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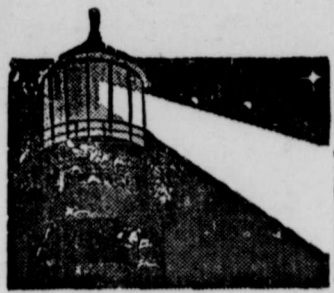
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On The BEAM

To Plant Guar With Bundle Feed

Mr. Harry Cranfill, who farms nine miles southeast of Loraine, is going to try a new idea in his conservation plan for next year. Noticing the big improvement in how his soil works following straight guar, he has decided to plant 3 or 4 pounds per acre of guar beans in with his bundle feed seeding this spring. He expects to get some good soil conditioning due to guar plus an increase in the feeding value of his bundle feed. Guar fixes nitrogen which is worth several dollars an acre as well as improving the physical condition of the soil. It also will increase the protein content of the feed.

Wallace Well Has Oil Showing

Whether or not a producer can be made of the Wallace oil well 14 miles south of Loraine remains to be seen. On a drill-stem test in Strawn lime from 6,975-7,010 feet, gas, oil and water were received. The hole is being drilled to 15 feet of pay above the water. Tool was open two hours and 15 minutes. Gas surfaced in eight minutes, with no gauge or estimate reported on volume. Recovery was 1,860 feet of free oil, 240 feet of heavily oil and gas cut mud and 630 feet of salt water. It is calculated by operator that the well has between 10 and 15 feet of pay above the water. The hole is being drilled to the contract depth of 7,700 feet.

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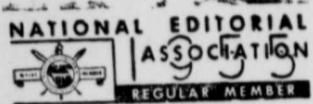
