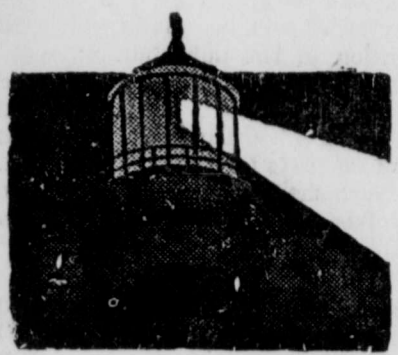

Questionnaires Of Crop Production Estimates Being Mailed to Farmers

Information supplied by some 25,000 Texas farmers and ranchers will become the basis for the official crop production estimates for each county and the State.

County Agent Bobby Lemons said a representative number of farmers and ranchers in Mitchell County will be among the 25,000 in Texas receiving the questionnaire from State Statistician Cary Palmer of the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service in Austin. The questionnaire will be mailed during the last half of October and early November.

Accurate estimates are of great importance to producers in planning their production and marketing, farm program participation and also for providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture, emphasized Lemons.

The program of estimates for each county is provided by the Texas Legislature. Since Texas covers such a wide area, with great diversification of production, State totals alone do not provide adequate information

SANDS FIRST VICTIM OF BULLDOGS IN DISTRICT PLAY

Smarting from a game they should have won from Forsan the week before, the Loraine Bulldogs last Friday night came back with vengeance and defeated the Sands Mustangs 41-6.

The Bulldogs now have Roby and Jayton to contend with and if they can polish both of them off, they will at least come out in second place in district play. According to reports, they should not have too much trouble handling Roby, but Jayton is something else. They have

on open date this week and should be in top shape for the Roby game on Nov. 13 at Roby.

The Bulldogs jumped out to a 13-0 lead in the first quarter when Cleon Williams and Ronald Jones scored on runs of 14 and 33 yards, respectively, with David Minton adding one extra point.

Sands scored in the second quarter when quarterback Paul Hopper passed to Paugh for 6 yards and the TD. This was their only score of the ball game. At halftime, the score was Loraine 13, Sands 6.

Jones scored two more touchdowns in the 3rd quarter on runs of 68 and 12 yards. Williams also added another TD in this quarter. Willie McKusker intercepted a Sands pass and took it 29 yards for the final TD of the game. Minton added 4 more extra points to bring the 3rd period scoring to 28 for the Bulldogs. The final quarter was scoreless.

Loraine had 18 first downs to 13 for Sands; 336 yards to 125; 0 passing yardage to 53; 0 of 2 while Sands completed 6 of 21; 1 interception; 5 punts for 32 yard average and Sands 3 for 32; Loraine had 11 penalties for 147 yards and 4 for 26 and the Bulldogs lost 1 fumble while Sands lost 3.

Cotton Seed For Planting

This hasn't been the best fall for crop harvesting and since many cotton farmers save seed from the current crop for next crop planting, some problems may arise, says County Agent Bobby Lemons.

When cotton opens during wet weather there is some danger that free fatty acid may develop in the seed. It can be detected by cutting seed and observing the color of the meat in the seed. If the seed has a brown color, then care must be exercised in handling the seed, points the county agent.

Seed can be damaged if it is stored overnight on a trailer at a moisture content of over 12 percent, or if it is left on a trailer on the gin lot during rush ginning periods.

Harvesting should be delayed in the morning, says the county agent, until the relative humidity, at boll height, is 60 per cent or less. It's better to eat an early lunch and start the stripper around 11 a. m. than to rush the job. Next year's planting seed should be saved from afternoon harvested cotton.

He suggests that cotton producers who are interested in more information on the subject come by his office for copies of MP-326, "Storage of Cottonseed for Planting Purposes", MP-297, "Keep Cotton Dry, Loose and Clean" and L-684, "Harvest All You Grow - Increase Profits - Pick Dry Cotton."

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Epperson.

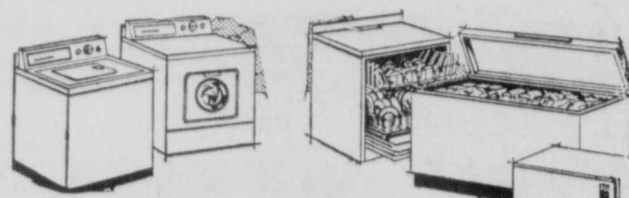
ATTEND SPIRITUAL LIFE RETREAT THURSDAY

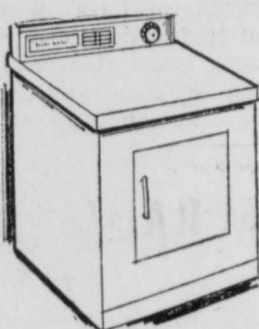

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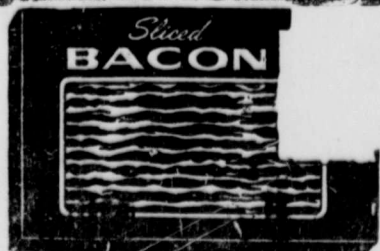
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
