Red Cross--Child Resuscitation as Taught Today

Washington, D. C., June 26—The 1957 version of a centuries-old method of artificial respiration has been adopted by the American Red Cross for reviving infants and small children whose breathing has stopped, A. W. Cantwell, national director of safety services, announced today.

The technique is known as mouth-to-mouth resuscitation. Modern refinements for application to children, Mr. Cantwell explained, were developed through studies, financed by a Red Cross grant, at Presbyterian Hospital in Chicago under the direction of Dr. Archer S. Gordon.

The studies led to a recommendation to the Red Cross by the National Academy of Science-National Research Council that the method be adopted. The mouth-to-mouth technique was used in Biblical times to revive apparently suffocated persons.

When the Red Cross six years ago adopted the back pressure-arm lift method of artificial respiration, Mr. Cantwell recalled, a modification of this method was described for use on small children to lessen chance of injuries to the chest wall.

Since 1951, a search has been pursued by the Red Cross for an even safer method, resulting in adoption of the mouth-to-mouth process. One of its great advantages, Mr. Cantwell said, is that the rescuer can tell at any stage of the operation whether it is effective.

Steps in the mouth-to-mouth technique are as follows:

1. Clear the mouth of any foreign matter with the middle finger of one hand. With the same finger hold the tongue forward.

2. Now place the child in a face-down, head-down position and pat him firmly on the back with a free hand. This should help dislodge any foreign object in the air passage.

3. Place the child on his back and use the middle fingers of both hands to lift the lower jaw from beneath and behind so that it "juts out."

4. Hold the jaw in the position described in Step 3, using one hand only.

5. Place your mouth over the child's mouth and nose, making a relatively leakproof seal and breathe into the child with a smooth steady action until you observe the chest rise. As you start this action, move the free hand to the child's abdomen, between the navel and the ribs, and apply continuous moderate pressure to prevent the stomach from becoming filled with air.

6. When the lungs have been inflated, remove your lips from the child's mouth and nose and allow the lungs to empty. Repeat this cycle keeping one hand beneath the jaw and the other hand pressing on the stomach at all times. Continue at a rate of about 20 cycles per minute. After every 20 cycles the operator should rest long enough to, take one deep breath. If at any time you feel resistance to your breathing into the child and the chest does not rise, repeat Step 2 then quickly resume mouth-to-mouth breathing.

The mouth-to-mouth or Mouth-to-nose technique may be in these cases; however, the cycle should be slower than that used for children. Approximately 12 cycles per minute should be adequate. The lower jaw must be held in the "jutting out" position with both hands at all times.

Thrips have shown up in some fields of cotton in Briscoe County this past week. These small cotton insects attack the underside of the leaves by rasping with their legs, then drink the plant juices as they ooze out. This causes the puckering or drawing of the leaves. There will be a silvering affect on the underside of the leaves. As late as the season is this year, farmers can lose no time by letting these fellows stunt the plant.

Thrips have been found in abundance in the weeds up until the time that cotton came up. In many cases they have moved into the fields from the weed patches. Thrips are easy to kill. Any number of the insecticides will do a good job. Toxaphene and Dieldrin are probably the most popular. It will take a pint of toxaphene and 1/2 pint of dieldrin per acre. This should be repeated in 7 to 10 days. The control of these insects is easy and economical. All farmers are urged to look at their cotton closely and if it looks as if it is not doing too well an inspection for thrips had better be made.

Last year we had a severe outbreak of thrips early, much the same as this year, and many farmers that did not control them did not miss much cotton at the end of the year. This was primarily caused by the exceptionally late and fine growing season that we had last year. In other words the cotton plant had time to recover and still put on a good crop of cotton after the severe attacks. This year it doesn't look like a sample like that will pay off since it cost so little to control them.

C. R. Badgett's Son-in-Law Receives Nice Promotion Publicity

The following story was handed the News for reproduction in the local paper. It concerns the progress of Mr. and Mrs. Badgett's daughter and son-in-law, and many Briscoe County readers will read it with interest:

"In 1955, the State Historical Society of Iowa chose to publish 'The Biography of John A. Kasson' (a 19th Century diplomat) written by Edward E. Younger as its selection for August of that year. Now with the History Department of the University of Virginia, he will spend the next academic session lecturing at the University of Allahabad on American Diplomatic History. These lectures are scheduled to begin in mid-July. The Youngers will return to the University of Virginia in May, 1958.

"Dr. Younger, a native of Arkansas, is married to the former Barbara Badgett of Quitaque and they have one daughter, Ellen, age 9. Mrs. Younger has been President of the Faculty Wives Club at the University for the past year. Leaving on June 12, the Youngers will visit London, Paris, Barcelona, Rhone, Athens, Istanbul, Baghdad, Karachi and Delhi. In Allahabad, Ellen will enter the Sixth Grade in the Indian school system.

First loads of new crop wheat was received at the local grain elevators here Thursday and Friday of last week.

James and Durwood Davis delivered their first load Thursday afternoon to H. E. Wilson Grain Company's elevator. The grain tested 60 with a moisture content of 12 1/2% and sold at \$1.83. The grain was from their farm five miles south of town, and was estimated to run about 20 bushels per acre.

Harvest-Queen Grain Company received their first load of wheat of the season when Jack Jowell of the Rock Creek Community pulled up with a load Friday evening which tested 58 with a moisture content of 13% and protein 10.65. Frank Mercer also delivered a load of wheat to Harvest-Queen Grain Company Friday which tested 61 1/2 with a moisture content of 12.60% and 10.65 protein.

Silvertown Co-Op elevator received their first load of new crop wheat from L. O. Weeks of the Rock Creek Community Friday afternoon. This grain tested 63 with a moisture content of 13%.

Chester Burnett of the Vigo Park Community also delivered a load of Early Wichita wheat Friday to Silvertown Co-Op elevator. This grain tested 64 with a moisture content of 10.50.

Irrigated wheat will be moving to market within the very near future if weather conditions remain favorable. Dry land crops in most cases will be a few days later in maturing.

Not many farmers are guessing out loud what their crops will yield this year, but the early cuttings indicate about 20 bushels for irrigated crops. Dry land crops are not far enough along to estimate, since a great deal depends on weather conditions during the remaining growing days of the crop.

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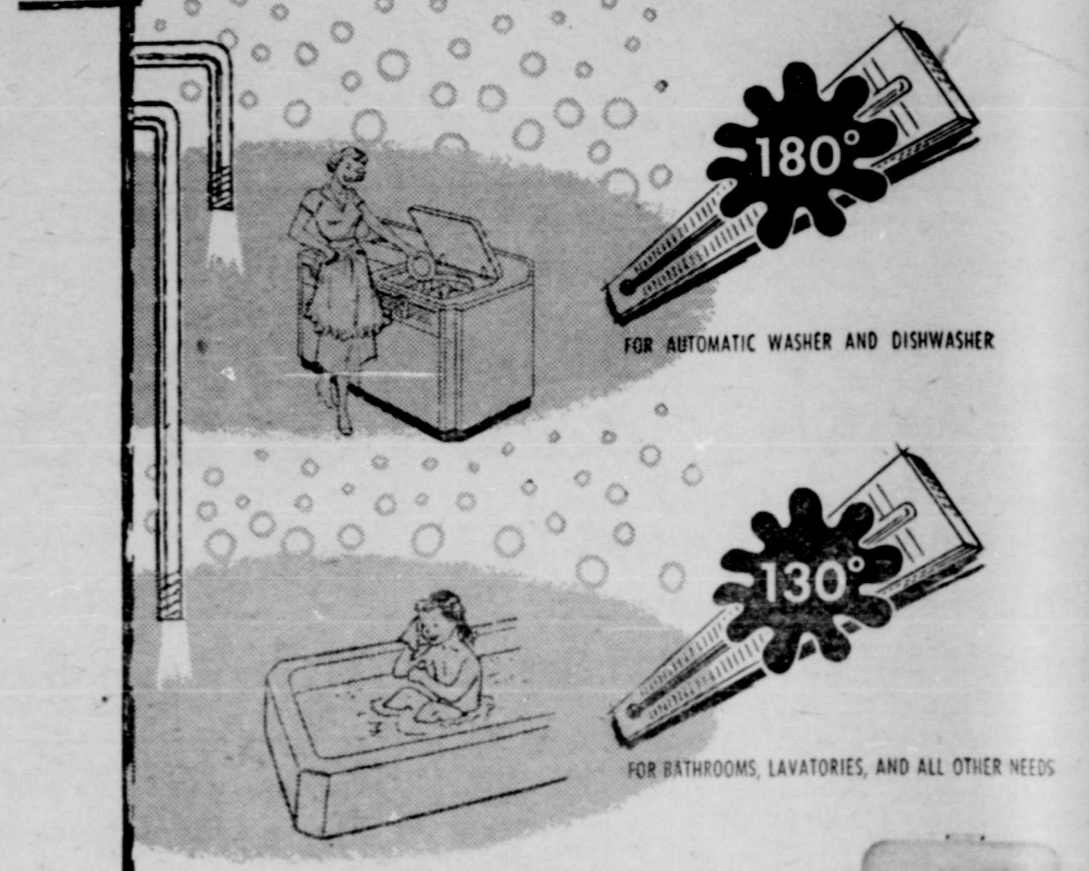
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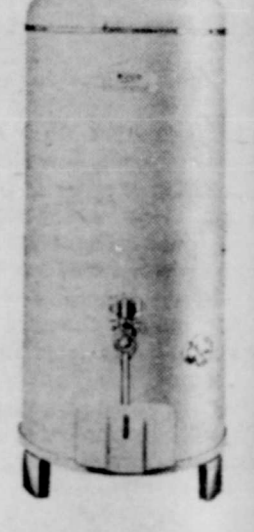

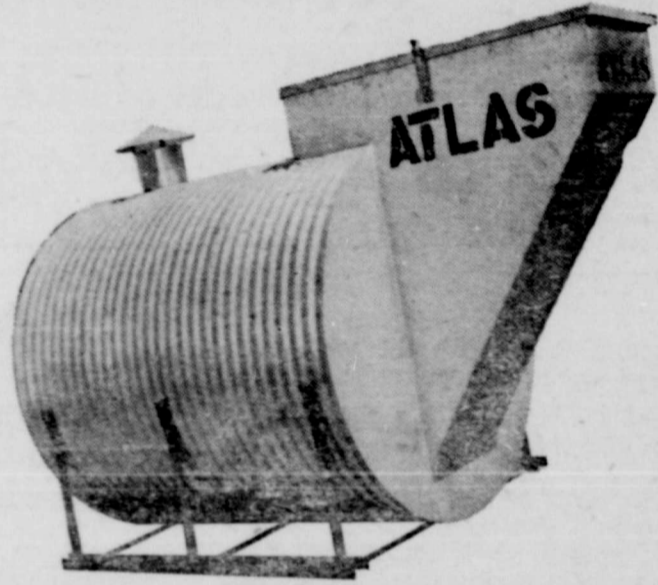
