HICKMAN DEATH SENTENCE UPHeld

PASTOR JAILED

Held In Contempt
Of Injunction In
Tabernacle Fuss

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, July 5.—The Rev. Earl Anderson, 35, pastor of the Fundamental Baptist church, is in the county jail here and must remain there from day to day until he shall purge himself of contempt of Judge Towne Young's court.

Deputy sheriffs escorted the pastor to jail today after Judge Young had fined him \$100 and sentenced him to jail until he shall post a \$1,000 assurance bond that the court's restraining order to cease work on the new tabernacle will be respected.

Will Pay Fine Now
In court Dr. Anderson declared that he would not at this time pay the fine or post the bond. Judge Young stopped him in a courtroom speech and ordered him taken to jail.

Eighteen others, cited to appear before Judge Young, were discharged by the court because they probably held a misconception of the facts. He warned them, however, that a like fate would await them if they continued work on the structure while the injunction was in force.

Dr. Frank Norris, Port Worth evangelist, advised Dr. Anderson not to pay the fine. He said steps would be taken to obtain his release through habeas corpus proceedings. Dr. Norris announced he would make arrangements for Dr. Anderson to preach all day Sunday from the county jail through a remote control radio hook-up with Dr. Norris' Port Worth station.

Mrs. Lula Seale, sheriff of Dallas county said there would be no objection to the arrangement.

Many Complaints Made
The telephone at police headquarters rang constantly last night when residents in the vicinity of the tabernacle reported that they were unable to sleep because of noise made by the workmen, who remained on the job throughout the night.

The injunction restraining work on the tabernacle was issued by Judge Young at the request of property owners who declared that the proposed structure did not conform to the city building code and would constitute a fire hazard.

HEROIC DEEDS
MARK MISHAPS

MAN LOSES OWN LIFE IN
SUCCESSFUL RESCUE
OF THREE OTHERS.

(By Associated Press)
ATLANTA, Ga., July 5.—Heroic deeds marked two independent day mishaps in the south, one of them accompanied by a sacrifice of one life to save four.

Charles H. Rutherford, 43, prominent Richmond, Va., real estate operator was drowned after saving his wife and three other persons from the Potomac river near his summer home at Church Point farm. He dragged them to a rowboat from treacherous currents, then collapsed while hanging on the side of the craft as it was being rowed ashore.

Attracted by screams a group of Boy Scouts of Mount Dora, Fla., prevented an imminent panic in a movie theater. They dashed into the burning building and led 50 persons to safety after a film had exploded firing the projection room. The structure was wrecked with a loss of \$50,000.

Woman Killed As
Auto Is Wrecked

FRANKLIN, Pa., July 5.—Mrs. Gladys Beers Sullivan, 18, mother of three children was instantly killed last night when an explosion wrecked the family automobile in which she was sitting in the garage when he returned to the garage on hearing the explosion and found the charred body of his wife.

A three-year-old daughter and seven months old twins survive.

Eight Injured In
Houston Car Wreck

HOUSTON, July 5.—Eight persons were slightly injured when five automobiles were in an accident on the Houston-Galveston highway yesterday. Two machines collided and three others piled up on them. Frank J. Kula, who suffered a broken ankle, was the most severely injured.

205 DEAD AS TOLL OF FOURTH

DROWNING HAS
LEAD AS AUTO
HOLDS SECOND

FIREWORKS CLAIM BIG
SHARE OF LIVES IN
CELEBRATION

CHICAGO, July 5.—The lives of 205 men, women and children were a nation's sacrifice to the celebration of its 152nd birthday anniversary yesterday.

Fireworks claimed their share of victims, as they always have since the United States first began observing Independence Day with sky-rockets, pin wheel and cannon cracker. There were 11 such deaths in the entire country, according to the Associated Press tabulation.

Lakes and rivers, however, exacted the heaviest tribute of human life during the holiday, 106 drownings being reported. Motor car deaths ranked next with 54. Heat claimed 32 lives and lightning three, while four were killed in plane crashes. In addition there were 15 deaths attributed to other causes directly connected with America's observance of the Fourth.

Two Areas Have Half
Two densely populated areas—the middle Atlantic states and the midwest—had more than half the country's total deaths for the day. In the former there were 68 fatalities, which was five more than occurred in the midwest.

The mountain states and the northwest had the best sectional records with five deaths in each division.

Everywhere through the midwest the temperature was high, contributing both to deaths by heat and by drowning. The midwest led the country in the number of drownings with 33, although the middle Atlantic area had only two less.

Three of the motor car deaths came in races, drivers being killed in Oregon, Pennsylvania and Wisconsin.

Thousands Injured
The number of persons injured, many probably fatally ran into the thousands. Premature explosion of a truck load of fireworks at Lancaster, Pa., injured persons as 3,000 gathered in the public square to witness the display. In the larger cities the hospital list of persons hurt during observance of the day ran into the hundreds. Chicago, with an ordinance prohibiting the sale of fireworks, echoed all day with fire cracker explosions, and reports from police and hospitals that the number injured was probably greater than in recent years.

Young Raskob Dies
In Auto Accident

WILMINGTON, Del., July 5.—William Raskob, 19, son of John J. Raskob, chairman of the finance committee of General Motors, was killed in an automobile accident near Centerville, Md., this afternoon.

He had spent the night at the family home at Claymont, Del., and was motoring alone to the summer home near Centerville, when the accident occurred.

So far as is known there were no witnesses, but it is believed that the car in some manner ran off the concrete road and in trying to get it back it stopped so suddenly that young Raskob was thrown through the windshield. His body was found lying on the road with the head badly injured. It is thought death was almost instantaneous.

Young Raskob was a Yale student and had been home since the university closed.

'Girl Hickman' Giggles
Over Slaying Of Baby

OAKLAND, Calif., July 5.—The girl Hickman is the title police here have bestowed on Miss Erna Janoschek, 17 year old high school girl who is being held on charges of first degree murder.

Erna, a rather pretty, intelligent young flapper, strangled to death a year old baby, Diana Lillencrants, for whose parents Erna worked as a nurse and nurse. She told about it with flip unconcern.

Explains Her Crime
"I strangled the baby because I felt her mother wasn't supporting me in managing her other child, and because I felt they were working me too hard."

At this point the girl interrupted her explanation to laugh.

"I have to laugh when the impulse comes over me," she said. "When things like this happen I have to laugh."

Which remarks help to explain why the police call her "the girl Hickman."

Some criminologists here see an amazing similarity between Erna and the young Los Angeles murderer.

She's Bright Girl
Neither in looks nor psychological makeup does either one bear any outward sign of abnormality or degeneracy. Both were bright students in school, apparently desiring to do creative things—Erna's room contained scraps of poetry she had scribbled. Each surrendered abruptly to the impulse to kill, and displayed no remorse or grief afterward.

WICHITA FALLS, July 5.—J. D. Parrell, candidate for lieutenant governor, in a statement here yesterday declared his intention of voting for Governor Alfred E. Smith for president.

Big Toll Taken
In Germany Storm

BERLIN, July 5.—Reports from the provinces indicate that one of the worst windstorms in years visited Germany yesterday, taking a heavy toll of deaths and property damage.

A big chimney collapsed at Freischlag, Silesia, killing four workmen and injuring three others. A factory chimney collapsed at Zawada, near Gliwits, killing one man and injuring three, while another person was killed in Gliwits. In Berlin one person was killed and many injured. Trees were damaged and a hangar at the Tempelhof Airfield collapsed destroying four airplanes.

GALVESTON.—Four bids for deepening the Galveston channel from 30 to 32 feet were opened here today and forwarded to the office of the chief engineers at Washington. It is estimated that over 2,000,000 yards of material will be removed from the channel. The government has provided more than \$600,000 for the work.

Wheat Exports
GALVESTON.—Wheat exports from Galveston for the year ending June 30 aggregated 11,647,151 bushels according to figures made public today by H. A. Wickstrom, chief of the grain department of the Galveston cotton exchange and board of trade. Corn exports in the same period were 3,205,765 bushels; barley, 1,136,468; kafir, 698,342; Milo, 177,857 bushels.

HEFLIN FAILS
KLAN MEETING

ARMED GUARDS PATROL
FIELD BUT SPEAKER
FAILS TO APPEAR

NEW YORK, July 5.—Guarded by klansmen armed with pistols, clubs and sabers, 3,000 persons attended a Ku Klux Klan rally in a 40-acre field on Long Island yesterday but the guest of honor, Senator J. Thomas Hefflin, failed to appear.

Late in the afternoon word was received that the senator was speaking at a Klan rally in Jackson, Mich., and obviously would not be able to address the Long Island meeting. Hefflin, a Klansman, who had spent the day in various ceremonies then disbanded.

Senator Hefflin at Jackson said that he had received an invitation to attend the Jamaica rally while speaking at Albany, N. Y., but had declined because of the promise to the Michigan folks.

Some 200 police and an emergency wagon loaded with riot guns and tear gas bombs were stationed about the field all day to guard the klansmen against possible attack but their services were not needed. The police were not permitted to enter the field by the klansmen who had rented it for the day.

Police said they could do nothing about the show of firearms and other weapons carried by the klansmen as all the armed men were either deputy sheriffs or had permits to carry pistols. The klansmen explained their show of weapons as a precautionary measure to protect Senator Hefflin from attack. Several threatening letters had been received, they said, promising death to the Alabama senator if he appeared.

Governor Smith also had been invited to attend the meeting yesterday but declined on the ground of two other speaking engagements.

SIGHTED OVER

Fliers Reported
Over Brazil Coast

RIO JANEIRO, July 5.—Radio advices reaching Rio Janeiro state that the Italian aviators, Capt. Ferrarin and Major Del Prete, have reached the Brazilian coast and are now heading southward for Rio Janeiro.

It was not expected that they would reach the Brazilian capital before daylight tomorrow.

Captain Arturo Ferrarin and Major Carlo P. Del Prete left the Montecelio flying field outside of Rome at 7:15 p. m. Tuesday with the announced purpose of making a nonstop flight across the south Atlantic to the coast of Brazil in an effort to break the Chamberlain-Levine distance of 3,909 miles between the United States and Germany.

The Italian fliers estimated the distance from Rome to the coast of Brazil as 4,635 miles. If they should reach Rio Janeiro after striking the Brazilian coast, the would add another 1,000 miles to the distance they had covered.

Their plane, the Savoia-64, is capable of remaining in the air long enough for the flight to Rio Janeiro.

It was in this same machine that the two aviators established an endurance record early this month of 58 hours, 34 minutes and 26.12 seconds at 3,115 Pernambuco time (1:51 p. m. eastern standard time), the fliers were in the air 48 hours and in the light of their long distance record should be able to remain in the air another 10 hours, or long enough to reach the Brazilian capital.

Never a Non-Stop Flight
The south Atlantic has never before been crossed by air in a non-stop flight from Europe to South America. This was accomplished by the French fliers, Dieudonne Costes and Joseph LeBrie, who flew from St. Louis, Senegal, to Port Natal, Brazil, a distance of 2,130 miles in 19 hours.

Many crossings have been made from the Cape Verde Islands, off the coast of Africa, to the Island of Fernando de Noronha, which is off the coast of Brazil.

JULY 4 THEORY OF WINS DOUBTED BY M'GRAW

CARDS RETAIN LEAGUE'S LEAD OVER HOLIDAY

BOTH BREAK EVEN IN DOUBLE HEADERS ON INDEPENDENCE DAY

A theory exists that the teams in the lead on the Fourth of July also will be on top in late September or early October at the close of the major league pennant campaign. If this were 100 per cent true, the Yankees and the Cardinals could save much trouble for all concerned by starting the world series immediately, but the theory arouses skepticism in some quarters—chiefly in the National League.

John J. McGraw, for one, recalls that the Giants were running away with a fourth straight pennant on July 4, 1914, with the humble Braves in the cellar as usual. It so happened that the young men of the clan of McGraw enjoyed the ensuing world series from ringside seats as the Braves sailed into the mighty Athletics for four straight victories.

Would Limit Cards

Now McGraw is in accord with any move designed to limit the Cardinals to a purely literary interest in the next world series, as he himself was limited fourteen years ago.

Although the Giants now have lost one game fewer than the Cardinals the fact remains that, playing eastern trailers, the New York team has been unable to overhaul its western rival, which met admittedly tougher foes in the sunset section.

The Giants close out their intrasectional campaign at the Polo Grounds Wednesday by dividing a double header with Brooklyn.

Dizzy Vance snapped a Giant streak at eight straight by rolling the home entry, 8 to 3 in the opener but Larry Benton came back in the second clout to hang up his fourteenth victory and his seventeenth complete game in seventeen starts.

Cards Break Even

The even break cost the Giants no ground as the Cardinals and the Cubs divided two wild games which developed merely into a background for the home run struggle between Black Wilson and Skinny Jim Bottomley. Each slugger gathered two, leaving Wilson in the lead of the league, 18 to 17. The Cards won by 11 to 6 and the Cubs by 10 to 9.

Hope flamed anew in Cincinnati as the Reds plucked the Pirates further into the depths by taking morning and afternoon decisions at Forbes Field, 8 to 0, and 11 to 3. The Braves dropped another to the Pittsburgh Phinks, 10 to 4, but rain prevented further carnage.

In the American League campaign to see whether the Yankees can win 117 games and so beat the record of the 1906 Cubs, the Senators held the champions to an even break. The Senators, furthermore, held the Huggins even in the series of four, which has not been done by every team the Yankees have met.

Athletics Turn Back Sox

The Athletics turned back the Red Sox, 5 to 4, and 11 to 3. The Mackmen so shaved a full game from the lead of the champions.

Detroit and Cleveland divided their holiday bill, as did the Browns and the White Sox. The Chicago celebration was notable chiefly for the debut of Ed Walsh, Jr., late of Notre Dame. Young Ed's first stride in the shoes of his famous father was an unimpressive one, but he showed he has the pitching goods. The Browns bunched hits on him for five runs in the fourth, and he was retired to await a better day.

Jack Schalk celebrated young Walsh's debut by catching him in person. Schalk just previously had handed in his resignation as manager and a Russell Blackburne had been named manager pro-tem.

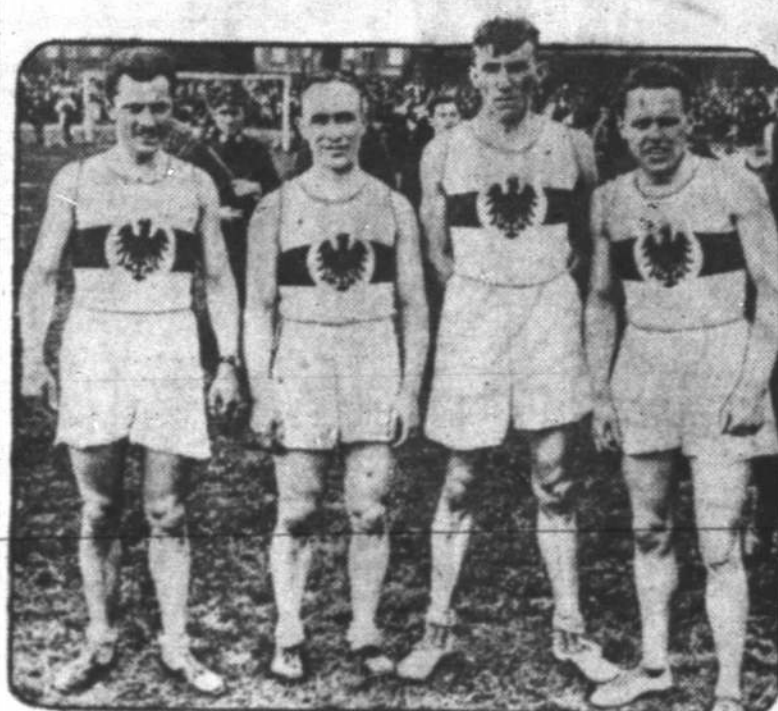

SMITH BACK IN CAPITAL AFTER TWO SPEECHES

GOVERNMENT PROBLEM DISCUSSED BY HIM IN ADDRESSES

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, July 5.—Governor Smith turned his face toward the state capital at Albany again today after two Independence Day addresses in which he told what he thought of the constitution, citizenship, and Tammany Hall, and took a sly dig at Congress.

In each of these addresses he made passing allusion to his recent nomination but on the whole steered clear of politics.

At the Independence Day address at Tammany Hall that he had heard a great deal of criticism of Tammany but expressed the opinion that nothing that was not all right could have continued its existence in this country as the society of Tammany has done for 139 years.

Neither Rich Nor Poor
Tammany, he said, cared not whether a man was rich or poor, what his religious beliefs might be so long as he was a lover of America.

In his second address of the day, delivered from the steps of the city to several thousand new voters, he likened the Declaration of Independence to a political platform and said that the whole thought of it was contained in the one sentence that holds that all men are created equal that life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness are their inalienable rights, and that to secure these rights governments are formed which secure their powers from the governed.

Of the constitution he said that no matter how much we may quarrel among ourselves politically, the senate and house of representatives can talk themselves to death and waste time in looking to the American public as though they were attempting it—no body can interfere as long as it remains with the privileges its enactment guaranteed.

He told the new voters both native and foreign born that citizenship carries with it responsibility "on the undisputed theory that you get nothing in this world for nothing" and expressed the opinion that one of the principal responsibilities was the exercise of the franchise.

Saying that it was surprising to know how many people were so different to their citizenship that they would not take the trouble to vote, he scored the man who "comes off on a picnic on election day, using it as a sort of week-end for entertainment."

BEER, BULLETS ARE DISCUSSED IN CRIME WAVE

FIFTH, SIXTH CHAPTERS OF CHICAGO REPORT ARE MADE PUBLIC

(By Associated Press.) CHICAGO, July 5.—Beer, bottles, "pineapples," and politics supplied the Illinois association for criminal justice with material for the fifth and sixth chapters of "organized crime," the report of an investigation into Chicago's crime.

The fifth chapter made public today dealt with the city's "beer war," which has occupied considerable attention since early in 1922, when various gangs were lured from other activities by promises of enormous profits in bootlegging and beer running. Since then, the report states, the gangsters active in bootlegging have formed strong organizations. The "beer war" resulted in 215 gang murders in less than four years, besides the killing of 160 alleged gangsters and bootleggers by the police.

Prohibition Not Barred The report, after enumerating the outstanding features of Chicago's "beer war," declared the investigators did not believe prohibition could be blamed entirely for the condition. Since other cities have not experienced similar gang activities under prohibition, the basic cause must be sought in the report suggested. The alliance of politics and gangdom was blamed principally for the "war" in Chicago.

"Pineapples," better known as bombs, have been in use in many years, the sixth chapter declared, although only in recent years has the bomber widened the scope of his activity. Twenty years ago bombs were used by vice lords to discourage competition, the report says.

With the coming of prohibition, bombs were found to be useful for the same purpose. Black hand activities, inter-racial conflicts, labor controversies, and "rackets" also have been found the "pineapple" and ideal weapon of attack because of the secrecy with which it can be planted.

Blackhand Bombings Investigation showed, are especially hard to solve because the victims seldom will go to police and because the perpetrators often have strong political connections.

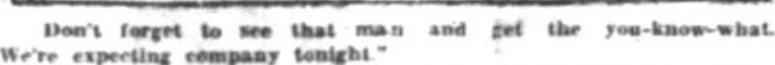

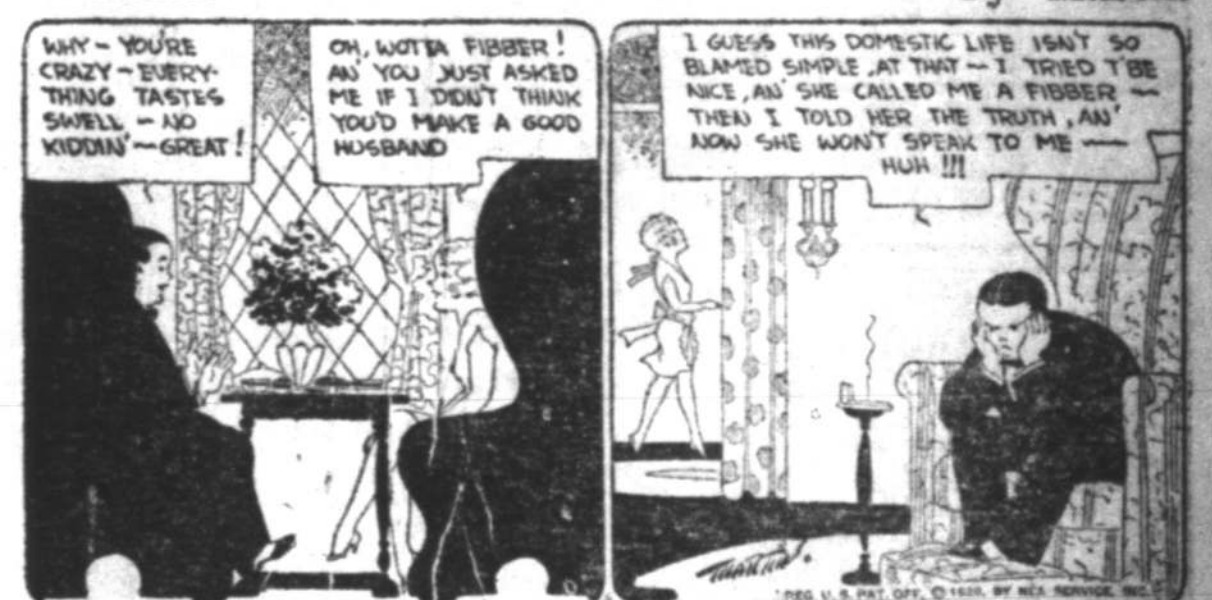

POWERFUL ICE BREAKER NEAR SCENE OF MEN

SLOW PROGRESS MADE DUE TO FLOES IN POLAR REGIONS

KINGS BAY, Spitzbergen, July 5.—Steadily grinding its way through tremendous ice floes, the powerful Russian ice breaker Krassin today was slowly approaching the camp of the five marooned men of the disintegrating ship of the Arctic expedition, the Swedish ship, the *Albatross*.

The Krassin was last reported in the vicinity of Cape Platen, about 50 miles west of the camp, making about three knots an hour in its difficult progress toward the eastward.

Search for Captain Roald Amundsen and his five missing companions is steadily going on, but this far has been fruitless. Soon the Norwegian fliers, Captain Riser-Larsen and Lieut. Luetow Holm will board the sealer Hobby to aid in the wide search for their fellow countryman and his companions.

The reconnaissance to be made by these fliers will have an American flavor since the Hobby was placed at their disposal by Miss Louise Boyd of California, who originally had planned a hunting trip to Greenland with it.

Recently ill, General Umberto Nobile was confined to bed aboard the *Citta Di Milano* today suffering from fever and exposure. His nerves have been strained by the disaster to the Italia. He worries constantly about the fate of missing members of his crew and Amundsen and the five men missing with him.

Despite hardships he has undergone and the disastrous result of his expedition, Nobile indicated in an interview that he has not yet decided to give up polar exploration. He expressed admiration for the unselfish attitude of Amundsen, who forgot the bitter controversy that developed after their joint flight across the pole in the Norge in 1926 to join in the rescue work. He said it was his constant prayer that Amundsen and his companions would be found and he hoped intensely that all were safe.

Nothing has been heard of the Russian flier Babushkin who took off from the ice breaker Malign on June 29 and failed to return. Babushkin reached the southern extremity of Hope Island and found a thick fog there. The rescue mission aboard the vessel thought that Babushkin might have alighted somewhere and been unable to take off again because of the fog.

BROWNWOOD, July 5. (AP)—Moses Grady Anderson, 17, was found shot to death here last night. He had brooded for several days over the fact that a friend had stopped speaking to him, the boy's father said.

Yvonne Anderson visited the offices of a newspaper yesterday and spent two hours writing his own funeral arrangements. The typewritten notes were found after his death.

OSLO, Norway.—The base ship Braganza, with the Norwegian fliers, Captain Riser-Larsen and Lieut. Luetow Holm arrived at Kings Bay from Northern Spitzbergen today and the airman will immediately begin a search for Roald Amundsen and his five missing companions.
