

Mavericks Bow to DeLeon 24-0 Here

Sheep grazing the sod at Maverick Stadium is a familiar sight, but it was a Lamb, Bill by name, and De Leon Bearcat by team, that tore up the green Friday night to help hand the Eastland Mavericks their ninth defeat of the season, 24-0.

The 140-pound De Leon back scored three times for the Bearcats — scoring from one yard away in the second period, from the four in the third and on a 12-yard dash in the fourth. Quarterback Danny Sharp scored the only other TD on a one-yard plunge in the fourth, after a 59-yard run by Gary Burleson. All attempts for extra points failed for the Bearcats.

The Mavericks played heads up and probably put on one of their best defensive shows — being "there" on almost every key play. The center of the Mav line held like a stone fence throughout the night.

An attempted new offense pattern failed to get off the ground in spite of its success.

Industrial Pilot Program For County Launched At Meetings

EC-65 CLUB ORGANIZED TO SEEK NEW OPPORTUNITIES

A pilot program designed to give new impetus to Eastland County's general economy through payroll expansions was formally launched as civic leaders from throughout the county met Thursday night at the high school auditorium in Cisco.

The program, which will be guided by the Texas Industrial Commission, was instigated at the suggestion of Governor John Connally. Director Harry W. Clark of the TIC and Larry Milner, the West Texas coordinator for the state agency, attended the Cisco meeting plus local meetings in Ranger, Eastland and Cisco on Thursday.

The pilot program was prepared by Mr. Clark and his staff, using the experience of his 25 years in the field of searching out new payroll industries. He pointed out that the success of the Eastland County program would be watched with interest throughout the state and that the Texas Legislature would be asked next year for funds to enlarge the TIC's operations in years to come.

To launch the program, the approximately 100 persons present formed an organization to be known as "EC-65," which stands for Eastland County, 1965. The meeting voted to:

1. Form the EC-65 Club with annual dues of \$5.
2. Elect Tom Stevenson, manager of the Chamber of Commerce in Cisco, as the EC-65 secretary - treasurer.
3. Authorize the county steering committee to obtain a suitable lapel button or pin for EC-65 Club members.
4. Authorize the steering committee to plan five one-day seminars that the TIC will plan and stage once a month for the next five months to help club members become acquainted with what they will need to know and do to help attract payrolls.

In workshop type talks, Mr. Clark and Mr. Milner presented to each of the individual meetings as well as the county meeting the details of the pilot program. They described the basic needs in seeking payrolls as five important fields, including:

1. Community betterment—Make your community attractive and a desirable place in which to live.

2. Research — Obtain facts and figures needed by potential payrolls.

3. Sites — Locate places that industry might want and have it ready for their purchase or lease.

4. Financing—Know where and how potential industries may obtain money for plants and so forth.

5. Prospects — Seek these from existing industries, Texas as manufacturers who are expanding regularly, local ideas that might be developed, rumors that should be investigated, and from regional organizations.

Mr. Clark and his staff will assemble a group of experts in each of the above five fields for the series of monthly seminars that will be held in the county.

He pointed out that "We are the coaches, and you must carry the ball and make the big plays." He added that an alternative might be

to dry up and eventually die as a community.

Mr. Milner reported that civic workers were invited to sign up as EC-65 Club members at each of the individual meetings — at Ranger Thursday at 9:30 a. m., at Eastland at 11 a. m., and at Cisco at 2:30 p. m. — as well as at the county-wide meeting. The minimum of 65 was obtained, he added.

Represented at the night meeting were civic groups from Gorman, Eastland, Rising Star, Ranger and Cisco. A. R. Rutherford of Cisco presided. A welcome talk was made by Mayor John Webb of Cisco. Mr. Rutherford noted that "it is particularly fitting that this type of meeting is the first public gathering in our new \$600,000 school auditorium."

The over-all program will be managed by the steering committee that was created last September, including Ross Wilson of Gorman, Walter Smith of Rising Star, Morris Newnam of Ranger, (Continued on Page 3)

Jack and his wife Betty and their six-month-old son, Jack Jr., moved to Eastland about two months ago. He is a graduate of Eastland School.

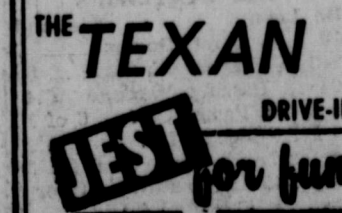
Located in the front office area of the packing company, the meat market will feature week-end specials every week, Meek said.

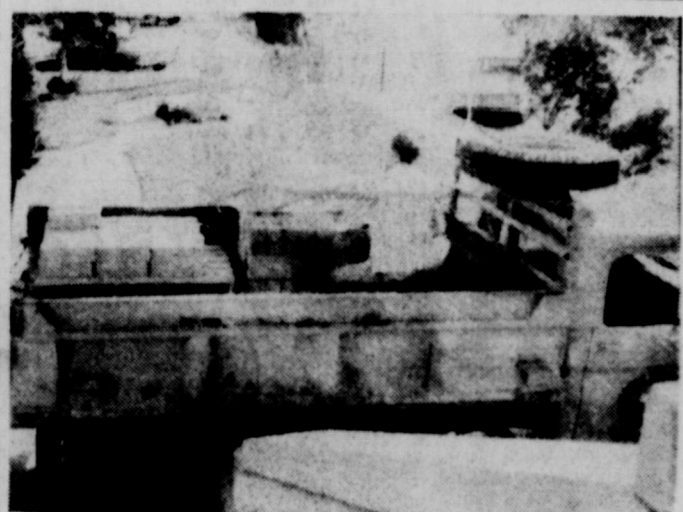
NURSES AIDES CHARGED IN MINOR DELINQUENCY CASE

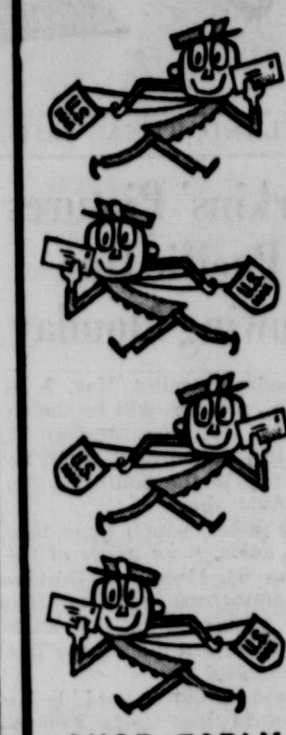

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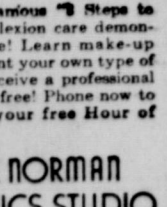

Reflections On South Pacific; Tour Nears End

Our ship left Honolulu last evening and is due to dock at San Francisco on Sunday. Last night as we were eating our evening meal in the dining room I noticed that the dozen waitresses all assembled near the entrance, leaving their usual duties for a few minutes.

Immediately the chef appeared with a birthday cake and the entire group marched to a table and sang "Happy Birthday to you, from the ship and the crew" etc. to the astonished and pleased recipient of the cake and song. It was all over in a minute and the girls went back to work. I then wondered how the ship knew of a guests birthday, until I recalled that upon boarding the ship we all were required to leave our passports at the purser's office. Evidently they are examined and a list of birthdays is made so they may be observed in this kindly manner.

Although I am now thousands of miles away from Australia my thoughts keep reverting to that delightful country. I am impressed by its vast size and the beauty of its lonely interior. Where else in the world can one find, as at Alice Springs, a telephone directory less than a quarter inch thick listing every telephone in all of northern Territory including its two largest towns, Alice Springs, and Darwin, which are a thousand miles apart?

We have just spent two days in the remarkable city of Honolulu. I noticed that there have been a great many apartment buildings and hotels built since my visit three years ago. The city seems very much alive both by day and night, and it is unique in that it is populated by a great mixture of races, mainly Asiatic and Polynesian, with many businesses in capable Chinese hands. There are military establishments everywhere and loud jets zoom over the city constantly.

As we left our pier and sailed slowly down the harbor we waved farewell to the crew of the Pomona that was berthed next to our ship. It was a forlorn and motley crew that waved back to us. The Pomona is an old Liberty type ship, now rusty and barely seaworthy, armed in Brazil, sailing under a Liberian flag, with Norwegian officers and a crew of twenty five men from six different countries, carrying scrap metal from Los Angeles to Formosa. A few days ago while 600 miles off Honolulu it was discovered that the captain had been murdered in his cabin. The

first mate then investigated and decided that the steward should be locked up under guard. Yesterday the suspect broke a plate and attempted to cut himself, apparently with suicide in mind. The officers and crew have vowed that they will not again sail on the Pomona.

For those who might be inclined to read more about the islands of the South Seas, including New Zealand and Australia, I submit a list of four books that I have read and enjoyed. They are: "All the Best in the South Pacific" by Sydney Clark. This is the best and most interesting guide book that I have found.

"South Sea Adventure Cruise" by Rita Custado Kistner. A vivid description of an island cruise in a private yacht.

"Island of Love," by Robert Langdon. An intimate account of adventures on Tahiti. "A Town Like Alice" by Nevil Shute. A good descriptive novel of life in Australia's cattle country.

\$18 Million To Be Spent In FM Roads Next Year

AUSTIN — The Texas Highway Commission has acted to protect the investment of Texas taxpayers in their 37,000-mile Farm and Ranch to Market Road system by approving \$18,090,200 for betterment in 1965.

A total of 3,305 miles of these all-weather roads will be improved under the 1965 Farm to Market Road Improvement Program to be executed in coming months by the Texas Highway Department.

Commission Chairman Herbert C. Petry, Jr. said traffic increase and heavier loads, coupled with the age of many of the rural roads in Texas, are big factors in the need for periodic "resoling" of many F-M roads.

Under the budget approved today, 353 F-M miles will be reconstructed with new grading, structures and surfacing; 338 miles will be widened, reconstructed and resurfaced; 679 miles will receive additional surfacing, and seal coat improvements will be made on 1,924 miles.

Extensive bridge widening and shoulder improvement work is also included in the list of improvements scheduled for Farm to Market Roads under the 1965 program, Petry said.

Today's improvement budget was in addition to a \$23 million Farm to Market Road construction budget approved by the Commission in May for new F-M road construction.

The Highway Department will spend about \$22 million next year for routine maintenance — in addition to extensive betterment covered in today's action — on the F-M system.

Of the total completed F-M Road system in Texas, 33,560 miles are rural and 1,085 miles are within city limits. An additional 2,469 miles are under construction at this time or financed for construction in coming months.
