PRESERVATION OF RESOURCES IS STRESSED

WASHINGTON, April 16.—President Roosevelt called on the nation today to carry on with renewed vigor the government policy of preserving natural resources.

The chief executive spoke at the corner stone laying of the new \$12,000,000 department of interior building under construction.

Secretary of Interior Harold Ickes joined the president in urging conservation of resources and called on congress to change his department name to "the department of conservation."

"A nation less bountifully endowed than ours, without a national policy of conservation would have ceased to exist long ago. The remarkable thing was the people of the United States were so complacent so long in the face of exploitation, waste and mismanagement, yes, even larceny of the national wealth that belongs to all the people," President Roosevelt said.

Houston People Are Getting Relief From Three Places

HOUSTON.—Houston people are getting relief from three sources, W. W. Whitson, Texas relief administrator, pointed out in a review of the relief situation.

The federal government is entirely out of direct relief and has only a work relief program, the WPA. This is now furnishing jobs for 5,808 family heads here. More than 1,000 have been cut from the WPA rolls since March 15.

The Texas relief commission, under very strict regulations, is taking care of families with no employable member. This aid is being extended to 3,900 cases in this county. It will continue until July. Then about 1,600 of the cases will be eligible for old age pensions.

Surplus commodities from the federal surplus commodity corporation are being used to supplement relief from the state.

Unemployables are receiving these commodities through relief commission case workers. The articles were bought by the government because of surplus market conditions. They do not form an adequate diet.

These are the only agencies to which the unemployed can turn for relief.

They are already operating at full capacity and no more can be added to the load, Whitson said.

The WPA must continue to reduce its rolls. Another 1,000 must go by May 31. The WPA is expected to last only through June.

The community chest recently exhausted its relief funds and stopped aid to 700 or 800 families which could not qualify for either WPA or state relief.

Allred To Speak At Teachers' Meet

BEAUMONT, Tex.—Governor James V. Allred was expected to speak at the annual Southeast Division convention of the Texas State Teachers Association here April 25-26.

S. Mortimer Brown of Bryan, president of the group, will be in charge of the sessions which were expected to attract 5,000 teachers to Beaumont.

President A. L. Threlkeld of the department of superintendence of the National Education Association and superintendent of schools at Denver, Colo., will be one of the speakers.

Others will be Dr. T. D. Brooke, dean of the Texas A. & M. Graduate School; Douglas Malloch of Chicago and L. A. Wood, Texas superintendent of education.

CRATES MADE INTO DESKS

SAN BERNARDINO, Cal.—The city school management has attained the high peak in economies. Teachers' desks are made at \$22 each from packing crates as against the factory produced article at \$30. The desks are serviceable, money is saved and employment given to local cabinet makers.

Rev. Mr. Estes succeeds the Rev. Alfred M. Dorsett of Snyder. The Eastland and Strawn pastor was formerly moderator of the Presbytery. In that position he was succeeded by the Rev. William Grogan, pastor of the Presbyterian church at Stamford.

One Post Office Is Put Out of Business

GLORYETTA, Calif., April 16.—The postoffice was closed today for lack of business. Postmaster Walter Gregory reported total transactions of 42 cents in stamp sales for the past 10 days. Rent is \$20 a month. He asked to be relieved.

Desdemona Makes Burglary Bail Bond

Jonah White, indicted Dec. 4, 1935 by a 91st district court grand jury for alleged burglary, made \$1,000 bond this week.

Indictment charges White with entrance Nov. 11, 1935 of a residence owned by W. H. Davis. Sheriff Virge Foster stated White was arrested at Desdemona.

Meixco Creates a Fund For Industry

MEXICO CITY, April 16.—President Cardenas issued a decree today creating a fund for industrial development to be handled through the government-controlled "National Mortgage, Urban and Public Works Bank."

Appropriations will be made as needed for the fund. Cardenas ordered the bank to present a definite program for aid in developing the national industries under a six-year plan of economic development.

Oldest Oil Lease Near Nacogdoches

NACOGDOCHES, Tex.—What is believed to be Texas' oldest oil lease will be exhibited by R. R. Lambert of Nacogdoches at the Texas Centennial Exposition in Dallas, which opens June 6.

The instrument, dated Sept. 18, 1886, was executed by Dr. E. M. Smith, Lambert's uncle, to President H. J. Litcher and Secretary J. A. Bentley of the Pennsylvania Oil Company.

Texas' first oil field was discovered near here in 1866. Oil seeped through the surface of the ground and formed pools. There still are profitable oil mines in the Nacogdoches, the only ones in the state, so shallow is the producing strata.

Oil is drawn from shafts in barrels lowered by windlasses. The Smith lease covered 231 acres near the town of Chireno.

WIND, RAINS REPORTED OVER WEST TEXAS

Windstorms and rain, sweeping West Texas Wednesday night and Thursday, caused two deaths and property damage.

S. Roach, 36, a bank teller and L. B. Hanson, 25, service station owner, were drowned in Lake Nasworthy near San Angelo, when a sudden gust of wind churned up waves which overturned their boat.

The bodies were recovered on Thursday morning.

Westward winds of tornado proportions caused damage to three tourist camps, the high school athletic stadium and other buildings in Midland and high winds accompanied by rain were reported at Big Spring and Abilene. Abilene reported rain of 2.2 inches, scattered thunderstorms drenched other portions of the south plains and far West Texas.

Additional rains Thursday in both east and West Texas were forecast by the weather bureau, which explained a high pressure area had encountered warm currents from the Rio Grande Valley.

Two homes, several barns and windmills were blown down at Roscoe, 9 miles west of Sweetwater. Sweetwater reported a 40 mile an hour gale, preceded by a severe sandstorm.

Eastland and Ballinger reported .65 of an inch of rainfall last night accompanied by high winds.

Funeral services were conducted Thursday afternoon at 2:30 at the First Methodist church of Ranger for Van Wayland Blanchard, 59, who died at his home in Ranger after a short illness.

The services were conducted by Rev. T. E. Bowman, pastor of the church. Interment was in the Eastland cemetery, following the services at the Ranger church. Killingsworth, Cox was in charge of arrangements.

The deceased had been a resident of Ranger for a number of years, having been engaged in business in the town. He is survived by his widow and one son, Charles Blanchard.

Per Well Plan of Proration Urged

AUSTIN, April 16.—J. O. Galeke, Amarillo, member of the state board of education, appeared at the railroad commission oil proration hearing today to demand continuance of the "per well" plan of allowed production as opposed to an acreage plan. He said he acted on instructions of the state board of education.

Galeke told the commission the proposed field rule for the Corpus Christi area is of interest to the board of education at this time because of the large tracts of submerged school lands there that are to be offered for oil exploration bids on May 4.

Italian Soldiers Advance to South

ROME, April 16.—Italian soldiers have resumed their advance south along the Sudanese frontier, moving farther into a zone vital to Great Britain because it is the source of the Nile, dispatches from Italian headquarters said today.

Their objective is believed Borni, Ethiopian frontier town, commanding more routes and another tributary of the Nile, the Rahad river, 28 miles down the frontier from Gallabat, which they took several days ago.

Court Reversed Self In Giving Doggett Ruling

Withdrawing a former opinion affirming his sentence of death, the court of criminal appeals Wednesday granted a new trial to Clifford Doggett, from Eastland county. "Former jeopardy" was the reason given by the court in its unique reversal of itself.

In the early fall of 1934 Doggett was tried at Baird for robbery in connection with the death of L. F. Threet, elderly ranchman of Callahan county, who was assaulted and robbed Aug. 25, that year, on his ranch, dying in a Cisco hospital. The jury returned a life sentence against Doggett.

In September that year Doggett was tried in Eastland county for Threet's murder. He was convicted and given the death penalty. The case went up on appeal, and Wednesday the criminal appeals judges held that the earlier life sentence conviction constituted former jeopardy. The court said: "Proof is conclusive that in conviction for murder he (Doggett) was convicted of the same transaction and upon the same evidence upon which he was previously convicted of robbery with firearms."

Three persons were indicted for Threet's death. One of the trio, a woman, Mary Lou Howell, drew a 20-year sentence in Callahan county on conviction of robbery. Last Dec. 11 the criminal appeals court granted her a new trial on the ground of insufficient evidence. The case has not been re-set. The third defendant, Elmer Van Cleave, was used as a state's witness and, although under indictment for murder and robbery, has not been tried.

Famed Picture In Capitol Building Not to Be Lost

HOUSTON, April 16.—Texas officials appeared today to be worried needlessly today over title to "the surrender of Santa Anna," historical painting that hangs at the entrance to the capitol building at Austin.

A reproduction of the painting was sent to Austin with a notation the picture was owned and copyrighted by Charles W. Johnson in Harrisburg.

That sent the officials into a search of state records to clear up title of the painting. Johnson said today he does not claim the copyright on the painting, merely holding exclusive rights to an arrangement of the picture in a layout.

Rain Proves Help For Planting; Is Gauged at .65 Inch

Rainfall Thursday morning was of especial benefit to grain sorghum planting and all crops, according to Assistant County Agent Hugh F. Barnhart.

The precipitation was gauged at 7:30 a. m. by Eastland Official Weather Observer J. A. Beard at .65 of an inch. Further rain fell after the gauge was taken.

The rain was the second this month. Precipitation April 9 was recorded at .05 of an inch.

Wild Gas Well In Beaumont Is Out of Control

BEAUMONT, April 16.—A wild gas well on the outskirts of Beaumont spouted a white hot column of flame into the air today with a roar audible for several miles.

With an explosion that rocked buildings in the city, Glenn McCarthy's Long No. 2, offset well, in the northern part of the new Amelia suburban oil area, blew out of control today. The well burst into flames and in a few minutes its blistering heat melted down a 122-foot steel derrick and destroyed a \$50,000 drilling rig. Light from the well was so bright it illuminated the western part of Beaumont.

LEAGUE PLANS FOR PEACE HIT A NEW SNAG

Geneva, April 16.—League efforts to arrange peace talks between Italy and Ethiopia struck a snag when Ethiopia announced it could not accept Italian proposals.

Italy, flaunting the league authority, demanded Ethiopia sue for peace direct to army headquarters in East Africa. Peace negotiations then would be held between the two nations in Switzerland with league participation barred.

The Ethiopian representatives informed Salvador de Madariaga, chairman of the league committee of 13 on peace efforts, that Ethiopia could not agree.

The United Press was informed that Baron Pompeo Aloisi for Italy had made the following proposals:

1. Ethiopia must start negotiations with Badoglio, following the World War precedent when an armistice was signed between the allied and German general staff.

2. Italy would then be ready for peace talks in Switzerland.

3. Italy would keep the committee of 13 informed of the progress of the negotiations, but the league will not be represented at them.

4. The league must guarantee Italy's security against Ethiopian attack if Italy agrees to cease hostilities.

You Can't Economize and Go on Spending

The small boy who wanted to eat his cake and have it, too, was in no worse fix than the politician of 1936 who keeps one eye on the job he hopes to get and the other on the voters who, he hopes, will hand it to him.

For the politician, these days, is becoming the victim of a squeeze. He is finding himself pinned between two apparently irresistible forces, and there is no sign that either of them is going to let up.

On the one hand, there is the overwhelming necessity for strict government economy; on the other, the equally overwhelming need for government to do a good many things that it never dreamed of doing before.

The sad plight of the office-seeker, sitting right between these opposing forces is beautifully illustrated by the recent campaign speech of an Illinois gentleman who is running for the Senate.

This individual, as quoted in the current New Republic, declared himself thus:

"I favor discontinuance of the orgy of spending in Washington, thereby reducing the cost of government and taxation . . . I favor deepening and widening the channel of the Illinois river. . . I favor deepening and widening the Hennepin canal. . . Federal funds should be advanced to the railroads to repair and rebuild the roadbeds and tracks by hand labor. . . In farm legislation, the government should make grants to the states—the states to pay bounties to the farmers for removing 25 to 30 per cent of their acreage from production."

And there we have it. This politician takes a bold and forthright stand for strict economy—and, in the same breath, declares with equally bold forthrightness for policies which would make economy impossible.

You can't laugh it off by saying that this particular vote-hunter is not quite right in the head, because to some extent every politician in the land is in the same boat.

The heart-rending plight of the present national administration, which went into office pledged to cut government costs by 25 per cent, is the most notable example; the reductio ad absurdum is the case of the Michigan candidate for Congress, who demanded rigid economy, adoption of the Townsend Plan, and payment of the soldiers' bonus.

Where do we come out on all this, anyway? We simply can't go on spending forever at our present rate; but the minute we start to cut expenses, we tread heavily on the toes of some vested interest, some vocal and influential section of the voting populace, some utterly essential activity that has to be done by someone regardless. And so what?

Perhaps the only way out is for us to decide which of the two we want and then stick to it. We can't have both; by demanding both we are giving our office-seekers headaches and turning politics into a three-ring circus. It's just about time that we began to get wise to ourselves.

BANGKOK, Siam.—By order of the Siamese government the "panung," the national "pants" of the Siamese, is abolished in favor of European trousers. The order has caused consternation throughout Siam.

For centuries the natives have worn the gaily colored "panung" which was a length of material, some ten feet long and three feet broad, wound round the thighs so that they looked like very short shorts.

Only the women may now continue wearing the "panung."

Daisies Deal Death To Many Insects

Strange as it may seem, a beautiful red daisy closely related to our common daisy with its orange disc center and white petals (she loves me—she loves me not) is the deadliest enemy of house flies, mosquitoes and other perennial pests. Contact with this colorful field flower instantly gives the insects a nervous breakdown (no fooling!) and within a few seconds, unable to forage for food or water, they starve to death.

"Pyrethrum," scientists call the deadly daily essence, which they now use as a powerful killing constituent in insect spray. And today when flies, roaches, moths or whatnots get on the harassed housewife's nerves she goes them one better. She flies for the spray gun and gives the flies a swift and deadly case of nervous prostration.

It was a Jugo-Slavish hausfrau who accidentally discovered the insect-killing power of the pyrethrum daisy when she picked a bouquet of the bright red flowers and put them on a table in the house. Later she noticed a great number of dead insects around the bouquet. Subsequently, small European manufacturers ground the flowers into a fine powder and distributed it about the Continent as a dust to be blown at insects by means of small bellows. More recently, pyrethrum daisy growing has become an agricultural industry in various countries and the Gulf Oil Corp. of Penna.—Gulf Refining Co. imports vast quantities of the death-dealing yellow dust for use in its insect sprays.

According to Dr. William A. Simanton, entomologist at Gulf's

The organs and functions of insect bodies are decidedly different in many respects from those of the human body and those of animals and birds. Hence pyrethrum, so deadly to flies, mosquitoes, roaches, moths and other insects and their larvae, has no effect on human beings or their pets. So if the dog or the cat or "the old man" gets on the housewife's nerves, the Gulf spray gun won't do much good.
