

Abernathy is on the way to greater progress. Many of the improvements for which this column has plugged are near accomplishment.

Abernathy probably will be the smallest town on the South Plains with street markers and house numbers. This accomplishment is credited to the 1935 Study club members, who sponsored the project. The Junior Study club has given assistance, too.

The city-wide clean-up campaign closes Friday. It is sponsored by the Lions club.

Telephone service has improved since installation of the new common battery system. The service will be further improved come May 1, when the company will have seven full time operators instead of two. The number of phone subscribers has greatly increased since installation of the new system.

Thanks to the people for voting unanimously to issue bonds for the sewerage system, and thanks to Mayor C. O. Anderson and Aldermen Andy Reid, N. C. Hix, Virgil Zeman, J. W. Harris and E. B. Lindsey for their tireless efforts to obtain the system for Abernathy.

City council members have been subjected to undue criticism because the sewerage system plans moved so slowly. Most of the conditions which slowed the project were beyond their control. I admit that some phases of the project may have been accelerated if full time had been spent at work on the problems. For obvious reasons no member of the Council was in a position to devote full time to that project. Like the rest of us, they have to make a living, too. I can attest to the fact that the Council has devoted several hundred hours to the task. Many of those hours were stolen from their business day, too. As reporter, I have attended most of the Council meetings held since January, 1946. I know that they have worked hard at the job of getting a sewerage system.

With the contracts to sell the \$112,000 in bonds and for construction of the system, their goal is accomplished. Aldermen Andy Reid and N. C. Hix, who will retire from the Council May 3, when their successors, Jack Hackler and J. D. Webb, take the oath of office, deserve a vote of thanks, along with the hold-over Councilmen for their work on this project. To Hackler and Webb, "congratulations, and the best of luck as 'servants of the people'."

Increasing the tax rate from the pitifully low 40c to 80c on the \$100 of valuation. The 80c rate still is lower than most towns of similar size have. Property valuations are to be increased this year. The reason our streets are in such terrible condition; the reason our town is poorly lighted; the reason that a hundred other civic improvements have not been made, all can be traced to the lack of city funds. With a 40c tax rate and extra low valuations, the city had no source of revenue for improvement funds. If we are to have these improvements we must foot the bill, and that we will come next tax-paying time. There are too many non-resident property owners, and some resident property owners, who have not paid their city taxes in several years. The due course of law should be followed to sell enough of the property to pay the taxes.

None of the extra tax money derived from the increased rate and/or valuations can, or will, be used to finance the sewerage system installation. In fact, no tax money whatsoever can be used to pay for the system. It must, as set out in the bond proposal published last November, be financed solely from revenues from the combined water and sewerage systems. City officials told you, and this column stated that the sewerage system bonds, if voted, would not cause an increase in taxes. If you ever catch Council members using your tax dollars on the system, you can hang them from the highest limb on city square, or send them to Leavenworth. The extra tax money is to be used for other badly needed improvements.

Expected to come up in the regular meeting of the City Council May 3, is a street lighting plan for the business section and part of the residential district. Extra city money will be needed to finance such an improvement. Officers who hear about all the petty thievery that goes on in our town say that a full-scale lighting system will pay for itself in property saved for the tax payers.

Also to be discussed May 3, will

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be plans for a third well for the city water system.

I hope the Council also makes definite plans May 3, for immediate work on the city streets. The city hopes to buy a maintainer someday, and plans for paving are being talked, but what we need RIGHT NOW is a lot of work on the streets.

Plans for street paving should be pushed. By plans, I mean the money put in a paving fund in the bank to do the job. The contractor says the sewerage system should be completed in six or eight months. Street paving, the actual work, should start as soon as the system is completed. Property owners will have to bear the cost of street paving by their places, and the city will have to pave street intersections and its part around the square.

The school's hustling superintendent, Fred H. Miller, is making contacts to obtain a top-notch band director. Snappy, attractive new uniforms will be provided for band members, and practice probably will start in August.

Projects for the Jaycees: take census of city and post signs with higher population figures on highway; establish hqds. as a clearing house for those who have houses apartments or rooms to rent so the people who want to move to Abernathy can be given better service.

Blowouts or flats at high speed sometimes cause fatal accidents. The Jaycees have a safety committee which should start work on securing a contraption to run over all our streets and through the alley in the business section to pick up nails, tacks and other bits (sometimes they're chunks) of metal that cause flats or otherwise damage and weaken tires. Lubbock county has a magnetic metal picker-upper. We should study their machine and buy or build one similar to use in Abernathy.

It has been suggested that the tabernacle be donated to the American Legion to use the salvageable material in the Legion home to be built here. Also suggested was a plan for the Jaycees to beautify the city square. Included in the project would be flood lights, playground equipment for children and

Scholastic Increase May Give School Here 2 Additional Teachers

School census takers enumerated 1,035 scholastics in the Abernathy School District in the annual March count just completed. This compares with last year's final tabulation of 905. The 1,035 counted, however, will probably be trimmed some by the County Superintendent's and State-Census Division offices. This is due to duplications, mistakes in ages and the moving of people from one district to another during the census taking period. The final tabulation for the district should be near 1,000.

The colored population showed the biggest increase — jumping from 20 last year to 35 — a 75% increase. The white scholastic population rose from 885 to an even 1,000, however, it is expected that this will be trimmed to at least 975. On the basis of this count the school will be eligible for at least 2 additional teachers, running the total to 33. This makes the school eligible for about \$57,000 in state per capita funds.

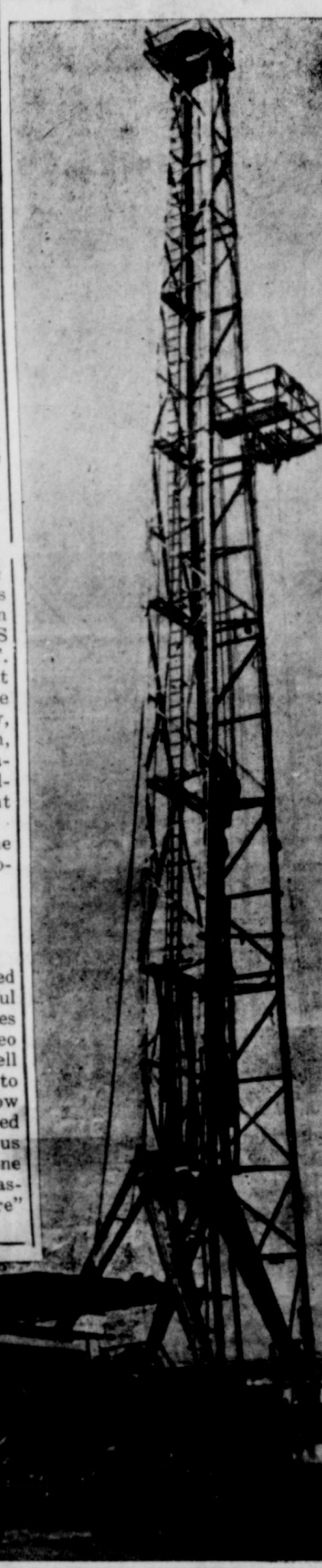
TO OPEN MAY 8

Oil Derricks Dominate Skyline At County Line

This photo was made at the No. 1 Pure Oil Co. D. O. Williams location, 660 feet from the north and west lines of section 20, block DT, HE&WT survey, southwest Hale county, nine miles west of Abernathy. Olson Drilling Co. is the contractor. Mrs. C. B. Wilson, whose husband is employed by the Olson Co. at that location, made the picture. This is a familiar skyline scene at County Line, which is in the Anton-Irish oilfield. The Williams well was drilled below 5,833 feet, Monday. Casing was set at 5,800 feet and the plug was drilled out.

Humble Oil & Refining company No. 1 T. E. Lutrick, six and one-half miles northeast of Abernathy, and in northwest quarter of section 17, block D-8, EL&RR survey, had drilled under 5,993 feet in line, and was drilling ahead.

In the southwest Hale county side of the Anton-Irish field, Stanolind Oil & Gas company No. 1 Julia Arnold, has been completed for a 24-hour pumping potential of 171.64 barrels of 29 gravity oil, with no water.

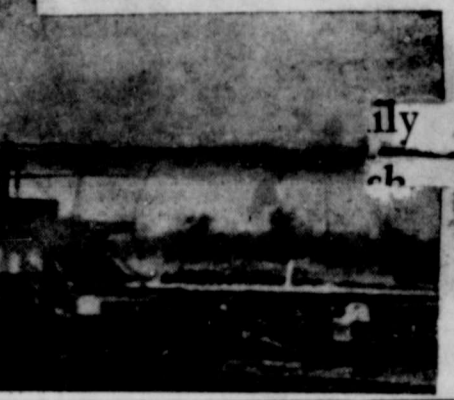
The pay at 5,509-6,060 feet, had been treated with 18,000 gallons of acid. Gas-oil ratio was 250-1. The well is 1,980 feet from north and east lines of section 14, block DT, HE&WT survey.

Hunt Oil company No. 1 Adams, stepout from production in the Anton-Irish field, had reached 5,410 feet, in line, and was making more hole.

Stanolind No. 1 L. A. Harrah was coring ahead below 5,959 feet in Permian dolomite. It has not found much indication of possible production down to the current level of operations.

Stanolind No. 4-A Lee Irish had reached 1,570 feet in anhydrite, and had set 8 1/2 inch casing at 1,567 feet, with 560 sacks of cement. It is to resume drilling in a few

the situation and accepting it as the parents' problem. In Bible school work we have long recommended classrooms of no more than twenty with assistants to attend to minor details. That is a far cry from our typical school room today, but it is a goal worth keeping in mind.

building while under construction. The structure is to be 40 x 60 feet when completed.

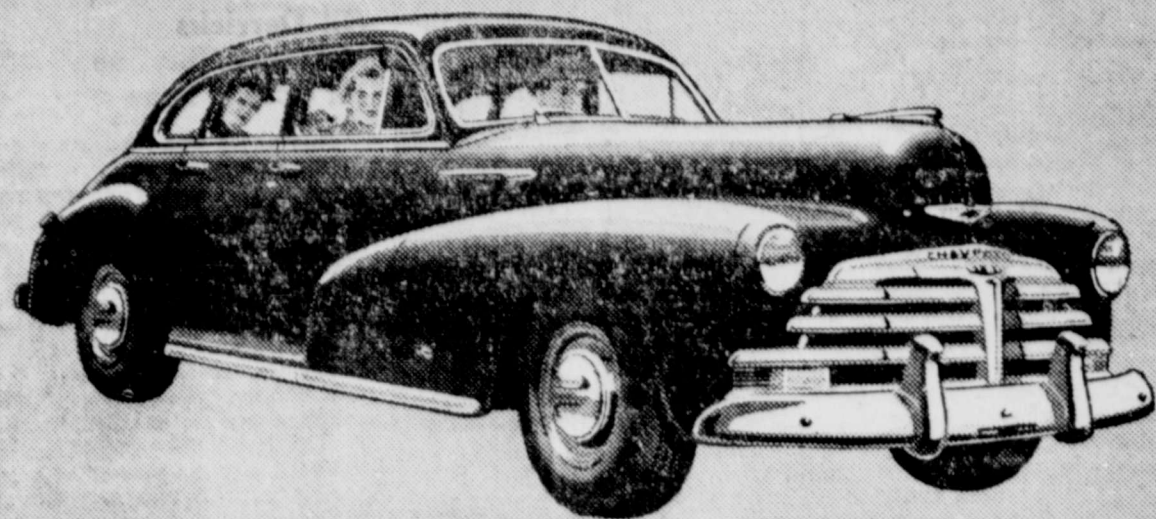

Stanolind No. 3-B Lee Irish had cored to 5,536 feet and so far has no signs of oil in commercial quantities.

Stanolind No. 4-B Lee Irish was drilling ahead under 3,242 feet in anhydrite and shale.

Stanolind No. 1 Edward Schoor had drilled below 5,795 feet in line and was continuing.

Stanolind No. 1 Ellwood, had

drilled plug on casing which had been set at 5,850 feet, and was making more hole.

Stanolind No. 1 Twilley, was on a bottom of 5,900 feet, in line, and was swabbing to test. It is showing some oil and some water.

General American Oil Company No. 1 A. F. Byrd, discovery for some sort of production from the Cisco section of the Pennsylvania, in southeast Hale county, about 3 miles north and east of Petersburg, was testing on the pump preparatory to completion from pay above the plugged back total depth of 5,906 feet.

On the last test reported the well was credited with having pumped about 250 barrels of fluid in 24 hours. Some of the recovery was water and the remainder was oil. Informed sources reveal that the water is showing some decrease. The well should be completed and put on production in the near future.

General American No. 2 Byrd, one-half mile west of No. 1 Byrd, and in the southwest side of the north half of section 17, block K, TTRR survey, has reached 2,657 feet in anhydrite and was making more hole.

Active drilling operations were slated to be started by the first of the week at three other stepouts to the No. 1 Byrd. Those projects are General American's No. 1 Bob Mayo, in southeast Hale county, and General American's No. 1 E. M. Carmickle, and No. 1 Flora C. Strickler, both in southwest Floyd county, just over the county line from the new southeast Hale county development. Each of those projects are slated to go to at least 6,000 feet, and some of them may go below that level.
