Lazbuddie had an almost perfect season going undefeated and untied until bi-district.



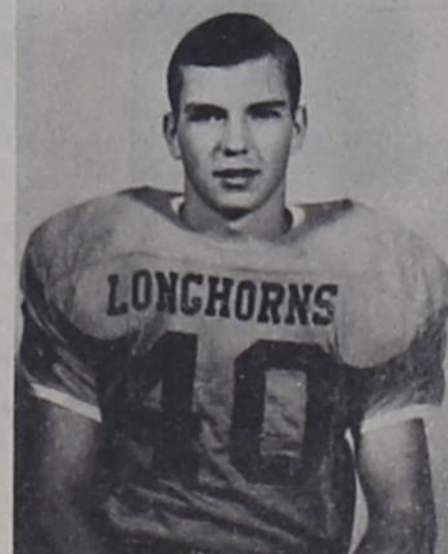

## Joyous Message of Christ Lives Anew

"And it came to pass, as the angels were gone away from them into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, let us now go even unto Bethlehem, and see this thing which is come to pass, which the Lord hath made known to us. And they came with haste, and found Mary, and Joseph, and the Babe lying in a manger." -- Luke 2:15-16.

Thus, in the New Testament, Luke tells the story of humble shepherds watching in the fields -- shepherds to whom the herald angels brought "good tidings of great joy," that they might seek and find the Infant Saviour. In still another Biblical account of the Nativity, Matthew writes of the Wise Men, who followed a Star to Bethlehem.

"And when they were come into the house, they saw the young Child with Mary His Mother, and fell down, and worshipped Him, and . . . they presented unto him gifts, gold, and frankincense, and myrrh." -- Matthew 2:11

At Christmas, as Christians everywhere celebrate the birth of Christ in church and home devotions, the story of the Nativity is told and retold -- but it never grows old. Always, the well-remembered words of two of his disciples, Matthew and Luke, seem to resound with renewed meaning and inspiration, bring to all some measure of that awe and wonder experienced by the shepherds and the wise men, long ago.

And now, as then, the supreme, the all-absorbing moment in the sacred story is that moment at the manger when first "they saw the young Child with Mary His mother."

### St. Francis Planned for First Creche

In the miracle of the manger, in the Madonna and Child, mankind sees an ever-present reminder of the love of God, the glory and promise of Christmas. Each year, as Christians return in heart and spirit to Bethlehem and the manger, the joyous message lives anew. In cities, churches and homes, manger scenes symbolize once again the birth of a holy Child.

The treasured tradition of re-creating the manger has a long and notable history. The first creche or crib, scholars say, was erected by St. Francis of Assisi and his brethren, in the tiny Italian village of Greccio in 1223.

As the people of the town gathered about the manger, the first Christmas carols were sung -- joyous songs in honor of the Saviour's birth. St. Francis felt that, through the manger scene and the cheery Christmas song, even the humblest member of the congregation could participate more fully in the observance of Christmas.

### Re-Creating the Nativity in Art, Song

Through the years, the meaning of the manger has been enriched by hundreds of thousands of reverent re-creations.

Both craftsmen and artists have been inspired by the manger, and have shared their inspiration with many. The Madonna and Child appear again and again in countless famous paintings, and the Christmas creche in miniature, created by the loving hands of skillful craftsmen, is a precious tradition in many lands, in many homes.

In song, too, "the young Child with Mary His mother" lives anew. Gathering around the manger scene, glad voices joyfully carol, "Silent Night, Holy Night! All is calm, all is bright, 'round yon Virgin Mother and Child. . ."

# Christmas Is Always

The chest of drawers, on which some of the gifts and a Christmas tree stand are displayed was finished by children in the class.

Santa comes only once a year for most youngsters, but to the youngsters in the Special Education class of Farwell Elementary School, the old fellow makes his rounds almost every day. At one time, many of the children who are now members of this class found school a gigantic monster, impossible to defeat. In Special Education, they find great comfort in being able to work on individual levels and at their own rates of speed. It's a gift that is priceless for it replaces failure with success and defeat with pride and confidence. It is a delight to see children in the program share their work with visitors. The pride they demonstrate when they say, "This is mine," can only be understood by those who have shared the stories of their problems and struggles.

This is the second year of operation for the class in Farwell school. The program began under supervision of Mrs. Kathyleen Walsler. Present teacher is Mrs. James (Nell) Craig.

Mrs. Craig says, "The program is many times misunderstood by those who are not involved in it. It is not a remedial program, but a separate track program that follows its own curriculum through seven levels rather than through the 12 traditional grades. A child may stay in one level as long as his needs require that he do so. Some levels may be completed in a year. Others may take two years or more."

Activities in the curriculum range from sensorimotor training, habit training and language development in Level I to productive employment in Level

VII. In all levels the curriculums divided into three distinct areas: Personal and Social Competencies, Physical Competencies, and Vocational Proficiencies. In the present classroom structure in the local school, students range in age from six to 16 years and are assigned to Levels I, II, III, IV and V. Most of the students are in Levels II and III. A pupil is assigned to Level II when he has attained a mental age of five years and has maturity and behavior control to profit from group directions. He is ready for Level III when his mental age is approaching six and one-half years. By this time he should have attained a readiness for more structured learning.

In higher levels the student has the opportunity to sample a great variety of tasks. Experiences are planned to give the student an opportunity to sample possible vocations. Dependability, work tolerance and good re-

lationships with others are stressed. While the present facilities do not provide for students in the higher two levels, it is hoped that by time the majority of these students are ready for that work, the school will be ready to accommodate them. In those levels the student is trained on the job and is finally offered a diploma from his high school. Only his transcript bears a description of the type program he followed. The Special Education program is not a watered-down version of the regular classroom. Nor is it a course in handicraft. Time was when teachers of Special Education took the "Arts and Crafts" approach to curriculum. These are included as opportunities for vocational exploration and leisure time activities, but the tool subjects... reading, writing and arithmetic are the core of the program. Most important is learning to get along in a social environment.

Mrs. Craig finds no one meth-

od of teaching to which every child will respond. She uses many of the Montessori techniques that include numerous kinesthetic experiences. All of the senses are appealed to, A child learns through touching, hearing, smelling and tasting.

Many times a combination of these will produce a learning experience that has not been accomplished before.

She teaches writing and spelling as one unit. Most of the children respond best to tracing letters and words, both with their fingers and with a pencil or special marker that the youngsters use to trace on acetate sheets which are prepared for this particular purpose. Mrs. Craig teaches cursive writing only since she feels that the children need to learn only one form of writing. She states that reversals (for example writing b for d) are not

as much of a problem and cursive writing with its rhythm and flow has therapeutic value.

There is no word and space confusion because cursive words are wholes.

The question most often asked Mrs. Craig is, "How do you manage to keep everyone busy

at one time?" she admits that it is a problem that doesn't have an easy answer. "Captain Kangaroo teaches the younger ones in the early morning hours

and gives her a fine opportunity to work with the older ones. That has become standard procedure. He does all of the things we are taught to do and in such delightful ways," she says. The young children like to watch Romper Room, and Mrs. Craig has some time to work with the middle group uninterrupted. At other times of the day, the older pupils go to Physical Education classes and Home Economics in high school and junior high school. The special contact with boys and girls of their ages is quite important. But Mrs. Craig must give the older boys and girls the credit that is due them... they have learned to be teachers too and take a lot of the responsibility of the younger ones.

When asked if the work is depressing, Mrs. Craig answered, "Only when I set goals too high. The victories are further apart than in regular classroom work but they are real victories when they come." She says, "When I lose my cool I regain it pretty quickly when one tiny charge looks up and says, 'I kinda love you!'"

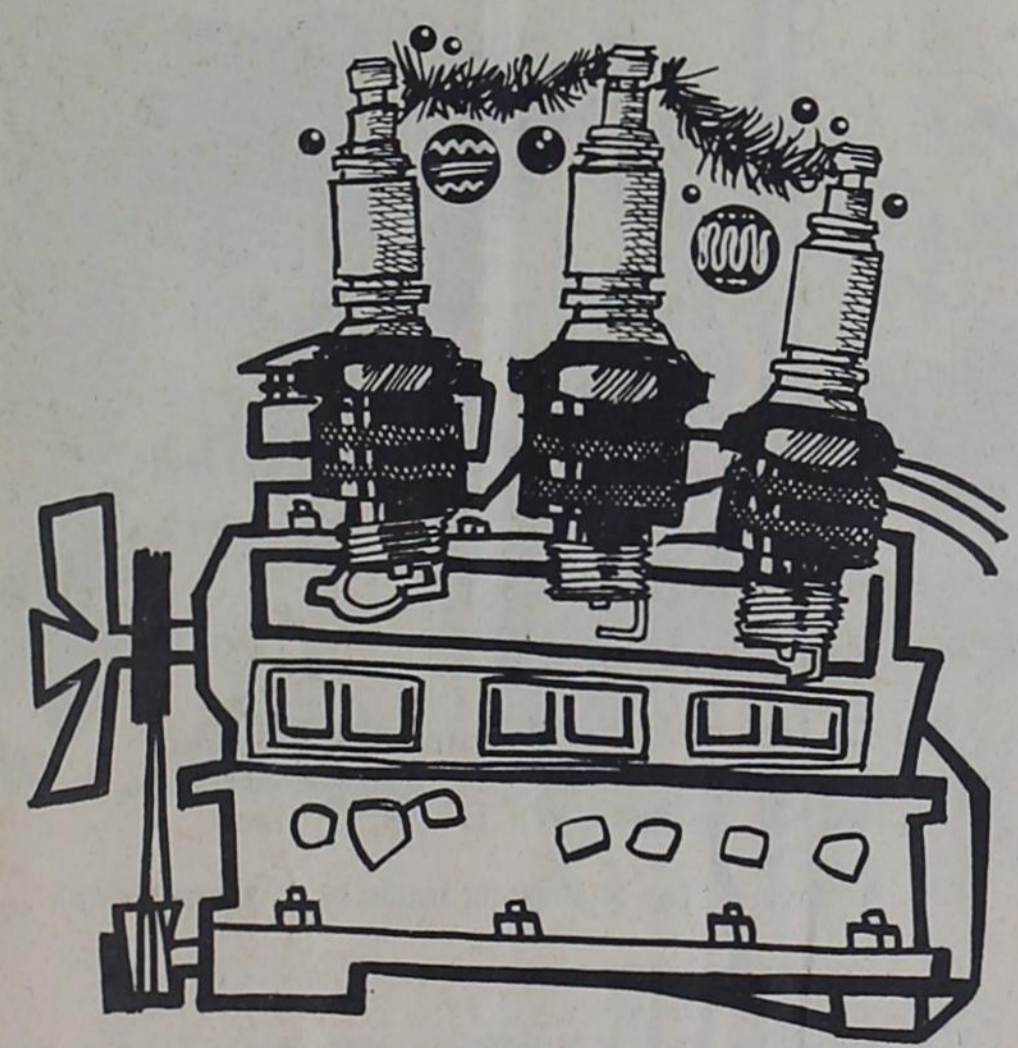

# Portraying Area Homemakers

Mrs. M. T. (Nina) Glasscock has called many states home, but her favorite home of all is the Twin Cities where she has been a resident for many years. She was born in Oklahoma City but lived in several states before settling in Kansas at the age of 11 years. She made her home near Wichita at a town called Augusta, until 1930 when she went to Muleshoe to visit relatives. It was here that she met a tall cowboy who was to change her entire life.

In March 1931, she was married to the cowboy, Mose Glasscock, who was at that time farming in the vicinity. However the next year they moved to the old VVN Ranch headquarters, and took over management of the ranch. It was here that Nina pursued her hobby of cooking, for on occasion she was required to cook for 18-20 cowboys. When they were branding or otherwise engaged in ranch work which took them away from headquarters, Nina cooked and took their meals to them. She tells how many times she cooked at least four large pans of biscuits three times a day for the cowboys.

She also enjoyed riding the range and many days found her astride a horse checking the fenceline or looking for strays, along with the cowboys. "Those were happy times for when the day's work was done, games were played and contentment reigned supreme," she said. The late comedian Will Rogers visited at the ranch and often ate with the cowboys around the chuck wagon as did G. D. Anderson, local banker, and the late Dr. H. T. Miller.

In 1937 the Glasscocks moved to a farm north of Texico-Farwell where they made their home until 1941 when they bought a farm some one and one-half miles south of Farwell. They moved to their present home at 100 Ave G in 1962.

During her years on the farm, Nina spent much time churning and molding butter to deliver to customers in the Twin Cities, and also in dressing fryers and turkeys for the same customers, who came to depend on her for much of their fresh produce. During those years she was also employed at Hills Mer-

cantile in Texico and as chief clerk for the Farmer County Rationing Board during World War II.

A brother, James Bruce, made his home with the Glasscocks for a number of years and was one of the boys who was at Pearl Harbor on that fateful day in 1941. He now makes his home in Fountain, Colo., where his wife, Ardith, has become known as the "World's Champion Barrel-Racing Cowgirl."

In 1945 Nina began her years of employment at Security State Bank, where she was associated with G. D. Anderson, a former visitor to the ranch, for the next 22 years, retiring in 1967.

She and husband, Mose, are members of the local Methodist Church and Nina is active in Women's Society of Christian Service. She is also a member of Farwell Study Club, joining in 1936.

## Offer Art Classes

Beginning on Jan. 7, Lee Simpson of Amarillo will be teaching art classes in Farwell. Anyone interested in taking the classes is asked to call Mrs. Mark Liethen. The classes will be offered on Tuesday nights and Wednesday afternoons of each week.

A small amount of hot mixture with egg yolks, then combine all of hot mixture with egg yolk mixture. Return to stove and continue cooking until thick (approximately two minutes). Remove from heat and add butter, lemon peel, lemon juice, and mix well. Cover and let cool; fold in cream and pour into favorite baked pie shell. Cover with meringue and return to oven for 12-15 minutes or until top of meringue is light golden brown.

**QUICK FRUIT COBBLER**  
1 cup flour  
1 cup sugar  
1 cup sweet milk  
2 tablespoons baking powder  
Mix ingredients and pour over fruit in oblong casserole. Drop 6 to 8 tablespoons butter on top of dough mixture and place cobbler in oven. Bake at 375 degrees for 20-30 minutes or until light golden brown. Remove and serve warm. Any kind of fruit can be used in this recipe and Nina tells how when she was living on the ranch, it was made many times from "sandhill plums."

**MERINGUE**  
Beat egg whites with 1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar and 1/2 teaspoon vanilla to soft peaks; add 6 tablespoons sugar and continue beating until egg whites stand in stiff peaks. Spread over filling.

All of the recipes loaned to us by Nina are delicious and we can testify to the tastiness of the cookies (much more like candy) since she presented us with a generous portion. Thank you Nina!

### MAGIC COOKIE BAR

- 1 stick oleo or butter
  - 1 1/2 cups Graham cracker crumbs
  - 1 cup chopped nuts
  - 1 cup (6 oz.) chocolate bits
  - 1 1/3 cup (3 1/2 oz.) Angel Flake coconut
  - 1 1/3 cup (15 oz. can) Eagle Brand milk
- Melt butter in 9"x13" pan and add other ingredients in layers beginning with crumbs, nuts, chocolate bits, coconut; and over the top pour the Eagle Brand milk. Place in oven and bake 20-25 minutes at 350 degrees.

### SOUR CREAM LEMON PIE

- 1 cup sugar
  - 5 tablespoons cornstarch
  - dash salt
  - 1 cup milk
  - 3 egg yolks, slightly beaten
  - 4 tablespoons butter
  - 1 teaspoon shredded lemon peel

# Aloha From The 50th State

(Ed Note: This Christmas greeting comes from Janell Hudnall in Hawaii telling something about the country, her work and the people. She is a daughter of Rev. and Mrs. Harvey Hudnall of Texas.)

Box 142 Pahala, Hawaii  
Leaving the snow-capped mountains of Colorado and the beautiful lakes and streams of northern New Mexico, I arrived on the island of Hawaii on August 23 of this year to begin another year of teaching.

Hawaii is the youngest isle in the island chain. Geographically it is the southernmost land area in the United States. Hilo, the capital of the island, is located 216 air miles from Honolulu, island of Oahu.

Hawaii is often referred to as the Orchid Island, Big Island, or Volcano Island. It can justify all three names as it has become the center of orchid culture in the United States, exporting flowers all over the world. Also, while it is second in population in the state, its

land area is greater than all the other islands put together.

In historic interest, much is available. Here was the birthplace of King Kamehameha the Great, the unifier of the islands. Hawaii was also the scene of Captain Cook's tragic death. It was also the first landing place of the missionaries who brought Christianity and American traditions to the Hawaiian Archipelago.

Climate and terrain on Hawaii reach opposite extremes within a short distance. A short travel can bring one from tropical beaches through rain forests and fern groves, past lava fields to snow-covered mountains.

Our town of Pahala is a small community of approximately 2,000 people. Pahala, along with the town of Naalehu, make up the major populated areas in the district of Kau. Pahala is located 52 miles from Hilo. An 86-mile drive will take us to Kailua, Kona, a major tourist destination. The world famous Mauna Kea Beach Hotel is also

located only a short distance away.

The climate in Kau is mild, but haoles coming from the mainland should not be deceived. Blankets and sweaters are necessary. We are now in the rainy season, thus the weather is quite cool. Periodically the sun does appear and the temperature rises to 85 degrees.

The primary industry in Kau is the production of sugar. Other less important industries are cattle, macadamia nuts, and the satellite tracking station at South Point, a greensand beach.

The possibilities for recreation in the Kau area are limited only by the imagination of the individual. Swimming is available at Panaluu, a black sand beach; Hapuna Beach, or at our school swimming pool. Excellent off-shore and small boat fishing grounds are plentiful. Big game fishing is also available at Kona. Wild pig hunting in the mountains is a favorite sport among the men.

A short 25-minute drive away lies the Hawaii Volcanoes National Park. Here one can see

the only active volcanoes in existence in the United States. Of the five volcanoes that formed Hawaii, Mauna Loa and Mauna Koa are still active. Lava from these volcanoes add land area to the island from their periodic eruptions that reach the ocean.

Mauna Loa, which reaches an elevation of 13,680 feet, is the world's largest active volcano. Other volcanoes on the island are the Kohala mountains in the north, Hualalai, Kilamea, and Halemaumau.

Kau High and Pahala Elementary School are organized from kindergarten to the 12th grade. It is located on a large 19-acre campus and administered from one office. There

are two dominate racial groups in the school population... Japanese and Filipino. Like the state as a whole, the children of almost all racial groups are represented in varying numbers in school. The families from which these children come are quite often large, averaging four to six children per family.

Needless to say, I'm enjoying a year's vacation while working. Tanned from the sun and dropping a little of my Texan accent to pick up the Pidgin English, I'm becoming a true Hawaiian.

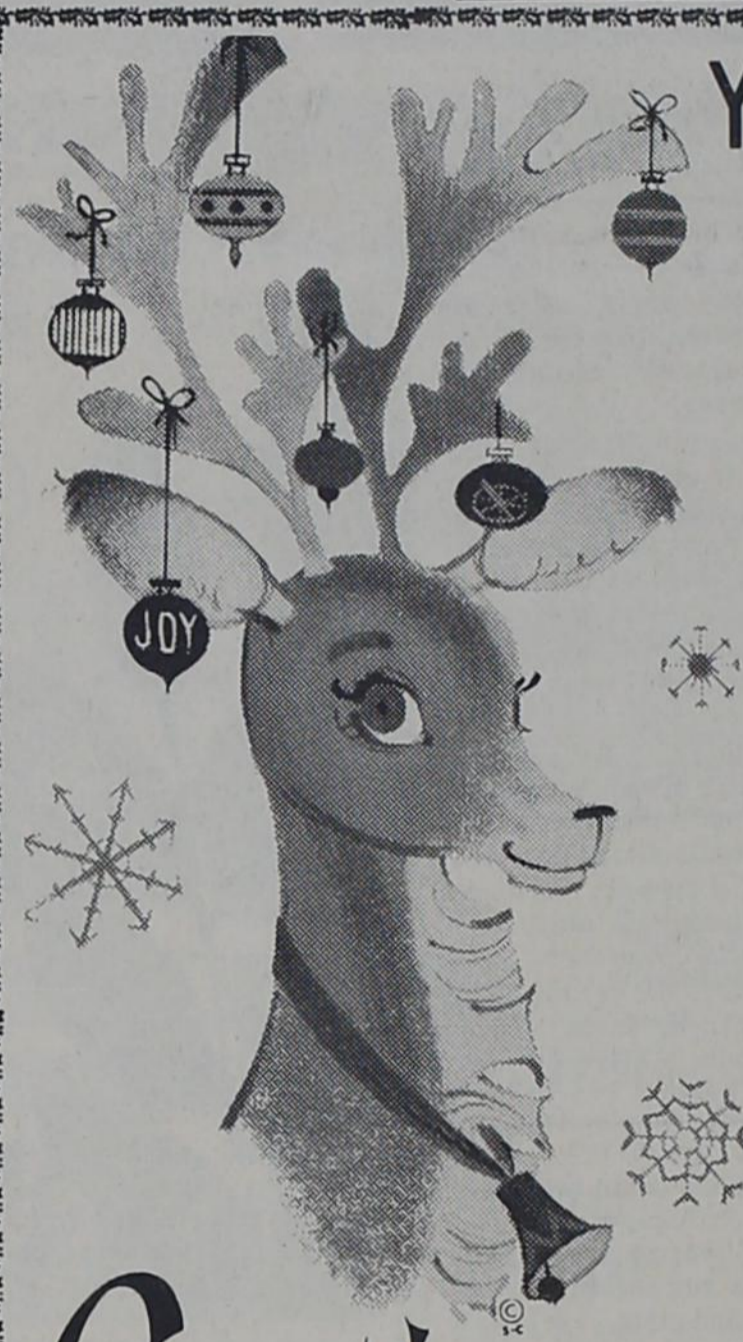

### NURSERY NEWS

By Alvin Woodburn Garden Center Nursery Clovis, N.M.

"Will a pine tree grow in Clovis?" was a question asked of us this past week. Since we have been going over some of the trees that adapt well to this area, we did hurry over the pine so let us look at some of the pines that will adapt here.

The Pondarosa is probably the most common. It is a very stately tree; growing to a good height. The bottom branches tend to shed and this will make the top more noticeable. This tree adapts here with very little special attention or extra care. Not subject to alkali as some of the other trees, it does appreciate a good watering during the winter and will pay many dividends for this care. The pine moth is very hard on the pine, but is not too hard to control; if proper methods are employed.

The Pinon is the New Mexico State tree and is well worthy of the honor. It is short and bushy by nature; thrives nearly anywhere and requires very little special attention. There are instances where families have survived on pinon nuts.

Another busy tree is the Japanese Black Pine, another that adapts well here. Somewhat longer needled than the pinon, it sports shorter needles than the Pondarosa.

The Austrian Pine is in a class by itself. The needles grow in a different pattern and makes a very attractive tree. The Scotch Pine is not necessarily short on anything. It makes a very nice, big headed tree and is doing very well in this area.

Among those in the decorative class is the Aleppo Pine, which has had some trouble tolerating the alkali and dry winters here. However, there are some that have done well.

The Mugho Pine is a cute trick and does not get too high, but surely does make a good short growth. More on pine trees next week.

### THE FATHER OF BELIEVERS

"Abraham believed God and it was counted unto him for righteousness" (Rom. 4:3).  
Has it ever occurred to you that the most loved, the most honored, the most respected person of history is—not Christ, but Abraham. Christ ought to be, but Abraham is. Besides the millions of professing Christians there are untold other millions of Jews and Mohammedans who speak with reverence of "our father Abraham."  
Clearly this is why God used this man to show us how to be saved and justified before a holy God. As Paul is God's great example of grace, so Abraham is God's great example of faith—saving faith.  
"If Abraham were justified by works," says Rom. 4:2, he has something to boast about—but not before God, who sees and knows all.

# When I Gave It My Whole Heart

(Editors Note -- The following article by Bill Glass, Cleveland Brown football star and a nephew of the late J. B. Benderman of Farwell, was given to this newspaper for reproduction by Mrs. J. B. Benderman. The article appeared in the Grit newspaper in late October.)

IT IS easy for any of us to let our lives slip into a rut, into a path of least resistance. Sometimes we don't even realize it has happened.

That was the case with me, my senior year in college. I was attending Baylor University in Waco, Tex., completely absorbed in campus life -- and, most of all, football. My brother, Vernon, had been a standout player at Rice, and therefore much was also expected of me.

Now, I was on the starting team, playing just well enough to stay there. I guess I was in a self-satisfied frame of mind.

One more thing: I had come from a home with strong religious convictions, but since coming to school my spiritual life had flagged too.

All of this was conveniently swept under the rug. I didn't want to think too much; I was far too busy enjoying myself.

THEN, ONE DAY I was forced to face these things -- and myself. All because of a little guy who barely came up to my shoulders, I might interject that I weighed about 230 pounds and stood 6-foot-5.

But Larry Walker was a college buddy at Baylor, and he was close enough to me so that he didn't pull any punches. It's good to have friends like that.

"Bill, you're a second-rate

football player," he told me, point blank. At first, I thought he was trying to kid me, but there was no trace of a smile on his face.

"Furthermore," he went on, "you haven't been putting out. You've been playing at about half your potential. With your superb physical equipment, you could be an All-American, but you'll never make it the way you are going."

I had no comeback because I knew, down deep I knew, that what Larry said was true. He said something else that day, though, that hit me even harder. Larry and I shared similar religious convictions, and he had something to say about that area of my life too.

"You talk about wanting to live a Christian life, Bill. Well, if you would play the football you're capable of, your influ-

ence for the Lord could be magnified many times over."

I HAD NEVER thought about it that way. "What would you suggest I do?" I asked Larry, a little red-faced.

"I think you need to ask yourself what your goals are. What do you want to accomplish this year on the football field? What kind of life do you want to live for Christ? If you see yourself as a mediocre football player or a mediocre Christian that is just what you'll be."

I didn't answer. Larry had set me to thinking about this whole question of achieving excellence in one's field. Then he said:

"Let's pray together about this, Bill. And let's make it a specific prayer that you become an All-American. And that as an All-American you use whatever glory this honor

brings, to the glory of God."

Ordinarily, this kind of prayer would have seemed selfish and self-centered to me. But not the way Larry explained it. And so we prayed. And when we finished I realized that something important had happened. I felt different inside.

Three days later, we played the University of California in our first game of the year. I had my whole heart in it, and the results were amazing. I played far better than I ever thought I could. All told, to my surprise, I made 17 unassisted tackles. It set the stage for the rest of my senior year -- on the field and off.

LARRY WALKER was right: I did make All-American. When I heard the news, I knew that many people shared the honor -- but it was to God that I owed the biggest debt. And it is to

Him that I owe everything that has happened to me since.

This was a turning point that has become a strength. When I sense myself wanting to let down, I only need remind myself that through Christ I can be used in a more dynamic way, and through Him I am free and obligated to do every task I undertake with my whole heart.

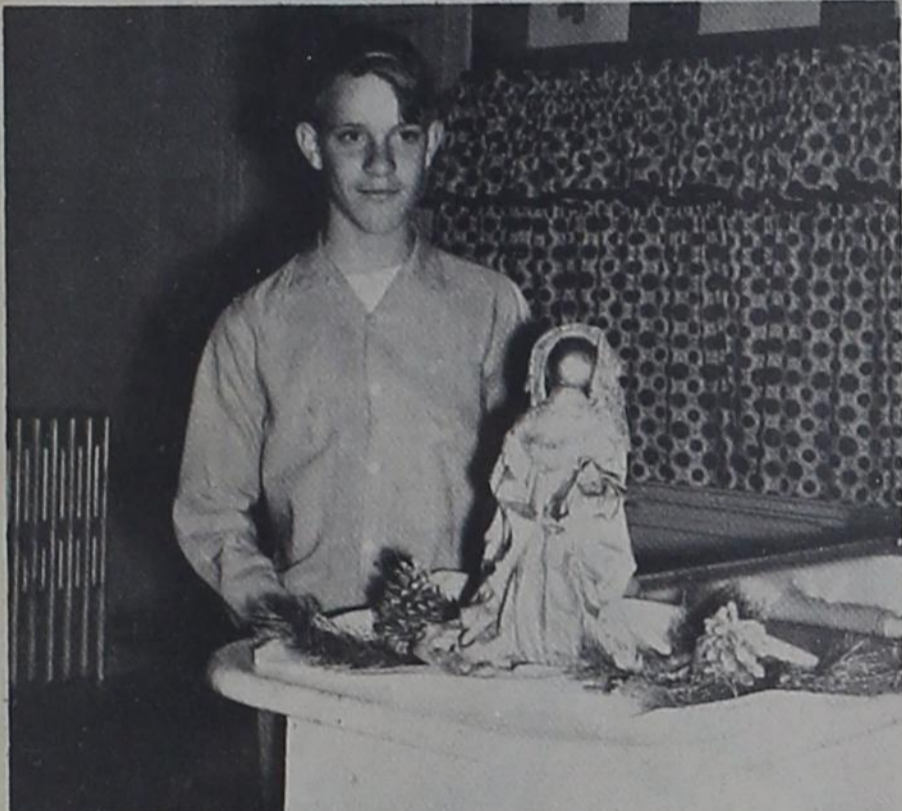
In this way I think I best witness to others that there is nothing secondclass about a life dedicated to Christ.

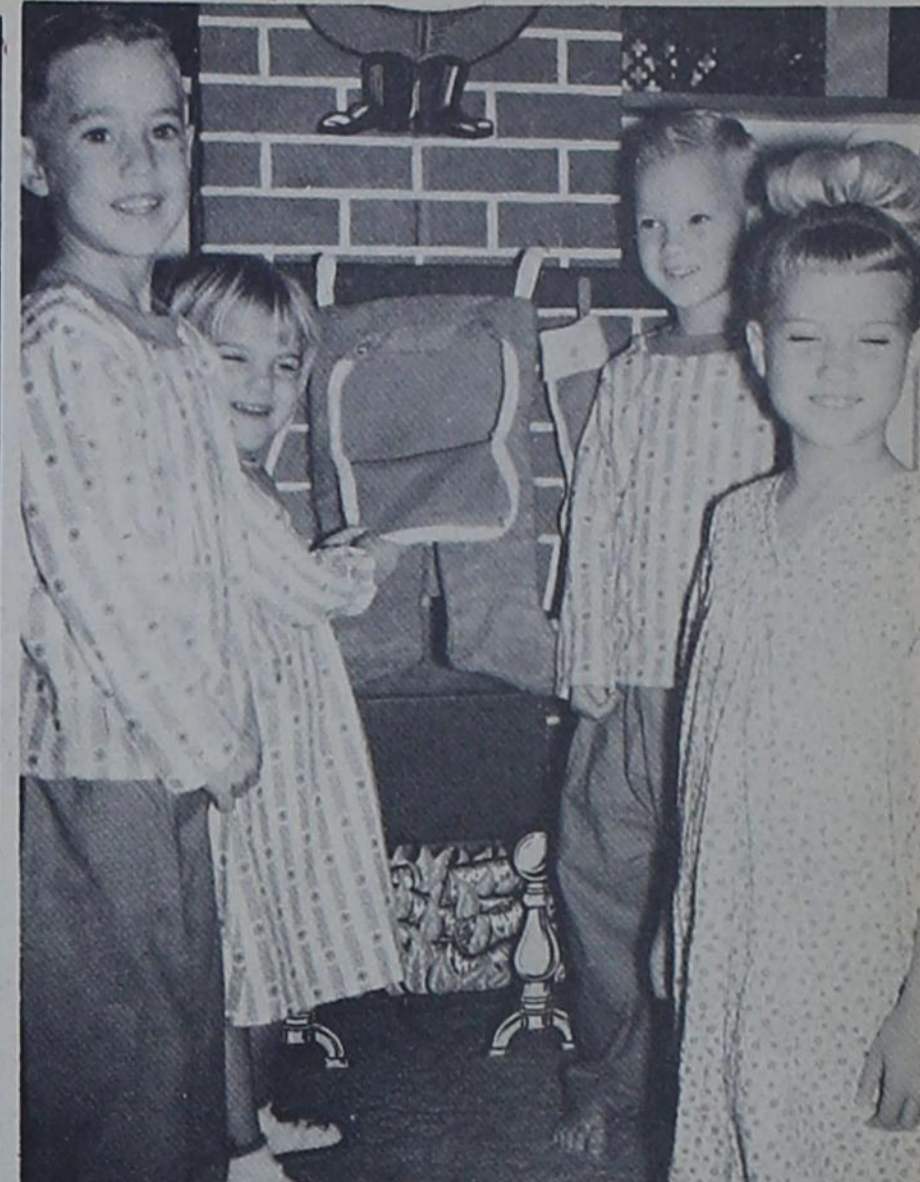

## Kaffee Klatch Season

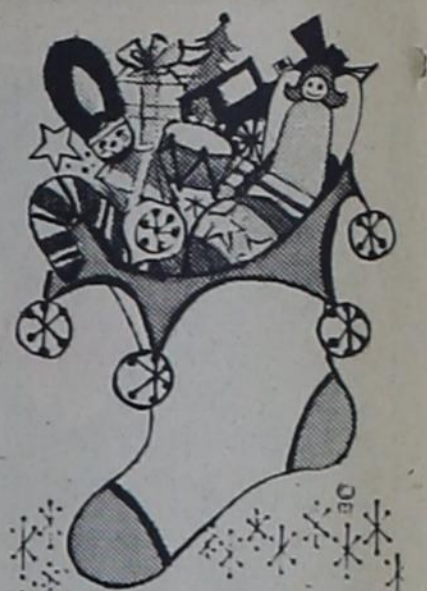

### CHOCOLATE SWIRL COFFEE CAKE

- 1/2 cup flaked coconut
- 1/4 cup chopped nuts
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 3 tablespoons butter, melted
- 2 cups New Bisquick
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1 egg
- 3/4 cup milk
- 1/2 cup semisweet chocolate pieces, melted

EARLY colonists of America often used corn as a medium of exchange instead of money.

# Home Is The Greatest After All

"Never have I been so glad to get back to a place where people smile and seem happy to be alive," said Mrs. Dale (Tom Paul) McCuan upon arriving back home from eight weeks spent in visiting Europe and parts of Africa.

Early in the summer the McCuans were notified by their son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Johnny McCuan, who have been teaching in Tunis for the past several years that they would not be coming back to the states this summer. At that time plans were begun for the local couple to join their children for a tour of Europe. The oil company by whom the young couple are employed made it possible for most of the parents to visit with their children overseas -- if they so desired.

The McCuans flew from Chicago to Frankfurt, Germany on a German plane. At Frankfurt they were met by Johnny and Winnie and immediately began a tour of Germany and other parts of Europe in a Volkswagen Camper.

Mrs. McCuan describes the country along the Rhine river as the "most beautiful I have ever seen," "... sorry it was too cloudy to take good pictures." Castles dotted the landscape every few miles and she noted that the river is still used for commercial purposes. They continued on up the river to Lubeck only three miles from the Iron Curtain and then crossed into Denmark.

As they were crossing into Denmark a long wait was necessitated due to the fact that the summer vacation was ending for all Danish people to be back in their homeland. "You certainly do a lot of waiting in line over there since people are so crowded," said Mrs. McCuan.

In Denmark it was noted that most of the people live in small villages, which are located two to five miles apart. Due to the fact that all of the land is kept mowed, for hay, the area looked much like a state park. The homes sported flower pots in the windows which were filled with geraniums and petunias. Even some of the barns had flower pots, filled with blooming plants, in the windows.

Most travel is by motor scooter, bicycle, or motorcycles, with children strapped to the cycles to prevent accidents. The McCuans were amazed to see even elderly people riding the cycles on eight lane highways.

One of the most interesting places visited in this area was a castle (Neusenstein) built by King Ludwig II. He had four castles built, but only got to live 172 days in this particular castle before being ousted -- "for of all things spending too much money." The castle was fabulous -- taking 220 women to sew and embroider for up-keep.

All servants lived on the first floor -- 102 steps from the ground, the ruler on the second floor. "never did see an elevator in it either." All of the furniture was handcarved--one chandelier weighed eight tons. The castle also had a private chapel for which it took 1000 candles to light.

Of interest to the group was the fact that Rotherberg, Germany is built with a moat around it and a draw-bridge.

The McCuans learned that America is the only place where pure food laws exist. Bread was delivered to the stores in burlap bags--no wrappers on it and many times was thrown in the back of vehicles. Fruits and vegetables were brought into the markets early in the mornings. . . . on carts pulled by a single horse or donkey. Meat markets were much like those in Juarez, Mexico.

The McCuans noted that none of the markets had screen doors and flies were plentiful everywhere. Cats and other animals came and went in restaurants as they pleased. It is here that Mrs. McCuan stated "Thank goodness for American pure food laws, health certificates and food inspectors."

They visited a museum in Munich which was quite interesting, with many of the ancient devices and also many of the modern ones. "It was much like the Smithsonian Institute. . . only not so good."

In Zurich, Switzerland they visited many interesting places, including a watch factory where many of the Swiss made watches are manufactured. . . watches and other articles are much higher this year than two years ago when Johnny and Winnie first visited the area, said Tom Paul.

The Swiss Mountains were beautiful and after spending much time sightseeing the group returned through Germany to Austria and stayed for a while visiting and seeing the sights. "We spent a night in the area where "Sound of Music," was filmed said Tom Paul.

The Austrian Alps are breathtakingly beautiful, grass with thick roots and turf like African Burmuda. Snow and flowers were side by side on the mountains and cows, goats and sheep were fat and contented grazing on the mountainsides.

Venice, Italy was also another highlight of the trip with its streets of water and much of the older parts of the city sinking. Water is lapping into many of the downstairs doors. An interesting sight was the soldiers striking the bells on the clock in the square. . . "has never failed to strike for 500 years."

In Rome many ruins were visited and it was hard for the McCuans to believe that many of the buildings dated back to before the time of Christ. What

was so amazing to them was the fact that much of the tile, laid at that time was still intact. . . "many of the pieces were no larger than a bean--they really built stuff to last."

They also visited the Vatican, which was large and expensive looking and the Cistine Chapel where Michaelangelo almost went blind laying on his back and painting the ceiling. They also saw the Picta (Mary holding Christ after the crucifixion), the largest amphitheater and the Coralla baths. . . "even had steam baths as far back as that!"

Also visited was Florence, Italy where they noted that articles were cheaper than any other place on the entire trip.

In this area was the river that overflowed two years ago wrecking havoc on the surrounding area and which stays muddy all time. Mt. Vesuvius was also in this area -- it has erupted seven times, covering the city of Pompeii. In this area they stayed at Camp Sulfatora which is in the basin of a volcano that is still boiling some 200 yards away. . . "of

course it hadn't really erupted in years but I was glad to get on the ship at Naples to cross the Mediterranean Sea to Tunis.

Mrs. McCuan notes that the water was so royal blue that is almost looked navy blue. Leaving the ship it took a day to arrive at their destination in Tripoli -- sounds were plentiful dogs barking, donkeys braying and the Mohammed Razzen chanting five times daily to call the people to prayer.

"Libya is doing quite well

with the American Oil Companies -- money is coming in, protection from the Wheelis Airbase. . . and it will continue to move forward as long as the old king lives. He is smart to not let Nassu tell him what to do."

The country is desert right up to the coast but it is in the process of modernizing. School was beginning in the Oil Company school, four teachers short and more students than ever. The airbase had a mixture of American and Arabic guards at the gates. Tom Paul visited the king's palace, and an oasis, where she saw camels being trained. "Roads were paved, but only wide enough for one car. . . therefore drivers played chicken to see who would get off in the sand."

After several days in Tunis Mrs. McCuan flew back to Frankfurt to take a plane home her husband had returned to the states earlier. She arrived in Chicago on the day the Democratic Convention began, but people were, "still smiling."

While making the tour the group stayed in camps along the way since this was much cheaper than staying in a hotel. Each person was required to pay about 50¢ per night plus a fee for the camper. Non one took hot baths since cold showers were free and an additional fee was charged for hot baths.

Upon arriving home Mrs. McCuan observed, "it seems odd for these countries to be so much older than we are but so far behind. . . It is the free enterprise system and the democratic way of government, with our right to choose our way of life which has made us progress."

## H. D. Agent Tells --

### How To Cook Turkey

Harvest days and turkey time go together. There are several ways of cooking a turkey. Two favorite ways include roasting and baking. Broiling is becoming more popular with the modern equipment available. There seems to be some confusion about roasting and baking a turkey. To clarify this, ROASTING is done undecored in a shallow pan equipped with a rack. There are two ways to Roast a turkey.

1. BREAST - UP METHOD: Place prepared turkey breast up in a shallow roasting pan. Cover breast and tops of thighs loosely with aluminum foil or a double layer of cheese cloth that has been saturated with melted butter. This keeps turkey from becoming too brown and aids in keeping meat moist. Brush with melted butter or drippings frequently during roasting. Do not break or pierce skin with fork. This allows juice to escape.

2. BREAST-DOWN METHOD: For moister breast meat, place prepared turkey breast down on V-shape rack in shallow roasting pan. Roast until half done. Turn breast up, remove rack, continue to roast until done. While breast is up, protect with foil or cheesecloth as above to prevent overbrowning. Brush frequently with drippings.

Baking is another method. This is baking the bird in a covered pan or wrapped completely with foil. A steaming process which draws the juices from the bird results in a great deal of stock. Many prefer less "turkey-stock" and meat that is more moist as the roasting process

where the meat retains the juices.

If you are one who has never been fond of turkey, check your method of preparation. Try roasting instead of baking.

A small booklet entitled "Harvey - Holiday Turkey," will soon be available free from the county extension office in Farwell. This could be the answer to some problems. Call 481-3619 or come by the office for a copy.

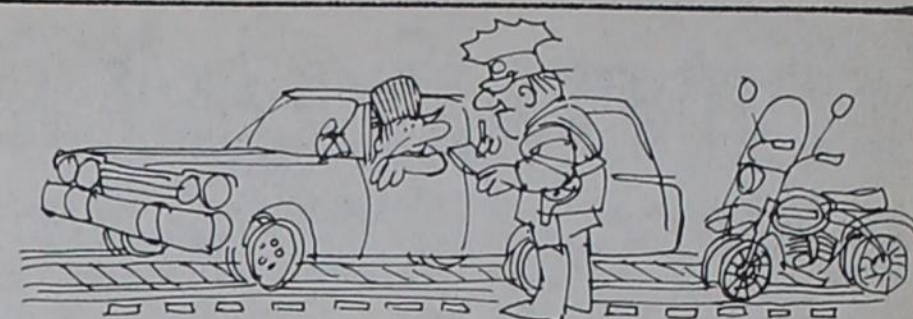

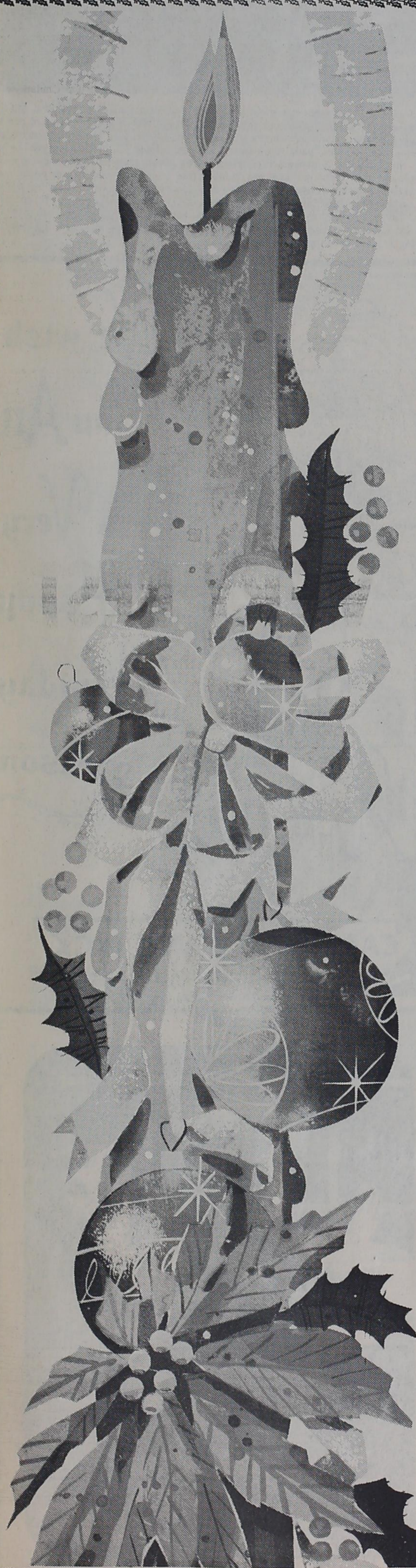

# Chrismons, Symbols Of God's Gift To Man, Jesus Christ

 Chrismons . . . a monogram of Christ, are being used for the first time in the local Methodist Church this year to symbolize the great gift God gave to the World when he gave his Son, "Our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ."

All the designs of Chrismon ornaments are symbols for Christ which have been passed down through the ages of Christian History and have been used in the Lutheran Church for many years. All Chrismons are in white and gold to symbolize the purity, majesty, and Glory of the Son of God.

Chrismons made by ladies in the local church which are being used in the windows of the sanctuary include the Fish, the Chalice, Angels and Archangels, the Triangle, Clover-Leaf, the Circle, Cross over the World, the Cross and the Crown, the Cross Patee, the Descending Dove and the Epiphany Star, the Creator's Star, and Regeneration through Baptism Star.

The Fish, one of the most ancient of the symbols, was used as secret identification in times of the Roman persecution of Christians.

"The Chalice" with wafer portrays the Lord's Supper, the Sacrament of the Altar.

Angels and Archangels portray the spirits God created to praise and serve Him. As God-sent messengers, the angels told man of the Birth, Resurrection, and Ascension of His Son. The gospels tell how the

angels ministered to the Lord during his years upon the earth. The Herald Angels symbolize the Nativity of the Lord and God's redeeming love.

The Triangle, Clover-Leaf, and three joining circles all represent the Trinity, "Father, Son and Holy Spirit."

The Circle is a symbol of eternity. The Cross and Greek Chi in a circle also represent eternity, while the butterfly on the cross symbolizes the Resurrection, new life emerging from the cocoon, as Christ emerged from the tomb.

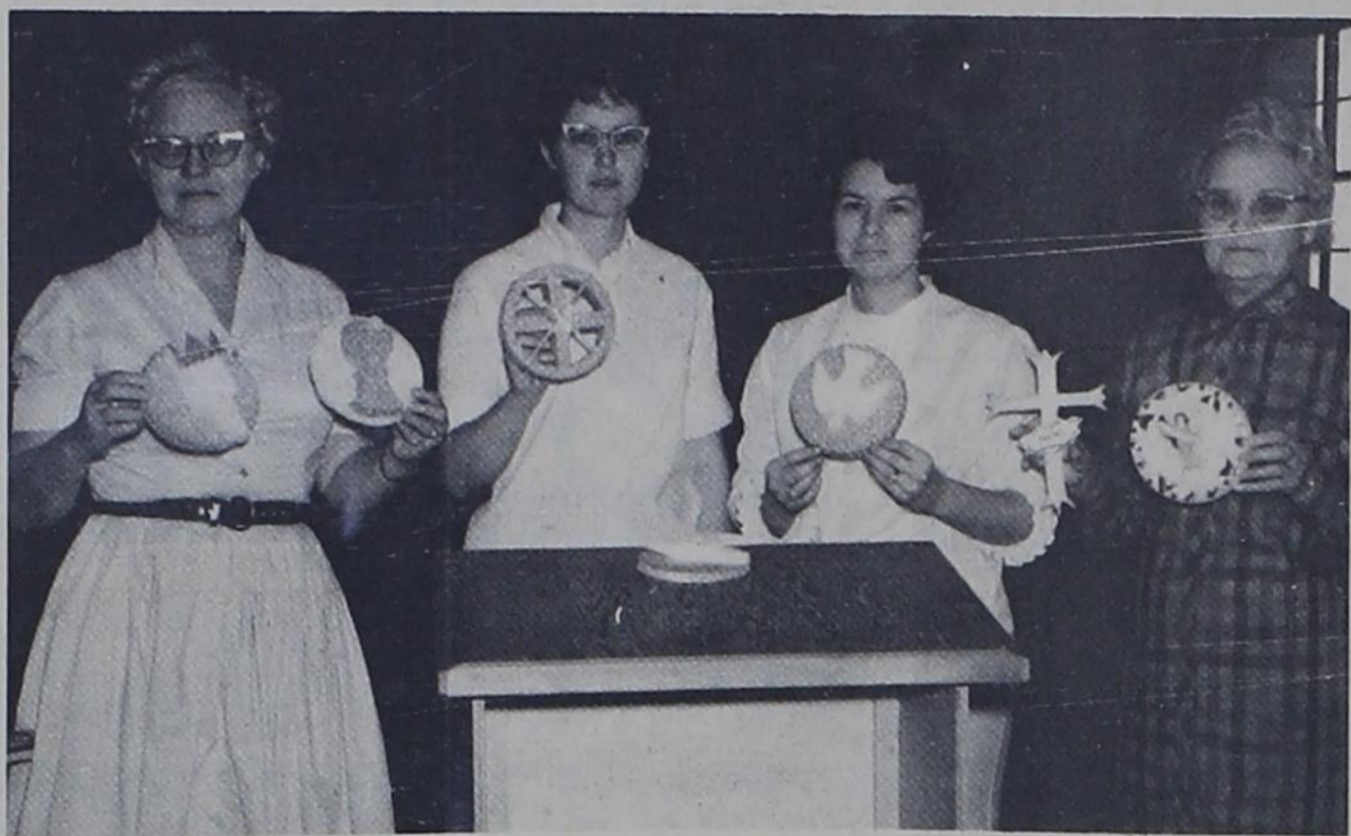
Cross over the world -- or Christ over the world, "Go ye into all the world . . . and lo, I am with you always . . . to the end of the world."

"The Cross and Crown with rose" symbolizes the Nativity of Christ, and the Cross Patee with four scrolls shows the symbols of the four Evangelists; Matthew, Mark, Luke and John.

The Epiphany star, the Creator's star and Regeneration through Holy Baptism are all self-explanatory.

Last of the symbols made by the ladies is the "Descending Dove," which is a symbol of a figure which, since earliest Christian times, has denoted the presence of God's Living Spirit among His people.

It is hoped that through use of the Chrismons in the church this year, that each of us will be brought closer to the real meaning of Christmas and the greatest gift of all, "Jesus Christ as Savior of the World."

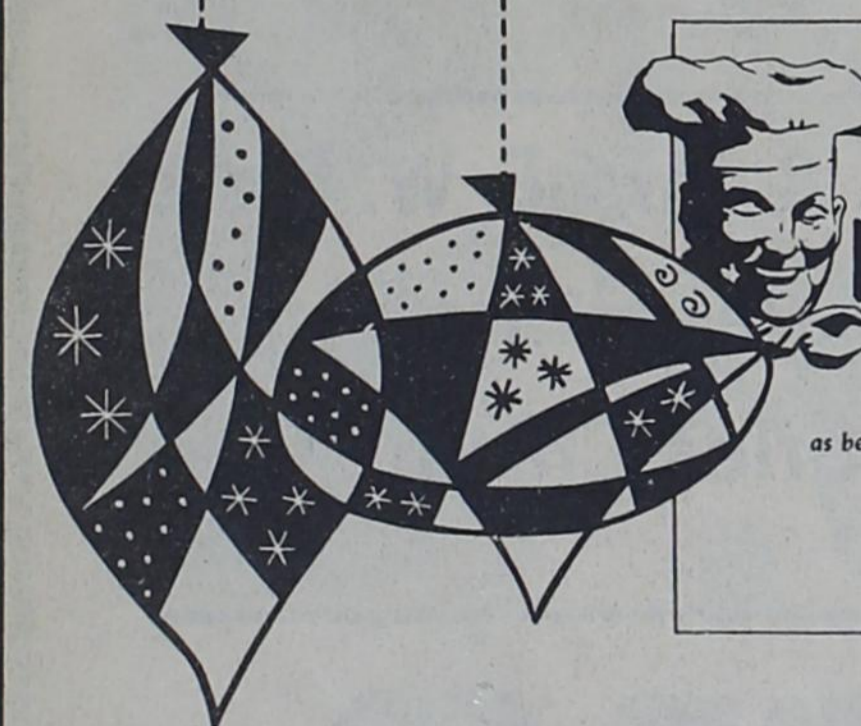

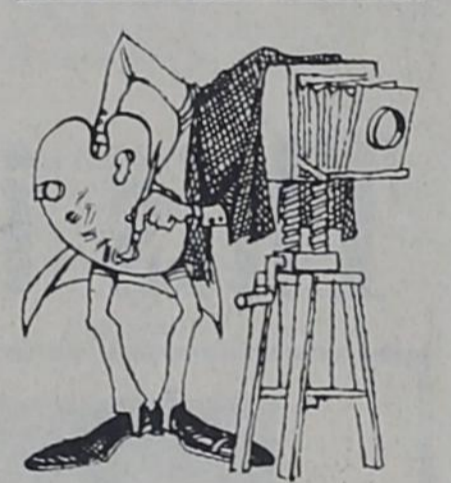

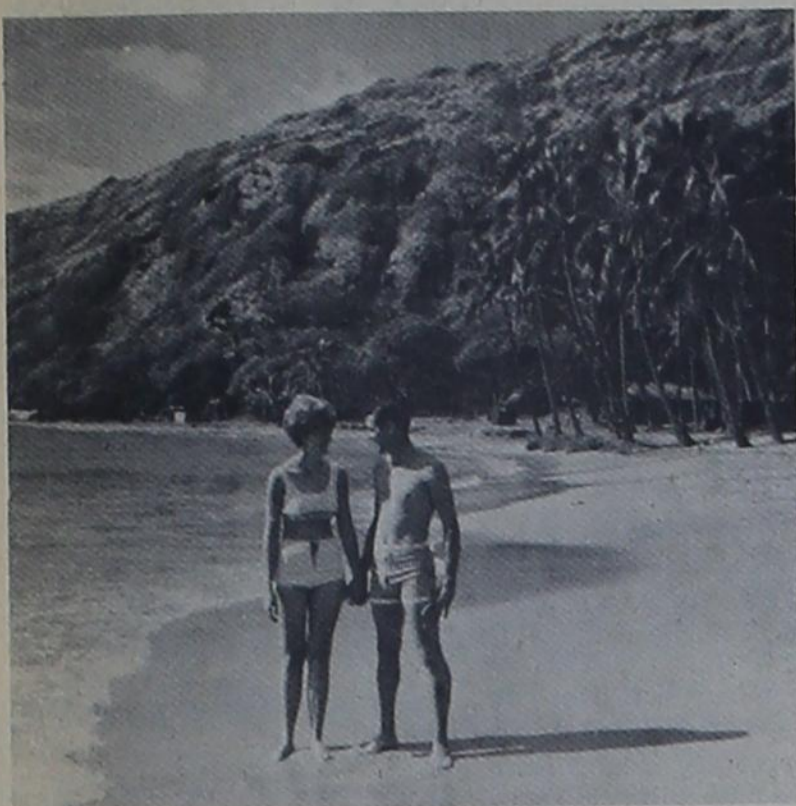

# Christmas Customs In Holland



A GLOW of pride spreads over the face of Mrs. Mary Mesman as she displays pictures of her children, who have all been born in America. She and husband, Ben, came to the United States from Holland approximately ten years ago, but at the Christmas season, a touch of nostalgia returns as they think of loved ones back in the homeland.

It's a long way from Holland to Farwell, Tex., and the Ben Mesman family who are spending their first Christmas in this community find that the Christmas customs of the two countries are also different.

In Holland, the Christmas season, Dec. 25-26, are strictly religious holidays. Early in the morning on Dec. 25 all families arise and attend early mass at their respective churches and then return home to a large breakfast which has been prepared for the entire family. Later the entire family again returns to church for a late mass and then home for another feast. The entire day goes like this, but on Dec. 26 the day is spent visiting back and forth among the families.

Santa Claus? Oh, he has already paid his visit to good children well in advance of the Christmas Holiday since Santa Claus Day is observed on Dec. 5. At that time, all children place their wooden shoes with a little hay in them by the fireplace before retiring in the hope that Santa Claus will visit them and leave something before they arise.

If the child has been good, Santa Claus does indeed make his appearance, removing the hay and leaving fruit, toys and sometimes candy, nuts and all

the other goodies which American girls and boys accept as part of Christmas, for the expectant boys and girls.

At this time (Dec. 5), Santa Claus also makes public appearances at schools wearing his black clothing (not red and white with which we associate the merry gentleman) and brings treats for all the boys and girls who have been good. If a boy or girl has been good, especially bad, Black Pete, "just might pick him up and place him in the sack for a few minutes," before leaving to make his other rounds. Since Santa Claus is kept so very busy at this time, he has many helpers (Black Petes) who assist him by making some of the rounds.

In Holland, Santa Claus makes his rounds in a sleigh but instead of reindeer he has horses pulling the sleigh. Good children in Holland, as in the United States, leave something for the horses to eat such as hay or carrots and also leave goodies for Santa Claus, to help keep up his strength as he makes his way to visit all children in the country.

Climax of the Christmas holiday is the "big" dance which is held in all villages and cities

on Dec. 26 and to which everyone is invited. As Mrs. Mesman told of this part of the Christmas Festival, she heaved a sigh and reminisced about some of the Christmases she has seen in former years; and admitted that she does indeed like the observance of Christmas as a religious holiday better than the American custom of having Santa Claus Day and Christmas combined.

The custom of sending greeting cards to friends and neighbors has not yet been accepted by people in Holland but the Mesmans are observing this custom along with all other American ways of celebrating Christmas.

Mrs. Mesman (Mary) told how in her homeland decorations are much the same as in American homes for the holiday season. They have Christmas trees, wooden shoes instead of stockings, gay Christmas ornaments and all of the other traditional decorations.

a "Happy and Prosperous New Year," and to share the "Ole Ball," (similar to a doughnut) and drink a cup of cheer.

The Mesmans, Ben and Mary, have been residents of the United States for approximately ten years but have only been residents of this area (Oklahoma Lane Community) for the past few months. They arrived in Parmer County in March and are presently engaged in operation of a dairy farm, milking 110 cows daily. He also does some farming, but likes the dairy best since in his homeland he operated a dairy farm. They have four children; Teddy, seven years of age, Tommy, six, Joanna, five, and Berny, three years old. They are members of St. Joseph Catholic Church in Texico and she is already busily engaged in assisting with church suppers and in other church activities.

Mary told how when they arrived in Farwell from California last March, they were treated to a sample of all kinds of weather the first week of their arrival, having rain, hail, sleet, snow and hot weather. . . all in one week! Asked if she had been back to Holland since leaving that country, Mary said "Yes, but it was so different!" No she does not think she would like to go back to Holland to make her home, but she has brought many customs of her homeland to this country. One has only to see her home. . . completely redecorated since the family's arrival, to know that here indeed is a woman who is born homemaker and will adjust quickly to the customs of any area in which she is living.

Her home is filled with lovely handwork which she makes in her "spare" time and she has spent many hours since her arrival in this area remodeling furniture and walls in her home. The entire home looks as if it had been laid out by an interior decorator.

Another hobby for this industrious woman is sewing. She was busily engaged in making Christmas "nighties," for family members, all from "red and white" the day on which we visited her.

If you are ever feeling a little lonely, pay her a visit to this delightful person (Mary Mesman and her family) and immediately you will feel a "warm glow" as they wish you a "Merry Christmas and Happy New Year!"

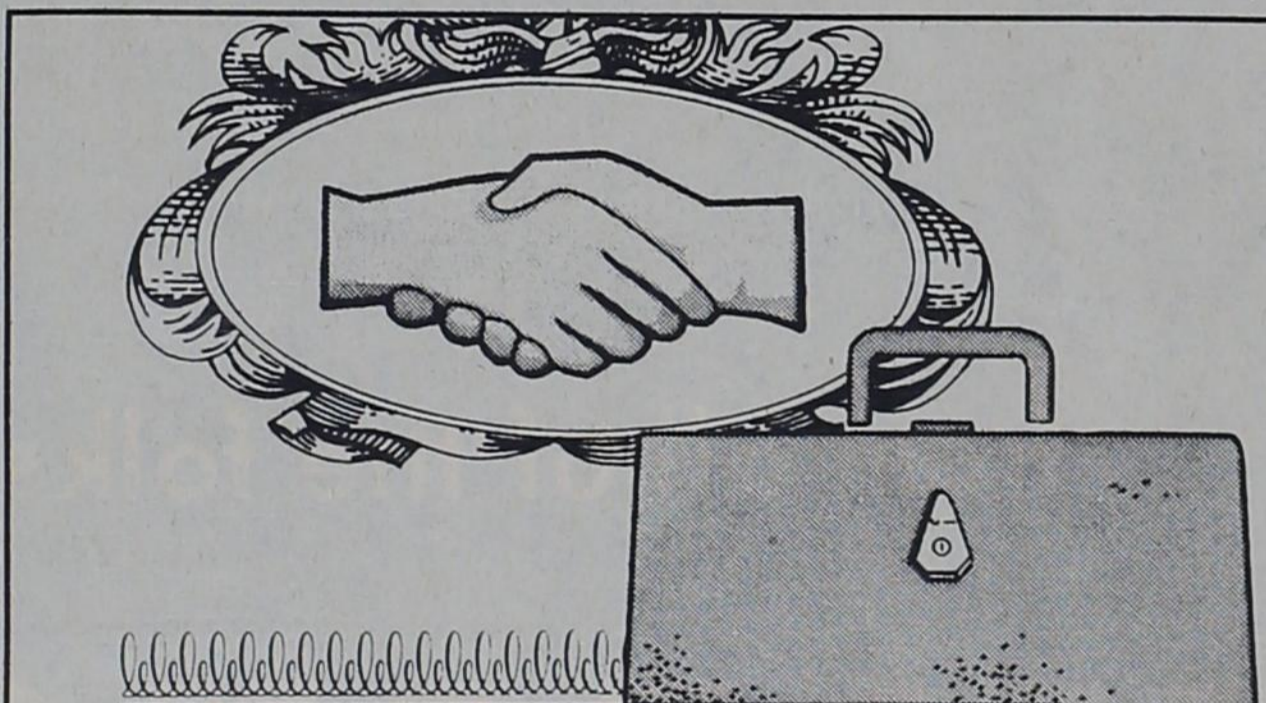

# Corona Cabin Provides Camping Home For Texico-Farwell Scouts

 Texico-Farwell Boy Scout Troop 200 first learned of the Corona, N.M., Scout cabin from Jack Jackson of Clovis, associated with Cub Scout Pack 130. He had become acquainted with the building through deer hunting trips to the area, located in central New Mexico's mountains. Clovis Troop 11 had already been using the facility.

Corona's present Scout Troop, led by Marshal Jeffcoat, actually uses the cabin only occasionally. But the building has already been used three times by Texico-Farwell Boy Scout Troop 200.

Boys camped in nearby tents on the troop's 1966 and 1967 trips, while the cabin provided sleeping facilities for Scout mothers who helped drive the boys to their destination. But Troop 200 moved its entire operation inside November 30 and December 1 of this year, as the temperature fell to 25 degrees and six inches of snow covered the ground outside. Boys and their adult leaders cooked all of their meals on the fireplace, and slept on tables, benches, the floor, and even on a pair of rusted bedsprings which had been left in the cabin. It was only this year that

This "Home Away From Home" for Boy Scouts is a one-room stone building, with wooden roof and cement floor. Across the room from a large fireplace is a cistern water pump, and there is one row of block windows which allow the lights to enter. The cabin is surrounded by many familiar trees of the forest.

Constructed by local Boy Scouts in 1947, the building's origin is proudly noted in an outside phrase inscribed in cement, "OUR CABIN, 1947 CORONA SCOUTS."

As is usually the case, scouting has been "off and on" in Corona as Scoutmasters have come and gone through the years. But Corona officials have continued to lease the building and its surroundings area from the Forest Service. Corona Mayor Thomas Huey says, "We pay the Forest Service \$25, a year so the cabin can be used by the boys."

Troop 200 discovered the "art" of building a fire which will send its smoke up the chimney, instead of inside the building. Says Scoutmaster Gene Bitner, "The logs have to be placed at the very back of the fireplace, but cooking can be done on coals near the front." On a recent visit, the Texico-Farwell boys cooked such things as homemade bread, cranberries, steaks, stew, and even hot tamales, as the fireplace also provided heat for the snow-covered cabin.

It is doubtful that many of Corona's residents know of the help their \$25, per year rental is providing for Texico-Farwell boys, who have to travel nearly 200 miles to find a home in the mountains. But Mayor Huey and Scoutmaster Jeffcoat have both welcomed Troop 200 to "come and use our cabin at any time!"

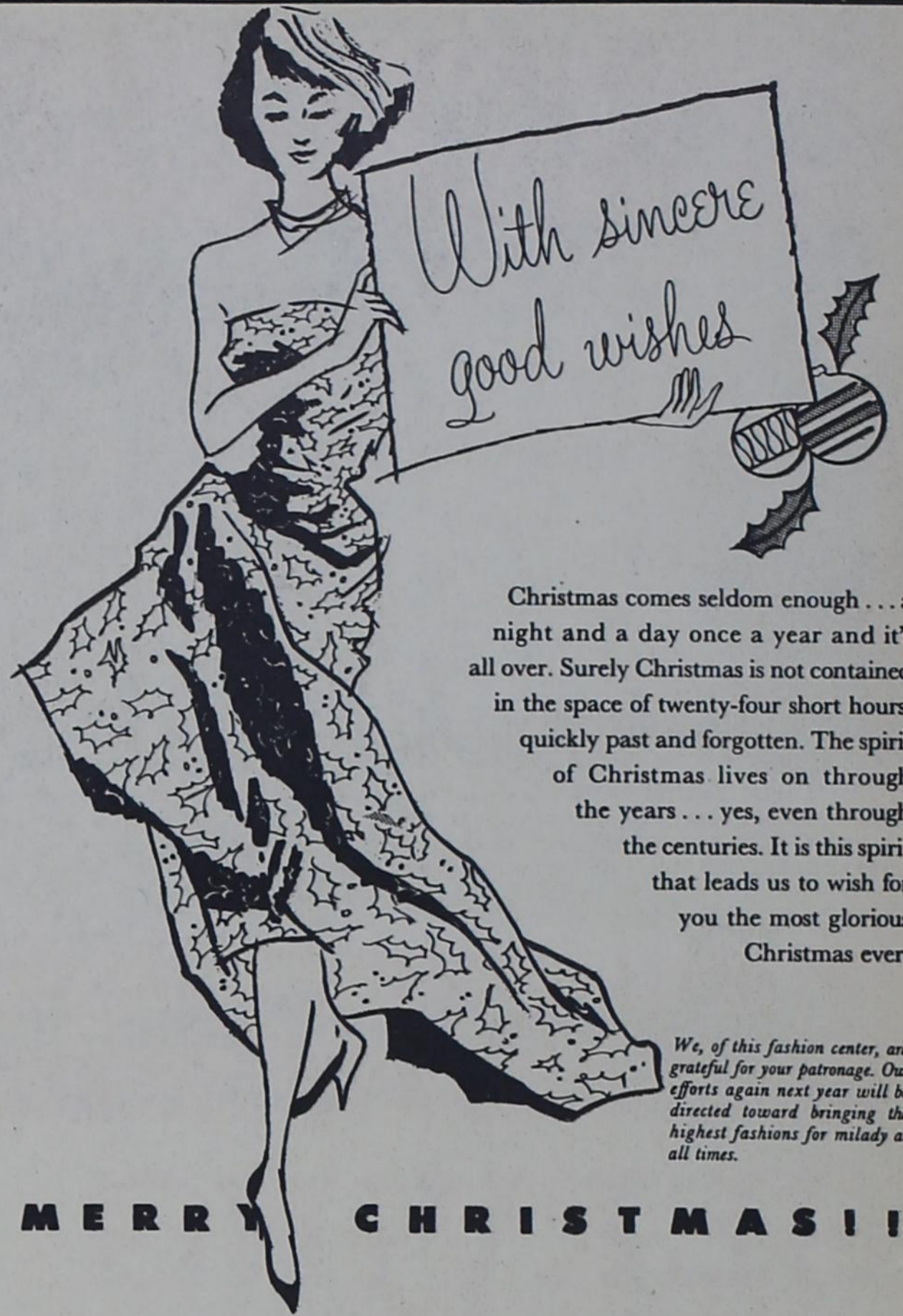
