SINCE the capture of Greece, after 21 days of battle apparently, there's nothing this side of "hell and highwater" that will stop the Germans. As to "high water" figuring in the ultimate defeat of the Germans, there is more "truth than poetry." It will be with the help this side of the highwater, that will put Hitler down with his head under him. The Nazis are sweeping everything on land but there's an abrupt halt when he comes to the waterline.

The capture of Greece despite the mountainous fortifications behind which the Greeks and British fought the invaders, and the further fact the German "push" marched into the mouth of the battling inferno, makes it obvious the democracies are poised on very anxious seats. The folks "back home," most of who are providing the army training camps with their sons in preparation to defend our country, are getting "fed up" on this pitching monkey-wrenches into the machine to delay Uncle Sam's defense program by various labor unions striking for higher wages and less working hours. Uncle Sam would look swell working his army men on the battle field on 8-hour shifts and squabbling for more pay. The very thing the people "back home" hope to avoid may come as a self-protection—that of the government taking over control of industrial plants in order there be no halt in the program of defense. This war is no child's game of marbles—on the contrary—a game in which the stakes are saving our country from dictator domination—that may seem to the reader a lot of crepe hanging by yours truly, or that I'm a scared wolf. To crush this monster Hitler, there is no place to wear kid gloves to carry through Uncle Sam's defense program, nor is there a place nor time to lend a listening ear to the guys who yell from the house-tops there's no danger of Hitler invading the United States. God knows I hope not, let's take no chances. That "I'll keep my hands off you if you remain neutral," policy by Hitler, is a d—n lie has been proven. At any rate should Hitler win domination of all Europe and spare the United States from invasion, the economic set up he would establish and maintain would have a very damaging effect upon the United States.

Mr. Ory was born in Uvalde, Texas in November 1877. He came to Big Spring, residing there some years, then moved to his farm 3 1/2 miles northwest of Stanton, where he has lived the past six years. He was a member of the Masonic and I. O. O. F. lodges of Stanton, and a member of the Baptist Church.

SOIL SUPERVISORS CONCLUDE MEETINGS IN THE DISTRICT

DISTRICT READY TO
RECEIVE APPLICATIONS
FOR WORK ON
INDIVIDUAL FARMS

The series of educational meetings held through Martin-Howard County Soil Conservation district last week, drew good crowds, according to Martin County Agent George Bond, who attended all the meetings. The meetings, which were held at Courtney, Lenora, Garden City, Garner, Coahoma, and Gay Hill, were conducted by the Board of Supervisors of the local soil district for the purpose of explaining what assistance farmers and ranchers may secure from the district.

Moving pictures were shown at the meetings to show some of the causes and results of soil erosion, and short talks explaining the value of saving rainfall by terracing. The district is now in a position to receive applications for the work on individual farms. Applications received early will be grouped for planning a coordinated soil and water conservation program for adjacent or nearby farms, and the supervisors have indicated they will show preference to such groups.

The supervisors meet at Stanton each month on the first Tuesday. Applications for assistance can be made to the supervisors, county agents of Martin-Howard, or Glascock counties, or to personnel of the Soil Conservation Service.

U. S. DEFENSE SAVINGS
BONDS AND POSTAL
STAMPS WENT ON
SALE THURS. AT P. O.

With the opening of the sale of Defense Savings Bonds and Savings Stamps, Thursday morning in Stanton, W. Y. Houston purchased the first Savings Bond with Wilmer Jones a close second. To little Miss Sandra Beth Poindexter, two year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Poindexter, goes the credit for purchasing the first Savings Stamp.

The drive to sell the new U. S. defense savings bonds and postal stamps started Thursday of this week. They went on sale at the post office. From the State Treasury Department at Austin, this week, came the appointment of W. Y. Houston, as chairman, of the committee who will make the drive for the sale of the bonds. Members of the committee of which Mr. Houston heads as chairman, are B. P. Eidson, James Jones, Mrs. Joe Poindexter, Mrs. G. W. Alsup, Guy Eiland, O. C. Southall, J. Morgan Hall, all of Stanton, T. Lindsay, of Tarzan; S. J. Foreman, Lenora.

These savings bonds are on sale at the local bank and the post office.

The new defense savings bond is similar to the "baby bonds" of which more than five billion dollars have been bought by more than two and a half million Americans since 1935.

Under the schedule, a defense bond purchase May 1, or thereafter, for \$18.75 will mature in 10 years at \$25, an increase of 33 1/3 per cent or 2.9 per cent per year compounded semi-annually on the investment. Any time after 60 days from the date of purchase, the bond may be redeemed for cash, in accordance with a table of redemption values carried on the bond.

A limit of \$5,000 has been set on the amount of bonds to be yearbought by any one person \$25, \$50, \$100, \$500 and \$1,000 in one year. Denominations are all sold for 75 per cent of maturity values, and which mature in 10 years. Special bonds of \$50,000 will be sold through banks.

Even school children can participate by buying 10, 25, 50 cent \$1.00 or \$5.00 postal saving stamps. When enough accumulate, they may be traded for a \$25 bond, etc.

EFFORT BEING MADE ESTABLISH FULL-TIME HEALTH SERVICE UNIT

REPRESENTATIVE OF
STATE HEALTH
DEPARTMENT HERE
IN THAT INTEREST

A full-time public health service for Martin county is being proposed, according to F. M. Hemphill, consultant of the State Health Department, who has been here working on this project the past few days.

Such service would lend its efforts toward the prevention and control of communicable disease, the education of persons to use to the best advantage the services of the community for the control of disease and the prevention of illness, and the promotion of those conditions which benefit the health of the people of the county.

The personnel of such service include a medical director, a sanitary inspector, a public health nurse, and a clerk. By the plan which has been submitted to the county officials here, the service would be combined with that of Midland county thus sharing the services of the director and the sanitary inspector but giving Martin county a full-time public health nurse. In this way the cost for the service to this county would be greatly reduced. M. Hemphill stated that if the proposal was accepted that the State Department of Health would participate financially in making the service available. Approximately 40 counties in Texas have a program at present and about two-thirds of the counties in the United States.

The proposal will be considered at the regular meeting of the commissioners court on May 12th.

fice when he first took the seat of attorney general. That motto reads: "I sacrificed no principle to gain this office and I shall sacrifice no principle to keep it." I see no good reason why I shouldn't cast my vote for Gerald C. Mann at the election June 28. The illusion to his candidacy through the columns of this newspaper beyond the political paid for advertisement, if there be any, will be little, as I believe a weekly newspaper like The Reporter, aside from taking side on some local campaign, is published for all the people of the community, and their wishes and desires upheld. They have different views to mine, (tho' under breath I am saying I hope they are like mine in this case), and I don't believe it's fair because I "control the power of the press" in Martin county, (now that sounds like the talk of a political ward-heeler), to use the newspaper to back up views to the exclusion of others whose views are not the same as mine. This is a free country and a man can speak his sentiments without fear of being Hitlerized—in other words, get his head chopped off. He's as free from having the jail doors closing behind him as the new born babe is of clothes, so long as he doesn't steal a cow and calf or shoot the daylight out of someone. So boys, if you don't see as I do in this Senatorial race, you will have to do something more than talk for and vote for anyone of Mann's opponents in this race to make me fall out with you.

MRS. HILL, POULTRY DEMONSTRATOR HAS A FLOCK OF 1395 BABY CHICKS

Mrs. Belton T. Hill, poultry demonstrator of the Brown home demonstration club, has really gone into the chicken business. She has three good brooder houses that contain baby chicks. She has 410 Rhode Island Reds seven weeks old, 485 Rhode Island Reds, five weeks old, and 500 White Leghorns of the best egg breed.

"This is our first year to use the hail screen floor and I certainly like it. I know now that it would have paid us to have been using it for years," Mrs. Hill remarked to the agent as she visited in the demonstrator's home.

Besides caring for the baby chicks, Mrs. Hill is completely remodeling her home. She has recently repainted the entire house and repainted the wood work. The kitchen has had a modern butane gas cook stove and electrolux added. The cabinet has been repainted and window curtains and shades are being added to the kitchen.

The bedroom has been put to look like an entirely different room. Two tall iron beds were sawed off and renamed to look like new. A new dressing center has been added and new curtains and shades add to the attractiveness of the room. When she has completed her task, her home will be an example of what can be done with a small amount of money and a great deal of determination and hard work on the part of the housewife and family members.

LET'S USE MORE EGGS IN 1941

4 The first week in May has been set aside as "Egg Festival Week."

Eggs are important as human food because of their nutritive value and their usefulness in combining them with other foods. Eggs are rich in protein, minerals, and vitamins, all of

which substances are needed in the growth and repair of muscle, bone, and blood.

Egg yolk is an excellent source of vitamin A, and a good source of vitamins B, D, and G. Vitamin D is necessary for the development of sound bones and teeth. Compared with milk, an equal weight of egg yolk contains ten times as much vitamin A and twice as much vitamin B. The yolk of the egg is approximately one-third fat, but fat that is not fattening. It supplies quick energy. In cooking, no other one material has such numerous uses as eggs. The recipes which follow are called true egg dishes:

Creole Eggs

1 tb. flour, 1 tb. fat.
1 cup tomato soup or pulp
1 green pepper chopped
4 to 6 eggs, 1/2 t. salt.
Cook eggs in boiling water 5 min. melt fat and blend in flour and salt. Stir tomato and pepper and cook until thickened. Slice eggs lengthwise on slices of toast, and cover with sauce. Serves four to six.

Tobasco Eggs

1 c. milk, 1/2 c. grated A cheese
1 c. heavy cream, 1 tsp. butter

3-4 t. salt, f. g. cayenne,
1/2 c. soft bread crumbs
6 eggs, 6 to 8 dashes tobasco
6 slices buttered toast

Scald milk and cream in skillet over low heat, add seasonings. Then break eggs carefully and quickly into milk. Sprinkle with cheese and the bread crumbs which have been browned in butter. Keep dipping sauce over eggs until sauce is blended and the eggs are cooked as you like them. Serves 4 to 6.

Marshmallow cup custards 4 eggs slightly beaten
1-4 c. sugar, 1/2 tsp. salt
1 qt. scalded milk
1/2 tsp. vanilla, marshmallows

Combine all ingredients but marshmallows. Turn into custard cups with a marshmallow in each. Set in pan of warm water, bake in slow oven of 325 degrees until set about 1 hour.

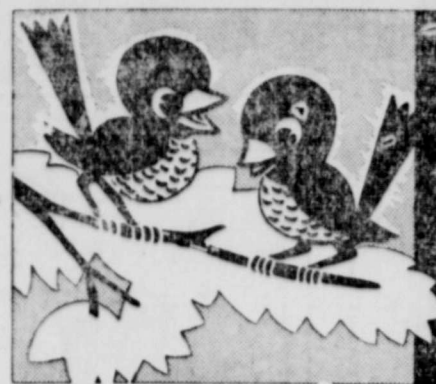

small amounts daily.

The making of good butter begins with the production of clean milk, free of off-flavors and handled in clean utensils. From two to four hours before churning time mix the different lots of cream so the temperature and ripening will be uniform throughout the whole quantity. Adjust cream to proper churning temperature. Usually from 50 to 60 degrees F. in summer and from 55 to 65 degrees in winter. Cream will not churn easily when too warm or too cold. Churning temperature should be regulated so the churning time requires from 25 to 30 minutes.

The cream should be cooled immediately after skimming and kept cool until churning time. Never mix warm freshly separated cream with cream that has been cooled as this will cause the cream to sour more quickly. Fill churn 1-3 to 1/2 full never more than 1/2 full. Remember you can't work out milk you must wash it out so when your butter granules the size of a grain of wheat remove the buttermilk from the churn and add water about the same temperature as the buttermilk unless it looks too hard or soft then add warmer or cooler water. Repeat the washing until the water comes off clear.

Use regular butter salt, about a tablespoon to the pound of butter.

FIFTEEN 4-H CLUB GIRLS RAISING CHICKENS

From the Stanton Junior 4-H club of 35 girls of grammar

school age, they're 15 raising their own chickens. The flocks vary in number from 25 to 150, and several different breeds are represented. Several different types of brooders are being used. Those raising chickens are Maydell Hogue, Helen Follis, Juanita Anderson, Dixie Minnix, Betty Ruth Gibson, Billie Thomason, Eddie Dail Payton, and June Reynolds.

June Reynolds has two different flocks. She has 72 White leghorns that are two weeks old and 25 that are three weeks old. She uses the home-made lamp brooder.

Some of the club girls are doing more club work than raising chickens. June Reynolds, Katherine Avery, and Johnnie Ruth White are improving their bedrooms also.

4-H CLUB REPORTER RAISES CHICKENS

Charlene Butcher, age 12, of the Flower Grove community, has 100 white leghorn chickens that were purchased when two weeks old. Charlene uses a distillate brooder. She uses hay litter on the floor and every other morning the old litter is removed and new litter added. The feed for the chickens is made from the crushed maize grown on the Butcher farm with protein supplement added.

Charlene has not lost a single chick during these three weeks.

POULTRY DEMONSTRATOR PLANS FOOD SUPPLY

"Our grocery bill is not going to be so large next year as it has been this year, for I plan to do more home canning. I intend to can more than 300 quarts of food," remarked Mrs. Louis Wren to the home demonstration agent as she visited in the Wren home.

Mrs. Wren has a very nice garden started and she will have at least 15 different types of vegetables in her garden when she gets it all planted. The family has its own orchard and grape vineyard to supply a great percent of the family's fruit.

Mrs. Wren has gone into the chicken business in a big way.

She has 280 straight run white leghorns that are 10 weeks old. She bought 289 baby chicks that were one week old and has lost only nine during these nine weeks. She has already begun to serve her family fried chicken. Mrs. Wren has bought another flock of 276 chickens that were one week old and still has 275 after keeping them for a week and a half. She uses straw on the bottom of the brooder house and changes it to add fresh straw from two to three times each week. She uses a commercial feed and has a kerosene brooder.

Mrs. Wren plans to keep pullets for a laying flock and to sell some of the roosters and to serve to her family and can the others.

The Wrens have several milk cows, which provide plenty of good milk and butter for the family and an extra supply to sell.

Mrs. Wren is by no means doing all of this by herself for she has cooperation of the entire family.

She enlarged on the subject and gave a very interesting and informative talk. Nora Allene Purser and Juanita Anderson gave vocal duets, "Roll Out the Barrel" and "Memories," with Mrs. R. G. DeBerry at the piano. O. C. Southall, superintendent of the Stanton schools, has been co-operative in every way during the year each time the club called on him and in appreciation of these favors Mrs. Earl Powell, president of the club presented a fac-simile of the Constitution of the United States to the class in American history, on behalf of the club. In the absence of Mr. Southall, Mrs. Harold D. Haley, teacher of English, accepted the gift.
