BUS TRAVEL HAS EXCELLENT REPORT

AUSTIN, Oct. 21.—(AP)—The report of the motor bus division of the railroad commission for the year 1928, made public today, showed that 4,744,867 passengers were transported in buses in the state last year and not one was killed or seriously injured.

Receipts of the division for the year were given as \$18,256.90 and disbursements \$16,190.82. The balance January 1 was \$13,802.98 compared with \$11,736.60 a year earlier.

The report pointed out that at the end of last year, 222 individuals and corporations were operating 969 motor buses over regular routes and between fixed terminals. They operated 43,982,435 bus miles during the year and the buses traveled over approximately 31,000 miles of public highways.

The total operating revenue of the bus companies last year was reported as \$6,412,483.50 and the expenditures as \$5,717,668.17.

ZEP SERVICE PLAN BROUGHT

NEW YORK PAPER TELLS OF INCORPORATION OF COMPANY

NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—The New York Herald Tribune Sunday said the day of regular Transoceanic Zeppelin service, carrying passengers and possibly small package freight, has been brought nearer by the incorporation in Delaware Saturday of the International Zeppelin Transport company, backed by the powerful National City bank interests.

Officials of the bank refused today to discuss the details of the formation of the company, which now has a nominal capitalization of only 1,000 shares, but it was learned they would be made public in two weeks.

Charles E. Mitchell, chairman of the National City bank has been in Europe conferring with German bankers, the Herald Tribune said, and it is believed German capital will participate in the development.

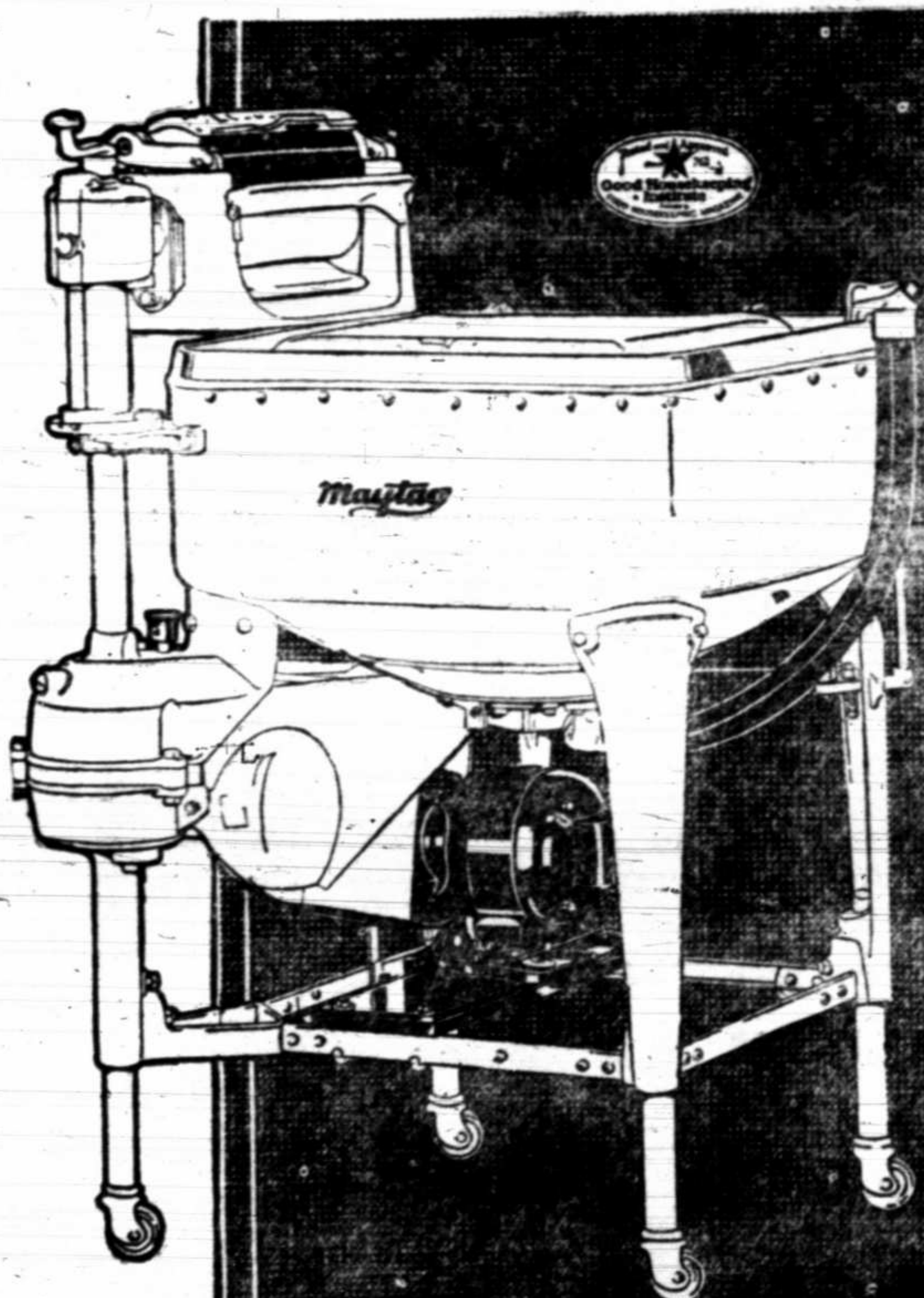

The main thing is to get the power resources of the country put on a more scientific basis. After all, it is the actual results achieved which count most. These people won't be able to take their money with them, and they will leave behind them a country more efficiently equipped with power."

"What they are doing is helping to have the country become more conscious of the importance of what electricity can do for them. Only a beginning has been made in making electricity do the work of the world. The ground has only been scratched."

"Power can revolutionize the lives of the people of this country. It can lift the burdens from the backs of the workers. It can abolish most of the tasks of the housewife. It has hardly made a beginning on the farm—where its possibilities are perhaps the greatest of all."

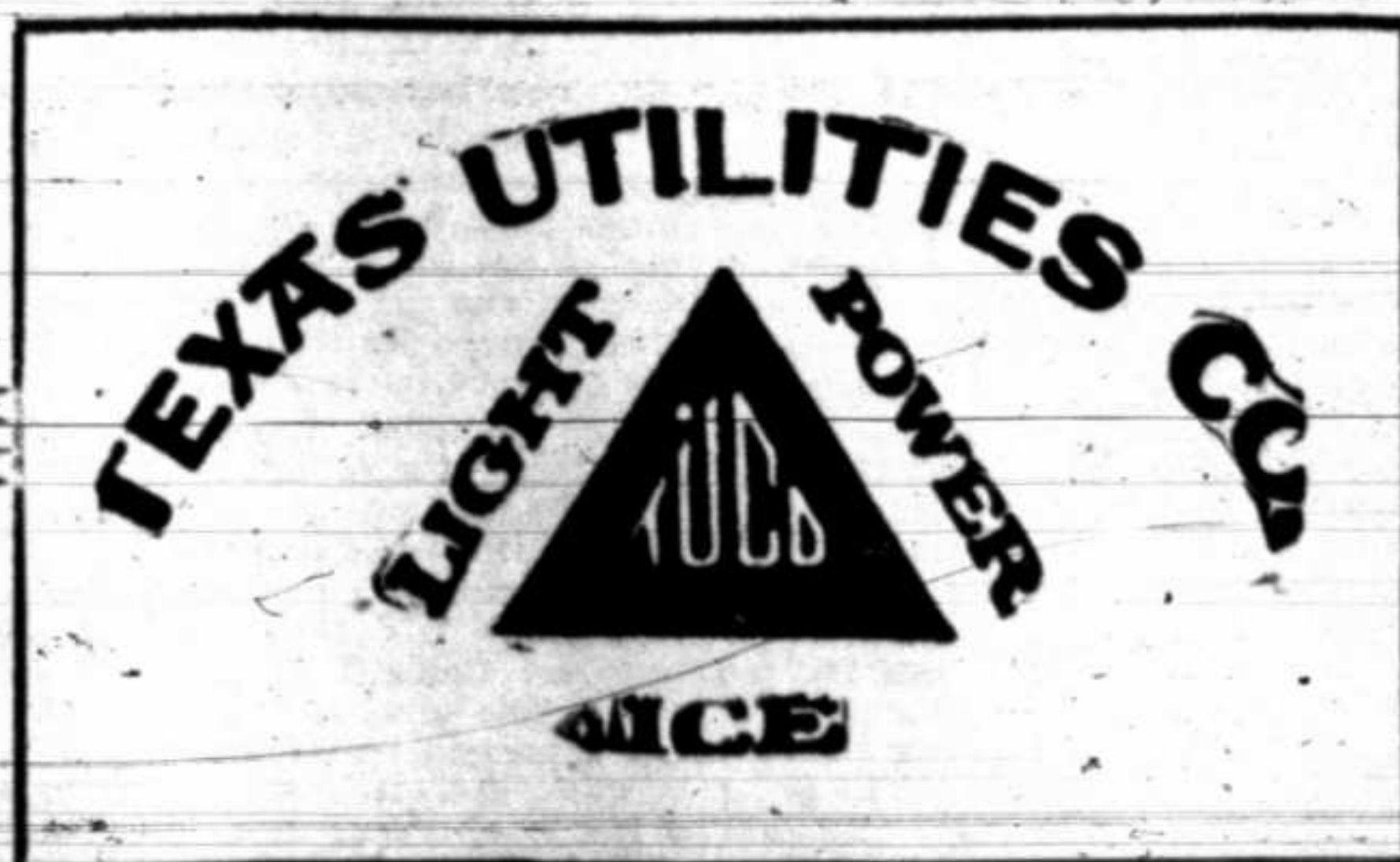

ARE CLOTHES FROM HUIE

FLIER ADDRESSES CONVENTION 1,300 MILES AWAY FROM PLANE HIGH IN AIR

NEW YORK, Oct. 21 (AP)—Talking from an airplane, 4,000 feet in the air and 1,300 miles away, Capt. A. R. Brooks Saturday addressed the annual convention of the Telephone Pioneers of America at Minneapolis. A combination of radio and land telephone lines, which connected New York, Minneapolis and the airplane into a single circuit thus added another milestone to the progress of communication. It was the first time that an airplane was "bridged" into a connection between two distant points.

Voice Heard Over Hall
The Bell Telephone laboratories radio station at Whippany, N. J., was the link between the plane, which was flying over New Brunswick, N. J., at a speed of 95 miles an hour, and the land telephone lines leading to a listening post in New York and to the convention in Minneapolis. Three loudspeakers made the speaker's voice audible to the thousands assembled pioneers. Incidentally, Captain Brooks notified J. S. McCulloch, president of the New York Telephone Co., of his election as president of the pioneers. Mr. McCulloch accepted by telephone from his New York office, with both the airplane and the convention listening in.

In his address to the convention, Captain Brooks said:
"We are flying a cabin monoplane, which we have converted into a flying laboratory for making all sorts of radio measurements in the air. Our fundamental investigations are still going on, but a few months ago we reached a point where our engineers could design the radio sets which I have in the plane now. We have a very sensitive receiving set, small and compact and weighing less than 15 pounds. Our transmitting is also very compact and weighs but about 25 pounds. Our communication with you by radio to our station at Whippany, N. J., and thence through the long lines of the Bell system to you at Minneapolis. Captain Brooks used a special microphone, which excluded the noise of the airplane."

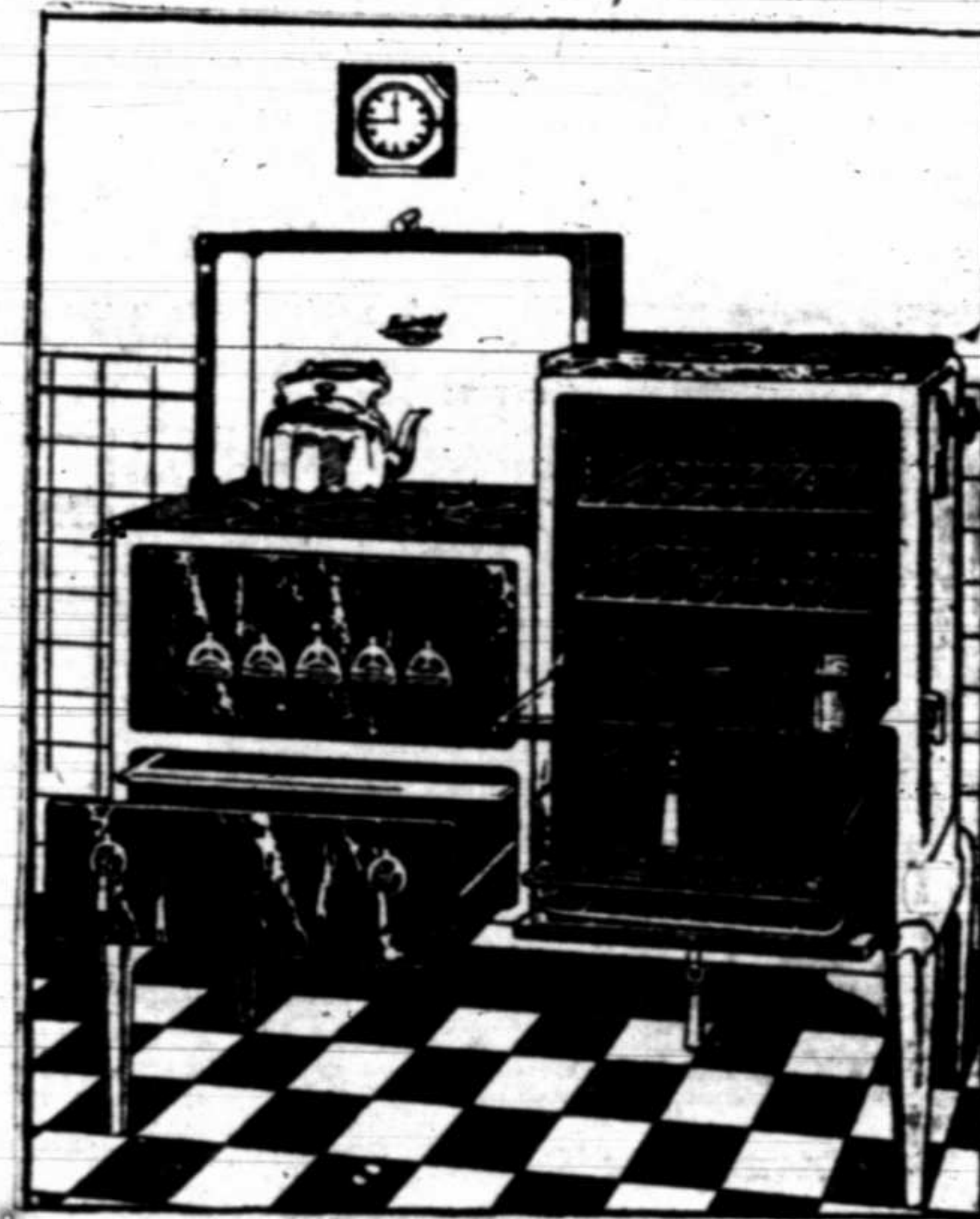
