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Checks For \$2 Million At ASC Ready To Mail

Already in the envelopes ready for mailing Monday are checks totalling \$1,144,000 made out to Mitchell County farmers for their part in the 1968 cotton and feed grains program.

Agricultural Stabilization & Conservation Service office, to distribute the checks to producers by mail, received another batch of United States Department of Agriculture

checks in the amount of \$760,000 in the Friday morning mail.

That brings the total amount of money for the program's participants in this county to \$1,904,000 already on hand, according to Eddie Braswell, office manager for the ASCS.

"That total, already received in the office accounts for about 80 percent of the total due

cotton producers in the county and about 45 percent for wheat and feed grains," said Braswell.

"The ASCS office will place in the mail Monday morning the checks in the amount of \$1,144,000, all dated August 19," Braswell said.

"It is our hope and our present goal to also mail the additional checks for \$760,000 received Friday morning—either Monday morning or, at least, some time Monday afternoon," he added.

Total money expected to be paid to Mitchell County producers under the 1968 cotton and feed grain program is "in the vicinity of \$3 million," Braswell said. In answer to a question from the Colorado City Record.

One thing learned by the local ASCS office manager during a field man's conference and a State ASCS Committee meeting at College Station, Tuesday through Thursday, was that Mitchell County was one of seven "unlucky counties" to have part

of its checks mutilated during processing at the New Orleans Commodity office.

That means, Braswell explained, that about 20 percent of the cotton money and about 55 percent of the grain checks will be arriving in the mail next week—or later.

Checks will be mailed as fast as they arrive, the ASCS office here was stressing at the weekend.

Producers who fail to receive grain checks, who receive only part of their expected total, or get checks for one cotton farm but not all their cotton farms, will be receiving additional checks as soon as New Orleans Commodity Office mails them to Colorado City, Braswell announced.

Cook Resigns To Take Post Near Dallas

Earl Cook, assistant superintendent of Colorado Independent School District, resigned Friday to accept a position as assistant superintendent of instruction for the Wilmer-Hutchins School District near Dallas.

Cook moved to the Colorado City school system Jan. 17, 1966, as coordinator for Federal Aid to Education program. He was named assistant superintendent two years ago. His resignation is to become effective here August 31.

"This is a fine professional advancement for Earl Cook," said James G. McMath, superintendent, in announcing the receipt of the written resignation, adding, "We hate to lose him."

Superintendent of the Wilmer-Hutchins District is Don Robbins, remembered in this area as a former superintendent of Lorraine Independent Schools, later a principal in the Midland school system, and more recently with the Texas Education Agency.

Scholastic total in the Wilmer-Hutchins District is 4,700 school pupils, almost three times as large as the scholastic figure here.

Cook will be one of three assistant superintendents with his assignment to be assistant superintendent in instruction. The other two assistants will be in charge of business operations and administration, respectively.

Son of Mrs. Orlean Cook, teacher at Westbrook, Cook grew up in Westbrook and Colorado City.

He earned his bachelor of arts degree and his master of education degree, both from Hardin-Simmons University at Abilene.

"One major consideration," said Cook after his resignation was announced, "was the opportunity to be in a location where Betty and I can continue graduate studies."

His wife, Betty, Hardin-Simmons graduate, was recently elected to teach third grade here in Primary School.

The couple are parents of a son, Jon, who is six, and a daughter, Emille Carol, two years old.

The Cooks will move to the Mesquite area, near Dallas, or to the South Oak Cliff area, when they locate a home near the Wilmer-Hutchins District.

New Industrial Class To Include On The Job Training

A new course at Colorado High School, under the Industrial Cooperative Training Program (ICT) will begin its first year at Colorado High School with the new term, starting August 29, with Forrest Lynn Fox as director.

Students registered for ICT are urged by the instructor to report to him at the high school building between the hours of 9 a.m. and 12 noon, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, or Friday, August 20-23.

Any other students wanting to

qualify for the ICT program are also asked to report.

Colorado City businesses or shops interested in participating in the new program may obtain information from Mr. Fox Monday through Friday morning.

Industrial Cooperative Training is designed to provide students with the opportunity of learning a trade or semi-professional occupation while earning a high school diploma. It is set up to provide greater assurance of full-time employ-

ment in a chosen occupation through on-the-job training under real conditions," said an announcement from the school.

The course will offer a full two years of training and carries four affiliated credits with two credits for each year.

Students also receive wages comparable to those paid to beginning workers in the same occupation.

Mitchell County 1968 farm tour, Thursday morning, will give ranchers, farmers, agribusiness men and other interested citizens a look at outstanding agricultural demonstrations and practices.

The tour, free to everybody, will leave by school bus at 8:30 a.m. from Lone Wolf Electric Coopatorium.

Dutch Treat barbecue feast, to be catered by Clyde Buckalew, will follow the tour. Tickets for the noon meal are \$1.75 each.

Dink Rees of Lone Wolf Co-op, is in charge of barbecue ticket sales.

Highlight of the day will be a series of visits to observe the newest and the best methods used in this county in the farm-ranch industry, one of the county's biggest assets.

All four of the United States Government Agricultural agencies are cooperating with the local Chamber of Commerce agriculture committee in sponsoring the tour.

Planning the route were John Russell, Farmers Home Administration; Don Hodges, Soil Conservation Service; Bobby Lemons, Extension Service county agent; and Eddie Braswell, Agricultural Stabilization & Conservation Service. Braswell is also chairman of the

Cattlemen Alerted By Screwworm Danger

Mitchell County farmers are being informed by letters from the agent's office of the increased danger to their herds since cooler weather and showers in the area.

Cattle producers are reminded by Lemons to be on the lookout and to collect samples at once from any suspected animal.

Bottles with labels already affixed are available at the Extension Service office for mailing of the samples to the testing laboratory, Lemons said.

Bobby Lemons, Mitchell County agent, issued a warning Saturday to cattlemen of this area to be on the alert for possible screwworm infection of their herds.

"There has been one case of screwworm confirmed in Howard County this week," said the county agent.

He noted also that one confirmed case showed up this week in the Garden City area, Glasscock County, and that both Coke and Sterling Counties have had verification notices of screwworm infestation.

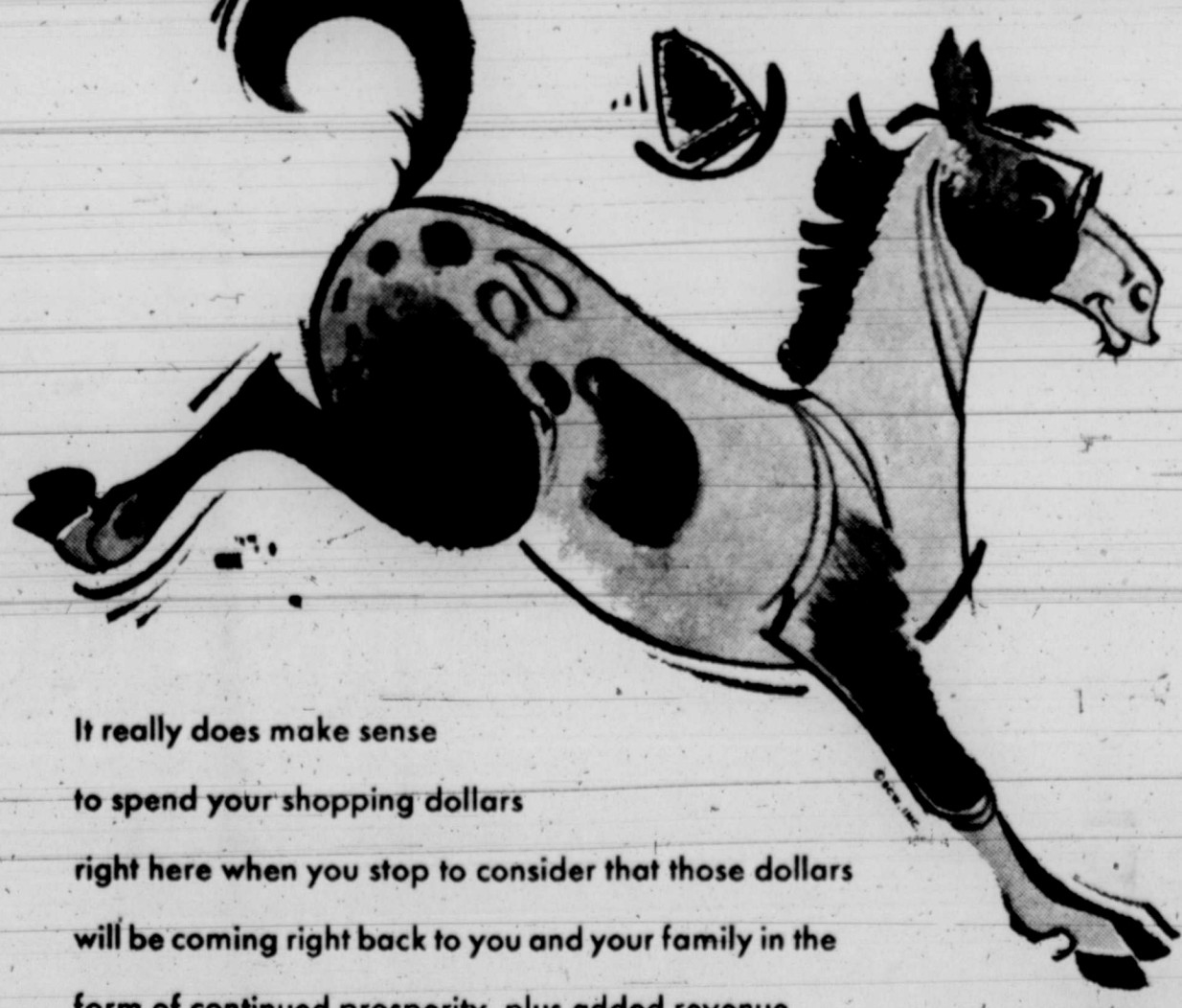
