2 New Cisco Industries Being Placed in Shape

Site for the construction of the plant of the Cisco Clay Products company — first brick and tile company to be organized in Cisco — is now being prepared, President R. W. Swan of this organization, announced.

Material for the buildings is being obtained and placed on the site and a bulldozer is cutting a road and shaping the site for the buildings which will be located near the Texas and Pacific tracks on the north side of the N. D. Gallagher tract, immediately east of the city.

The company hopes to be in production by August.

Meantime machinery for the second plant for the manufacture of building materials from Cisco clay — the Stout Brick and Tile company — has been ordered and a site for this plant will shortly be announced. Forrest Stout of Odessa is active head of this firm, which will also be located on the Gallagher tract.

Legion to Sponsor Supervised Recreation This Summer

John William Butts Post of the American Legion will sponsor a city-wide program of supervised recreation for children of school age—7 to 18—in Cisco this summer.

A meeting of the members of the Post Friday evening overwhelmingly approved the program, which is in line with the Legion's national policy of combatting delinquency by supervised play.

The program will start June 1 and will include all kinds of games for youngsters up to the age of 18. Soft ball, volleyball, tennis and hardball will be included and in some of the events regular competitive schedules will be followed.

Among the teams to be organized will be an American Legion junior baseball team, with a player age limit of 17 years. Uniforms for this team will be furnished by local business houses, whose advertisements will appear on the suits.

O. V. Overall, high school basketball coach and assistant football coach, will supervise the recreation program. Announcements on procedure for enrollment in the program will be made shortly in all the schools, it was said.

A special committee consisting of H. R. Garrett, H. A. Bible, Paul Poe, Oran Clark and Hal Wagon will select the grounds to be developed into play areas. The practice field at Chesley park will be used for hardball play.

In general charge of the program will be a committee consisting of E. L. Jackson, Frank Walton, Quincey Lee, G. C. Rosenthal and H. E. Ashton.

The finance committee will consist of Charles Spears, chairman; Nick Miller, James McCracken, H. N. Lyle and Jack Anderson, and the publicity committee will be Jack Lauderdale, chairman; Miss Lela Latch, A. R. Allen, O. S. Leveridge and Bob Elliott.

To raise additional funds for the program the Legion will sponsor a carnival to be held May 16, 17 and 18 at D avenue and Third street.

It is hoped to develop this program into a permanent institution of supervised recreation in Cisco, members of the Legion said. Cooperation of other organizations in Cisco which have an interest in juvenile activities is requested in making the program a success.

WASHINGTON, April 27. — President Truman and the top administration leaders tonight manifested alarm over industrial repercussions of the soft coal strike as labor officials planned strategy for ending the 27-day-old walkout.

As Mr. Truman wrestled with mounting reconversion problems aboard the presidential yacht Williamsburg, production officials painted a discouraging picture of industrial slowdowns caused by the strike.

Informed sources pessimistically forecast the possibility that the mine walkout may last another two to four weeks.

But Secretary of Labor Lewis B. Schwellenbach was trying hard to get vitally needed coal production going sooner.

He will meet with bituminous operators at 3 p. m. Sunday and will call on producers and John L. Lewis to resume negotiations on Monday or Tuesday.

Anthracite Strike Looms.

HAZELTON, Pa., April 27. — John L. Lewis departed for Washington today armed with full power to sound a strike call, if necessary, to pursue higher demands for higher pay, less working hours and, principally, creation of a health and welfare fund for Pennsylvania's 75,000 anthracite miners.

Authorizing filing of a thirty day strike notice April 30, the 450 delegates to the convention at the close of a three-day session here listed contract proposals but refrained at Lewis' behest from specifying exact terms.

No Warning Flares Were Dropped For Unscheduled Stop

CHICAGO, April 27. (U.P.)—James Tangney, flagman on the ill-fated Burlington railroad advance flyer which was rammed by a Burlington streamliner Thursday with the loss of 44 lives, testified at a hearing today that he did not drop warning flares when the train made an unscheduled stop just before the crash.

Under questioning by S. L. Fee, Burlington general superintendent and Gordon Morris, of the interstate commerce commission, Tangney said he did not drop flares when the train slowed down and did not set in operation oscillating warning lights on the rear of the train.

25 States Return to Daylight Saving Time Today

WASHINGTON, April 27. — Daylight saving time will go into effect at 2 a. m. Sunday in six Eastern states and portions of 19 others.

Twenty-three states and the District of Columbia, however, will not observe the time change.

States which will push timepieces ahead one hour on a statewide basis are New Jersey, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Rhode Island, Vermont and Connecticut.

Those states where communities will make their own decisions on the subject are New York, West Virginia, Illinois, Minnesota, Florida, Michigan, South Carolina, Kentucky, Missouri, New Mexico, Indiana, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, Ohio, Louisiana, Delaware, Oregon, Maine and Maryland.

Russia Has Hopes of Getting Grip on Dardanelles

MOSCOW, April 27. (U.P.)—The Soviet press today angrily raised the Turkish question again and significantly recalled that the Big Three are already in agreement that the Montreux convention governing the Dardanelles must be revised.

The press charged that Turkey has violated the Montreux agreement.

It was considered no coincidence that the Soviet press blast coincided with the meeting of the Big Four ministers conference in Paris.

Reds Bargain Hard But Agree to Less on the Showdown

PARIS, April 27. (U.P.)—Russia tonight yielded on her demand for one-third of the Italian fleet and agreed at the Foreign Minister's Council meeting to a compromise giving her less than a quarter of the former Fascist warships.

The new concession came during a three and a half hour discussion of terms of the Italian peace treaty at the third session of the Big Four foreign ministers.

Vatican Broadcast Paints Awful Picture of Red Zone

LONDON, April 27. — The Vatican radio, citing a "report" of an unidentified eyewitness, charges that 50 Germans are dying each week in camps in the Russian occupation zone of eastern Germany amid widespread conditions of disease, plunder, starvation and criminal assault.

"The German press is not allowed to mention the extent of the suffering," declared the broadcast. "Only the church has the power to raise its voice before the world."

"Many of the priests who have shared their bread with the refugees are too weak to celebrate a service. Added to the great physical suffering is the great spiritual burden. There is no food, no blankets, no medicine, no nothing."

"In camps built to accommodate 2,000 to 4,000 some 50 people die each week."

The broadcast said children in the area were suffering and that cries for help were going up from "girls and women who are being brutally raped and whose bodily and spiritual health is completely shaken, so that they are unable to give birth to a healthy child."

Says OPA is Most Catholic Bishops Important Fascist Say Military Control is Two Harsh

WASHINGTON, April 27. — Sen. Joseph H. Ball, R., Minn., today denounced the OPA as "the most important single collection of American Fascists we've got."

Ball, frequently an administration supporter when most other Republicans line up in the opposition, said he probably would vote for all of the amendments which OPA officials contend would cripple the agency.

He called the OPA Fascist "because they don't believe in freedom." He charged that OPA has sought to impose its control on the economy of the country instead of regulating prices of scarce items to prevent runaway inflation.

"If we could confine OPA controls to rents and a few commodities that are short in supply — and write standards that would prevent them from squeezing the life out of American business — then I'd probably vote for its extension," Ball said.

HUGE BLACK MARKET.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., April 27. (U.P.)—One of the nation's biggest black markets in suits and nylon has been uncovered with the arrest of four men — one a former minister — charged with stealing \$200,000 worth of merchandise from railway express shipments in at least six states, police announced today.

WIESBADEN, Ger., April 27. — Catholic bishops of western Germany will protest to the Allied control council in Berlin against the alleged harshness of occupation laws, which they call a danger to Germany's future, military government authorities said today.

A military government spokesman said also that a letter criticizing military government policies in western Germany — the American, British and French zones — was read on Easter Sunday from the pulpits of the German Evangelical church.

The spokesman said the Catholics had planned to read a letter of similar content written in stronger language, but refrained from doing so at the request of the military government.

Military government authorities requested the Catholics to withhold reading their letter on grounds that it would ignite unrest "and possible riot." They said it might cause disorders.

UP TO BIG FOUR.

NEW YORK, April 27. (U.P.)—Diplomatic sources said today that the Spanish question may have to be thrashed out at the Big Four peace talks in Paris in view of the apparent inability of the United Nations Security Council to reach agreement on what to do about the Franco regime.

He, it is said, has been largely responsible for converting the natural optimism of Truman from a return-to-normalcy hope to an attitude of accepting the Washington picture as one of continuing crises. Mr. Truman listens to Mr. Snyder because he has known him long and learned to believe in his counsels.

Tenting together always has made firm friendship. What battle-born companionships stemming from the present war will emerge in the future to rule the nation? It's a safe guess the leaders of twenty or twenty-five years from now will be men who fought the nation's fight in this war, and that many friendship teams will hold the reins of power.

If the world's food crisis is "worse than it has been painted," and it is honest Herbert Hoover that says so, every grown-up in this country should be ready to take in his belt a little. And even the children may want to help, in ways that can be done without hurting their health and growth.

Or in blunt American, to produce what the world needs, and live in peace.

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"BAPTISM."

All Denominations common to our Southland, at least, practice baptism. It is true that there are differences of opinion as to what constitutes baptism, and as to the purpose of baptism, and as to the subjects of baptism, but all believe baptism to be authorized in the scriptures. All can agree completely who will go, "To the law and to the testimony" (Isa. 8:20), and "Speak as the oracles of God. (1 Pet. 4:11). The element of baptism is WATER. (Acts 10:47; Acts 8:36). MUCH water is necessary to scriptural baptism. (John 3:23). Baptism must be preceded by FAITH, REPENTANCE, and CONFESSION. (Acts 8:36-37; Acts 2:38). It is performed by both the candidate and the baptizer "going down into the water" (Acts 8:38) where the baptizing takes place by a "BURIAL" (Rom. 6:4; Col. 2:12) followed by a "raising up to walk in newness of life." Those who do this may well "go on their way rejoicing" (Acts 8:39) in the promise of Jesus who said, "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; . . ." (Mark 16:16). But some good folk do not believe this to be necessary. Then the rest of the passage is a warning to them for it says, "He that BELIEVETH NOT SHALL BE DAMNED" (Mark 16:16). Remember, friend, Jesus is "The author of eternal salvation unto all them that OBEY Him." (Heb. 5:9).
