RATLIFF MURDER CASE NEARS END

TESTIMONY CONCLUDED TODAY IN CARMICHAEL SLAYING, WITH NIGHT SESSION BELIEVED SURE

(By the Associated Press)
ANSON, Tex., Apr. 26.—Testimony was concluded here today in the trial of Marshall Ratliff, charged with murder in the death of George Carmichael, policeman, wounded fatally in a gun battle following the robbery of the First National bank at Cisco on Dec. 23.
Arguments were to start at mid-afternoon, and it was indicated that a night session would be held so the case could go to the jury tomorrow morning.

Parley Is Halted

AUSTIN—Governor Moody's conference with Lynch Davidson, chairman of the Texas "harmony" Democrats, closed abruptly here today with both leaders dashing to a railway station. Mr. Davidson, word at his office that he had gone to Dallas and Mr. Davidson presumably accompanied him.

Perjury Probe

WASHINGTON—Testimony given by Robert W. Stewart before the senate Tamm-Lone committee was being studied by the senate to determine whether perjury charges shall be brought.

Flight Is Rapped

MONTREAL (By The Canadian Press)—Severe criticism of the flight to carry serum from New York to Quebec for the treatment of Floyd Bennett has been made by Premier L. A. Taschereau of Quebec and provincial secretary Athanasius David. Mr. David made plain that Col. Charles A. Lindbergh's part in the flight was entirely admirable.

All Smith Boom

HOUSTON—R. L. Henry, Houston chairman of the Harris county Smith-for-President club, in a statement here Thursday said that Texas supporters of Governor Al Smith have begun a state-wide drive for the selection of a slate of seven delegates at large to the Democratic national convention.

Three Generations Celebrate Birthday

DEVILS LAKE, N. D., April 26.—Three generations celebrated birthday anniversary yesterday. Mrs. J. R. Dalay, 33, her daughter, Mrs. Otto Scheunemann, 33, and the latter's child, Henrietta, 3, all were born on April 25.

Ratliff already has been convicted of robbery of the bank and the murder of G. E. Bedford, Cisco police chief. In the former case he was sentenced to 99 years in prison, and in the latter he was sentenced to electrocution. Trial of the third case was begun Monday.

Three Defunct Witnesses
In the trial here only three defunct witnesses were used, while 30 persons testified for the state. None of the witnesses, however, directly connected Ratliff with the fatal wounding of Carmichael.
Ratliff has been kept under close guard since the discovery, earlier in the week of two hawk saws in the lining of his uniform.

Gotham Mayor Aids Memorial Movement

ATLANTA, Ga., April 26 (AP)—Mayor James J. Walker of New York City has raised more than \$50,000 for the Stone Mountain Confederate Memorial association through the sale of Stone Mountain memorial half dollars. Hollis N. Randolph, president of the association, said in his annual report to the organization. This, it was pointed out, is more money than has been raised by any other individual other than officers of the association.

Insurgent Leader In Mexico Beaten

MEXICO CITY, April 26 (AP)—Dispatches from Guadalajara today stated that Enrique Gorostiza, one of the most prominent insurgent leaders in Jalisco, was defeated and from fifteen to twenty of his followers slain in a battle attempt to capture El Teuchan, a ranch near Encarnacion De Diaz. The insurgents withdrew, carrying off their wounded.

THREE DIE IN FAMILY FUSS

FOURTH INJURED WHEN MAN SEES TO END MARITAL TROUBLES

DONORA, Pa., Apr. 26 (AP)—Three persons were dead and a fourth was reported in a critical condition today as a result of a husband's attempt to patch up marital differences with his wife.
Andrew Lacus, 35, was shot to death yesterday by his son-in-law, John Fancsall, 25, in the former's bedroom at Monongahela City, Pa. Fancsall, who was married to Lacus' daughter, shot his mother-in-law and his estranged wife and then shot himself. The mother-in-law and Fancsall died later. Mrs. Fancsall's condition was described as serious.

Three Are Shot In Argument Over Dog

CHICAGO, April 26 (AP)—Two women and a man were shot, one of the women possibly fatally following an argument resulting when the man kicked a police dog owned by Mrs. Lottie Fraim of St. Louis, Mo.
Joseph Pignowski, a guest with Mrs. Fraim at the home of Mrs. Bertha Natchezewski, kicked the dog when it barked at Mrs. Fraim's dog. Pignowski, strangled with the woman, seeking to disarm her. During the struggle the woman was wounded twice, one bullet striking Mrs. Natchezewski, the other plowing through Mrs. Fraim's jaw.
The St. Louis woman was reported dying.

Small Stand Here Robbed Last Night

Forty-three cents in pennies and a bunch of fruits, candies and peanuts were stolen from a small banana and peanut stand on East Broadway during last night, a report to the Journal said today. The cash register yielded the 43 cents while the other stuff was taken from the place at random.

\$203,000,000 TAX CUT APPROVED

Dolores Del Rio, Cinema Star, Fears Divorce Will Alienate Her Admirers

IDOL OF MEXICANS OF CATHOLIC FAITH IS FACING DILEMMA

HOLLYWOOD, Calif., April 26.—How will the news of her divorce be greeted by her thousands of Catholic followers?

That is the thing that is bothering Dolores Del Rio, the Mexican screen star, confided exclusively to the writer just before boarding the train for Nogales, Mexico, to file her suit for divorce from her husband, Jaime Del Rio.

The actress, whose rise in the film world has been little short of sensational, practically admitted that she would have taken this step for a permanent separation some time ago had it not been for the fear of her standing among those of her faith.

Will Not Marry Again

"However, since I have no intention of ever marrying again, I feel that I have not violated a simple law of the church," says Mill Del Rio. "The laws of our church say nothing about divorces. They merely state that a divorced person shall not remarry."

On April 11, 1921, Dolores, then only 15 years old, and fresh from a convent where she had spent most of her early life, became Mrs. Jaime Del Rio. Both were members of prominent Mexican families. Two and a half years ago Dolores and her husband came to Hollywood and the Mexican beauty embarked upon her cinema career, guided by Edwin Carowe. For a while things moved along very smoothly. Then the breach started, as breaches will start in celestial families. The break came shortly before Christmas of last year when Del Rio departed for New York. He has not returned.

"Our divorce is due solely to lack of compatibility between us," declares Dolores. "We had hoped that a separation would end our difficulties, but it failed so we are following the only course left—a divorce."

Plan Separate Careers

"I have absolutely no thought of re-marriage and feel confident that Jaime is of the same opinion. We both have our careers mine on the screen and his in the literary world, and we felt that we could pursue them to better advantage separately."

Angel's Flight Is Halted By Illness

NOGALES, Ariz., April 26 (AP)—The off-again-on-again South American flight of Jimmy Angel, Presno airman, was held up again today with prospects that it would be several days before the projected 25,000 aerial trip is resumed.
Angel was reported in a dispatch to the Herald here to be suffering from malaria and in a railroad hospital at Guaymas where he landed last Tuesday. His condition was reported not serious.
Angel's trip has been delayed because of illness of the pilot, broken oil lines, shortage of gas, and customs troubles.

Globe Trotters In London And Berlin

LONDON, April 26 (AP)—Tolchiro Araki, Japanese, engaged in a race around the world eastward against a westbound competitor, arrived in London at 6 a. m. from Paris. After visiting the Japanese embassy he went to Croydon airport, boarded a plane and left for Berlin at 8:45 a. m.

TEXAS POLITICS FLARES UP ANEW DESPITE "HARMONY" AGREEMENT AS MOODY PLANS TO OPEN STATE TOUR

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, April 26.—The Texas political situation continues to boil, notwithstanding the "harmony" brought about through the efforts of Governor Moody's wing of the party Tuesday.

The latest pyrotechnics came from the pen of Judge William E. Hawkins of Breckenridge, who will oppose Mr. Moody for the Democratic nomination for governor, in a statement received here last night in which he condemned in the strongest terms what he styled the "abject surrender" of the Constitutional Democrats.

Credit Meeting Of Retailers Delayed

There will be no regular weekly credit meeting of the Lubbock Retail Merchants in their office tomorrow afternoon at one-thirty due to the closing of the stores for the opening game of the West Texas League here, officials said today. This will allow members and their employees plenty of time to attend the game.

Health Conditions In City Held Good

Health conditions in Lubbock are very satisfactory and the epidemic of heavy colds and influenza, which was present here as well as throughout the state, is rapidly diminishing, Dr. J. W. Ellis, city health officer, reported today.

SENATE BOARD STAYS WITHIN MELLON RANGE

NEW SCHEDULES VOTED OVER PROTEST FROM DEMO MEMBERS

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Apr. 26.—A \$203,000,000 tax reduction bill was agreed to today by the senate finance committee as a substitute for the \$290,000,000 measure voted by the house.

The republican majority on the committee wrote into the bill the new rate schedules over the program of the democrats for a \$25,000,000 reduction.

Formal Report Delayed

The formal report of the bill to the senate was held until tomorrow when some administrative provisions will be settled.
This proposal, if given final congressional approval would be acceptable to the treasury since Secretary Mellon announced today that a tax reduction of as high as \$219,000,000 would receive his sanction.

Reduction of Tax Corporation Tax

The \$203,000,000 reduction program includes:
Reduction of the corporation tax from 12-1/2 to 12-1/2 per cent.

Repeal of the 3 per cent automobile tax

An increase in exemptions allowed corporations from \$2,000 to \$3,000.
Downward revision of the rates applying on the intermediate rates brackets.

Inheritance Tax Repeal

The proposal of republicans to repeal the inheritance tax was laid aside without a record vote. This action cuts the original \$10,000,000 republican plan for the \$203,000,000 schedule which is within \$5,000,000 of the original limitation set by Secretary Mellon.

The senate bill also would restore the present rates on club dues, capital stock transfers and sales on the produce exchange which the house had voted to cut in half in each instance.

Approval was given, however, to the house provision to have the admission taxes increased from 10 per cent to 25 per cent on prize fights.

The house proposal to allow a retroactive cut in the corporation tax in the 1927 income payable this year was eliminated but it was agreed to make the proposed revision of surtax rates apply retroactively on last year's incomes payable this year, which means a return of about \$25,000,000 to individual taxpayers.

Two Men Held Here On Federal Charge

The two men arrested in Lamesa the first of the week on charges of passing, defaced currency, were brought to Lubbock last night for safekeeping awaiting their removal by federal officers to a federal court where they will face trial on the charges. The men are Tommy Wright, of Sweetwater, and C. B. Talasero, of Fort Worth.

Commission Meets On Rail Problems

The city commission was in session here today in further consideration of the proposals of the Fort Worth, San Antonio, City South Plains, railroad regarding street closings for the right of way of lines of the company in the south part of the city, but no definite decision had been reached early this afternoon.

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STATE OFFICIALS HERE TODAY ON TRIP TO COLLEGE

Col. H. H. Harrington, member of the State Board of Control and W. T. Gaston, chief of estimates and appropriations of Austin, are back in Lubbock today and making a complete inspection tour of the college in regards to its appropriation needs for the coming biennium.

Today at noon the group were guests of the Lubbock Kiwanis club in their regular luncheon while tonight at six they will be entertained by the school of Home Economics in the dining room of the school with a dinner.

PERMITS HERE TAKE SPURT IN UPWARD CLIMB

TWO ISSUED TODAY TO BRING MONTH'S TOTAL TO \$189,750

Featured by the issuance of two permits for 2-story residences to cost \$10,000 each and to be built in O'Neal Terrace, the city's newest residential tract, building permits took a jump upward today, totalling \$87,000 before the noon hour and boosting the month's total to \$189,750.

Five permits were issued today, all for residences. They brought the total number of residence permits for the month to 50 and the total number of permits for the year to 192. The week's permits have totalled \$58,475.

The year's building total is \$778,760. With the addition of the \$269,000 Tech building, it will total \$1,047,760.

Permits Issued Today

Permits issued today were: Tom Jackson, two permits for two \$11,000 7 room 2-story brick veneer homes for Charles F. O'Neal on lots 3 and 4 and 5 and 6, block 3, O'Neal Terrace; \$5,500 to Tom Jackson for the construction of a 5 room brick veneer residence for Olen Stewart, on lot 22, block 14, Lillwood; \$5,000 to Tom Jackson for the erection of a 6 room brick veneer residence for Webb Comstock on lot 24, block 20, Overton addition.
The two \$11,000 homes in O'Neal Terrace make six modern homes to be built there since its opening several weeks ago. Mr. O'Neal stated this morning that other homes above the \$10,000 class are being contemplated.

Pedro asked me not to call him. Senior Alvarado and I did feel as though I was addressing an ambassador, so I selected Pedro as his most attractive neighbor.

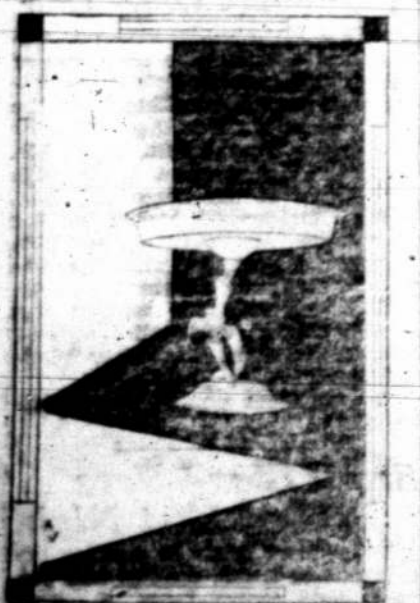

WURZBACH IN ADDRESS ASKS DELEGATES RE- UNINSTRICED

FLOOD THREAT MOVES SOUTH

FLORIDA IN GRIP OF SURGING WATERS AND MANY HOMELESS

(By Associated Press.) ATLANTA, Ga., April 26.—Flood waters that spread beyond their ranks in south Georgia and Alabama through the early part of the week had to a large extent receded today, but in northwest Florida continued to spread over a wide area of lowlands.

Many of the 3,000 to 5,000 estimated homeless in the three states were preparing to leave temporary havens in the hills and returned to their sodden homes and fields to replant crops, while railways, paralyzed since Sunday, began normal service over a wide area and highway repairs were under way.

Residents of Caryville, Fla., numbering 600, were safe at Bonifay, while flood waters of the Choctawhatchee river coursed 12 feet deep through the streets. Westville on the other shore of the stream was menaced.

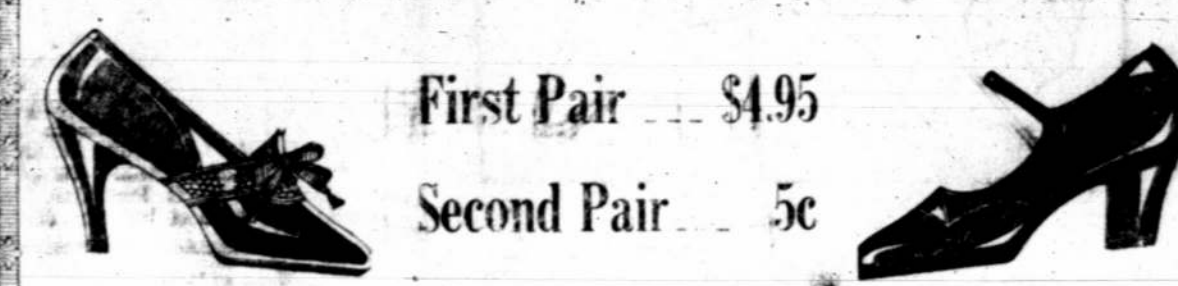

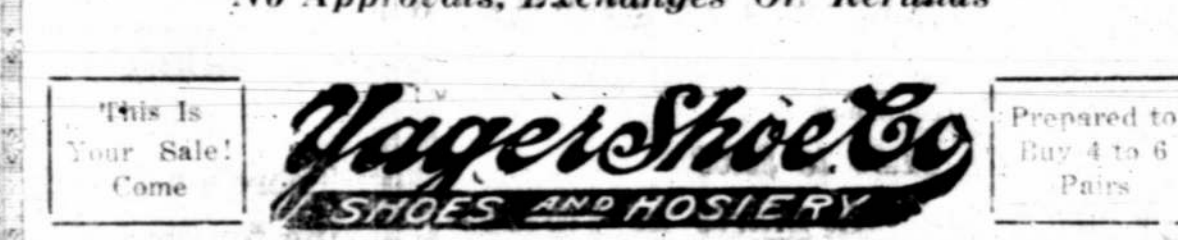
