TEXAS TO AGAIN RECEIVE FEDERAL ROAD AID

FINANCIAL HELP
ON HIGHWAYS IS
AGAIN SECURED\$6,500,000 TO BE USED THIS
YEAR; AVAILABLE IN
TWO WEEKS

(By The Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Mar. 29.—Federal road aid, \$6,500,000 worth for 1927, again is to be released to the state highway department within two or three weeks after being withdrawn for about six months, W. R. Ely, member of the highway commission, said today.

National road authorities late in the administration of the last Ferguson highway commission withdrew all aid and declined to enter with the state in any project because of poor field conditions of the highway department and the bad condition of roads.

The new highway commission late yesterday conferred with federal engineers over the aid problem.

Ely said today that the commission is now in a position to see the aid will be available in two or three weeks because it has satisfied federal authorities that the department will properly maintain the roads, pay current debts as soon as possible and generally measure up to the standard imposed.

Highway Aid Granted
AUSTIN, Mar. 29. (AP)—The new state highway commission today untied the department's purse strings and granted \$42,500 in aid.

Shackelford county was granted \$12,500 to aid in construction of a one-inch bituminous surface on highway number 23 from Albany to a point near Moran.

Robertson county was allowed \$15,000 to be used in erecting an approach to a bridge on highway number 42 over Brazos river to highway number 43 at the county line.

The commission authorized a Wilbrey county delegation to start work on grading and drainage structures on highway number 96 from Raymondville south to the Cameron county line, preparatory to laying hard surface. About \$39,000 in cash is available to the county, the delegation said.

BRITISHER SETS
NEW AUTO PACEMajor Segrave Drives Famous
'Mystery S' 203.841 Miles
Per Hour In Florida

(By Associated Press)
DAYTONA BEACH, Fla., Mar. 29.—Burning the sands of the famous Daytona Beach, Major H. O. D. Segrave, an American-born Englishman, in a four brilliant red speedster, today captured his way to an unofficial world's speed record for the mile—straight away of 203.841 miles an hour. A meeting of American Automobile association officials was called for later to officially time the race.

Skids Are Perilous
Major Segrave, premier of European racing drivers, sent his "Mystery S" at the astounding pace of 207.015 miles down the course, after heating up the track into a quartering head wind that threw his huge racer into skids that threatened instant death. The computed average time for the mile on the two runs was 203.841 miles an hour, 207.171 for the kilometer, and 203.616 for the five kilometers.

"I'm satisfied, now we'll pack up and go home," Major Segrave told K. Lee Guinness, companion on the American trip and formerly one of Europe's foremost drivers, when found that a broken brake shoe would prevent his making a third run.

Six Bills Signed
By Governor Moody

AUSTIN, Mar. 29. (AP)—Six bills, one of them empowering the state highway commission to allot state funds to erect interstate bridges, were signed by Governor Dan Moody, W. Boyd Gatewood, his secretary announced today. The measure authorizing the commission to allot funds for the erection of interstate bridges is regarded as an attempt to settle the controversy over proposed building of a bridge between Texas and Oklahoma over the Red River. Other bills signed: Allowing appointment of guardians for disabled veterans without the necessity of insanity proceedings; empowering the state game, fish and oyster department to use state-owned islands for establishment of salt water fish hatcheries; providing a fine of \$1,000 for the destruction of reports of property valued at \$50 or more and a fine of \$250 for destruction of property less than \$50 in value; providing a method for condemning highways for obtaining federal aid; increasing pay of grand jurors to \$3 per day.

LIBERALS FIRE
ON U. S. PLANENicaraguans Damage Ship But
Fliers Unhurt; Fire Is
Returned By Them

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Mar. 29.—An attack by liberals on an American marine corps airplane was reported to the navy department today by Rear Admiral Lathimer, commanding forces in Nicaragua.

The admiral said a force estimated at 200 men opened fire yesterday with rifles and machine guns on an airplane piloted by Captain H. D. Campbell, who, with Lieutenant E. H. Lamson-Scribner, as observer, was making an air reconnaissance about nine miles east of Leon. Part of the tail of the plane was shot away but neither officer was injured.

At the time of the attack the plane was flying at an altitude of about 1,500 feet. It was struck 12 times by bullets. Lieutenant Lamson-Scribner returned with his machine guns. No estimate as to the casualties suffered on the ground was contained in the Lathimer report.

WRANGLE HALTS
BIG LIBEL SUITLawyers Argue As Sapiro Asks
To Show Financial Damage
Done Him By Ford

(By The Associated Press)
DETROIT, Mar. 29.—Aaron Sapiro's witness stand narrative today reached the point where he wished to show financial damage attributed to alleged articles printed in Henry Ford's weekly, the Dearborn Independent, but a long argument by attorneys and adjournment of court for the luncheon recess prevented anything on it going into the record.

Sapiro admitted that his fiscal records for 1918 and 1917 had been lost, but said he could give definite figures as to gross and net income of himself and his firm for the years since then, and approximate figures for the first two years.

The defense moved to subpoena all of Sapiro's records and correspondence pertaining to them, a step to be argued later.

Some of the Sapiro records are in San Francisco and others in Chicago, he said. It would take several days to get them here.

STRONG ACTION
IN CHINA IS URGE
OF U. S. CONSULMINISTER MACMURRAY, IN
PEKING, SENDS ADVICE
TO WASHINGTON

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Mar. 29.—Recommendations for strong action to prevent recurrence of the Nanking outrages at other points in national territory were contained in a message forwarded to the state department today by Minister Macmurray at Peking.

While the message which reached Macmurray from Nanking did not bear the signature of the sender as received here, department officials believed it probably was signed by Consul J. K. Davis, who is still aboard a warship at Nanking.

Situation at Nanking Critical
The minister's cablegram, dated March 27, was accompanied by a report from Rear Admiral Hough, commanding the Yangtze river patrol, which said the situation at Wuhu, up the river, from Nanking, was growing more critical.

The reports that the trouble is being stirred up and may be expected at any moment, the department's announcement said.

Minister Macmurray said that a message to him from Nanking reported that outrages there "were more riotous than was at first realized."

Examination of depositions and verbal statements by Americans had produced evidence of two known cases of attempted attacks on American women and there were other cases "only slightly less critical in character" it was added.

"The message states that the campaign of terrorism and insult to foreigners is not only officially countenanced and directed, but even pre-arranged," it was added.

SITUATION GRAVE AS ALBANIA
MOBILIZES ON SLAV FRONTIER

PARIS, Mar. 29.—The Jugo-Slav government, says a Havas dispatch from Belgrade, is reported to have advised the foreign ministers of the great powers that according to news received from Albania, the situation there is grave, with mobilization continuing actively "under direction of Italian officers."

It is understood, the dispatch adds, that the Belgrade government has agreed to all the suggestions of the powers on the subject of an investigation into the situation along the Jugo-Slav-Albanian frontier. But in view of the repugnance of Italy to a commission of inquiry, it is thought possible that the whole question, brought to a head by Italy's allegations that Jugo-Slav was mobilizing on the Albanian frontier, will be settled directly between Rome and Belgrade. This plan the Belgrade government is known to be willing to accept in principle.

He said he could not definitely identify his attackers in the event of their capture, on account of the heavy masks they were wearing at the time. He probably will go to Floydada in an effort to identify the men held there, but said he believed his attackers are still at large unless they have been arrested today by Dallas police.

YARDS RECEIVED BY
LUBBOCK C. OF C.

A map showing the right-of-way wanted by the Fort Worth and Denver South Plains railroad through Lubbock and across the Santa Fe tracks southeast of the city has been received by the railroad committee of the Chamber of Commerce here, and strenuous efforts will be started at once to collect delinquent notes to the end that the purchases of the necessary grounds might be made. O. L. Slaton, chairman of the committee said today.

The depot of the company, as shown on the plot, will be located in the north end of the Pickett addition, just south of 18th street between Avenues F and G, the right-of-way to consume the entire six blocks immediately south of this location to a point near 24th street, where the track will angle southeast, across the northeast corner of McMiniside addition.

Crossing Location Set
The Denver will cross the Santa Fe track just north of the new Slaton highway where the highway turns parallel to the Santa Fe, crosses the road to the Lubbock cemetery just east of the Santa Fe and running in a southeasterly direction, is routed south of the cemetery, then turns a north-easterly direction across the canyon, from which point the road will take an almost air line northeast course into Petersburg.

An industrial track to connect with the Santa Fe will branch from the main line about 27th St. and Avenue A, then in a due north course on Ave. A to the Santa Fe tracks. The "X" is to be located just south of 25th St., one leg of which will extend in a south-westerly direction through the Harkey and Hill additions, and down the west side of the Flynn addition, due south on the south extension of Avenue L.

Maps showing the route wanted across the county beyond the cemetery have not yet been received, but information here is that the most direct route possible will be asked into Petersburg. Maps showing the route are expected the latter part of the week. Information here is that the road will miss Idaho on the west by about two miles and a half.

Right-of-way for the depot and trackage must now be secured immediately. Mr. Slaton said today in order that no delay will be encountered in actual beginning of construction work.

Cultured Cosmopolite Is the World's First Woman Steamship Agent



Madame Maria Haidar Bey

NEW YORK, March 29.—American women are so accustomed to step from sheltered home to office and shop and then to express themselves in dollars and cents we just assume that the first woman in any business or profession must be a daughter of our democracy.

No it is something of a surprise to find that the first woman steamship agent of the world is Mme. Maria Haidar Bey and that she is employed by the French flag line as manager of their Paris office.

Thoroughly Modern

Upon investigation it develops that Mme. Haidar Bey whose name works a Turkish baron and whose country interests resemble love, is a thoroughly modern very American appearing woman, who is a true cosmopolite.

"I am German by birth," she explained, "educated in Paris as a child and later at Oxford. I married a Turk who was military attaché of the Turkish embassy in Berlin and then went to live in Constantinople. When that turned out rather badly, I decided to have a career—and here I am."

"There is nothing," she added, "of oriental bondage to make you appreciate American freedom. That's why I love American and why I come to this country every chance I get. I like to feel your bustle and bustle and accomplishment—it feeds my natural inclination to be up and doing."

Mme. Haidar Bey has certainly seen moving and has pursued her career in many colorful countries.

"I made my first move toward independence in Turkey," she went on. "General Harrington, commander-in-chief of the British army of occupation in Turkey secured for me the management of a military club in Turkey that used to be the Enver Pasha's cavalry club. Under me were a staff of some thirty Greeks, English, French and German—my seven languages came in very handy."

Then she moved to Athens where she did relief work for the League of

Nations first and then worked with the American Red Cross. Her next objective was Paris where she studied Diplomacy in the Ecole des Sciences Politiques.

She also did some work for the United States steamship line, but gave up this because she was so beloved by Americans to conduct tours for American university students.

"And because I myself am so interested in Spain and find it such a glamorous and romantic country. I always used to take my students into Spain," she said.

"Naturally that brought me in touch with the Spanish officials and transportation officials, and the position I now hold grew out of that."

"Certainly, I find it very fascinating and satisfying work. And I can't imagine not being out in the world as you American women put it."

Having traveled extensively over Europe, and knowing labor conditions, Mme. Haidar Bey thinks we do not quite appreciate our opportunities here. Women are taken for granted here in industry and well received in comparison to the rest of the world, they don't realize there are still parts of this earth, notably Turkey, where women actually are the bosses, and being yourself, if you are a woman, is almost impossible.

Women in Europe

"The employment situation in Europe is complicated for women," she continued, "because with so many men out of work, it is easy to understand the prejudice against allowing women to take jobs. Granted she get her self a foothold, a woman has to work much harder than a man to hold it. Her rise is necessarily slower, and less spectacular than over here. But conditions are bound to change."

"They are bound to change here, too. Once American women find there is a field they haven't touched, even if it happens to be the ocean, they will conquer it."

HUNDREDS WILL CONTEST SKILL DIRECTOR SAYS

THREE SCHOOLS ENTERED IN CLASS A; NOLES COMPLETES PLANS

Sixteen schools in Lubbock county have posted entries in the three divisions of the interscholastic league track and field meet that is to be held here next Friday and Saturday. Howard Noles, director of the meet, said that the largest number in the history of the interscholastic league is anticipated.

The thirteen schools entered other than the three Class A are about equally divided as to class B and rural. Mr. Noles said and although all of these will not enter a full entry in competition, it is expected that the full two days will be taken up in the various phases of the outlined program, which is to be followed as closely as possible.

Other Events Scheduled
Literary events will open at the Lubbock high school building Friday afternoon at 1 o'clock, with declamation, music, memory, essay writing and preliminary in boys and girls debates scheduled as the opener. At 2 o'clock finals in boys and girls debate will open, followed by spelling, arithmetic and extemporaneous speaking contests.

Saturday morning at 9 o'clock finals will be held in both junior and senior boys and girls declamation.

Tennis competition will start Friday morning at 9 o'clock in boys and girls singles, with doubles to follow immediately on courts to be furnished by private citizens not yet designated. Finals in tennis will begin at 3 o'clock Saturday morning.

All track and field events will be held Saturday at the Tech athletic field, with junior events to begin at 9 o'clock Saturday morning. Track and field events of the senior groups will be held simultaneously on the Tech field beginning at 1:30 in the afternoon. All contestants are asked to gather at the field not later than 1 o'clock. Under rules of the meet, any contestant who is entered in both a track and field event which conflict as to time, he will be excused from the field event to participate in track events.

The number of athletes who will be here has not yet been ascertained, but with 16 schools represented, several hundred probably will participate from all parts of the county.

High School Basketball Stars Ready For Opening Round Of Chicago Meet

CHICAGO, Mar. 29.—Alpine, Tex., with no railroad trains nor electric lights but its population of seventy-five inhabitants reduced to 45. That is the doing of Mr. Amos Alonzo Stagg, director of Athletics at the University of Chicago, for 23 years. Stagg cut down Alpine's population by inviting one tenth of the inhabitants here to compete in the national interscholastic basketball tournament, which opened at the University today.

The tournament attracting forty-three high school teams from thirty-eight states, thirty-five of them state champions, will wind up next Saturday night with the title deciding contest. Nearly four hundred boys from all over America will compete in the 200 games.

He Knows about Alpine
Mr. Stagg probably never heard of Alpine, when he planned his national tournament but he knows about Alpine now. He knows, for example, that a place of 75 inhabitants, can produce a basketball team that thinks it is good enough to play with the best high school teams of 25 states. He knows that this little hill country school, five miles from a railroad, thinks enough of its basketball team to rake and scrape up the dollars necessary to bring the team and its principal coach here to a city of millions, to compete for the honor.

The team of Jacksonville, Florida, arrived full of vim and vigor today. Toledo, Ohio, Colorado Springs, Col. Florence, Miss. Durham, N. C., Roswell, N. M. and other teams have sent their teams en masse.

Tough of sinew and strong of courage are the Tennessee state basketball champions from Alpine. That sinew and courage will get its first shake its only test tomorrow on the stroke of twelve against Lincoln, Neb., champions of the cornhusker state.

The tournament including the consolation rounds, will see nearly 200 games played. If there are any favorites to win the title, nobody seems to know anything about them, because all the teams consider themselves high class. The team that won the 1926 championship, Pittsburg, Mass., is not competing this year because it was kicked in the Massachusetts tournament and the winning team was ineligible for the national tournament.

The basketball squads began dropping off every train today. Fresh from the wide open spaces were the Safford and Gilbert, Arizona, teams, with their two gallon hats and cowboy chaps.

FATHER KILLED, DAUGHTER HELD

Mother Also Wounded, Girl Assumes Blame; Married Sweetheart Jailed

(By The Associated Press) WINONA, Miss., Mar. 29.—Fifteen-year-old Kitty Jones, who maintains steadfastly that she shot her father, Mrs. Jones, to death and seriously wounded her mother, because they showed her nine-year-old brother Ira, Jr., more attention than they did her, today was in the same jail with Sam Boyd, 35, upon whom the wounded mother lays the blame of the tragedy.

Boyd, who is married, was arrested last night by Sheriff E. H. Thompson, upon information from Mrs. Jones that she saw him leaving her room after she had been shot.

They Admit Intimacy Both the girl and Boyd admitted to officers that they had passed notes and that the girl had accepted money from Boyd, the sheriff said.

The shooting occurred Sunday night after Jones and his wife had returned. Both were asleep, and Jones probably never knew what killed him. Mrs. Jones told the sheriff that she did not hear the shooting, but awakened to the knowledge that she could not get up. She said she saw Boyd passing from her room into the dining room adjoining.

Mrs. Jones told officers that her husband had "spoken to Boyd" about his relations with Kitty some time ago and that the men had quarreled. Boyd corroborated this statement in jail last night, the sheriff said. He denied, however, that he had killed Jones.

Strong Action By U. S. In China Urge Of Ministers In War-Torn Territory

(Continued from Page 1)

While late dispatches indicated that the Cantonese military forces had exerted a restraining hand in the city and that the high tension there had relaxed considerably, Washington officials continued to manifest anxiety over the safety of Americans in treaty ports and in the Yangtze river valley.

Although somewhat hopeful that widespread anti-foreign outbreaks had been averted, officials showed that they were relieved greatly by reports that Americans were continuing to pour out of the danger zone to points protected by the friendly guns of allied warships. Renewed warning for Americans to leave the interior have been issued by Minister Macmurray at Peking and various American consuls.

Routing Given Marines

WASHINGTON, Mar. 29 (AP)—The routing to San Diego of the 1,500 Marines ordered to reinforce the American contingent in China was completed today by marine corps headquarters and the plans call for the movement of nine special trains across the continent.

Only two of the trains were ordered to move today, these being from the Quantico marine base. Leaving Quantico early in the afternoon, they will go to New Orleans, then by way of the Gulf Coast lines to Houston and the Santa Fe to San Diego. Two other Quantico trains will leave tomorrow going via New Orleans, then on the Texas and Pacific to El Paso, the Southern Pacific to Los Angeles, and the Santa Fe to San Diego.

Some Through Amarillo

The Paris Island detachment, en route tomorrow will go by way of Memphis, taking the Rock Island there for Amarillo, and thence by the Santa Fe to San Diego. The four trains from Philadelphia will leave about 1 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. The first will follow the Pennsylvania lines to St. Louis, the St. Louis Southwestern to Fort Worth, the Texas and Pacific to El Paso, the Southern Pacific to Los Angeles and the Santa Fe to San Diego, the second will leave via the Baltimore and Ohio to St. Louis, the Burlington to Kansas City, the Missouri Pacific to Pueblo, the Denver, Rio Grande Western to Salt Lake City, the Union Pacific to Los Angeles. The third will go over the Reading to Bethlehem, Pa., the Lehigh Valley to Buffalo, the Nickel Plate to St. Louis, the St. Louis San Francisco to Wichita and the Santa Fe to San Diego. The fourth will follow the route of the third, from Philadelphia to St. Louis and will change there to the Katy to San Antonio, the Southern Pacific to Los Angeles and the Santa Fe to destination.

Six days will be allowed for the trip across the country, the itinerary calling for the arrival of the trains in San Diego by April 5, almost two days after the transport Henderson on which they will sail for China arrives from Corinto, Nicaragua.

Situation Is Easier

WASHINGTON, Mar. 29 (AP)—Moderate leaders among the nationalists in China apparently are in control of the situation at Shanghai today as no reports of renewed anti-foreign agitation were received by the state and

navy departments.

Guns Are Trained

Commercial dispatches reaching the city tell of reported incidents at Hankow, and said Cantonese were placing heavy guns at points along the Yangtze, down which the ships loaded with refugees must pass, and apparently bore out the apprehension manifest here, even though no official advice was received from Admiral C. S. Williams, commander of American naval forces in Chinese waters, or from diplomatic and consular representatives.

The lack, however, of any word from the Admiral was taken as a favorable indication as he promptly has reported any unusual or threatening developments.

Guns Trained On Ships

LONDON, Mar. 29 (AP)—Heavy guns trained American warships by Cantonese on Lion Hill, Nanking, were mentioned in a dispatch in today's Daily Mail from Percival Phillips, its correspondent in Shanghai.

Lion Hill overlooks the Yangtze river where the American vessels have been at anchor with British warships, as well as merchant men of both nationalities. Actual fire on foreign ships from other guns also was described in the dispatch, which said that the river forts between Chinking and the mouth of the Yangtze had been manned and shells sent at all passing foreign craft. A shell set the steamship Woonsoong afire.

Will Not Merge Forces

WASHINGTON, Mar. 29 (AP)—American forces in China will not be merged with the forces of other great powers.

President Coolidge considers the United States has its own commander in the field with an establishment under his direction, so that independence of action on the part of the American military groups can be maintained.

Nevertheless, the president feels that the American forces will cooperate with the troops of other powers, especially since reports have indicated that American refugees are scattered throughout the foreign concessionary area particularly at Shanghai. In case an emergency arises, the president understands that the French concession, in particular, is compact enough to lend itself to the best defense, but the American officers in chief command would have discretion to act upon his independent judgment of what the requirements were.

Peking Doctors Leave

PEKING, Mar. 29 (AP)—Alarmed by the events at Nanking, all the American members of the staff of the Peking Union Medical college have decided to leave for home immediately.

Science Has Host of Remedies For Diseases of Skin

THERE are still persons who believe that every disease of the skin can be successfully treated with a salve, a lotion, or a powder.

This belief and the advertisements of nostrums for the treatment of skin diseases are a reflection of the actual knowledge of such conditions held even by the medical profession, a quarter of a century ago.

Today the methods of treatment of skin diseases include practically every form of apparatus, every method of medical administration known to medical science. This advance is a reflection of the application of knowledge in physics, chemistry, biology and bacteriology to medicine, and of a more thorough comprehension of the fact that the skin is not merely a protective covering of the body but an organ whose condition reflects that of the other tissues and influences them definitely.

Perhaps the greatest advance has been the X-ray and the knowledge that application of its rays would affect not only tumors, whose cause is unknown, but also inflammatory and degenerative diseases of the skin produced by parasitic organisms. Not only the rays of the X-ray tube, but also those of radium, of the sun and of the ultraviolet lamp are known to have definite effects on the skin.

Radium is used for destroying cancer of the skin, masses of the veins, birth marks, moles and similar unsightly excrescences. As Dr. Fred Wise, indicated at a recent meeting of specialists in diseases of the skin, the physician is no longer limited to any single form of treatment, but may attack such growths with any of the destructive rays that have been mentioned; he may freeze them with carbon dioxide snow; he may remove them surgically with the knife; he may dry them by passing an electric current through them, or cut them with a needle whose cutting power depends on vibrations produced by electric waves.

In attacking certain parasitic diseases of the skin, the specialist reaches them through the blood, injecting combinations of dyes and metallic elements or specific drugs which produce the immediate death of the parasitic organisms when they come in contact with them.

There still remain infectious and diseases of the skin which are not easily amenable to treatment. Pemphigus, in which there are tremendous wheals, blisters and similar eruptions, is not known to yield easily to any form of treatment, although it may be benefited on occasion by the use of drugs such as arsenic and quinine.

Generalized changes of the skin resulting from disturbances of the nervous system and of the glands sometimes resist every form of medical attack.

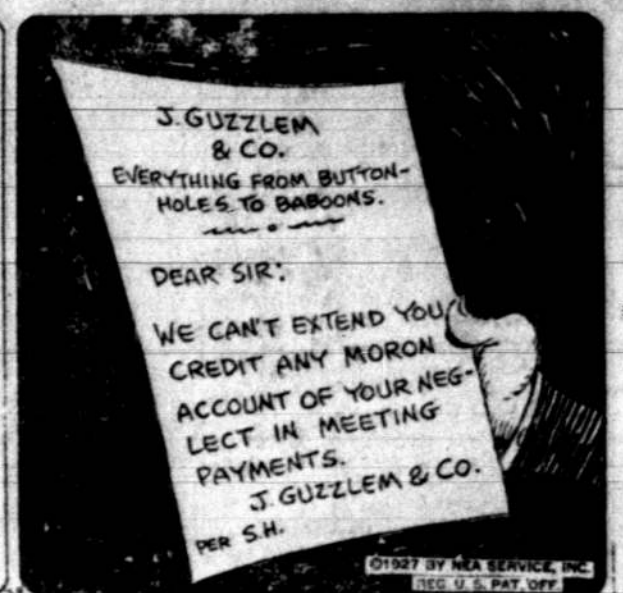

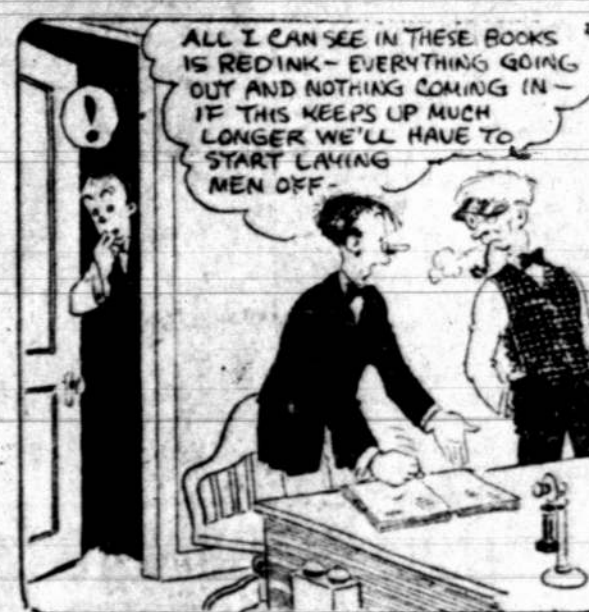

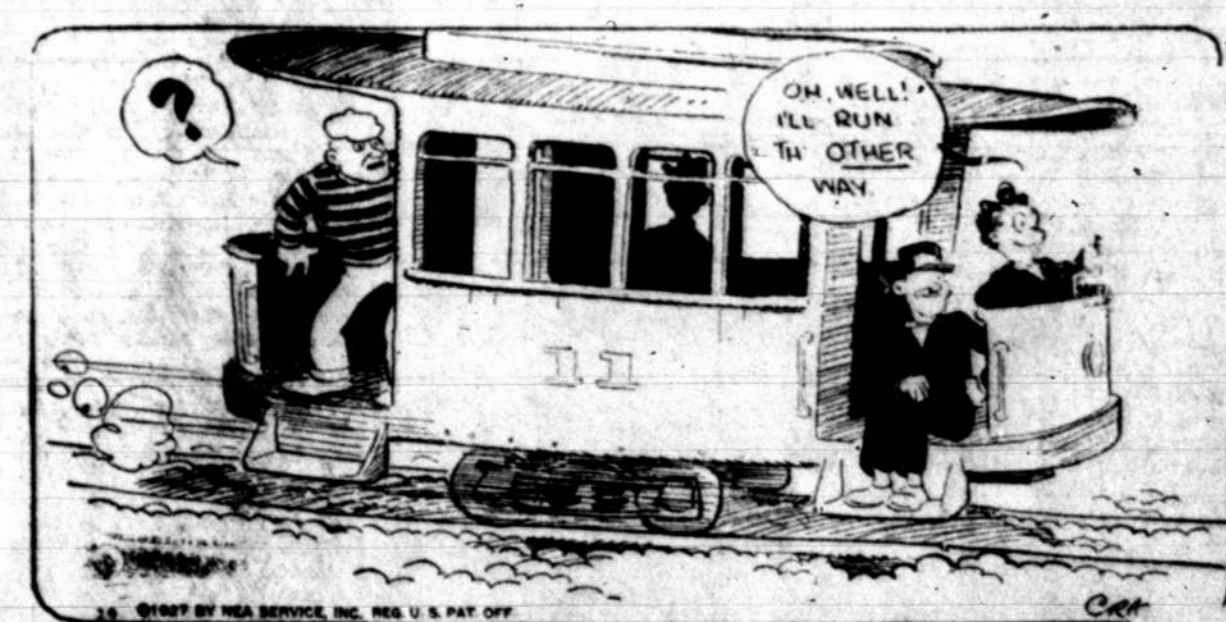

KELLOGG AND GREW HAVE THEIR
OWN FEUD, STATE DEPARTMENT
MALCONTENTS ASSERT

WASHINGTON, March 28.—There
are many wheels within wheels involv-
ed in the bickering and dissatisfaction
among the foreign service personnel
at home and abroad, which have re-
ached a high point with the incident re-
volved of consular officers against social
favoritism in the promotion system.

One of the most interesting bits of
gossip about the State Department
tells of a feud between Secretary of
State Kellogg and Under-Secretary
Joseph C. Grew. When Kellogg is away,
Grew takes charge, but when Kellogg
returns, he has been doggedly
fighting appointment as ambassador to
Turkey or some other post because of
his desire to remain in a position of
authority over all embassies and lega-
tions.

Division in Department
Thus there is an apparent division
among the assistant secretaries, with
Grew and J. Butler Wright playing
the game together. Robert E. Otis, cer-
tainly one of the most capable and
impartial of the "Mexican-fostered"
bolshevik hegemony story, on Kellogg's
team and Wilbur J. Carr, sup-
posedly upholding the cause of his con-
sular service.

But the men of the foreign service
are not as interested in this alleged
fight as they are in their own—
the wrangle over charges that
the higher classes of service are being
filled with men of wealth and high
social ratings.

They indignantly point to various
specific cases of men in "the
circle" who they are certainly
men of wealth and social accomplish-
ment even if they have not actually
been preferred for that reason.

Hugh R. Wilson, new minister to
Bern, who has ranked as a counselor
of the embassy in Class I at \$2900 a
year while serving as chief of the Di-
vision of Current Information, is de-
scribed as a former wealthy Chicago
merchant who has reached the top after
15 years' service at the age of 42.
Wilson is the youngest man of the 23
in his class in point of service and has
always been in the diplomatic branch,
which is preferred by young men of
means and "social background."

Related To The Morgans
William R. Castle, new assistant
secretary of state, is described as of
the Castle Hawaiian sugar family. He
has been chief of the Division of West-
ern European Affairs. Grew, himself,
is related by marriage to the Morgans.

Alexander Kirk, assistant to Grew,
at \$2900, is described as a member of
the Kirk soap family. His son-in-law,
Alan E. Winslow, now en route to
Mexico City as secretary of embassy,
is said to have been promoted at least
three times since the Rogers Act be-
came law in 1924. Winslow entered the
service in 1913 at \$2500 and in a little
more than eight years has worked to a
job that now pays \$7000—an astonish-
ing jump for government work.

Francis White, the new assistant
secretary of state, is described as a
man of means. J. Theodore Mariner, coming

Better Farming Is Fostered In Llano

LLANO, March 29.—The Llano Chamber of Commerce, which recently affiliated with the West Texas Chamber of Commerce with a substantial increase in membership, is sponsoring in accordance with the diversification program advocated by the regional organization of the west, more cows, sows and hogs for the rural population. Their efforts in this direction are meeting with unprecedented success. It is thought that the number of chickens in the Llano region will be increased many times due to the chicken campaign, and indications show that dairying and hog raising will augury to an appreciable degree.

In addition to the cow, sow and hen program sponsored by the Llano Chamber of Commerce, the organization is making an effort to secure a granite crusher and a graphite mill for the section. It is also hoped to obtain location of a cotton or woolen mill there. The freestone water in the Llano soil, an essential in the wool making process, is one factor which may bring a milling concern to the place.

Llano's granite possibilities are undeniable. A fine granite mountain is situated there on both a railroad and river with spur tracks. Graphite deposits of the Llano section cover 25,000 acres, fronting the railroad and river, with ore running from 11 to 25 per cent.

The Llano Chamber of Commerce has a reputation for accomplishing things. Last year they bought and paid for a truck, not taken over by the state. The organization also did work on the Pecan Belt highway, raising \$10,000 to help the county, and succeeded in having it taken over by the state for maintenance. By virtue of effectiveness of their work, the Llano chamber is counting on accomplishing the major plans laid out in their 1927 program.

Olney To Complete Paving In 15 Days

OLNEY, March 29.—According to R. B. Chaskey, representative of the Thurbur Construction company, contractors for the paving contract now under way in Olney, the entire project will be completed in about fifteen days.

Workmen for the above company have been in Olney since January 1 laying additional pavement throughout the city. Approximately forty blocks of brick pavement have been laid to date and several blocks more have been excavated and the concrete poured. Since the first of the year brick pavement has been laid on Third street from Avenue B to Avenue L; on First street from Avenue C to Avenue J; on grand avenue, from Third street to the Gulf, Texas and Western railroad; on Second street from Avenue K to Megard road; on Avenue P from Third street to the Gulf, Texas and Western railroad, and from First street two blocks north. All of the above has been completed and the streets opened up.

Avenue B from Main street four blocks south is now being excavated and the concrete curb and gutters laid. Several other blocks will be excavated within the next few days bringing the total blocks of brick pavement laid since January 1 up to 60. This together with the 40 blocks of pavement that Olney has been enjoying for the past two years will complete a network throughout the entire business district and the principal residential districts.

Farms At Lockney Yield Good Profit

LOCKNEY, March 29.—In the great shallow water belt of the Staked Plains of Texas, the day has passed for the easy going, shiftless farmer. Nearly all of the farmers in this vicinity of the town of Lockney are becoming really professional men. They have developed the science of farming to such an extent that most of them can really term themselves followers of the profession of farming.

Such a man is R. J. McLaughlin who lives 10 miles north of Lockney. After studying prices, supply and demand, and everything that really makes a difference to a farmer he has become what is usually known as a real farmer.

This year McLaughlin has 520 acres of fine wheat and 50 acres laid by for a row crop. This represents the farming end of his program. But he is not satisfied. He wants more than two chances to live. As a result Mr. McLaughlin has hogs, cows and poultry. He says that the pigs from 150 hens practically supplies the grocery bill for his family of four.

HANKINS IS HONORED

AUSTIN, Mar. 29 (AP)—Stanton M. Hankins, of Childress, state adjutant of the American Legion, has been appointed state service officer to handle claims of ex-servicemen of Texas for compensation. The appointment was made under authority of a bill passed at the recent session of the legislature and signed today by the governor, creating the position of state service officer. His duties will be to "aid injured and disabled citizens of this state who served in the world war and their relatives, dependents and dependants to secure from the United States government the compensation, hospitalization, insurance and other aids and benefits to which they are entitled."

Poultry Improvement In Lubbock County Is Remarkable As Agents Continue To Labor To That End

As a direct result of the efforts of David F. Eaton, Lubbock county farm agent and Miss Hazel Hammer, home demonstration agent of the county, together with the south-wide diversification program in cooperation with the university of Texas, production of poultry has become widespread over the South Plains, and especially in this county.

Where three years ago practically no poultry of any kind was found in many farms in this part of the state, there is now hardly a farm in the entire county that does not have from a dozen to several hundred chickens. It is estimated that the number of chickens on the farms of the county will average well over 100, and in the opinion of Mr. Eaton this is a conservative estimate. Many farms now boast from 500 to 400 chickens, and in some instances more, and some farmers are commercializing on chicken production.

Improvement Is Remarkable
The bulk of the flocks are raised, however, purely as a sideline, with no particular attention paid to the flocks, but the tendency toward improvement of strains and pure blood fowls is remarkable, it was said. The rural citizenship apparently has come to a realization of the benefit to be derived from pure blood stock, which costs no more, and in some instances, not as much as a mixed strain to which no attention is paid. Such will naturally divert more attention to the flock for it is human nature to give more attention and care to a well kept and blooded strain than to the ordinary haphazard flock.

On the basis of 2,000 farms in the county, and an average of 100 laying hens to the farm, the egg production in the county over a year's time would be approximately 1,400,000 dozen annually, which at the prevailing price of about 20 cents per dozen would bring into the county about \$280,000 annually from eggs alone. This is based on a production of 100 eggs per hen per year, which is considered very conservative. Many flocks in the county will far surpass this number, but this is accepted as a basis for figures.

Leghorns Predominate

Leghorns (white and brown), Barred Rocks, Plymouth Rocks, Rhode Island Reds and Orpingtons are the predominating strains, with an occasional flock of the heavier breed of chickens, such as Brahmas and others. No definite information as to the number of each breed is available.

While equipment to care for the flocks has been greatly improved during the past year or two on the average farm, there is yet not sufficient care given. In the opinion of Mr. Eaton, the main difficulty at the present, he said, is the tendency to house too many fowls in one shed, adding to the disease hazard. He cited rump as a particular instance. Chickens should be given plenty of room in the sheds, he said.

Feeding is no problem so far as grain is concerned, for plenty of this can be scratched up around the lot, but more attention should be given to a balanced ration, he said. Proteins and similar ingredients can be obtained only in certain feeds, and should be watched closely for maximum production of eggs.

Chicks Distributed

Through the aid of large hatcheries in several parts of the county, baby chicks this year are being distributed to many farms by the hundreds, bringing about the development of many poultry farms over the county, and the problem now, in the opinion of Mr. Eaton, is some uniform standard of raising so that the product may be marketed to the best advantage. When products are dumped on the market under prevailing conditions, it is natural to presume that the price cannot be controlled, it was said, and it now is to the benefit of chicken raisers to work some kind of organized effort toward marketing.

The government report on the poultry industry released recently recites that the outlook this year is very bright, with equal or better prospects than prevailed last year. Many eggs this spring have been shipped into the United States from China and other foreign countries, and while there probably was plenty of this food available in this country, the lack of organized marketing effort did not disclose the product.

There is very little probability that the chicken industry will be overdone in this part of the state, Mr. Eaton said, and it is his ambition to see every farm in the county with a blooded flock of poultry.
