DENVER OFFICIALS ON WAY HERE CHINESE DISORDERS SPREAD OVER NEW AREAS

AMERICANS AND JAPS USE GUNS TO KEEP PEACE

U. S. SAILORS HURT FOUR ATTACKERS; JAPANESE WOUND PAIR

(By The Associated Press)
Further disorders and continued spread of the area affected by the nationalist movement marked developments over the week-end in China. American and Japanese blue jackets were involved in fighting with Chinese at two widely separated points.

The Americans, charged with guarding the steamer Chinese near Chungking, in the upper Yangtze valley, shot and wounded four Chinese who attempted to capture the vessel.

Japs Wound Two
The Japanese, faced with a serious situation at Hankow, sent of the Cantonese regime, rounded two Chinese when a mob invaded the Japanese concession. Ten Japanese, including five sailors, were reported carried off by the mob.

The Cantonese are pressing their drive northward in the direction of Peking, and the exodus of foreign women and children from the northern capital continues. American and other foreign residents of Kalgan, to the northwest, have left for Tientsin, near the coast.

American ships also leaving Canton, in southern China, and a gunboat has arrived there. The port of Amoy has been closed on orders from Peking in consequence of Chinese strikes.

Labor Situation Unchanged
The labor situation in Shanghai remains disturbed. Banners in the northern native section, facing the British lines, say "evacuate British troops and warships or suffer."

British officials, while awaiting news of the American government's attitude, say a protest and demand for reparation for the Nanking outrages will be sent to the Cantonese in a few days, either as a joint measure or a separate but identical note from the powers.

Engine Chen, Cantonese foreign minister, is quoted as declaring that the nationalist revolution is not communalistic, although communists are collaborating with the Kuomintang or re-

EARL CARROLL GRANTED EIGHT DAYS' SENTENCE POSTPONEMENT

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, April 4.—Earl Carroll, theatrical producer, who was to have started for Atlanta today to begin a penitentiary term of a year and a day for perjury in connection with his bathtub party, obtained a postponement until April 12.

Samuel Folk, of counsel for Carroll, appeared in federal court and asked for a postponement of four weeks. The court declined to give such a long postponement but did grant a delay of eight days.

Wants to "Fix Business"
Mr. Folk told Federal Judge Augustus Hand that the delay was requested in order to permit Carroll to "put his business affairs in order."

Judge Hand said it seemed to him that the theatrical producer had had plenty of time to do this since January 10, when it seemed inevitable that he would have to go to Atlanta. He added that what he thought was required now was "promptitude."

The next step in the case now remains for Carroll to appear in person in the United States district court April 12.

After this report to Judge Hand, he is then to be turned over to the United States marshal and taken to the Atlanta penitentiary with a batch of other prisoners.

Escaped Prisoners Return And Give Up

SPRINGFIELD, Mo., April 4 (AP)—Hench McDaniel and Bill User, who escaped from the Carroll county jail at Springfield, Ark., Tuesday night, returned Saturday and surrendered to the sheriff. McDaniel is held in connection with the burning of the home of Mrs. Minnie Tanner—Harris on Green Forest, Ark., whose charred body was found in the ruins of her home several weeks ago. He is charged with arson.

User was arrested the day following the Green Forest tornado on March 19 for killing Halls V. Ridd, highway worker, on the streets of Green Forest. Domestic trouble is said to have led to the shooting.

Curtail Whipping In Reform School

AUSTIN, Apr. 4 (AP)—Boys at the state reform school, Gatesville, in the future shall not be whipped except at the order of the superintendent of the institution and only then when either the superintendent or chaplain is present, the state board of control ordered today. Action followed the report of Manager Jim McCoy, that information he received indicated boys were being "immoderately whipped."

Dr. H. H. Harrington, chairman of the board, said that although the order would be permanent the board has not yet concluded its investigation and may announce further results later.

TWO COURTS IN SESSION TODAY

Walter Royalty Heads Grand Jurors; Pharr Reads His Charge To Probers

The new 99th district court, recently created by the Texas legislature opened its initial term in Lubbock county Monday morning, with Judge Clark M. Magellan, who has been confined to his home for the past two weeks with bronchial pneumonia, on the bench, and while the jury lists have been drawn for the court, officials were busily engaged today in arranging this when settings were to be made on the appearance and non-jury docket.

Opening simultaneously with the 99th, the 72nd district court opened a six weeks term, the grand jury was duly empaneled and set to work by Judge Homer L. Pharr, and settings were to be made on appearance and non-jury docket.

THUGS FLEE AS BORGER POSSES SCOUR COUNTRY

OFFICERS CLOSE BEHIND KIMES AND TERRELL; MANHUNT GOES ON

(By The Associated Press)
BORGER, Texas, Apr. 4 (AP)—Officers here today believed they were close on the heels of Matthew Kimes and Ray Terrell, Oklahoma outlaws sought in connection with the killing of two deputies last Friday and the robbery of the Pampa First National bank last Thursday.

The bandits were thought to be in hiding among the Canadian river breaks following a dash from a shack in Signal Hill, a village near here. The manhunt was continued throughout Sunday night and was resumed today.

Trousers Are Found
City and county police Saturday crashed into a two room shack at Signal Hill where it had been reported the men were hiding. The officers found a pair of bloody trousers believed to be the ones worn by Terrell on the night that Policeman Coke Buchanan was killed here several weeks ago. It was reported that Terrell was shot in the leg by one of the two bullets which Buchanan fired just before he died.

A resident told of the flight of Kimes and Terrell from the shack just before their pursuers arrived. He said he saw a large coupe about 100 feet from the shack. A man, he said, dashed from the house and leaped into the moving automobile, which was driven rapidly away.

Officers Close Behind
This escape occurred while the officers were searching a farm two miles away, where they located a large still and arrested a man, who informed them that Kimes and Terrell had left the farm last Friday in an automobile. The man was taken to jail at Signal Hill.

Deputies, last night stood guard over the Stinson jail to prevent any possible mob action or any attempt to liberate three prisoners held in confinement.

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Two Boys Drown As Boat Is Overturned

DALLAS, Apr. 4 (AP)—Clifford Stockton, 17, and Lee Harris, 18, were drowned at "Reed's Crossing" dam, north of Dallas Monday. They were fishing from a boat, which capsized when caught by the water fall over the dam. Both boys were good swimmers, but could not cope with the strong undercurrent.

Clarence Stockton, brother of Clifford, was almost drowned in an attempt to rescue the other two. He dived into the waters and was saved by a fishing pole which friends held out to him. This is the second death in the Stockton family in less than two months. On February 19, James Stockton, 35, was killed, and his brother, Lee Stockton, 46, was acquitted of murder at a recent trial.

PIONEER RAILROADER DEAD
SAN ANTONIO, April 4 (AP)—James H. Gallagher, 73, for 35 years a railroad man in Texas died at his home here Monday. He helped with the construction of the International and Great Northern railway and later moved to San Antonio where he was road master for the San Antonio and Aransas Pass for 17 years.

MAJ. PETTUS HEMPHILL TAKES OVER HIGHWAY DIVISION HERE

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Confederate Vets Gather In Florida

SAPIRO ADMITS PAY WAS LARGE

Reed's Examination Shows He Received \$70,000 Out Of One Project, Alone

(By Associated Press)
DETROIT, Apr. 4.—Aaron Sapiro testified today in his \$1,000,000 libel suit against Henry Ford that he had received \$70,000 from southern cotton plantations since 1923, paid as retainer and fees through the American Cotton Growers exchange.

He admitted also that he would refuse to serve as legal counsel for a co-operative organization which he had promoted unless he was paid for his efforts, although he primarily had the interest and welfare of the farmers at heart. That admission came about in cross-examination by United States Senator James A. Reed of Missouri, chief of Ford counsel, concerning the New Jersey poultry association.

His Brother Arrives
Sapiro's brother Milton came from California bringing records of fees demanded early last week by Senator Reed, and immediately was sworn in as an attorney in Aaron's behalf.

The session started off dragging heavily, and for the most part was extremely dull. Senator Reed for fifty minutes read from an address Sapiro made to cotton growers at Montgomery, Ala. in 1926.

William Henry Gallagher, chief of Sapiro's counsel said today that when Sapiro's cross-examination was completed he would call for Ford as the next witness and if the motor manufacturer's injuries were reported such as still to make it impossible for him to appear, would demand an official medical examination for Ford. Counsel said, however, that if the defendant could not appear they would not resist an order of Judge Raymond for an official report as to his condition.

Conclusion of cross-examination of Sapiro seemed far away today.

Two Men Burned To Death In Oklahoma

RAIL MEN WILL TELL PLANS TO LOCAL CITIZENS

PARTY EXPECTED HERE BY TONIGHT; C. OF C. WILL SPONSOR MEETING

A party of Fort Worth and Denver, and Burlington railroad officials are expected to arrive here late this afternoon from the east on an inspection trip over the route of the new line of the Fort Worth and Denver South Plains railroad. O. L. Slaton, chairman of the railroad committee of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce said today. The party includes Frank E. Clarity, vice President and general manager of the Fort Worth and Denver, and W. D. McCoy, chief counsel. The full personnel of the party, which includes ten or twelve, is not known here, but several officials of the Burlington, parent line of the Fort Worth and Denver are said to be in the party.

W. S. Broome, division engineer of the Fort Worth and Denver South Plains, who is in charge of all construction work now well under way, will accompany the party to Lubbock. It is expected that the officials will be in conference with chamber of commerce leaders tonight or early Tuesday morning, when detailed plans of the railroad company will be disclosed.

Field Notes Submitted
Field notes have been submitted on the right-of-way desired, through the county, and plans are now proceeding here for collection of funds with which to purchase this. Maps showing desired right-of-way in Lubbock were received several days ago, and demand has been made on the committee here for delivery of same, effective March 28, from which time the committee is given 90 days to deliver.

A meeting of signers of the Denver contract, numbering about 100, has been called for Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock, when maps will be worked out leading to collection of the approximately \$25,000 yet outstanding in notes.

Secrets of 16 Years Successful Pitching

BY GROVER ALEXANDER, Veteran Pitcher of World's Champions

HERE ARE THREE GAMES THAT GAVE ALEXANDER THRILLS. I have pitched close to 600 games in my career in the National League and of course I have not won all of them. I have taken my thrills like all of the boys, but I guess there are three games that stand out most prominently.

The one that gave me the biggest thrill was the 2 to 2 tie of 19 innings in the fall series of 1925 between the Cubs and the White Sox. He was the old boy, close to 40, still standing the severe pace.

I enjoyed pitching that game, for it convinced me that the arm still had plenty of fire in it. The Sox scored their runs in the third inning and couldn't touch me again until darkness stopped the battle.

I felt so free and smooth that afternoon, in spite of the damp, cold, raw weather that I believe I could have pitched 10 more innings.

The game that brought the saddest heart throb in my career was played in St. Louis during the summer of 1915. After a pitcher has been at it so long he craves for the fame of a no-hit game. And here was one all but, in my hip-pocket.

Only one batter had reached first base on me up to the ninth inning with two out. Luders missed a slow, twisting grounder down the first base line that allowed Miller Huggins to reach first base.

That was all right, for I traveled on without allowing the Cardinals a hit up to retiring two in the ninth.

Artie Butler was the batter. I was never so determined in all my life to fool a batter as this one. I was good and fast back in 1915 and I slipped two curves past him. He swung and missed. One more was all I needed to get over. Another burning curve, and stepping away he clipped it for a dinky pop fly to shallow center. Dave Bancroft and Dode Faskit tried to get it, but the ball fell between them for one of those pop singles. I have never been that close to a no-hit game since and I guess I never will be again.

Answering Cain's Question

When Cain was accused of Abel's murder, he sought to sidestep by asking aggressively, "Am I my brother's keeper?"

Ever since then that same question has been raised by all the rest of mankind. We are asking it of ourselves right now: indeed, most of the social and political and economic problems of our day arise largely because part of us answer that question by saying "No."

A magazine writer recently answered "No." He wrote an article on "The Right to Live," in it he declared that the assumption that society owes the individual a living is erroneous, and asserted that the only privileges a man deserves are those he can carve out for himself. He was quite bitter against unemployment pensions and attacked the British government for giving doles to the coal miners during the recent strike.

His article is interesting in that it voices the protest of what we might call the old order: for undeniably the tendency nowadays is to take the opposite view.

What is the outstanding bit of legislation passed in this country during the last ten years? The prohibition law, surely. And why was it passed? For one reason because the majority of us feel that, in a sense, we are our brothers' keepers; that society as a whole is responsible for what may happen to its weaker or less fortunate members.

Child labor legislation is more of the same thing. So are the laws to protect women in industry; so are the movie censorship laws; so are the employment and accident insurance laws in force in so many states. The list can be extended by any reader, doubtless.

That the move toward this kind of laws is growing can hardly be denied. Despite protests we seem to be growing convinced that society has a duty toward its individual members; a duty to see to it that they shall be protected, even from themselves, if need be.

Some people, like the magazine writer, see in these laws increasing limitations on the freedom of the individual. That there is some limitation probably is a fact. But there is a larger significance.

We are answering "Yes" instead of "No" to Cain's question.

To Shake or Not to Shake

President Coolidge, it is announced, does not think that his wrist was lamed by shaking hands with the daily horde of White House visitors. Instead he blames rheumatism.

Yet the incident serves to remind us of the national custom of the president devoting part of each day to shaking hands with every stranger who happens along.

What a foolish custom it is, looked at from the standpoint of the president's physical well-being.

And should it be discontinued permanently, how many thousands of folks would be deprived of the pleasure of telling grandchildren how they shook hands with President So-and-So on such and such an occasion.

Up To The Parents

If young people would stay at home nights instead of going out to late dances and parties there would be much less crime, says Dr. Charles Coleman, president of Southern Methodist University.

Probably right. And that puts the responsibility squarely up to us parents.

Boll Weevil Will Be Prevalent For Next Year, Report

WASHINGTON, Apr. 4 (AP)—Survival of boll weevils in hibernation during the winter will be higher than usual, the Department of Agriculture estimated today in publishing its annual survey.

Temperatures throughout the cotton belt have been unusually mild, the department said, adding that this made possible the higher survival among those weevils actually in hibernation.

"This is offset by the fact that in

many sections last summer and fall conditions were such that the number of weevils entering hibernation were much lower than usual," the report said. "Consequently, spring infestations are going to depend to an unusual degree upon conditions last fall in each locality. Wherever weevils were abundant last year the spring emergence will be heavy."

"In Texas, especially in the central portion, the weevil population was decidedly increased by favorable weather conditions during the latter part of the growing season. Initial infestation is expected this season than for several years."

Styles in Clothes Have Little Relation to Health Needs

Few people care enough about their health to select clothing with health problems in view primarily. Unquestionably style plays a great part in any other factor in the selection of wearing apparel. Indeed, it has been asserted that styles extremely detrimental to health are frequently selected, even with the deiment in mind. It has been asserted that the craze for reduction in weight and slenderization is a response to a change in feminine fashions.

It seems doubtful if human nature will ever be modified sufficiently or intelligence at such a high level that clothing will invariably be selected for its hygienic qualities rather than for the other considerations that may be concerned.

Even the hygienic aspects clothing should protect against cold and permit diffusion of heat by circulation of air in warm weather. Moisture must not be permitted to collect on the body surface, where it may tend to macerate the skin, to open the way for infection and to produce disagreeable odor.

Under modern business conditions women workers seem to make little provision for changes from the hot season to the cold, making it necessary to overheat rooms to accommodate their light clothing and thus causing main workers who wear heavier clothing to suffer unduly with heat and dryness of the atmosphere.

Woolen clothing has the value of warmth and of taking up perspiration. It is, therefore, suitable wear for winter.

In the climate of the United States the color of the clothing seems to bear little importance to its healthful qualities. It is generally believed that white clothing absorbs fewer heat rays, which is presumably the reason for its popularity in warm weather and in the tropics.

HOSPITAL EDUCATION TAUGHT THE CURE OF ENVIRONMENT

THERE is a great contrast between the hospital of today and the hospital of a quarter of a century ago.

Leaving out the matter of clinics, therapeutics and diagnosis, to say nothing of new methods in operating, there is the fact of the building itself.

I cannot entirely efface the memory of a children's ward visited in a downtown city hospital years ago. To begin with, the building was in a district submerged winter and summer in a London fog of grime and smoke, all the more hopeless and insupportable as it moved with the vapor of three rivers. It had a pesty quality that clung to the very vitals. The sun was almost an unknown quantity.

Inside the hospital the walls were painted an economical gray. The ceilings were unbelievably high—they must have seemed miles off to the sleepless little children. A few of the children had been in that room for years—quite a number had been there for months. I was told that one or two would never know any other room. There were general hospitals in the city. They were all alike—no one thought there of building in the open and giving the sun a chance. Of course there were no automotive ambulances. Not even so, those children needed no ambulance. They should not have been in an emergency hospital at all.

That hospital has moved twice, each time farther away from the smoke and the clang of the mills. The latest one is costing three million dollars. And what part of it is being given the most special attention? The children's wing! It is a far cry from those gray smoky walls I remember to a solarium with real sand and a swimming pool with quartz windows—not glass, mind you—that will fully admit the healing rays of the sun and the penetrating ultra-violet ray.

Hospital education is one of the best things that is happening to us. The actual curative value of environment is undisputed. Our state of mind and our emotions can no longer be discounted as important factors in the functioning and metabolism of the body. Attractive interiors for the sick and attractive exteriors for the convalescent are the new keywords in building. Gardens, shrubbery, flowers, little gravel paths, perhaps a fountain. How important they are! The pessimists might say it puts a premium on sickness. That is ridiculous and cruel. Anyone who begrudges a sick man, woman or child comfort because it happens to be beautiful, is a mean person indeed.

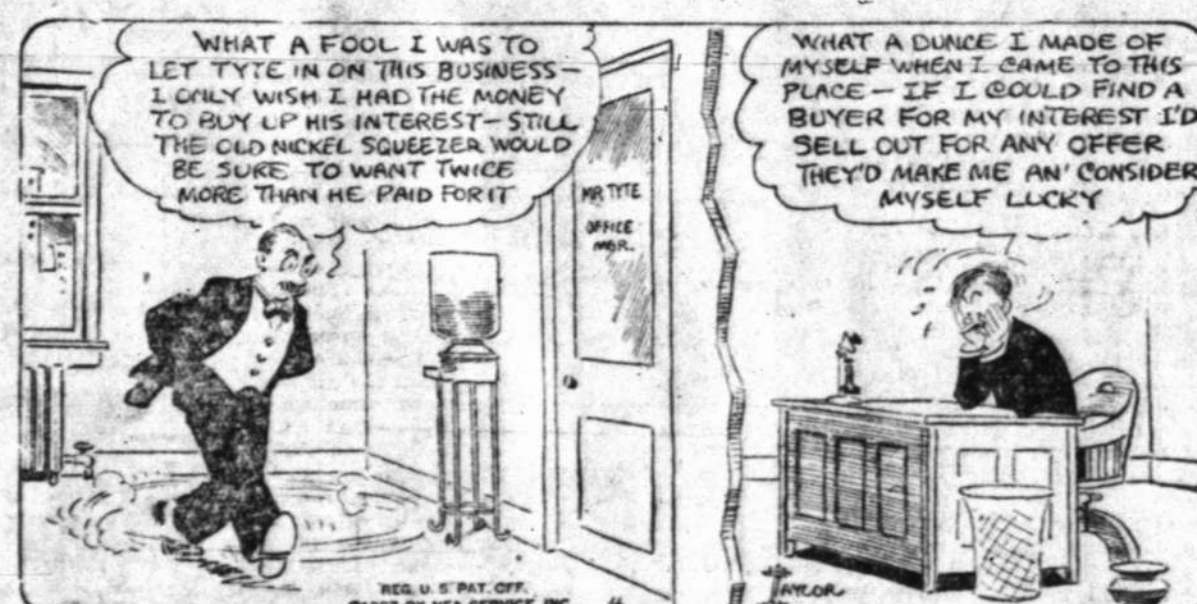

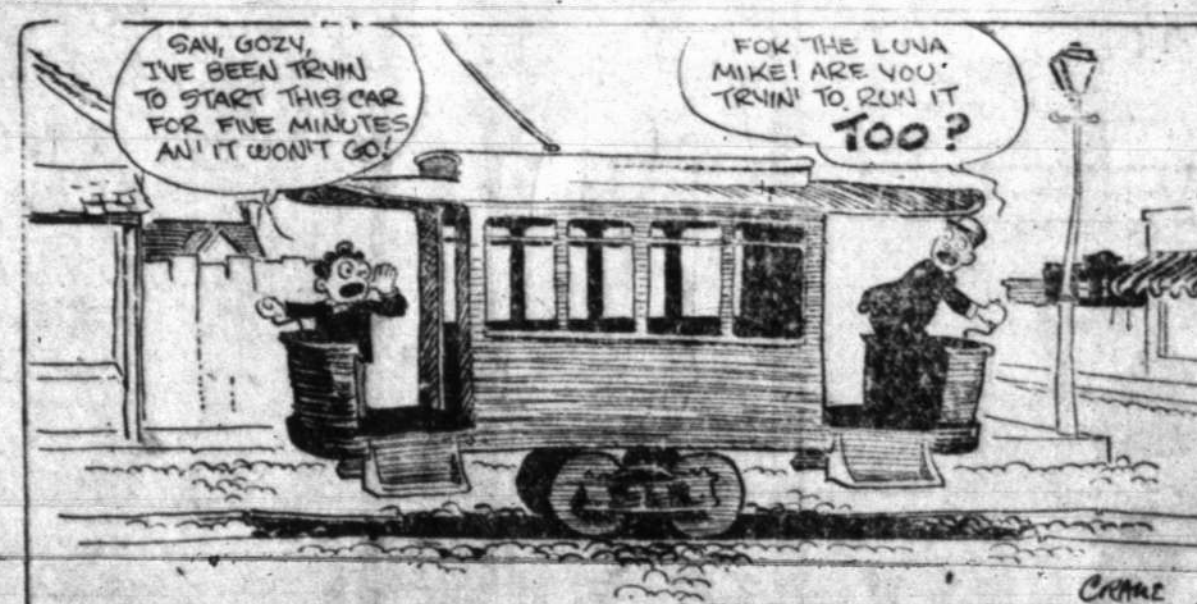
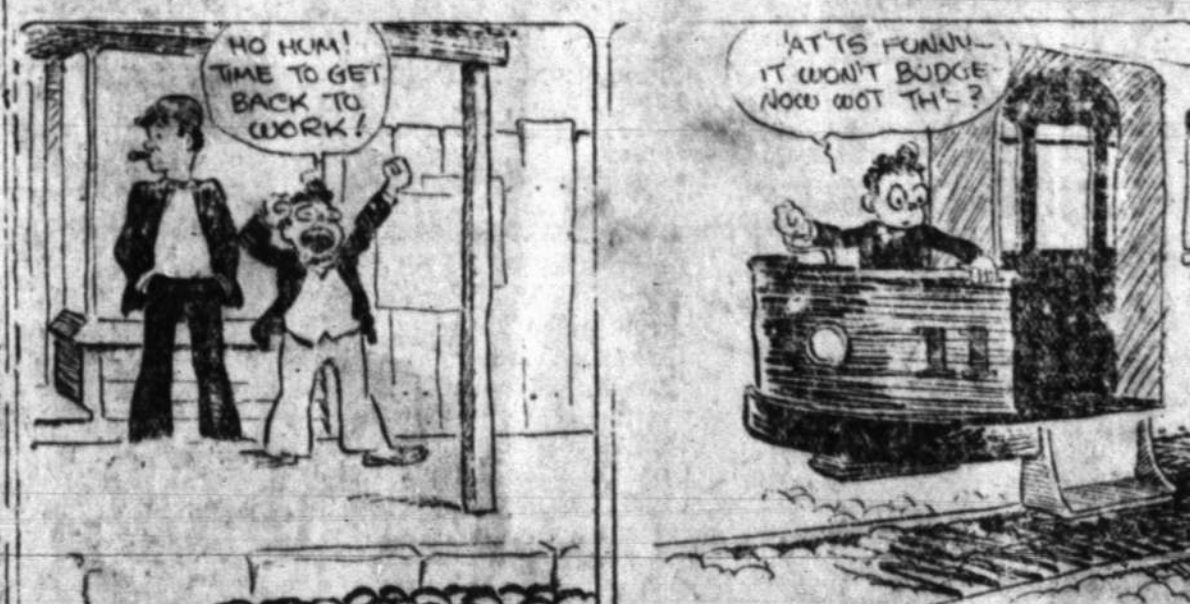

CROWDS HAMPER FIRE FIGHTERS

Thrill Seekers' Get In Way As Fire Boys Answer Alarm Sunday

The Lubbock fire department, called out on an alarm at 2:20 and Avenue Q Sunday afternoon, about 2 o'clock, was called upon to make a much harder fight against traffic than at the scene of the actual fire, and was entirely pinned up for some time by ever-ruthless sightseers. It was said this morning in a statement describing the practice of Lubbock citizens in following the equipment to the extent of compassion. It is no hardship that the fire of Sunday was of little consequence, but it is never known when such a situation has existed there is going to be a costly experience to the city. Fire Chief W. E. Twitty said, in explaining that if another alarm had come quickly on the heels of the small blaze, the department, completely hemmed in and cut off from the balance by one of the worst traffic jams ever seen here, would have been powerless to reach the scene.

He suggested that if the citizenship insists on following traffic in the vicinity of a fire, official action must be taken to overcome the situation, and somebody must pay the penalty. While he said the department fully appreciates the interest shown by the citizenship in all phases of its work, he offered a plea that the department also be given a chance to operate with the highest efficiency possible, and that it not be hampered by congested traffic.

The Sunday fire was of no consequence, starting in a lot fence at the home of Bob Jasper near Q and 22nd. Very little damage was done.

He told of violations of the prohibition laws of the various phases of the law, saying that the manner of enforcement means much to the success of the law. The man who will

coolly and deliberately go about the country selling intoxicants in violation of the law, is one of the most damnable in the country, he asserted, in demanding careful investigation of all liquor cases with the promise that they will be given rigid and prompt trials.

He rapped the drunken driver of an automobile, saying that the sooner this type of man is behind prison bars, the better it will be for the population as a whole. Such a man, he said, not only endangers his own life, but the lives of innocent men, women and children.

He said that the law is designed to give equal protection and justice to all alike, regardless of race, color, creed, social standing or financial rating, and that a public official who violates the law is as deserving of punishment, or possibly more so, than a private citizen.

Inspection is Ordered

He asked that the grand jury make inspection of all county properties, including the court house, jail and farm, making such recommendations as he sees fit for better service to the general public.

Both courts will spend this week on appearance and non-jury civil cases. Next week the 95th will open two weeks of criminal hearings, and the fourth, fifth and sixth weeks of the term will be consumed by the 72nd in trial of criminal matters. The term for the 72nd is six weeks, and the 95th twelve weeks.

publican revolutionary party. Chang Makes Concessions

General Chang Kai-shek, Chinese generalissimo who has been at odds with the Kuomintang left wing, announced that he will confine himself in the future to pushing the military campaign against the northwestern.

Some French newspapers criticize Chiang's policy declaring that he is counting on a "Chinese victory" and is thus "putting all his eggs in one basket."

Machine Guns Used

SHANGHAI, Apr. 4 (AP)—American machine guns were used by Chinese troops in the fighting at Shanghai, four Chinese were wounded.

The trouble occurred near Chungking when coolies attempted to capture the American steamer Chinan from bluejackets of the gunboat Monterey, who were guarding it, said a

wireless dispatch received here this afternoon.

Japanese fired with machine guns on the steamer in the Japanese concession at Hankow yesterday. There was a quarrel between a Japanese sailor and a rickshaw coolie. A mob of Chinese invaded the concession, held up Japanese in the streets and began looting. Sailors were quickly landed from warships in the Yangtze and opened fire with machine guns to disperse the Chinese, wounding two of them.

The Japanese, faced by what apparently is a serious situation at Hankow, have rushed additional warships there.

Action Is Urged

The American Chamber of Commerce in Shanghai in a statement just issued called for immediate concerted action by the powers to restore order in China. It declares that military, police and judicial action have destroyed all semblance of law and order in the greater part of China and that the joint action called for would have a far-reaching influence throughout the country and be of ultimate benefit to the Chinese themselves.

"The mass of the conservative and law-abiding Chinese," the statement declares, "reduced to a state of helpless intimidation, is unable to take effective measures to protect either themselves or foreigners. The adoption of a conciliatory policy by foreign governments has merely strengthened the lawless elements and encouraged outrages like those at Nanking."

Germany, hitherto virtually immune from nationalist anti-foreignism, now are beginning to feel its effect throughout the Yangtze valley.

Protests Are Coming

LONDON, Apr. 4 (AP)—Protests by the foreign governments over the outrages at Nanking and demands for reparation, are expected to be lodged with the Chinese government in a few days. It was authoritatively stated in Downing street today.

Diplomatic exchanges between Washington and London and Tokyo continued over the week-end without a hitch. It remains uncertain, however, whether the demands will be made jointly or in identical notes by the three powers.

There is also some difference of opinion as to whom to address the notes, but the likeliest recipient is Eugene Chen, Chinese foreign minister.

Crisis Is Approaching

LONDON, Apr. 4 (AP)—Another crisis seems to be approaching at Hankow. Foreign Minister Chamberlain told the House of Commons today. He said, however, that latest reports showed a "full" following yesterday's fighting in the Japanese concession there.
