Hess Challenged In
7-AA Scoring Race

Randall Hess, Cisco's ball of lightning, maintained a healthy lead in the District 7-AA scoring race last week with a 12 point performance against Anson, but he gained a new challenger in Ken Wigington of Ballinger, who got 26 points in leading Ballinger to a 41-8 triumph over Sonora.

Hess, who had two touchdowns called back in the Anson tilt, has made 58 points in three games for a 19 point average. Wigington's fine game against Sonora pushed his total to 38 points, but he has played in four games.

Pat DeBusk of Coleman failed to score as the Bluecats were shut out Brady, but he still is in third place with 32 points. Charles Wolford of Ranger gained the fourth slot with 28 points. Jerry Chandler of Ballinger slipped to fifth with 26 points and Clint Humphreys of Eastland dropped to sixth with 25 points.

District 7-AA teams had their best week of the season, winning four games and dropping one Friday. Cisco continued to set the pace with a 14-0 win over Anson. Ballinger downed Sonora 41-8. Eastland clipped Cross Plains 28-6. Ranger eased past DeLeon 14-12 and Coleman fell to Brady 32-0.

This week, Eastland, Coleman and Winters take on toughies, while Ranger, Cisco and Ballinger have fairly easy encounters. Eastland takes on unbeaten Albany in Albany. Coleman meets once-accused on Haskell in Haskell. Winters meets Hamilton in Hamilton. Ballinger plays Lake View of San Antonio, and Cisco plays on devastated DeLeon.

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Navarro Sinks Rangers
26-6 Saturday, Here

In the first game of the Texas Junior College Athletic Conference, the Ranger College Rangers played with fire and determination, but lost to a strong Navarro Junior College team by a score of 26-6 Saturday night in Bulldog Stadium.

Proving that anything was possible, Navarro intercepted a Ranger pass on the last play of the game and trounced 30 yards downfield and across the goal line—for the final score. The extra point try was blocked.

Rangers' only bid was made in the first quarter after James Stanford, fullback, had blocked a Navarro punt and carried the ball down to the two. Quarterback Dick Maxwell made the plunge to earn the six points. A run attempt for the extra points failed.

College officials said that the turnout for the first home game this season was the largest in about two years. A good crowd of fans was on hand to see the skirmish.

For the opening kick-off, Ranger started its Team No. 2. They failed to pick up a first down, however, and were forced to punt. Navarro took the ball and made the first down, but quickly had a pass intercepted by George "Buz" Boynton, left halfback.

This set the Rangers in motion, as they trounced downfield picking up fast yardage and two first downs. They were unable to make the third first down, however, and the ball went over to the Navarro Bulldogs.

The Bulldogs' punt, four plays later, set up the Rangers' touchdown from the two yard line—after it was blocked by Stanford. Maxwell went over to gain the score, but the extra points try was no good.

Only three plays and two first downs later, the Navarro Bulldogs romped back strong and evened the score when Bobby Prestridge, fullback, ran 37 yards for a touchdown. Quarterback Burton Cash made the conversion and the score stood at 7-6.

Navarro, in possession of the ball at the opening of the quarter, gave Ranger fans a scare by a fast run over the goal line. The play was nullified, however, by a personal foul penalty.

A 35 yard pass from Quarterback Stan Purley to End Bill Curry set the Bulldogs up on the 12-yard line. A fumble on the five, however, sent the ball over to the Rangers.

The ball changed hands back and forth, in a defensive battle, until Jack Roberson, Bulldog halfback, broke loose to run 70 yards downfield and across the goal line. The

score stood 14-6.

Fighting hard, with their backs to the wall, the Rangers picked up 18 yards before a pass was intercepted by Navarro. Two plays later, however, James Pope at left end intercepted a Bulldog pass. Two passes fell incomplete, however, and the Rangers chose to punt.

Navarro failed to gain yardage and the ball went back to the Rangers on the Navarro end of the field, with time fast running out.

A first down was picked up on a nine-yard pass to Dean Faulkenberry, another pass fell incomplete and then came the last and fatal pass attempt—intercepted by Pete Hobby, tackle.

The play originated on the Rangers 20-yard line, but Hobby drove downfield for about 30 yards to score the touchdown on the final play of the game. The kick was blocked, and the Navarro Bulldogs left the field with a 26-6 win.

Half-time activities featured the Rangers who were introduced by Al Lotzpeich. The Navarro Bulldog Band, in Spanish type uniforms, also performed.

Navarro began a drive, with a 25-yard run made by Halfback Carl Shields but failed to complete two passes. Following the punt, the Rangers made it down to the 32-yard line, but failed to pick up over one first down.

The ball changed hands back and forth until late in the quarter, when Roberson ran loose—again—making his way downfield 55 yards to paydirt. The attempt

for the extra points was no good, and Navarro led 20-6.

Fourth Quarter

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Soil Conservation
District News

Cover crop planting season is upon us. Many drills are already running. Winter cover crops are one of our most profitable conservation practices in this area. Our soil, in order to produce an economical return, must be protected from the elements and have a continuous supply of organic material for maintaining soil tilth. Winter cover crops fulfill these two needs.

On our sandy land rye is primarily used for protection from wind erosion. Vetch is used in combination with rye to add nitrogen and provides a higher quality of organic material for returning to the land. Vetch and rye has been a great help in maintaining peanut yields in the area since vetch was introduced here on a large scale some twelve to fourteen years ago.

While vetch has been most popular on sandy land it does give good results on our heavier soils when used primarily as a soil improving and grazing crop. Where land is used for harvesting of small grains, vetch intertills with combining and must be separated from the grain after harvest.

Results similar to use of vetch can be obtained through proper use of fertilizer on small grain land.

In recent years commercial nitrogen fertilizers has become so cheap and so easy to apply it may possibly be cheaper to apply nitrogen than to use a legume like vetch with small grain.

Relatively heavy use of nitrogen fertilizers on small grain for growing a heavy stubble and the use of commercial nitrogen for decay of small grain residue can do much for raising the organic content of small grain land.

Here are facts and figures—

Some impressive statistics have been made by both local football teams so far this season. Totals given below include figures of the games this past weekend.

Ranger College has earned a total of 628 yards in three games (with a 1-2 record) and stacked up 31 first downs to 30 for its opponents.

BULLDOGS

Joe Bradford, the Bulldogs Fullback, leads the total yards gained rushing race for the local team. Bradford has accounted for 240 of the total 894 rushing yards picked up by the Bulldogs this season.

Not too far behind him is Jerry Anderson, a standout in the DeLeon game. Anderson, at left half, has gained 190 yards this season. Charles Wolford, quarterback and end, who leads in the scoring race, has gained 142 yards. Jake Hasham, who has seen little play so far, still comes in fourth with 89 yards. Lee King, quarterback, has gained 88 yards.

In four games, the Bulldogs have compiled 59 first downs, 74 points, and 166 passing yards. They have held their opponents to 43 first downs, 68 points, and less passing yardage.

On points Wolford leads, having gained 28 so far this season. Hasham is second with 18, and Anderson is third with 14. Bradford has made eight points and King, six.

Next Friday night the Bulldogs will face the Dublin team in the first of two home games to be played this weekend.

STOCK MARKET REPORTS

Cattle and calves were generally steady to strong at Fort Worth as stocker buyers were numerous and aggressive and shippers and independent packers also set a fast pace. There was some ineffective lower bids offered on the early rounds but these bidders were quick to surrender or go empty-handed.

Good and choice slaughter steers and yearlings sold from \$25 to \$27 and medium and lower grades scaled from \$18 to \$24. Fat cows drew \$19 to \$21.50 and canners and cutters sold for \$13 to \$19. Bulls brought \$18 to \$22.50.

Good to choice slaughter calves ranged from \$24.50 to \$27.50 and common and medium steer calves cashed at \$27 to \$33 and light weight stocker yearlings scaled from \$31 downward. Feeder steers sold from \$22 to \$26, a load of strictly good feeders weighing 803 pounds from Les Ringo of Gordon at the \$26 top. Heifer calves sold mostly from \$29 downward, a few lightweights above that range.

The delayed action break in swine prices which featured the close of livestock trade at northern centers last week struck at Fort Worth Monday. After considerable delay in getting trading started, during which it was well past mid-morning before any movement toward the scales started, salesmen were forced to yield.

At the close butcher hogs and packing sows were 50 cents to mostly \$1 per hundred lower. Shippers took about a deck of choice hogs at \$21 and the other choice hogs sold at \$20.75. Medium to good butchers cashed at \$19 to \$20.50. Sows sold from \$19 to \$20.

Sheep and lambs sold steady at Fort Worth Monday and several lots of goats also commanded firm prices. Good and choice fat lambs cashed at \$20 to \$22, some woolskins at \$21. Top prices were paid for No. 1 pelt lambs. Cull to medium lambs sold from \$14 to \$19. Stocker and feeder lambs sold mostly from \$19 to \$21, a few higher. Slaughter ewes sold from \$7 to \$8. Aged slaughter bucks sold for \$6 to \$6.50. Goats ranged from \$6 on hard canners, up to \$8 for fat wethers.
