

Farm Safety Week Set

Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Week, set by Governor Dolph Briscoe, began Thursday, July 25.

The week-long emphasis will highlight farm and ranch accident prevention, through programs conducted by the Texas Safety Association, Texas Farm Bureau, State Agricultural Extension Serv-

ice, Future Farmers and Future Homemakers, and the Young Farmers of Texas.

Records show that 285 Texas farm and ranch residents died in 1974, an increase over the 214 fatal accidents which occurred in 1973. Accidents involving traffic, tractors and drownings were the leading causes of fatalities in 1974.

"Farmers and ranchers have become increasingly concerned with the various agricultural safety regulations issued by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) and the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA)," according to Joe L. Smetana, Texas Safety Association Vice President for Farm and Ranch Safety.

"Of particular concern due to recent regulations are the certification or licensing of farmers and ranchers to use restricted pesticides, and the roll over protective structures for farm tractors," explained Smetana, who is Safety Director for the Texas Farm Bureau.

In his proclamation of the

Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Week, Gov. Briscoe urged "all who live and work on Texas farms and ranches to put safety first, to plan for accident prevention and to work diligently to remove hazards in agricultural environments."

The Texas week coincides with National Farm Safety Week.

Mr., Mrs. R. Griffiths Attend Leaders Conference

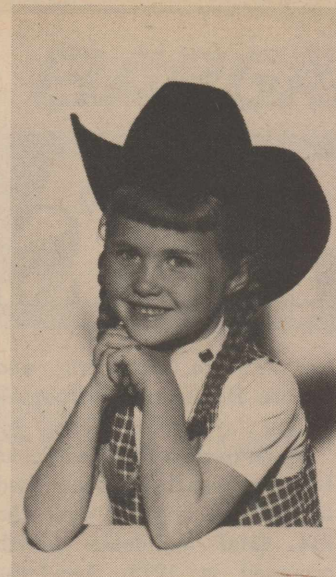
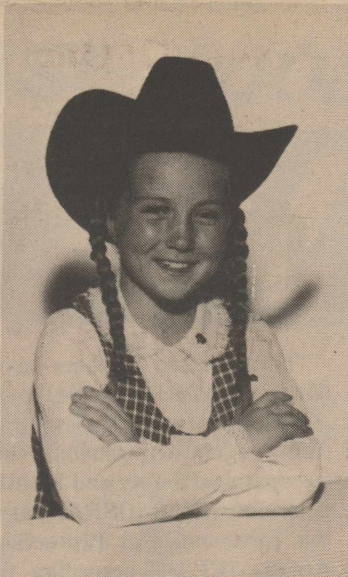

vocational agriculture teacher; Shirley was "promoted" six years ago from the first to second grade.

The Tuckers have a son, Jim, who is studying agriculture education at Tech and a daughter, Lana, an eighth grader. They are "Monday-Thursday parents" of little Adam Kendricks, keeping him those two days each week.

Shirley shares a recipe for cooking fish that she learned in Louisiana plus a tip on how to tell when grease is the correct temperature for frying.

"Louisiana cooks can fry fish the best of anybody," she claims and vouches for the tip. "I promise it is not a dangerous thing, there's no danger of causing a fire. It works too, I saw it before I tried it."

The apricot salad is very good although the gelatin is very difficult to find. Shirley says they stock up on the hard-to-get gelatin whenever they travel through areas which have A & P grocery chains.

In addition to being a fishing enthusiast, Shirley also loves to play golf and likes working in the yard. "Anything that gets me out of the house," she laughs.

COTTAGE CHEESE- APRICOT SALAD

1 carton cottage cheese
1 pkg. Apricot jello
1 small carton cook whip
1 can apricots, drained well
1/2 to 1 cup nuts

Sprinkle dry jello over cottage cheese. Fold in other ingredients and chill. (Apricot jello can be purchased at A & P grocery stores)

MARTHA BATES SALAD

1 box lemon jello
1 box lime jello
Prepare in usual manner except use only 3 1/2 cups water. When jello is firm, add:
1 1/2 cups crushed pineapple
1 cup pecans
1/2 lb. shredded cheese
1/2 cup mayonnaise
1/3 cup unsweetened cream
Mix thoroughly and allow to stand until firm.

LOUISIANA BASS SPECIAL

Filet bass, cutting out rib cage to remove all bones. Salt and pepper to taste. Dip pieces of fish in Louisiana Hot sauce then roll in yellow corn meal. Drop into hot deep fat. (Peanut cooking oil is best for cooking fish) When fish float to the top, remove and serve hot.

TIP:

The way to tell if grease is hot enough for cooking fish is to put a kitchen match in the grease. When grease is hot enough, the match will strike and extinguish in a second. Remove match and drop pieces of fish into hot grease.

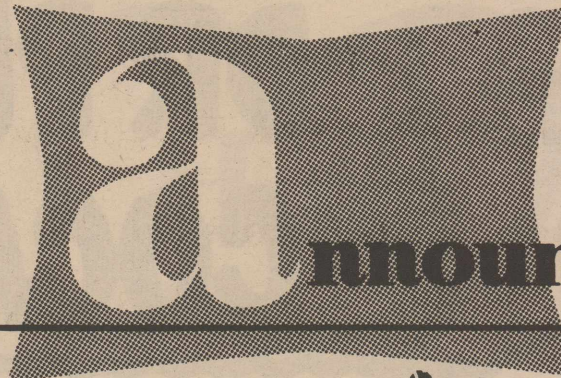

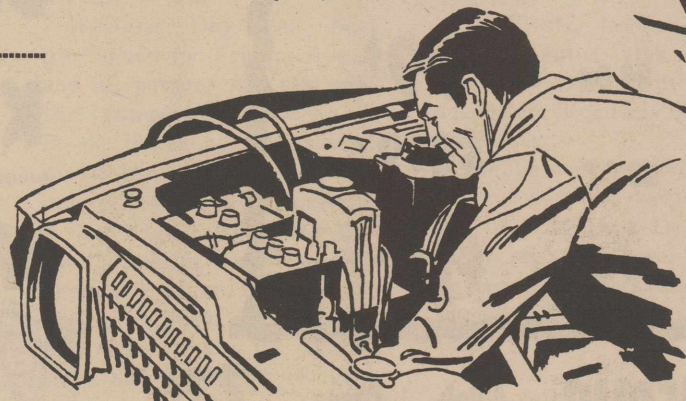

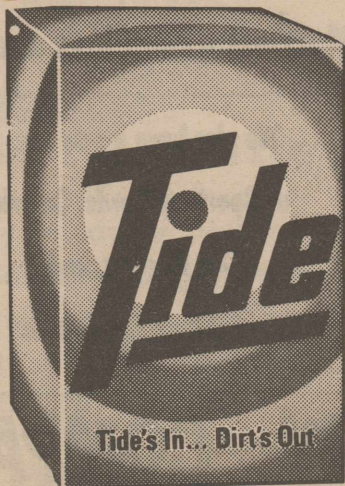
