GREAT FAIR EXPANSION IS URGED TOLL IN TORNADO AT ST. LOUIS STEADILY MOUNTS

DEBRIS STREWN CITY GIVES UP BODIES TODAY

THREE OTHERS DIE IN SLIGHT RECURRENCE IN TWO STATES

(By Associated Press)
ST. LOUIS, Sept. 30.—The mounting death list in yesterday's devastating tornado here reached eighty-three today, when additional bodies were found, and injured died. The body of a third girl was found in the ruins of the Central high school, and it was feared two others were buried there.

All but two of the dead were identified.

With eighteen persons reported missing, many injured in a critical condition and portions of the devastated area unsearched for bodies the Post-Dispatch estimated the total dead might reach 140. The number killed in the city's disastrous tornado of 1926.

Estimates of the property damage remained between \$10,000,000 and \$20,000,000.

Hundreds of families, left without a roof, or with sides of their houses laid open by the storm, slept last night in the national guard quarters, and other improvised quarters, and were fed today from the city's 1,500 policemen, and the Post-Dispatch relief forces.

Milliamen On Patrol
Milliamen of the 128th infantry Louisiana national guard regiment patrolled the streets west of the boulevard, directing motorists through a mass of fallen trees, shattered roofing and broken glass.

Lightning Kills
Two In Missouri
POPULAR BLUFF, Mo., Sept. 30.—Two men were killed by lightning and at least a score were injured, several seriously by an electrical storm followed by a tornado in the rural section about eight miles east and south of Popular.

Pupils In School After Row Settled

GARY, Ind., Sept. 30.—The pupils of Emerson high school, who have been on strike this week because of the enrollment of 19 negroes, returned to their classes today, following a ten minute mass meeting at which terms of settlement were explained.

All but three of the negroes were removed to temporary quarters in a junior high school, pending erection of the \$15,000 building provided for in a bill passed to final reading in the city council last night. The three remainings are seniors and have attended Emerson for three years.

The bill providing for the new building will come up for final action today. Gary has several junior high schools for negroes, but no senior high schools.

JUDGE IS SHOT IN COURTROOM

WOMAN EMPTIES PISTOL BUT SHOTS GO LOW AND NOT FATAL

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Sept. 30.—U. S. District Judge Tiltman Johnson, was shot by a woman in the courtroom of the federal building here today. The woman was immediately placed under arrest.

A superficial examination before the judge was removed to a hospital disclosed that he had been shot four times below the waist and in the legs. The woman emptied a six chamber revolver at the judge.

Woman Overpowered
Court attendants grappled with her and she was overpowered. At the jail she gave her name as Mrs. Howard Simmons of this city.

Court attendants said that the woman was recently plaintiff in a \$20,000 damage suit against the Utah Copper company which was decided in the defendant company's favor.

Germany Resents Statement Of Pope

ROME, Sept. 30.—The recent visit of the American Legion party to the Vatican has caused a slight diplomatic incident, Germany and Austria having remonstrated in friendly fashion about passages in the address made by the Pope referring to the contribution by young America in that decisive moment for the future of old Europe and the whole world.

The words were considered by these two countries as rather a pro-Ally demonstration on the part of the pontiff.

It is understood that the incident will have no further developments after frank and cordial explanations given by Cardinal Gasparri, the Pope's secretary, that the Pope had no intention of siding with either group of the former belligerents, but merely meant to allude to historical facts which cannot be denied by either side.

Moscow Takes Joke And Laughs It Off

MOSCOW, Russia, Sept. 30.—Apprized of the fact that the invitation, already accepted by the Soviet presidium, to participate in the celebration of the third centenary of Boston had been sent by a Dorchester lamp lighter and junior, Soviet officials accepted the "joke" in good part. One of them said "Moscow's sense of humor readily join in the worlds chaos being fully alive, its citizens may of laughter."

9 TO 3 DEADLOCK FOR CONVICTION HALTED BY COURT TODAY

GEORGETOWN, Texas, Sept. 30.—Failing to reach a verdict, the jury which tried Mrs. Rebecca Rogers of Austin, 22, former uni- versity student on charges of arson was discharged in district court here today.

The jury stood nine to three for conviction, it was said.

The case went to the jury about 9 a. m. Thursday.

State's Charges
The state charged Mrs. Rogers, then known as Rebecca Bradley, as her secret marriage to Otis Rogers was unannounced, had burned a vacant house in Round Rock as part of a plan to lure officers and employees from the Round Rock bank. The defense pleaded not guilty and attempted to prove Mrs. Rogers was mentally unbalanced.

Mrs. Rogers also is under a charge of having robbed with firearms the bank at Buda, Texas, not far from Round Rock, the next day after the vacant house was burned. Her trial on that charge is to be held in San Marcos.

Hurry Back To Husband
Mrs. Rogers remarked when the jury was discharged: "I must hurry back to San Angelo." She has been working there to be near her husband who has been treated for tuberculosis in a sanatorium. His illness was traced to having left a sick bed at Amarillo to go to her defense when she was arrested and charged with robbery of the bank at Buda.

As the jury came in Rogers was pale and appeared worried. Mrs. Rogers appeared somewhat aloof and rather unconcerned. Rogers seemed disappointed at the result, as he had expressed belief in a verdict of acquittal.

Harry Dolan, prosecutor said "It will be a conviction next time." Indications were that the next trial of the arson case would await disposition of the charges of bank robbery.

End Seen In Mexico And Indian Trouble

NOGALES, Ariz., Sept. 30.—(AP)—The end of a century of warfare which the Yaqui Indians have waged against the Mexican government appeared near today.

It was believed by General Francisco R. Manzo, commander of the military forces in Sonora, Mexico, that with the unconditional surrender of Chief Mori and about 1,000 braves the final chapter of the century of strife probably was written. The Yaqui chief and his warriors surrendered at Ortiz, Sonora.

General Manzo reported that chief Luis Matuz, the recognized head of the tribe, is now in the Sierra de San Juan, the Yaqui mountains, and is negotiating a complete and unconditional surrender.

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Brock And Schlee Hop Off For Home

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 30.—(AP)—William S. Brock and Edward E. Schlee, round the world fliers, left Mills field here for the coasting house apparently a suicide by inhaling gas. On a table near his bed were a novel, "Death of a Young Man," and an unfinished essay of his own on "What Is Death?"

He left no note. The manager of the rooming house said little was known of him. He had registered there two months ago as "John Franklin" by papers found in the room revealed his true name.

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Student Burned In Class Row Has Chance For Life

(By Associated Press)
TIPTON, Okla., Sept. 30.—Burned seriously last night in a high school class fight, Arthur Jamerson, 17, president of the junior class was declared today to have a chance to recover.

He was burned when he sought to tear down an effigy, which had been saturated with gasoline, on the campus here.

The freshmen had erected the effigy and were losing in their fight to defend it. Some one threw a match at the effigy and flames enveloped Jamerson.

Half of Body Burned
About half of his body was burned badly, as he inhaled only a little of the flames, he has a fighting chance for recovery, physicians said. It was feared that much of the skin on his body would have to be grafted.

Investigation by school authorities exonerated all boys participating in the fight. C. A. Jamerson, father of the boy and prominent merchant, said he did not blame the boys, declaring he believed his son's burn to be accidental.

MINE WORKERS
ARE ENJOINED

(By Associated Press)
PITTSBURGH, Pa., Sept. 30.—A preliminary injunction, restraining the United Mine Workers from attempting to retain striking miners' houses owned by the Pittsburgh Terminal Coal corporation, was granted in an opinion filed in federal court here today by Judge F. P. Schoonmaker.

The corporation had sought a sweeping injunction against the union, alleging that it was interfering in any way with operation of the company's non-union mines, and asking for \$1,500,000 damages. The preliminary injunction, however, contained only the eviction phase of the suit, which was based by the corporation on the allegation that the union had violated provisions of the Clayton and Sherman acts by interfering with interstate shipment of coal.

Quarrel Over Show
Fatal To Husband

PITTSBURGH, Sept. 30.—(AP)—A quarrel over whether he would take his wife to the "movies" resulted fatally today for Alphonse Bove, 38, who died from a bullet wound below the heart. Mrs. Bove, who was arrested, told police she obtained a pistol during the quarrel last night and that it was discharged when her husband attempted to take it away from her. Two small children were made fatherless by the shooting.

EVIDENCE IN ENID POISON
CASE IS HELD INSUFFICIENT;
ACCUSED NURSE RELEASED

(By Associated Press)
ENID, Okla., Sept. 30.—Mary Atkinson, 26 year old trained nurse, today was released, from charges of poisoning Mary Jane Bailey, 18 year old daughter of an Episcopal minister with whom she was infatuated.

David Fugelson, justice of the peace, who presided over the nurse's preliminary hearing Wednesday and yesterday, ruled that evidence was insufficient to hold the nurse for trial in district court. Miss Atkinson was brought from the jail where she had been confined for about three weeks, to the office of Dan Mitchell, county attorney, where she was held for her brother, Harry Atkinson, sheet metal worker of Pawhuska, Okla., and H. G. McKeever, of her counsel and there was informed that she would not be held for trial. Miss Atkinson smiled. She thanked the justice and departed with her brother and McKeever. Her brother said he would take his sister home and that she would live there with him until she could find employment.

The Rev. Charles Bailey, father of the dead girl, said he would prepare a statement and issue it this afternoon. He declined to comment at this time.

Miss Atkinson was arrested immediately after the death of Miss Bailey, when physicians reported to the county attorney that symptoms of Miss Bailey's fatal illness were such as are produced by poisoning. Later a poison was found in her room as were love letters which she had written to Mr. Bailey. Letters written by the rector to the nurse also were taken and placed in the hands of the county attorney.

CHALLENGE IN DUEL REFUSED

(By Associated Press)
MEXICO CITY, Sept. 30.—Declining the challenge to a duel hurled at him by General Rodolfo Herrera, former Foreign Minister, Caudillo Aguilar invites Herrera to make good his threat to give him a thrashing.

In a statement published today, Senor Aguilar declares that General Herrera is disqualified under the code of honor and furthermore was dismissed from the army by former President Obregon because he was "unworthy to belong to that institution."

Charged as Slayer
The duel challenge followed charges by Senor Aguilar that General Herrera assassinated President Venustiano Carranza in 1920 while the latter was fleeing the country and that the crime was ordered by General Obregon, who later became president. Herrera maintains that Carranza, seeing his escape cut off, took his own life.

Senor Aguilar in today's statement invites General Obregon personally to answer the charge that he (Obregon) ordered Carranza's death at the hands of General Herrera, who maintained the troops which pursued and overtook the fleeing president.

Before General Herrera's threat that if Aguilar declined to meet him on the field of honor he would thrash him, the former foreign minister says: "I am prepared to defend myself."

HOLLYWOOD, Calif., Sept. 30—Watch for more rumors of John Gilbert and Greta Garbo being engaged—and also more denials.
Movie fans became quite excited over the prospective marriage of the two screen stars last winter about the time "Flesh and the Devil" was released. But in time the whole affair blew over. Maybe it was a publicity stunt to put the picture over—perhaps it wasn't.
But nevertheless, it will not be at all surprising if the same reports are broadcast from the Hollywood village once more. "Love," the second Gilbert-Garbo film, has just been completed. As on Leo Tolstoy's "Anna Karenina," features the same sort of passionate love scenes that were responsible for the stories some months ago.
It is well known that "Flesh and the Devil" was one of the biggest money makers on the Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer 1926 program. And the engagement stories had not a little to do with its success. Two More Games to Play
The captain of the home run in-
dustry has two more games to play
against Washington and is confident
he will get his sixtieth homer
before the curtain is rung down on
the American League season.

EXHIBITORS ARE GUESTS OF OFFICIALS AT BANQUET HERE

That the 1927 Panhandle and South Plains exposition's livestock exhibit is the greatest of its kind ever held on the South Plains was the consensus of opinion expressed at the livestock exhibitors' lunch held at Hotel Lubbock last night when the exhibitors were guests of the superintendents.

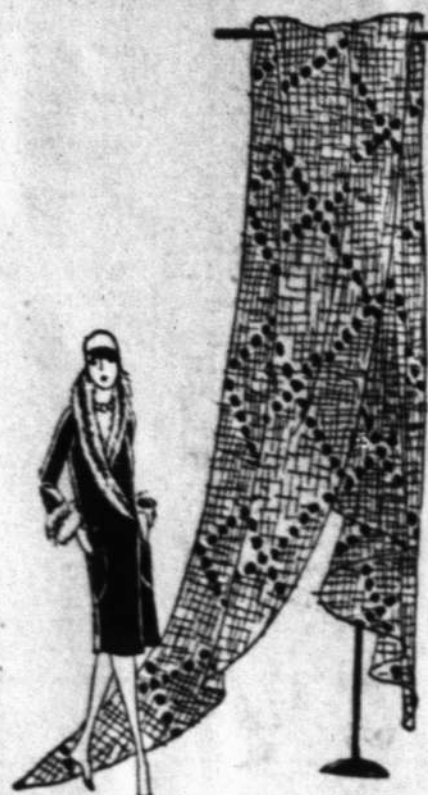
Taft Wins Jerseys

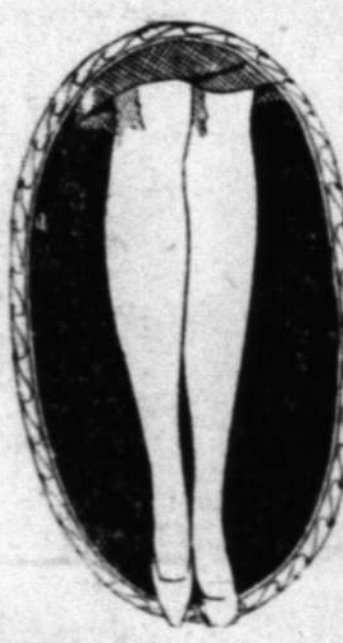

DOTY, ACCUSED OF DESERTION GIVEN PARDON

MUST REJOIN FOREIGN LEGION AND SERVE OUT ENLISTMENT

(By Associated Press)

PARIS, Sept. 30.—President Doumergue today signed a pardon for Bennett J. Doty, American, who had served part of an eight year prison term for desertion from the French foreign Legion while on active service in Syria last year.

Doty, whose home was in Memphis, Tenn., will be under military orders to rejoin the First regiment of the foreign Legion at Sidi-Bel-Abbes, Algeria. He has forty nine months yet to serve of his original five year enlistment under the name "Gilbert Clare."

It is understood that he left the prison this morning enroute to Marseilles whence he will leave on the first available transport for Algeria to begin serving the remainder of his enlistment.

The war ministry, it is reported, felt that while a pardon could be allowed under the circumstances any release from his enlistment oath would tend to have a bad effect on discipline and that he must fulfill his contract.

complete his enlistment of five years in the Legion even though the French government has pardoned him after serving part of an eight year prison sentence for desertion.

Discipline demands the completion of the enlistment contract, the French war department feels, and Doty must go back to the ranks for four years and one month—the period of enlistment still uncompleted.

Doty, whose pardon was formally signed by President Doumergue this morning, will be under orders to rejoin the First regiment of the foreign Legion now at Sidi-Bel-Abbes, Algeria, far from the Syrian desert where he had been serving in the campaign against the Druses when he made off for Palestine overcome by "homesickness."

It is understood that Doty left prison this morning enroute to Marseilles from which port he will leave on the first available transport for Algeria.

Doty himself has expressed in the past perfect satisfaction with the thought of getting back in the open again whether it means service in Morocco or Algeria. "Get me out of here," he once said while in Albertville prison during his fifteen months imprisonment. "I don't care where I go, but get me away from behind these walls."

A. & M. COWS TO BE ON EXHIBIT AT DAIRY SHOW

16 HEAD, BEST IN HERD GO TO MEMPHIS IN TEXAS DISPLAY

(By Associated Press)
COLLEGE STATION, Sept. 29.—Eight Holstein, seven Jersey and three Guernsey cows from the Agricultural and Mechanical College here are headed in the general direction of the National Dairy Show at Memphis, Tenn., October 15-22.

The cows, whose blood is the bluest of the College dairy herd, even now are honored by being taken to the Texas-Oklahoma Fair at Wichita Falls, October 1 to 8, after being exhibited at the West Texas Fair at Abilene. From Wichita Falls the herd is to be sent to the State Fair at Dallas where all dairy animals which win first places are to be sent to Memphis as a part of the all-Southern dairy exhibit.

Many Unique Features
In this connection the College has been advised that the Texas exhibit at Memphis will be extensive and marked by unique features. It will portray the livestock industry in this state with illustrations of the present and predictions of the future of the dairy business. It is intended to show also the principal feedstuffs produced in Texas with stereoscopic slides of grazing crops available for cattle the year round. Seventy-two of these views, one third each for East and West Texas, will be shown.

Another feature of the state exhibit is to be a large map of the state made of Texas feed crops. Three mounted heads of cattle are to be shown on the map. From a Longhorn through a mechanical contrivance, will issue a brief sketch of pioneer days when the range was covered with a now almost extinct breed, from the head of a white-faced Hereford will be recounted the period of improved beef cattle and from the mouth of a champion Jersey cow, which won many state national ribbons for the A. and M. herd in the past, will come discourse on the period of improved dairy herd.

Special Train Planned
The Texas display promises to be one of the outstanding exhibits at the national show. Plans have been made to run a special train from Dallas to Memphis at a special rate for the round trip, leaving October 17 and returning October 20.

A. L. Darnell, dairy husbandry department of the college, is chairman of the committee of nine in charge of arrangements for the exhibit, and also chairman of the committee which has arranged for the special train.

Churches Join In Foreign Mission Work, Brown Says

(By The Associated Press)
LAUSANNE, Switzerland, Sept. 29.—Replying to the advice that has been frequently hurled at the missionaries attending the World Conference on Faith and Order to join hands in the foreign mission fields, Doctor Arthur Judson Brown of New York General Secretary of the Presbyterian Board of Foreign Missions, told The Associated Press that the missionaries have gone further toward union than the churches at home.

Doctor Brown, who has had 32 years experience as an administrator of foreign missions, prefaced his remarks with the statement that, contrary to the general impression, a majority of the missionaries have not left (Public) China. His board, he said, has nearly 100 missionaries in 23 stations in China. The latest reports showed that all but about half a dozen were occupied by missionaries. In these the work is being carried on by Chinese Christians.

"Churches of several denominations," Dr. Brown said, "have already organically united in India, China, Korea, Japan and other Far Eastern countries."

"Missionary work in the non-Christian world is hampered by sectarian divisions of Christendom. The missionaries and the mission boards have done their best to overcome this obstacle. In this effort they have gone farther toward union than the home churches have gone."

"While the churches at home are considering whether union is practicable the missionaries on the field are actually consummating it. Many Christian leaders at home appear to be ignorant of the extent to which union has already been reached in the mission field."

"In the United States the denominations of the Reformed and Presbyterian churches are still separated but on the mission field where-

ever they touch, organic union has already been accomplished.

"Union of the churches is absolutely necessary. A divided church can never save the world because Christians cannot bring the Gospel to bear with the necessary effectiveness."

Dr. Brown said that there the United States census lists 212 religious bodies in this country.

CAN'T DODGE BAD LUCK

San Saba Product Not Good Fertilizer

COLLEGE STATION, Sept. 29.—No value as a commercial fertilizer—this sums up the conclusions of an investigation made by the chief of the division of chemistry, Dr. G. S. Fraps, of the fertilizing value of a mineral deposit at San Saba, Texas. This investigation was made at the request of the parties interested. Some rocks were found to contain nitrates and potash salts but they were merely local deposits, not large enough to be of importance. The analysis of a sample from two hundred tons of the rock

showed it to contain only one-half percent available phosphoric acid, 2.3 pounds nitrogen, and 7.4 pounds potash to the ton. Another lot of several tons, supposed to be from better material, contained only 0.7 pounds available phosphoric acid, 5.2 pounds of nitrogen and 11.6 pounds of potash to the ton. The material is chiefly limestone rock.
