The 1971 License Plates go on sale February 1, 1971. Lynn County has received the following numbers: Passengers -

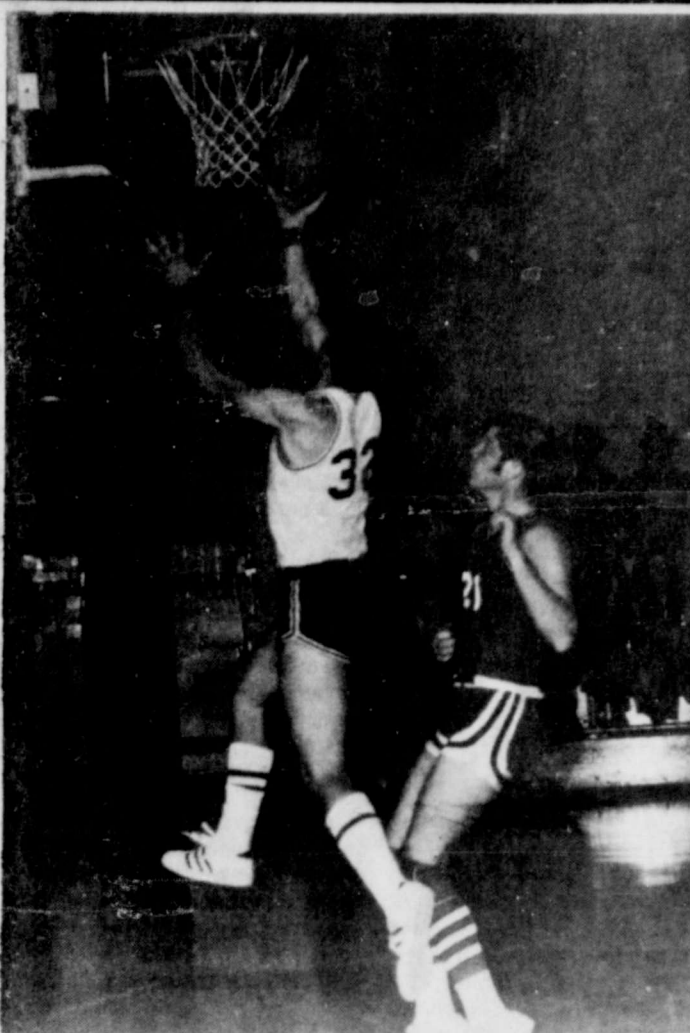
CKK-850 to CKR-24; Commercial, LS 3150 to 4599; Farm, 8F-1025 to 8F-2474.

In order to distribute the numbers equally over the county, George McCracken, Tax Collector, plans to place License Number CKM10 to 999 at Wilson Coop; CKN-10 to 999, New Home Coop; CKP-10 to 999 in O'Donnell at Moore Insurance Agency.

Due to the new computer system, the Texas Highway Department in Austin, has requested that license plate numbers be issued in numerical order.

People that wish to have a special number, must bring their car papers and money to the office or sub-station prior to date registration begins.

Mr. McCracken states that he feels this two-week period will be ample time for people to comply with this method and will be able to obtain their special numbers.

January 30 Final Day To Pay Taxes Without Penalty

Saturday, January 30, 1971 is the final day to pay state, county and hospital taxes for the year 1970 without penalty. Saturday will also be the last day to obtain your Voter Registration Certificate.

George McCracken states that the tax office will remain open Saturday, January 30, 1971, in order for people to pay their

taxes or to obtain a Voter's Registration Certificate for 1971, if they have not done so already.

All persons 18 and above must register in order to vote in 1971. Voter applications mailed and postmarked on or before January 31, 1971, will be issued a Voter's Registration Certificate.

Program To Increase Farm Income



The state-wide program to increase agricultural income in Texas to \$3.76 billion in 1976 is admittedly geared to help the agriculture industry; but what about the consumer, the housewife in the grocery store?

"Consumers are concerned with an assurance of an adequate food supply; and 3.76 in '76 is a program of growth," says Dr. W.E. Black, Extension economist at Texas A&M University. He adds that the new program is important because the increasing population must be fed on a decreasing amount of land used for agricultural production.

"Guidelines in the program are meant to increase production and improve quality," Dr. Black says of the project, which seeks to increase cash receipts to agriculture by one billion dollars at the end of the 1976 crop year.

The increase in production and cash receipts will benefit

the consumer as well as the producer. Food prices will undoubtedly be affected by an increased efficiency in production and marketing as costly practices in current use are improved or eliminated.

The technology in production and food preparation will be reflected in food prices; although the price of individual items will also be affected by the amount of preparation before purchase by the consumer. This would include special services such as pre-cooking and specialty packaging.

Four-Way Test Rotary Subject

Dr. David Midkiff spoke Thursday at Rotary on the "Four-Way Test", a code of ethics for business people originated by a Rotarian and promoted by Rotary International.

The four-fold test includes the wording: "1. Is it the truth? 2. Is it fair to all concerned? 3. Will it build good will and better friendships? 4. Will it be beneficial to all concerned?"

Annual Farm Mechanics Contest Held

Six teams of FFA boys from the Mesa District vied for top honors recently in the 6th Annual Farm Mechanics Contest sponsored by Lyntegar Electric Cooperative in Tahoka.

Sid Long's team from Gail demonstrated their usual skill and ability as they walked away with first prize for the sixth consecutive year. Brownfield's team, coached by Robert Becker, won second and V.P. Carter's Tahoka team won third. A cash prize is awarded the winning team to go toward purchase of shop equipment for the chapter. Other winners receive plaques for their efforts.

The contest centers around three basic farm skills and a 4th category called Identification requires each contestant to recognize and identify material and equipment taken from the other categories.

The three mechanical classes are welding, plumbing, and farm electrification.

Each division is broken down into areas where the judges can score different parts of the skill separately. The total of this breakdown determines the contestants score.

Overall high winner this year was Clay Neill from the Brownfield Chapter. Other winners were: Welding: Eddie Askev, Brownfield; Electrical: Marvin Boyd, Gail; Identification: Clyde Curry, Tahoka; Plumbing: a tie between Raymond Hernandez of Dawson (Welch) and Hubert Sorrells of Gail.

Judges are usually Vo-Ag advisors from chapters outside the Mesa District or from schools that do not have teams entered.

This year's judges were: Welding, Dan Taylor from Cooper and Melvin Chisum from Flower Grove. Plumbing: Lewis Knight from Ralls and H.M. Cook from Seagraves. Electrical: Delbert Smith from South Plains Electric Cooperative, Lubbock and Jimmy Woodard from Meadow. Jimmy Mense from Texas Tech judged the Identification division.

Awards were made after the contest at a banquet at the Tahoka Cafeteria. Binie White, Lyntegar's coordinator for the contest presented the awards.

Federal Land Bank Reduces Interest On Loans

Ross Smith, Manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Tahoka, received word today that the Federal Land Bank of Houston has reduced the interest billing rate on variable rate loans to 8 per cent. "This reduction affects more than 90 million dollars of variable rate loans to more than 2800 farmers and ranchers throughout Texas, Mr. Smith stated.

The variable rate loan plan which was introduced by the Houston Bank in July 1969 lets

Six Accidents In County In Dec

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated six accidents on rural highways in Lynn County during the month of December, according to Sergeant H.E. Pirle, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person injured and an estimated property damage of \$4,495.00.

The rural accident summary for this county during the calendar year of 1970 shows a total of 82 accidents resulting in five persons killed, 43 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$63,625.00. "Operation Motorcade" which was in effect during the Christ-

mas and New Year's holidays recorded 101 traffic deaths as compared to the estimated 87. Ten of these traffic fatalities occurred in the Lubbock Region in the following counties: Cochran, Crosby, Parmer, Swisher, Wichita and Wise which had one fatality each with Dallam and Potter Counties having two fatalities each.

The Patrol Supervisor reminded all motorists to think about the more than 30,000 people that have been killed in Texas traffic accidents during the last 10 years, and to join the drive to reverse this alarming trend of traffic deaths by strict observance of traffic laws and rules of defensive driving.

"TWO BITS WORTH"

All advertising in the United States was stopped at 10 o'clock this morning.

More than 3,300 of the nation's radio stations immediately announced plans for discontinuing operations indefinitely. Industry spokesmen predicted that all of the more than 500 television stations in the nation will turn off their switches within a week. About 86,000 employees in these organizations will be affected directly losing their jobs.

Approximately 600,000 in allied industries, it is expected, soon will receive their final paychecks.

The major national networks, stunned by the complete loss of revenue, announced imminent discontinuance of all service. The nation's newspapers, depending principally upon advertising revenue, were readjusting to the situation quickly. Most of them were reducing size by 75 to 85 percent and at least doubling circulation prices. The American Newspaper Publishers Association announced that several hundred thousand would lose their jobs. Many magazines went to the wall immediately. Some were trying to follow the newspaper lead -- reducing size and raising subscription prices.

Thousands of retail clerks in stores throughout the nation economists predict, will be unemployed within a week. There will not be sufficient buying traffic in the stores to support the huge retail payroll.

Store owners and managers are cancelling orders, given in anticipation of normal business. And, of course, this means that thousands of manufacturers and wholesalers

throughout the nation are making plans to reduce production by closing down plants. Economists predict that unemployment will soar into the millions. With mass production crippled, prices on merchandise will rise sharply -- while buying power declines.

Freight carriers -- on land, in the air, on water -- are having emergency meetings to determine what should be done next. The future looks dismal indeed to them, for there will be little or nothing to carry for profit.

All of this because advertising was stopped at 10 o'clock this morning; all of this because there remains no method of telling the people about the products of their own manufacture.

Market prices on the Exchange dipped to new lows, as investors foresaw general business bankruptcy throughout the nation. Trading is at a virtual

standstill. There are plenty of sellers, but no buyers.

Dr. Albert Snailpace, who has been conducting a campaign against "advertising excesses" by organizing citizens' groups throughout the nation commented: "This is awful." Dr. Snailpace had just been notified that he had lost his faculty job. The university did not expect many of its students to return to the campus for the next semester.

There are emergency sessions of the Cabinet and congress in Washington, and Governors throughout the nation are calling sessions of General Assemblies.

Officerholders are beginning to wonder how they will conduct their campaigns now. In big towns and small towns, breadlines are forming -- but there will be no bread in a few more days. Grain and cattle markets in Chicago, Omaha, and Kansas City are collapsing.

All of this because advertising stopped at 10 o'clock this morning.

There is no voice to tell the buyers about the sellers' wares. There are no dollars to support the mass media that day in and day out, hour in and hour out, convey information to the people.

There are long faces in the Treasury Department -- where Savings Bond officials read quickly the handwriting on the wall. Savings bond sales would drop to a trickle, and the nation would lose a vital means of helping to keep our economy stable.

Department of Defense officials made plans for stepped-up manpower drafts, for they could expect very few recruits in the absence of selling assistance from the crippled media of the nation. The Red Cross, long thwarted in its attempts even under ideal conditions -- to maintain blood banks at minimum requirements, has given up the fight completely.

The Bureau of Internal Revenue anticipates only a small percentage of the taxes which will be required to meet the growing demands of emergency operation of the nation.

And in Russia, there is a man with an enigmatic smile.

Something had happened in America that reduced that nation to a shambles faster -- of, so very much faster -- than a thousand atom or hydrogen bombs, or even some of the more horrible subsequent ones that can take millions of lives.

Ladies and gentlemen, that's what could happen if advertising stopped in America today.

Highlights of the meeting included a banquet, tour of the Capitol, and talks by legislators.

White-Winged Pheasants Released In Lynn County

Lynn County is the center of an experiment being carried out in an effort to get started in this area an exotic game bird, the Afghan white-winged pheasant, a native of Asia. Started in 1966, about 700 of the birds have been released to date in this county.

The stocking program is being conducted by Texas Parks and Wildlife personnel, and Lynn County Soil Conservation District personnel.

Jimmy May, exotic game bird biologist, of Tyler, where the State white-winged pheasant hatchery is located was here last Thursday and told The News it now appear this area can become a prime area for the bird with proper cooperation of farmers, ranchers and others interested in wildlife propagation.

White-winged pheasants, planted in eastern New Mexico, are on the increase, and an open season has already been declared.

This bird is similar to the popular ring-necked pheasant strain which has become established on the North Plains of Texas. For some reason, the ring-necked pheasant does not adapt to the country south of

about Plainview, but Wildlife Department officials believe the Afghan white-winged pheasant can successfully adapt to the South Plains.

First plantings of the birds were made here in February 1966, when about 100 were flown in here from California and planted in three widely separated locations in Lynn County.

Since then, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has been rearing its own white-wing pheasants at Tyler, and 100 to 150 pheasants a year have been released since in Lynn County, the latest last November.

Other releases have been made in Terry, Gaines, Martin, Lubbock, Bailey, Hale, Nolan, Runtels, and Tom Green counties, but now releases are being emphasized in Lynn and Terry counties only.

These pheasants do not migrate, but they do scatter very freely and some of them have been seen as far as 30 miles or more from point of release. In fact, they disperse quickly in no determinate pattern.

They are known to seek a habitat to their liking. They are also known to have hatched out young in the area. Several

citizens have reported seeing young pheasants in the county.

An accompanying picture shows a nest of pheasant eggs discovered on the John Slover place south of Tahoka the first year, but this nest was abandoned by the hen. This is the first white-wing pheasant nest "in the wild" ever found in Texas, although young pheasants are known to have been hatched.

Proper cover for the birds is very important. They seem to do well in milo, corn and cotton fields, and overgrown weedy and brushy areas. They like stubble and turn-rows. Their food is principally milo, wheat, corn, larger weed seeds and insects, but not smaller seeds. They do little or no damage to crops.

They do not stand extreme cold for long periods, and eggs do not hatch well in hot and dry sandy areas. The young seem to require some water, and may roost in bushes, while adults roost on the ground. They mate in April, and the average clutch contains 11 eggs which are pale greyish olive.

White-wing pheasants are native to southeastern Turkistan and northern Afghanistan, and have been imported to the U.S. for planting in areas a little milder than the ringneck pheasant range, where precipitation ranges from 10 to 20 inches and there is not quite so much winter cold.

The white-wing is similar to the ringneck in flight characteristics and in flesh but a little smaller. The male weighs 2½ to 2½ pounds, the female 1¾ to 2 pounds.

They have almost pure white-wing coverts, a majority of which have chestnut borders. Upper parts are yellowish or orange red. The male has a dark green throat and little or a trace of a white collar. The female is lighter in tone than the ringneck.

Naturally, there is no open season as yet, and penalty for killing is high.

But, game management people are asking cooperation of all people of this area in the hope that they may be propagated here in sufficient quantities to have an open hunting season in future years.

Any person who sees any of these birds is asked to carefully note the number, possible age, and location and report the same to Lynn County Soil Conservation District office in Tahoka or to any game warden.

Allan Sheppard, local soil conservationist, Richard Christie, and other workers with the Soil Conservation Service here are helping Parks and Wildlife Service in keeping records and helping otherwise with the program.

Biologist Herbert Kothman of Big Spring, and Wardens Ted Wheelis and Bill Pratt of Lubbock, all with the Parks and Wildlife Department, are in charge of the bird plantings.

Incidentally, they report prairie chickens are making a slow comeback in Cochran, Yoakum, Hockley and Terry counties. During a two-day open season this year in Cochran, 231 prairie chickens were killed by hunters, compared to 232 in the Panhandle, where there was an open season also.

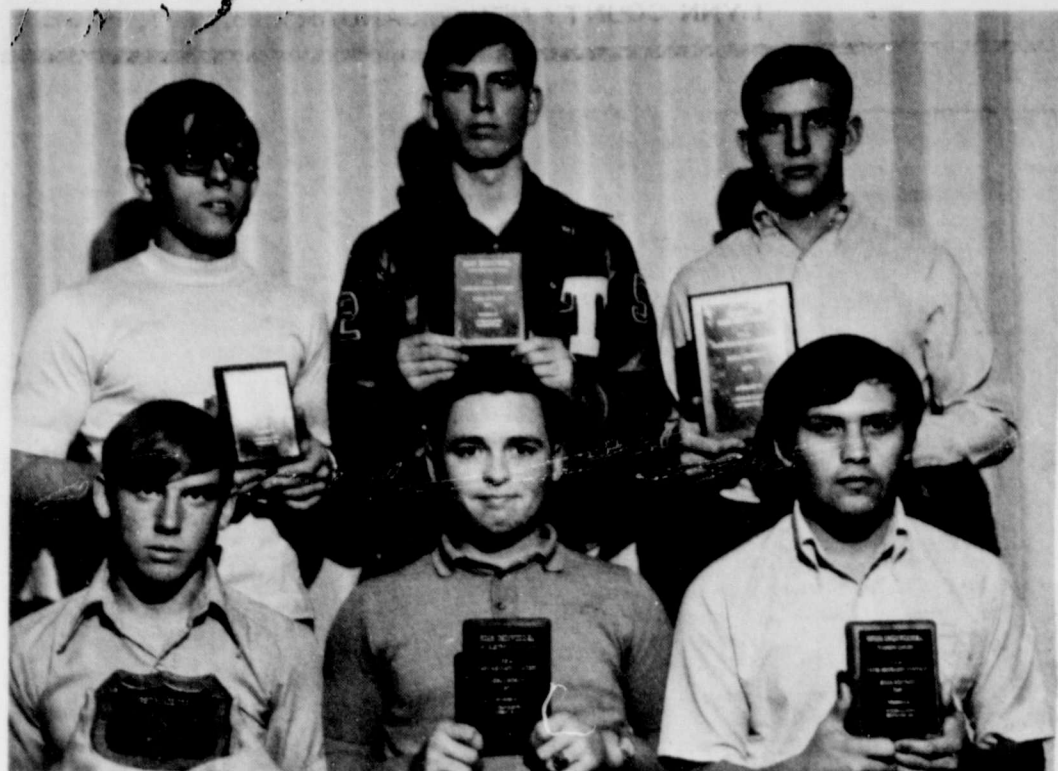


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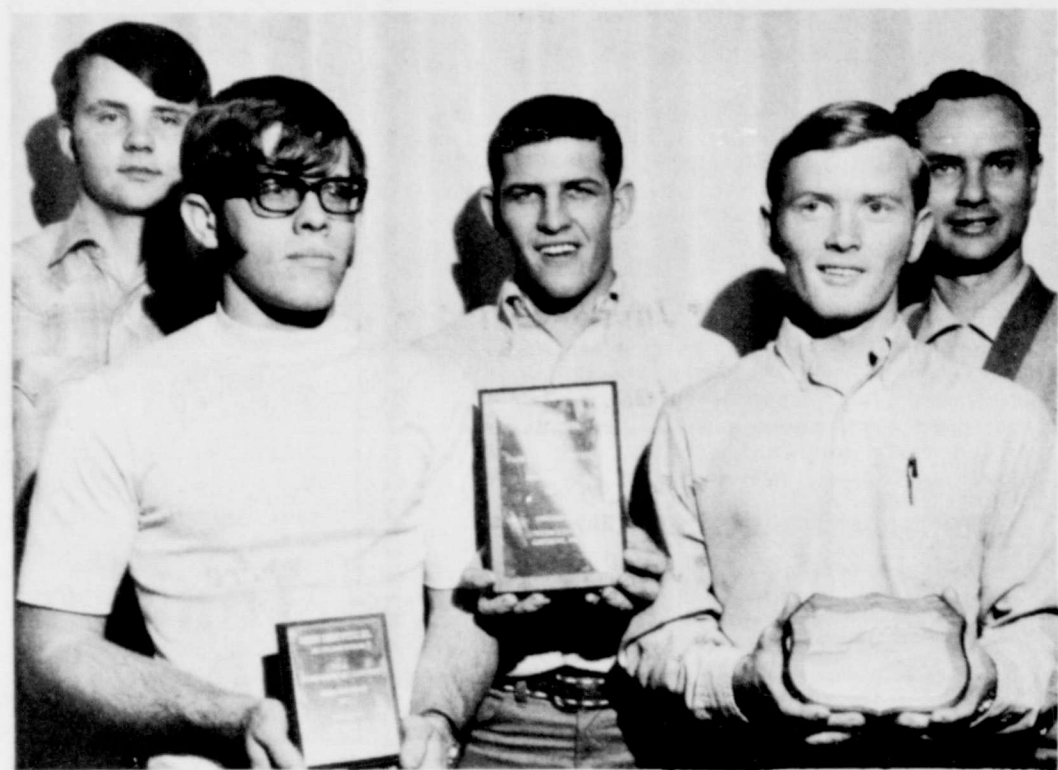

We're paying more and more at the supermarket just for the privilege of carrying home plain, ordinary water.

Soup manufacturers have realized that consumers will pay a good price for water, so they're adding it to the plant. By advertising an honest, old-fashioned soup," they can get the public to pay two to three times the single serving price of condensed soup.

A recent survey taken in Washington, D.C. shows that soups with water added cost about 12.5 cents per serving, while condensed soups cost about 4.2 cents for the same serving.

There are other products in which we pay for water. Some puddings and whipped toppings come ready-to-eat. Fruit drinks often containing only 6 percent actual fruit are made up mostly of water.

"Just think how much money we've spent on bottled drinks and the energy exerted lugging home all those bottles of water."

But convenience can't be ruled out. When we're in a hurry or unable to make the product ourselves, convenience foods come in handy. Products such as ready-to-eat puddings and toppings save cooking and cleaning equipment. Ad some take the guesswork out of cooking.

Soups and soft drinks, however, are another story. A can of soup still needs to be opened and the contents heated in a pan. Do you consider it much work to add water?

The next time you feel the cost of living tugging at your pocketbook, stop and think. Is it worth the extra cost to have someone else turn on the faucet?

Cottage Potatoes

Packaged instant mashed potatoes
1 tablespoon instant minced onion
1 cup (8 ounce) cottage cheese
1 tablespoon butter or margarine
Paprika
Prepare potatoes for four according to package directions with the addition of onion to boiling water called for in the directions. Fold in cottage cheese. Pour into greased 1 quart casserole. Dot with butter or margarine; sprinkle with paprika. Bake in 350 degree oven for 30 minutes.
5 to 6 servings.

SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

BY RICHARD L. CHRISTIE

The Soil Conservation Service has been concerned with the environment ever since its beginning. Doctor Hugh Bennett, the first administrator of the Soil Conservation Service was very much aware of environment in 1928. In 1935 Dr. Bennett brought many ecologists into the Soil Conservation Service. They were the best and most prominent men in the field at that time. Among them was Aldo Leopold, who wrote an essay in 1936 that summed up the philosophy of these men.

"Civilization is not the enslavement of a stable and constant earth. It is a state of mutual interdependence and cooperation between human animals, other animals and plants

and the soils, which may be disrupted at any moment by the failure of any of them. Land despoliation has evicted nations, and can, on occasion do it again...it thus becomes a matter of some importance, at least to ourselves, that our dominion be self-perpetuating, rather than self-destructive."

So you see environmental concern is not new and especially with the Soil Conservation Service. There has never been a more significant year in this field. Everyone is finally aware of these problems and pollution is now a common word with second and third graders. We say hurray for the awareness and concern. Public concern about the entire environment is at high tide. Some aspects of

this new awareness unites the businessman, the farmer, the sportsman, the sub-urbanite and the college student.

Don't get me wrong, demonstration and protest is not the way to act on changing our in-born misuse and wastefulness of our resources. But know we are aware!

Let us in the agricultural field not be so ready to except so much of the blame for this problem. The concern over the use of chemicals of various pesticides and herbicides does not rest only or majorly on farmers and ranchers. The good progressive farmer and rancher does all he can to hold preserve and protect the resources they have. Be it wildlife, water, soil, plants or animals, they value it all and use it to best make their operation economical.

Per acre or area of land, who puts on the most chemicals, the lady with a beautiful lawn and rose garden or the cotton farmer. The lady with the roses sprays for insects once a week; she puts out a weed control on her lawn every time a weed appears or as often as the chemical sales people recommend, whichever is less. It is a proven fact that more chemical pollutants come from urban areas than rural areas.

Many of the environmental questions have been given off the top of the hat answers and we haven't really studied or looked into them deep enough to answer them. Let us look at some of the public wants.

The public wants more good beef steak-but they also want all areas free of animal wastes. The public wants green parks and open space in and near cities - but also millions of new homes will be built in the next decade.

I am not saying to be concerned, we should have gotten concerned years ago. But, I am saying be sure of your facts about pollution before you spread the blame on someone.

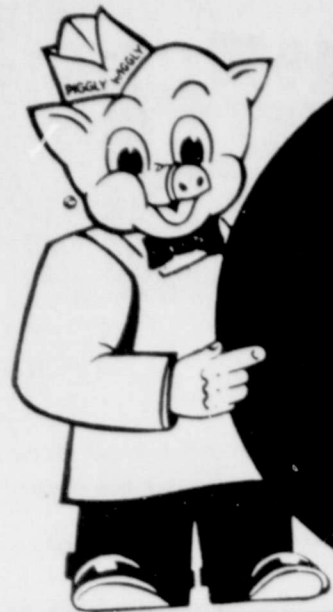

Embargo On Mail To Great Britain
An immediate embargo on mail to Great Britain was ordered Jan. 19, 1971, by the U.S. Postal Service, W.L. Crawford, Regional Director, Dallas Postal Region, announced.
The action was taken immediately following notification from the British postal administration that an all-out strike of British postal workers is expected Wednesday.
The embargo does not apply to mail addressed to American military personnel in the United Kingdom. Ireland also is not affected. The embargo applies to all other mail from the U.S. -- surface or airmail -- addressed to Great Britain, including England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland.
"The British postal administration advised that the strike is expected to continue for an indefinite period," Mr. Crawford said, "and all United Kingdom domestic and international mail services will be suspended. Mail already enroute also may be delayed."

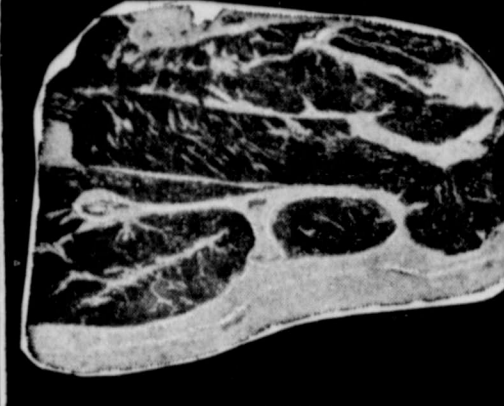
