ABILENE HAS AN \$85,000 FIRE

Walker-Smith Wholesale Grocery Store Completely Destroyed At Noon—Force Was at Dinner.

Abilene, Tex., Feb. 1.—At ten minutes after twelve o'clock Friday, fire was discovered in the two-story brick building occupied by the Walker-Smith Wholesale Grocery Company, and the building and entire stock were destroyed. The fire had gained such headway before the alarm was turned in, and before an entrance could be affected after the firemen reached the scene that they were powerless to do effective work, except to keep the flames from reaching adjoining buildings. It was a hard piece of work to keep the flames within the walls of the destroyed building.

The loss, is estimated by M. Whitteberg, manager of the Abilene house, on building and stock at between eighty-five and one hundred thousand dollars. The building was located at the north-east corner of Mesquite and North Second Sts.

So far as is known there was no one in the building except M. C. Kirk a clerk in the store, all side and back doors having been locked and the force, except Mr. Kirk had gone to dinner. Mr. Kirk would give out no statement to a representative of this paper.

Insurance was carried on both stock and building, but Mr. Whitteberg was unable to give the amount. J. Blackwell, vice president of the Walker-Smith Company, who is located at Brownwood, was notified of the disaster by telephone and will reach Abilene late this afternoon. Until a conference of those interested is held future plans of the company can not be given.

Chas. S. Miller Corrects Error Published About Ballinger In Bellville Times.

Mr. C. S. Miller, of Ballinger, in writing to his cousin, Mr. Carl Schauerhammer, complains about an article which appeared in last week's issue of the Times and says in part as follows:

That Bellville Times in quoting Dorberger made things appear worse than they are. Nearly every week some one who left here for east is coming back, and there is not a farm in the county that was cultivated the past few years that is not again being cultivated this year. So while a lot left others come in, they move about and change like blackbirds, but the farming and business goes on just the same. Wish you would tell the Times to correct their statement showing what I say. At present the prospects are fine, wheat and oats are looking better than I ever saw them at this time of the year. In 1908 we had such enormous crop it spoiled the people and they got too careless and extravagant, these past four years has been a good lesson to them, and credit and business conditions are now on a more solid basis than they ever were in, as far as real safety is concerned. Of course business is contracted some, in short all the wind and water has been squeezed out, and we are getting down to real values. I would never go back on old Runnels county, which in spite of its double drouth coming at same time, never the less is the best place in the state to live in, take it all the year around. Please put this up to the Times from me, because I do not want them to let a wrong impression of the county go unchallenged."

AUSTIN POKER GAME CREATES SENSATION

Committee to Investigate Gambling Charges—Other Legislative News.

Austin, Feb. 1.—The raid by Austin police on rooms in the hotel most frequented by lobbyists and legislators yesterday afternoon, and thirteen pleas of guilty for playing poker and nine arrest for crap shooting, has pushed every thing else off the boards and the gambling gossip is the sole topic.

JUDGE TOM PATTERSON.

FREIGHT WRECK.

The westbound passenger train Friday was four hours late on the Santa Fe, on account of a freight wreck near Goldthwaite that morning.

The wreck was said to be a right severe one but the greatest damage was done to the track that was considerably torn up by the cars and that was the cause of the long delay in the passenger service.

RETURNS HOME.

G. W. Worthington, of Columbus, Ohio, who had been spending the past month in Ballinger prospecting in this section with the view of locating himself and quite a number of other people from his old home section, left Friday afternoon for his home. Mr. Worthington was very much impressed with our county and says he feels confident of inducing many of his people to come to our section when he tells them of the conditions here, the mild winter, the two or three crops made each year and especially, he says, when the lands in our county are just as productive and in many instances more so, than their country and the difference in the price is so great that they could buy four or five times as much land here as in their country. He says he has found that the very best land can be bought here at from \$20 to \$40 when the same grade of lands in Ohio are selling for \$150 to \$250 per acre.

Mr. Worthington says he greatly enjoyed the winter in our county and can give his people some eye openers with reference to this county after he gets to see and talk with his people.

FIVE PRACTICAL FARM SCHOOLS, McASKILL'S PLAN

San Antonio, Tex., Feb. 1.—A system of practical agricultural colleges where actual farming may be taught will be installed in various sections of the state if the measure of D. A. McAskill, representative from this district to the Legislature, is passed. Mr. McAskill thinks that at least five practical agricultural schools should be established and he will devote most of his time during the session towards getting the bill through the Legislature. His plan has been endorsed by the Bexar County Farmer's Union and other agricultural and commercial organizations in this section of the state.

Bill Reported Favorably.

Austin, Jan. 31.—The house committee on constitutional amendments reported favorably Rogers' resolution ratifying the election of United States senators by direct vote. Favorable report also was made on Rogers' resolution providing for the submission of an amendment liberalizing the irrigation laws, and Campbell's plan to exempt all county and municipal bonds from taxation to improve the market for them.

Liquor Bills Reported.

Austin, Jan. 31.—Favorable report was made today on Spradley's uniform high license bill and Russel's bill making an express agent in local option territory take the affidavit of the receiver of liquor that he wants the liquor for his own use and is over 21 years of age.

Appropriation for Department

Austin, Jan. 31.—Governor Colquitt today signed the bill appropriating \$25,000 for the maintenance of the attorney general's department from now until Sept 1. This emergency appropriation bill is the first bill outside of the per diem and contingent expense bill to reach him and was passed in accordance with his message.

WRECK ON A. & S. DELAYS TRAFFIC

North Bound Train Out of Ballinger Saturday Jumps Track at Hatchel.

The six-thirty Northbound passenger train out of Ballinger over the A. and S., Saturday morning run into an open switch at Hatchel and the entire train was derailed. There were about two dozen passengers on the train, but most of them were in the rear car and no one was hurt. The greatest damage was in the delay of traffic and to the track. About 100 feet of track was badly torn up, and it was necessary to build a track around the wreck for the other trains to pass. The train coming south and due here at noon turned back when it reached the scene of the wreck and the mail and passengers were transferred and brought to Ballinger in autos.

The wreck is one of the worse on this road since its completion.

Austin, Feb. 1.—Representative Henry of Texarkana, chairman of the committee appointed by Speaker Terrell to conduct the investigation in regard to poker playing under the resolution introduced in the house yesterday afternoon by Lewellyn of Dallas, called a meeting of his committee to convene at 10 o'clock this morning. Both branches of the legislature adjourned until Monday. There will be a number of important committee meetings for the consideration of measures in both the house and the senate today.

Austin, Feb. 1.—A number new bills were introduced in a senate yesterday. Among them was a skeletonized appropriation bill carrying appropriations for all state eleemosynary institutions. An effort will be made to pass this apart from the appropriation bill. Lattin offered a bill providing that son shall not be sued on a contract outside his home unless, when he signs it, attention is called to this: he allows the waiver. Nowing offered a bill at a special suit to agree on a spot wherever it appears. Judge is warranted.

Woman Suffrage Favored.

Austin, Tex., Feb. 1.—The house Committee on Constitutional amendments reported favorably resolution providing for the submission of a constitutional amendment allowing woman suffrage. Kirby, Bruce and Buchanan gave notice of adverse minority report.

The committee also reported favorably an amendment requiring a man to be a fully naturalized citizen before he can vote.
