Russell to Quit After Five Years as Representative

Washington, D. C., Cisco Daily Press and Friends:

It has been my privilege to serve you in the national congress for the last five years, during the most critical period in our country's history since its foundation. It has been my heart's desire to render you the best services possible, and in doing so I have considered it a privilege and an honor to serve as your representative in the greatest legislative body in the world.

As you know, congress has been in almost continuous session since I was elected as your representative, which has required my constant and almost complete attention and presence. Also, you know that climatic conditions in this area are not as conducive to good health and well-being as in West Texas. As a result of these conditions, I feel that it is to my best interest, and to the interest of you whom I represent, that I not be a candidate for re-election. Therefore, I shall not be a candidate for re-election, and shall retire at the end of this year.

You have my sincerest thanks for your cooperation during the trying times I have served you. Your welfare, as well as my country's welfare, has been the uppermost thought within my breast. I appreciate more than I can express to you in words the kindness you have shown me on all occasions. It shall be my duty and pleasure to cooperate with and assist any person you see fit to elect as your national representative.

Mrs. Floyd Lacked 13 Days of Being 100 Years of Age

DALLAS, Mar. 13. — Mrs. Martha Alice Floyd, one of the very first white girls born in what is now Dallas county, died in Abilene Tuesday morning, just thirteen days before reaching her 100th birthday. She will be buried in Abilene tomorrow.

Mrs. Floyd was born March 25, 1846, in Peters Colony at Mustang Branch, later Farmers Branch, which then was a part of Nacogdoches county. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jentry H. West, had come to Texas from Washington county, Tennessee, in 1845.

Her father sold land and shipped meat to forts farther west, under a government contract, and also operated a tannery and general store.

In September, 1865, she was married to Thomas H. Floyd at Cochran's Chapel, near what is now Love Field. Her husband, a native of Kentucky, had served four years in the Confederate army.

He and Mrs. Floyd lived in Dallas for a number of years, where he owned and operated the Floyd Drugstore. In 1882 they moved to Callahan county, and Floyd served as county surveyor at Baird for almost forty years.

They moved to Abilene in 1921. He died there in 1927.

STALIN ISSUES BLUNT STATEMENT

LONDON, Mar. 13. (AP)—Generalissimo Stalin tonight charged Winston Churchill had delivered a "sort of" ultimatum to the non-English speaking world and predicted that "Churchill and his friends" will be beaten if they succeed in organizing armed intervention against eastern Europe.

Stalin bluntly declared that Churchill's attitude was incompatible with the 20-year Anglo-Russian treaty of alliance and scoffed at suggestions it should be extended to 50 years as proposed by Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin.

Stalin emphasized the gravity of the diplomatic crisis between the three great powers by breaking his silence to speak back to Churchill.

Stalin directly compared Churchill with Hitler and accused the British statesman of employing Hitlerian tactics in an effort to cement a bloc of English-speaking peoples against Russia.

TO FREE OIL INDUSTRY.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 13. (AP)—Economic Stabilizer Chester Bowles announced today that the oil industry may be freed from price control within six months and possibly before June 30.

DETROIT, Mar. 13. General Motors and the striking CIO Auto Workers reached a settlement today to end the auto industry's longest and most costly walkout on its 113th day.

The settlement, announced after a surprise all-night bargaining session, provides an 18½-cent hourly wage increase for 175,000 striking General Motors employees in 92 plants in 50 cities.

A national UAW General Motors conference was summoned to meet in Detroit March 15 to consider ratification of the agreement.

"Termination of the strike," the UAW statement said, "will be contingent upon the conference's approval and ratification by the local union membership."

The contract runs for two years from the date of ratification.

Developments leading to the agreement came rapidly and included a continuous 17½-hour conference that started at 9:30 p. m. yesterday and broke what had appeared to be a hopeless deadlock as the strike entered its 17th week.

Federal Labor Conciliator James F. Dewey, guiding light through the climactic talks since Jan. 30, announced the settlement.

"The parties have reached an agreement for termination of the strike with respect to national issues, subject to ratification of the local unions," Dewey said.

"Both the International Union and the Corporation have urged local unions and local managements to press for immediate settlement of local issues," the mediator said.

No Auto License Plate Without Title Certificate

As the deadline of March 31 approaches, Tax Collector Clyde S. Karkalits has visions of long lines of impatient motor vehicle owners waiting to register their vehicles during the last few days of March.

He urges all Eastland county vehicle owners to get their documents in order and apply early for registration to avoid waiting in line.

Under the laws of Texas, a certificate of title in proper order and the current year's registration receipt must both be presented at the tax collector's office before new license plates can be issued.

"The certificate of title is the same to a motor vehicle that an abstract is to a plot of real estate," Mr. Karkalits points out. "Each time a vehicle changes hands, the assignment of title on the reverse side of the certificate must be completed and application made for a title in the new owner's name through the tax collector's office," he said.

Buyers of used vehicles should insist sellers give an assigned certificate of title and the current registration receipt at time vehicle is delivered. Purchasers of new vehicles should obtain a manufacturer's certificate. Unless changes of ownership are recorded through the tax collector's office, the files of the state highway department at Austin

will continue to show the seller as the legal owner of the vehicle. It is to the advantage of both buyer and seller to keep the titles clear.

When a lien against a vehicle is paid, the owner should protect his interest by securing a release from the lien holder and submit it to the tax collector with application for a corrected title.

Mr. Karkalits appealed especially to owners of vehicles bearing out-of-state license tags, urging them to apply early for registration, since it may require from five to ten days to get a proper Texas certificate of title required before the vehicle can be registered in Texas.

Beginning March 23 Mr. Karkalits or a deputy will be at Cisco city hall each day for a week to issue car licenses.

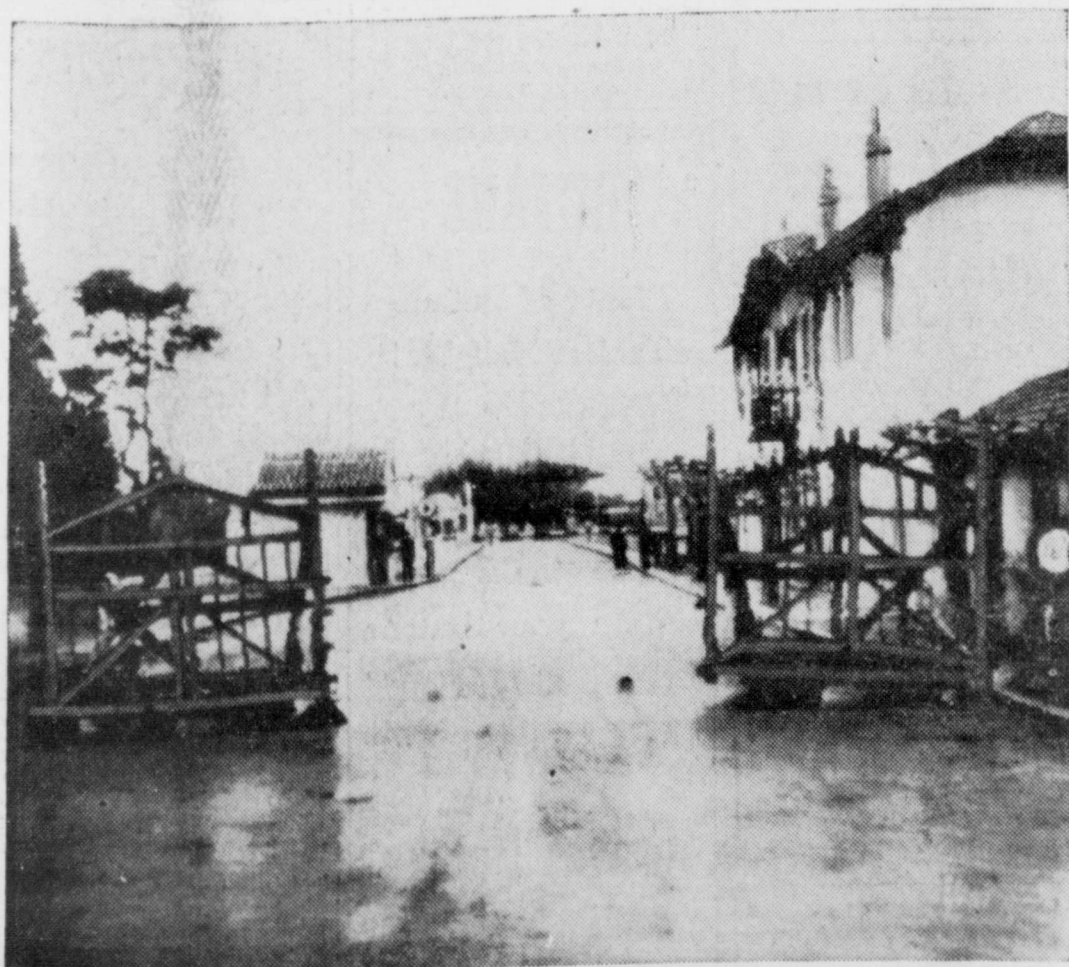
WANT US. TROOPS OUT.

FREDERICKSBURG, Jan. 12.—The "Kaffeemühle Versteckspiel," in which early colonists of the United States worshipped, is to be restored here with the aid of CWA funds. From data collected by Samuel E. Gideon, associate professor of architectural design of the University of Texas, architects have drawn plans for an exact reproduction of the roughly hewn cathedral. German pioneers called it the "kaffeemühle" because it resembled a coffee mill. It was erected of heavy logs and mortar in 1847 by German colonists. Steeple bell and corner stone from the original structure, now in the keeping of the Holy Ghost Lutheran church, will be restored. The reproduced building is to be used as a museum for relics and records of pioneer days.

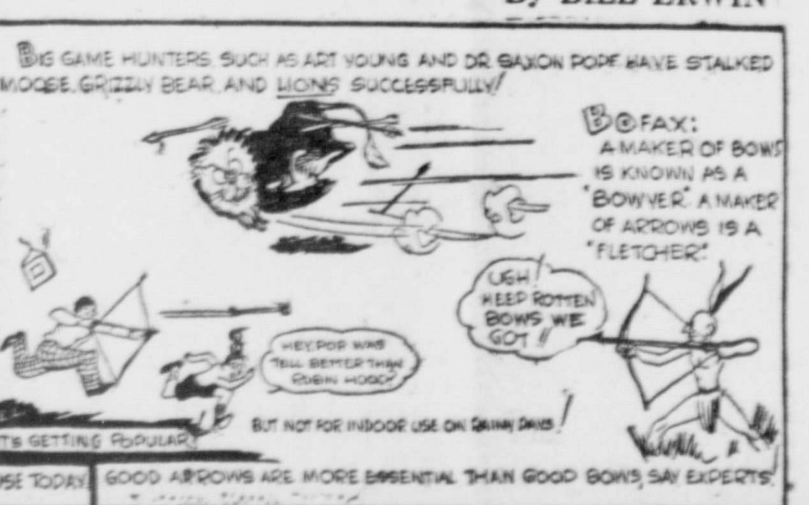

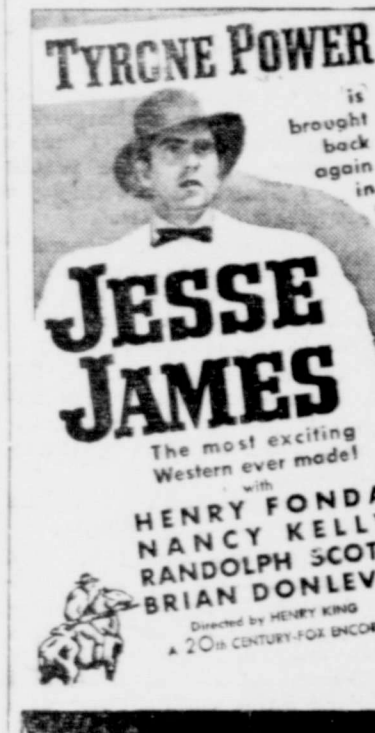
