3 Ozona Youths Attending Range Camp At Junction

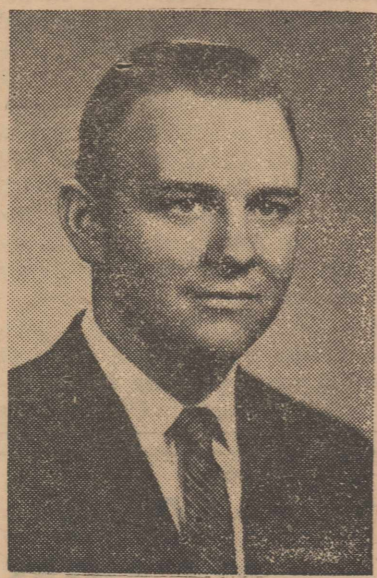
Outstanding 4-H and FFA Boys of Texas Are At Camp

Junction, July 30 — The seventh annual Youth Range Camp for outstanding 4-H and FFA boys of Texas opened this morning with registration at the A&M Adjunct near here. The camp is sponsored by the Texas Section of the American Society of Range Management.

The boys were selected on a basis of outstanding 4-H and FFA work and interest in or projects with range management. Expenses for each boy attending the camp were secured from local banks, service clubs, soil conservation districts, livestock associations, farms and other organizations.

The week's camp is designed to give outstanding range and ranch boys an opportunity for additional training in range management, leadership and recreation. The program will include study, judging range conditions, wildlife management, ranch planning and field trips to the Awbrey Kothmann and Pierce Hoggett ranches, and the Ranch Experiment Station, Sonora. A well planned recreational and entertainment program is planned for the group between instruction periods. Land Owners Benefit From Changes In Great Plains Savings Plan

Two changes have been made in the Great Plains Conservation Program recently, that should be of interest to the Crockett County ranchers, Dick Ketchum, work unit conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service, announced this week.

The formula for determining total allowable cost sharing under the Great Plains contracts, \$2500 times the number of years, has been eliminated. The amount of cost sharing is now limited to \$25,000 for any one contract regardless of the number of years in the contract.

The other change in the Great Plains Conservation Program is that cost share payments will be based on a percent of the actual cost not to exceed an average cost. Ketchum was informed. Formerly cost sharing was based on a percent of an average cost established by the Crockett County Great Plains Committee.

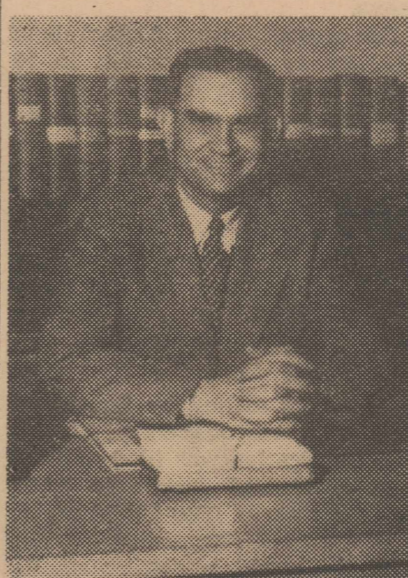
Confirmer Completed In Northwest Crockett

The El Cinco (Devonian) field gained its third producer and a location southwest extension with completion of Shell Oil Co. No. 1-24 C. D. Johns, Crockett County project, six miles south-southwest of McCamey.

It was finished for a daily flowing potential of 361 of 41.2 gravity oil, with gas-oil ratio of 694-1. Production was through a 14-64-inch choke and perforations between 5,143-236 feet. Tubing pressure was 700 pounds.

Location is 3,738 feet from the northeast and 660 feet from the southeast lines of 24-31-H&T.C.

The field has one producer across the river in Pecos County.

THE MOON CAN WAIT

The most obvious and rational thing in the world is that conservative leaders on both sides of the aisle in Congress should feel, in backing President Kennedy's appeal for a \$3.5 billion step-up in defense spending, that a comparable amount — or as near to it as possible — be pared off less vital spending in the interests of national solvency.

Lead-off man in voicing such warnings was Virginia's economy-minded Senator Harry Byrd, who though supporting the preparedness program, said that the President himself should lead the search for places to cut non-defense spending.

The President himself, in his message to Congress urged the members to "keep down all expenditures not thoroughly justified by budget requests." But his spokesmen have been quick to argue that his domestic spending bills are designed to strengthen the economy — and must be passed.

The Senate and House minority leaders, Dirksen and Halleck, threw their full support back of the stepped-up defense spending but have demanded cut-backs on civilian spending.

Discovery Indicated In Southland Royalty Test West of Ozona

An unidentified Permian discovery has been indicated in Crockett County with the flowing 167 barrels of new oil in approximately 18 hours when drilling reached 3,444 feet at Southland Royalty Co., et al, No. 1-23 University, re-entered 2,200-foot failure, 14 miles west-northwest of Ozona.

The project flowed 84 barrels of 34.4 gravity oil, no water, in 12 hours through a 3/4-inch choke. Tubing pressure was 0-50 pounds. Total recovery for about 18 hours was 167 barrels of new oil.

Operator killed the well with mud and cored from 3,444-494 feet, recovering 50 feet of shale. Operator then ran logs and was waiting on orders.

The formation is below the San Andres and above the Wolfcamp.

Originally drilled by Southland Royalty, it was abandoned May 2, 1958 Application was filed in June to re-enter and deepen to 8,500 feet for tests of the Ellenburger.

And that, we would say, includes the \$8.8 billion, five-year, back-door borrowing foreign aid measure tentatively approved a matter of hours later by the House Foreign Affairs Committee.

Nor can we afford at this time to embark on that \$20 billion excursion to find out what the moon is really made of.

U. S. Army Reservists of Area Spend Training Day In Sonora Armory

Sunday, July 30, 1961, saw 23 United States Army Reservists spend a standard military day beginning at 1730 and ending at 1630, (4:30 p. m.) training in and around Sonora Armory. Reservists included Capt. Merton M. Skaggs who commands Sprawling Troop "B" of the 15th Cavalry with his first and second platoons in Sonora.

But this is not a good picture of the Sonora USAR platoons. Of the 23 men assembled, four came from San Angelo, seven each came from Eldorado and Ozona, while five live in Sonora.

Another 15 men belonging to the 1st and 2nd platoons are away on six-month active duty with the Army. Of these, four are from Sonora, five from Eldorado, and six from Ozona.

Sunday's full day of drill saw the Army Reservists study the Military Code of Conduct, this instruction being presented by 2nd Lt. James G. Kimrey of San Angelo who commands the First Platoon, and included films on the subject.

The USAR personnel ate a strictly military noon meal prepared by Mess Sgt. Smith of Junction on a M1937 Field Range.

The afternoon saw Reservists rehearse prepare for instruction for coming drill periods, take the lumbering M-41 tank out for an exercise period down a county road, repair and adjust two jeeps, and soberly go about their business of being worthy components of General Earl Rudder's famed Texas' 90th Division, on Call.

Ozona Coaching Staff To Attend Coaching School

Harbinger Of Fall Is Pre-Season Clinic In Santone

At least four members of Ozona's coaching staff expect to be in attendance next week at the annual Texas High School Coaches Association school and clinic to be held in San Antonio this year.

Coaches Fred Hickman, Byron Cleere, and Chick Womeck will leave from Ozona Sunday with Coach Brooks Doizer joining the group from Austin where he is attending the University of Texas this summer.

The annual coaching school, which lasts a week, will end just about a week prior to the opening practice session in Ozona which

is scheduled to get under way this year on the 14th of August.

The school will once again have the north vs south all-star football game and basketball game. The football game is scheduled for Thursday night, Aug. 10th.

The present coaching school idea was pioneered in San Antonio and there are predictions that this year's school will set a new attendance record. Each of the schools for the past several years has surpassed the mark, due in part to the ever increasing number of high schools in Texas, and also to the greatly increased interest being paid to such sports as basketball and track which were formally given scant notice.

From The Stockman, Aug. 4, 1932

Perfect purity in milk supply will be available to Ozona people by September 1 or shortly thereafter when complete modern equipment for pasteurization will be installed at the Mike Couch dairy.

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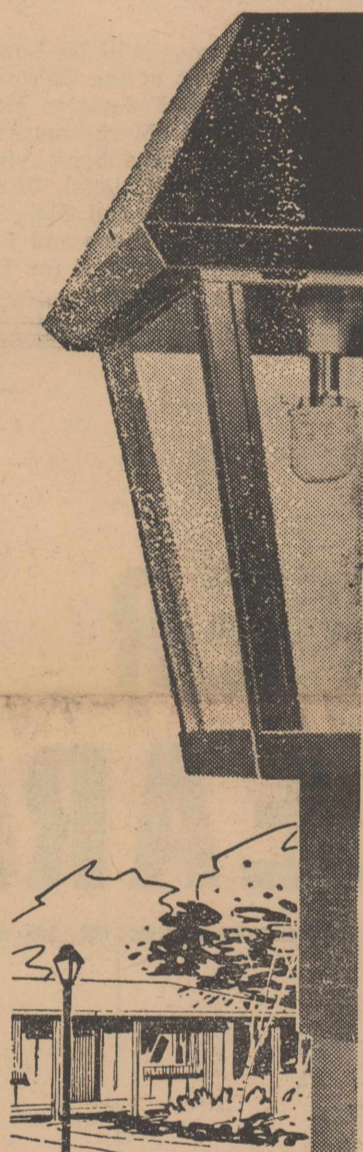

Notes From The County Agent's Office

By Pete W. Jacoby

Sheep and lamb slaughter is becoming a more important item in Texas each year. In 1950, only four percent of the U. S. Commercial slaughter could be accounted for by Texas, but by 1960 this figure had increased to 8 percent of the total, says Ed Vacek, extension livestock marketing specialist.

Continuing this trend, federally inspected slaughter of sheep and lamb during the first half of 1961 has far exceeded slaughter for the same period of 1960. The principal gain occurred in the South Central region, which includes Texas. During the first quarter of 1961 the South Central region showed a 33 percent increase over the first quarter of 1960, while the U. S. as a whole showed only 10 percent increase. Heavy slaughter during these months was also evident in the Mountain and West North Cen-

tral areas of the country, continues Uvacek. Forecasts indicate slaughter will continue close to last year's level for the rest of the year. South Central slaughter, however, will probably drop lower during the July-September quarter.

Since 1957, January 1 inventories of sheep and lambs on Texas farms have increased 37 percent and now total 6.2 million head. This increase represents a reversal of the trend started in the mid 1940's when there was a nationwide shift out of the sheep business.

This year, Texas sheep received the highest condition rating ever for a July 1. The Western Range states showed sheep conditions averaging the same as last year's level, and slightly better than last month.

With a reasonably strong slaughter yet to come and an already depressed market, the outlook is for seasonally lower prices into the fall with some possible improvement late in the year, says Uvacek. Live lamb prices will probably be slightly below the corresponding year's levels in the fall and feed-

er prices are also expected to be forced down by these low slaughter lamb prices.

Texas' 1961 wool production is estimated at 54.3 million pounds, the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service announced this past month. This is 5 percent above last year's production. The 1961 wool clip is the highest since 1948 when production was 55.7 million pounds.

The number of sheep to be shorn is an estimated 6.6 million head, 4 percent above the 6.4 million head shorn last year. This is the highest number of sheep to be shorn since 1951. The increase in sheep shorn accounts for the increase in wool production.

An average weight per fleece of 8.2 pounds, the same as last year, is expected. The 10-year average fleece weight is 7.9 pounds.

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1910 - THE OZONA WOMAN'S CLUB - 1960 FIFTY YEARS OF COMMUNITY SERVICE

Past President

Mrs. Carl Colwick, the twenty-first president of the Ozona Woman's Club, was a very active club member in Stephenville, Texas, and in First District before coming to Ozona. She was welfare chairman under Mrs. M. H. Hagaman, also State Health chairman under Mrs. Volney Taylor from 1933 to 1936.

Other local officers were Mrs. Stephen Perner, first vice president; Mrs. B. B. Ingham, second vice president; Mrs. W. R. Baggett, recording secretary; Mrs. A. C. Hoover, corresponding secretary; Miss Elizabeth Fussell, treasurer; Mrs. N. W. Graham, historian, and Mrs. A. E. Deland, parliamentarian and critic.

New members were Mrs. M. Johnson, Mrs. Mike Friend, and Mrs. J. A. Marley. A new committee with Mrs. Joe Davidson as chairman was the club house committee. It was to investigate the possibility of a club house for the community, but war efforts made this impossible at the time.

Mrs. Stephen Perner and the program committee built an informative study around the topic Building for Better Citizenship. The yearbook contained the poem "Women Arise" by Edwin Markam, which was dedicated to the clubwomen of America, a framed copy of which was presented to the TFWC Headquarters building in Austin, by Miss Decca Lamar West of Waco at the Golden Jubilee Program.

The year's work opened with a program honoring the pioneer women of Crockett County, directed by the president, Mrs. Colwick. Those reminiscing were Mrs. Laura Hoover, who told of her move from Arkansas to Llano, then to Junction and on to Crockett County in 1880. She drove one wagon, taking care of their two children, and the baby calves too young to walk with the herd and slung under the wagon in a "coonie". Mrs. Fayette Schwalbe came to Ozona as a bride from Shenwood and stopped at Mammy Kirk's Hotel before going on to

the ranch south of town.

Mrs. T. A. Kincaid said they arrived in Ozona from San Angelo by wagon with a very sick child. Mrs. Mary Perner, with her seven children, came also by wagon from Bandera to Comstock where they spent the night in a dugout, two days later coming to Ozona where Mr. Perner had established a store.

Mrs. Charles E. Davidson related how her family moved from Taylor County near Buffalo Gap to this area in 1890. They stopped for six months in Sherwood for school. Her father drilled one of the first wells by using horse power. Mrs. A. C. Hoover attended the first school in Ozona and Mrs. Wilse Owens recounted her family's move from Emerald to Ozona for school.

Other outstanding programs were a Latin American Literature and Art exhibit at which the Sonora Club women were guests. The Club sponsored Mrs. Volney W. Taylor of Brownsville (former TFWC president, and state commander of the woman's field army for cancer control in a lecture and tea for the public at the Methodist Church. About fifty attended including Mrs. Earl Duncan, Mrs. Joe Trainer, Mrs. John Fields, Mrs.

Lloyd Earwood, Mrs. Duke Wilson, Mrs. C. A. Taylor, Mrs. E. E. Sawyer and Mrs. O. G. Babcock of Sonora.

Federation and defense was the topic of discussion by Mrs. George Bean, local defense chairman, who suggested sending magazines to service centers. Mrs. Bert Couch discussed the organization of a Red Cross first aid course which was endorsed by the club. The Club gave defense stamps as awards for the best posters on safety and health by the students of junior high and the Latin American school on the safety and health program. Winners were Pierce Reese, Lois Nell Williams, Robert Pennington, Sam Perner, Adalene Yancy, Edna Martinez, Alma Castillo and Antonio Cardenas.

Mrs. Hubert Baker was delegate to the Sixth District convention in Menard and reported that Miss Elizabeth Fussell, retiring first vice president of the District, was honored by the local club with a coffee in the home of Mrs. Edgar Wilkerson of Menard, during the convention. Miss Fussell was delegate to the state convention in Ft. Worth.

The same officers served Mrs. Colwick during her second term as president. New members were Mrs. J. M. Baggett, Mrs. Hugh Childress, Mrs. L. K. Brown, Mrs. Neal Hannah, Mrs. Clyde Childers, Mrs. L. B. Cox, Jr., Mrs. A. W. Jones and Mrs. John Bailey.

The topic of study for the second term was facing a new day with stress upon service, with Mrs. George Bean chairman of the committee with Mrs. Joe Pierce, Mrs. Max Schneemann and Miss Elizabeth Fussell.

The opening meeting was in the home of Mrs. Charles Williams. Mrs. Max Schneemann discussed her visit to her son, Max Jr., at Ft. Lewis, Washington. Mrs. B. B. Ingham, Red Cross Chairman reported thirteen members had made forty-two garments in the current quota.

Other interesting programs were the garden program which had forty-four arrangements in the

flower shop. Those winning prizes were Mrs. Neal Hannah, Mrs. Scott Peters, Mrs. Hillery Phillips, Mrs. Massie West, Mrs. Joe Davidson, Mrs. B. B. Ingham, Mrs. Geo. Montgomery and Mrs. Wayne West. Russia was discussed by Houston Smith and Mrs. Carl Colwick reviewed the book, "Kremlin and the People" by Walter Duranty, Mrs. Neal Hannah played a composition by Tchaikowsky.

Guest day in the home of Mrs. B. B. Ingham was a Bible program. Mrs. Winnie Fox of Lampasas gave an interesting talk on travels in Palestine. Music was by Mrs. Ed Lewis and Mrs. Neal Hannah. Mrs. Hubert Baker read "In Palestine with the 23rd Psalm."

The point rationing system was explained by Mrs. M. A. Westerman, teacher of home economics in the local school system. She closed her talk with an appeal to the club members for victory gardens and saving of all foods.

Post war world was the topic of a talk by C. S. Denham, Superintendent of schools, who gave an absorbing review of world history as affecting developments toward present world conflict, the alliance and pacts made and broken, the requirements for world relations after the war if the peace is to be permanent.

Mrs. Stephen Perner was delegate to the Sixth District convention in Coleman. Others attending were Mrs. Colwick, who won first place on a quiz show, Mrs. Hubert Baker, and Miss Elizabeth Fussell. Miss Fussell was delegate to the state convention in Dallas.

The club had many projects during these two years, other than the regular clean up campaign, care for the cemetery, aid to schools, donation to District, State and General funds etc. The club was active in war work such as sending cookies and magazines to Army camps, filling 25 Red Cross Kits,

\$10.00 to aid in the rehabilitation of Camp Bowie, making layettes for Red Cross knitting, donation to U. S. Navy relief, service men's Christmas boxes, purchasing of war bonds and defense stamps, working in home nursing and canning food classes.

Mrs. W. E. Smith was added to the In Memoriam list of Club members.

Grace Colwick was the daughter of Fred Henry Chandler and his wife, Annie Clark Chandler, of Stephenville, Texas, which was her birth place. She was educated in the public schools and attended Arlington State College of Stephenville and received an A. B. degree from Lindenwood College of St. Charles, Missouri. She was married to Carl Davis Colwick in Stephenville where they made their home for several years, moving to Ozona about 1937, where her husband was engaged in ranching on the Childress ranch north of town.

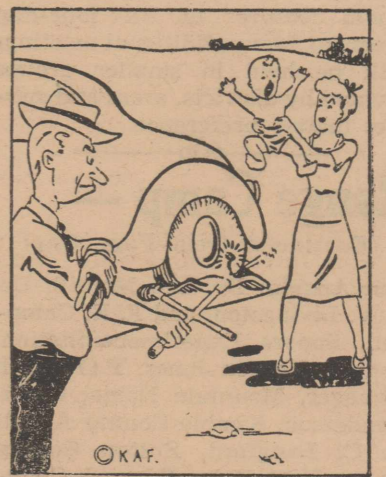
While in Ozona Mrs. Colwick was an active worker in the Methodist Church and many civic affairs. She was captain of the Women's Field Army of Crockett County in Cancer Education, bringing Dr. J. V. Brindley of Scott and White to lecture on cancer. Always a responsive and responsible member of the club, she held many offices locally and served the district under Mrs. C. D. Bruce of Santa Anna. She attended many conventions always returning to share her enthusiasm with others.

Mr. and Mrs. Colwick later returned to Stephenville where they made their home with her mother, who was ill at that time. Her interests turned to her church and was general chairman of the Christian Woman's Fellowship. She also devoted much time to the public library, as well as to the usual club work. Her personal hobbies beyond home making were

reading, collecting glass and paintings, and her nieces and nephews. Mrs. Colwick returned to celebrate the golden anniversary of the Ozona Woman's Club last fall, saying her club work was most rewarding and the associations very delightful.

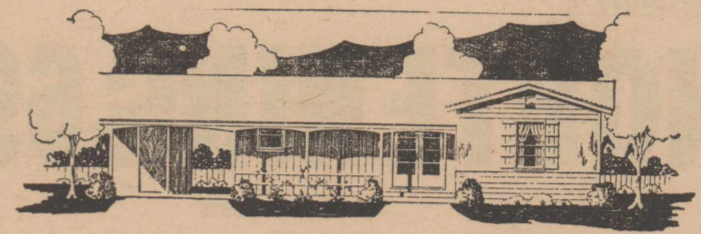


