BANK AT WHITE DEER ROBBED BY YOUTH

White Deer, March 16.—"I don't know why I did it," was said to be the only remark of Frank Crutchfield captured here today in the basement of the First National Bank following the robbery of that institution of nearly \$2,000, and for which Crutchfield is being held in the county jail at Panhandle awaiting a preliminary hearing there probably tomorrow.

He was captured in a hand-to-hand struggle when found hiding in the basement of the bank following the alarm of a hold-up given over the telephone by Miss Edith Simmons who had been locked in the vault.

Crutchfield, it was said is approaching 21 years old, and is the son of J. J. Crutchfield, well known farmer and rancher of that community. It is reported that at the time of the robbery he was at liberty under bond in connection with two burglary charges.—Amarillo News.

NEW TRAIN SCHEDULE NOW IN EFFECT

Starting on Monday morning of this week the east bound train on the Santa Fe leaves one hour earlier than the former time. The departing time is now 8:45, arriving at Shattuck at 12:30 in time to catch the new west bound train on the main line which leaves Shattuck at 2:22 p. m. The west bound train arrives at the same old time, 1:35 p. m. The new east bound train on the main line leaves Shattuck at 1:10 a. m. The other trains on the main line, No. 22, East bound, and No. 21, West bound, depart at the same time as before, 4:30 p. m. and 1:10 a. m.

H. C. 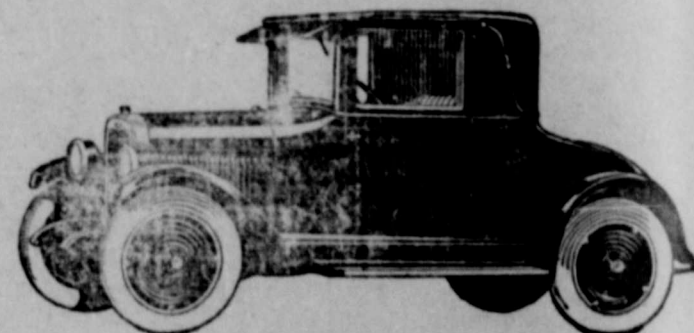

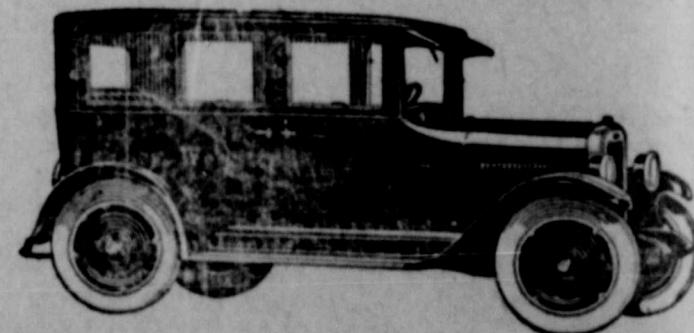

CONGRESSMEN AS CHURCH MEMBERS

More than 90 per cent of the members of the incoming Congress are adherents of some religious denomination, according to the Board of Temperance, Prohibition and Public Morals of the Methodist Episcopal Church in an investigation which has lately received wide publicity in the newspapers. Methodists lead in both the House and the Senate, says the statement, with Presbyterians and Episcopalians following closely. After them in order come Baptists, Congregationalists, and Roman Catholics. There are no Hebrews in the Senate, and eight in the House. Here is the summary of Congress affiliations as given to the press:

Southern members are mostly Episcopalian, Methodist, Baptist and Presbyterian, according to the report. From the East come Episcopalians, Congregationalists, Catholics and Jews. The Middle West is well represented in almost all denominations. According to the Washington Evening Star, the Board furnishes us this additional information:

"If members of fraternities which require belief in God are taken into consideration, the number of lawmakers who have professed religious conviction will be found still greater. There are 304 Masons in the House and 65 in the Senate. Ninety-eight Representatives are Knights of Pythias, and there are 13 Knights in the Senate. The Odd Fellows have 74 Representatives and 7 Senators. Of the 35 men in the House of Representatives with no religious affiliation, 23 are Masons and 2 are Pythians, while of the 7 whose religious affiliations are unstated, 4 are Masons. The 10 Senators with no religious affiliations include 6 Masons, and all 3 of those whose religious affiliations are unstated are Masons.—Literary Digest.

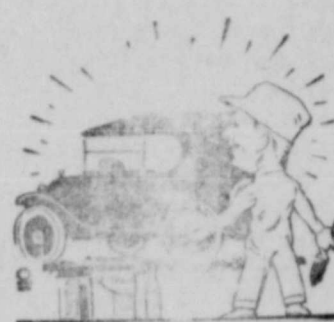

AGRICULTURAL NEWS

AGRICULTURAL OUTLOOK FOR 1925 IS ENCOURAGING

The general outlook for American agriculture is fairly encouraging this year as compared with recent years, although there may be a slackening of domestic demand for farm products next winter, according to the annual outlook report of the United States Department of Agriculture issued last week.

Producers of the major farm products such as cotton and wheat are advised by the department to follow about the same program of production as last year. Increased acreages

of these crops are not advisable this year, the department says.

"General business prosperity during the first half of this year will maintain the domestic demand for the 1924 farm products yet to be marketed and should stimulate the demand for the better grades of certain farm products.

"It is not assured, however, that the industrial improvement of the first half of 1925 will continue into 1926 at the same high level, and should there be a reduction in business activity as a result of overstimulation of business, a slackened demand for some of the 1925 crops may be expected.

The foreign market for most American farm products promises to be as good as last year. The European economic situation is distinctly brighter than it was a year ago. The short grain crops in 1924 coupled with higher purchasing power in industrial centers and better facilities for financing imports are favorable for continued sales of American wheat and rye, at least until the next harvest. Despite increased prices, the demand for American pork products in Germany has continued strong.

"From present indications ample credit for farming purposes will be available in most regions of the United States on more favorable terms. Interest rates are now somewhat lower than in recent years and credit needed should be arranged for early this season. Additional credit for production purposes, however, should not be used unless there is fair prospect of increasing the net farm income, or unless essential to bring about sound diversification.

"The present tendency in industry points to stronger competition for farm labor during the spring and summer of 1925 than prevailed during 1924." From present indications little change in farm equipment and upkeep costs are to be expected.

On a twelve day test, I began with 70 head of hogs weighing 7880 lbs. and during this time, I added as I bought them 70 head weighing 7715 lbs. making a total of 140 head weighing 16,495 lbs. After feeding them 7500 lbs. milo chops costing \$2.00 per 100 lbs. or \$150.00 and 1500 lbs. of Pig Chow at \$3.50 per 100 lbs. or \$52.50 making a total cost of feed of \$202.50, I weighed the bunch and found that they had made a gain of

2435 lbs. Cost of gain per 100 lbs. was \$3.32 1/2.

HOW TO FIGHT OUT WORM

It is unlikely that there will be extensive damage by cut worms this spring. These worms must feed during winter on weeds and grass growing in the fields. In most sections, because of the dry weather and the clean-up extensively practiced last fall, there has been no vegetation growing during the winter, and most of the worms have been starved.

It will be well, however, for the farmers to keep a sharp lookout, especially in fields where vegetation continued growth during winter and early spring. Should cut worms in numbers attack gardens, cotton, or other crops, poison bran mash should be used. This should be mixed in the following proportions:

Twenty-five pounds bran, one pound Paris green or white arsenic, six lemons using both juice and rinds after running through a fine meat chopper, two quarts cane molasses, water enough to thoroughly moisten without making sloppy.

Distribute along the rows in late afternoon, using a cotton planter with shoe removed, if an extensive acreage is to be covered.

OLDEST MASON AND AN OLD MAN

Dr. J. S. Halstead, of Breckenridge, Mo., known to a number of Elk City folks, is the oldest Mason in the United States and is probably the oldest man. Dr. Halstead passed his one hundred and seventh mile post the Fourth day of March. The local Masonic Lodge and the Mayor of the town of Breckenridge prepared everything and gave due observance to the centenarian's birthday. The following taken from the Breckenridge Bulletin will be of interest to those who know him. It will be interesting to also state that Dr. Halstead was at one time Henry Clay's family physician. The following is from the Breckenridge Bulletin:

At 107, Dr. Halstead seems to be in better health than he has been at other times since he reached his hundredth year. He is almost totally blind and is confined to his bed, but his hearing is fair, his voice is surprisingly strong, and his memory is remarkably clear for a man of more than a hundred years.

His time is spent in reviewing in memory the pictures of his long and fruitful life filled with many happy reminiscences and pleasant associations. When a visitor asked him what period of his life time stands out most vividly in memory, he replied at once, "My early boyhood."

He went on to relate his experience as a twelve year old boy working at odd jobs about a store in Lexington, Ky. His memory is clear in regard to the most minute particulars. The exact names, locations and street addresses are recalled readily as he tells of his activities as a boy and young man.

Although he is deprived of his sight, Dr. Halstead enjoys holding his visitor's hand and smiling to him in cordial welcome. He has not lost his sense of humor. Some of his frequent callers jest with him and hear his chuckle of appreciation.

To the people of Breckenridge, among whom the doctor has spent the greater part of his long life, he extends his deepest appreciation for their many kindnesses to him and expresses his high regard for their friendship. He cherishes the memory that in all his social relations and business transactions there has not been a harsh word or unfriendly feeling to mar the memories of the years that have passed.

He says he has found great pleasure in his activities in the Masonic Lodge. "I have the utmost confidence in the Masonic Order. I would like to see its principles and its ideals entirely ruling over our government. There would be no hatred, greed or cause for strife."

"Mine has been a domestic life. I have reared eight children to manhood and womanhood, educating them to meet the problems of life and teaching them to treat their fellowmen with fairness. I consider these the most important tasks that a man can perform on this earth."

"I have just about lived out my

time, I will go on some of it but I do not dread it. I have lived here in a way that, as the western horizon, I hold whatsoever." He is a perfect of a well spent life and a well earned faith.

Mrs. Halstead, who is 96, is hardly less remarkable than her husband. She is almost blind, but her eyesight, but is able to entertain the callers that come to see her.

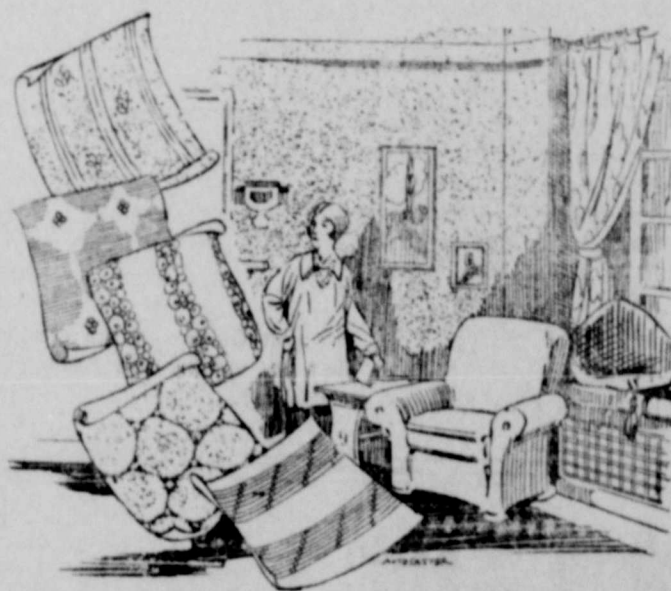

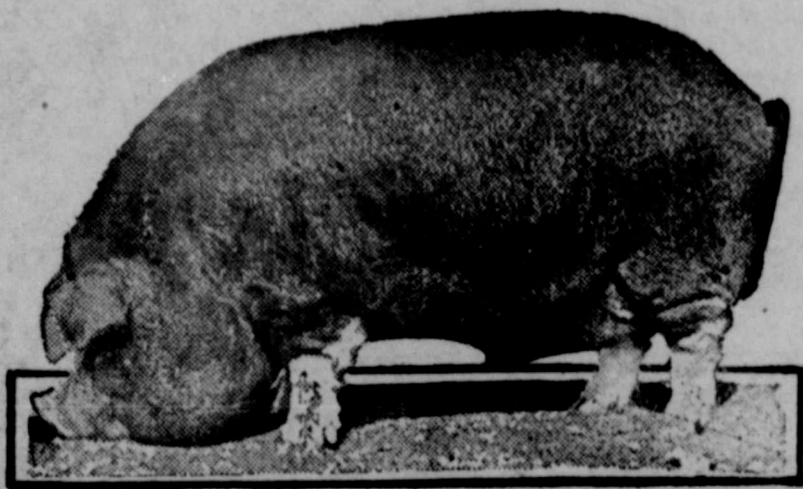

We have organized a Health and Manners Club in our school. Most of the black marks, so far, have been given for drinking coffee.

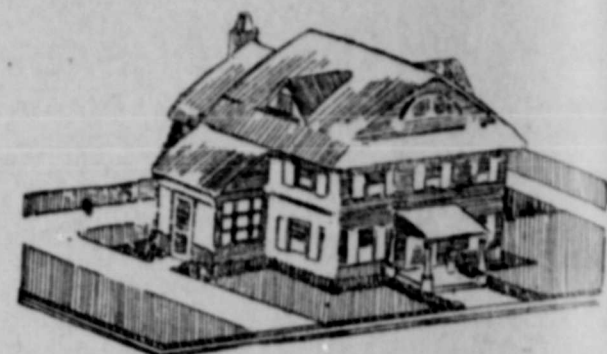

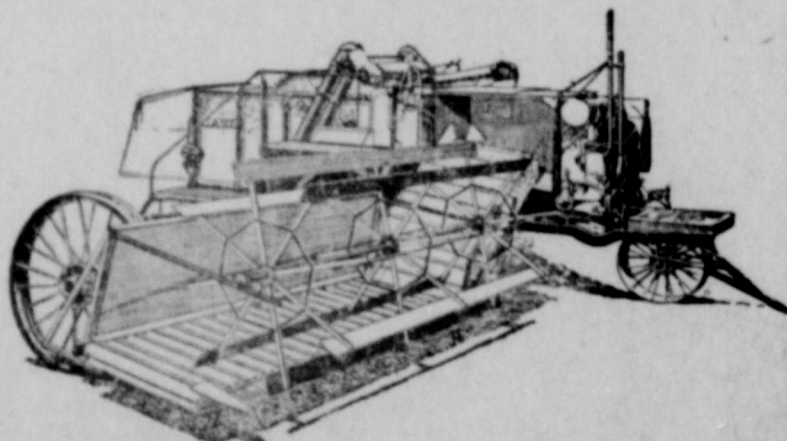
