

Steel Postpones Strike

PITTSBURGH, Pa. Sept. 22. (AP)—CIO steelworkers today postponed for another week the nationwide steel strike set for Saturday midnight. They accepted President Truman's plea for extension of the strike truce until 12:01 a. m. October 1 to permit renewed contract talks. Wildcat walkouts already had shut down two Pittsburgh steel plants and idled 2400 workers.

Storm Warnings Reduced

HOUSTON, Sept. 22. (AP)—Storm warnings were reduced today to 80-mile area from Ft. O'Connor to Freeport, replacing hurricane warnings that had flown since yesterday afternoon from Corpus Christi to Freeport.

At 10 a. m. the storm was 160 miles south-southeast of Galveston with winds only 35 miles an hour.

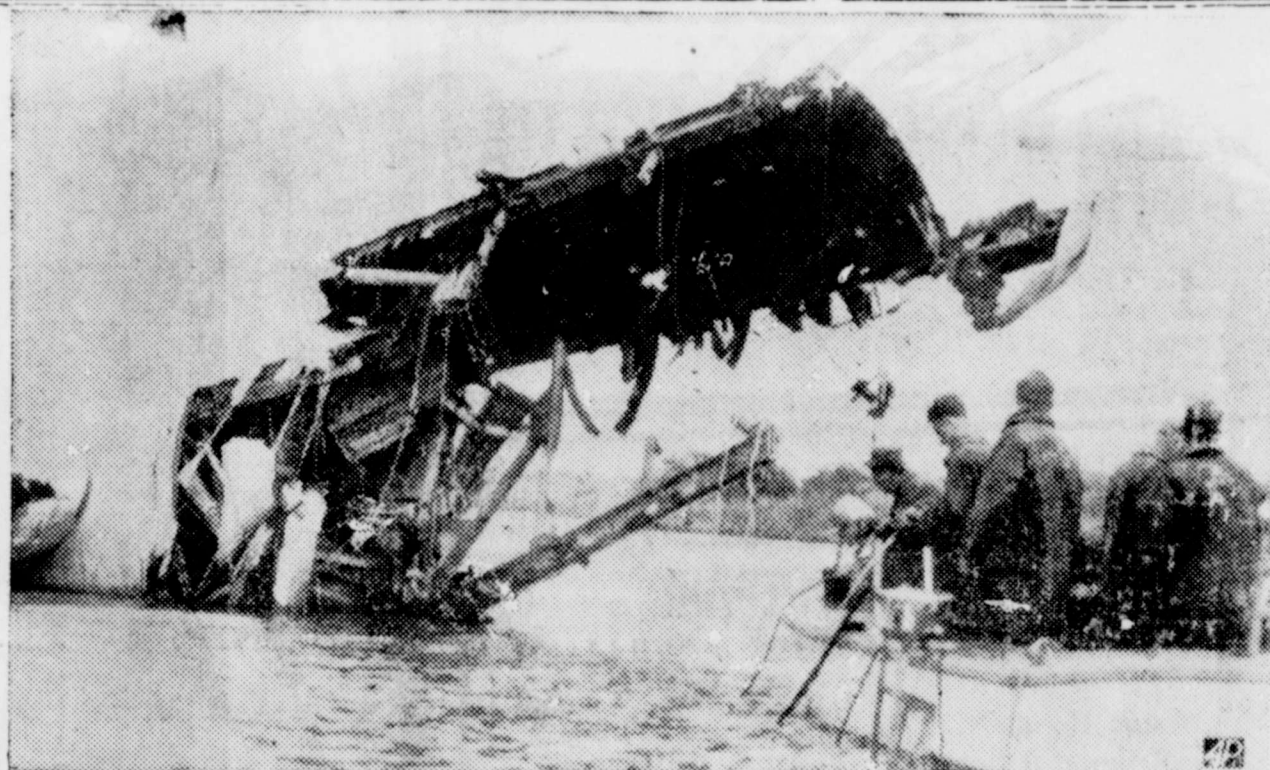

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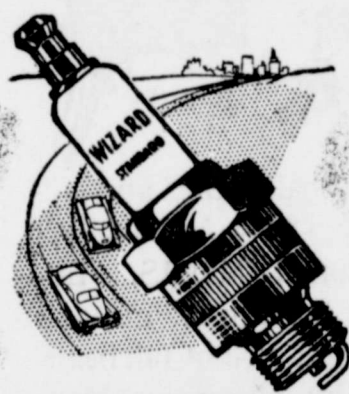

THE GATESVILLE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE. . . needs to adopt a long range program of work through committee recommendations and a Community Clinic. A Community Clinic is nothing more than a round table get together whereby the membership is divided into group meetings for the discussion of plans, business and program. For the meetings the membership is arbitrarily divided into groups without regard to vocation or supposed interests.

At each meeting, the chairman explains the nature of the meeting, and the president or manager discusses what the Chamber of

Commerce can and cannot do and how the program of work will be carried out. To each one present is then handed a memo bearing two or more questions, such as:

1. What do you expect the C. of C. to do for the promotion of your own line of business or activity?
2. What, in your opinion, as a citizen, is the thing of first importance to be done for the good of the community as a whole?

Each one present is then called upon to state his ideas. I believe that each member of the organization should have the opportunity to express his views at an open meeting, provided, of course, he doesn't use this opportunity to vent his personal spleen upon one individual or group of individuals. Constructive criticism is another matter all together.

Every Chamber of Commerce is something of an opportunist in dealing with current problems. It must be quick to recognize and act upon new issues as they arise. However, the Chamber of Commerce which follows the opportunist plan of waiting for something spectacular to turn up in order that it may capitalize upon it is destined to be a follower rather than a leader of public thinking in the community. It is more in line with the aims of the C. of C. for it to establish itself as a leader of public opinion, striving to educate the community along a line of thinking that anticipates future as well as present needs.

I quote from the textbook on Chamber of Commerce Administration that is published by the National Institute for commercial and trade organization executives. "Too often the appeals of special interests concentrate the efforts of the organization upon immediate problems of no great moment, while long range trends of vital significance to the community are allowed to drift unattended. It is unfortunate when a Chamber of Commerce and its manager listen to the voice of selfish members or to the more audible shouting which frequently emanates from small but strong minority groups and deceive themselves with the belief that these selfish voices re-

HAMILTON-CORYELL SOIL CONSERVATION

Cecil Dixon, a cooperator of the Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District and of Mr. Smith's Ames Veteran Class is doing an outstanding job of bringing back to production 400 acres of range land that was literally covered with trees, brush and cedar.

Since working out a conservation plan with the district, Cecil has terraced what cultivated land there was on the place, has cleared approximately 11,000 large trees of all kinds every day of the week for the past two years and in livestock has been running only goats to kill the brush. In addition he has sowed approximately 700 lbs. of Oklahoma blue-stem grass seed mixture over the cleared areas and has an exceptionally good stand. He also planted KR bluestem which he can proudly show you.

Of course Cecil has had some bad luck at times as fire got out once which destroyed a lot of litter and seed. He, however, immediately planted this burned area to different kinds of seed to restore the litter as soon as possible because as Cecil says, "You have to have a good litter if you expect grass to grow."

Cecil has about every kind of grass growing on his piece of land and can tell you where they are in importance to grazing of livestock. It isn't uncommon while walking over this range land with Cecil to have him stop you while he gets some brush and covers up some big bluestem which he has noticed is unprotected. He believes KR bluestem is one of our best introduced grasses but thinks that the native bluestems are the best. Any farmer or rancher who is interested in grass production should spend at least half a day with Cecil as we believe it will help you with your own grass problems as he has some of the answers.

Have you ever thought what we have and are doing to our ranges? First, we stock them with cattle. After our tall grass is all gone we stock with sheep. After the short grass is all gone we stock with goats and after the brush and cedar gets so large goats can't handle it, we are ready for the bulldozer or poisoning. When we get our ranges to this last stage is when it becomes a long, hard and costly job of producing grass. Grass is the economical way to produce livestock.

Paul Hinson, a cooperator of the district and an Ames Veteran student, has been doing a good job of carrying out his conservation farm plan with the district. He has recently completed all his terrace system. He intends to check over all his outlets and seed them to permanent grass where necessary during the fall and winter months to protect them from erosion. Grass can be sodded any time during the year when the ground is not frozen and there is plenty of moisture. In other words, the dormant stage is one of the best times to sod grass.

The last terraces Paul had constructed were the large channel type and were constructed with heavy equipment belonging to the

county under the jurisdiction of County Commissioner Cleo Carroll. Frank McLaughlin, Jim McLaughlin, Hope Thompson and Charlie Rainer are the operators of Mr. Carroll's machines; Walter Landry and Homer Bandiver are the operators of Jake Clearman's machines and Joe Rubarth and Monroe Chambers are the operators of Curtis Smith's machines. Dan Murrah, Wes Scott and John Bone operate their own machines.

These men and others who are helping to combat erosion on the farms of the Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District are to be congratulated for the fine work they are doing. They are making better terraces every day and will continue to do so because they like their work and feel that they are helping to make this a better district in which to live.

The Supervisors and the Technicians of the Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District appreciate their work and are proud to work with them.

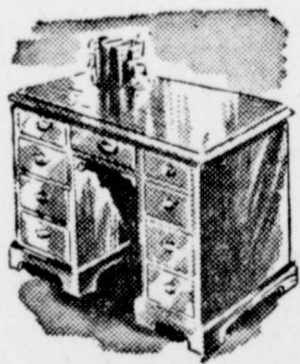

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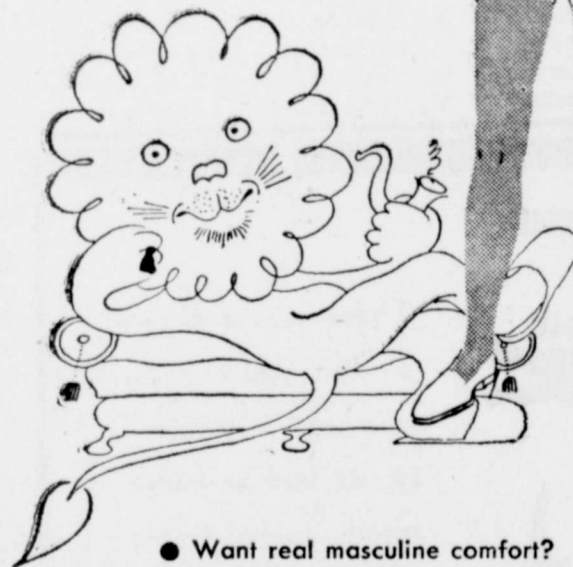
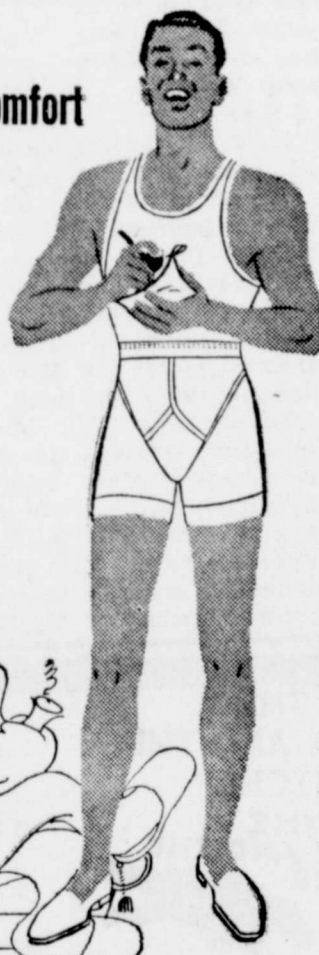
