## District probes water supply

In an unprecedented investigation, the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District, which includes Floyd County, is seeking to confirm the availability of additional ground-water reserves still in storage in the dewatered areas of the Ogallala Formation which would come near to or equal the quantity of water already pumped from storage by gravity which is approximately 200 million acre feet.

If the assumption is confirmed, the

second phase of this study will include methods to recover this water.

The water that is estimated to still be in storage in the dewatered section is capillary water held by surface tension around the clay, sand and gravel deposits of the formation already exhausted of its free water reserves by gravity pumping.

The amount of water that hydrologists speculate may be contained as capillary water in the formation could rival the estimated 500 million acre feet of water originally thought to be recoverable from the Ogallala Formation in Texas.

If their theories prove correct, an additional 500 million acre feet of water may still be clinging to the wetted sands and other materials in the geologic deposit when the formation will no longer yield water to wells through the natural forces of gravity.

The value of this additional water, if capturable by some method of secondary recovery and estimated at \$100 per acre foot, could be as much as fifty billion dollars.

One idea for recovering this capillary water involves the drilling of small diameter wells down into the formation to below a clay lens, sealing the well and then injecting compressed air into the wet sand section below.

This will theoretically result in the

release of the capillary water, allowing it to move by the force of gravity down to the existing water table for capture.

A simple air compressor propelled by a wind driven device similar to the old time windchargers on the High Plains, could provide power for such a secondary recovery operation, and take advantage of the natural winds of the area to conserve energy.

The total volume of water in storage in the Ogallala Formation can be calculated as the product of the volume of saturated material times the porosity, or the ratio expressed in percentage of void space to total volume.

Unfortunately, much of the water will not drain from the formation material by the forces of gravity for capture by wells. Therefore, the quantity of water in storage that is available to wells by gravity flow is computed by multiplying the volume of saturated material by the specific yield, the quantity of water that the formation will yield under the force of gravity if it is first saturated and then allowed to drain — the ration being expressed in percentage of this water to the volume of material drained.

The specific yield of the Ogallala Formation in Texas is about 15 percent. On hundred feet of saturated material would contain about 15 acre feet of water per surface acre. An acre foot of water is 325,851 gallons.

The Floydada Fire Department is completely volunteer.

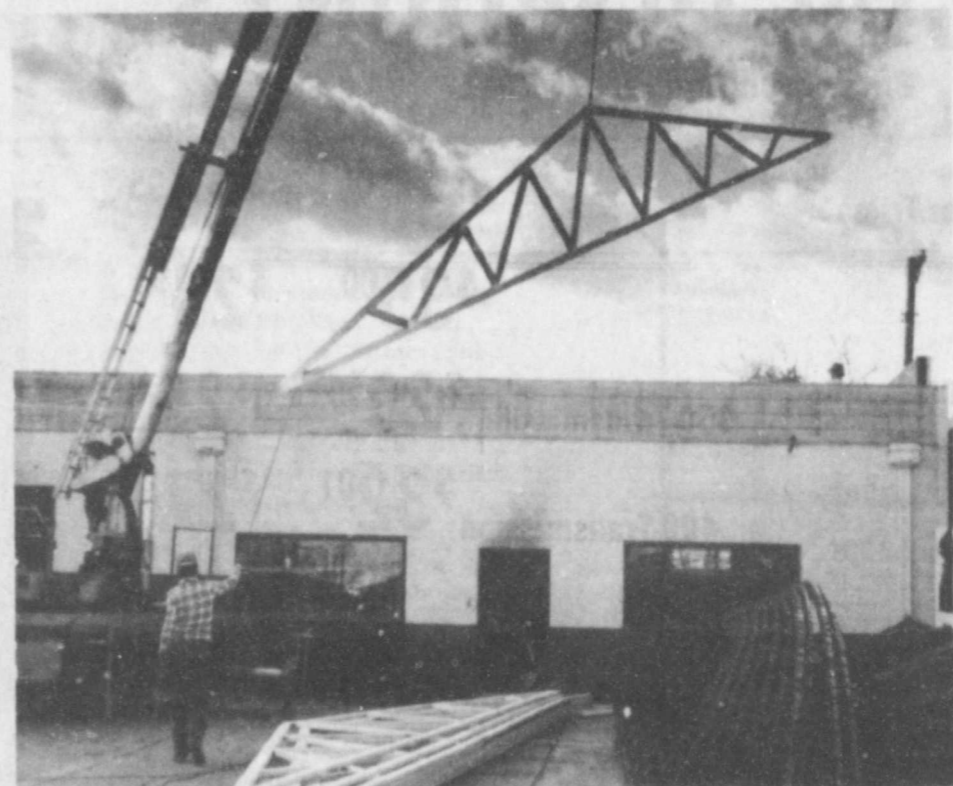
The damage to the building, equipment and merchandise was extensive.

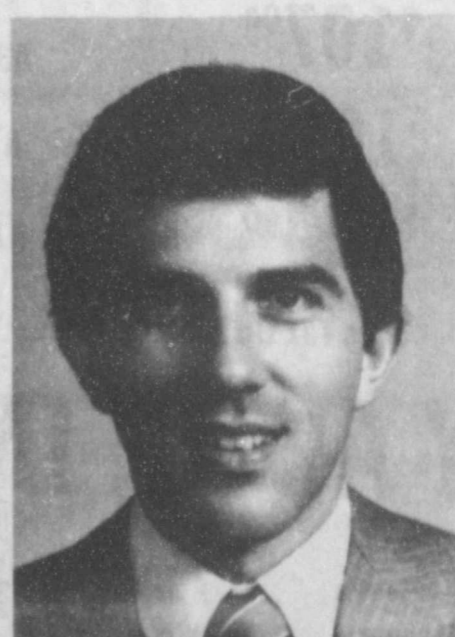
## Area gets light snow

The boosters and band members are collecting newspapers, computer cards, computer read-out sheets; and recycling them to Lubbock to them in.

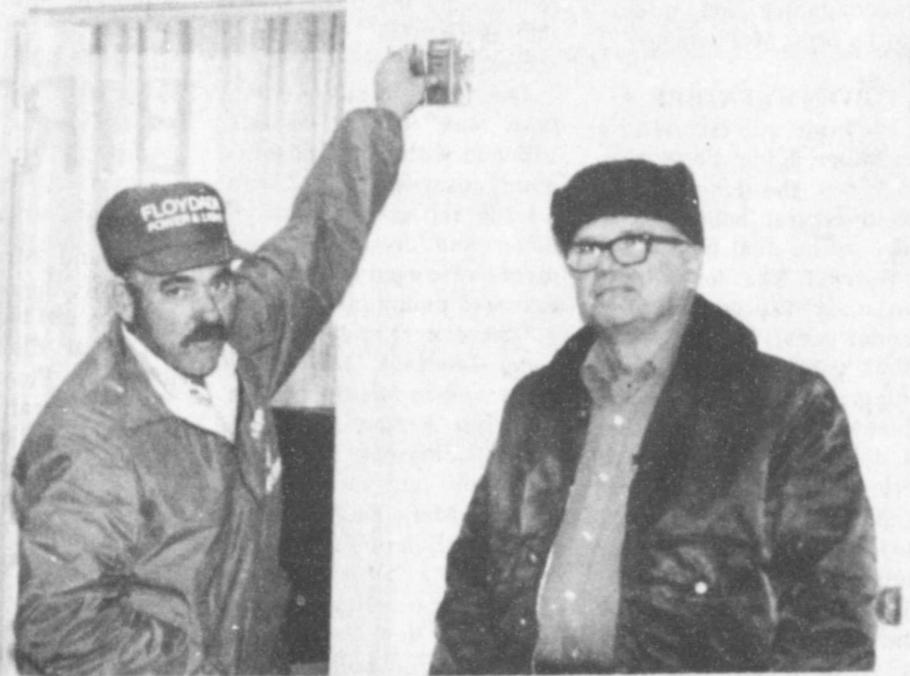
West Texas Paper Co. pays the organization by the pound for the paper and keeps track of the net total. At the end of the contest, the organization that recycled the most paper will get a bonus.

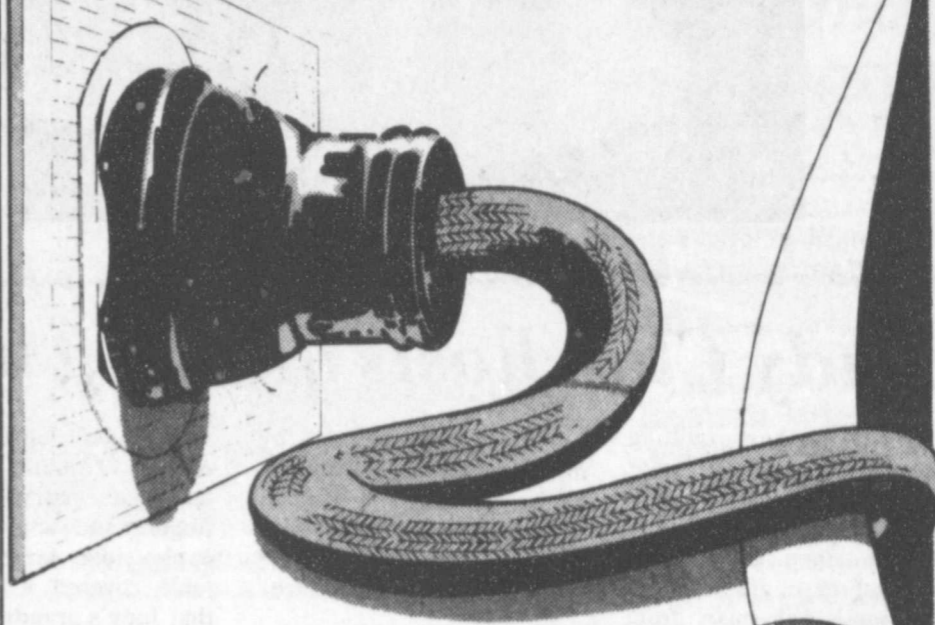

## Today's Lifestyles

### WOOL SWEATER CARE

Hand-wash wool sweaters at home to keep care costs down. Although most woollens require dry cleaning, wool sweaters are an exception.

Before washing a sweater for the first time, trace an outline of it on heavy paper. Use a pencil or pen that will not fade or run when wet. Label the paper pattern, and keep it to use each time the sweater is washed.

To wash a sweater, use lukewarm water and a mild detergent. Avoid using too much detergent — it's hard to rinse out of the sweater. Never use chlorine bleach on wool. Pretreat any spots with a diluted detergent solution. Soak the sweater for five to ten minutes, then gently squeeze the suds through the sweater several times. Avoid scrubbing, twisting or stretching the sweater while it is

wet. Squeeze out suds. Rinse the sweater at least twice in clear, lukewarm water. Handle the garment carefully. Squeeze out excess water after last rinsing. Lay the sweater on a dry terry cloth towel, and roll the towel up. Let towel absorb water for a few minutes.

Place the paper pattern of the sweater on a dry towel or sweater drying rack. Place the sweater on the pattern, gently shaping the sweater to match the pattern. Let the sweater dry away from direct heat and sunlight. When sweater is almost dry, turn it over to allow underside to dry more rapidly. Handle with care, and do not stretch sweater while turning it.

### TEN WAYS TO CUT FOOD COSTS

Cut food costs 10 easy ways.

First, pack your lunch. You not only save money, but you know what you are eating in terms of calories, protein and other key nutrients.

Eat more meat substitutes. Dry beans, peas and nuts are nutritious when used in the right combination. Or, add small amounts of meat, poultry or fish to the meat substitute to insure nutritional adequacy.

Prepare more food from scratch. If you work and don't have time for tedious preparation on workdays, try preparing food on the weekends, freeze it and reheat after a busy day at the job.

Eat fewer meals outside the home. Plan for meals eaten at restaurants and make them special occasions and something to look forward to.

Drink more water — it's cheaper than soft drinks, alcohol, coffee or tea, and it is calorie free.

Plan for a garden, and grow vegetables at home.

Buy store brands or generic products. The store or house brand is cheaper and for most products, they are just as acceptable as the nationally advertised product.

When taking a trip in the car, plan on a picnic instead of a stop at a fast food establishment.

Use unit pricing when selecting products. Often the larger size package is not the most economical.

Use leftovers or planned-overs. Dollars are saved by not wasting food.

## USDA: no barley, wheat payments

The U.S. Department of Agriculture will make no deficiency payments on the 1980 crops of barley and wheat, according to John Goodwin, associate administrator of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Goodwin said such payments are not required under the 1980 feed grain and wheat programs because market prices have been well above established target price levels of \$2.55 for barley and \$3.63 for wheat. During the June through October marketing period the national average market prices were \$2.59 per bushel for barley and \$3.89 per bushel for wheat.

Goodwin also said the final 1980 national program acreage for barley has been increased from 7.9 to 8.3 million acres and the national program acreage for wheat has been increased from 70 to 75 million acres. The national program acreage represents the number of acres of a crop "needed to meet estimated demand and assure desirable carryover levels," Goodwin said.

He said the allocation factor for both wheat and barley is 100 percent. The allocation factor is computed by dividing the national program acreage for a crop by the harvested acreage.

If 1980-crop deficiency payments for corn and sorghum are required, they will be made next April, Goodwin said.

## Soil fertility program Monday

The Floyd County Extension Service and the County Crops Committee would like to invite all Floyd County producers and interested individuals to attend their annual Soil Fertility Day Program which will be held at the Massie Activity Center in Floydada on Monday, January 26, beginning at 7:00 p.m.

Each year some of the major production problems confronted by producers in the county are addressed at the annual Soil Fertility Day Program in an effort to assist producers in learning new and improved methods of controlling and/or eliminating many of the obstacles limiting effective and profitable production of major crops in the county.

This year's program topics include:

- Weed control in cotton and grain crops
- Use of Trichogramma wasps in boll-worm control
- Use of infra-red photography in solving soil fertility and weed control problems

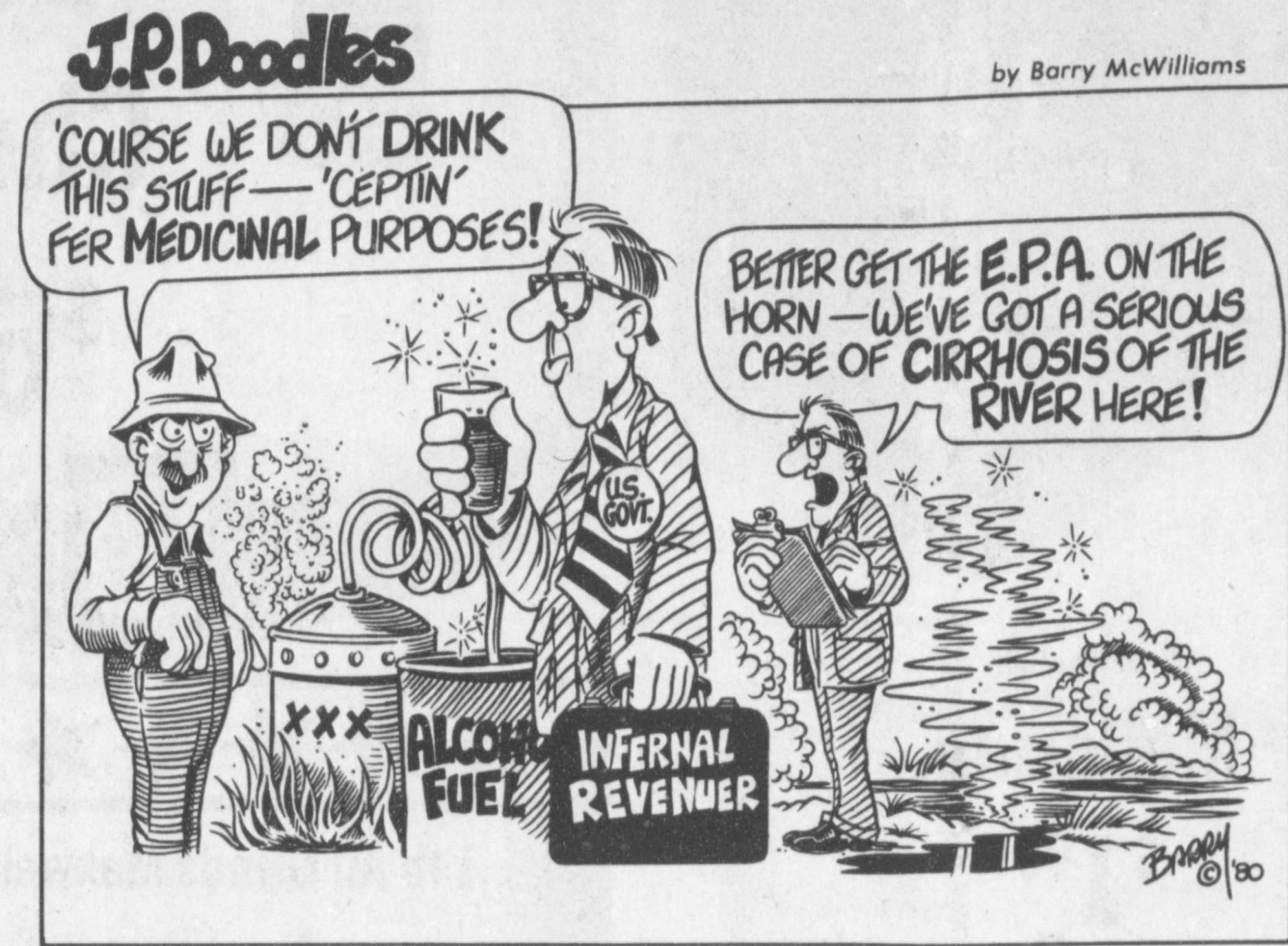
There will be no charge for attending this program and all those who attend are encouraged to have in mind some questions concerning weed control or insect control problems that they might want to ask any of the speakers on the program.

## Soybean growers can win trip to Mexico

## Many problems face Ag Secretary

(COLLEGE STATION) — "The greatest challenge the new Secretary of Agriculture will likely face is winning support for his producer-oriented policy proposals within other agencies of government."

Several of the major issues confronting Agriculture Secretary John Block are of direct interest to other government departments, according to Dr. Ronald D. Knutson.

Knutson is an economist in policy and marketing with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. He also has been serving on the staff of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Transition Task Force for the incoming Reagan administration.

Knutson said agricultural issues where conflicts are likely to occur among agencies of government include lifting of the Soviet grain embargo, increases in food prices, and proposals to increase price and income supports that have the potential for adding to government outlays.

Knutson, in an address before the Texas Farmers Union in Dallas, said that two major changes will occur within the USDA as a result of the election of Ronald Reagan as President and appointment of Block as Agriculture Secretary.

"First, USDA policy proposals and decisions will be more market-oriented. In this situation, forces of supply and demand are the prime determinants of farm prices and income," said Knutson.

This contrasts directly with the Carter administration farm policies where prices of major food and feed grains have been maintained in a relatively narrow range, mainly through low release and call levels within the government-controlled but farmer-held reserve, the economist explained.

implications for farmers and their organizations, the economist noted.

"While farm income will be higher in a market-oriented environment, farm prices will fluctuate more—and risk will increase," he predicted.

"In addition, with primarily a producer clientele, it will be critical that the new Secretary have a broad unified base of producer support. Without such support base, the Secretary's position in winning the assistance of other agencies for his producer-oriented proposals will be undermined," emphasized Knutson.

## Deadline nearing for SBA farm loans

"During the months of December and January the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) made arrangements for representatives from the Lubbock Disaster Office to meet with Texas agriculture producers and related businesses at various locations to provide information about the SBA disaster program and make applications available for persons to apply for low-interest recovery loans," said John H. Fall, Branch Manager of the SBA Lubbock Disaster Office.

Fall continued, "The farm disaster loan program is designed to provide low interest recovery loans for losses sustained during the 1980 production year as declared by SBA's declaration #1900."

Declaration #1900 expires February 12, 1981, and physical loss applications must be received by the SBA Lubbock Disaster Office by the close of business or postmarked by midnight. The deadline for economic injury disaster loan applications is May 12, 1981.

## Rep. Stenholm supports multilateral agreements

(DALLAS) — Congressman Charles Stenholm (D-Texas) appears to be among a growing number of farm state lawmakers who support multilateral trade agreements, according to statements made to members of the Texas Farmers Union meeting in Dallas.

Noting that the U.S. did not sell one single bushel of grain in world markets in 1980 at a price above the cost of production, Stenholm told the statewide farm organization's audience that officials of other exporting nations such as Canada and Australia "are asking when we Americans are going to stop selling our grains so cheap."

"The U.S. controls sixty percent of the world wheat market," noted the second-term congressman and member of the U.S. House Agriculture Committee. "That means we are poor businessmen if we can control a market but cannot increase our own profitability."

However, he quickly added that farmers don't have control of their markets, pointing out that ninety percent of the world's grains are traded by just four of the largest companies, three of which are foreign-owned, and the fourth partially under foreign control.

"We're going to continue to see the export market touted as a solution to the farm problem, and certainly it is," he said. "But the days of productive

agriculture in this country are numbered unless there is a change in policy."

While advocating a higher price for farm goods, Stenholm warned farmers against seeking income improvements through federal farm programs.

"Farmers cannot take a liberal approach to this congress and administration," he said. "The idea of spending more money for anything in the Congress is going to be difficult, just keeping what's there will be difficult enough."

On the positive side, the congressman said the state would benefit from having a veteran of the Texas election, "Kika" de la Garza, chairman of the House Agriculture Committee. He is also "very pleased" with the appointment of John Block to Secretary of Agriculture, although he's "concerned about who his (Block's) top aide might be."

Stenholm also said he had little doubt that fuel costs would rise by a dollar per gallon in a relatively short time, but, rather than suffering diesel costs, farmers should be "getting the 16-20% return they deserve because of the definite price increase of 'gasohol' (ethanol) relative to olive oil."

## Bentsen calls for meat import quotas

Senator Lloyd Bentsen on Thursday urged the President to keep meat import quotas in place during 1981.

"I urge you to consider both the consumer and the producer impact of your proposed decision on the 1981 meat import quotas and then to negotiate voluntary restraint agreements with meat exporting countries," Bentsen said in a letter to President Carter.

"According to the Department of Agriculture's own estimate, the amount of meat that would be imported without any restraints is only 11 million pounds above the trigger level of 1,447 million pounds. Such a small amount of meat will have very little, if any, impact on consumer prices."

"On the other hand, any action to suspend meat import quotas will have a large effect on the American cattle rancher. Cattlemen have been severely hurt in recent years by drought, by low cattle prices and by astronomical increases in operating costs. They are now rebuilding their herds to produce meat for future years and a suspension

of quotas at this time could discourage producers and thus reduce future meat supplies. From a consumer point of view, this action is just pushing a drowning man under until he comes up for a breath of air."

"In addition, I view this proposed action as a violation of the spirit of the Meat Import Act of 1979, which I authored. I supported, as did the industry, a compromise on President's discretion in order to win passage of your initial veto. However, the promise contains specific language directing that 'special weight be given to the health of the domestic industry.' In view of the very real benefit and the fact that these quotas may be suspended next year if we believe that the intent of this law is that quotas not be suspended in this situation," Bentsen said.

"I believe it is in the best interest of all concerned not to suspend the import quotas and I urge you to negotiate voluntary restraint agreements instead," Senator Bentsen said.

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
