

Texan Dies Before Trip To Become Uruguay Envoy

BRYAN, Tex., May 22. (AP)—William S. Howell, 54, business man, attorney and veteran of the US diplomatic service, died early today, one-half hour before he was to leave for South America to assume his new post as US ambassador to Uruguay.

Dr. A. G. McGill of Bryan said Howell died of a heart attack. Shortly before 5:30 a. m. his stepmother, Mrs. W. S. Howell, called to awaken the recently appointed ambassador. Receiving no answer, she went to his bedroom and found him unconscious. A few minutes later he died.

Howell was to have left Bryan by automobile at 6 a. m. for New Orleans to take a ship to Montevideo.

Mrs. Rosemary McRae, a daughter, was to meet him at New Orleans and accompany him to Uruguay to serve as hostess at the US embassy.

Howell's death recalled the fatal heart attack suffered Feb. 6 by O. Max Gardner, 64, in New York, eight hours before he was to sail for England as US ambassador to the court of St. James.

A native of Bryan, Tex., Howell, a tall, blue-eyed, affable man, served in the diplomatic service from 1916 until 1935.

Funeral services will be held at the First Baptist Church in Bryan at 4 p. m. Friday, the same hour at which Howell was scheduled to sail from New Orleans. Dr. W. H. Andrew, pastor of the church, will officiate at the services. Burial will be in Bryan City cemetery.

At New Orleans, state department representatives were endeavoring to locate Mrs. McRae to inform her of her father's death.

Howell was educated at private schools and at the University of Texas. He practiced law in San Antonio from 1912 to 1916. In the diplomatic service, he served in London under Ambassador John W. Davis; in Mexico City under Dwight Morrow; and at Prague, Warsaw, Havana, and Panama. His last station was at Paris where he was chargé d'affaires.

In 1935 he resigned, and since that time he had divided his time between New York and Bryan, dealing in stocks, bonds, and oil.

Bar Of Reformed Reds In Union Offices Pondered

Leave Loophole
For Repentants,
Sen. Taft Urges

WASHINGTON, May 22.

(AP)—The question of whether a reformed communist ought to be permitted to hold office in a labor union went before Senate-House conferees today trying to compromise labor bill differences.

Senator Taft (R-Ohio) told a reporter it is the view of the Senate members of the conference committee that just because a man once was a communist is no reason for barring him forever from becoming a union officer.

"We want to leave some room for the man who has repented and seen the light," the Ohio Senator said.

House conferees were reported not too enthusiastic about defining a provision in their labor bill which bars from union office anybody who "is or ever has been a member of the communist party." The "ever has been" phrase was inserted on the House floor.

Both bills ban the certification of unions as bargaining agents if any of their officers is a member of the communist party "or by reason of active and consistent promotion or support of the policies and doctrines of the communist party can reasonably be regarded as being a communist or one who believes in overthrow of the government by force."

Taft said he still hopes the conferees can conclude their work this week, but some other committee members said they doubt any final agreement can be reached until next week. Lending weight to their belief was word that Chairman Hartley (R-NJ) plans a session of his House Labor Committee Saturday to discuss conference developments.

Incorrect Maps Cause Air Crash

MANILA, May 22. (AP)—Wreckage of a luxury air liner carrying at least 11 Philippine government officials and a crew of seven was found today on a mountainside on Mindanao. All aboard were believed dead.

Incorrect maps which show towering Mt. Katanglad in the wild Bukidnon Plateau region as 7,600 feet instead of its actual 9,300 feet apparently brought disaster to the plumb-lined, twin-engine aircraft on the mountain's cloud-obscured northern slope.

An American 13th Air Force B17 will fly to the crash area tomorrow to determine the feasibility of helicopter operations to speed the search for possible survivors of the wrecked plane.

Wreck Of Army Plane Kills Five

DAYTON, O., May 22. (AP)—Five persons were killed and two others were injured today when a four-engine army transport plane from Wright Field crashed and exploded in a field about four miles east of Dayton.

Names of the dead were withheld pending notification of relatives.

A witness said the plane appeared to be in trouble as it swooped low. Seconds later, the plane tilted on its side and plowed into a ditch, then hurtled into a wheat stubble field.

An explosion turned the plane into a mass of flames.

Wright Field officials said the plane, containing military personnel, was on a routine test flight.

Recommend Rise In GI Allowance

WASHINGTON, May 22. (AP)—Rep. Edith Nourse Rogers (R-Mass) chairman of the House Veterans Committee, said today that a subcommittee soon will recommend a boost in the subsistence allowance of veterans attending college under the G.I. Bill of Rights.

Mrs. Rogers appeared before the House Rules Committee to appeal for floor action on another measure which would permit an increase in the ceiling compensation for veterans participating in on-the-job training programs.

She and Rep. Ramsey (R-Ohio), chairman of the subcommittee, said a bill will be approved within a few days to give single veterans in college a subsistence allowance of \$75 a month rather than the present \$65. Married veterans, who now receive \$90, would get \$110 with \$15 extra for each child.

Mrs. Rogers told the rules committee that the present ceilings are so low that many veterans are refusing to participate in the program. She quoted Veterans Administrator Omar Bradley as estimating the increase would cost about \$149,000,000.

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Truman's Mother 'Doing Nicely'

GRANDVIEW, Mo., May 22. (AP)—President Truman's mother was reported "progressing nicely," today nearly 24 hours after she was placed in an oscillating bed for passive exercise.

Brig. Gen. Wallace H. Graham, the President's physician said 94-year-old Mrs. Martha E. Truman's "voice is strong" and that he felt encouraged by her continued progress.

Relaying Graham's remarks to newsmen at nearby Kansas City, Presidential Press Secretary Charlie G. Ross said the young medical officer saw no reason to retreat from his optimistic view yesterday that the elderly patient has a chance to recover.

The patient, co-operating with Graham's plea that she eat when she can had a fairly good breakfast, he reported and was "in good spirits."

The President, his wife and daughter, Margaret, were with the chief executive's mother.

Mr. Truman took along with him to the house a batch of official papers on which he worked during the day.

Measure Said Proof Of US Desire For Peace

Negotiations For Use
Of 400 Million
Fund To Start Soon

KANSAS CITY, May 22.

(AP)—President Truman today signed the \$400,000,000 Greek-Turkish aid bill setting in force a historic American foreign policy of bolstering weak countries against outside aggression as a "support" to the United Nations.

He called it "an important step in the building of peace" and said it offered "proof" that the United States will make "a vigorous effort to help create conditions of peace."

"The conditions of peace," he said, "include the ability of nations to maintain order and independence and to support themselves economically."

The measure, a far-reaching departure in international relations of this government, became law in a simple ceremony in a mid-western hotel with Mr. Truman's pledge it would not be used to benefit "any particular group or faction."

He announced that United States ambassadors in Greece and Turkey were being instructed to "enter into immediate negotiations" with the two governments for the expenditure of the funds, which he asked for March 12 to help halt the spread of communism in the near and middle east.

He expects to announce soon the appointment of an administrator of the program.

In his brief statement, the President called the measure "proof" that the United States earnestly desires peace and is willing to make a vigorous effort to help create conditions of peace."

Replying to the objections raised against it in congressional debate that it would "by-pass" the United Nations, Mr. Truman declared it would help further UN's aims, and added:

"Our aid in this instance is evidence not only that we pledge our support to the United Nations but that we act to support it."

The President originally planned to sign the bill in a White House ceremony last Monday. He cancelled this when his mother's serious illness at nearby Grandview brought him flying to her bedside.

Revising Fund Estimate Seen

AUSTIN, May 22. (AP)—Rep. Woodrow Bean of El Paso told the house today that Comptroller George Sheppard informed him he would revise his estimate of anticipated state revenue.

Later Bean told reporters he believed the revision would be from 30 to 40 million dollars up.

Bean, arguing against a resolution calling for final adjournment June 3, which the house defeated, said he didn't know "at whose insistence" the comptroller would revise his original estimate that state general fund income would be \$186,000,000 in the next two years.

Bean has been the leading new-tax advocate in the house. A comptroller's estimate of increased income would knock the props out from under arguments for new taxation, if the appropriations bills and estimated income can be kept in line. Such efforts are now being made in conference committees on the appropriations bills.

Smuggling Ring Said Sneaking Reds Into US

WASHINGTON, May 22. (AP)—Rep. McDowell (R-Pa.) said today a House un-American Activities subcommittee has uncovered evidence that a "ring" is sneaking communists from Mexico into the United States.

McDowell said the subcommittee also found "communism deeply entrenched in Hollywood and the movies."

Just back from California, the Pennsylvanian told a reporter he returned by way of the Mexican border to check on "tips and leads" regarding the ring.

"There is absolutely no question," he said.

"The un-American Activities committee is not concerned with illegal immigration, any more than with the numbers racket or cheating on income taxes."

"The immigration we are concerned about is that of people who come over our border to do something to our country."

He gave no details as to where the ring operates along the border or how many people it is getting across.

McDowell and Chairman J. Parnell Thomas (R-NJ) were members of a subcommittee which went to the coast for hearings on communism in Hollywood.

Mickey Rooney Sued By Former Wife

LOS ANGELES, May 22. (AP)—Actor Mickey Rooney, 26, one of Hollywood's highest paid actors, has been sued for separate maintenance by the former Betty Jane Rose, mother of his two sons and who, at 17, won the beauty contest title of "Miss Birmingham," Ala., of 1944.

She alleged the actor, who was divorced in 1943 from actress Ava Gardner after 18 months of marriage, used fraud in obtaining a property settlement with her, representing his annual salary as \$36,000 whereas it actually is approximately \$250,000.

Blood Count For Men Near Bikini A-Bomb Ordered

WASHINGTON, May 22. (AP)—The Navy announced today that a complete blood count has been ordered for all men still in service who took part in the Bikini atom bomb tests last year.

The order was described by a Bureau of Medicine officer as a "routine followup."

Secretary Forrestal directed order to all ships and stations that the checkup be made in an undisturbed place and made public today.

"It is directed that a complete blood count be performed on all personnel now on active duty who were attached to operation cross roads or the Navy Radio logical safety program," the order read.

"All cases of abnormal blood counts shall be repeated. Forward results of all examinations to Bureau of Medicine and Surgery with personal data as to full name, rate or rank, service number, location of examination and approximate time attached to operation Cross Roads and Radiological safety program."

Between 35,000 and 40,000 Navy men were in the vicinity when two atom bombs were exploded July 1 and 25 in the Pacific last year.

Police Capture Slayer Suspect

GREENVILLE, May 22. (AP)—Adrian Roark, 23, wanted in connection with the shootings of his wife and a cafe proprietor at Houston, surrendered to officers last midnight after they had poured a hall of bullets into the barn in which he was hiding, four miles east of Commerce, Hunt County Sheriff Fay Clifton said today.

Roark, unwounded, walked from the barn with his hands in the air and told the posse of more than a dozen Hunt and Delta county officers that "it got pretty hot in there." He was armed with a .32 caliber automatic pistol, Clifton said.

Tipped off the man's whereabouts, the officers went to the barn shortly before midnight and called for him to come out, the Sheriff related.

When he did not appear, they riddled the barn with bullets. Then Roark walked out, his hands in the air. He was taken to the Hunt county jail at Greenville.

Roark is wanted in Houston on two charges of assault to murder.

Patients In Soldiers' Home Are Stricken

WEST LOS ANGELES, Calif., May 22. (AP)—Some 500 patients at the Sawtelle Soldiers' Home were stricken last night with food poisoning, but an Army spokesman said today that none is in serious condition.

The spokesman, declining use of his name, said it had been determined that the tainted food was served at one of three noon messes in the home, but said "the cause had not been definitely isolated. All the men were affected by nausea, he added.

The Soldiers' Home, operated by the Veterans Administration, has a capacity of 3,500, most of them veterans of World War I and earlier conflicts. Only about 200 World War II servicemen are residents.

Ford Production Lines Are Watched

DETROIT, May 22. (AP)—Production lines at three big factories of the Ford Motor Co., being watched for any signs of faltering, rolled on today under the handicap of a foreman's strike.

As the walkout of approximately 3,800 organized supervisory men headed into a second day, its ultimate effect on production for a car-hungry America remained speculative.

Five Railway Unions To Bargain On Pay

WASHINGTON, May 22. (AP)—Five big unions prepared to bargain out their demands on the railroads under procedure which will delay any strike showdown for perhaps six months.

A. F. Whitney, president of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, told reporters:

1. The railroad labor organizations feel they have a legal right to call a "quick" strike any time after Sunday — but do not plan to do anything of the sort.

2. He believes his union and four others allied with it will agree to "start from scratch" under the time-consuming railway labor act in their new negotiations for changes in 44 working rules.

3. He thinks this should result in a settlement or a breakdown of negotiations by Nov. 1.

Whitney's statement at a combined dinner and news conference last night jibed with the stand of Alvanley Johnston, who said the same thing in Cleveland regarding his brotherhood of locomotive engineers.

Twenty other rail unions will follow these legal procedures as a matter of course.

There had been some doubt in the case of the trainmen and engineers, growing out of their 48-hour strike a year ago this week.

At that time the two unions had gone through all the steps required under the law, had taken strike votes, and gone on strike May 23.

The strike was broken by President Truman when he threatened to use the army to enforce his terms, which were a pay raise of 18 1/2 cents an hour, but no changes in working rules for one year.

Thieves Operate In Five Towns

Peace officers of five West Texas towns, including Big Spring, area co-operating in investigating an epidemic of early morning burglaries which occurred today.

A local combination filling station-grocery store was entered but a preliminary check showed that nothing was missing. Police theorized that the thieves had been frightened and fled before they could take anything.

Three business establishments in Coahoma — two filling stations and a grocery store — were burglarized sometime after 4 a. m. but investigating officers said each place missed only a limited amount of merchandise. The raiders twisted door locks to gain entrance to two of the places while a plate glass door was shattered at the other establishments.

Colorado City, Roscoe and Eoraine also reported burglaries of minor consequence.

"Peanut King" Dies

WILKES-BARRE, Pa., May 22. (AP)—Amedeo Obici, founder and president of the Planters Nut and Chocolate Co. of Suffolk, Va., and known in the industry as the "Peanut King," died last night. He was 69.

Obici, 69, was a prominent figure in the nut and chocolate industry. He founded the Planters Nut and Chocolate Co. in 1912 and served as president for many years.

He was a member of the National Association of Manufacturers and the National Association of Manufacturers.

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Labor Party Girds For Leftist Fight

LONDON, May 22. (P)—Labor party leaders, girding for a showdown with a leftist rebel bloc at next week's annual party conference in Margate, declared today that the aim of British-American understanding is to prevent war.

The ruling government, the ruling party's leadership said in a booklet published today, "does not propose to take sides in a lineup for the next world war."

The booklet, entitled "Cards On The Table"—a phrase much favored by Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin—was designed in part to disarm caustic left-wing critics of British foreign policy, who contend that Britain is snubbing Russia and aligning herself too closely with the United States.

Konni Zilliacus, one of the leaders of the "rebel" parliamentary delegation in the labor party, disclosed yesterday that five party units had drafted an anti-American resolution for submission at next week's five-day conference in Margate.

He said the resolution condemned US aid to Greece and Turkey as "a menace to world peace" and demanded a United Nations investigation of American policy in Turkey.

The leadership's new booklet, while critical of some actions of both Russia and the United States, rejected entirely the assertions of the "rebel" bloc that the British-American alliance was aimed at Russia.

"The really striking feature of world politics today is not that Russia is frightened of America," the booklet said, "but that America, with undisputed control of half the earth and all the oceans, is frightened of Russia."

"For Russia, which foresaw a struggle with America, Britain was not a possible ally, for Britain

could not under any circumstances adopt a policy which might lead to war against America.

"Apart from other considerations, Britain depends by sea and supplies imported by sea and could be starved to defeat in a few weeks by the American fleet (which is) six times as big (as Britain's)."

"The aim of an Anglo-American understanding is to prevent war by proving to Russia that an aggressive anti-British policy is doomed to frustration."

"As long as Britain plays a decisive part in the defense of American security, it is impossible for America to adopt a policy of world aggression without British agreement."

"The nature of the military co-operation between America and Britain makes it impossible for either to fight if the other remains neutral."

Miss Riley, runner-up to Mrs. Babe Didrikson Zaharias in the 1946 Trans-Mississippi, had easy going in her first two matches of this year's tourney at the Metairie Country Club here. Miss Pearson yesterday met the Kansas State champion, 18-year-old Marilyn Smith, and eliminated her 3 and 2.

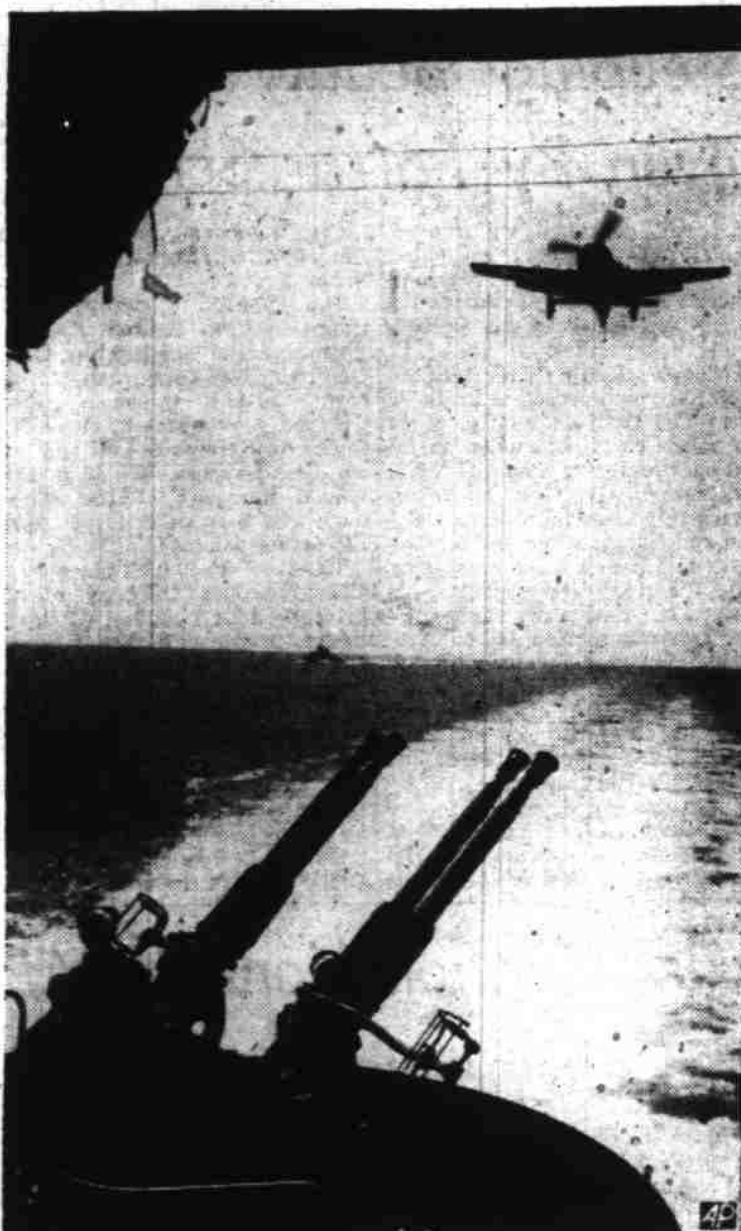

Negro University Directors Building On Permanent Basis

AUSTIN, May 22. (AP)—While Herman Marion Sweatt's legal fight to enter the University of Texas is in the process of adjudication, the directors of the newly-established Texas State University for Negroes are taking practical steps to give the colored youth of Texas a real university of their own.

They are letting the Sweatt case follow its own course, and meanwhile hope to have running full blast by September an institution of higher learning for Negroes that will afford the same educational opportunities now offered whites.

Some of the directors of the institution feel that the idea has become general over the state that the Texas State University for Negroes is only of an emergency or stop-gap nature.

They emphatically insist that such impression is entirely incorrect, and that they are taking both the constitutional and statutory mandates under which the institution was founded at face value to give young Negroes in Texas substantially equal higher education on a long-range basis.

Craig V. Cullinan of Houston, chairman of the Negro university's board of directors, recently endorsed a proposed constitutional amendment designed to give the institution a sound financial basis for such growth. He was speaking for the entire board of five whites and four Negroes.

The proposed amendment, by Rep. Jim Heflin of Houston, would assure general fund appropriations for the school in an amount equal to one-sixth of the income from the University of Texas permanent fund. This underwriting in the state's fundamental law would remove the school from possible future legislative whims, assuring the sort of continued financial support essential to sound, long-distance development in every conceivable field of higher education.

Just one week after their nominations by Gov. Beauford H. Jester had been confirmed by the senate, the bi-racial board met in Austin and named Cullinan chairman. A Negro, Principal Emeritus W. R. Banks of Prairie View university, was made vice-chairman. The members wasted no time digging in on the business of putting into effect the statute enacted earlier in the session of the legislature, under which a total of \$3,000,000 was appropriated for higher education of Negroes in the

next two years. They started plugging for enactment of another measure by Rep. Heflin, allowing them to accept lands, buildings and other property for the school. Cullinan said this would enable the directors to begin with a "going concern"—the physical properties of the Texas College for Negroes at Houston, which has a current enrollment of 1,800 students.

The directors are not worried about having students. They feel that a first-class institution of the kind they want to give the Negroes of Texas will draw as many students as it can handle. Cullinan believes most Texas Negroes want their own institution of higher learning, and that efforts to discredit the interim law school at Austin mostly stemmed from out of the state.

National Science Bill Considered

WASHINGTON, May 22. (AP)—The House Interstate Commerce Committee moved today to consider legislation establishing a national science foundation, and Senator Smith (R-NJ) said he will withdraw his motion to have the Senate reconsider the approval it gave such a bill Tuesday.

Smith, chief author of the Senate bill, told reporters he believes he can accomplish the change he desires after the House acts and the measure goes to a House-Senate conference to adjust differences.

Smith told the Senate he voted under a misapprehension, for an amendment, approved by a single vote, giving the President sole authority to remove the director of the proposed foundation. As originally presented, the amendment would have given such authority also to the proposed 24-member foundation.

The New Jersey senator said for such a government-financed research program to succeed the foundation itself should have control over its personnel as well as research projects.

WASHINGTON, May 22. (AP)—Rep. Worley (D-Texas) left Washington today after receiving word of the death in Shamrock last night of his father-in-law, Fred S. Oliver.

Bevin Sinned Against Fact, Paper Charges

MOSCOW, May 22. (AP)—The government newspaper Izvestia declared today that British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin's recent report to the House of Commons on the Moscow foreign ministers meeting was "a sinning against fact."

The article, which took up three-quarters of a page, declared that Bevin's statement did not represent a "proper presentation" of facts, and declared it could in no way be called a "report" on what took place in the Soviet capital.

The paper also accused Bevin of giving an improper account of conversations anent the proposed revision of the British-Russian treaty of alliance.

"Actually he said nothing about the real state of the Anglo-Soviet talks," Izvestia said. "The situation is that the British side introduced amendments in these talks which do not improve but worsen the present Anglo-Soviet agreement."

Izvestia added that the amend-

ments proposed by the British during the course of the talks, which were conducted coincidentally with the foreign ministers meeting, were "directed at weakening the obligations which exist in the original agreement."

Oiler Co-Owner Fined By Green

A \$50 fine has been assessed against A. D. Ensey, co-owner and business manager of the Odessa Oilers, by Longhorn League President Howard Green, according to reports received here today.

The fine was levied in connection with a disturbance during last Sunday's Odessa-Ballinger game played on the Oiler diamond. Ensey and Manager Stu Williams of Ballinger appeared at a hearing Wednesday in Abilene. Details of the disturbance were not made public.

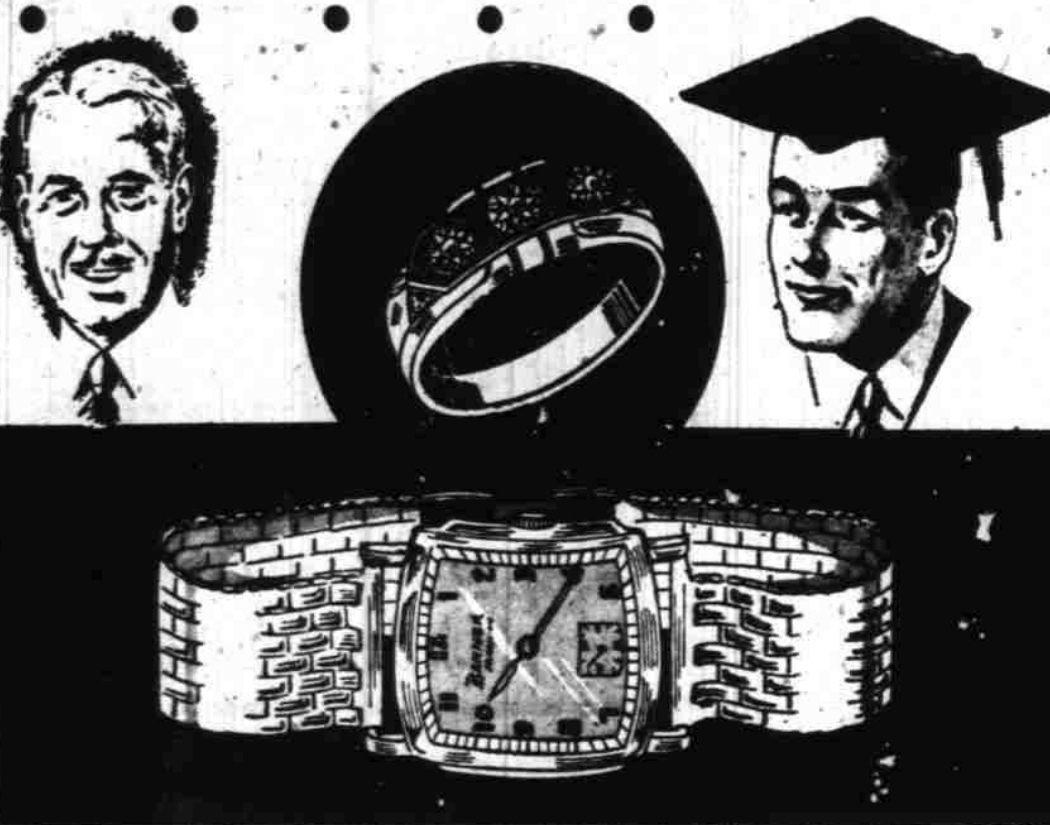

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Houston Third Biggest US Port

HOUSTON, Tex., May 22. (P)—Houston ranked third among the ports of the United States in 1946 and handled the greatest volume of business in its history, statistics received by J. Russell Wait, director of the port, from the United States Corps of Engineers show.

Houston's total tonnage last year was 31,837,458 tons, considerably greater than the previous high of 28,174,716 tons handled in 1939.

Ranking second to Houston, among Texas ports, was Beaumont with a total of 23,052,108 tons, while Port Arthur was third with 20,177,288 tons and Texas city fourth with 13,149,109 tons.

Galveston ranked seventh among Texas ports with 5,960,924 tons, being exceeded by Port Aransas with 10,199,061 tons and Corpus Christi with 8,517,518 tons.

Mansfield, Oldest Man In Congress

WASHINGTON, May 22. (P)—The oldest man in Congress and one of the most remarkable, is 86-year-old Texas Rep. Joseph Jefferson Mansfield, who became ill March 9 and was taken to the Bethesda Naval hospital.

His hometown is Columbus, Texas. Neither age nor the inability to walk have dulled the sense of humor and the cheerful, kindly disposition of this white-haired, Virginia-born Texan. He is truly beloved by Republican and Democratic colleagues alike, and they often testified in the House chamber of their regard for him.

Every man who has served in the House in the last 30 years has hailed him respectfully as "Judge Mansfield." He came here

in 1917, at an age when some men begin to think of retiring, after having served many years in public office.

Mansfield became a Texan at the age of 20, lured to the state by a land grant his father had received from the Mexican government prior to the Texas revolution. He worked first as a farm hand and laborer in a nursery, then as a baggage master and freight clerk. He was admitted to the Texas bar in 1886, was elected mayor of Eagle Lake in 1889 and county attorney of Colorado county in 1892. He was elected county judge in Colorado county in 1896 and served in that office 20 years.

He also established and edited a newspaper, served as vestryman in the Episcopal church, helped organize, and served as an officer in the Texas Volunteer Guards, and was Grand Master of Masons in Texas in 1912-13.

For the last 28 years Judge Mansfield was confined to a wheelchair. Page boys pushed him to and from the Capitol and the House Office building—through the subway that connects the two buildings.

Always sitting just below the Speaker's rostrum, he is a familiar sight in the House chamber. A small handful of individuals, however, can remember the Judge as he was when he came here.

About 5 feet 10, he was of athletic build and so active he seldom used an elevator, preferring the stairs if going only one or two flights.

In 1921 he suddenly suffered a paralysis. Since then he has had to use a wheelchair, but is so unsentimental about it and has such a radiant personality that not even those around him seemed conscious of this handicap.

During the 16 years the Democrats were in control of the House, from 1931 to 1947, he served as chairman of the important Rivers and Harbors committee. Credit goes to him, more than to any one other individual, for the development of inland waterways along the Texas and Louisiana gulf coasts.

His activities in development of waterways throughout the country led to a close and unusual friendship for years with the late James N. Stout of New York. The latter, two years older than Mansfield, died about four years ago.

A New York navigation and shipping authority, Stout came to Washington every weekend for years to play chess with Mansfield. Almost any Saturday or Sunday afternoon you could find them in a close game in the Judge's office.

For recreation now, the Judge goes for a Sunday afternoon automobile ride with his son, Bruce Jefferson Mansfield, a civilian employee of the office of Army Engineers. He knows well the historical background of all nearby Virginia and Maryland, and well he should, for he is a direct descendant of some of America's most distinguished families who lived in this area.

Born Feb. 9, 1861, at what is now Wayne, W. Va., but then Virginia, the "Dean of Congress" was christened Beauregard after the famous Confederate general. Mansfield's father, also a Confederate soldier, was killed in battle in the summer of 1861. When word of his death reached home, the name of the then five-month-old Beauregard was changed to that of his father, Joseph Jefferson.

Time rolls back swiftly when one considers these facts:

Judge Mansfield's paternal grandfather fought in the American Revolutionary War. His father, Joseph Jefferson Mansfield, was born in 1807. The father's mother was a cousin of Thomas Jefferson. The grandfather of the Congressman, on his father's side, was 17 when he fought against the British in the "US War of Independence."

Judge Mansfield's wife who died many years ago, was a member of the Byrd family of Virginia. Besides his son Bruce Jefferson, Mansfield has two daughters, Margaret Byrd Dorsey of Baltimore, Md., and Mrs. Jacquelin Amanda Schmidt, whose husband, Frank Schmidt, is county clerk at Seguin, four grandchildren, and one great grandchild.

Dollinger Shows How Investments In Education Pay

Wherever and whenever more money is invested in education, economic levels rise.

This was the thesis developed before a group of more than 50 administrators, teachers, and other citizens Wednesday evening by H. J. Dollinger, Dallas, assistant manager of the Southwest division of the US chamber of commerce, at the Settles. The meeting was sponsored by the chamber of commerce education committee, headed by Ted Phillips.

Dollinger told of surveys made by the US chamber of which resulted in the contention that money spent in education is a business investment. While the curve is not identical, it is more than regular, he said. In fact, according to Dollinger, the per capita income shows an even more pronounced increase over per pupil educational expenditures on the whole.

Studies so consistently developed the same picture, he continued, that it could not be dismissed as coincidence. He projected a number of charts to reflect the tie-in between educational expenditures and commercial activity, particularly in retail sales, national magazines, telephones, per capita income. Percentage of men rejected by selective service followed more the same pattern.

Dollinger paused frequently to answer questions and give explanations on various points. In the final analysis, he said, it gets down to an individual matter and therefore exceptions creep into the picture. Surveys indicate the same pattern is followed locally, by states and even internationally.

Democrats Push Drive To Delay Income Tax Cut

WASHINGTON, May 22. (AP)—Democrats pushed ahead today in a drive to delay senate action on income tax cut legislation and republicans admitted the outcome will be close.

Senators Byrd (D-Va.), Barkley (D-Ky.), and Tydings (D-Md.), were ready to take the floor to support a proposal by Senator George (D-Ga.), that consideration of the GOP-backed bill, already approved by the house, be held up until June 10 to see what the appropriation picture looks like.

Senator Millikin (R-Colo.), chairman of the finance committee, said the opposition could have all the time it wanted but he predicted the George move would be defeated.

Roosevelt papers — Senator Brewster (R-Me.), said today a senate committee and not private individuals should decide whether to observe an order by President Roosevelt that some of his papers should never be made public. Roosevelt's order is contained in a memorandum now in the hands of Brewster's war investigating committee which is demanding free access to the Roosevelt papers in connection with an all investigation.

Veterans — after week of delay the house rules committee agreed to look over a bill to hike wages and allowances for veterans training for jobs while working. However Rep. Kearney (R-N.J.) author of the measure told a reporter that if the committee fails to clear the bill for house action he will circulate a petition to take the bill from the group.

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Feathered Friends May Carry Sleeping Sickness Virus In US

BERKELEY, Calif. (U.P.) — The common sparrow, the yellow-headed blackbird and others among the nation's feathered friends are actually dangerous beasts because they carry the virus of encephalitis — deadly sleeping sickness.

That is the opinion of five scientists in the Hooper Foundation of the University of California's Medical School, published in the foundation's journal Science.

The virus of encephalitis, the report said, has been found in the mites of wild birds.

The report is the first evidence that the virus is carried by the mites and forms another link in the chain that has been forged by University of California scientists connecting wild and domestic fowl with the transmission and survival of the disease.

Annually, the disease takes a toll among residents of California's vast central valleys and other areas of the western states.

In their investigation, the scientists took mites from the nests of the yellow-headed blackbird and the English sparrow, the report said. Ground up and mixed in a fluid, the mites yielded western

equine encephalomyelitis virus which infects guinea pigs, hamsters and mice.

The new evidence indicates that the bird mites can transmit the disease, although the scientists said they have not yet attempted to accomplish it in the laboratory.

Previously, studies have shown that some common types of mosquitoes are able to transmit the disease to livestock and domestic fowl and presumably to man.

The scientists pointed out that the symptoms of encephalitis are in many ways similar to those of poliomyelitis in that the disease attacks the nervous system. Often it leaves its victims, particularly young children, with a permanent brain damage in the form of mental deficiency.

Bobby Soxers Say Parents Too Lenient

CHICAGO. (UP)—Parents are too lenient, some bobby soxers believe.

The youngsters say they'd have more respect for their folks if they would use the rod once in a while.

"Sparing the rod is just spoiling their chances for successful parenthood," Alice Loeb, 16, Chicago high school student said.

Alice and five other youngsters aired their views on the faults of modern parents at a conference on delinquency prevention. All agreed there would be fewer children in the courts if their parents showed a little more authority.

Bruce Drake, 17, Berwyn, Ill., said too many parents had lost their influence over children by failing to give them love and affection.

"They give them everything else, and think that's all that's required of them," Bruce said. "They don't even try to understand the problems of our generation."

Carol Lipsey, 15, Chicago, said over-indulgence caused children to wander in the wrong directions. "We really don't want everything we think we want," she said. "We need someone to tell us that."

In addition, Jasper Roy, 18, Chicago, said parents who demonstrated little affection for their offspring often tended to ridicule their ideas. As a result, the youngsters feel ill at ease when discussing their problems at home.

"The parents remember how they were raised, and won't change their ideas," he said.

If father would drop his evening newspaper once in a while and play a game of ball with the boys in the neighborhood, his stock would go up 100 per cent, Glenn Wolthausen, 15, Barrington, Ill., said.

"The old folks are too narrow," he said. "They haven't advanced a bit in 25 years. They'd still rather play pinochle than watch their sons play baseball on the high school team."

"It was among the effects of my father's best friend, Mark Bruno," Are you related to the composer?" Olefsky asked.

"I am the composer, but I've never heard the number," Miller answered.

So, amid stacked chairs, rolled scenery and instrument trucks, Olefsky sat down and played the composition Miller had written but never heard.

The man without a hat—that's the average Parisian.

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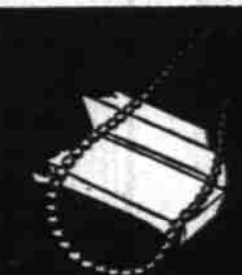

Diversion Of Brazos River For Texas City Water Is Proposed

AUSTIN, May 22. (P)—The consolidated hearing of surface water rights for the Texas City and Galveston area continued today before the State Board of Engineers with two applicants proposing diversion of Brazos river and a third applicant asking for permission to deliver San Jacinto river water.

E. V. Spence, chairman of the board, said the hearing would adjourn today and reconvene Monday. Yesterday, H. E. Whitaker, vice president of a New York engineer firm, testified that the American Canal company could deliver Brazos river water cheaper to Texas City and Galveston than could the San Jacinto River Conservation and Reclamation District.

He said that in 1950 Galveston could purchase Brazos water for about \$22.80 per million compared to about \$33.50 per million for San Jacinto water.

Earlier this week the San Jacinto district presented testimony that it would have exclusive rights in the Texas City area. Yesterday attorneys for the American Canal and the Galveston County Water company said if they received a permit they would have no objection to another company bringing water to the area. "Let the customers decide who they want to buy from," they said.

The third applicant for water rights is the Briscoe Irrigation company which now has a canal about 10 miles from Texas City. They would also divert water from 10 miles from Texas City. They would also divert water from the Brazos river.

Watermelon Bill Killed Because Of Plug Test

AUSTIN, May 22. (P)—Convinced that the only way to test a watermelon is to plug it, the House Agriculture Committee last night killed a bill calling for standardization of watermelons by compulsory inspection.

The bill was reported unfavorably 10 to 2. Presented by Rep. Don Peters of Cotulla, the measure would have provided for state and federal certification of watermelons through the state and United States Departments of Agriculture.

The bill would have required an inspection fee not to exceed \$6 per car lot, and would have made it unlawful to ship more than 1,000 pounds of watermelons without first obtaining an inspection certificate.

Proponents of the bill said that standardization of watermelons would build a better market at out-of-state marketing points, but opponents said standardization by inspection was meaningless.

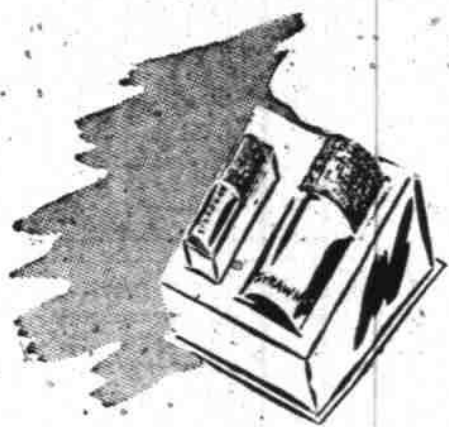
"It's impossible to furnish any evidence of the quality of a melon. You can't tell whether one is ripe without cutting it open, and then you can't tell the quality without tasting it," observed A. D. Richards of Floresville. He represented the Wilson County Farm Bureau, which he said included 800 watermelon growers.

WASHINGTON, May 22. (P)—Evidence of disloyalty to our government, of violations of civil liberties, of juvenile delinquency, and of the activities of professional bigots and other disrupters of American unity.

LOOKING 'EM OVER

With TOMMY HART

Coach Pat Murphy, straw boss of the Big Spring High school football team, is thinking of embarking upon a study of black magic in the hope of becoming a finished sorcerer by the time the 1948 season rolls around, either that or petitioning the local school board to let his charges play six-man ball.

If the eight-semester eligibility rule endures—and there is every indication the legislation is going to remain as is—Big Spring High will be hard spent to field eleven boys at one time, much less eleven who know a football from a tennis racket.

The Irishman, against the rule from the start, knew he would be hit hard in '48, when the new regulations take effect, but never realized he'd lose practically his entire 1947 squad to the ridiculous decree until he recently took inventory of the scholastic station of the members of his squad.

Of the 43 boys who will constitute the main Steer squad this fall, five will be lost in '48 because of their age. No less than 29 must drop out, even though most of them will not have finished their schooling.

because of the eight-semester clause in the Interscholastic League constitution. Of that 29, an even dozen are backs, two are centers, six guards, five tackles and four ends. He will be left with exactly one center, two guards, three tackles and four ends. No backs can return.

The average age of the squad will be something like 15 or 16 years, since the boy who is 17 or more has usually been in high school longer than eight semesters.

Boys who will depart the squad because of their age after next fall include Harold Berry, Sam Thurman, Eddie Houser and Jimmy Kirby. (Murphy had counted George Worrell in that bunch but George elected to get his sheepskin this spring.)

Athletes who will sing their swan song after next season because of the eight-semester clause, unless something immediately and drastic is done to vote out the legislation, include Harold Cain, James Fannin, Ike Robb, Delmar Turner, Corky McDonald, James Odom, Roy Pool, Joe Bailey, Donald Hale, R. H. Carter, Charles Seydler, Jerry Houser, Bobby Fox, Paul Shaffer, Pat Lamb, Billy Wheeler, John Currie, B. B. Lee, Jack Ewing, Dick Grimes, Bob Coffee, Charles Wright, Moe Madison and Bobby Hoberg.

Murphy well realizes he alone won't suffer, that most other schools will be hurt accordingly. His point is that the grade of football in the state as a whole will go down, way down.

He maintains the rule, in effect, does away with the 18-year age rule, that in reality most schools will be playing 15 and 16 year old boys. (Most other states allow them to play until they're 19.)

Inter-scholastic League officials attempted to explain away the action by maintaining the new legislation would stop the practice of boys remaining in school simply to play football.

Pat counters that the decision should be up to the parents and not the advisory council of the TIL.

Murphy points out that schools continue to get apportionment on scholastics until they're 18 years of age, regardless of whether or not they've graduated. He maintains it would be no more unreasonable to charge a student tuition who has remained in school longer than four years than it will be to rob him of athletic eligibility.

If that isn't enough to be blue over, Patrick learned the other day that Jackie Barron, regular quarterback on last fall's Steer team, will not be back in September.

Last year Leo Durocher set a record for "changing chunkers" when he used 380 pitchers in 157 games while managing the Dodgers to second place in the National League pennant race. That was an average of slightly less than 2½ pitchers per game.

But now mild-mannered, conservative Burt Shotton holds the Dodge reins and outdoes Durocher in the act of juggling hurlers.

In the Dodgers' 28 games to date, of which incidentally they've won 15, Shotton has used 81 pitchers, an average of 2.89 per game.

Shotton practically gave the pitching staff a vacation yesterday when he called upon only two hurlers to subdue the submerged St. Louis Cardinals 4-3 in 10 innings. Left-hander Joe Hatten opened up for Brooklyn and was replaced by Fireman Hugh Casey, who went on to gain his third victory of the season.

In dropping their 15th game in the 19 times that the opposition had started a southpaw against them, the Cards sunk deeper into the cellar, seven and a half games away from the top.

Cookie Lavagetto, veteran Dodger third sacker, broke up the game with a run-scoring single in the 10th, starting and losing pitcher Harry (The Cat) Brecheen.

The Chicago Cubs recaptured first place by shading the Philadelphia Phils 2-1 in Wrigley Field. They lead the New York Giants by nine percentage points. It marked the Cubs' fifth straight win over Philadelphia, all by one run.

Frank Shea, rookie right-hander of the New York Yankees, gained his first major league shutout, and his fourth triumph by outpitching the mighty Ritz, Hal Newhouser, of the Detroit Tigers 5-0 before 49,844 Yankee Stadium fans in a night game.

The victory snapped a three-game losing streak for the Yankees and whittled Detroit's first-place American League margin to a half game over the idle second-place Boston Red Sox.

Handcuffed for seven innings, the Philadelphia Athletics came to life in the eighth with a five-run rally against rookie Pete Gebrian and two successors to defeat the Chicago White Sox 5-2 in a night game at Philadelphia. It was Chicago's first loss in the last five games.

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Cleveland Arc Tilt May Be Transferred

CLEVELAND, May 22. (AP) — President Bill Veeck of the Cleveland Indians will decide today whether he will transfer tomorrow's scheduled game with the St. Louis Browns to League Park from Municipal Stadium, which has been transformed into a quagmire by construction work on a midjet auto racing track encircling the playing field.

Confronted with a warning from American League President William Harridge that the game would be forfeited to the Browns if the Indians were unable to provide a suitable playing field, Veeck said he would switch the game to the Indians' former home because "we're in the thick of the pennant race now and can't afford to lose a game on a forfeit that we've got a chance to win."

Tomorrow's game is scheduled as a night affair but the game would be played in the daytime if transferred to League Park, which is not equipped for lights. He said a crowd of approximately 50,000 was expected for the Tribe's first night game of the season, and that the club would lose money by switching to League Park, which seats approximately 28,000.

Legislators Moan They're 'So Tired'

AUSTIN, Tex., May 22. (AP)—Members of the House and Senate are tired of working.

They tell each other how tired they are of working.

They tell members of the press how tired they are.

But not enough of the legislators are so tired of working that they will agree to set a date for the session to end.

Some members say they won't agree to go home until a tax bill has been passed to take care of the deficit which the state apparently will face if all the essential appropriation measures are finally passed.

Comparing the amount of money which the state comptroller estimates is available for spending with the total of "must" appropriations as now drawn, that deficit will be in the neighborhood of \$41,000,000 plus.

A showdown on the issue of more new taxes or no new taxes will probably not be reached until conference committees have worked out compromise appropriation bills agreeable to both houses.

Essential money bills yet to be agreed on by House and Senate are for state departments, higher education (senior colleges and universities), eleemosynary institutions, junior colleges, and vocational education.

Some persons believe that a revised estimate of potential income for the state general revenue fund—coupled with further slashing of

pending appropriations—might bring revenue and spending close enough together that the comptroller would feel justified in certifying all the essential bills.

If the comptroller should certify these bills, advocates of new taxes would lose their best arguing point.

Meantime, the legislators keep reminding one another that they are tired of working.

The Senate, which has been indicating its attitude very strongly by entertaining filibusters almost daily this week, adjourned in the midst of another filibuster yesterday afternoon.

Sen. T. C. Chadick held the floor for two and a half hours as he talked against a bill allowing common carriers in intrastate commerce to require the shipper to place a stated value on shipments of household goods or office furniture.

In the House, stalling tactics were used against Sen. Fred Harris' bill to abolish corporal punishment in the state's institutions for boys and girls, and consideration of the measure was finally postponed until Monday morning.

Some representatives viewed this as tantamount to killing the bill, in view of the lateness of the session.

There was bitter House debate of a resolution giving House and Senate permission to adjourn following today's session until Monday.

Rep. Jimmy Horany of Archer City noted that the House had worked only two Fridays during the session and had put in only 72 actual working days out of 128 days since the session began. Rep. James Sparks of Sherman said his resolution was merely permissive—the House could stay in session Friday if it so desired.

DAR Delegates To Mark Ballots By Hand To Elect New Officers

WASHINGTON, May 22. (AP)—Delegates to the DAR convention, who had their troubles with voting machines at the last election three years ago, mark their ballots by hand today for rival slates of National officers.

There are two tickets in the running, one headed by Mrs. Roscoe C. O'Byrne of Brookville, Ind., and the other by Mrs. Stanley T. Manlove of Newburgh, N. Y., the candidates for president general. In all there are 38 candidates for assorted offices in the Daughters of the American Revolution.

At their 1944 triennial election in New York, the delegates voted so many blanks on that mechanical contraption that it took three days and several returns to get their officers named, survivors of the ordeal recalled.

Tellers assembling at the voting booths in Continental Memorial Hall at 7:30 a.m. had been advised by Mrs. Frank L. Nason of

Boston, Mass., chairman of tellers, that they were three for Thursday lunch, dinner, maybe a midnight snack and possibly Friday morning breakfast.

There were indications it would be a close election, possibly with winners from both tickets. It would have taken a mechanical gadget to have recorded the difference in applause given opposing candidates for some offices at the nominations last night.

There was a possibility that the elections might result in a challenge, depending on an interpretation of the by-laws as they affect vice president general candidates from the same town.

Mrs. Charles C. Haig, nominee on the Manlove ticket for first vice president general, is from Washington, D. C., as is Mrs. Roy Clement Bowker, one of nine nominees for vice president general at large.

The by-laws read that only one vice president may be elected from

any one state or the District of Columbia. The organization has 21 vice presidents, of whom three are considered "in the cabinet" as first, second and third vice presidents.

Of the other 18, six are named annually, some months ago the parliamentarian, Mrs. Hampton Fleming, interpreted the by-laws to mean that only one vice president candidate of any description could be elected from a state or the District of Columbia.

Nobody seemed to be sure what will happen if both Mrs. Haig and Mrs. Bowker win. They belong to different political factions within the DRA.

Both Mrs. Manlove, as recording secretary general, and Mrs. Haig as treasurer general, have served in the administration of the outgoing president general, Mrs. Julius Y. Talmadge.

The students are striking for increased food allowances and in protest to changes in curriculum.

Texas Animal Trainer Seeks Passage For Seven Elephants, Three Pythons

MADRAS, India, May 22. (AP)—For two hot months, Buck Reed, American animal trainer, has been waiting in Madras for a ship to take him back to Texas with his seven elephants, three pythons, 150 monkeys—and Peer, the brother of Sabu, the movie actor.

Buck, whose official name is L. E. Reed, lives in Gonzales, but he has been on the road with circus shows so much of the time that he hardly knows which town

to call his own. His older home is Chatman, New York.

But those seven elephants and 150 monkeys—they are eating all the profit out of Buck's animal trip to India. It costs about 100 rupees a day for food and pay for seven mahouts. (The rupee is worth about 30 cents, US).

And what seven lucky mahouts they are, including Peer, the brother of Sabu. All are going to the United States with Reed, but then they are coming back at Reed's expense, unless some Hollywood promoter snatches them away to fame and fortune the way it happened to Sabu.

All the animals except the monkeys came from Mysore State, Republic of France at its embassy for brother, but Reed said that was perhaps because he had continued to live as a Mahout, which is tough life without much profit. Sabu, he said, used to get eight rupees a month as a Mahout in Mysore.

In the movies Sabu probably earns eight rupees a minute while he is acting. Reed said Sabu's relatives in Mysore do not hear from him very often.

Reed is keeping his animals in the Madras zoo and the zoo is very glad to have them. It means they have a free attraction without any cost, because Reed pays for the Mahouts, for the food and all the attendants.

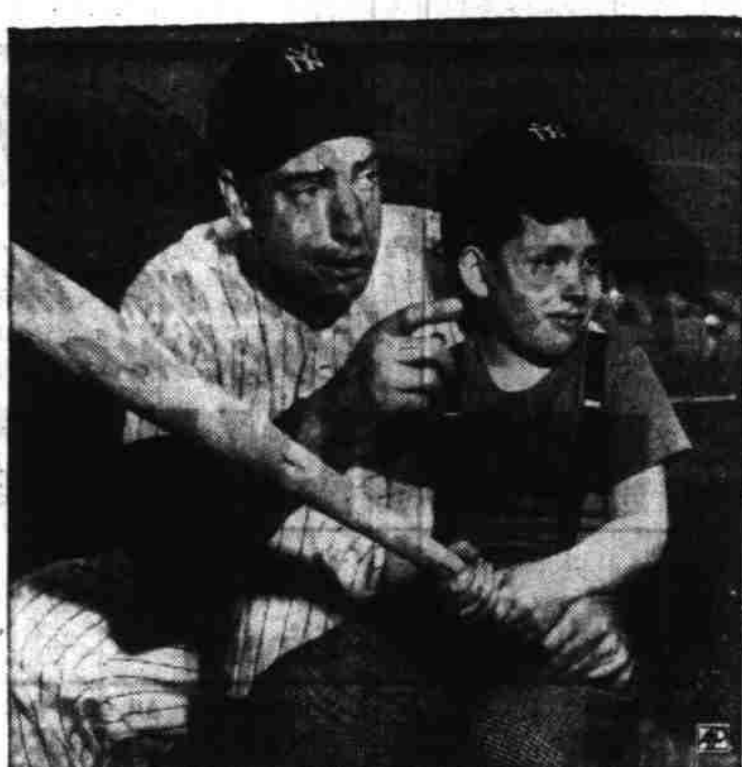

20-Inch Pipe Line For West Texas Refineries Slated

TULSA, Okla., May 22. (AP)—The Oil & Gas Journal reported today that a group of oil companies "headed by the Shell interests" was planning construction of a 20-inch pipe line to carry crude oil from West Texas fields to refineries in California.

The project would be the first crude oil pipe line linking oil supplies east of the Rocky Mountains with the West Coast.

Present plans, the Journal said, call for the line to originate at Midland and to terminate at Wilmington, Calif., where six refineries with a combined capacity of more than 225,000 barrels daily are located.

Time for the start of construction was said to depend on the availability of steel pipe, now in short supply.

According to Journal, tentative plans indicate the line would move 150,000 barrels of crude oil daily.

WASHINGTON, May 22. (AP)—Carl A. Marzani testified today that he selected 15 of 300 possible targets for the 1942 Doolittle raid on Tokyo—first air strike on the Japanese capital.

Marzani, on trial charged with concealing Communist affiliations in obtaining a federal job, testified his name is written over 18 factory sites on the map designating targets for the attack.

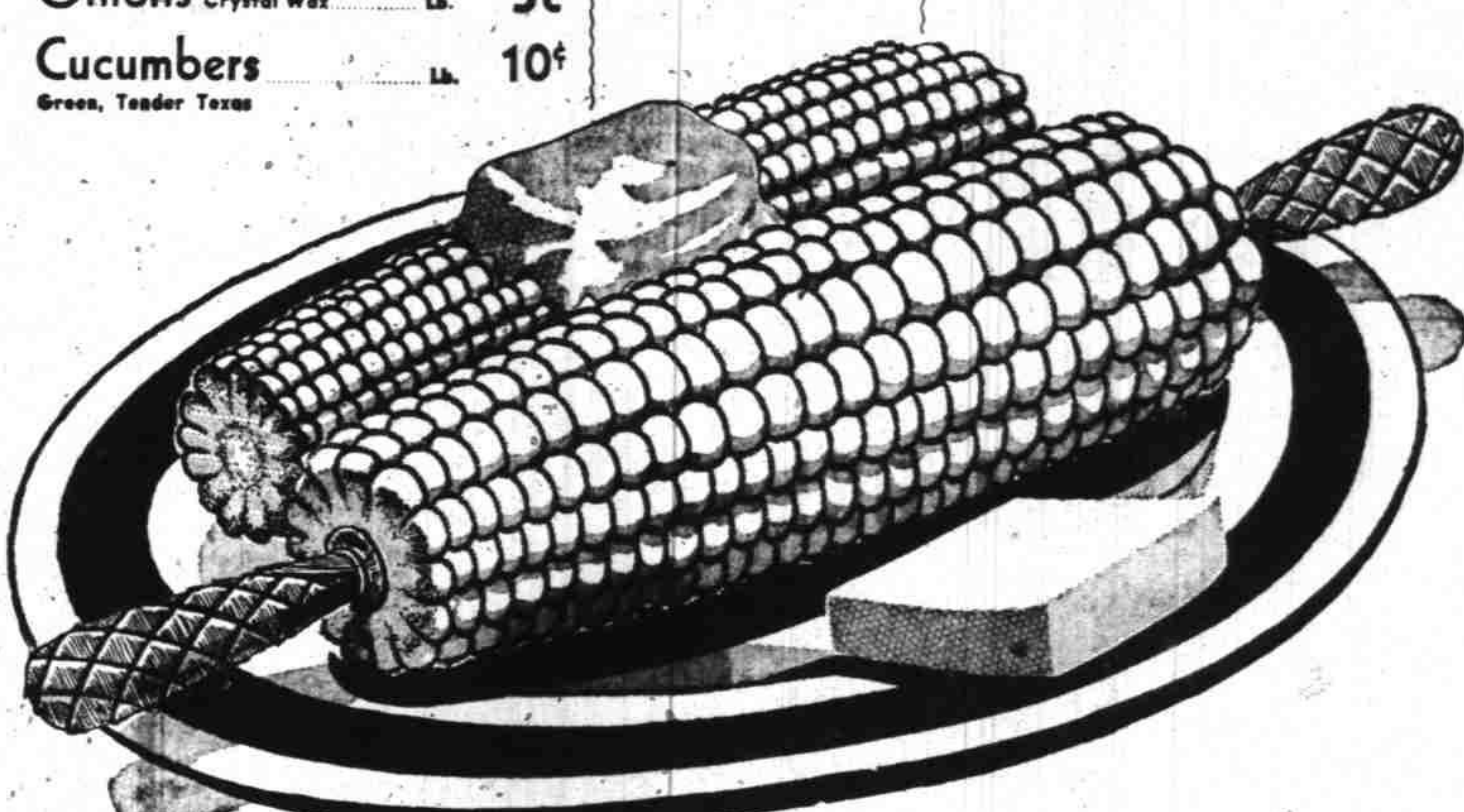

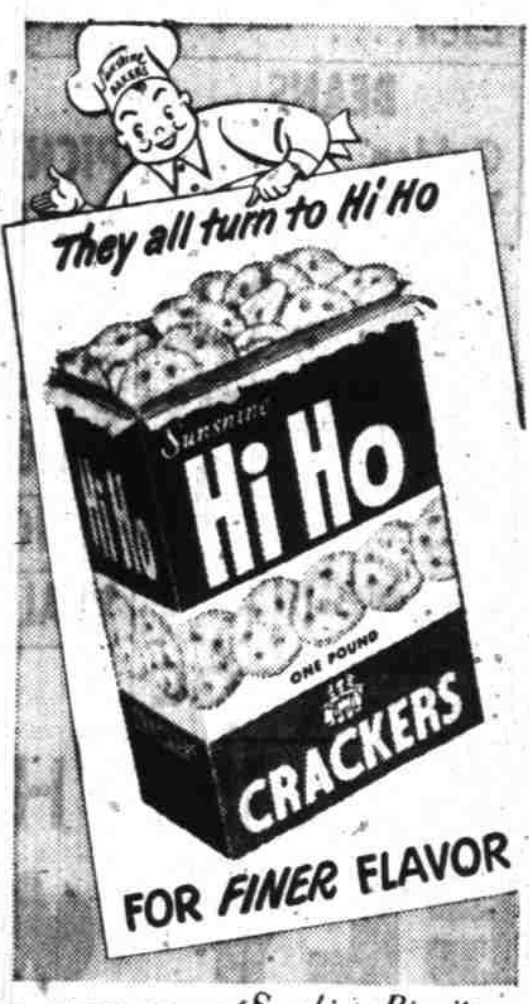

Two Religious Groups Seeking Border Control

BELFAST, Northern Ireland.—A battle of the auction marts and real estate offices is being waged between Protestants and Roman Catholics seeking control of the border counties of Ulster—the northern part of Ireland which remains within the United Kingdom. In Fermanagh and Tyrone, where the rival creeds are fairly evenly divided, each side is striving to retain ownership of farms and town property. The Protestant say that Roman Catholic organizations are always in the market for Northern Ireland farm-lands which are subsequently rented to tenants of that faith, thereby increasing the Catholic vote in the community. Behind this is the implication that the Roman Catholics are seeking sufficient votes to gain approval for ultimate reunification with Republican Eire, they say.

For their part, Protestant interests planning to retain farms in

"loyal" hands have for ten years been operating a private fund to give similar aid to members of their faith in County Fermanagh. Another fund is being started in Londonderry city where Protestant Unionists are concerned at the extent of Roman Catholic penetration.

(The "Unionists" are those rooting for union with Britain; those favoring unity of Ireland are Nationalists.) Hints by Nationalists that Government money is being used to support the Protestant funds are denied by Unionists, who claim that such action is impossible. The possibility of legislation to control sales also is dismissed as being beyond the powers of parliament. "This is a private fight and the Government has nothing to do with it," declared a leading Unionist MP.

Rhyming Signs In Portland Are Rejected By City

PORTLAND, Ore. (U.P.)—Portland is a poor place for poets.

Take it from Ben F. Hines, traffic safety director, who spent his time making signs that rhyme to keep the cars in the right line, so people won't have to pay fines or have axles lifted off their spines. The city discarded Hines' signs in the second phase of a "decline in the arts," which first started when police arrested a Reed College student for reading poetry in the moonlight.

Hines' job was to keep automobiles and pedestrians from climbing all over each other at intersections. Portland was a quiet city until the war brought shipyard workers in droves.

Hines got out his rhymes and signs, put them on 550 street corners, warning: "Gaze both ways." "Be alert or get hurt." "C sharp or B flat"—this little gem had musical notes drawn on it.

The first phase of the decline of the arts, as removal of Hines' signs is called amongst Portland's poets, was the arrest of a Reed College war veteran student for reading Keats on the streets. The veteran was run in. That started a moonlight "rebellion" among students, who began reading by moonlight all over the place.

The second phase of the decline, it was reliably reported, came when Hines devised a sign to scare pedestrians with a likeness of "Lena the Hyena."

Hines figured that Lena's kisser, dramatizing the horrors of traffic accidents, would be a bell-ringer. But it was turned down. Hines refused to consult the muse any longer and all pedestrian signs have been removed and the pedestrians and cars left to their own devices.

Coahoma Student To Get Diploma

Howard J. Hitt, Coahoma, is among 163 seniors and graduates who will receive diplomas for bachelor's and master's degrees Monday in commencement exercises at East Texas State Teachers college at Commerce.

Hitt, majoring in education and minoring in agriculture and history, will receive a master of science degree.

Slump In Factory Jobs Reported

WASHINGTON, May 22. (P)—The Bureau of Labor statistics reported today that an April decline in industrial employment and a poor showing in the construction field "point to soft spots in our economy which will need careful watching."

The slump in factory jobs was the first since the reconversion low in February, 1946, said a report by BLS Commissioner Ewan Clague.

Clague did not join those economists who predict that a recession soon will bring widespread unemployment.

"We are on a crest, but the crest may be a plateau on which we may stay for some time—perhaps a year or two," Clague told reporters.

Greater Latitude, Responsibility

The 6-3 decision of the supreme court in reversing a libel conviction of three Corpus Christi newsmen establishes a greater latitude for comments on litigation while actually under trial.

Although the case was similar in many respects to the celebrated Miami case, the court's ruling does extend and more clearly establish the premise that news matter and editorial comment are privileged even during the course of a trial except that they might prove an imminent threat to the administration of justice.

Heretofore, it has been established in the courts and their actions were proper fields for comment after the litigation had been decided. The Miami case put a wedge into the premise that this did not include

litigation actually being heard. The Corpus Christi case is a clear ruling on this point.

It is, however, not a blanket license for unbridled criticism of courts, either before or during litigation. The press is liable, should it foment conditions which would create the imminent threat to the administration of justice.

With this development, the press is fronted not only with greater latitude and clarification of its freedom, but also with a sense of responsibility on the point. No public servant ought to be utterly secure from public censure at any instant. The press, however, should be temperate in the exercise of this right of censure so it may be perpetuated.

Training Not Pulled Out Of Hat

During this week naval reservists in Big Spring are attempting to focus attention on the need for a healthy backlog of trained minds and men.

While this represents only one branch of the military, none can gainsay its importance, not only individually, but also because it represents the whole of the defense machinery.

Although the organized reserve does participate in active drills as opposed to the volunteer reserve, the emphasis placed upon technical training makes sense. This is a day of diabolical cunning, which, unhappily, ascends quickly to a zenith in time of conflict. The world as a whole is not yet awake to the cataclysmic possibilities of another armed conflict. Too many people seem to think that these pre-

dictions and prevues—even the accomplished fact that the first crude atomic bombs are of incalculable force in explosive power and radiation—are the hallucinations of a Jules Verne or comic book creator. Unfortunately this is not the case.

All of this points to the inescapable fact that should another war flare—and God forbid it—it will be fought with minds and devices. The ability to operate the defense mechanisms which may be developed as time unfolds is something that cannot be pulled out of a hat overnight. No matter how willing the human heart, learning, more than conditioning, cannot be produced instantly. The only time to do this is before the need arises—not when it is upon us.

National Science Foundation Planned

WASHINGTON, (AP)—The Senate has just approved setting up a national science foundation.

This is its purpose:

1. To build up a big supply of trained scientists, particularly by helping educate young people with scientific brains.

2. To do basic research in many fields. For example: to find the cause and cure of cancer.

The foundation won't become a fact unless the House also approves. It's expected to vote soon.

Money? That would be decided later. Some senators talk of letting the foundation have \$20,000,000 to \$30,000,000 a year.

Spend how? This way:

1. As loans or grants to colleges, universities or other organizations to start or carry on research work.

2. On scholarships for young men and women to continue

their scientific training. They'd be chosen on ability.

Many scientists, educators and others have urged congress to set up this foundation. It would work this way:

1. There'd be a top governing board, appointed by the President, of outstanding people in science, medicine, engineering, and so on.

2. From those 24, nine would be chosen as an executive committee to do most of the board's work, leaving the major decisions to the board.

3. There'd be a director, working full time. The board and executive committee members would only meet several times a year.

4. There'd be special divisions, headed by experts, in such fields as cancer, heart disease, biology, national defense, and so on.

The division experts, knowing their special fields, would know what kind of research work was needed most.

They'd make recommendations

to the executive committee and the board for final decisions.

Suppose the foundation decided to put a lot of effort into finding the cause and cure of cancer.

With its money, it could start some special research jobs going or help out some universities where scientists already were working on cancer.

Through exchange of information on work being done, it could save scientists from duplicating one another's work.

But the foundation couldn't dictate to scientists what work they should do.

The foundation's job would be in research. It would have nothing to do with treatment. For example:

It might pay for finding a cancer cure but not for giving the cure to cancer victims.

Once the cure was found, giving the curing treatments would be up to doctors or hospitals. The foundation wouldn't pay for that.

Development Of Africa Discussed

British military authorities in London disclose that the projected withdrawal of England's main Mediterranean and middle eastern defenses to East Africa is to be accompanied by an economic, social and political development in Africa which will be "truly historic."

Hot on the heels of this momentous statement we see British, French and Belgian colonial administrators meeting in Paris to discuss a program for intensive development in southern, central and equatorial Africa. They tell us that this great project is to be started at once.

All this has been got under way without blare of trumpets. Indeed it's only now we get a close-up preview of a vast enterprise that is calculated to strengthen a British empire which some gloomy prophets have said darkly was breaking up. This prediction has been voiced more persistently since mighty India with her four hundred millions has been granted her independence, thereby removing one of the brightest gems from the imperial crown.

Winston Churchill said a few

days ago that Britain would continue to play a leading role in world affairs, "albeit not in the full stature of former days." He added: "It is my unquenchable faith that if we have hard times ahead—we shall come through the difficulties in the end."

I don't think we can quarrel with such an estimate, always provided as indicated in yesterday's column—England doesn't forget that her fate as a sovereign democracy is linked with America's.

The term "breaking-up" isn't an apt one to use in connection with the changes in the British empire. It is undergoing a metamorphosis which thus far has resulted in dividing it into two parts—the British commonwealth of nations comprising sovereign states and the empire (including the dependencies). These two divisions complement each other.

There is a question of whether India will want to remain within the commonwealth when her independence has been formalized. However that may be, Britain has scattered around the

globe many great and potentially rich colonies which are inhabited largely by primitive peoples. In the ordinary run of things these colonies must remain within the empire for many decades before they will be capable of self-government.

It is to some of the most important of these colonies that England now is turning vigorous attention, judging from the London announcement. Within British East Africa, British West Africa and British South Africa are a large number of colonies, totaling hundreds of thousands of square miles and inhabited by many millions of Africans.

These possessions contain rich natural resources and there are great tracts which are prime for the growing of cotton, tobacco, rubber, peanuts, and many other products, as well as for cattle raising.

Thus when England has weathered her present economic crisis, and has set the wheels turning in her richest colonies, she should do well for herself. As Churchill says, she will continue to play a leading part in world affairs.

'Don't Fret About Sex, Dinwiddie!'

HOLLYWOOD, (AP)—"What did Chloe Glockenspiel do that was so bad?"

"Stop fretting about sex, Mel-corn Dinwiddie!"

"If you were Sophie Hossenspeffer, would you keep the throttle open? This, roughly, is the type of catchword that has been used in recent months to induce customers for certain movies. It is a device that has been exploited since the early-day flickers, and Rosalind Russell now speaks up against what she considers its over-use."

Roz is in a position to ponder such weighty matters, since she now has her own say-so on how her vehicles will be sold to the public. Resting on the "Mourning Becomes Electra" set, she opined that people should be better informed about the films they are going to see. Too often they emerge from a theatre saying, "That wasn't at all what they said it was going to be."

"The selling campaign," she observed, "seems to be aimed at one particular group. Sometimes

it is the bobby-soxers, and sometimes it is adults. The exploitation seems to confuse, rather than explain what the film is about."

"The actress said that pictures should be explained to the public in an effort to interest all groups."

Speaking of Semantics, or the science of words, brings us to another matter. Semanticists would have a field day in Hollywood, where words often are used strangely.

One thing that has always intrigued me is the way signs are worded to discourage visitors on movie sets. There is the plain "no visitors," which is the signal that anybody can enter. Even the lowliest B film posts the simple "no admittance," and pretentious productions blatantly proclaim, "no admittance with-

or without a pass." Neither carries much weight. The prize is on the Goldenly lot. Its rambling prose:

"Keep out. It is very embarrassing to ask you to leave the set."

A 'House Dick' Talks

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP)—Hotel guests are getting more honest.

"Since the war they don't take so many towels and sheets," said W. H. Howard, a veteran house detective. "About all we lose is soap now. The souvenir collectors aren't much of a problem."

Like so many "house dicks," Howard, a fatherly man of 63, is a former law enforcement officer. Hotels prefer for their "works" elderly men with a background of police experience because they have learned how to handle embarrassing situations with tact and diplomacy.

Howard carries a police revolver but has never had to use it. He walks from five to ten miles a night during the ten hours he is on duty. But his patrol is better than an outdoor beat. He never rains in a hotel corridor and rugs are a degree gentler than concrete pavements.

Being a hotel detective is an interesting life, although the pay is generally small.

"There's hardly a night that something new doesn't turn up," said Howard, such as the evening he met a soldier who cut one end off his pillow and dreamily shook it out the window just to watch the feathers float down. In Howard's opinion the soldier belonged to the poetic rather than the criminal type.

He said that most guests are easy to deal with and only about one a day in a 500-room hotel try to beat the bill.

His chief duties are three fold: to protect guests from their own carelessness, catch and evict occasional sneak thief prowlers and "see that the help doesn't run off with the hotel."

Howard has four simple rules which he thinks all guests should

observe in hotels for their own welfare:

1. Be sure to lock your door before retiring or leaving your room.
 2. Don't smoke in bed.
 3. Check the location of the nearest fire escape before retiring.
 4. Don't form new acquaintances among other hotel guests unless you know who they are.
- "If you observe those rules," said Howard, "you can be sure of waking up in the morning safe with your money still in your pocket."

Fletcher Called Lobbyists' Protege

WASHINGTON.—With housing the No. 1 need of the nation, the real-estate-building-and-loan lobbies continue to be more active than ever to block any kind of public housing. Here is a sample of how the back-stage boys operate.

Last November, the Republicans elected a new congressman from San Diego, Calif.—Charles Fletcher, who is also president of the Home Federal Savings and Loan Association. Immediately following his election, Morton Bodfish, ace-lobbyist for the building and loan associations, skillfully contrived to get Fletcher appointed to the banking and currency committee.

Ordinarily no freshman congressman rates this key committee, but Bodfish, with long experience in pulling the right wires in Washington, managed it just the same. And having been put in this pivotal place, here is how Fletcher is reaping dividends for his building-and-loan-ers.

Chat Paterson of the American veterans' committee was testifying before the banking and currency committee against the "Bodfish-inspired" legislation whereby emergency war housing built by the government would be sold largely for cash and to the big real-estate operators. Paterson proposed instead the cities and veterans' groups be able to buy this war housing for low-income tenants. This brought an immediate objection from building-and-loan executive Congressman Fletcher.

"Socialized housing!" he exclaimed, adding that he was against Senator Taft's idea that the government should help low-cost housing because private enterprise has failed.

"I represent the statement that private enterprise has not done the job," continued Fletcher. "It has not had a chance to do the job. The President has not turned loose the controls. This committee is even now working on legislation..."

ORGY OF RACETRACKS
"But the bill you are proposing," interrupted AVC's Paterson, "would allow a new orgy of racetracks and commercial construction at a time when controls to channel scarce housing are desperately needed."

"Most of the controls on housing were removed last year," he added. "We were promised that private enterprise could do the job. Instead we find housing starts reaching new lows."

"I remember, too, that just a year ago, when I appeared before the committee in support of OPA, members of the committee were confident that private enterprise could bring down the cost of living if price controls

were removed—and look what's happened since."

"It is the rankest sort of propaganda to say that private enterprise has been given a chance to succeed," retorted Fletcher, hotly.

Paterson then invited the San Diego banker-congressman to visit some of the slums near the Capitol.

"A rank idea of how well private enterprise has succeeded would be given by a trip to the slum areas of the United States which were built without government controls. Let me show you some of the areas right around Capitol Hill. They were built long before there was any sort of government control."

"As veterans we favor the provision of publicly owned housing for those who cannot afford decent, sanitary and safe housing. We support Senator Taft's view on that."

"Well, I don't agree with Senator Taft," snapped the gentleman from San Diego.

TELLING TRUMAN

President Truman heard some frank talk about his domestic and foreign policies during the latest "thought clinic" held at the White House with Democratic party bigwig from Colorado, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming.

Bluntest of the group was Mrs. James H. Wolfe, national committee-woman from Utah, who told the President that many voters were against the Truman doctrine, and that some people were worried because military men are getting high posts in government.

In general, western Democratic leaders gave their blessing to the Truman doctrine, but emphasized that one of the most effective ways of fighting communism was by a liberal democracy at home.

"We've got to lead the world in this," spoke up Colorado State Chairman Eugene Cervi. "If we have a dynamic and liberal democracy here at home, that is the best possible antidote to the spread of communism, Mr. President. Our own economy must be a blazing beacon if you expect to make the principles you have espoused a living thing in other countries."

Cervi said he saw no reason why the Democratic party could not have a "left wing," provided it was not a "communist left wing," but was composed of progressive elements who are "true liberals."

Truman said he agreed, but asked: "That brings up the old question—What is a liberal?"

He said he had always considered himself a liberal, adding:

"Nobody objects to true liberal-

ism, but communism is not liberal in any sense of the word. It is strictly totalitarianism."

There were laughs when Cervi quickly responded: "I know you are not trying to put me in the position of defending communism, Mr. President. I am equally opposed to it."

WITCH-HUNT

Both Cervi and Mrs. Wolfe of Utah expressed concern over the prospect of a witch-hunt which would discourage liberals from serving in the government.

"We are not going to have a witch-hunt," replied the President. "The liberals won't get hurt so long as I'm around. Remember that communists are not liberals. They are very conservative people serving conservative masters."

This caused New Mexico's ag-governor Jack Dempsey to remark: "Do you remember how the Republicans called us communists when we introduced old-age pensions and social insurance?"

"I sure do," replied the President. "And when they weren't calling us crackpots?"

"I sat on the war and means committee when the social security bill came up," continued Dempsey, "and watched every one of the 14 Republicans on that committee vote against the bill. But now they're all for it."

Dempsey told Truman that the people of New Mexico were for his foreign policy 100 per cent.

"Last year," he said, "the folks thought you were doing a good job carrying out someone else's program. Now that they know you're carrying out your own program, they're even more pleased."

"We can't go along with Governor Dempsey that the people of Colorado are for your foreign policy 100 per cent," said Colorado National Committeeman Barney Whitley. "But the great majority feel you're on the right track and you can count on Colorado supporting you for re-election in 1948."

This was obvious bait to get Truman to admit his candidacy for re-election. But the President ducked.

"I'm interested in the country," he replied, "and I'm interested in doing the job I've got to do now."

He then made a final plea for foreign-policy support.

"If we had spent just one billion dollars after the First World War on preventive medicine," Truman said, "we could have saved some 250,000 lives and from \$250,000,000,000 to \$350,000,000,000."

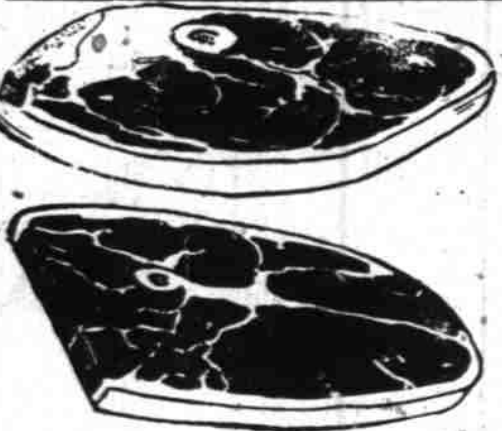

'Food-Line-Itis' Suffered In Britain

LONDON—Any woman in Britain will tell you that daily food shopping—with the queuing and carrying that it involves—is a mild form of torture, and the British Medical Journal agrees.

Short Order Suppers Can Be Specialty Of Yours

A fine, old-fashioned meat pie, its juicy goodness, hasting and bubbling under a crust of golden biscuits, is now minute-made by today's busy housewife who combines yesterday's roast with pantry staples to produce a masterpiece. This short-notice main dish can be whipped up in a trice by combining 2 cups diced left-over beef, 1 cup diced cooked carrots, 2 medium onions quartered and cooked, 1-8 teaspoon pepper, 1 11-oz. can condensed vegetable soup undiluted, 1-2 cup water. Pour into casserole, top with a ring of unbaked biscuits and bake in very hot oven (450 degrees F.) 20 to 25 minutes. Serves 5.

Are short-order suppers a specialty of yours? Can you face drop-in company at dinner time without being phased? Does the news that your husband is bringing home an office pal on wash day find you cheery and poised with an expandable menu in mind?

It takes a skilled and adaptable housewife to meet emergencies like these. But she needn't be a veteran at the job. Even a bride, with some forethought and a few good recipes tucked up her sleeve, can turn the trick.

First off you need to keep a small stock of canned staples on hand all the time. Storage room is at a premium these days, so only the most important and all-around useful foods, such as canned condensed soups, should be

given precious space. With a well selected variety of these on hand—say, cream of tomato, vegetable, cream of mushroom, cream of green pea, chicken noodle, gumbo creole and the like—a hurried housewife can work more menu magic in a matter of minutes than Houdini could do tricks.

Did you know, for instance, that a few cooked peas, added to thickened condensed chicken noodle soup and served on toast or waffles makes mighty satisfying main dish eating... or that an epicure's rarebit can be conjured from condensed cream of tomato soup... or that a great delicacy with authentic fire and flavor comes from an undiluted can of gumbo creole soup heightened with chili powder and tomato ketchup? We suggest you clip the recipes below and add them to your file of miracle menu plans.

BEEF BISCUIT PIE

2 cups diced leftover beef
1 cup diced carrots, cooked
2 medium onions, quartered, cooked
1-8 teaspoon pepper
1 11-oz. can condensed vegetable soup without meat, undiluted
1-2 cup water.
Biscuit dough based on 1 cup flour

Combine all ingredients except biscuit dough. Pour into casserole. Roll and cut 5 biscuits. Arrange on top of vegetable mixture. Bake in very hot oven (450 degrees F.) 20 to 25 minutes. Serves 4.
