Boy Scouts From Wide Territory To Gather Here Monday In Swim Meet

Watermelon Feast Will Be Served To Visitors

Approximately 75 to 100 Scouts from nine towns in the Southwestern, Southeastern and Southern Districts of the South Plains Council are expected to participate in the Tri-District Swimming meet at Lamesa Monday evening, August 8, according to Mr. Henry Norris, swimming meet chairman. Mr. A. G. Bearden, publicity chairman for the meet, has mailed out invitations to each of the troops in the following towns: Slaton, Post, Tahoka, Brownfield, Plains, Gomez, Ropesville, O'Donnell. Thirteen troops are expected to participate in the meet. Watermelon feed is being arranged for all the participants following the meet. All parents and friends of Scouting are invited to attend.

During the past three years Troop 22 of Lamesa has won the swimming championship of the South Plains Council. Mr. Spikes troop has a strong team again this year, but will meet with considerable more competition than during the past few years.

Scouts winning first or second place in this meet will qualify to participate in the Council Championship Swimming meet to be held at Plainview on Friday evening, August 12.

He worked with this firm until the fall of 1927, when he purchased the interest of Jay Butler in The Butler Drug Company. Associated with him in this new business was Matt A. McCall, the firm being known as Morris-McCall. Later Owen C. Taylor purchased an interest with Messrs. Morris and McCall. In February of 1932 Morris sold his interest in the store and moved with his family to Memphis, Texas, where he purchased and operated a drug store for a few months. Believing in the future of Lamesa, he sold out there and returned to this city.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
 proposing an Amendment to Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas; changing the form of the oath of office for members of the Legislature and all officers of the State of Texas; providing for an election upon such Constitutional Amendment, and making an appropriation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
 Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:

"Article XVI. Section 1. Official Oath. Members of the Legislature, and all officers, before they enter upon the duties of their offices, shall take the following Oath or Affirmation: I do solemnly swear (or affirm), that I will faithfully execute the duties of the office of _____ of the State of Texas, and will to the best of my ability preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution and laws of the United States and of this State; and I furthermore solemnly swear (or affirm), that I have not directly nor indirectly paid, offered, or promised to pay, contributed, nor promised to contribute any money, or valuable things, or promised any public office or employment, as a reward for the giving or withholding a vote at the election at which I was elected. So help me God."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this state, qualified to vote on Constitutional Amendments, at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1938, at

Mail Schedule Is Changed July 1st

Beginning July 1, the local post office had quite a change in the mail, especially in the incoming parcel post mail, heretofore our parcel post mail came in on the train, but that has been changed and it all comes in on the bus from Big Spring, and supposed to arrive about 8:45 each morning. With this change it makes much better service especially for the rural patrons in that they get their parcels 24 hours earlier by the change, however it has made our mail run just a little later as you already know, of course, we would like to keep the mail running on the same schedule but it is impossible if we take all the mail out the day it comes in so for that reason the rural mail carriers as well as the city carriers have been delayed somewhat on account of the change.

This to the rural patrons, if you will have your letters stamped your packages ready for mailing when the carrier comes by and not delay him on his mail delivery it will help to get his round completed and in that way he will not be delayed in stopping to stamp your letters and prepare your packages for mailing.

Also if you will keep your mail box in good shape, and up the right height and make it just as convenient as possible for the carrier it will help us to expedite the mail service a lot. We will appreciate your hearty cooperation, if your box is not what and where it ought to be you should ask your carrier what it needs and place it there and you will see a change in the speed of the mail.

There is another change that would help and if the Road by your place is impassable during wet weather you should encourage your commissioner to repair it so that the carrier could go even during a rain, that is an awful handicap to the carrier, please cooperate in this respect.

If we will all keep this in mind and cooperate we will be able to give a lot better and quicker service than heretofore. —Owen C. Taylor, postmaster.

"For the Amendment of Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, changing the form of the oath of office for members of the Legislature and all officers of the State of Texas."

"AGAINST the Amendment of Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, changing the form of the oath of office for members of the Legislature and all officers of the State of Texas."

Each voter shall scratch out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against so as to indicate whether he is voting for or against said proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation ordering an election in conformity herewith to determine whether or not the proposed Constitutional Amendment set forth herein shall be adopted, and the Governor shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expense of such publication and election.

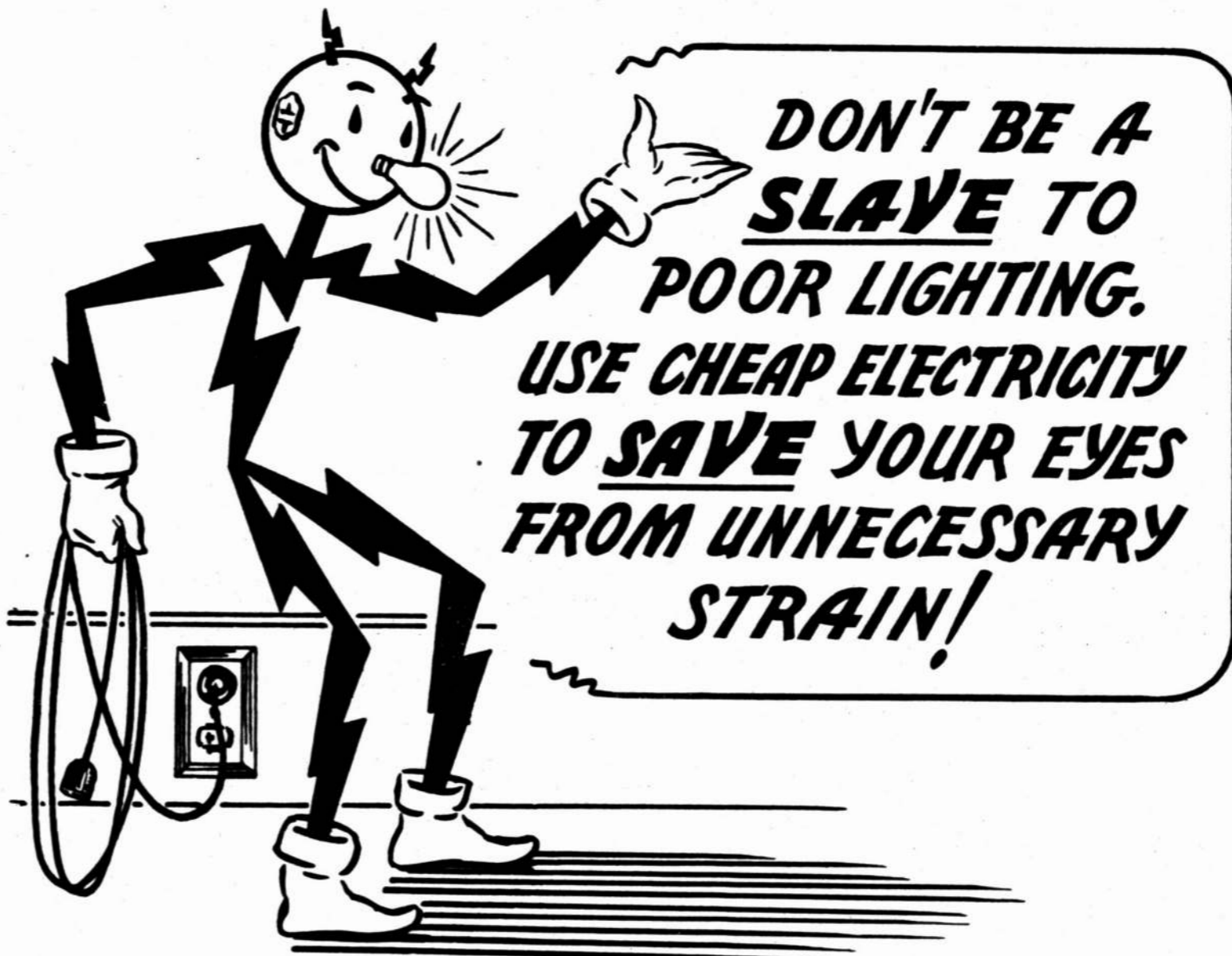

Gail Lad Drowns In Tank Near Home

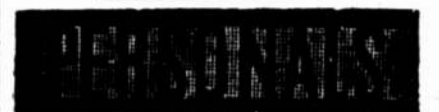

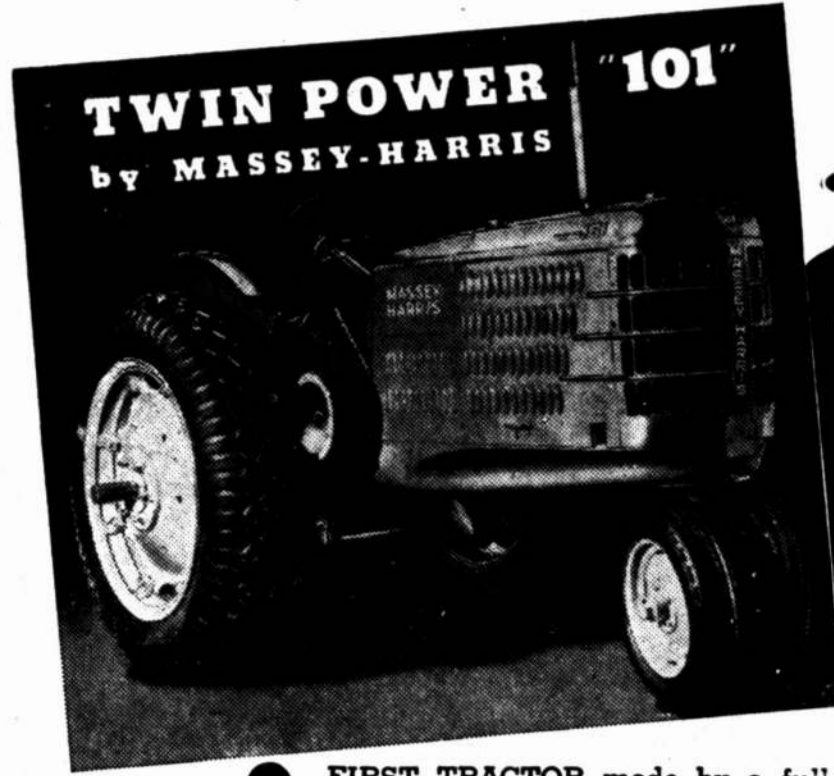

S.C.S Notes

"Erosion slowly but surely was stealing the productivity of my soil, and gradually had reduced my average cotton yield from one-half to one-fourth of a bale to the acre," says Peter Ballard, who owns a 640-acre farm three miles east of Newlin in Hall and Childers counties.

When Mr. Ballard first acquired this farm in 1891, he put 300 acres into cultivation for row crops. About 15 years ago, he put an additional 200 acres into cultivation. The farm borders on the Prairie Dog Town fork of the Red River, the soil being very sandy.

In the spring of 1937, Mr. Ballard consulted J. T. Reese, superintendent of the Soil Conservation Service CCC demonstration camp at Memphis about his erosion problem. A survey revealed that the land was being damaged severely by wind erosion and that deep gullies were being formed. It was this erosion that had been reducing the yields over a period of several years.

Aided by the Soil Conservation Service superintendent, Mr. Ballard worked out an erosion control program for his farm. Terraces were constructed on the 500 acres of cultivated land in the spring of 1937. Sudan grass was broadcast on the terraces, and cotton and sorghums were planted in strip crop pattern in alternate intervals between the terraces. Although rainfall was below normal in this area in 1937 Mr. Ballard harvested crops which were above the average.

"I attribute my good yields to the fact that the terraces had held all the water on my land where it fell," Mr. Ballard says. "The sudan grass on the terraces and the stubble left on the

field when the sorghums were harvested afforded protection for the cotton strips and practically eliminated wind erosion on my farm last spring."

Mr. Ballard plans to allow the sudan to reseed on the terraces each year. He believes it is a good practice to maintain a good cover on his terraces, and says his reseeding plan eliminates the necessity of replanting the structures every year.

In the spring of 1938, Mr. Ballard found that his field had plenty of moisture as a result of the terraces having held the water on the land where it fell. This year, he has planted cotton in strips where grain sorghums were grown last year, and sorghums in the cotton strips.

"I believe the terracing and strip crop program have eliminated wind erosion and gullying on my farm and that the increased yields will far more than offset the small expense involved in carrying out the soil and water conservation practices," Mr. Ballard says.

Dr. Cox Says:

Austin, Tex., Aug. 1.—The State Department of Health while approving slum clearance projects to prevent over crowding, and its attendant hazards, is at the same time housing over 135 employees on two thirds of one floor in the Land Office Building.

When questioned about this condition, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer stated that he knew that the working conditions were far from ideal but until the Legislature provided more space nothing will be done about it.

Dr. Cox said, further that the ideal solution would be the erection of a

building, in connection with the one already existing for the State Hygienic Laboratory. The state owns a quarter block of land at this location and also a PWA grant could be secured so that the actual cost for such a building would be very small.

At present the records of millions of vital statistics, birth and death records, are housed in the State Health Department offices and contribute a serious fire hazard. A new fireproof building would provide protection for over 5,000,000 records that may be needed by Texans to establish proof of birth or death. These records if destroyed could not be replaced for any amount of money.

Such an arrangement would give adequate space for the health department and provide badly needed housing space for some other State department.

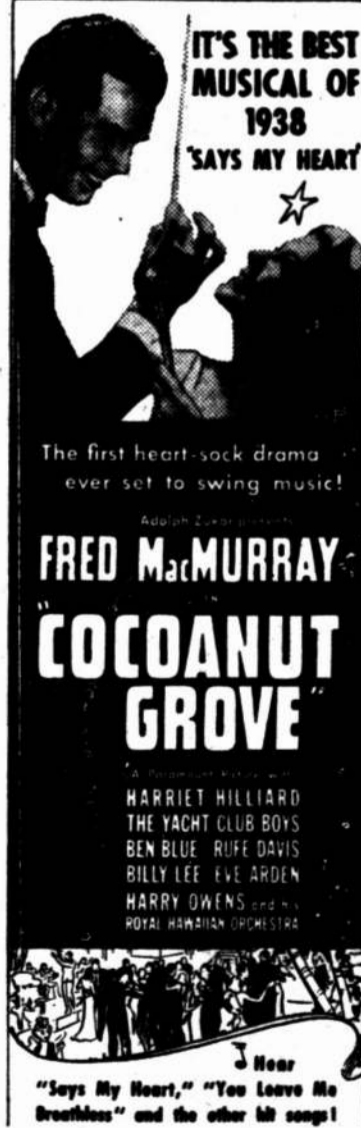

Texas Game Laws Given For The Protection Of Wild Life

Dove hunters of Texas will not be subjected to a series of conflicting regulations such as confused them last year, the Game Department announced.

Compared to those of last year, the 1938 regulations are fairly uniform.

Combined state and federal laws governing both mourning and white-winged doves provide the following open seasons:

white wings. The possession limit also ties of Yoakum, Terry, Lynn, Garza, Kent, Stonewall, Haskell, Throckmorton, Young, Jack, Wise, Denton, Collin and Hunt, all counties north thereof, and the counties of Parker, Tarrant, Dallas, Rockwall, Kaufman, Johnson, Hopkins, Delta, and Franklin.

In the remainder of the state the open season on both species is from Sept 15 to Nov. 15. Below the Texas-Mexican Railway in the Rio Grande Valley, however, only four days of shooting each week during the open season will be allowed on Tuesdays, Thursdays, Saturdays and Sundays—but this exception is not applicable to Webb and Zapata counties.

The hours for mourning and white-winged doves during the open seasons are from 7 a. m. to sunset.

Neither species may be shot with a weapon other than a shotgun, and it shall not be larger than No. 10 gage. If it is a repeating or automatic shotgun, it must be permanently plugged to a three-shell capacity.

The daily bag limit is 15 in the aggregate of both mourning doves and white wings. The possession limit also is 15 in the aggregate of both species.

Baiting of doves of either species is prohibited by federal regulations.

Under new federal migratory waterfowl regulations announced recently Texas duck hunters will have a 45-day open season this year compared to a 30-day open season in 1937; and in addition may shoot a limited number of species hitherto protected.

The open season on ducks and geese, Wilson's snipe or jacksnipe, and coot, is from No. 15 to Dec. 29.

The open season on rails and gallinules, except coot, is from Sept. 1 to Nov. 30.

Not only has the open season on ducks and geese been lengthened, but the possession limits have been doubled.

The bag limit on ducks, except the wood duck, is 10 in the aggregate of all kinds the same as last season, but the possession limit has been doubled to 20 in the aggregate.

This season hunters may take three canvasbacks, redheads, buffleheads or ruddy ducks in their daily bag, or an aggregate of three birds of the different species. The possession limit for these ducks is six of any single species, or in the aggregate.

The daily bag limit on geese and brant is five in the aggregate of all kinds, and the possession limit has been increased to 19 in the aggregate.

The daily bag limit on rails and gallinules, except sora and coot, is continued at 15 in the aggregate of all kinds. The possession limit is the same.

Bag limits for some of the other migratory game birds are: Sora, 15; Coot, 25; Wilson snipe or jacksnipe, 15. In each case the possession limit may

not exceed the daily bag limit. A new federal regulation added this year forbids the rallying of coot for hunting.

As was the case last year, waterfowl and coot may be hunted in season from 7 a. m. to 4 p. m.

Not more than two days' bag limit of lawfully taken and lawfully possessed ducks and geese may be transported in one calendar week. Transportation last season was limited to one day's bag.

Chief restrictions in this year's federal regulations that have been continued from last year are:

Baiting of waterfowl and doves and the use of live duck and goose decoys in hunting waterfowl are not authorized regardless of the distance between the bait or decoys and the shooter.

Three three-shell limit on repeating or automatic shotguns, in effect the last three seasons is continued. Hunters may shoot waterfowl with shotguns only, not larger than No. 10 gage.

Ross' geese, wood ducks and swans are still protected.

Miss Bulsterbaum Cites Approaching Transfer Dates

Miss Pauline Bulsterbaum, county superintendent, calls attention to the fact that all pupils who have finished the grades offered in their home district and who expect to attend school elsewhere should be transferred to the school of their choice. This is very important as the Attorney General's Department has recently ruled that county board transfers are not legal transfers so far as the Rural Aid Law is concerned.

Only those pupils who have been transferred by parent application through the county superintendent's office will constitute legal transfers, and the home district will not be reimbursed in rural aid for children attending school in other districts, if not transferred in the regular manner.

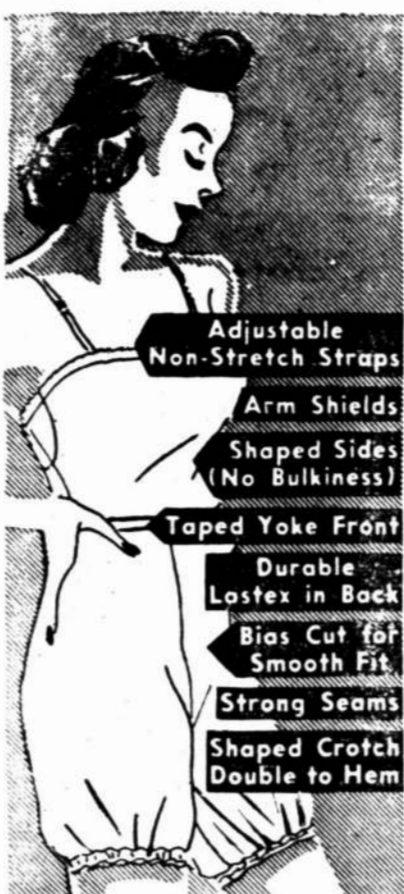
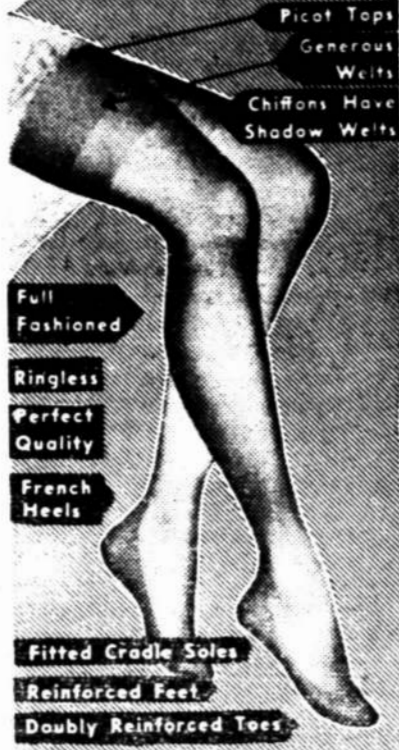

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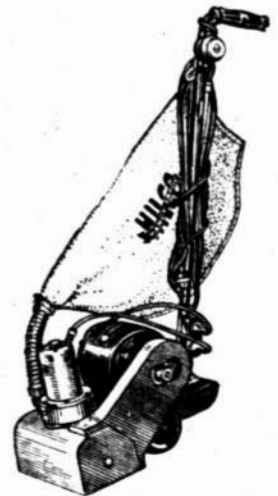
