graham, and Jack Davenport of Ft. Worth, and the following sisters and brothers, Mrs. W. L. Wilson, Mrs. Clem Ratliff and Miss Edna Davenport, all of Ranger, Fred Davenport of Eastland and Henry Davenport of Ranger. Ten grandchildren and four great grandchildren also survive him.

OIL, RAILROAD CENTERS GET CRUSHING BLOW FROM ARMADA

More than 2,000 American war planes bombed Nazi oil and rail road targets from the Ruhr and Rhineland to central Germany today in a smashing daylight follow-up of the RAF's triple night attack on Oberhausen, Cologne and Berlin.

A half dozen aerial task forces, numbering well over 1,100 Flying Fortresses and Liberators and 900 Mustang and Thunderbolt fighters, fanned out over the Reich for the great daylight assault. Allied forces clearing the Ger-

PARIS (UP)—The First U. S. Army opened a new offensive today in the sector of its deepest penetration of Germany southeast of Aachen and smashed forward nearly two miles to Vossenack, 28 miles southwest of Cologne.

mans from Walcheren Island on the approaches to Antwerp had the enemy backed into the northern half of the principal town of Flushing today and widened their beachhead on the west coast to at least 4 miles.

On the eastern front Russian tanks and infantry advancing across the open plains of Hungary on the last lap to Budapest neared Orkney, 24 miles south of the capital.

Eighth Army troops in Italy crossed the Ronco river in strength and reached the airfield outside Forli, junction point on the Rimini-Bologna highway, where stiff fighting is in progress.

About 500 British heavy bombers hit the Ruhr Valley factory and railway town of Oberhausen during the night, while twin engine Mosquitos attacked Berlin and the burning ruins of Cologne.

In the Pacific, Japan rushed air reinforcements into the Philippines from her dwindling reserves in the homeland.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur reported in his daily communiqué that Japanese air attacks on American shipping and troops at Leyte continued "light and ineffectual."

American ground forces on Leyte tightened their assault arc around the north coast town of Ormoc for an estimated 2,000 Japs in that sector.

Meats, Fats—Red stamps A5 through Z8 and A5 through F5, good indefinitely. The four red stamps validated October 29—total 40 red points will have to last for at least a 3-week period. No new red stamps until December 3.

Processed Foods—Blue stamps A5 through Z8 and A5 through W5, good indefinitely. No new stamps until December 1.

Sugar—Sugar stamps 30, 32, and 33, each good for five pounds indefinitely, sugar stamp 40, good for five pounds of canning sugar through February 28, 1945.

Gasoline—In states outside the East Coast Area, A-13 coupons in new "A" book, good for four gallons each through December 31.

Fuel Oil—Period 4 and 5 coupons and new period 1 coupons, good through present heating year.

Shoes—Airplane stamps 1 and 2 good indefinitely. Airplane stamps 3 becomes good November 1 and remains good indefinitely.

Off-Highway Gas Coupons Expire—Farmers and other non-highway gasoline users are notified by the Office of Price Administration that any "E" and "R" coupons, not serially numbered, expired November 1, and may be exchanged for valid ration currency at their local War Price and Rationing Board. The expiring coupons can be identified by two points: First, they have no serial numbers, and second, they bear the capital letters "E" and "R" with no number after them. Currently valid coupons bearing serial numbers are lettered "E-1", "E-2", "R-1", and "R-2".

More Children's Apparel on Way

America's consumers from six months to 16 years—not to mention their mothers will be cheered by the fact that the War Production Board has taken further steps toward allocating materials in its third infants' and children's apparel program calling for production and distribution of roughly 30,000,000 units from December 1 through next February 28. WPB has given priority assistance to producers to obtain cotton and flannelette fabrics. Outwear, pajamas and underwear are included in the current children's apparel program. Low cost goods of durable quality is stressed. The increased quantities of apparel are expected to be available to retailers during the first quarter of 1945. The first program, announced December 24, 1943, called for 24,852,000 garments and the second, on May 10, 1944, scheduled output of 24,781,000 units.

Clothing Controls To Protect Public—Public interest will require that War Production Board controls over leather and cotton textiles industries be maintained after the fall of Germany to guard against possible disruptive shortages in those fields, J. A. Krug, WPB Chairman, said. He cited considerable depletions of inventories of these commodities as a factor. "These basic commodities are in tight supply and will be protected through continuance of WPB directive powers and allocation controls after controls in most other fields have been abolished," said Chairman Krug. "However, even in these industries the controls will be removed as soon as production is seen too be meeting minimum essential civilian requirements." On the basis of current figures it would take some time after the end of the war in Europe to replace existing shortages and return to a minimum working supply level.

Planting Time For Strawberries Here, Says Agent

October 15 to November 15 is the best time to set strawberry plants in most sections of Texas, says Loma Faye Hearn, Assistant county home demonstration agent. If the planting survived the summer in good shape, take the largest and thriftiest "daughter" plants and put into a new location for next year's production. "Daughters" usually are those nearest the mother plant. Discard any having reddish brown spots on margins.

In choosing varieties, in central and north central areas of Texas, plant Klondyke, Ranger and Yellow's Resistant Blakemore. If possible sandy loamy soil for the planting site select a fertile, well drained, site. Plants should be spaced ten or twelve inches and not set too deep.

In home gardens five hundred to one thousand plants should bear enough for the table and for preserving. Usually one hundred plants is a safe guide. In preparing the soil, the site first should have a heavy application of well rotted barnyard fertilizer, broadcast, then plowed under and well pulverized. In areas of heavy rainfall, the soil should be plowed into beds eight to ten inches high and two to three feet wide. Where moisture is limited, it should be so prepared that irrigation can be used when needed. In sandy land where commercial fertilizers may be used put down and mix well into the soil five to six pounds of 5-10-5 or similar material per hundred feet of row space. Apply this at least two weeks before setting out the plants.

Lastly, keep weeds and grass under control.

Texas Falls Off In Supplying Men For War Jobs

AUSTIN, Tex. Oct. 23—A drop of 90,000 in total traffic flow through U. S. Employment Service offices during September, reception contacts in USES office in traffic from August, is responsible for Texas not being able to furnish its share of war workers to vital war jobs for the September-October recruitment pattern, C. E. Belk, State Director of the War Manpower Commission said today as he revealed that reception contacts in USES offices of 327,637 in August had dwindled to 230,969 in September.

The drop in traffic was not gradual, he said, but had seemingly shut-off the day following Labor Day. War Manpower Commission officials had expected the load to regain its former momentum by September 15, but that when it had failed to do so every recruitment device known to the Service had been brought into play.

Although traffic has begun to respond to the intensive recruitment campaign now being operated in all parts of Texas, Belk expressed doubt that it would pick up sufficiently to meet the Texas quota. He attributed failure of American armies to continue their spectacular advance in Germany directly to the shortage of trucks, heavy equipment, artillery, ships and other supplies.

Said Belk, "If civilian workers were as conscientious about taking war jobs as they are the returning veterans, we would have no problem. Of the 90,738 civilian workers referred to jobs in September, 60,071 accepted them. Whereas, of the 6,216 veterans who applied for work during September, 5,353 went into war plants."

Sees Postwar Boom In Sale Of Auto Parts

TOLEDO, O. (UP)—The immediate postwar period will offer the parts and service business of America's automotive industry the greatest challenge and opportunity in its history, says Royce G. Martin, president of the Electric Auto-Lite Co.

Martin, writing in the Exchange, its official publication of the National Exchange Club, believes

that motorists will want peacetime performance from their automobiles because new cars won't reach market until at least four years after the war's end.

"Americans will want to see what has happened throughout the nation during the war," he wrote. "They themselves will want to witness the scenic grandeur opened to them by the Alcan highway and the Inter-American highway."

"People actually will flow from Alaska to the southern tip of South America—in a family car. The itching feet of servicemen and women will not cling to familiar stamping grounds. They will want to see this great nation for which they fought."

Martin said it is "logical to assume" that present-day establishments will expand their parts' sales and repair services to meet the growing demand of the immediate postwar era.

SEAMAN ASKS FOR AND GETS PROOF OF HORNFROG STORY

That Texas men in service are consistent boosters for the home state is a well known fact and many stories to prove the fact drift back home.

But the latest comes from Miss Johnnie Hightower of the county clerk's office. Miss Hightower received a letter from one John E. Lee, seaman second class, whose address is the Fleet Postoffice, at San Francisco, and who hails from Weatherford.

Lee stated in his letter that in "bull session" one evening he told his outfit about the famed Horned Frog incident, and as he said, "the story, to say the least, brought quite a bit of skepticism." So to prove his story he asked for confirmation from county officials. He got it in a letter from the county clerk and her staff and immediately returned his grateful thanks.

Following is the letter which Lee wrote to Lee from the staff:

October 14, 1944
John E. Lee, S-2
CASU 52, Div. L
Fleet Post Office
San Francisco, California.

Dear John:

For centuries our world has been frequented by persons of a "Doubting Thomas" nature, who didn't believe most things—even after proof was offered. The habit of raising one eyebrow, thereby asking, "Do you expect me to believe that?" has been practiced even more extensively since the arrival in Texas of so many natives from various other of the United States. Why all the blame for bragadoecia has to be centered on Texans, we find it difficult to understand. The boys from Brooklyn are proud of "Dem Bums"—and tell us about it; the Wisconsinites are fond of their "cheeses"—and tell us about it; the Californians long to forever bask in the glories of their "golden sunshine"—and tell us about it. So, why can't we tell them about "Old Rip," the famous Texas Horned Frog? Here's the information:

The story goes that when the corner stone was laid for the Court House which was built in 1897, some mischievous school boys put a horned frog under some papers and other things that were put in the corner stone. The Court House was razed in 1928 when they were preparing to build the present Court House. When the story got around that there was a horned frog in the corner stone, and when the corner stone was opened, there was an immense crowd watching to see if it were true. Mr. Eugene Day says that he lifted the frog out and handed it to Rev. F. E. Singleton, then pastor of the Methodist church in Eastland; that the frog was perfectly flat when lifted out, but as soon as the air struck it, it blew up like a balloon. when he took pneumonia and died. He was embalmed, and now appears on display in a small casket in the lobby of the Eastland County Court House.

Your skeptical associates might also be interested to know that Old Rip, so far as we are able to determine, bears the distinction of being the only horned frog ever to be kidnapped! After he had been on display for a short while, an enterprising gentleman (?) confiscated the remains of the frog, and was well on his way to California (where he expected to make a fortune by exhibiting this unusual spectacle) before he was apprehended. Did any one ever kidnap a Wisconsin cheese? Or leave a Brooklyn Dodger in a corner stone for 31 years?

Now, we don't know what explanation a scientist would offer for this phenomenon, but we do know that many of the people who were there when it happened still say, "I saw it with my own eyes, and it's true!" and we believe them.
