Forms Ready For Federal Use Tax

Administrative Officer Ben Hawkins of the Big Spring office, reminded owners that Form 2290 Federal Use Tax Return on Highway Motor Vehicles, should be filed immediately.

The provisions of the Highway Revenue Act of 1926 require Form 2290 to be filed for all taxable vehicles in use during July of each tax year. An additional Form 2290 must be filed for each month in which additional vehicles are put in use. These returns, which are filed with the District Director of Internal Revenue, are due on or before the last day of the month following the month in which the vehicle is first used. The tax due must be paid when the return is filed.

The tax applies to the use of highway motor vehicles having taxable gross weight of more than 26,000 pounds. The taxable gross weight of trucks and truck-trailers is determined according to the empty weight and the number of axles. The tax applies to the use of single-unit trucks with empty weight of 13,000 pounds or more, and truck-trailers with empty weight of 5,500 pounds or more.

The rate of the tax for a full year is \$1.50 per 1,000 pounds of taxable gross weight. A full-year's tax for one vehicle will range from \$4.50 to \$90.00, depending on its taxable gross weight. Each tax year begins July 1 and ends the following June 30. If the first use of a vehicle in the tax year occurs after July, the tax is prorated according to the number of months remaining in the tax year.

Internal Revenue Service publication No. 349, "Federal Use Tax on Highway Motor Vehicles" has been prepared by the Service to answer taxpayers' questions. The booklet defines highway vehicles subject to the new tax, and contains a variety of information on the determination of taxable gross weight, exemptions, the preparation of applicable forms and returns, and the manner in which payments are to be made. A use-tax schedule of vehicles by category is also included. These booklets and copies of Form 2290 and Instructions may be obtained from the Internal Revenue Service office at 306 Permian Building, Big Spring, Texas.

The highway vehicle use tax was levied by Congress to help defray the cost of the proposed expansion of the nation's highways. It is effective until June 30, 1937.

Soil Conservation District News

Jack McKinney, a cooperator of the Mitchell County Soil Conservation District, whose farm is 8 miles northwest of Westbrook, has recently completed a farm pond on his rangeland. Jack has been deferring his rangeland this year and the grasses that were not destroyed by the drought have made considerable growth and seed. Jack said that, "With permanent livestock water and a normal season or two, I believe I can get my range back in shape to graze."

Rube Mann, manager of the Tom Morrison ranch, which lies northwest of Westbrook, has deferred all his rangeland this year and plans to do the same next year. Mr. Mann, who is also co-operating with the Mitchell County SCD, has recently put a complete terrace system on approximately 80 acres of land. He has the land all prepared and will plant it to rye in September for soil improvement and protection from wind erosion during the blowing season.

Dave Womack, another SCD cooperator, whose farm is 5 miles southwest of Colorado City, has constructed nearly 4 miles of large level ridge-type terraces during the past week. Mr. Womack has a good farm and is doing a nice job of farming it. He uses terraces, contour farming and cover crops to conserve moisture and reduce erosion.

New District cooperators who have recently worked out conservation plans with the assistance of S. C. S. technicians are: J. W. Lewis, Ralph Mann, A. L. Geer, Mrs. G. Y. Bassinger, Armando Baumann, Edward Baumann and Doctors Rhodes and Cowan. Work will begin on the conservation practices that were planned as soon as crops are out this fall.

Veterans' News

Q. I am a Korea veteran eligible for GI training. I recently returned to active duty, and as a result will be unable to start training when my starting deadline arrives. Could the deadline be postponed in my case?

A. No. Under the law, veterans must begin Korean GI training before their deadline, which is three years from date of discharge. There are no exceptions.

Q. How do I go about changing the beneficiaries on my GI insurance policy?

A. Get a "Change of Beneficiary" form at any VA office. Fill it out, sign it, and send it to the VA District Office where you pay your premiums. Or you may simply write the District Office a letter, listing your beneficiaries. In writing, be sure to give your full name, address and insurance number.

Q. I understand that a disabled Korea veteran continues to receive subsistence payments for two months after he has been declared rehabilitated. What if he stops training before he is completely rehabilitated? Will he also get subsistence payments for two months afterwards?

A. No. The extra subsistence payments are made only after rehabilitation has been completed. They will not be made if a veteran stops training before-hand.

Q. I am planning to start school this fall under the Korean GI Bill. How can I find out whether the course I want to take is GI approved?

A. Your VA Regional Office maintains a list of GI-approved courses. This information is not available at VA headquarters in Washington, D. C.

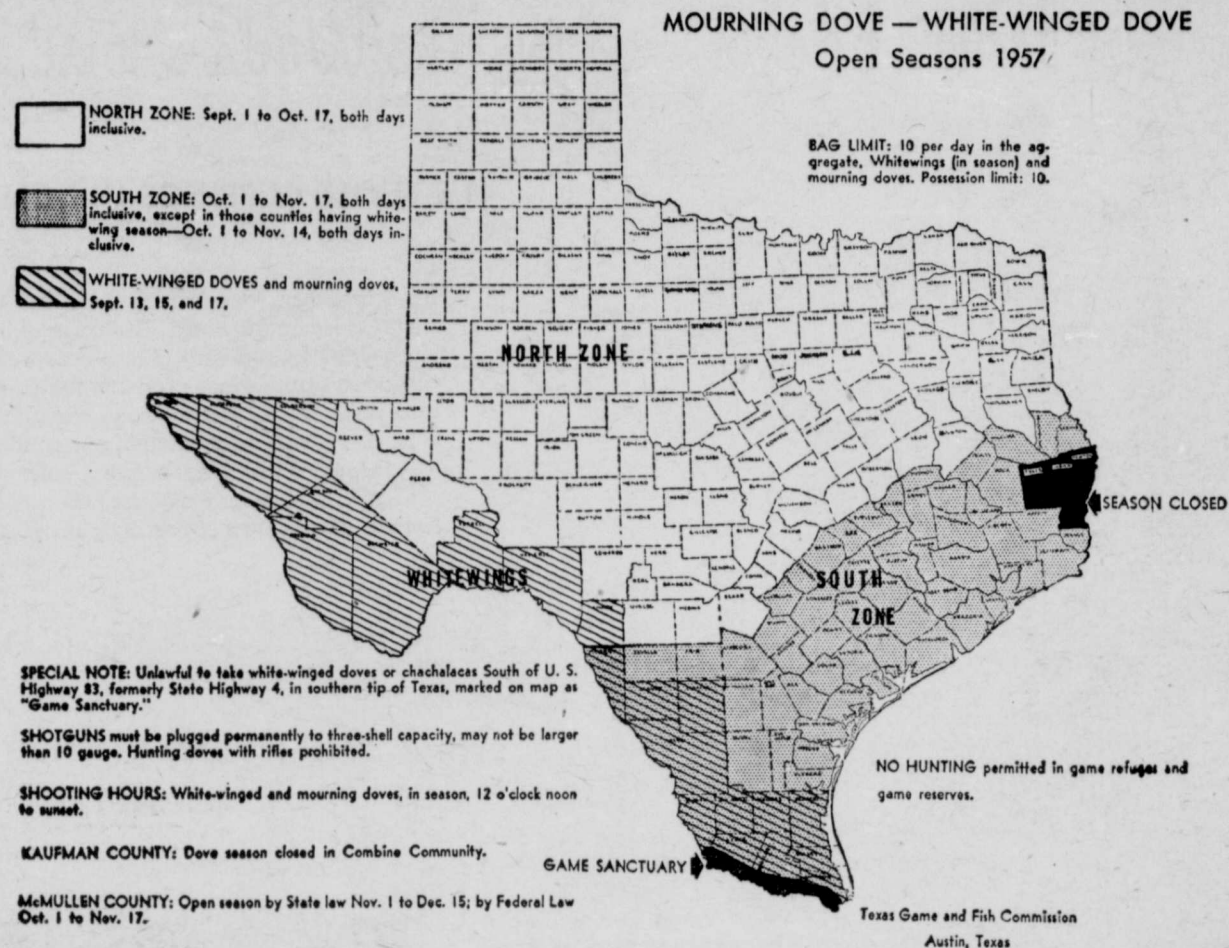
