Council Resumes Manager Search

The City Council of Colorado City's two month search for a new City Manager is not over.

In a telephone conversation with Acting City Manager Brenda Tarter around 5 p.m. Tuesday, Steve Sundby, Assistant City Manager at Littlefield, declined to accept the position.

Mrs. Tarter stated that Sundby expressed his thanks to the council and the town but said that he had accepted a position with a corporation instead.

When informed Friday that the council had voted to hire him, Sundby said that he would give an answer Monday as to whether he would accept the position or not. He called Monday and asked for another day to make up his mind.

After some debate, Sundby had been the council's choice among four candidates who had been interviewed for the City Manager position since the end of December.

Colorado City has been without a City Manager since Nov. 30 when James Campbell resigned to accept a similar position in Corsicana.

In an informal poll taken of some of the

councilmembers Tuesday afternoon the consensus seemed to be that while Sundby's declining the position was a letdown, it was very necessary for the council to begin looking again quickly.

Mayor Marion Bassham stated that she hoped the council could

get together again as soon as possible to discuss the matter.

J. O. Dockrey Jr. stated that he was in favor of starting all over again but that whatever we do, "We don't need to do it wrong."

Buddy Hertenberger's main thought upon hearing of Sundby's re-

jection was that, "We either keep looking or we do without." He also suggested that he would be in favor of going back over some of the applications of people who weren't interviewed.

Jessie Munoz simply said that, "We have to interview further, we have no choice."

Chamber Begins Quest For Logo

Colorado City Area Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture is now sponsoring two contests, one for a logo or symbol for the Chamber and one for a slogan.

This was one of many items discussed during the monthly meeting of the Chamber's board of directors Monday night. Fourteen of the Chamber's 15 directors were present despite inclement weather.

J. O. Dockrey attended the meeting and requested that something be done to get a symbol and slogan for Colorado City for the Chamber to use for promotional purposes.

Dockrey is head of the Ambassadors, the Chamber's official representatives at official functions. The Ambassadors wore red blazer type jackets and Dockrey wants an emblem or logo or symbol to emblazon on the jackets along with a slogan such as former city slogans, Power City and Mother City of West Texas.

The entries in the emblem contest should be artistic renderings and can be submitted to the Chamber office as can entries in the slogan contest. Everyone is eligible to enter.

Jan. 19, Walker married a woman from Uruguay, Beatriz. The couple was married in Uruguay and a friend-also a missionary-performed the ceremony.

After a honeymoon in

Rio de Janeiro, the newlyweds headed for the United States. Mr. and Mrs. Walker arrived Jan. 23 in Lubbock.

Mr. and Mrs. Walker met while he was working with a missionary team in Montevideo, the capital of Uruguay, and she was serving as church secretary.

Although Mrs. Walker no longer works as church secretary-she is now concentrating her time on establishing their home-Walker is continuing his work with the missionary team.

In 1976, the Colorado City 22nd and Austin

Street Church of Christ sponsored Walker as a missionary to Uruguay.

Snow, Cold Weather Slaps At Colorado City

In case you missed it, last Friday was Groundhog Day and although no reports were heard from any of the local rodent type creatures, there's a distinct possibility they did see themselves in their shadow and now comfortably snoozing away until sometime in March.

Colorado City residents awakened Monday morning to find another blanket of the familiar white stuff covering the ground and to learn that winter was still around and was taking another mild swipe at them.

Compared to the cold spell of early January it was a very mild swipe as snow fell off and on throughout Monday and into Tuesday and the temperature stayed mostly in the 20's until around noon Tuesday when it began to rise.

By 2:35 Tuesday afternoon, it had risen to 40 degrees. The weather was bad enough for Colorado City school officials to cancel classes Tuesday because of the slick roads. Loraine and Westbrook students had no such luck. Classes were held in both schools although no buses ran in Loraine. Reports from local law officials indicated that this time around, unlike in early January, the weather wasn't se-

vere enough to cause any more than normal traffic hazards.

The Colorado City Police Department reported handling four minor accidents Monday with no injuries in any of them. As of Tuesday afternoon there had been none reported on that day.

The Texas Highway Patrol reported only two accidents with no injuries during Monday and Tuesday. One of these involved a Mrs. Baird's truck which jackknifed near Loraine around 3 a.m. Monday.

The Mitchell County Sheriff's Department reported handling no accidents during the two day period.

Gaylord Price of the Texas Department of Highways reported that his crews didn't have the difficulties in keeping the roads clear that

they did in January because, "We didn't have the really hard freezing temperatures and the freezing rain."

Preaching and the Sunset School of Missions in Lubbock.

While in school, Walker formed a friendship with two other men who decided they would work as a team of missionaries.

Thus, Walker, Fory Grove and Mike Strawn set out for Uruguay, sponsored by three different churches in Texas.

Mission work for the trio and their families is concentrated mostly in the city of Montevideo.

"The philosophy of the team is to establish a strong base in Montevideo," said Walker. "We want to work through family and friends to reach others."

"When we can, we work out in the interior," said Walker, "but there's not enough peo-

ple to do everything."

Since beginning their careers as missionaries to Uruguay, the team from Texas has formed a new congregation in Montevideo, as well as working with established churches.

The team works from offices in the city. They have established a Bible information service, which serves as an outreach to the public.

In addition, Bible studies are taught by the missionaries.

Walker explained that Uruguay is an areligious country.

"There is a lot of agnosticism, existentialism and many different philosophies," said Walker.

In Uruguay, there has been complete separation of church and state since 1912, Walker explained. Since that time,

Uruguay has been a socialist state.

Walker explained that the population of Uruguay is about 75 per cent Spanish, 20 per cent Italian and five per cent German, Swiss, Armenian, Greek, Polish and Yugoslavian.

"Uruguay was built upon immigration," said Walker.

One major difference between Uruguay and the United States is the education systems.

The school system in Uruguay is basically French, Walker explained, and the criteria is different from the United States.

"The American system is built on preparing the student to make a living—it's economical," said Walker. "In Uruguay, education is to develop a person culturally."

Although students in Uruguay study basically the same subjects American students study—math, science, history, literature—the emphasis is placed on the arts.

"It's more or less the concept that school is going to make you a more cultured person," said Walker.

Language is important in Uruguay schools and Mrs. Walker speaks Spanish, English and Portuguese fluently.

The university system in Uruguay is divided into different schools and is not concentrated on one main campus as is the common practice in the United States.

The economy in Uruguay is based upon beef and wool.

Walker explained that Uruguay is increasing its crop production and

is trying to be self-sufficient in food.

However, most machinery used in Uruguay must be imported.

A pound of hamburger in Uruguay costs about 50c while a Volkswagen Beetle would be about \$11,000.

The import duty on automobiles is 300 per cent, Walker explained, and for that reason, there is not an abundance of cars in Uruguay.

Walker noted that Model A's, Model T's, Packards and old model Mercedes are common automobiles but new makes are not too common.

The standard of living in Uruguay is higher than many people might imagine, Walker said. Since everything is government owned, a more or less equal standard of living has evolved.

"The extreme poverty you see in Brazil and Mexico doesn't exist in

Uruguay, noted Walker. Because of giant public housing units, there are few slums in Uruguay.

Living in a country of less than three million people, Walker said "life is tranquil—there's not the confusion you find other places."

Mr. and Mrs. Walker plan to continue working in Uruguay about 10 more years. After that, they hope to continue mission work in another area, perhaps some place remote such as the Amazon.

But, for the next four months, Mr. and Mrs. Walker will be living in Colorado City and visiting surrounding towns, including Schulenburg where Walker's family lives.

Oil Activity

The Jameson, North (Strawn) field of Mitchell County was extended one and five-eighths miles southwest with completion of Texas Production Co., Houston, No. 1 Chappell Trust, et al, one mile north and east of depleted Strawn production in a northwest extension area of the Jameson field, seven miles west of Silver, for a daily pumping potential of 39 barrels of 38.8 gravity oil, plus 86 barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 179-1.

Production was through perforations at 6,289-304 feet, which had been acidized with 2,000 gallons and fractured with 59,000 gallons and 87,500 pounds of sand.

It originally was scheduled as a 7,200-foot wildcat in Coke County, however, location was amended and to the above field and to Mitchell County.

Location (amended) is 134 feet from the northwest and 2,930 feet from the southwest lines of 3-15-SPRR.

High School Sports Important To Town

The following article was published in the January issue of "The League, The Official

Publication of the University Interscholastic League." It gives some ideas on the place high school sports should have in the school and in the community.

"There is no such thing as a 'right' to participate in athletics. Math, history, English and certain other courses are mandated by the state authorities, and each student has a 'right' to be exposed to them. But as a participant in athletics, a youngster must follow rules or his 'privilege' will be taken away from him.

"Your team does not belong to the community. It belongs to the school and that school has voluntarily agreed to abide by a certain set of rules, so that all athletes may compete under the same standards.

"If these rules offend any special interest groups to the point where they cannot conduct themselves in a rational manner, then, by all means, these persons should direct all their energies toward some other level of athletics, NOT the high school level.

"All high school athletes make mistakes. They are not perfect, and never will be. While these mistakes make high school athletics unpredictable and interesting, it sad to hear so-called fans boo youngsters at an athletic event.

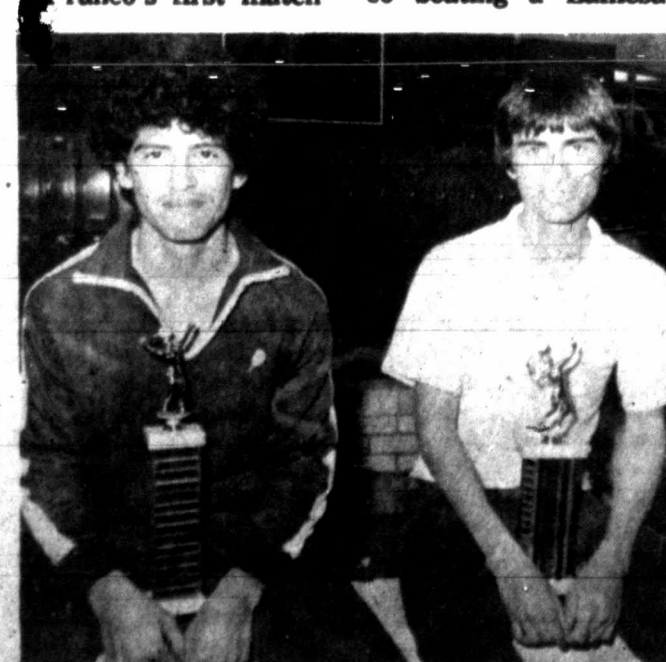

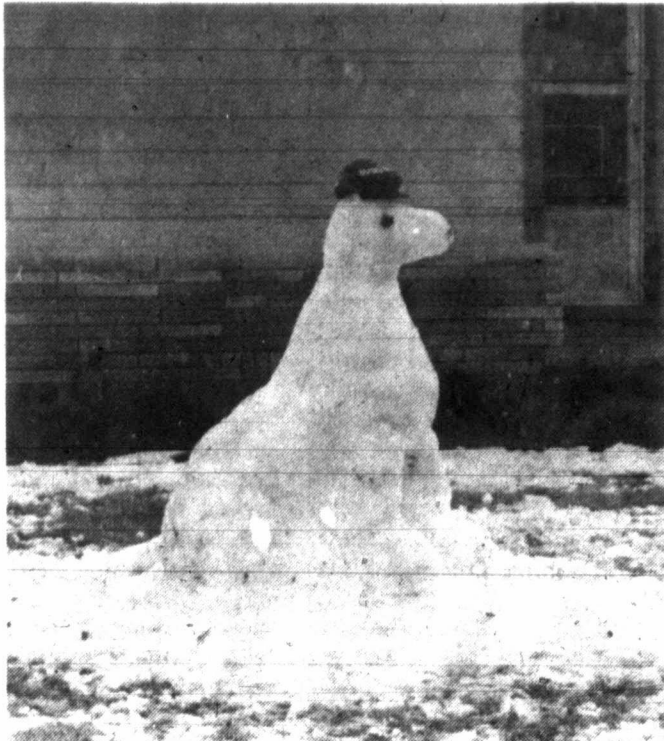

Homestead Amendment To Cut Into CISD Tax Base

"We'll be looking at a very tight budget over the next year or two," was Colorado Independent School District Tax-Assessor Collector J. S. Craddock's practical assessment of the situation as he discussed the recently adopted Homestead Amendment's effect on school finances Tuesday.

Craddock declined to make a guess as to how much of an effect the amendment, which was adopted by Texas voters last fall, would have on the school's money situation but he could definitely see how it could cut heavily into the school's tax base.

According to the amendment, all property owners in the district may this year qualify for a \$5,000 tax exemption on their homesteads. This \$5,000 is taken off the 100 per cent value of the homestead and not off the ratio percentage which is applied for tax purposes. This ratio in this

school district is 67 per cent.

For example on a \$20,000 home, the \$5,000 would be subtracted from that figure and then 67 per cent of the remaining \$15,000 would be applied to determine the taxable valuation. Craddock pointed out that this exemption is not automatic, for a homeowner to become eligible for it, he must come into the school tax office and fill out an affidavit affirming that he is a property owner and identifying his homestead. He added that this was one reason why it wasn't possible to determine how much of an effect the amendment would have because there was no way of knowing how many of the school district's 2,500-3,000 property owners would come in and sign up.

Craddock went on to say that the whole thing was really still in a quandry because the legislature hasn't even determined yet exactly

what a homestead is. He further added that as he understood it, \$450 million of state funds had been earmarked to partially make up for the losses in revenue which the school district would suffer because of the exemption.

Craddock stated though that even here there was no way of knowing yet how much of the losses in tax revenue would be made up through the state funds.

Craddock finally stated that an announcement would be made to the property owners of this school district when the homestead affidavits were ready for them to come in and fill out.

There were other tax exemptions passed by the voters last fall but these are also, "up in the air," as far as the legislature is concerned. One of these was a possible additional \$5,000 exemption for those citizens age 65 and over which the amendment allowed the legis-

lature to pass if it saw fit to do so.

Another exemption which the legislature may pass if it chooses to do so is to take up to two family cars off the school tax rolls.

The final possible exemption involves evaluating farm land for tax purposes on the basis of income instead of market value. The legislature has yet to come up with a formula to determine this new tax valuation, however.

Bobcat Deadline Feb. 20

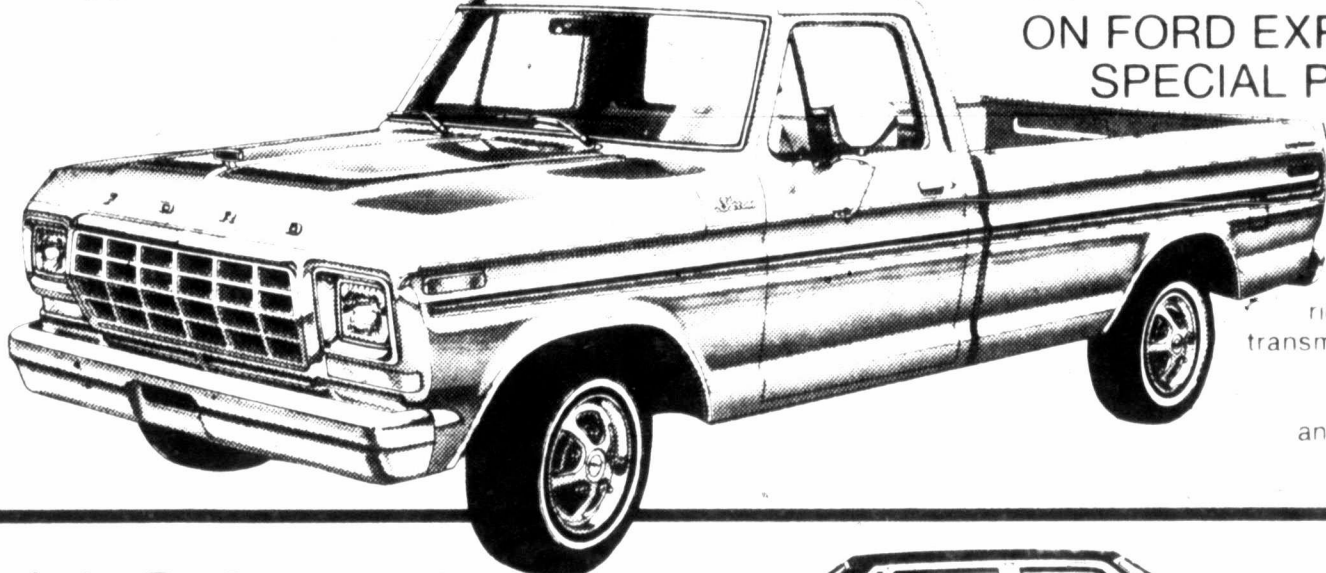

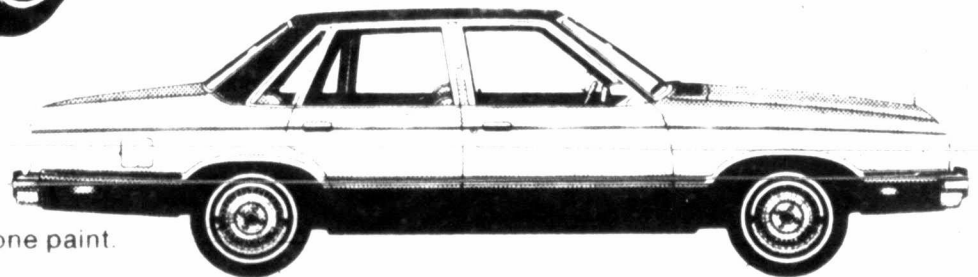

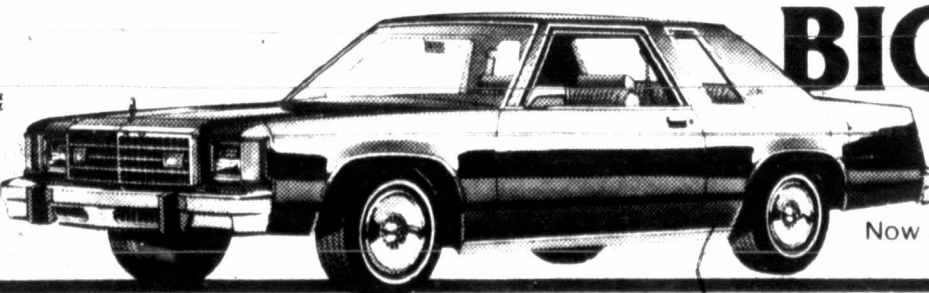

Lone Star Attempts To Recover Gas Costs

Lone Star Gas Company has filed an application for a rulemaking with the Texas Railroad Commission seeking authority to recover 100 per cent of purchased gas costs.

At present Lone Star is limited by the commission to an 85 per cent recovery of increased residential and commercial gas costs at the city gate, not all of which is recovered by Lone Star from these customers.

The company has operated under such a pur-

chased gas adjustment provision since June, 1975.

During the years 1976, 1977 and 1978, about \$30 million of legitimate operating expenses went unrecovered in gas cost alone. If the company had been permitted to recover full gas costs in 1978, it would have meant only a 2½ per cent increase in consumers' bills.

The most dramatic increase in Lone Star's cost of operations continues to be the escalating cost of gas.

According to Doug Williams, senior vice president of operations, the passage of the Natural Gas Policy Act has for the first time placed maximum lawful rates upon all gas produced in Texas.

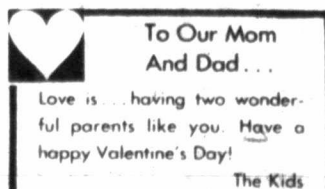
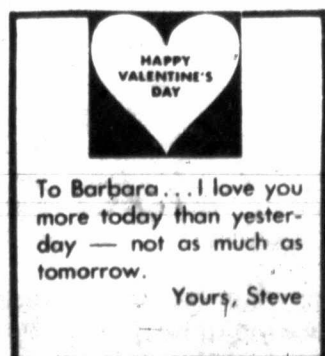
"For the past three and a half years, we have been competing with other major intrastate gas purchasers who have flowed through 100 per cent of their increased gas costs to their customers," Williams said.

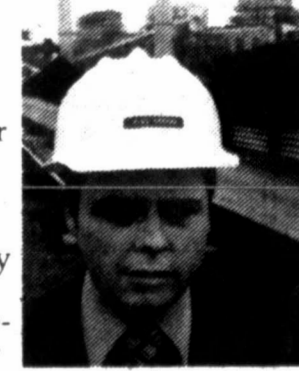
