



Republicans host Haywood in Muenster

The Cooke County Republican Party hosted a fundraiser lunch for Tom Haywood Sunday at the Muenster Knights of Columbus Hall. The guest of honor is challenging Steve Carriker for election to Texas State Senate District 30. Haywood, from Wichita Falls, carried the Muenster area in the last election but narrowly lost to Democrat Carriker over the whole district.

The challenger was introduced by master of ceremonies, Dan Hamric of Montague, a well-known Muenster native but now, as he said, "one of only about nine Republicans in all of Montague County."

Haywood said that he and Steve differed in a number of areas; family values, crime control, education regulation, the growth of government and in the willingness to get out to the people. "I want to serve everyone in the district and I'll go to any group to tell of the need for conservative government. That's just what I did when I attended a meeting of Cooke County Democrats earlier this year," Haywood received warm applause when he said he was proud to be

running as a Republican rather than a Clinton Democrat.

Sharing the spotlight with Tom Haywood and speaking for his campaign was Texas State Representative, Peggy Hamric of Houston District 126. Hamric is a former Republican organizer and worker who is now in her second term in office. She is married to Dan Hamric's brother, Bert.

"We need more conservative senators like Tom Haywood who believe in business and will represent you in the fight against crime and the fight to regain local control of our schools," she said. "Tom wants to make the sacrifice to serve you. Please invest in him."

Also speaking in support of Haywood was Texas State Republican Chairman Tom Pauken. He said that although he and President Clinton had both attended Georgetown University, he had no agreement with Clinton policies or Clinton-type policies in Texas. He said he made no apologies for his support of the right to life and his resentment of the anti-Christian and anti-Catholic comments of the U.S. Surgeon General. Pauken closed, "People sense the country is in

trouble and they want to make a difference. We have a fine man in Tom Haywood and he needs your commitment. The time has come to make government the servant, not the master."

Also attending the event, which filled the KC Hall upstairs, were Marcia Saunders, president of the Texas Federation of Republican Women; David Bridges, candidate for the 4th U.S. Congressional District; Sharon Keller and Terrie Livingston, candidates for the Court of Criminal Appeals and the 2nd Court of Criminal Appeals; Texas State Representative Mary Denny; Richard Denny, candidate for State Senate from East Texas.

Local Republican candidates attending were Paul Hesse, County Judge; Richard Brown, County Commissioner; Pat Payne, District Clerk; Robin Hacker and Dorothy Lewis, Justice of the Peace.

The meal was catered by the Hermes Sisters of Lindsay. Special organization help came from Angelo and LaVerna Nasche, Debbie and Doyle Hess and Pat Peale from the Cooke County Republican Party.

Pam Fette and Terry DeGarmo entertained with instrumentals on the classical guitar and flute. Fette also sang, accompanied by Ruth Felderhoff on the keyboard.

Tom Haywood offers leadership skills in race for state senator

Native Texan Tom Haywood, age 54, is seeking election to the office of State Senator for District 30. He is running on his record of leadership, service and achievement.

Haywood earned a BS, an MS, and a Ph.D. in physics. He taught physics at the University of North Texas in Denton and Midwestern State University in Wichita Falls. While at MSU, Tom was chosen to serve as the Director of University Affairs while continuing to work as an associate professor.

In 1979 Haywood accepted the position of Executive Director of the North Texas Oil and Gas Association (NTOGA). He led the NTOGA to be one of the most highly respected organizations of its kind in Texas. Currently Mr. Haywood is the owner and chief executive officer of his own business, a property tax appraisal and consulting firm in Wichita Falls.

Tom Haywood has demonstrated his leadership in his community by serving on the boards of directors for Crimestoppers, Drug Free North Texas, the Boy Scouts of America, the Texas Association of Business, and West Texas Children's Aid Society. He believes in strong family values and straight-forward conservative leadership.

About a year ago Mr. Haywood was diagnosed as having Parkinson's disease. In its early stages the disease might cause the mobility problems such as a slow, short walk; stooped shoulders, or general stiffness throughout the body, especially the extremities. It usually causes uncontrollable tremors in the patient's arms and legs.

Also a Parkinson patient might speak more slowly and appear sluggish, but with proper medical treatment the patient should be able to do anything that people can do.

"This really is a non-issue. The real issue is Steve Carriker and his record as a senator," Haywood was

quoted as saying in a story by Patrick Fortner published in the Times Record. Haywood is taking medication for his condition and has not suffered any side-effects from low dosage he is on. His condition is not deteriorating rapidly and his doctor told him that he is doing great.

Haywood speaks slowly due to the disease and finds it frustrating at times to think faster than he can express himself verbally, but doesn't view it as a major problem. Though his illness is a major inconvenience, Haywood feels that he will be able to represent the district should he be elected. Haywood referred to two well-known Parkinson's patients who are leading fairly normal lives, Rev. Billy Graham and U.S. Senator Robert Byrd.

Most recently Tom Haywood has been in Muenster to attend a fund raiser for his campaign held in the Muenster KC Hall last Sunday. He also attended the press conference held at Cooke County Electric Cooperative at which State Representative Ric Williamson announced his switch from the Democratic party to the Republican party.

Clarification made on indictment

There was no known connection between the incident and the Germanfest. The Enterprise regrets the error.

Chief Appraiser Fry resigns

Cooke County Appraisal District Chief Appraiser Ross Fry said he will resign Sept. 1, stating he can no longer be effective while facing one distraction after another.

Fry announced his resignation this week during the CCAD board's regular July meeting. The board made no comment on the resignation.

"This is a tremendous job here, and the only way it will work is the entities and board workers together," Fry said. He contended that he has been unable to work with Board Member Phyllis Murrill and at least two taxing entity heads, and that continued distractions have resulted in a staff morale problem.

"As far as you not liking what I'm doing, we have to comply with the law," Murrill said. "If you don't like what the law does, then go to the state and change it," she said. Earlier in the meeting, relating to another subject, Murrill told the board, "I think the chief appraiser needs an attitude adjustment."

The CCAD board last month hired an independent audit firm to investigate allegations of discrepancies in the tax rolls and collection records of the Cooke County Appraisal District. Don Rowlett, the auditor hired, reported to the board this week that he has been unable to analyze the tax and appraisal rolls due to problems he has had with computerized tapes provided to him by the appraisal district. CCAD Systems Analyst David Moore countered Rowlett's statement, contending that the problems were with Rowlett's computer system. "These are standard tapes, and we get them converted for people on a regular basis," Moore said.

Rowlett told the board there are other problems with the data, namely that 1993 values have been overlaid onto the 1994 tax rolls. CCAD officials said the overlay occurred because some data had been corrupted. "You're just running in the blind with this," Rowlett said since the records have been overlaid

and will not match. "This study may be a moot point," he said.

CCAD Board Member Sandra Curry said it might be possible for Rowlett to do some manual sampling if the computerized tapes don't work out. Rowlett said he would have to have a 10 to 15% sampling to be valid. He also said he has been able to obtain the mineral and some commercial appraisals which were done by outside firms and not the appraisal district, and that he will be analyzing those.

Rowlett said he has received three sets of records from the appraisal district so far, two of which he has been unable to use. The third set is being converted, and

Rowlett said he hopes these tapes will be usable. "I'm hoping, I'm praying, that these three tapes will clear this thing up," Rowlett said. Once he receives the proper data from the appraisal district, Rowlett said he should be able to give a final report by the board's Aug. 16 meeting.

Rowlett added that it would be a good idea for the CCAD to archive its appraisal and tax rolls for security reasons. Fry said the information is kept on microfiche, but Rowlett contended that microfiche could not provide a working computerized accessible copy in case someone wanted to go back and check records. CCAD still wrestling with internal issues

The Cooke County Appraisal District board of directors wrestled with a host of procedural issues during its regular board meeting along with the pending resignation of Chief Appraiser Ross Fry and an independent audit.

Cooke County resident Leon Haney addressed the board during the public comments section of the agenda with the complaint that he has been unable to secure a place on the agenda of any board meeting. CCAD President Tom Schad told Haney he could always address the board during the public comments section. CCAD Board member Phyllis Murrill said Haney should be allowed on the agenda if he has an item that requires the board to take action. By law, the board may not answer a speaker or take action during the public comments section

of the agenda. "Leon wanted on the main agenda to discuss an employee issue," Murrill said. "Dragging it on and assuming no responsibility does not get it done," she said to the board. Schad then recommended that Haney come before the board at the August meeting during the public comments section. Should the board decide that the issue needs action, then the board will place Haney on the agenda for the September meeting as a part of the regular agenda. Haney agreed to Schad's recommendation.

Another procedural issue also dealt with the agenda. Murrill took issue with how some agenda items were being placed or "edited" once they were submitted to the chief appraiser. "I just want some assurance that we can get it on the

School finance, budgeting and local taxes addressed

The last two articles have dealt with some of the particulars of school finance and one of the ways districts get additional state monies. State mandates and how they impact budgets was in one of the articles. I also discussed cutting costs and budgets. I would like to use all that as a springboard to look at the '94-'95 school year and the impact of school finance and budgeting on it.

A question was recently asked if taxes would ever level off and quit escalating. The perception, as of late, is that the rising tax rate is a given, year in and year out. While that has definitely been true three of the past four years for MISD, it is important to remember that we have been operating under three different systems of state finance the past four years. Each time the Legislature has initiated a new

system, it does at least two things to our district. It mandates a higher tax rate and the state has cut the amount of state money we receive. Because of the way state finance works under the latest legislation, a district does not get the money it earns through ADA, etc., in that school year - it is supposed to get its money the next year (well, this is the next year of the new plan and nobody knows for sure if that will totally be the case). This would be analogous to a man going to work every day for an entire year but not getting paid for all his work until the next year. In essence, the state is a year behind.

Now to respond to the perception mentioned above concerning rising tax rates. If the state doesn't change the system again during the next legislative session beginning in January, then some stability will return to our tax rate. However, as long as MISD is considered an

above-average wealth district, then state formulas will ensure that the local taxpayer continues to shoulder the burden of public school finance.

I would like to clarify a misconception that some folks have, particularly when taxes escalate. Some think there would be no school tax to pay if there were no public school in this district. That simply is not true. What would be true, in that situation, is that this school district would be annexed to or consolidated with another district and would assume the tax rate in that district. If we take that scenario and look around at our neighboring districts, two of the three have a higher tax rate. Regardless of where this district ended up, school taxes would be paid ... somewhere.

For 1994-'95, MISD is confronted with several concerns involving the financing of our schools. Our '94-'95 tax base is \$3,100,000 less than it

was last year, mostly due to a loss in minerals. Our projections for ADA, etc., and use of actual state property values for '94-'95 indicate this district should be getting, at least, \$60,000 more from the state than we are projected to get. If you remember the above example about state money being a year behind - this means MISD wouldn't get this money until the '95-'96 school year.

This is definitely true in this case, but even more to the point is that the state is using unreliable data ('93-'94 tax base instead of the '94-'95 figure) to project MISD's funding for '94-'95, hence, the \$60,000 shortfall.

If we take the \$60,000 shortfall (state officials have indicated there could be a partial adjustment and MISD could get part of that money but no promises were made; as a matter of fact, if this district could be assured of getting what it should

receive, then our tax rate probably would be no higher than our effective rate and our tax levy would remain the same) and the \$3.1 million loss in property value for '94-'95, then you can readily see MISD's concern. MISD's preliminary budget for '94-'95 is reflecting a 2-3% increase (this doesn't reflect Pre-K costs as they are subsidized by a grant from TDHS).

MISD has cut costs in a variety of ways to help keep the budget down but, as mentioned in previous articles, state mandates greatly hamper this outside of cutting programs and teachers. MISD is doing everything to generate more ADA (this gives us more state dollars), the district recently received a Pre-K grant from the Texas Department of Human Services. This grant allows us to serve three- and four-year-old youngsters in an off-campus

educational setting. Original figures showed the district generating an additional \$12-15 thousand after all is said and done. (Once again, we don't get this money until '95-'96). More importantly though, we are able to provide a foundation for these youngsters for future success in school.

As the board begins its season of deliberation on what impact the above is to have on taxes for '94-'95, taxpayers can be assured they will make sound decisions based on much of the information in this article. All districts face this same dilemma. It is interesting to note that most of the county schools have indicated that they will have to raise their taxes. MISD will not be exempt from that possibility.

I am, as always, willing to discuss finances and taxes or answer any questions I can - anywhere and anytime.

Council studies new well in greater depth

The Muenster City Council has held two special meetings in the last two weeks. They discussed the proposed new water well and other aspects of Muenster's water distribution system with a different engineer at each meeting.

Bill Pembroke of Rady and Associates came to the July 11 meeting. This metroplex engineering firm has done work for Muenster before for the water department and sewer department. Pembroke offered an engineering plan in several phases. An initial study phase would examine the current water system with attention to potential growth and demands by the years 2005 and 2015. Another phase would plan well number seven and its connection to the system. The third phase would

oversee the construction of the well lines and insure compliance with Texas Water Commission rules.

Pembroke gave a maximum cost estimate for engineering services of \$33,000 and explained that \$9,000 of that was for the first phase which was not needed if the city didn't want it now. Also the costs could be as much as 25 percent lower if everything went smoothly. The first phase would be needed if the city pursues building a new water tower on the north side of town. They discussed areas of savings, for example, since logged wells exist nearby, a test hole may not be needed.

The city hopes to contract with a local driller when the time comes. Numerous references to help and ideas given by Herky Biffle were

made.

On Monday, July 18, the council met with engineer Tim Morris of Sherman. Morris was not prepared to offer a plan and cost estimates. Now that he knows more of what the city wants, he promised to submit a proposal by the end of this month.

The council seems to want help in the state rules compliance area and let the staff and contractors handle certain parts of the job, and hopefully save some money. The engineers seemed to want to be more in charge.

After the meetings, the council said they probably would not solicit proposals from any other engineers and at the regular August meeting they would choose either Rady and Associates or Morris to work with.

Abbot Alfred Hoenig dies July 12 at age 82

Eucharist of Christian Burial was held for Retired Abbot Alfred Hoenig, OSB, in Corpus Christi Cathedral on Monday, July 18, 1994, at 10 a.m. with the Bishop of Corpus Christi as celebrant and more than 40 priests, monsignori and abbots present in the sanctuary, including Abbot Jerome Kodel of Subiaco Abbey, Subiaco, Arkansas.

The homily was delivered by Prior Gregory Yockey, OSB, of Corpus Christi Abbey. The Mass was sung by the Abbey choir and organist. Abbey priests and brothers were participants in the funeral liturgy.

Father Alfred Hoenig, first abbot of Corpus Christi Abbey, died Tuesday, July 12, in a Paris, Arkansas hospital while on a month's vacation.

Father Alfred, a native of Muenster, was born on May 22, 1912, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Aloys Hoenig, both deceased. He is one of nine children. He received his elementary education at Sacred Heart School in Muenster. Subsequently, he entered New Subiaco Abbey and Academy for his high school and seminary training. He made his religious vows on Sept. 15, 1932, and was ordained to the priesthood on May 26, 1938 by the late Bishop John B. Morris at St. Andrew Cathedral, Little Rock, Arkansas.

Father Alfred spent most of the years of his priesthood as a teacher, prefect and principal of Corpus Christi Academy. In 1959, he received his appointment as prior of the then Corpus Christi Priory. Then, on Sept. 2, 1961, the chapter of members of the Priory assembled and elected Prior Alfred the first abbot of Corpus Christi Abbey. Father Alfred received the abbatial blessing on Thursday, Nov. 23, 1961 by His Excellency Bishop Mariano Garriga, D.D., LL.D., former Bishop of Corpus Christi.

In early spring of 1974, Father Alfred presented his monastic chapter with a dream - a new monastery on a promontory overlooking the placid waters of Lake Corpus Christi. Difficulties ensued, many of them. There was opposition, much of it. But with unflinching faith and undaunted courage, Abbot Alfred pursued his dream.

Thanks to his determination and long hours of work, the dream is now a reality. A temporary fiberglass complex was built on the western bank of the lake. Some years later, the present monastery was built about a fourth of a mile distant from the former monastery complex. The fiberglass complex is now the abbey's retreat center.

Father Alfred resigned as abbot on May 22, 1987. After his resignation, he did parish work, principally at St. Michael's Church in Cuero, Texas. On Sept. 12, 1990, Father Alfred became the chaplain at the motherhouse of the Sisters of the Incarnate Word Blessed Sacrament in Victoria, Texas. He held this position until his death. He was much beloved by the sisters and will be sorely missed by them. Twenty-one attended from Victoria and 20 from Corpus Christi.

Survivors include two brothers, Joe Hoenig and Tony Hoenig of Muenster; and four sisters, Mrs. Marie Vogel and Mrs. Tillie Otto of

Muenster, Mrs. Emma Fetsch of Rhineland and Mrs. Clara Stanley of Seagraves. He was preceded in death by a brother and a sister, Mr. Alphonse Hoenig and Miss Anna Hoenig.

Solemn Evening Prayer followed by the recitation of the rosary was celebrated at Corpus Christi Cathedral on Sunday, July 17, at 7 p.m. Mass of Christian Burial was celebrated at Corpus Christi Cathedral on Monday, July 18, at 10 a.m. Solemn Evening Prayer, followed by interment, was at Corpus Christi Abbey Mausoleum at Lagarto, Arrowhead Subdivision, on Monday, July 18, at 3 p.m.

Arrangements were under the direction of the Maxwell P. Dunne Funeral Service, Inc. of Corpus Christi.

Among local relatives attending were Joe Hoenig of Muenster, Rupert and Jeanne Hoenig of Lake Kiowa, Eleanor Pelzel of Ennis, Edna Mae and Richard Hermes of Lindsay, Rita Cottle of Carrollton, Tony and Aileen Hoenig of Muenster, Marie Vogel of Muenster, Helen Patel of Fort Worth, Claude Vogel of Muenster, Jeanne Parker of Plano, Tillie Otto of Muenster, Dollie Gilley of Dallas, Jim Otto of Cedar Hill, Emma and Leo Fetsch of Rhineland, Jimmy Fetsch of Shreveport, Louisiana and Clara Stanley of Seagraves.

Their treasured memories of their brother and uncle are many: Abbot Alfred officiated at the weddings of Tony and Aileen Hoenig, Marie and Theo Vogel, Alphonse and Ida Hoenig, Emma and Leo Fetsch, and Janice (Vogel) and Karl Browning. He also officiated at Janice's baptism and her daughter, Laura Browning's, baptism. At Subiaco, he was active in sports and excelled in music, playing the trombone and the violin.

Father Alfred Hoenig celebrated his First Mass in Muenster on June 1, 1938 and his First Mass in Muenster after being named Abbot, on New Year's Day, 1962. Both events were accompanied by parish receptions in his hometown. He celebrated his Silver Jubilee with a Mass of Thanksgiving in Sacred Heart Church on July 4, 1963. On Nov. 1, 1988, at 5 p.m. Abbot Alfred Hoenig celebrated his Golden Jubilee Mass in Sacred Heart Church with a reception for the whole parish.

He was held in high esteem by many hundreds of friends all over the states. On this last vacation trip, he had visited many friends and was enroute to include more when he became ill of a heart ailment, and was hospitalized. He died in a hospital in Paris, Arkansas.

Muenster ISD approves Pre-K program

The Muenster School District will offer a pre-kindergarten program this fall after trustees approved contracts to get the program underway during their regular July board meeting.

The board approved a contract with the Texas Department of Human Services, Child Care Management Services and with Tender Loving Care Daycare Center in connection with the pre-kindergarten instructional program for 1994-1995. The TDHS is providing grant money to fund the program while Child Care Management Services will administer the program. The Tender Loving Care Center will be the care provider for approximately 30 children, Muenster Superintendent Steve Cooper said.

In another matter, trustees hired Kyle Leath as the new high school varsity basketball coach replacing

Brian Strother. Leath has been a varsity assistant coach in the Callisburg ISD for the past two years and is a former longtime trainer for the Dallas Mavericks. Cooper said it will be of great value to have a certified trainer on staff, something that small school districts are generally unable to afford. Leath will also be an assistant football and track coach. The board also hired Patrick Dietz, a Gainesville native, as the new band director. Cooper said Dietz, a graduate of the University of North Texas, comes highly recommended.

In other business, the school board:

--Discussed projected finances for the last part of August and projections for next year's budget. Cooper said the state is using 1993-1994 property values to calculate next year's state funding, so the district won't be getting about \$60,000 it would otherwise be

getting if everything were calculated on present values.

--Reviewed the superintendent's growth plan for 1993-1994 and for 1994-1995 as mandated by the state. The plan outlines goals and objectives that the superintendent will be seeking each year. A major focus last year was for Cooper to get more involved with the changing financial situation at the Texas Education Agency.

--Approved local policy reviews, primarily dealing with sexual harassment.

--Approved awarding some credit for the new class schedule. The new requirements mandate that a student take at least one computer course, including this coming year's seniors. A half credit will also be awarded for cheerleading and marching band as part of physical education.

--Officially accepted the resignation of Coach Strother.

Lindsay ISD receives satellite grant

The Lindsay school district has received notice that it will receive a \$13,200 grant for the installation of a satellite dish that will provide educational programming.

School trustees learned of the state grant during the board's regular July meeting. The satellite dish will allow the district to download programming from the Texas Education Agency and from other areas, Superintendent Gilbert

Hermes said.

Hermes also reported that the district will be receiving \$7,500 from Rural-Vision South, Inc., which is planning to build a television tower in the Rosston area. The company will use the tower for programming between 5 and 8 p.m., while the school district will be able to access educational television during the day. No timeline has been set for the beginning of either project, Hermes said.

In other business, school trustees:

--Accepted revisions to the site-based decision making plan, which is an ongoing process of long-range planning over a five-year period.

--Reviewed the preliminary budget of the Cooke County Appraisal District, but took no action.

--Awarded a bid to Sysco Foods to provide food products to the cafeteria for 1994-1995.

agenda," she said. "I don't want Ross (Fry) editing me if he doesn't agree with me."

After a lengthy discussion, the board voted unanimously on a new procedure for board members placing items on the agenda. Any CCAD board member may submit an item to Chairman Schad, or in his place vice chairman Arthur Felderhoff for inclusion on the agenda. The items will then be given to the chief appraiser to be placed on the agenda.

district was buying lunches for the members of the Appraisal Review Board, the board which hears taxpayer protests. "I'm concerned about a conflict of interest here," Murrill said. "If somebody bought me lunch, I would wonder what they wanted."

Fry said it has been traditional for the CCAD to purchase lunches for ARB members. Murrill said the ARB members receive \$100 day for their service plus mileage. It was unclear whether the law covers expenses for meals. The board will look into the situation further before making a decision.

to keep a minimum of five years of history," he said.

North Central Texas College President Ronnie Glasscock told the board he has been unable to receive a timely certified tax roll upon which the college calculates its property tax rate, which generates a portion of the revenue to fund the college budget. "Frankly, I'm frustrated," Glasscock said. "I feel it's sloppy management. I've got a faculty coming in Aug. 18 and payrolls to make," he said. "He (Fry) said he could certify 95 percent of the roll by July 25, but 95 percent does me no good."

Appraisal Review Board hearings are still underway at the appraisal district and are not expected to be completed until around Aug. 10, Fry

said. The CCAD has received about 400 taxpayer protests, hearing about 25 taxpayers per day, he said. The CCAD by law must certify a tax roll by July 25, but Fry said due to the hearings, the roll can only be certified as 95 percent complete, which is allowable under the law. "That's as good as I can do," he said.

Callisburg ISD Superintendent Mac Hewlett last month told the board of his district's problems with the CCAD tax roll figures regarding over 65 tax exemptions, which are supposed to be frozen. He told the board tax roll discrepancies forced his district's school trustees to set last year's tax rate based on two different figures.

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TO YOUR HEALTH

Heat can be dangerous, especially during Texas summers. Heat cramps, heat exhaustion, and heat stroke are some of the serious conditions that can occur when the body's cooling system is overworked and begins to break down. When this happens the body temperature can rise to dangerous levels.

In a normal year about 175 Americans succumb to the demands of summer heat, according to the National Weather Service (NWS).

Because of this hazard the NWS has devised the "Heat Index" (HI). The HI, given in degrees F, is an accurate measure of how it really feels when relative humidity (RH) is added to the actual air temperature.

NWS warns that HI values were devised for shady, light wind conditions and exposure to full sunshine can increase HI values up to 15°F. Also, strong winds, particularly with very hot, dry air, can be extremely dangerous. The NWS typically calculates HI values during the summer and alerts the public of the risks and dangers of exposure to heat through Special Weather Statements or Public Information Statements.

People who work outside on hot days aren't the only ones who should be concerned. Anyone who works in a hot, humid environment, indoors or out, or works wearing some kinds of total-body protective clothing could be at risk to develop heat-related illnesses.

Heat cramps are the least serious of the heat-related problems. They occur when the body fails to replace salt lost during sweating. Heat cramps can cause painful muscle spasms, usually in the legs, arms, and stomach. To treat heat cramps, gently massage the cramped muscles, and drink half a glass of salt water every 15 minutes for an hour.

Heat exhaustion, caused when the body loses more fluid through sweating than it takes in, is a more serious illness. People suffering from heat exhaustion will still sweat, but they may also feel weak, dizzy, or nauseated, and may get a headache. To treat heat exhaustion: sip water; lie down with feet raised; move to an air conditioned room;

and apply cold compresses to the body. If symptoms persist or get worse, seek medical attention.

Heat stroke or sunstroke is very serious and can be fatal if not treated immediately. Symptoms include a body temperature of 103° or more, confusion, convulsions, delirium, and possibly, unconsciousness. When heat stroke is suspected, call an ambulance immediately. While waiting for the ambulance, move the person to a cool room if possible and sponge their body with cool water or rubbing alcohol.

Should the government control Texas schools?

"By aligning Texas schools with the controversial federal Goals 2000 program, the Long Range Planning Committee of the State Board of Education (SBOE) is giving control of our local schools over to a new federal bureaucracy and removing authority from parents and locally elected school boards," said SBOE candidate Richard Watson.

According to Watson, "The SBOE Long Range Planning Committee seems willing to give up the very things that Texans consider important in education, namely, local control of schools and parental rights over a child's education."

The Goals 2000 program and accompanying legislation moves the system in the direction of a federal board of education, a federally approved curriculum, federal teacher certification, and deferral mandates upon schools across the nation.

Goals 2000 also opens the door for expanded social services in the schools and the implementation of controversial Outcome Based Education. "Concerned citizens may call the Texas Education Agency at 512-463-8985 to voice their opposition to the Goals 2000 program," Watson concluded.

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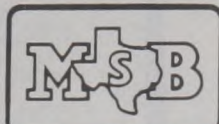

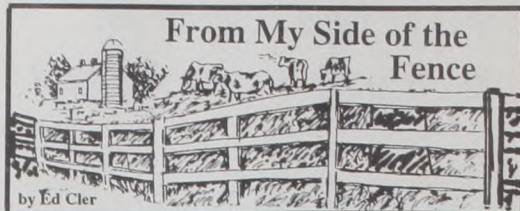

A Social Security message for brides-to-be

It's the time of year when many brides-to-be are busy with a list of "things to do" before their wedding. The Social Security Administration (SSA) would like them to add one important, but easily-managed item, to that list.

For women who are working, reporting a name change assures that they will receive proper credit for their earnings and, one day, all the Social Security benefits they are due. For women who don't work outside the home, reporting the change will ensure that their Social Security record shows the correct name when the time comes to apply for benefits.

Another important reason to report your change of name is that Internal Revenue Service and SSA records should show the same name and Social Security number. If they don't, your tax refund could be postponed.

To report a name change, call Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213, any business day between 8 a.m. and 7 p.m., or call or visit your local Social Security office.

Jones reminds everyone that the service is free. "Don't be misled by any business that offers - for a fee - to complete the paperwork for you. The process is simple and you don't need to pay anyone for a revised Social Security card."

Prices plunge for feeders, consumer prices slower

Prices to cattle feeders have plunged, but prices to consumers haven't. A cattle markets expert, however, says both groups may see good news in the next several months.

"We'll have to slowly eat our way out of this glut," said Dr. Ernest Davis, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"The price to consumers is higher than it should be, and given the fundamentals, the price to cattle producers is about \$5 a hundredweight (cwt.) lower than it should be," he said.

From July 1993 until May 1994, there were the largest numbers of cattle on feed in the past 20 years.

The number of cattle put on feed in May across the seven states is down 22 percent from May of last year, the lowest May placements since 1976, according to the June U.S. Department of Agriculture's "Cattle on Feed" report.

These large numbers of cattle on feed, plus heavy slaughter weights, caused the price that cattle feeders were getting to drop to about \$62 per cwt. It rebounded slightly to about \$65 cwt., but feeders, who had held cattle back for a better market, finally had to sell overweight cattle. Those cattle were penalized for being too fleshy and were bringing only \$60 per cwt.

"To be fair, processors have to cut fat from the cattle to meet the demands of the diet-conscious consumer, and that makes them less enthusiastic about buying cattle that are too fat," he said.

Retailers, who also are buying their cattle at a discount, haven't passed these savings along to consumers.

Retail prices, which at \$2.88 per pound for choice beef, are 16 cents lower than a year ago but only 1 cent lower than the average price for April.

"(Retailers) are always slow to lower prices, but on the other hand, they're slow to raise prices even when their margins are narrow," he said.

The Beef Industry Council is hoping, however, that its new beef coupon clipping campaign, which began June 15, will encourage more retailers to get in the spirit and lower prices.

Additionally, Davis said, "There's a light at the end of the tunnel," for cattle feeders. "Prices should rebound to the low- and mid-70's (cwt.) by the end of the year for fed cattle."

TDA begins private applicator inspections in July

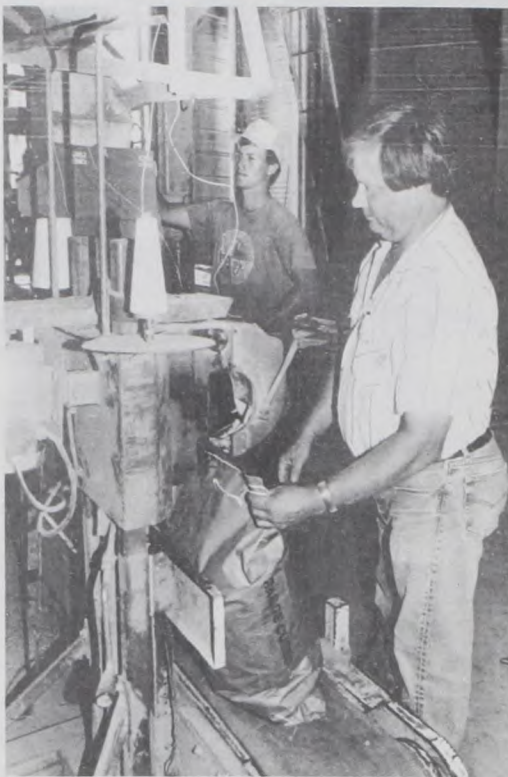
The Texas Department of Agriculture has entered into an agreement with the Agriculture Marketing Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture to conduct compliance assistance inspections of private applicator records. The inspections will be randomly divided and include all regions of the state.

The 1990 Farm Bill requires private applicators to keep records of federal restricted use pesticides for two years. Within 30 days after application, a private applicator must have written records of:

- the brand name or product name of the federal restricted use pesticide and its EPA registration number (pesticides include herbicides, fungicides and insecticides);
- the total amount of the product used, not the quantity after water or other substances were added;
- the size of the area treated in a unit of measure such as acre, linear foot, number of animals, etc.;
- the crop, commodity, stored product or site to which the application was made;
- the specific location of the application;
- the month, date and year of the application; and
- the name and certificate or license number of the applicator or applicator's supervisor.

Feedlot manure offers compost and disposal

It can be economical for farmers to use composted feedlot manure on their crops, according to Kansas State University researchers.

"We can't make general recommendations based solely on this one limited study," said Jeffery Williams, professor of agricultural economics. "However, it does show that some use of compost is economically viable, given the right circumstances."

From a farmer's point of view, animal manure can be a valuable fertilizer, said Alan Schlegel, research agronomist. It has important soil-building characteristics, as well as many vital nutrients.

Applying it to cropland also provides feedlot owners an avenue for disposal of their waste, Schlegel added.

Composting the manure increases its value.

"Composting reduces the moisture content of raw manure," Schlegel said. "With less moisture, the manure is less expensive to transport and easier to apply."

Composted manure also has fewer weed seeds and

less odor.

When compared to chemical fertilizer, however, is composted manure cost-effective?

The researcher's economic analysis compared composted manure to chemical fertilizer as the source of nitrogen for irrigated grain sorghum. The analysis used yield data from a research study Schlegel conducted in western Kansas.

Using this data, Williams estimated the economically optimal combination of compost and chemical fertilizer to use on irrigated grain sorghum.

"We looked at maximizing net returns, not maximum yield," Williams said.

Net returns are the profits from the sale of the crop, minus the costs involved in producing the

When fertilizer and compost were kept at their lowest costs, the optimal combination was 110 pounds of fertilizer and 1 1/2 tons of compost per acre, Williams said. But when the cost of the compost rose to \$9.50 a ton (a rate within the current price range) it was not viable to use compost.

Children living on farms, ranches face special risks

Growing up on a farm or ranch can be a rewarding experience, but it also carries risks not normally associated with childhood.

Eighteen percent of Texas farm and ranch fatalities in 1990, the latest year figures are available, involved children 16 years and younger.

Heavy machinery, while essential to agricultural production, presents special dangers to children who live and play around it. One study found three out of four fatal accidents were caused by tractors or other farm machinery.

Potential hazards also include pesticides, electricity, fire, ponds, silos and manure storage pits.

Farmers and ranchers should set aside time with their children to discuss and demonstrate these and other risks. The following suggestions are given to prevent accidents:

- Never allow a child on a tractor as an extra rider.
- Set aside a special outdoor play area away from farm equipment, stock ponds, chemicals and livestock.
- Assign work chores on the basis of a child's age and maturity. Instilled early with the work ethic, farm children often take on responsibilities beyond their years that may jeopardize their safety.
- Store pesticides and other toxic chemicals in their original containers under lock and key. Store fertilizer and treated seed securely.
- Ensure that young people who

drive tractors or operate other farm machinery are adequately trained. The State Association of Young Farmers of Texas offers driving safety courses in some communities.

• Above all, be a positive role model. Children imitate what they see. Farmers and ranchers who observe safety precautions are likely to have children who also observe them.

County Agent's Report

PASTURE AND CROPLAND SOIL SAMPLING WEEK - AUGUST 1-11

Fertilizer costs can represent over one-half of the early pre-harvest cost of some pasture and hay crops. In many crops, this cost can be as high as one-third of the total economic input. Many producers tend to decrease or eliminate fertilizer in tight economic times, but elimination of fertilizer can be a very expensive decision.

A special Soil Testing Initiative will be conducted in Cooke County for pasture and crop producers from Aug. 1 until Aug. 11. Dr. Larry Unruh, Extension Soils Chemist, is offering county producers a special soil analysis service during this two week long period. Producers must take their soil samples and deliver them to the County Extension Office or one of the cooperating fertilizer dealers in Cooke County by Aug. 11. Fee for this service will include \$5 for the routine analysis (pH, NO₃-, P, K, Ca, Mg, Na, S, & Salinity), or the routine analysis plus micro-nutrients (Zn, Fe, Cu, Mn) for \$7. This is a 50 percent savings to those producers who participate during the two week long soil fertility incentive.

Those fertilizer dealers participating include Tony's Seed and Fertilizer at Gainesville, Tony's Seed and Fertilizer at Muenster, Red River Farm Co-Op at Gainesville, W.B. Hudspeth, Inc. at Era,

and Sicking Brothers Fertilizer at Myra.

Producers can pick up a soil sample information form and soil sample sacks at any of the fertilizer dealer locations or the County Extension Office. Your payment for the sample must be in check form and must accompany the soil sample. Checks should be made out to Soil Testing. Do not send cash.

Producers should take a single composite sample from each uniform area of 10 to 40 acres in a field. One sample can represent up to 40 acres. A procedure for taking soil samples is listed on the soil sample information form.

With the increased need for proper fertility along with the cost of fertilization, producers need to regularly soil test their pastures and fields. Information gained from soil testing will help both producers and fertilizer dealers in better meeting your pasture and field crop needs.

When taking soil samples, observe these simple precautions.

- 1) Avoid sampling spots in the field such as small gullies, slight depressions, terrace waterways and unusual spots.
- 2) When sampling fertilized fields, avoid sampling directly in fertilized band.
- 3) Do not use old vegetable cans, tobacco cans, match boxes, etc. to submit samples.
- 4) Do not use heat to dry samples.
- 5) Be sure to keep a record for yourself as to the area represented by each sample.
- 6) Be sure sample numbers on the boxes correspond with sample numbers on the information sheet.
