Horns Get Seventh Win In Steers' Muddy Corral

It was a cold, rainy, muddy and terrible night for football as the Longhorns traveled to Farwell Friday to engage in a district 3-A football contest.

The rain started long before the game began and continued to fall as both teams retired from the field following the end of the last quarter. The field was so wet, that the players looked like mud pies someone had left in their original mud pot.

The only dry place in the area was the dressing room and one player said it had leaks. But with all this going against the Longhorns, they managed to win their third straight district game and boost their season record to a great 7 wins and no losses.

It was a night of fumbles as both teams had trouble hanging onto the football due to the weather conditions. The Steers

seemed to like this better for a while as they picked up their first and only score of the evening early in the second quarter when they drove down to the Hart 4 yard line. Roy Morton carried it across on the next play to give Farwell the lead with 11:45 seconds left in the half. The extra point attempt failed.

Hart then took possession of the ball and drove down to the Farwell 29 when all-stater Stanley Dyer broke several tackles and romped 29 yards up the middle to put Hart on the scoreboard. Hart's extra point attempt also failed and the score with 6:33 was Farwell 6, Hart 6.

Both teams traded the ball back and forth on fumbles, but Hart decided to try to hold on. Again, Jimmy Brown took a hand off from Rambo and had a clear path to the goal when the ball

Plane Missing

A white single-engine plane with green lettering is missing somewhere in the area between Cortez, Colo., and Salt Lake City, Utah with four men aboard.

Three of the men are residents of Hart and the fourth man, a resident of Dimmitt.

Those aboard the missing plane are C. C. Hanes, J. C. Jackson and Mark Booe, all elders of the local Church of Christ. Harold McCullum, minister of the Church, is the pilot and owner of the plane.

The four men left Dimmitt Tuesday evening about 6 o'clock flying to Cortez, Colo., where they spent the night.

They departed at 10 a. m. Wednesday from Cortez to Salt Lake City, Utah, where they were scheduled to refuel.

The men had planned to be in the state of Washington by Wednesday night to attend worship services at one of the local churches. They were to fly on to Burnaby, Canada where they were to attend lectureships over the weekend and observe the progress of the church in Burnaby. The local church is helping in the support of the minister there, Alan Jacobs. Jacobs was in Hart this past summer after serving as a missionary overseas.

Assisting the Civil Air Patrol in the search for the men are a number of men from Hart.

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DIMMIT

16 Ways To Encourage Your Child To Use Drugs

1. Never eat together as a family.
2. Never have family traditions which occur weekly, monthly or annually that children can look forward to.
3. Never listen to your children - talk at them but not with them.
4. Never let your children experience cold, fatigue, adventure, injury, risk, challenge, experimentation, failure, frustration, discouragement, etc.
5. Teach them to "do as I say - not as I do."
6. Leave the responsibility of spiritual training and development to the schools and church, but don't teach them at home.
7. When confronted with the choice of whether spending your time or money on a material pursuit or on a family activity, always choose the material object.
8. Expect your child to achieve, to win, but don't teach him the principles of life, of living. Let him learn them on his own.
9. Take a "pick-up-pill" in the morning followed by a "relaxant" at night.
10. Never correct your children appropriately, but uphold them before the law, school, church and friends as "not my little boy."
11. Undermine the role of the father in the home - never have the father's influence in the home - stay together for the sake of the children - or better yet, get a divorce.
12. Keep your home atmosphere in a state of chaos.
13. Always pick up after him - never let him take any responsibility.
14. Always solve his problems - make his decisions.
15. Be too busy with business, civic or social life to spend time with your children. Or, if you do happen to have time, spend it together, watching television.
16. Don't teach them while they're young. Wait until they are old enough to learn and decide right or wrong for themselves.

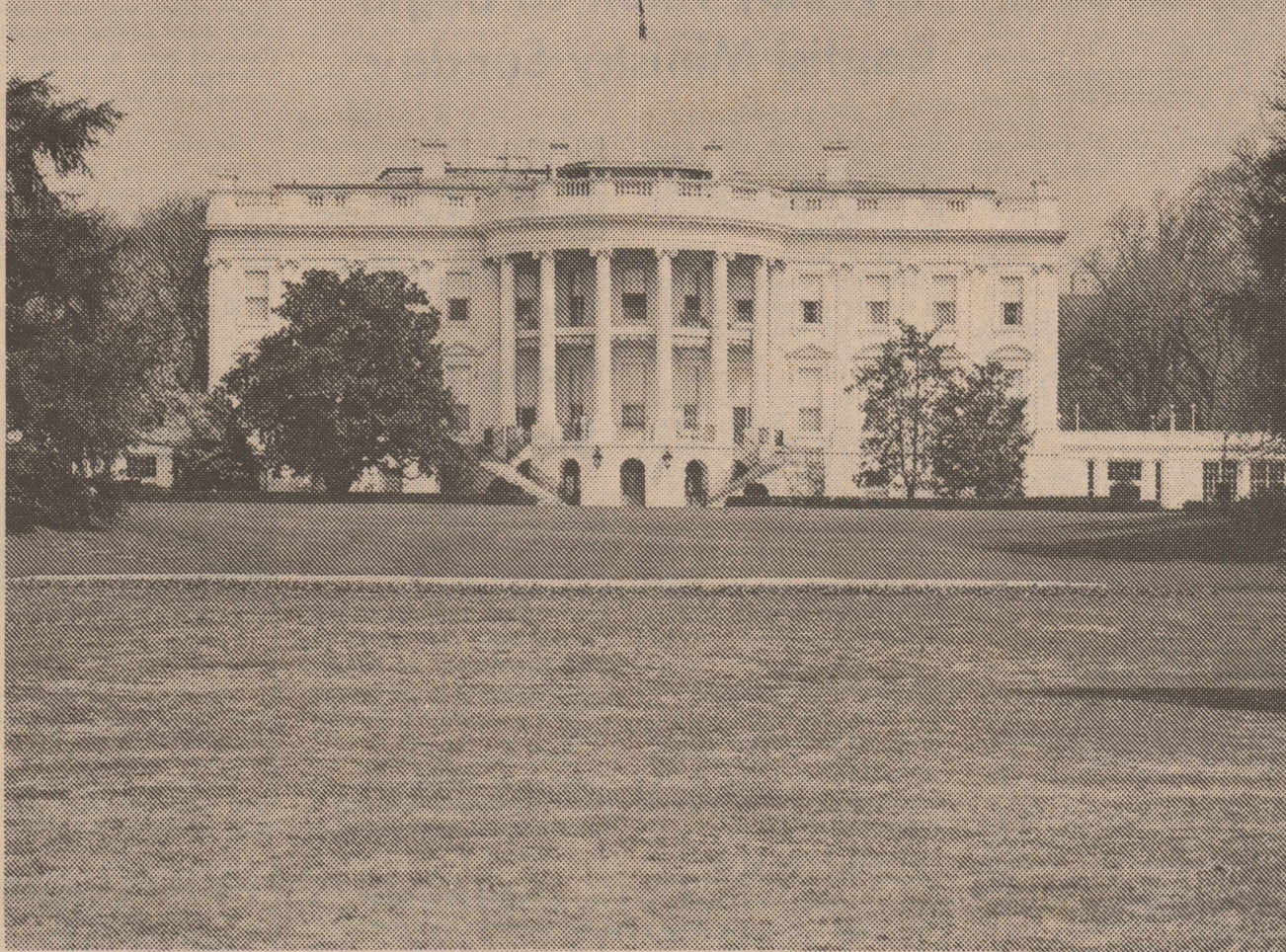
